

Pitts Marks Major Anniversary Of **Opening Doors For Benton County**

Offering housing to people of Benton County for over 50 years, Pitts Homes of Warsaw helped a local family this as their 1800 square foot home was delivered to their family farm near Warsaw on Wednesday, May 17.

Pitts manager Jerry Downs was on site to oversee the placement as two large cranes lifted the sections of the house on the basement months as we were waiting across the state, but we

of the home of Stan and Amanda Adler.

"It was so amazing to watch the cranes lift the sections of our house and put them together so quickly," said Stan Adler. "We had been planning for this moment for over a year but when it came together it was really fast."

Downs stated that usually it only takes six months from the time a customer decides on a floor plan to have the house built and delivered but the Adler's waited for a year because COVID slowed down production.

"Actually, this house has been in storage for several prepared for the set up of the Adler's home," said Downs. Downs, who will celebrate 40 years with Pitts in October, has been the manager of the Warsaw branch of Pitts Homes since its establishment here in 1983. The company was established in Hermitage in 1970 and now has businesses in Clinton, Bolivar, Strafford and Warsaw.

The Adler's chose Pitts Homes for their purchase because they wanted to buy local and they needed affordable housing.

"We looked around at several modular businesses

for the basement to be knew Jerry and we knew he would treat us fairly," said Amanda Adler. "I wanted to be able to be a part of the plans as we searched for the perfect house for our forever home."

In selecting a modular home, the Adler's were able to pick a floor plan that suited their family and then customize it to fit their needs. Downs explained that a modular home is actually an engineered house with the same construction as if it were built on site.



constructed house is that the on-site house is exposed to the elements as it is being built while an engineered house is built inside the company's warehouse," said Downs.

Modular homes are constructed entirely in factories then are transported to their sites on flatbed trucks. They meet strict quality-control requirements prior to delivery and are built to strict specifications.

Assembled with the use of cranes, the final product is almost indistinguishable from comparable ones built on-site and must conform to the same local, state and regional building codes as their site-built neighbors. They must be structurally approved by building inspectors.

"We had two homes delivered to the Benton County area on the day the Adler's received their home," said Downs. "The homes left the factory in Indiana at 5:30 in the morning and arrived in Benton County the next day. Both houses were standing on their sites within hours of arrival."

The Adler's selected a floor plan with the Pitts crew and then made adjustments to fit their family's needs.

"We wanted three bedrooms, two baths and an office," said Amanda Adler. "So, we selected a floor plan to fit that then turned what would have been a breakfast nook into an office for Stan just off the kitchen. We have a working fireplace and a open kitchen/living room area to give us plenty of space for our large extended family."

explained that Downs with the many different floor plans available, he could help customers fit the needs of their families. "As long as it could be built in two halves, we can modify the floor plan to meet the needs of the customer," said Downs. "We can build a two-story structure or the single depending on how much the customer wants to spend. We are very competitive when it comes to price with the traditional on-site constructions." The Adler's decided on building a basement to set their home on instead of a concrete pad. "The water heater, water softener and heating/ac systems will all be located in the basement so that frees up space on the first level," said Amanda Adler. "For now, the basement will be mainly storage, but we want to finish it someday when our children are older so we had plumbing and electric outlets installed in the basement." The basement actually took more time to construct than the house that now sets on top of it. Benton County is known for its limestone and clay so digging down several feet was a chore .. "We have been dreaming of this day for over a year and with COVID slowing down the process, I thought this day would never come, but here it is," said Amanda Adler with tears in her eyes. While COVID did slow down production, Downs said that Pitts Homes actually continued production through it all. "COVID increased demand for manufactured homes because people wanted to get out of the city," said Downs. "We never shut down and people came to our lot to look through the models throughout the COVID pandemic." Amber and Trey Glenn from Warsaw also recently purchased a home from Pitts Homes to accommodate their family of seven. "From start to finish, this project has gone relatively said Amber smooth," Glenn. "We moved in over the weekend and couldn't be happier! We have a lot of outside work to do, but the inside is everything we'd hoped for. Thank you to Pitts Homes in Warsaw!"

Downs and his wife Kathy actually first lived in a home right on the Pitts lot until they bought their farm north of Warsaw. Their daughter Eryn (Kellner) grew up on the Pitts Homes lot and now works as the office manager and salesperson. Both Downs and the Kellner family live in modular homes.

"I consider myself to be very lucky to have found a job I love very early in my career and I enjoy taking care of my customers and helping them reach home ownership," said Downs. "Seeing a family reach their goals is very satisfying."

Mike Mais, Chairman of the Harbor Village Board of Directors addressed the assembly thanking supporters and contributors who made the Harbor Village dream a reality. Tours were conducted and the most popular place was the dining area.

One of the residents attending the first open house, Bob Hare, was quoted as saying "It is the best thing that has happened in this area...I come here once or twice a week because there is good fellowship and games. Another visitor, Dani Stanton, said that she came to see how her mom might benefit from the facility and stated "It is close by and convenient for Mom, and she might like to use the computer lab and cafeteria services. My niece lives with my mom and has two small children who might also benefit from the services offered by Harbor Village. It is good to have all ages together. That way grandparents can be with their grandchildren at the same place."

"The intent of Harbor Village was for all of us to be in place," said Chris Steward, CEO of Katy Trail Community Trail. "Compass and Katy Trail help and work with the Senior Center to provide services, health education, fitness, recreation, disease management, falls prevention, long-term care ombudsman program, benefits counseling and Medicare information and counseling, as well as enrollment assistance in the Health Insurance Marketplace. Many classes are held at the center, as well as special events.

"At this point we are trying to make the Senior Center a place to have a good meal and maybe stay for bingo or other activities," said Fair. "The senior housing located near Harbor Village is also a great service and we hope there will be more housing in the future. Physical fitness is offered and if it is hard for someone to stand up and do exercises, they can sit down and still exercise leg muscles. I sat in on the Joint Friendly Exercise class during the Open House on May 18 and the ladies were having the best time. They were laughing and singing which is what they need socialization."

Fair said that the Warsaw senior center ranks among the nicest facilities in the counties in West Central Missouri served by Care Connection, and said at the Village Café, the food is good. The biggest draw is fried chicken on Fridays when as many as 120 people show up for lunch. The Warm House, in Warsaw, is partnering with the center to provide this end of the week meal.

In 1977, the senior center operated in Warsaw on 704 State Street. In 1979 it moved to 1050 Jackson Street in a strip mall. The center then moved to Gunstock, near a small park in 2012 before becoming part of Harbor Village.

Since the move to its current location, the senior center has been able to serve more seniors because of building space and a larger kitchen. In 2012 the center served about 22,500 meals. That number increased to about 32,000 in FY 2023.

The Senior Center is open five days a week. Many of its exercise and wellness programs are offered on Zoom as well as at the center. Now our organization is trying to help people who have barriers such as transportation, housing, literacy, and food, which can keep them from achieving optimal health. We are starting to do an HIV protection program and are starting with one provider at a time to prevent HIV. Benton County has the highest incident of HIV out of all the 13 counties Katy Trail serves. We also deliver health care in a mobile unit once a week to the Warsaw

School District and have a licensed social worker with an office in one of the schools.

Fair, Public Kav Information Officer of Care Connection for Aging Services, said that the organization has expanded its services in programming and care management. She said that the number of meals has expanded at the Senior Center, many that are home delivered to people who are homebound. The Senior Center is part of Care Connection where a variety of services are offered including nutrition, care management, family caregiver support, in-home the center at 660-438-3300 or email warsaw@goaging. org.





Rusk went on to say, "We are playing our best ball right now."





Additionally, while thirdparty special needs trusts are funded by someone other than the beneficiary, firstparty special needs trusts are funded by the beneficiary's own assets - and for these first-party special needs trusts, the trust must typically pay back Medicaid for money it has spent on the beneficiary's behalf after the death of the beneficiary. This repayment could deplete the trust, depriving secondary beneficiaries of any assets they might otherwise receive. Thirdparty special needs trusts do not require Medicaid repayment.

Consult with a legal professional before establishing a special needs trust to ensure this arrangement is appropriate for your family's situation. But if it is, and if it's managed properly, it can relieve you of some of the stress you may feel over the future of your loved one with special needs.



policy, government benefits will be protected.

In a special needs trust, the role of trustee is important. A trustee must manage the funds within the trust and ensure those funds are used only to supplement SSI and Medicaid, the government programs that typically pay for food, housing and medicine. Instead, a special needs trust can be used for most other expenses, including transportation and travel, education, entertainment, professional services and personal items. You could serve as trustee yourself or choose a relative or a trusted friend. Ideally, vou want someone who's familiar with your wishes and the needs of your family member with disabilities and who is also competent at managing finances and staying current on SSI and Medicaid regulations.

As an alternative, you could hire a professional trust company to manage your special needs trust. This type of company has expertise in asset management and government regulations and can provide you with strict recordkeeping of all the financial transactions associated with your trust. If you go this route, you'll want to compare different trust companies' costs and services. For such a personal matter as administering a trust for your special-needs family member, you'll want to be sure you're comfortable with whatever company you select.

Also, you'll want to be familiar with some of the possible areas of concern regarding special needs trusts. For one thing, because the trustee totally controls when and how funds are distributed, beneficiaries can get Jones, Member SIPC





Wheat Straw Ammoniation

conditions Drought throughout parts of central Missouri have severely limited cool-season grass production in pastures and hay fields. Seedheads have emerged on cool-season grasses, but undergrowth is thin in many places. Many producers are searching for hay or other forage sources to replenish depleted hay reserves.

In addition to already harvested wheat hay and planting summer annual forages, another option to fill hay needs might come in the form of ammoniated wheat straw. In order to be successful, straw needs to be baled and treated soon after grain harvest.

Bales need to be covered to seal in the anhydrous ammonia. Use either 6 or 8 mil black or clear UV resistant plastic sheets for covering the stack. A 40' X 100' sheet of plastic will completely cover 38 round bales of straw. Stack two bottom rows of 13 bales and one top row of 12 bales. Anhydrous ammonia should be applied at a rate of 60 pounds per ton of wheat straw, so it is important to weigh some bales to get an average bale weight. Once the weight of 38 straw bales is known, the correct amount of anhydrous ammonia can be purchased and the anhydrous tank can be slowly emptied under the covered stack.

To treat the straw, insert a 1-inch pipe into the center of the stack under the plastic and attach it to a steel fence post to keep it in place. Apply the ammonia slowly to the center of the stack. Three to 5 hours is suggested. Be sure to seal the sides of the plastic against the ground with dirt, waste lime, etc. Enough fill should be placed on the plastic to keep it from being pulled loose by winds and ballooning when the ammonia gas fills the covered stack.

Bales should be stacked in an area that has excellent air flow. Be aware that vegetation under the stack will be killed. Stacking the bales on gravel will help keep moisture from wicking up from the ground below, but be absolutely sure to get the plastic sealed to the ground completely around the stack in order to prevent the anhydrous ammonia from escaping.

Safety when working with anhydrous ammonia is of the utmost concern. Follow these safety instructions: 1) Wear goggles, rubber gloves and protective clothing. 2) Work upwind when releasing ammonia. 3) Have fresh water available to wash off any anhydrous ammonia that comes in contact with the skin. 4) Check all valves, hoses and tanks for leaks. 5) Check the plastic cover for leaks and patch with duct tape. 6) Do not smoke near anhydrous ammonia. 7) Keep children

away from treatment area. Keep the straw pile covered until 2 to 3 weeks before feeding begins. At that time, the ends of the stack can be opened to allow the stack to air out. The chemical reactions occur within a couple weeks during the summer months, but the pile must remain covered to maintain forage quality of the treated straw. When feeding begins, some producers will remove several bales from the pile a few days before feeding to allow the straw time to air out.

Toxicity can occur in animals when some forages



are ammoniated, so only treat low quality forages such as wheat straw or fescue stubble following seed harvest. Consider working with a nutritional consultant to develop feeding programs. If toxicity issues do occur, avoid working the cattle and remove ammoniated hay from the diet for several days. A mixture of 50% ammoniated hay and 50% untreated hay should eliminate any problems.

Treating wheat straw with

anhydrous ammonia does improve the straw's feeding value and can stretch tight hay supplies. However, utmost care should be taken when treating and handling the straw. Supplementation programs will also be different than for traditional grass hay. 

Benton County Central Dispatch broadcast a call for service at 11504 Del Vista Drive in rural Warsaw MO. Dispatch stated that two females forced entry into the residence, concerned about their friend who had been missing from the area since Monday, May 15th. Upon entry, they discovered what appeared to be a body concealed with a blanket and trash bags. There was also a substance they believed to be blood, all over the area.

Deputies arrived on scene and secured the residence while applying for a search warrant. After the search warrant was issued, detectives entered the residence to discover a deceased person. Detectives described the scene as horrific in nature.

The scene was carefully processed by detectives

May 19th. The body was removed by the Benton Coroner County and transported to the Jackson County Medical Examiner for a forensic examination to try and identify the body as well as the actual cause of death.

A preliminary report from the medical examiner received late today, Friday May 19th, identified the deceased as 57-year-old Lori Beth Finlay who resided in the area. The body was discovered at her alleged boyfriend's residence Robert Ashley Peterson, 54.

The medical examiners preliminary report suggested that Finlay was shot multiple times in the head and neck with a projectile weapon as well as bludgeoned about the upper body, head, and neck. During the investigation, Peterson was located at a residence in Marshall MO and taken into custody on a Benton County Warrant for domestic violence and being held on a 24hour investigative hold in connection with the murder victim. After detectives sifted through a mass amount of evidence a probable cause statement was issued to the Benton County Prosecutor, Rod Richardson for the arrest of Peterson for Murder 1st Degree and Tampering with Physical Evidence. Peterson is currently being held in the Benton County Jail on a no bond warrant. Peterson may be facing further charges as the investigation continues.
