Eyes On Lincoln: R-II District **Continues Major Construction**

August 22 is the first day of school for the Lincoln R-II public school district. Students, teachers and parents will notice the progress made since construction began on the project voters approved last

On April 5, 2022, Superintendent of R-II school district, Kevin Smith, thanked the community via Facebook for voting that day to pass Proposition Cardinals. "Our kids and community will all benefit." Indeed, by the votes of 11%, that is, 297 out of the total 2,651 of those registered to vote on R-II issues, the entire community benefits.

"I have heard from many community members since the election. Every comment has been very positive. There is a lot of excitement about the additional space we have needed for many years," Smith said.

Construction began in February this year. The project is on schedule to be completed by August of 2024 in time to open the doors of the new facility for the 2024-2025 school year.

Repayment terms of the bond issue to fund the construction have not changed; that is, 20 years

with no tax increases. Smith noted the "great working relationship" the district has with LJ Hart and Company that handled the bond sales. "The district can feel at ease knowing that everything is being taken care of properly," he said. Bond sales generated \$6,300,000 in revenue for the project, more than the \$6,000,000 expected.

The Enterprise article about Proposition Cardinals published March 31, 2022, reported at length on the scope of the construction

project. Parent activists promoting the project envisioned the new gymnasium would enable "early access to sports training for children... starting from kindergarten and up through 6th grade" on the one hand, while also creating space necessary to allow junior and high school members of various sports teams to practice on a regular basis during the daytime.

In addition, parents and teachers looked forward to the new preschool and

special services classrooms being located within the main building and out of the mobile buildings. Students would no longer have to walk back and forth every day between the mobile buildings and the main building during inclement weather. In fact, progress in that regard has already been made. Construction at the main elementary hallway to weld the new portion of the building to the existing one was ongoing at the beginning of this month.

As a result, as announced

August 1 on the school's Facebook page (https:// www.facebook.com/ LHSCards/) kindergarten orientation was delayed until August 14 and 15.

Construction projects bring some temporary inconveniences and some changes to routines. The Facebook page for Proposition Cardinals posted on February 23 about the beginning of construction, and gave advance notice that parking and after school pickup CONSTRUCTION Page 3

Lincoln Adopts Unchanged 2023 Tax Ordinanance

Following a 5:45 PM public hearing on the city's proposed 2023 tax rate, the Lincoln city council opened in regular session at 6:00 PM on Monday, August 14 and adopted under new business a 2023 ad valorem tax rate of .7270 cents per \$100 valuation for its general revenues, and .1444 cents per \$100 valuation for Parks/Recreation; both unchanged from the 2022 year rates. No doubt that action was based on the board's knowledge that Mayor Glen Nelson would report in regular session that the city experienced increased 2023 revenues of about nine percent for all major funds within the city except streets. He added the city is "doing well and on budget".

Aldermen Janice Swearngin, Jack Lietzke, Fisher, Barbara Hammond were present. Mayor Nelson presided; City Clerk Sabrina Brown recorded.

(Continued from Page 1) in our area," said James White, publisher of the Benton County Enterprise Company.

White went on to say, "BCE TV is a link that may be accessed through www. citylinktv.com or viewers may also find it right on our website at www. bentoncountyenterprise. com. Viewers can watch the games on a smart TV, phone, tablet or laptop."

Over the years, several upgrades have been and other necessary optional modifications have also been added to enhance the broadcasts.

"Like anything else, we have had to upgrade some equipment and software," White said. "There have been connection concerns at some more rural locations, but for the most part, we have always been able to remedy those issues right away and bring the games to the fans like they expect."

One of the newer features in 2023 will be the ability to provide a live scoreboard that will be visible on a viewer's screen during the entire game, complete with graphics.

"One thing that people have always told us is that they wish our broadcast had a scoreboard, so we have really worked on perfecting that this year," White said "In the past, proudly. fans have been reliant on commentators to announce the scores, but they won't have to do that as often now."

An added feature this year will also be the ability for broadcasters to highlight starting lineups individual players and throughout the game.

The crew for all Warsaw broadcasts throughout the 2023 season will be Matt Dove and Drew Burdick. Adam Howe will join them in the booth at all away contests.

Dove will do the playby-play for the Wildcats and Burdick will do color commentary along with game stats. Howe will provide additional commentary at away games. "BCE TV is a great way

for former players, fans and coaches to check in on their teams, no matter where they are in the world," Dove said. "It's a great way to stay connected."

The production of BCE TV also encourages and helps to connect the school and their respective community as several advertising options are available for businesses organizations show their support. Full video commercials, either previously produced or shot and produced by the BCE TV production team is the most popular. However, other opportunities to advertise include logos and/ or "live reads", narrated by the broadcast team.

Every broadcasted game for each team, as well as a coaches show for Warsaw is always archived for later viewing.

"The archive feature of BCE TV is very popular because it allows relatives and friends to view over the weekend or even later if they can't watch the game live on Friday night," White said.

"It was a privilege to be honored at the luncheon," said Foster. "It was very gratifying, and I received a certificate, a medallion, and a rose."

Foster was able to listen to the successes of other ladies and learn about the huge areas of influence that each of them has accomplished. She was also able to talk to the presidents of the National and Missouri Federations of Republican Women.

Foster is from Missouri, but she spent 37 years in California in the nursing and medical field. Her husband was also stationed with the military in the state, but in 2007 they returned to the local area.

"Because it had been such a long time since I had lived here, I didn't know anyone," remembers Foster. "But one day during the Jubilee Days celebration I met Marilyn Drake and Shirley Lowe on the courtyard lawn and talked to them for about an hour. They were both members of the BCRWC and when I got home, I started thinking that those were the type of people I wanted to meet. I went to the July and August meetings of their club and heard about the National Federation of Republican Women Convention that was about to take place in Florida. I thought I would go and then I could see my daughter who lived in the state. By the next month, I was elected president of the BCRWC. I knew a lot about nursing but nothing at all about politics. I served a total of four years as president, then accepted the position of Secretary serving in that capacity for several years. I was also Vice-President, Second followed by a term as First Vice-President and am now Parliamentarian of the

club." Foster's husband became sick with dementia, and she wanted to be with him all the time during 2022. She cut ties with everything that she was doing until he passed away in February of

this year. Foster is getting back into her most treasured volunteer activities, including her work with the Samaritan Village Orphanage and Medical Clinic in Arusha, Tanzania. She is a member of River Church which helps sponsor the orphanage, and Foster has traveled to it five times so far to help, including a trip in 2012 which was reported in the Benton County Enterprise. She said 60 orphans at the village. There have been about 150 abandoned children taken in since the orphanage opened.

there are currently about

Some have been adopted and many of them have grown up and become successful in a variety of careers. Among the alumni are two doctors, a lawyer, a priest, minister, and some seamstresses.

"River Church, in Warsaw, supported a medical clinic in Arusha and the village is building a new dormitory," said Foster. "One milk cow was donated a while back and now the village is raising cattle so there is plenty of milk. Since the addition of a rooster the hens are laying eggs that are being sold. There are pigs for producing pork to be sold to local restaurants, and there are fish and vegetables, so the orphanage is self-sufficient. It started with one little girl who'd been abandoned. The orphanage was created in 1992 and began caring for children in 1996. The children are given a first name and all of them have the last name of Samaritan. They are also given their own individual birth date."

Foster has also been very involved with the Friends of the Benton County Sheriff's Office, and she wants to get involved with the organization again. She says the volunteers have done a lot for the Sheriff's Department including getting a \$29,000 drone, vests, and another drug/attack dog, and they are working on another project this year.

Foster was ordained as a minister in the River Church in October of 2018. She teaches some women's studies and has done some church services. Her church, law enforcement and the Republican Women's Club are her main concerns now.

"I am about to have hip replacement surgery," said Foster. "I'm almost 85 years old, but I still want to be as active for as long as I can."



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
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

Paul wrote the following to Timothy: ". . . from infancy you have known the holy Scriptures, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus." "Able" in this verse is a translation of the Greek word "dunamis," a word which is a bit stronger than "able." It is the word often used for power, suggesting an inherent power in Scripture draws us to faith in Jesus as we are exposed to the Gospel. Our word "dynamite" derives from this Greek word. Thus, the Scriptures "have the power to make us wise unto salvation."

A wise Christian knows that salvation is in Jesus Christ, a truth that has powerfully exploded in their soul through exposure to the Scriptures. We have a glorious treasure in the Holy Bible, yet many give it little time or thought. Faith in Christ makes us Christians. If I may make a personal reference, in my case, I knew about Jesus in the Bible for years before I was converted. I knew what the Scriptures said about Him.

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I rejected most of what they said. When a neighbor's witness opened my eyes to the gospel's truth, the Jesus of Scripture suddenly and indelibly became alive in my soul. My first impulse from that encounter with the living Christ was a desire to read the New Testament. I read it for the first time through the lens of faith, and the Scriptures began their work of making me wise unto salvation. I might add that the job is not vet finished! I still need lots of exposure to the sacred writings.

But how can words on a page have such wondrous power? According to its testimony and the testimony of millions of believers, the Bible is a unique book. Hebrews tells us that the Word of God is living and active. As we handle the Word of God with faith, the God revealed on the pages of Scripture becomes real in our hearts. Paul tells us that the word of God is the sword of the Holy Spirit (Eph. 6:17). The Holy Spirit operates in, with, and through the written word.

Our church is committed to the Bible, the whole Bible, and nothing but the Bible because we want our members to become wise unto salvation.





She is preceded in death by her parents, her husband, two children that passed in infancy, a son Ron, great great grandbaby Liam and numerous brothers and sisters.





MSHP Reminds Drivers, "It's Time For School!"

August has arrived and with it the 2023-2024 school year. The Missouri State Highway Patrol would like to encourage parents to include conversations about safety when preparing their student for school. It's also important that drivers be prepared for the change in traffic patterns as students begin another year of instruction. In 2022, two people were killed and 361 injured in traffic crashes involving a school bus. In Missouri last year, a total of 884 traffic crashes involved school buses.

Troopers hope everyone will review these safety tips:

Motorists Always be vigilant, but especially near school zones, playgrounds, bicycle paths, and crosswalks when schools are in session. Expect pedestrian and bicycle traffic to increase near schools on days where the weather is good. When schools are in session, drivers should expect a change in traffic patterns school buses, parents taking their children to school, and many young drivers will join other motorists on the road and affect the morning and afternoon commute. Whatever route you drive, expect this additional traffic and prepare by allowing extra time to reach your destination.

Missouri law states that on a two-lane road, if a school bus is stopped and displaying warning signals while loading or unloading children, drivers must stop when meeting and following the bus. However, it is only necessary to stop on a four-lane highway when following the bus. Drivers, when you see a stopped school bus, stay alert and follow the law. Children may not be aware of traffic and dart unexpectedly into

the roadway. **Students**

If you're walking to school, stay alert! Cross the street at intersections or marked crosswalks and never between parked cars. Use

sidewalks when they are available. If it is necessary to walk on the roadway, stay close to the left edge and step off to the left when traffic approaches. Never dash into the street after a friend or to retrieve something.

Riding a bicycle to school is a fun way to travel. If you're riding your bike, be sure to wear a helmet and obey all traffic signs and signals. Ride as near to the right side of the roadway as is safe and use the proper hand signals when you plan to change directions, slow, or stop. Never carry passengers. Keep both hands on the handlebars except when signaling. It's important to maintain your bicycle in good condition.

If you ride a school bus, check the weather and dress accordingly. Wait in line for the bus on the shoulder or sidewalk. Use the handrail when getting on or off the bus. Never try to retrieve items that fall under the bus and walk at least 10 feet in front of the bus when crossing the street. Sit quietly on the bus and keep the aisle clear. If anything goes wrong, stay calm and follow the instructions of the

bus driver. traffic Most crashes involving young drivers (under the age of 21) occur between 3 p.m. and 4 p.m., when school typically lets out. Many of these drivers are young and inexperienced. Parents: It is important to encourage those young drivers to remember driving is a full-time job. Using a cell phone, texting, or adjusting the radio can be the distraction that leads to a traffic crash. It's also against the law for this age group.

Parents

Parents are encouraged to talk to their children about riding a bus, walking, or driving to school in a safe manner. If they ride a bike, please make sure they wear a helmet and follow traffic laws.

talk to your Please children about the Courage 2 Report MO program, which provides a safe and confidential way to report any concerns regarding their safety or the safety of others. These concerns may include: assault, bullying/repeated harassment, cyber bullying, fighting, guns, homicide, human trafficking, knife, planned school attack, imminent school shooting, school shooting threat, sexual offense, suicideother person (3rd party), or a terrorism threat (extremism). Those reporting their concerns may remain anonymous. C2R provides a "sooner is safer" tool to report real time concerns 24 hours a day. There are several ways concerned persons may submit a C2R report: through an Apple or Google Play Courage2Report mobile app, by making an online report via http://www.mshp.dps. missouri.gov/MSHPWeb/ Courage2ReportMO/ index.html, by speaking confidentially to a trained professional at 866-748-7047, or by texting "C2R" to 738477.

C2R Missouri calls and tips (web, text, and mobile app) are answered 24 hours a day, 365 days a year by communications trained professionals. C2R Missouri requests a disposition report be returned on each tip report, notifying the Missouri State Highway Patrol of the outcome. For more information about C2R Missouri awareness and education resources, call the C2R Missouri Administrative Office at 866-362-6422.
