Douglas is on the sidelines for every home game, football, volleyball, basketball, baseball and softball. She also travels with the football team for away games. It is her job to care for injured players and even at times to prepare them to be transferred to a hospital.

A 1992 graduate of Smith-Cotton High School, Douglas studied athletic training at the University of Central Missouri. She graduated with her bachelor degree in 1996 then received her master in athletic training from UCM in 1997. She went to work for Central Methodist University where she taught and also worked as an athletic trainer. WHS football coach Ryan Boyer

was one of her students.

Warsaw Runs Low On **Water Pressure**

Superintendent Says Cole Camp In Need Of Tax **Levy Increase**

In early moments at the City's March 16 Board meeting, Cole Camp R-1 Supt. Steve Hubbard discussed plans to put a 50 cent tax levy increase before voters in the upcoming election. He cited a need for Cole Camp schools to stay competitive in staff salaries, and assured listeners that such an increase would go only to staff. He concluded that City schools operate with the lowest levy allowed by law, and informed listeners that a 6:30 PM March 28 town hall meeting will be held in the middle school gym, to further discuss the matter.

was no surprise. What does this mean to you.? It is your second such award.


Burke-It means a lot because you only win coach of the year when you have good teams. We had a great team, so it's a result of the kids playing well.

One of the first cakes I made was called a Wacky Cake. There are different names for this easy (one 8x8 pan) cake, but it seems wacky to not mix everything together in a However, it comes out great every time, easy to make if you need a cake fix. Ever 1 ½ cups all-purpose

3/4 cup granulated sugar ¹/₃ cup unsweetened cocoa 1 teaspoon baking soda ½ teaspoon kosher salt 1/3 cup canola oil

1 tablespoon distilled white vinegar

2 teaspoons vanilla extract 1 cup water (I now substitute with ½ cup cold coffee and ½ cup water)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Sift flour, sugar, cocoa, baking soda and salt into an ungreased 8x8 pan, spreading mixture evenly. Make one large well and two small wells in mixture. Carefully pour oil into large well, vinegar into small well and vanilla into remaining small well. Pour liquid evenly over mixture, stir everything together using a fork until well combined.

Bake 25 or 30 minutes, until toothpick inserted in middle comes out clean.

Pour the following frosting recipe over cake while still warm, top with chopped pecans if desired.

Frosting: Cook 1/3 cup butter, ½ cup milk, 3 Tbs. unsweetened cocoa over



We were happy to have her as a teacher as well."

While Douglas is currently teaching physical science in the high school, she hopes to expand the science department by offering functional anatomy, sports medicine and first aid classes.

Many area schools call on Douglas at times to work because their district doesn't have an athletic trainer. This past year Douglas was hired by the Versailles and Sherwood School Districts to work during their wrestling tournaments.

Douglas became interested in athletic training when she was a freshman in high school in Sedalia.

"I looked up to a senior player volleyball who wanted to major in sports medicine so I became interested as well," said Douglas. "Now my daughter is majoring in athletic training as well.'

Douglas is the mother of a 23-year old daughter Taylor who is a college student and a 21-year old son, Ty-Kristofer, who is a Marine stationed in Jacksonville, North Carolina.

Douglas commented that the worst part of the job is when a student-athlete is badly injured.

"I had a junior varsity football player who suffered a paralyzing injury which affected his leg from the mid-thigh down and it took him over a year to completely recover," she said.

"I love the students and community here in Warsaw," said Douglas. "I enjoy watching the students grow up and fulfill their dreams.'



The group then okayed a resolution declaring the city's intention to reimburse itself from the proceeds of one or more tax-exempt financings for certain expenditures made and/or to be made in connection with the acquisition of certain capital improvements. This was said to be simply a banking procedure.

late session, Administrator Pogue added that the city's finances are about 10.5 percent better than the same period last year. He said the Municipal Airport will possibly lease land to a party to build a helicopter facility. That party may be able to get a 'Star loan' to build the facility, and the City may get a CDBG grant to help pay for it. In the last comment, he added that Co-Mo Connect will be in the City at 10 AM Apr. 28, to showcase its broadband installation in the city. Clerk Kendall asked about Aldermen's preference for its 'cloud' backup, and was approved to continue the present arrangement for another year. The group also received and approved a request by Stepping Stones Garden Club for a plant sale to be held 8:00 AM-Noon May 20 on the courthouse lawn between Main and Washington Sts.

Aldermen closed their open meeting about 6:47 PM to go into executive session. The open meetings are usually held on 1st and 3rd Monday eves; visitors are welcome.

Under old business Aldermen approved on 2nd reading three ordinances: (1) amending the employee handbook, noting that City employees will have input to that handbook; (2) setting the City's water rates to slightly increase its financial status; while (3) decreasing the City's sewer rates to slightly decrease its financial status. "An even wash," according to some. In new business, the group approved the investment of about \$ one million, at a better interest rate than formerly; and okayed workers compensation insurance through Redwood Financial Group, with some decrease in premium from recent costs.

City Clerk Paul reported there will be a Sunshine Law Training event at City Hall, 6 PM March 28. She added that a scheduled 2022 audit has been postponed because the auditor was not Public Works available. Director Heath Roark reported his department has received a mini-excavator and other equipment. Police Chief Jeff Canfield reported that his Dept. has received several body cameras and car cameras, but they have not been installed yet. He was looking toward a cloud backup of his records system. Alderman Cristin Fox noted that the City's general fund sales tax revenue was up about \$3,000 from the same time last year. And Mayor Meuschke reported that another round of TAP grants, of possible benefit to the City's sidewalks, will be available in July.

The meeting closed at about 8:35 PM. These sessions are usually held on 3rd Thursday eves. Visitors are welcome.



Ladycats Prepared To Ride Pitching, Youth In 2023



After a season in which she garnered second team All-State honors as a freshman, Warsaw will ride Brylee Brewster's pitching in what the Ladycats are hoping will be another successful season.

Brewster appears primed for a stellar sophomore campaign after leading Warsaw to a 13-2 record a year ago, when she posted a 0.79 ERA and struck out 156 batters in just 80 innings of work.

"Brylee puts in work all year long," head coach Megan Daleske said. "She plays for KC Peppers-Wallace 18's throughout the summer and continues individual work with pitching lessons and workout regimen in the winter."

She went on to say, "Brylee's best asset as a pitcher is her ability to control multiple pitches. She moves the ball around very well and constantly keeps batters guessing."

Brewster will handle the majority of the time in the circle, but she could be relieved from time to time by freshman Hailey Ferguson who has been working hard in the off-season as well.

Behind the plate, the Ladycats lost two-time All-State performer Taylor Howe, who is now starting collegiately in the Missouri Valley Conference at the University of Evansville. She will be replaced by her freshman sister, Tanna. Howe, who is a shortstop on her KC Pepper-Wallace 16's team throughout the summer, has readied herself for the season by attending

lessons with Brewster to help develop chemistry for the battery.

Sophomore Carly Price filled in several times at first base last season and she'll get the first opportunity at that same spot this year. In the middle, Haylee Cobb and Olivia Strange return at shortstop and second base after being in those same positions last season. At the hot corner, senior movein Janie Kilgore brings experience and leadership to a young squad.

In the grass, senior Faith Tharaldson, junior Jaylen McCullick and freshman Addison Sherill will provide speed and athleticism. Others players, including Ferguson, freshman Sadie Chapman and junior Autumn Walton are also in the outfield mix.

"The five returning starters from last year's varsity roster have been working hard and setting a standard for our large incoming freshman class," Daleske said. "Our defense, with a dominating pitcher, will be a major strength this year. We do not envision very many runs being scored against us so we will have to really focus on producing runs at the plate."

If that happens, the Ladycats should themselves playing late into the season.

"We expect to see another winning record," Daleske concluded. "But we are hoping that the tougher competition will help prepare us for a postseason



Wildcats Remain Youthful, **But Return A Ton Of Talent**

The Wildcats posted 14 Harding could spare innings wins in 2022 and they return seven starters from that team, looking to make another run into the Class 3 playoffs.

Senior catcher Nick Bagley earned first team All-State honors behind the plate a year ago and he'll be responsible for helping to mentor a young pitching

"Nick blocks and receives the ball well, and does a good job of keeping the pitchers focused," Warsaw head coach Johnny Eierman

At second base, sophomore Drake Murrell has taken the early nod, but senior Colton there as well.

On the left side of the Warsaw infield, a combination of the younger Bagley, Ferguson and Frost will all be used, depending on who's on the bump.

The Wildcats outfield will be anchored by senior Tayten Boyer in centerfield and he will be flanked on either side by Whitaker, Depriest and sophomores Bradley Watson and Shane Poyser. Any combination of those outfielders should save some hits and runs for the defense with their pure athleticism. Another sophomore, Logan Gemes may see time in the outfield, but may also be on the dirt at times as a true utility player for Eierman's defense.

Ferguson is the team's top returning hitter after posting a .438 batting average a season ago. He also had an on-base percentage of .608, swiped 11 bases and scored 22 runs. Nick Bagley hit .392 with an OBP of .430 and younger brother Kendall wasn't far behind with an average of .387. Whitaker hit .371 for the Wildcats last year and recorded 15 stolen bases, Boyer finished at .317 and Depriest also contributed to the offense with 14 stolen

"Our team speed is one of our top strengths," Eierman

"I want the identity of our team to be the most energetic team around," Eierman concluded. "When our guys practice and compete with a ton of energy, it's exciting to watch."

The Wildcats first home contest will be on Friday night, March 24, when they host the Tipton Cardinals. That game is slated for a 5:00 PM first pitch. All games are played on Roy Freund Field at the City of Warsaw's West Bledsoe Ferry Sports Complex.

Cole Camp **Brings Back** Stable Of Arms To Compete In 2023






CDs can be part of your investment strategy

In the financial world, stocks and stock-based mutual funds often get a lot of attention. And deservedly so, because they often form the core of a portfolio. When late autumn winds were putting a chill on Truman Lake, Missouri Department of Conservation Fisheries Management Biologist Chris Brooke and assistants were counting and measuring hundreds of crappie netted from the lake's depths. Nature's ancient processes guide the life patterns of fish like crappie. But anglers play a role in their ecosystem, too, at a heavily fished reservoir. Brooke was out on the water with the help of other MDC personnel in October to gather data used to track fish population trends.

Black crappie and white crappie, separate species that are closely related, among Missouri's are most popular sport fish. They can be easily caught during the spring spawning season on small lures or bait like minnows. Many anglers consider them a favorite fish to eat and a year-round quarry. Truman Lake is one of the state's most productive crappie fishing lakes, an enormous reservoir with varied water and habitat conditions. Crappie are panfish that must be 9 inches long or longer to be kept at Truman Lake. But they are numerous

given a succession of good

spawning years, a fish that's important to the lake's recreation economy.

biologists

MDC

scientifically monitor fish populations in Missouri waters to make sure they are healthy, and if not, possibly regulation propose a change. No regulation change is being considered for Truman Lake because crappie populations are good and relatively stable. The population sampling done with nets in autumn does enable a prediction for angler success. He expects 2023 to be a good year for crappie fishing. That's helped by a large year-class of black crappie spawned in 2019 that have reached the legal length limit.

"I think we're going to have an average year on Truman," Brooke said of 2023. "But an average year on Truman still produces a lot of really good crappie fishing."

When sampling crappie populations, biologists pull trap nets from the lake and process the fish. The crappie are identified by species, counted, and fish over five inches are measured. Most are then released back to the lake. Otoliths, an ear bone in fish, are removed from a few fish to determine the age. Data gathered goes into computer programs used to track population trends, such as growth rates. For example, the 2022 sampling showed that in the Windsor Crossing area of the lake on the Tebo Creek arm, 10 percent of the black crappie were over nine inches long and 48 percent of the white crappie were that size. Catch rates for both species were about the same.

Brooke sampled at six sites last autumn. Crappie numbers and average size varies between different lake locations. The middle and upper reaches of the Osage and South Grand River arms of the lake have higher percentages of white crappie than black crappie. Black crappie are sampled in higher percentages in the Pomme de Terre and Tebo Creek arms as well as the lower lake areas closer to the dam. White crappie dominate in the murkier arms of the lake. Black crappie are more numerous where water is more clear. The upper areas of the lake's arms tend to have more larger fish, while the lower areas have more fish.

For an angler, catching crappie comes down to knowledge of fish habits, skill, and some luck regarding weather and baitfish patterns. Also required is if fish happen to be hanging out and hungry where a baited hook on a line is dropped down into the water. Uncertainty helps make fishing an adventure.
