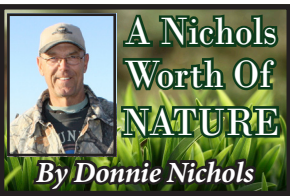

A Nichols Worth Of NATURE

Last month, I compared the functional yards we used to have with today's chemical fed, water gulping monoculture, non-native friendly lawns of today. I mentioned that turf grass is our country's largest irrigated crop using 9 billion gallons of water a day yet more than half of the lower 48 states were in a drought at the end of last summer. Here are a few more interesting facts: In 2018, gas powered lawn mowers, leaf blowers and other garden equipment guzzled almost 3 billion gallons of gas in the United States, roughly the same amount as 6 million passenger cars driven for a year. Running a lawn mower for an hour emits the same amount of pollution as driving a car 45 miles. Lawn and garden equipment produces up to 5% of our country's air pollution. Our lawns use 10 times more fertilizer than our agricultural crops.

The 80 million pounds of pesticides and herbicides we add to our lawns each year also disrupt the food chain, killing helpful insects and plants.

On another note, the eagle chicks in the nest that Kim and I monitor are about to fledge. The 2022 eagle production results from

Drought Taking A Big Toll On Benton County Crops And Cattle

At a recent cattle sale in Urbana, Missouri, the owner Bryon Wheeler made a statement to the assembled crowd that if the area didn't get rain soon area auctions would be having much larger cattle sales as farmers wouldn't be able to feed their livestock.

All Missouri counties are experiencing some level of dryness, with the most intense being felt in west

and southwest Missouri. "Grass is not growing as it should be and the creeks are not running like they usually are this time of year," said Leslie Grace of Henderson Ranch. "We shipped 500 head to the Flint Hills last week but we are not sure they will have the grass to support them."

Grace commented that the inventory of cattle nationwide is down considerably due to several years of drought in the western part of the nation.

"This past winter hay became ridiculously expensive and to haul it all

the way from Iowa made it even more expensive," Grace said.

If farmers have to sell their cows then when the rain finally comes restocking with young heifers will be expensive according to Grace.

According to the weather service 82% of Missouri is in drought conditions. Of that 50% is considered to be in severe drought and 14% in extreme drought.

Also located in southern Benton County, the Johnson Farm is experiencing similar problems. "The drought has definitely

affected our practices right now. The grass isn't growing like it should. The creek and ponds are lower than they should be. We are still feeding out some hay. We are really praying that we get some real rainfall soon or the summer will look dire," said Katie Johnson.

University of Missouri Extension agent Amie Breshears is also dealing with the affects of the drought. "Normally, April showers bring not only May flowers, but also pasture grass and hayfield

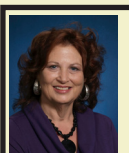

try a combo of dill, mint, and basil — or one or two of those herbs. As with all recipes, taste this as you make it and adjust what it needs. A little more salt, a little more lemon, a little more (or less) garlic or cilantro. It's about balance. I make this to serve with salmon, poached chicken, grilled meat or fish. Great on vegetables such as asparagus, cauliflower, or broccoli

1 jalapeño, seeded and roughly chopped
juice of 1 lemon
1 cup firmly packed cilantro leaves and stems
1 clove peeled garlic, optional
kosher salt
Combine yogurt, jalapeño, lemon juice, cilantro and garlic (if using) in a blender or food processor. Sprinkle in a hefty pinch of salt. Puree until blended. Serve, or store for up to 5 days in the refrigerator.

Spring green sauce with yogurt & cilantro
This is no harder to make than a smoothie. It lasts for days in the fridge and you can double or triple it. And you can customize it. If you're not into raw garlic, leave it out (but boost the lemon and salt). If you don't like cilantro,

grass. Unfortunately, with the lack of rain, our grass in our pastures and hayfields is not growing as we need it to. I've heard that producers are still feeding some hay, which usually stops once winter ends and the grass starts growing. That's not good - now is the time for grass to be growing to make this year's hay for feeding livestock this coming winter. If producers are still feeding hay, and this year's grass isn't growing like it should, producers will either have to find alternative feed sources, which can be expensive, or sell off animals so they are feeding fewer head. If lots of producers sell animals, the price may fall and the producers might not get enough money to cover their costs. Unfortunately, once producers sell off their animals, it can take time and money to rebuild the herd. It can also take time and money to rebuild pastures that may have been over-grazed. There's no 'bouncing back' from a drought. It takes time and money and lots of hard work. In short, there are many negative consequences and hard decisions that must be made when we don't get the rain we need. It's very important," said Breshears.

Lincoln FFA adviser and Benton County farms Brandi Maddux Rath is also dealing with the problems created by the drought.

"We have seen effects on pasture growth for our livestock. Normally by this point we see a relatively steady increase in forages, but the lack of rain has slowed that down. The cooler temperatures recently are also slowing the growth of forages. We're fortunate to have a decent supply of hay to get us through, but some don't have that luxury. I feel that a slow start to the season will lead to a delay in harvest for hay this summer," said Rath.

Down at Edwards Matthew Henderson is facing the same problems with the lack of rain and cool weather. "Well, a year ago, I was under stocked for the grass I had available to graze. So... I went and purchased several cows to better utilize my grass situation... and then.... Where I live, the drought started late last summer. We generally fertilize for multiple cuttings of hay, and the later cuttings were far under what they normally produce. Then the lack of moisture that seemed to continue into early fall, impacted our grazing abilities going into winter.

"We had to start feeding cows two months earlier than normal... and probably should have been feeding earlier than we started! To that, we depleted our hay supply before the end of the year, and were searching for hay by the first days of 2023. Normally I have hay to sell, but I spent

an additional \$60,000 + purchasing hay in 2023... so far. In addition, we are now facing the driest and coolest spring I have ever experienced. If the Good Lord doesn't send some rain our way soon, and the normal weather cycle as far as temps sets in... I'm not sure the grass with the minimal moisture we have received up to now, will grow enough to get very far into the upcoming grazing periods. Generally this time of year, moisture and temps produce excess forage, and people grazing livestock can manage to get by thru dry summer periods, but we haven't had a growing season this spring, and unless something changes quickly, there will be a serious problem of "no groceries" for many livestock producers. And most of the grass in our area is Fescue, which is a cool season grass, and it needs to be growing now, but with no rain... not going to grow much!

"So I have already spent additional money towards the purchase of hay, that had other places to go, and now facing the very real possibility of little to no hay crop, I suppose I will have to way out the economics of keeping my cattle or selling them. During an ideal year, there is very little profit in my livestock operation after expenses such as FUEL, fertilizer, equipment upkeep or purchases, herd health and labor costs. So realistically, if it doesn't start raining very quickly, I will consider selling my cattle. The cattle market has been relatively strong as of late, I believe mainly due to other parts of US selling down herds of livestock due to drought situations in their area.

"Less cattle production drives the markets to support the demand of the consumers. I would like to keep what I have and market my calves (my income) to be able to continue on the way I have always operated, but if I have to spend all I make in income towards the purchase of hay to feed my livestock... it doesn't leave much money left in the bank to pay my bills.... Lots to pray and think about," said Henderson.

The Lake of the Ozarks is also 3.31 feet below the full pool of 660 due to the lack of rain.

The weather forecast for central Missouri is for rain on Thursday and Friday. According to the weatherman, May should have more rainfall than April.

electricity to this area in the 1930s, it enhanced the quality of life for the region," said Bradshaw. Warsaw Mayor Edward Simons was very pleased with the addition of Co-Mo Connect.

"People want to live here because it is a beautiful area, but they need fast internet in order to continue working after moving here," said Simons. "We were thrilled to be able to grow with the help of Co-Mo Connect."

Co-Mo Connect has already installed broadband in Lincoln and they are working with the Cole Camp City Board to expand their services to Cole Camp.

"We are presently working south of Warsaw to take our services to the resorts south of the river," said Szymanowski. "We are also still visiting with every single business in the Warsaw community to expand our services."

While the Warsaw City Board pledged \$700,000 to bring broadband to Warsaw, that money is being repaid with a grant through Co-Mo.

Since then, Jones has bought numerous properties in Missouri and Kansas, as well as an all-inclusive resort in Belize. Jones runs seven different companies in the hotel/motel/rental business as well as a rental boat in Osage Beach.

(Continued from Page 1) the 26 nests monitored in our area by the Missouri Master Naturalists were: 19 nests occupied, 30 eaglets observed with 24 fledged. This equates to 73% nest occupancy, 1.6 eaglets per nest and .8 fledged per nest. I also monitor 12 bluebird boxes I placed along the mile loop in our neighborhood. I record data on boxes occupied, nest building, eggs produced, chicks hatched and fledged. My friend, Mike Murray, came out the second week of March made two bluebird boxes and placed them in his yard in town. Both boxes now have nests in them. Bluebirds are a great example of the importance of native plants in food chains.

Over thousands of years, insects have evolved the ability to digest natural toxins in plants.

Many insects develop not only a tolerance for these plants but also a dependence. There is an insect/native plant relationship. Dr. Doug Tallamy, author of "Bringing Nature Home", compares a native white oak tree in his yard with a non-native Bradford pear

in his neighbor's yard. He counted 410 caterpillars on the oak and one caterpillar on the Bradford pear. Chicks have hatched in one of our bluebird boxes and there is a constant pattern of parents bringing food to the nest. It may take 700 plus insects per day per chick for 16-21 days before Eastern bluebirds fledge.

It's not too late to put up a nest box. With good conditions, bluebirds usually have two broods in a season and sometimes three broods in one summer. "Plans to protect air and water, wilderness and wildlife, are in fact plans to protect man." Stewart Udall

Baling and wrapping high moisture forage has become a popular way to conserve spring forage crops. The advantages include less drying time needed before baling, harvesting at an earlier stage of maturity to capture high nutrient value, and reduced storage losses. There are several key components of the baleage making process that help ensure a high-quality product is produced, and I'd like to discuss three particular items related to baleage production.

The first item is the amount of ash in the forage. Ash is basically mineral content, and high ash levels can come from soil being incorporated into the bale as the forage is raked into windrows. Soil contamination can lead to clostridial bacteria contamination, which may result in poorly fermented forage, especially if the forage is above target moisture levels. Producers should pay attention to rake settings and avoid soil contamination, especially with winter annual cover crops such as rye, wheat, or triticale.

The second big issue is forage moisture content. Haylage wrapped too wet is a candidate for clostridial fermentation and the associated toxicities that come along with that issue, especially if the forage is heavily contaminated with soil. Butyric acid is a potential problem with very wet haylage and results in lowered feed intake and potential toxicity issues. Too dry, and the forage does not ferment and has a greater potential for molding if exposed to oxygen.

Target moisture for haylage is 45 to 60 percent moisture at baling. A review of the moisture content from forage quality samples of haylage I have received in my office for the years 2020 - 2023 showed 29% of the summer annual haylage samples were within the recommended moisture range. Winter annuals had 36% of the samples within the recommended moisture range. Most of the samples for both forage types were wetter than recommended, but a wide range of moisture content was noted. For example, the moisture content for winter annuals ranged from 39 to 74%. These results are from a small sample size but indicate producers may need to pay closer attention to moisture content at baling time.

Moisture can be estimated by microwave drying or using moisture testing equipment. Both take some time, but knowing forage moisture content when baling is critical to the success of having a high quality, well fermented product.

The final point is to exclude oxygen. Be sure to make tight bales. Bales should be wrapped with 6 to 8 mil of plastic. Consistent bale diameter is also critical as it prevents localized air pockets in tube-wrapped haylage. Bales should be wrapped within 12 hours of baling. Paying attention to these items will help ensure oxygen exclusion which leads to proper fermentation and forage preservation.

Harvesting at the right stage of forage maturity, baling at the correct moisture, and excluding oxygen with tight bales and adequate plastic wrapping are keys to successful baleage production. Before feeding, have the forage analyzed for nutrients and fermentation characteristics. This can help avoid feeding issues and provide producers with information to help them conserve high quality feed.

The Ladycats built a 5-1 lead at the end of the first inning and never looked back as they disposed of the Butler Lady Bears on the road on Monday morning, 15-1 and ultimately staked claim to the regular season championship of the Ozark Highlands Conference, finishing a perfect 6-0.

Batting in the top of the first, Warsaw leadoff Tanna Howe took advantage of an error in the outfield to end up on second base to get things going. Adison Sherrill singled up the middle to score Howe and it was quickly 1-0.

Carly Price was hit by pitch and Brylee Brewster reached on a fielder's choice to load the bases. Sherrill crossed the plate on a passed ball and Haylee Cobb scored Price and Brewster on a single to center field. Janie

Kilgore drew a 1-out walk, Kalebey Stevenson took a base on balls with 2 outs and Howe drew another walk to push across the final run of the inning to put the Ladycats up, 5-0.

Butler plated their only run in the bottom of the first inning.

Warsaw tallied 2 more runs in the second and tacked on 4 in each of the third and fourth innings for the 15-1 win.

Lady Bluebirds Get Wins Over LaMonte, Lincoln To Start Week

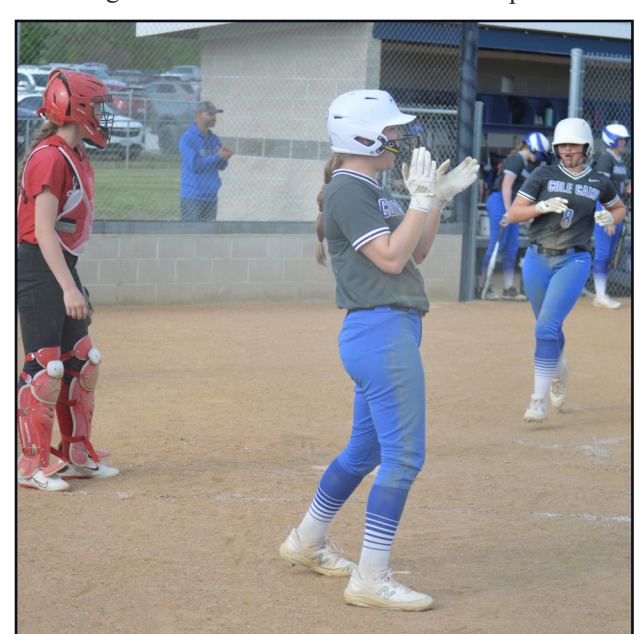

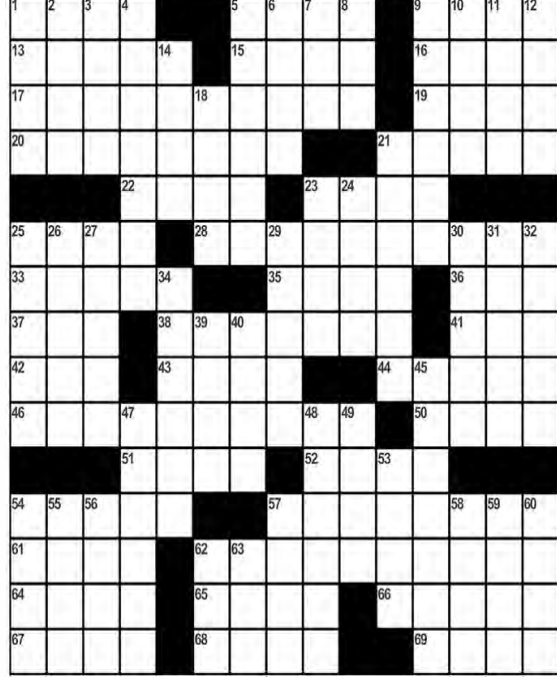

There has been a lot of talk about a "cashless" society, but it's not here yet. In fact, cash can still be a valuable element of your overall financial picture – if you employ it wisely. But how?

Consider these four key uses of cash:

- Everyday spending – Of course, you need sufficient cash on hand to pay for your cost of living – mortgage, debt payments, utilities, groceries, etc. You'll likely rely on your savings or checking accounts to pay for these needs.

- Unexpected expenses and emergencies – It's never a bad idea to establish a monthly budget. But, as you know, life is unpredictable – and sometimes you may encounter "budget-busting" expenses, such as a major home repair or a large medical bill. If you haven't planned for these costs, you might be forced to dip into your long-term investments, such as your IRA and 401(k), which can result in taxes, penalties and less money for your retirement. A better alternative is to prepare in advance by building an emergency fund containing up to six months' worth of living expenses in cash, or at least in a highly liquid account, held separately from your regular checking or savings account so you won't inadvertently spend the money.

- Short-term savings goal – When you are investing



for a long-term goal – especially retirement – you will likely need to own a reasonable percentage of growth-oriented vehicles, such as stocks and stock-based mutual funds. The value of these investments will fluctuate, so, if it's possible, you'll want to avoid selling them when their price is down – which may make them unsuitable for short-term goals. But if you're aiming for a goal that you want to achieve in a year or so – a wedding, a long vacation, and so on – you'll want to be sure a specific amount of money is there for you when you need it. Consequently, you'll want to put away cash for this type of goal, possibly in a short-term savings or investment vehicle that might pay somewhat higher interest than a regular checking/savings account.

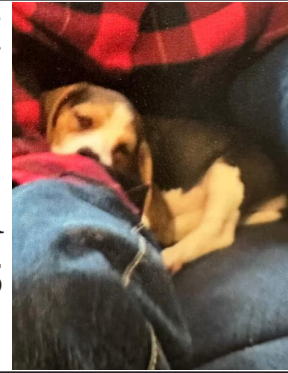
- Source of investment – In regard to your longer-term investment strategy, cash can play two important roles. First, it can serve as its own asset class, alongside other classes, such as stocks and fixed-income vehicles. Unlike these other classes – especially stocks and stock-based mutual funds – cash won't fluctuate in value, so it can potentially help lessen the impact of market volatility on your portfolio. And second, having the cash available in your portfolio gives you the opportunity to quickly take advantage of other investment opportunities that may occur. And you may be able to use your existing investments to help replenish the cash in your portfolio. For example, if you choose to take stock dividends in cash, these dividends can be "swept" into your brokerage account and held there until you're ready to invest them. (However, depending on your comprehensive financial strategy, it may be a good move to simply reinvest the dividends into

the same stocks or stock funds.) Keep in mind that you won't want your investment accounts to contain too much cash, as its purchasing power can erode due to inflation.

By managing your cash efficiently, and putting it to

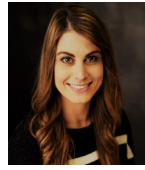

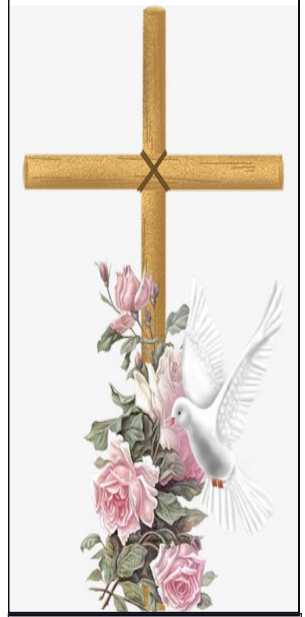
adversity. The world may act like a burning dumpster fire and how we react is what is important.

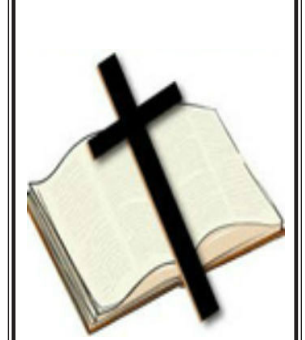

It has been a busy week in the Missouri House of Representatives, with two weeks remaining in the legislative session we are working quickly to move legislation through the General Assembly and hopefully to the Governor's desk. Below, you will find some important highlights of the previous week here at the Capitol.

Budget Bills Head to Conference (HBs 2-13, 15) With just a little more than a week before the constitutional deadline to approve a state operating budget, key members of the House and Senate are now headed to conference to work out the final details for the spending plan for the upcoming fiscal year.

It was on March 30 that the House gave its stamp of approval to the appropriations bills that make up the state budget. The plan as approved by the House checked in with a funding total of \$45.6 billion. The Senate then took the House plan and spent the last few weeks making several key changes. The version of the budget approved by the Senate increases state spending by more than \$4 billion. As it returned to the House the Senate-approved plan checked in at a total of approximately \$50 billion.

Budget leaders from the House and Senate will now meet in conference committees to iron out the differences in the two spending plans. One of the key differences in the two plans is funding for the expansion of Interstate 70. The House opted not to include funding for the plan in the state operating budget, but instead placed the \$859 million requested by the governor in a separate capital improvements project bill

that also included another \$180 million for other road projects. The Senate plan allocates more than \$2.8 billion for the Interstate 70 project and utilizes bond debt to provide \$1.4 billion of that funding. The two chambers will now need to work to reach an agreement on the total amount allocated to the project and whether to issue bonds to provide a portion of the funding.

The Senate made several other changes to the House budget that members from both chambers will discuss. Among other items, the Senate added nearly \$462 million to raise rates paid to agencies that care for individuals with developmental disabilities, as well as \$300 million to build a new psychiatric hospital in Kansas City. Additionally, the Senate authorized \$29 million to boost the minimum school teacher salary to \$38,000. The members of the Senate also added \$43 million to build a new veterinary hospital and \$25 million to construct a research slaughterhouse at the University of Missouri. An issue of interest has been funding for public libraries. Funds that were removed by the House Budget Committee we reinstated by the Senate version of the Budget.

House and Senate members will conference on the budget next week to iron out the final version of the state spending plan. The two chambers have until Friday, May 5 to give final approval to the bills that make up the state operating budget.

Legislation to Provide Direct Access to Physical Therapy Signed into Law (SB 51)

Governor Mike Parson has signed Senate Bill 51 into law. The legislation allows Missourians more direct access to physical therapy services. A signing ceremony was held in Governor Parson's office at the State Capitol this week where he was joined by the sponsors of the bill.

"We are all about streamlining processes and making it easier for Missourians to receive the services they need without unnecessary government burdens," Parson said. "SB 51 will make access to physical therapy care easier for more Missourians, while reducing patient costs and protecting their quality of care. We are proud to sign this good piece of legislation into law and look forward to more being sent to my desk soon."

Under the provisions of SB 51:

Qualified physical therapists may treat patients

without a prescription or referral from a physician; Qualified physical therapists may provide certain educational information, fitness or wellness programs, screenings, and consultations without a prescription or referral from a physician; and Physical therapists are required to consult with an approved health care provider after every 10 visits or 30 days, whichever occurs first, before continuing therapy.

As I mentioned before, only two weeks remain in the legislative session, many bills will never make it across the finish line. I have amended several pieces of my own legislation onto other bills that are still moving with the hope that they may get final approval from both the House and Senate and be sent to the Governor's desk to be signed into law. As per usual this is a fast-paced, interesting time as we approach the final day of session.

As we head down the final stretch, many political maneuvers are being used and deployed as we head into the final two weeks. As usual, the remaining budget bills, the House and Senate did not agree upon, so they are headed to conference committee, which is a committee of both Representatives and Senators and they will negotiate and compromise and hopefully come to an agreement. The House sent the Senate a \$45.6 billion budget and the Senate sent us back a \$50 billion budget. Some of the differences are the Senate added almost \$2 billion to the I-70 project, over what

the house budgeted, some of that money being bonded money. The Senate also added in \$300 million for a new psychiatric hospital in Kansas City. They also added \$29 million to raise the minimum teacher salary to \$38,000.00 and also \$43 million and \$25 million for a new veterinary hospital and research slaughterhouse at the University of Missouri. These differences will be worked out by next Friday, as that is the deadline for the budget to be done. I will give a more lengthy and detailed report in the next two weeks as many of the bills will cross the finish line then.

Calling Missouri birders who know their birds by sight and sound! The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) needs volunteers to assist with five vacant bird-observation routes in Missouri as part of the 2023 North American Breeding Bird Survey (BBS) May 27 – July 7.

The five Missouri BBS routes that need volunteers are: Cassville in Barry County, Centertown in Cole County, Kennett in Dunklin County, Sticklerville in Sullivan County, and Bland in Gasconade and Osage counties. Volunteers will need to conduct their

survey one day during the May 27 – July 7 survey period.

BBS is a long-term, large-scale, international bird monitoring program that started in 1966. The purpose of the BBS is to track the status and trends of North American bird populations. Each year during mostly June -- the height of the bird-breeding season for most of the U.S. -- BBS volunteers collect bird-population data along roadside survey routes to help. For more info on the BBS, visit pwrc.usgs.gov/bbs/.

Each survey route is 24.5 miles long with stops at half-mile intervals. At each stop, volunteers conduct three-minute point counts where they record data on the bird species and numbers they see or hear within a quarter-mile radius. Surveys must start one-half hour before sunrise and take about five hours to complete. Volunteers need only conduct their survey route once during the survey period.

Haslerig said volunteers need access to suitable transportation, must have good hearing and eyesight, and must be able to identify all birds in the area. All new BBS volunteers must successfully complete an online methodology training program before their data can be used.

She also stressed that knowing bird songs is extremely important. "Most birds counted on these surveys are singing males," said Haslerig.

The annual BBS helps scientists determine bird populations and their threats.

"Bird populations have numerous, widespread threats including habitat loss, habitat fragmentation, land-use changes, and chemical contaminants," said Haslerig. "The annual BBS is vital in determining how bird species are doing. For example, a recent article in the journal Science showed the loss of almost 3 billion birds in North America since 1970. These results were partially determined by long-term BBS data. This shows the necessity of these surveys and recruiting volunteers to conduct them over the long term."

Haslerig hopes surveyors will commit to multiple years of collecting data on the same route. "It helps with the consistency in data collection," she said. "And volunteers also get familiar with the routes and have better ideas what birds they will encounter. And it's fun!"

Pay Attention To Safety While on Mowers

Spring/summer is here and as we get out our lawn mowers and other outdoor power equipment out from storage to work in our yards, businesses and other green spaces, it's important to keep safety in mind.

"Think safety first," says Kris Kiser, President and CEO of the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute (OPEI), an international trade association representing outdoor power equipment, small engine, utility vehicle, golf car and personal transport vehicle manufacturers and suppliers.

"I can't stress enough to review manufacturer's safety guidance before starting up any equipment—especially your lawn mower. Review your owner's manual and do maintenance on your equipment," said Kiser.

OPEI offers these tips for readying and using your outdoor power equipment:

- Know not all lawn mowers are the same. Whether your mower is a garden tractor, zero turn mower or other, it has a unique design, requirements, weight classification, and other differences that impact how to use it safely. The newest machines have the latest safety standards.

- Know your specific machine. Many mowers may look similar but the technology is ever evolving with evolving safety systems. They vary in design, power supply, performance, operating parameters, and more. Your manufacturer-supplied owner's manual will guide you in these differences. Read your owner's manual.

- When using mowers on slopes follow the manufacturer's guidance to the letter.

- Do not disable or alter manufacturer-installed safety equipment.

- Walk your yard before mowing. Slopes, wet grass and weather may impact equipment performance, as well as safe handling procedures. Pick up sticks and limbs that may have fallen to the ground over the winter and any loose objects that could be hit by a mower. Inspect trees for damaged limbs that may get in your way when mowing.

- Look over equipment before use. Check the air filter, oil level and gasoline tank. Watch for loose belts and missing or damaged parts. Replace any parts needed or take your equipment to a qualified service representative.

- Protect your power. Use only E10 or less fuel in gasoline-powered outdoor power equipment if it is not designed for higher ethanol blends. Add a fuel stabilizer if you don't use up all the fuel in the tank right away. Burn off any fuel before storing the mower more than 30 days. For battery-powered equipment, only use battery packs specified by the manufacturer. Follow all charging instructions as outlined in the owner's manual. Be sure to store fuel and batteries safely. Keep batteries away from other metal objects, store them in a climate-controlled area, and never stack batteries.

- Keep children and pets away from machines

during operation.

- Keep your mower clean. It will run more efficiently and last longer. Always remove dirt, oil or grass before using and storing. Store equipment in a dry place, avoiding damp or wet environments.
