Warsaw Outlines **Multi-Million Dollar Plan For Airport**

In late session Monday night, City Planner Randy Pogue set forth an ambitious plan for multi-million dollar improvements to the city's municipal airport, beginning with additional parking aprons for airplanes parked there, and continuing with additional hangar space. He indicated there may be substantial grant money available to accomplish much of that work; also showed board members a nearby overcrowded repair hangar.

The meeting opened at the Municipal Airport at 6:00 PM on Monday, June 5, with Aldermen Rob Coskey, Lou Breshears, Doug Hedrick, Adam Howe, Eric Flores present. Alderman Reba Slavens was absent. Mayor Eddie Simons presided, City Clerk Jessica Kendall recorded.

First business conducted was to approve the evening's agenda and May 15 council meeting minutes, then agree to pay May 15 to June 2 bills presented.

There was no old business. In early moments, Clerk Kendall swore in recently re-elected Alderman Breshears.

FOR POOL PATRONS including Lennox Brown, safety is the top priority for lifeguards Urijah Phillips, Shayla Kindle, Daytona Kinnan and Summer McCannon. The Warsaw Municipal Pool opened for the season on Sunday, June 4.



The Warsaw Municipal Pool, which opened 10 years ago on Memorial Day weekend at 1009 Jackson Street, began its summer season 2023 on Sunday, June 4 with plans for plenty of fun and exercise. Although it was scheduled to open the previous week, mechanical problems with the pumps had to be corrected. Nina Sprouse is beginning her third year as pool manager, and she is joined by 20 lifeguards.

"All of our lifeguards are high school athletes," said Sprouse. "We are overstocked, but it is important to offer as many jobs as possible to young people. We have not determined when the

pool will close this season because our lifeguards will need to report for training when school starts. We are waiting to get information from the high school about its fall schedule."

Daily admittance to the pool is \$4.50, and a sevenvisits punch card is \$28. Punch cards for 24 visits are \$90, for 48 visits is \$168 and the daily twilight swim after 5:00 PM is \$2.25.

Sprouse said that there are many opportunities for swimming classes, parties, lap swimming and open swimming. Open swim hours are Sunday, 12:00 PM to 5:00 PM, and Monday through Saturday from 12:00 PM to 7:00 PM Minnows swim lessons (introductory level), Fish swim lessons (beginner level), Dolphins (Intermediate), and Sharks (Advanced) will be starting at the end of June. My Grandfather loved to crumble up cornbread in a large glass and fill it with

Preheat oven to 350°F. Coat a 13x9-inch baking dish with cooking spray.

Take 3 large sweet onions, slice crosswise into 1/4-in.thick slices and separate into rings, then toss with: 1 tsp. each dried thyme, herbs de provence, parsley flakes, oregano or other dried herbs of your choice: 1 tsp. garlic salt, 1/2 tsp. dry mustard, 1/4 tsp. cayenne pepper.

Arrange in baking dish, top with 1/4 cup butter, cut into 1/4-in.-thick pieces, then sprinkle with 8 oz. Cheddar cheese, shredded (about 1 cup)

Cover with aluminum foil, and bake in preheated oven until onions are soft and sides are bubbly, about 40 minutes.

Remove foil. Bake at 350°F

job with Mizzou Academy to teaching business classes at Warsaw High School.

Cole Camp Swimming Pool, a private pool located at 606 West Bluebird Drive, opened on Saturday, June 4. It had to delay its opening to take care of a water leak and will be working on other pool projects in the fall. The Cole Camp Swimming Pool Board President, Taylor Hayes, said that the pool first opened in 1981 and because of its age needs to have parts replaced. She said that some people who created the pool are not around anymore, so it is unknown what kinds of plumbing and other fixtures were used. She said that the pool underwent some big projects this spring.

"We have memberships, but the pool is also open to the public," said Hayes. "Anybody can buy a daily pass, but there are only so many available to the public compared to members. Beginning June 12, we will have open swim from 7:00 AM to 8:00 AM Monday through Friday. Water Aerobics will be 8:30 AM to 9:30 AM Monday through Friday at \$5 a session, or \$50 for a season pass."

Non-member daily admission is \$6. However, Sunday is Fun-Day with half price admission of \$3 per person or \$10 per family. Swim lessons are offered June 19-23, June 26-30, and July 10-14 at 9:35 AM to 10:20 AM, 10:25 AM to 11:10 AM, and 11:15 AM to 12:00 PM. Lessons must be paid in full before a spot for a child will be held. The cost for members is \$40 and for non-members \$60. To schedule, stop by the pool or call (660) 668-2424.

Private pool parties and private swimming lessons will also be offered. Hayes said that typically there is a family fun day in mid or late July where there are cardboard boat races and contests for kids.

"We will close the pool on August 19 because all of our lifeguards and our manager are either students or work at school," said Hayes. "We have seven lifeguards, four who are returning to us."

Hayes said that the Board will have an annual fundraiser for the pool on

October 8 at the pool. It will be a drive-by fish fry dinner funded by free will donations.

in his freshman year on a Thursday, played football against Tipton on the road on Friday and caught a touchdown pass.


He scored 1,000 points in basketball and now has his name on the wall with his father Darren Eckhoff. He was All-State in both football and basketball his senior year.

Of course, some students don't pay the full bill for college. Any grants and scholarships they receive can bring down the "sticker price." Still, there's often a sizable amount that students and their families must come up with. To help fill this gap, you may want to explore various strategies, one of which is a 529 education savings plan.

A 529 plan offers several key benefits. First of all, your earnings can grow tax deferred and your withdrawals are federally tax free when used for qualified education expenses, such as tuition, fees, books and so on. You may be eligible to invest in a 529 plan in most states, but depending on where you live, you may be able to deduct your contributions from your state income tax or possibly receive a state tax credit for investing in your home state's 529 plan. Tax issues for 529 plans can be complex. Please consult your tax advisory about your situation.

And 529 plans aren't just for college. You may be able to use one to pay K-12 expenses, up to \$10,000 per student per year. (However, not all states comply with this 529 expansion for K-12, so you might not be able to claim deductions and your withdrawals could be subject to state tax penalties.)

A 529 plan can also be used to pay for most expenses connected to apprenticeship programs registered with the U.S. Department of Labor. These programs are often available at community colleges and combine classroom education with on-the-job training. Furthermore, you can now

(Continued from Page 1) said he has a streamlined enforcement process accomplishing that for work. Mayor Simons then proposed reappointment of the city's committee members as follows: Mayor Pro Tem, Flores; Finance, the Mayor and Breshears; Police, Flores, Howe, Works, Coskey; Public Hedrick, Flores; Parks & Rec, Slavens, Howe, Coskey; Planning & Zoning, Breshears, Hedrick. His suggestions were okayed by the board.

In new business, the group approved two ordinances: (1) amending a section of the city's municipal code book to authorize Code Enforcement Officer Blankenship to act in related matters, and (2) amending the city's municipal code to refine what is deemed a public nuisance. Citizens may wish to familiarize themselves with it's provisions. Aldermen also adopted three resolutions: (1) authorizing the city to sign an agreement with Lovelace and Associates to provide a \$655,000 to \$660,000 topographic design survey along Commercial St., funding expected to come from a grant; and (2) providing an inventory of lead pipes in houses and businesses in the city, grant funding also expected; and (3) authorizing the city's continued membership in Kaysinger Basin Regional Planning Commission, at a cost of 22 cents per citizen of the city.

The open meeting closed about 6:55 PM to go into executive session. Visitors are welcomed to the open meetings, which are usually held on 1st and 3rd Monday eves at its Community Bldg. site.

SHERIFF'S DISPATCH By ton County Sheriff Eric Knoy

Hello Benton County,

It has always been my way to keep you informed, a measure some appreciate, and some criticize me for. I am informing you that we are operating with half of the staff we need to be effective. The honest statement is, if you call 911, we may not be able to be there, currently we are forced to take the calls in order of life safety. For instance, if your being shot at by your neighbor, that would take precedence over some fellas fist fighting down at the watering hole, simple assault, verbal domestics, suspicious vehicles, suspicious subjects, things that go bump in the night, noise complaints, smashed mailboxes; well you get the idea. We may not be able to be there; it is physically impossible to cover over all 740 square miles with half the people.

We have a total of 16 road positions, and we are down eight deputies. Recently we lost some senior staff with over 28 years of experience combined. The staff that has left is getting out of law enforcement and taking up employment in non-law enforcement careers. This is a trend that is happening across America, not just Benton County. If you watch the news, you already know it's not a popular time to be in law enforcement.

We start new deputies at \$20 per hour now. That helps, but it's not enough. We need to change the county's retirement system to LAGERS and have better health insurance for our employees (\$1,100 per month for a family) I turn away candidates every year from larger agencies who are tired of the city life and own lake properties here in Benton County. They can afford to work here after years of better pay, they just can't afford to lose their quality retirement. Most law enforcement agencies have LAGERS retirement

us due to the fact they can't continue their retirement. I am working to try to present the opportunity for the LAGERS retirement system to Benton County, not only for my staff, but for all county employees.

Believe it or not, all the crazy that goes on outside our county borders does eventually affect us in one way or another. The illegals pouring across our borders will eventually find their way here, bringing their crime and issues. The drugs have already found their way here. The passing of Amendment 3, in all its wisdom. Remember, I'm not against the use of marijuana in your own home. What you do is your business. I was, and still am against the way Amendment 3 is written and all the extra that are detrimental to our way of life! Take the time to read all 38 pages; you should be as scared as I am. The language in this amendment has hampered our ability to reach Methamphetamine, Fentanyl and other deadly street drugs, as well as increasing the amount of impaired drivers passing you on our roads.

Someone visited the office recently who was very upset because of a nest of thieves living on their road. We know who they are, and we have been picking them off as the opportunities present themselves. Our efforts were not good enough or fast enough to satisfy this individual. When it was explained to him, we were eight short and that violent crimes were up, he stated that wasn't his problem. Not quite in those words, but I cannot repeat the actual statement. He went on to say that's what he paid his taxes for and demanded service.

Folks, I'm not ranting here. I'm leading up to a truth here in your county. THIS OFFICE BELONGS TO YOU! Everything that goes on in this county and within this office IS YOUR PROBLEM. You allowed me the privilege to manage your office, bring in my business sense, passion, and transparency but at the end of the day, it's all OUR problem. Please don't forget that all public offices belong to YOU! At the end of the day, there are only so many licensed peace officers willing to do this line of work under the conditions that our society has allowed to stand. We are in trouble, fellow Americans! Band together, take care of one another. There is power in numbers. Get involved and be aware of your surroundings. Speaking of transparency, some folks that have limited knowledge of their sheriff's office, are saying that "Sheriff Knox changed the radios and got rid of scanner land". The truth is, I had nothing to do with the radio change, but I support it 100%. I love the community's input and many times, it's a citizen with a scanner that helps us find the bad guy! The problem is, the antiquated radio system from the eighties only worked in certain areas of the county, leaving my staff with no ability to communicate when outside that range. As much as I love sharing our days and nights with you, the safety of my staff is more important. As always, my door is always open to you and I welcome your questions and suggestions.

MDC will host a free clinic on using trotlines to catch catfish June 8 and June 9 at Truman Lake.

Learn how to catch catfish with setline method

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) will host a free clinic on how to catch catfish on trotlines on Thursday, June 8, and Friday, June 9 at the Sparrowfoot Campground on the Grand River Arm of Truman Lake. This two-part clinic will help newcomers learn how to build, set, and run trotlines. All materials to build a trotline will be provided. Space is limited.

The first session will be from 3 to 8:30 p.m. on June 8. Ginger Miller, MDC educator, conservation and Chris Brooke, MDC management fishery biologist, will teach the sessions. Participants will learn about catfish biology, catfishing regulations, how to build trotlines, and how to set and run the lines in the lake. They will also get an overview of rod and reel catfishing at the lake. Participants will go out onto the lake in MDC boats with instructors to set their lines. The June 9 session will be from 8:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Participants will go out in MDC boats with instructors to run the trotlines and remove fish. There will also be demonstrations on how to clean catfish to prepare for cooking.

This clinic is open to participants ages 7 and older. All participants must have a valid fishing permit, and for Missouri residents that includes those ages 16 to 64. Fish without having to buy a fishing permit, trout permit, or trout park daily tag.

Want some free fun that gets family and friends outside in nature? Get hooked on fishing with the Missouri Department of Conservation's (MDC) Free Fishing Days June 10 and 11. During Free Fishing Days, anyone may fish in the Show-Me State without having to buy a fishing permit, trout permit, or trout park daily tag.

Free Fishing Days is an annual MDC event that takes place statewide during the Saturday and Sunday following the first Monday in June.

Aside from not needing permits, other fishing regulations remain in effect, such as limits on size and number of fish an angler may keep. Special permits may still be required at some county, city, or private fishing areas. Trespass laws

Maintaining public fishing areas for everyone to use and enjoy requires the help of all citizens.

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) reminds the public to dispose of waste responsibly when cleaning fish. Each year, MDC receives numerous nuisance complaints of fish waste on the banks around public fishing accesses, especially during the paddlefish snagging season. It's important for anglers to do their part to keep fishing areas clean for others to enjoy.

In addition to using trash receptacles, disposing of fishcleaning waste back into the water is allowed. Waste should not be piled up near the water's edge, and instead should be discarded into deeper water or in the flowing part of the stream. This assures waste cannot wash up to the bank or be concentrated in one area.

The paddlefish snagging season for Lake of the Ozarks, Harry S. Truman Reservoir, Table Rock Lake, and most other waters in the state runs March 15 through April 30. The season for the Mississippi River is March 15 through May 15 with a fall season of Sept. 15 through Dec. 15.

Code of The Wildlife Missouri states that extracted paddlefish eggs may not be possessed while on the water or adjacent banks and may not be transported. Disposing of paddlefish eggs immediately back into the water is allowed. A person cannot transport eggs to another location. This includes by boat to deeper water.

Paddlefish have several regulations to help protect them from poaching. Anglers may keep the eggs; however, extracted paddlefish eggs may not be possessed while on the waters of the state or adjacent banks, and may not be transported. If anglers wish to keep the eggs, they should be prepared to hold the intact fish on ice and remove the eggs from the fish later. Once the eggs have been removed

By the time the guy made it over to where I was, he didn't have time to say much. I'm sure he had wished he had never encountered me that day. I wasn't very pleasant!

Then recently my daughter called and said my son's stone was moved a few inches. I went out to see, and it appears the mower caught the edge and slid it forward. Maybe he had a few extra snorts that morning! By the way it gets mowed, that might be an ongoing situation.

I called the funeral home April 10, 2023 at 8:39 AM. They took a message, I'll call you back. Called again May 2, 2023 at 9:54 AM. Took a message, I'll call you back. On May14, 2023, I went out to do my usual weed eating around the stones, everything was the same. There is no care or respect in the world anymore!

Some people might think this doesn't amount to anything. It means everything to me, a part of my heart is out there! Very, very frustrating to have to deal with this, especially in a cemetery.

This could have been so much easier if they had just fixed the problem they created. I hate being ignored!
