

Last month, I compared the functional yards we used to have with today's chemical fed, water gulping monoculture, non-native friendly lawns of today. I mentioned that turf grass is our country's largest irrigated crop using 9 billion gallons of water a day yet more than half of the lower 48 states were in a drought at the end of last summer. Here are a few more interesting facts: In 2018. gas powered lawn mowers, leaf blowers and other garden equipment guzzled almost 3 billion gallons of gas in the United States, roughly the same amount as 6 million passenger cars driven for a year. Running a lawn mower for an hour emits the same amount of pollution as driving a car 45 miles. Lawn and garden equipment produces up to 5% of our country's air pollution. Our lawns use 10 times more fertilizer than our agricultural crops.

The 80 million pounds of pesticides and herbicides we add to our lawns each year also disrupt the food chain, killing helpful insects and plants.

Drought Taking A Big Toll On **Benton County Crops And Cattle**

At a recent cattle sale in Urbana, Missouri, the owner Bryon Wheeler made a statement to the assembled crowd that if the area didn't get rain soon area auctions would be having much larger cattle sales as farmers wouldn't be able to feed their livestock.

All Missouri counties are experiencing some level of dryness, with the most and southwest Missouri. "Grass is not growing as

it should be and the creeks are not running like they usually are this time of year," said Leslie Grace of Henderson Ranch. "We shipped 500 head to the Flint Hills last week but we are not sure they will have the grass to support them." Grace commented that the inventory of cattle nationwide is considerably due to several years of drought in the western part of the nation.

"This past winter hay became ridiculously

the way from Iowa made it even more expensive," Grace said.

If farmers have to sell their cows then when the rain finally comes restocking with young heifers will be expensive according to

According to the weather service 82% of Missouri is in drought conditions. Of that 50% is considered to be in severe drought and 14% in extreme drought.

Also located in southern Benton County, the Johnson Farm is experiencing similar problems. intense being felt in west expensive and to haul it all drought has definitely

affected our practices right now. The grass isn't growing like it should. The creek and ponds are lower than they should be. We are still feeding out some hay. We are really praying that we get some real rainfall soon or the summer will look dire," said Katie Johnson.

Spring green sauce with yogurt & cilantro

This is no harder to make than a smoothie. It lasts for days in the fridge and you can double or triple it. And you can customize it. If you're not into raw garlic, leave it out (but boost the lemon and salt). If you don't like cilantro,

try a combo of dill, mint, and basil — or one or two of those herbs. As with all recipes, taste this as you make it and adjust what it cilantro leaves and stems needs. A little more salt, a 1 clove peeled garlic little more lemon, a little more (or less) garlic or cilantro. It's about balance. I make this to serve with salmon, poached chicken, grilled meat or fish. Great on vegetables such as asparagus, cauliflower, or broccoli

1 cup plain Greek yogurt

1 jalapeño, seeded and roughly chopped juice of 1 lemon 1 cup firmly packed

optional kosher salt

Combine yogurt, jalapeño, lemon juice, cilantro and garlic (if using) in a blender or food processor. Sprinkle in a hefty pinch of salt. Puree until blended. Serve, or store for up to 5 days in

the refrigerator.

(Continued from Page 1) the 26 nests monitored in our area by the Missouri Master Naturalists were: 19 nests occupied, 30 eaglets observed with 24 fledged. This equates to 73% nest occupancy, 1.6 eaglets per nest and .8 fledged per nest. I also monitor 12 bluebird boxes I placed along the mile loop in our neighborhood. I record data on boxes occupied, nest building, eggs produced, chicks hatched and fledged. My friend, Mike Murray, came out the second week of March made two bluebird boxes and placed them in his vard in town. Both boxes now have nests in them. Bluebirds are a great example of the importance of native plants in food chains.

Over thousands of years, insects have evolved the ability to digest natural toxins in plants.

Many insects develop not only a tolerance for these plants but also a dependence. There is insect/native plant relationship. Dr. Doug Tallamy, author of "Bringing Nature Home", compares a native white oak tree in his yard with a non-native Bradford pear

in his neighbor's yard. He counted 410 caterpillars on the oak and one caterpillar on the Bradford pear. Chicks have hatched in one of our bluebird boxes and there is a constant pattern of parents bringing food to the nest. It may take 700 plus insects per day per chick for 16-21 days before Eastern bluebirds fledge.

It's not too late to put up a nest box. With good bluebirds conditions, usually have two broods in a season and sometimes three broods in one summer. "Plans to protect air and water, wilderness and wildlife, are in fact plans to protect man." Stewart Udall

Baling and wrapping high moisture forage has become a popular way to conserve spring forage crops. The advantages include less drying time needed before baling, harvesting at an earlier stage of maturity to capture high nutrient value, and reduced storage losses. There are several key components of the baleage making process that help ensure a high-quality product is produced, and I'd like to discuss three particular items related to baleage production.

The first item is the amount of ash in the forage. Ash is basically mineral content, and high ash levels can come from soil being incorporated into the bale as the forage is raked into windrows. Soil contamination can lead to clostridial bacteria contamination, which may result in poorly fermented forage, especially if the forage is above target moisture levels. Producers should pay attention to rake settings and avoid soil contamination, especially with winter annual cover crops such as rye, wheat, or triticale.

The second big issue is forage moisture content. Haylage wrapped too wet is a candidate for clostridial fermentation and associated toxicities that come along with that issue, especially if the forage is heavily contaminated with soil. Butyric acid is a potential problem with very wet haylage and results in lowered feed intake and potential toxicity issues. Too dry, and the forage does not ferment and has a greater potential for molding if exposed to oxygen.

Target moisture haylage is 45 to 60 percent moisture at baling. review of the moisture forage content from quality samples of haylage I have received in my office for the years 2020 -2023 showed 29% of the summer annual haylage samples were within the recommended moisture Winter annuals range. had 36% of the samples within the recommended moisture range. Most of the samples for both forage types were wetter than recommended, but a wide range of moisture content was noted. For example, the moisture content for winter annuals ranged from 39 to 74%. These results are from a small sample size but indicate producers may need to pay closer attention to moisture content at baling time.

Moisture can be estimated by microwave drying or using moisture testing equipment. Both take some time, but knowing forage moisture content when baling is critical to the success of having a high quality, well fermented product.

The final point is to exclude oxygen. Be sure to make tight bales. Bales should be wrapped with 6 to 8 mil of plastic. Consistent bale diameter is also critical as it prevents localized air pockets in tube-wrapped haylage. Bales should be wrapped within 12 hours of baling. Paying attention to these items will help ensure oxygen exclusion which leads to proper fermentation and forage preservation.

Harvesting at the right

stage of forage maturity, baling at the correct moisture, and excluding oxygen with tight bales and adequate plastic wrapping are keys to successful baleage production. Before feeding, have the forage analyzed for nutrients and fermentation characteristics. This can help avoid feeding issues and provide producers with information to help them conserve high quality feed. It has been a busy week in the Missouri House of Representatives, with two weeks remaining in the legislative session we are working quickly to move legislation through the General Assembly and hopefully to the Governor's desk. Below, you will find some important highlights of the previous week here at the Capitol.

Budget Bills Head to Conference (HBs 2-13, 15) With just a little more than a week before the constitutional deadline to approve a state operating budget, key members of the House and Senate are now headed to conference to work out the final details for the spending plan for the upcoming fiscal year.

It was on March 30 that the House gave its stamp of approval to the appropriations bills that make up the state budget. The plan as approved by the House checked in with a funding total of \$45.6 billion. The Senate then took the House plan and spent the last few weeks making several key changes. The version of the budget approved by the Senate increases state spending by more than \$4 billion. As it returned to the House the Senate-approved plan checked in at a total of approximately \$50 billion.

Budget leaders from the House and Senate will now meet in conference committees to iron out the differences in the two spending plans. One of the key differences in the two plans is funding for the expansion of Interstate 70. The House opted not to include funding for the plan in the state operating but budget, instead placed the \$859 million requested by the governor in a separate capital improvements project bill

that also included another \$180 million for other road projects. The Senate plan allocates more than \$2.8 billion for the Interstate 70 project and utilizes bond debt to provide \$1.4 billion of that funding. The two chambers will now need to work to reach an agreement on the total amount allocated to the project and whether to issue bonds to provide a portion of the funding.

The Senate made several other changes to the House budget that members from both chambers will discuss. Among other items, the Senate added nearly \$462 million to raise rates paid to agencies that care for individuals with developmental disabilities, as well as \$300 million to build a new psychiatric hospital in Kansas City. Additionally, the Senate authorized \$29 million to boost the minimum school teacher salary to \$38,000. The members of the Senate also added \$43 million to build a new veterinary hospital and \$25 million to construct a research slaughterhouse at the University of Missouri. An issue of interest has been funding for public libraries. Funds that were removed by the House Budget Committee we reinstated by the Senate version of the Budget.

House and Senate members will conference on the budget next week to iron out the final version of the state spending plan. The two chambers have until Friday, May 5 to give final approval to the bills that make up the state operating budget.

Legislation to Provide Direct Access to Physical Therapy Signed into Law (SB 51)

Governor Mike Parson has signed Senate Bill 51 into law. The legislation allows Missourians more direct access to physical therapy services. A signing ceremony was held in Governor Parson's office at the State Capitol this week where he was joined by the sponsors of the bill.

"We are all about processes streamlining and making it easier for Missourians to receive the services they need without unnecessary government burdens," Parson said. "SB 51 will make access to physical therapy care easier for more Missourians, while reducing patient costs and protecting their quality of care. We are proud to sign this good piece of legislation into law and look forward to more being sent to my desk soon."

Under the provisions of

Qualified physical therapists may treat patients without a prescription or referral from a physician; Qualified physical therapists may provide educational certain information, fitness wellness programs, screenings, and consultations without a prescription or referral from a physician; and

LEGAL

Physical therapists are required to consult with an approved health care provider after every 10 visits or 30 days, whichever occurs first, before continuing therapy.

As I mentioned before, only two weeks remain in the legislative session, many bills will never make it across the finish line. I have amended several pieces of my own legislation onto other bills that are still moving with the hope that they may get final approval from both the House and Senate and be sent to the Governor's desk to be signed into law. As per usual this is a fastpaced, interesting time as we approach the final day of session.

As we head down the final stretch, many political maneuvers are being used and deployed as we head into the final two weeks. As usual, the remaining budget bills, the House and Senate did not agree upon, so they are headed to conference committee, which is a committee of both Representatives and Senators and they will negotiate and compromise and hopefully come to an agreement. The House sent the Senate a \$45.6 billion budget and the Senate sent us back a \$50 billion budget. Some of the differences are the Senate added almost \$2 billion to the I-70 project, over what

the house budgeted, some of that money being bonded money. The Senate also added in \$300 million for a new psychiatric hospital in Kansas City. They also added \$29 million to raise the minimum teacher salary to \$38,000.00 and also \$43 million and \$25 million for a new veterinary hospital and research slaughterhouse at the University of Missouri. These differences will be worked out by next Friday, as that is the deadline for the budget to be done. I will give a more lengthy and detailed report in the next two weeks as many of the bills will cross the finish

Calling Missouri birders who know their birds by sight and sound! The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) needs volunteers to assist with five vacant bird-observation routes in Missouri as part of the 2023 North American Breeding Bird Survey (BBS) May 27 – July 7.

The five Missouri BBS routes that need volunteers are: Cassville in Barry County, Centertown in Cole County, Kenneth in Dunklin County, Sticklerville in Sullivan County, Bland in Gasconade and Osage counties. Volunteers will need to conduct their survey one day during the May 27 – July 7 survey period.

BBS is a long-term, large-scale, international bird monitoring program that started in 1966. The purpose of the BBS is to track the status and trends of North American bird populations. Each vear during mostly June -- the height of the bird-breeding season for most of the U.S. - BBS volunteers collect bird-population data along roadside survey routes to help. For more info on the BBS, visit pwrc.usgs.gov/ bbs/.

Each survey route is 24.5 miles long with stops half-mile intervals. At each stop, volunteers conduct three-minute point counts where they record data on the bird species and numbers they see or hear within a quarter-mile radius. Surveys must start one-half hour before sunrise and take about five hours to complete. Volunteers need only conduct their survey route once during the survey period.

Haslerig said volunteers need access to suitable transportation, must have good hearing and eyesight, and must be able to identify all birds in the area. All new BBS volunteers must successfully complete an online methodology training program before their data can be used.

She also stressed that knowing bird songs is extremely important. "Most birds counted on these surveys are singing males," said Haslerig.

The annual BBS helps scientists determine bird populations and their threats.

"Bird populations have numerous, widespread threats including habitat loss, habitat fragmentation, land-use changes, and chemical contaminants," said Haslerig. "The annual BBS is vital in determining how bird species are doing. For example, a recent article in the journal Science showed the loss of almost 3 billion birds in North America since 1970. These results were partially determined by long-term BBS data. This shows the necessity of these surveys and recruiting volunteers to conduct them over the long

Haslerig hopes surveyors will commit to multiple years of collecting data on the same route. "It helps with the consistency in data collection," she said. "And volunteers also get familiar with the routes and have better ideas what birds they will encounter. And it's fun!"

Pay Attention To Safety While on Mowers

Spring/summer is here and as we get out our lawn mowers and other outdoor power equipment out from storage to work in our vards, businesses and other green spaces, it's important to keep safety in mind.

"Think safety first," savs Kris Kiser, President and CEO of the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute (OPEI), an international association representing outdoor power equipment, small engine, utility vehicle, golf car and personal transport vehicle manufacturers and suppliers.

"I can't stress enough to review manufacturer's safety guidance before starting up any equipment—especially your lawn mower. Review your owner's manual and do maintenance on your equipment," said Kiser.

OPEI offers these tips for readying and using your outdoor power equipment:

- Know not all lawn mowers are the same. Whether your mower is a garden tractor, zero turn mower or other. it has a unique design, requirements, weight classification, and other differences that impact how to use it safely. The newest machines have the latest
- safety standards. Know your specific machine. Many mowers may look similar but the technology is ever evolving with evolving safety systems. They vary in design, power supply, performance, operating parameters, and more. Your manufacturer-supplied owner's manual will guide vou in these differences. Read vour owner's manual.
- When using mowers slopes follow the manufacturer's guidance to
- Do not disable or alter manufacturer-installed safety equipment.

 Walk your yard before mowing. Slopes, wet grass and weather may impact equipment performance, as well as safe handling procedures. Pick up sticks and limbs that may have fallen to the ground over the winter and any loose objects that could be hit by a mower. Inspect trees for damaged limbs that may get in your way when mowing.

- Look over equipment before use. Check the air filter, oil level and gasoline tank. Watch for loose belts and missing or damaged parts. Replace any parts needed or take your equipment to a qualified service representative.
- Protect your power. Use only E10 or less fuel in gasoline-powered outdoor power equipment if it is not designed for higher ethanol blends. Add a fuel stabilizer if you don't use up all the fuel in the tank right away. Burn off any fuel before storing the mower more than 30 days. For batterypowered equipment, only use battery packs specified by the manufacturer. Follow all charging instructions as outlined in the owner's manual. Be sure to store fuel and batteries safely. Keep batteries awav from other metal objects, store them in a climatecontrolled area, and never stack batteries.

Keep children and pets away from machines during operation.

Keep your mower clean. It will run more efficiently and last longer. Always remove dirt, oil or grass before using and storing. Store equipment in a dry place, avoiding damp or wet environments.
