Fate Of Visitor Center 'Hangs In The Balance'

The Harry S. Truman Visitor Center had one window blown out and seals on a few more windows damaged during a storm on the evening of July 1. Ranger Allen Flint reported that some repairs were made on July 2, but the upper area of the Visitor Center will be closed as well as the surrounding area outside of the windows until parts and materials are ordered and the area is safe for the public. When Ranger Allen gets approval from his chain of command, the Visitor Center will reopen for weekends. Regular hours are Friday, Saturday, and Sunday plus Monday federal holidays, from 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM. Open season began this year on April 15 and will end on September 30.

According to the website welcometowarsaw.com, the Visitor Center construction began in 1975 and was completed in 1977. It sits atop Kaysinger Bluff and provides a spectacular view of Truman Dam and Reservoir. Exhibits within the Visitor Center provide information about the rich history of the Osage Arm of Lake of the Ozarks Valley

from pre-civilization to modern day.

The open hours for the center are down from its former seven-day a week schedule, due to lack of federal funding. Ranger Allen and Bradly Wright, Truman State Park Manager, said that there are several funding pots being used to "keep the lights on" at the Visitor Center.

"Recreation is low on the federal government's priority list," said Ranger Allen. "And the Visitor Center is on the low end of

recreation. So, one way we keep it going now is to take \$80,000 from our recreation budget to use for the basic needs. We are operating on a bare budget, while the Corps of Engineers in Washington D.C. are making funding decisions. We have promised to stay open until next year's fiscal year, and after that it is back to the drawing board."

About four years ago, people in Warsaw and the county came together to talk about strengths, opportunities and other

aspects of the community. A study was done which resulted in the establishment of the Benton County Economic Development Committee. This committee has continued to meet every month. James Sandford from the Corps of Engineers hosted the meeting last month at the Visitor Center and Congresswoman Vicki Hartzler was once very involved in a master plan related to Truman Lake and its Visitor Center. So, the concerns have been ongoing

Benton County citizens and officials are trying very hard to save the Visitor Center and want to come up with ideas to make it self-funded. There have been suggestions that the building might be turned into office space, or made into a convention center, leased to a great steak house or the Visitor Center could charge \$5 a car to generate funds. Last year the Warsaw Area Chamber of Commerce formed a partnership with the Corps **CENTER Page 3**

Administrator **Discusses Details** Of RAISE Grant With City Council

On July 10 City Warsaw Administrator Randy Pogue discussed a nearly \$25 million award to be soon received by the city for infrastructure projects. He noted that those funds will dwarf previous city improvement grant funds used for various infrastructure projects; then commented on projects Warsaw now has in mind: On the RAISE Grant, he said he has received invitations to speak at the meetings of the Missouri Bicycle and Pedestrian Federation and at the Rock Island Trail Summit, both to meet soon. He said he would take personal leave to attend those meetings, but was advised by the group that the city would pay for his attendance.

On the Main Street TAP project, Pogue was advised to apply for a related grant. And he was told the group was still considering the final design of CED lights to be installed on several streets around town, yet Pogue wanted a decision on those lights in the near future. The Administrator also commented on the Municipal Airport terminal program, saying that it needs further study and perhaps an application for a CDBG grant. The group agreed he should apply for that grant. Pogue then discussed the **WARSAW Page 3**

Remember, this is a team that has been in contention for a state title over the last several years.

The Lincoln girls basketball teams have played with as little as five girls and Warsaw girls basketball struggled to have enough players to even put a JV squad on the floor in recent seasons. Sports that share seasons with others find additional difficulty and some schools have combined their programs in cooperative efforts just in order to give student-athletes an opportunity and to field teams.

This banana cake. striated with chocolate and cinnamon, is extremely moist. It is a great cake to prepare ahead of time, and keep on hand for several days. The bananas add an powder initial burst of moisture, and they keep the cake from cinnamon

½ pound butter 2 cups sugar

6 very ripe bananas,

½ cup sour cream (regular or reduced fat but don't use

2 teaspoons vanilla extract pinch salt

1-1/2 teaspoons baking

soda

chocolate chips

1 teaspoon baking powder 4 cups flour ounces semisweet

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3 Tablespoons 1 Tablespoon

Preheat oven to 350; grease a 10-inch Bundt pan or tube

In a large heavy saucepan,

melt the butter over medium heat. Mix in sugar, and add mashed bananas, don't worry if they remain lumpy. Mix in sour cream, vanilla, salt, baking soda and baking powder. Stir in flour, beat until batter becomes thick. Stir in chocolate chips. Sprinkle cocoa powder and cinnamon over surface of the batter, then swirl into with no more than 5 strokes. Pour into pan, bake for 50 minutes or until tester comes out clean. Cool on rack for 10 minutes, then cover with a rack, invert, remove pan. Cool right side up.

(Continued from Page 1) to have the Chamber collect donations in the Visitor Center. The donation box is still in the building, but there is no information available about amounts collected.

One couple of concerned citizens who are working hard to find solutions to keep the Visitor Center open are Larry Berry and his wife Peggy Crabtree-Berry. He is a Southside County Commissioner, and she is Chairman of the Republican Central Committee as well as Chairman of Concerned Citizens of Missouri.

"We have to find a way to make the Visitor Center pay for itself," said Mrs. Berry. "My husband has been calling Congressman Mark Alford, District 4, who has some ideas how we might try to save it and he and the Corps need to meet to discuss them. There is so much history associated with the Visitor Center, and the Kaysinger Bluff Pioneer Heritage Association needs to be invited to give their thoughts and ideas. People from many surrounding counties and around the state come to visit the Visitor Center, and they spend money in our county. I have been in contact with Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft who also wants to help. There will be a meeting on July 15 in the Warsaw Community Building at 6:00 PM regarding information on the Visitor Center. The public is invited to come and bring ideas about how we can all work together to save the center." Park Manager Wright

reported that the Corps information public office has reached out to Congressman Alford to try and set up a meeting with the Corps about his ideas for funding. 1. Approximately how many kids do you have going out this season or do you expect?

Boyer-30-40 kids. **Eierman-**20-25.

Daleske-We generally have around 18 or 20 girls. Since moving softball season to the spring we are fortunate that we no longer have to compete with

volleyball for athletes.

Wisdom-HS 10-12 boys and 8-10 girls; MS 30-35 total, boys and girls.

Henderson-12-14 players from grades 9-12.

Morgan-10 girls, 20 boys. Brownsberger-15-20. Shearer-30.

2. Do you think most people realize the numbers game and minor struggles that you face each year coaching at a smaller school?

Boyer-I think that most understand the challenges that small school sports face. However, there will always be some people that just don't understand it.

Eierman-No.
Shearer-No, they do not.
Morgan-No, even larger school's coaches don't

3. Some rules seem to hurt the smaller schools, i.e. the pitch count in baseball. Care to comment?

understand.

Boyer-For fall sports it is difficult to get all kids out when practices start 2 1/2 weeks before school does.

Eierman-Pitch count can be tough. You have to manage your guys and be on top of it.

Morgan-Rules in track hurt us. You can't compete when you can't fill the spots. Shearer-Yes, many rules are put in place for the larger schools. But just like our society, many rules are put in place for cities and don't take into consideration the

rural communities.
4. Does having several sports at your school hurt your numbers?

Boyer-Too many can definitely pull kids in too many directions and in turn be detrimental to programs.

Daleske-Absolutely, when softball and volleyball were both in the fall, we were splitting the best athletes between two sports and having them to play both has helped both teams.

Morgan-Moving softball to spring really hurt the girls track team. We were winning before. Now we are lucky to finish in the middle of a 14.16 team meet.

of a 14-16 team meet.

Wisdom-Yes, having too many "options" can water down the pool of kids. However I am a strong advocate for kids doing something. Schools just need to be careful on how many and what "options" they provide.

Brownsberger-I think the kids who want to play will

play.5. Is there a solution to this

ongoing problem? **Boyer-**In my opinion, 'less is more'. We are allowed to play too many games in all sports. Because of this, playoffs run into the next season and as a result it makes it very difficult to keep kids in multiple sports.

Eierman-What I see and think personally is kids being pulled in every direction all year long as well as kids constantly playing travel ball. They don't ever get a break. Personally think a solution to this would be shortening some seasons and adjusting

the sports calendar.

Wisdom-Recruit kids from the district to get involved. Youth programs are a must to not only get kids involved but the parent; make the parents and kids feel like there is something more to being involved than just playing the sport.

Bryant-At the end of the day, it comes down to the youth programs and the parents being active in teaching the kids the fundamentals of the game. The more you win, the more the kids are going to want to play.

Drehle-Getting the kids in the weight room cuts down on injuries. It goes in cycles in the smaller schools. We are in a cycle right now at Lincoln with very few juniors and seniors in almost every sport.

Henderson-Success draws interest, which is normal. Our athletes put a lot of

effort into the sports they are successful in, and rightfully so. Kids get spread thin and with multiple sports being played by these athletes, time is put into the programs that win.

Morgan-Only solution is not offer too much, if you do you will water down the sports that are in existence now. Plus, trying to persuade athletes to play multiple sports instead of specializing. Play multiple sports/specialize in the summer.

6. Do private schools have an advantage?

Eierman-I don't know much about private schools numbers. To me, it seems the solution with private schools is for them to have their own playoffs, and own set of rules, leagues, etc; completely divide the state between public and private schools. They can play in regular season but not in playoffs.

Shearer-I believe so. Private schools can go select their student athletes. Also, most private institutions have a higher participation rate.

Henderson-Yes, those kids are there to play.

Well, there you have it; a strong topic indeed. We thank all of our coaches for their honest responses and we wish all of their programs the very best.

Passing The Torch: Howe Sisters Find Success With Ladycats, Set Sights Much Higher





A TALE OF TWO SISTERS, Taylor and Tanna Howe have found many successes on fields and courts for the Ladycats. Taylor, a 2022 WHS graduate is now getting ready to enter her sophomore year at the University of Evansville while Tanna will be a sophomore at Warsaw in 2023-24.



It is my privilege this week to write about two athletic sisters in Taylor and Tanna Howe.

Taylor was an All-State softball player for two years and received All-Conference and All-District honors in basketball and volleyball for the Ladycats. She graduated in 2022 and is now playing softball for the University of Evansville in Indiana and recently completed her first year for the Aces.

Tanna, now preparing for her sophomore year at WHS, was dominant on the softball field, earning conference, district, region and state recognition. She also found success in her freshman seasons on the volleyball and basketball courts for Warsaw.

Tanna led in almost every statistic in basketball for Warsaw in her freshman year. A couple of coaches said they wished she was playing for them.

In softball, she hit a homerun over the left field fence in a 3-2 district semifinal victory over Cole Camp.

She is easily the best catcher in the area with speed on the base paths and surprising power for her stature. She plays shortstop on her competitive team coached by her father, Adam. From what I understand, Tanna is projected to play shortstop in college.

With junior phenom Brylee Brewster on the
