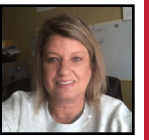

Officially First Responders! MO 9-1-1 Dispatchers Achieve Major Milestone

**Include Safety
In Your Plans
For Labor Day

Governor Mike Parson signed SB 24 into law on July 6, providing those working in emergency telephone services a change in status from clerical personnel to first responders. The bill adds “telecommunicator first responder” to the definition of “first responder” in various provisions of law. The bill took effect on August 28 and now gives 9-1-1 employees access to mental health services through the creation of a health fund.

“We are the first point of contact with those in need and we haven’t had access to mental health services like we should have,” said Jessica Mayfield, Director of Communications, MO 9-1-1 Directors Association – Region 2 Representative, Benton County Central Dispatch. “We are now getting recognition. I have purchased a banner to display out front of our building that states ‘9-1-1 Dispatchers, The FIRST First Responders’. This is big news happening within 9-1-1 throughout the state of Missouri.”

RECOGNITION RIGHTFULLY GIVEN, Missouri now recognizes 9-1-1 Dispatchers as First Responders. Marking the monumental change, Benton County Commissioners Scott Harms, Larry Berry and Steve Daleske met with 9-1-1 Dispatchers Susie James, Jessica Mayfield, Brenda Hillburn, Jeff King and Aleca Paulsen.

Health Disorders, Fifth Edition, as a compensable occupational disease under workers’ compensation when diagnosed in first responders, as defined in by law.

SB 24 also modifies a requirement for emergency medical dispatchers to complete an emergency medical dispatcher course that meets or exceeds the national curriculum of the U.S. Department of Health. Instead, rulemaking authority is transferred to the Missouri 911

Service Board. This board shall develop rules and regulations, in collaboration with an Oversight Committee that has been established, relating to the medical aspects of pre-arrival medical instructions, and will set the standards for the state of Missouri. Director Mayfield has been appointed to sit on this Oversight Committee and states she is looking forward to making positive change within 9-1-1 for Missouri. Officers of the Missouri Chapters of the Association

of Public Safety Communications Officials, the National Emergency Number Association, and the Missouri 9-1-1 Directors Association, sent a letter to members of these organizations stating that they commended association lobbyist Scott Penman and Kaycee Nail of Penman Group for their hard work and dedication during this legislative session. The letter gave them credit for getting this bill through this legislative session, when without their help it

might have taken longer than two sessions. Also thanked were Senators Lincoln Hough and Elaine Gannon, Representatives Chad Perkins and Robert Sauls who made it one of their priorities to get this legislation to the floor, and Governor Parson for seeing and agreeing with the need laid out in these priorities.

SB 24 also provided new provisions relating to other vulnerable persons.

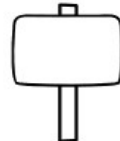

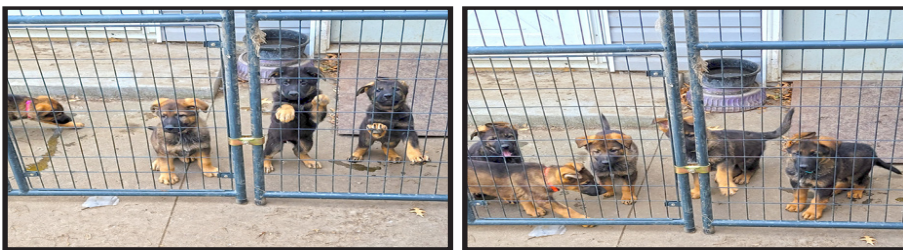

(Continued from Page 1) individual patients, their personal providers, and when appropriate, their family. It is a true team approach that assists the person/family with learning techniques to help them manage their own illnesses and also focuses on ways to prevent the onset of illnesses. Efficient and effective care is enhanced by data and technology to assure that patients receive the care they need when and where they need it. Care is delivered in a culturally and linguistically appropriate manner.

"When the position of social worker at Warsaw became available, I knew this was what I was called to do," said Arnett.

In just the first week of school, Arnett has been busy locating resources for students and their families.

"School should be a safe inclusive place where children can grow up," said Arnett.

Arnett pointed out that if children do not have food or clothing, they aren't worried about their homework. Arnett worked with WARM House this past week getting clothing and shoes to children who needed them.

Arnett is also working closely with Benton County Youth Coalition (BCYC) to help educate students about the dangers of vaping, drug and alcohol abuse.

According to Arnett, students dealing with drug abuse lose all motivation to do anything.

Arnett will also be working closely with the school counselors in the district.

"Students can be referred to me by their counselor, teacher, or parents," said Arnett. "My door is always open and I look forward to helping students as they work through the process of growing up."

Arnett will also be working with students who are having behavioral issues at school and at home.

"I learned a great deal about mental health problems that children are dealing with by working with Compass," said Arnett. "Problems at home can create problems at school so I will also be doing home visits to help children who are struggling."

Warsaw Superintendent Scott Gemes was pleased with the addition of Arnett as the district social worker.

"The addition of a social worker will take some of the workload off of our counselors," said Gemes. "Jonna will also be in charge of working with homeless students and their families."

Homeless students are identified as any student living with someone other than their legal guardian so that could include a student living with friends or grandparents.

Warsaw residents, Arnett and her husband Hadley are the parents of a three-year-old daughter, Blaire.

"I am glad to be back at Warsaw and I am excited to help kids prosper and break down barriers that stand in the way of their education," said Arnett.

MSHP (Continued from Page 1) refueling, open the engine compartment to visually inspect and smell for fuel leaks. Activate the blower system for at least four minutes before restarting the vessel.

In 2022, there were eight boating crashes which included one fatality and five injuries. One person drowned over last year's Labor Day holiday. Troopers arrested five people for boating while intoxicated during last year's counting period.

Marine enforcement troopers will be working to make our waterways safer during the holiday weekend. Missouri's boaters are asked to do their part by remaining alert for other boats and swimmers and being courteous on the water. Smaller vessels should yield right-of-way to larger vessels. Boaters should avoid overloading their boat with too many passengers and always pay close attention to the boats around them. Causing harm to another person or their property with an excessive boat wake may subject you to enforcement action or civil liability. Treat other boaters and property owners as you want to be treated. Be courteous and follow all of Missouri's boating laws.

Remember: Life jackets save lives. Wear one when you are on or around water. If you'll be on the road this Labor Day holiday, make sure your vehicle is in good working condition before you depart. Drive courteously and obey all of Missouri's traffic laws. Remember to buckle up and pay attention as you travel.

Help ensure a safer Labor Day weekend for everyone. In Missouri, seven people died and 398 were injured in 1,041 traffic crashes over the 2022 Labor Day holiday. This means one person was killed or injured every 11.5 minutes. Troopers arrested 121 people for driving while intoxicated during last year's holiday weekend.

The Highway Patrol will be participating in Operation C.A.R.E. (Crash Awareness & Reduction Effort) over the Labor Day holiday weekend. Speed, inattention, and impaired driving are leading causes of traffic crashes. All available troopers will be patrolling Missouri's roadways and waterways. Troopers on the roadways will be enforcing Missouri's speed limit, seat belt, and impaired driving laws, in addition to being available to assist motorists.

The public is encouraged to call the Patrol's Emergency Report Line (800) 525-5555 or *55 on your cellular phone if they witness criminal activity or experience an emergency. These emergency numbers are operational for both highway and water emergencies. If your celebration includes alcohol, designate someone else to drive whether you are in your boat or your car. Please don't become a statistic.

Too many people die in traffic crashes each year in Missouri. The choices you make when you're behind the wheel matter. Make good choices, so you'll never have to say, "If I could just go back ..."

The Sandman Shines As Lincoln Routs Lone Jack In Season Opener

The secret is out; Lincoln sophomore Riley Sanders can throw a football with the best of them. On Friday, in a 58-7 rout of Lone Jack at home, he threw for 7 touchdowns, a school record and tied him with Lincoln legend Jackson Beaman for 7 TD's in a game.

It was his first start at QB after playing behind All-State standout Connor Lynde last season.

Lone Jack kicked the ball out-of-bounds to start the game and then tried an unsuccessful onside kick giving Lincoln great field position.

On the very first offensive play of the contest, Sanders hit a wide open Dawson Parrott on a 30 yard bomb in the left side of the end zone for a touchdown.

It was something Lincoln had talked about all week.

"We saw on the film that their safety didn't drop back so we knew either Dawson or Chase Young would be open," Sanders commented. Sanders hit Cam Everhart for the extra point and it was 8-0 early.

Sanders would hit Everhart again at the 7:37 mark for another TD. The PAT failed but it was 14-0.

Sanders passed to Parrott again for another TD.

Everhart scored the PAT and it was 22-0 after one.

At the 11:13 mark of the second quarter, Sanders would find Brayden Benham, another talented sophomore, for the TD and it was 28-0 as Lincoln pulled away with just two many weapons for the 22 man Lone Jack squad.

The game time was pushed back to 8:30 PM because of the heat. Lincoln came in with just 15 players and without future star running back Anthony Srader. Both teams tired at the end from the heat and from the short rosters.

Lone Jack was bigger up front and looked good in warm ups but Lincoln's speed was just too much early on. It was 46-0 at half as the fat lady sung early and went home.

With a running clock, the second half moved along except for first game nervous penalties. No one scored in the third surprisingly enough.

Warsaw Delivers In Second Half As 'Cats Roll Past Marceline At Home

It was a tale of two halves for Warsaw on Friday night but strong performances on both sides of the ball after halftime helped to propel the Wildcats (1-0) to a 36-8 win over the Marceline Tigers in front of a raucous week 1 crowd.

Warsaw held the ball for the majority of the first quarter after Jayce Depriest returned the opening kickoff to the Tigers' 28 yard line. The drive was marred by penalties on both sides but after working their way back to the original line of the scrimmage, the Wildcats sideline rolled the dice and finally hit paydirt on 4th and 15 when Garrett Ferguson was flushed from the pocket, rolled to his right and hit Drake Murrell for a touchdown on a diving catch after streaking across the back of the endzone. Logan Gemes came on to tack on the point after try to put the Wildcats up 7-0.

On the ensuing drive, the Warsaw defense was fierce. After a Murrell sack on the Tigers' first play from scrimmage, the defense forced a three and out. A twelve play drive for the Wildcats that saw much yellow on the field was halted resulting in a punt. Gemes' boot was downed at the 11 yard line for Marceline and that's where they would start their next possession.

The Wildcats defense, however, had other plans. A false start pushed Marceline back to their own 6 yard line and the next play was a swarming tackle for loss by the defense. From their own 2 yard line, Tigers' quarterback Dax Thomas was wrapped up in the endzone by Warsaw's Riley Taylor for a safety to put the Wildcats up 9-0 at the end of the opening period.

The Green and Black offense couldn't take advantage of the free kick and turned the ball over on downs. Marceline put together a drive that got the ball to the 11 yard line of the Wildcats after a long run, but the defense stepped up again by forcing a fumble, recovered by Ryan Fajen.

A sixteen play Warsaw drive ended in another Gemes punt from the 42 yard line of the Tigers and was fair caught at their own 10 yard line. Marceline took advantage of the right side and just two plays later, broke a big run that ended in a 90 yard touchdown run by Caleb Stallo to get them on the board with just 18 seconds left to go in the first half. The Tigers got lucky when a botched snap on the PAT resulted in a successful 2 point conversion attempt to make the halftime score 9-8, in favor of the home team.

Eleven penalties were enforced in the first half. Marceline took the

opening kick of the second half and the Wildcats quickly forced a punt after a Mason Anderson sack.

Starting at the 39 yard line of the Tigers, it took Warsaw just three plays to score their second TD of the night, this time on a 34 yard romp to the endzone by sophomore running back Josh Harvath. Gemes' extra point split the uprights and gave the Wildcats a 16-8 lead.

A stalled drive by each team volleyed possession back to the Tigers, but that's when the defense would step up yet again.

From their own 19 yard line, Thomas rolled to his left to pass, he was chased by Depriest and was driven to the ground by Harvath while attempting to make a left-handed pass. The ball floated and Taylor picked the ball out of the air and raced into the endzone for another Warsaw touchdown.

Gemes came on once again to nail the PAT and the Wildcats lead was 23-8 at the end of the third.

Harvath scored his second TD of the night on a 13 yard run in the fourth and Gemes made the score 30-8 with another extra point as the 'Cats began to pull away.

Trying to seal the win, the Wildcats special teams got in on the fun when they recovered an onside kick, setting up shop for the Warsaw offense at the Marceline 48 yard line.

After seven straight run plays, Depriest tallied his first TD of the season on a 6 yard run to cap the scoring for the night when Gemes PAT went wide right, resulting in the 36-8 final.

Ferguson finished the game 4 for 9 on pass attempts for 49 yards and 1 TD. He also rushed 7 times for 13 yards.

Harvath led the 'Cats on the ground with 137 yards on 14 carries and 2 touchdowns.

Oliver Robertson ran for 28 yards and Depriest added 27 on the ground with a TD.

Murrell led Warsaw with 43 receiving yards and was on the receiving end of 1 touchdown.

The Wildcats totaled 257 yards of offense; 208 on the ground and 49 through the air.

Murrell led the stingy Warsaw defense with 4.5 tackles, including 1 quarterback sack.

Taylor notched 3 tackles with an interception and a touchdown and was also responsible for the safety.

Shane Poyser, Depriest, D'Angelo Ramirez and Jase Hubert all tallied 2 tackles apiece.

Depriest, Wyatt Gemes and Hubert all had forced fumbles for the Wildcats and Fajen, Brennen Slavens and Logan Gemes all had fumble recoveries.

The Wildcats will be back at home in week two when they host a new Ozark Highlands Conference opponent in the Versailles Tigers.

That kickoff is set for 7:00 PM at Randy Morrow Field and can also be viewed on BCE TV.

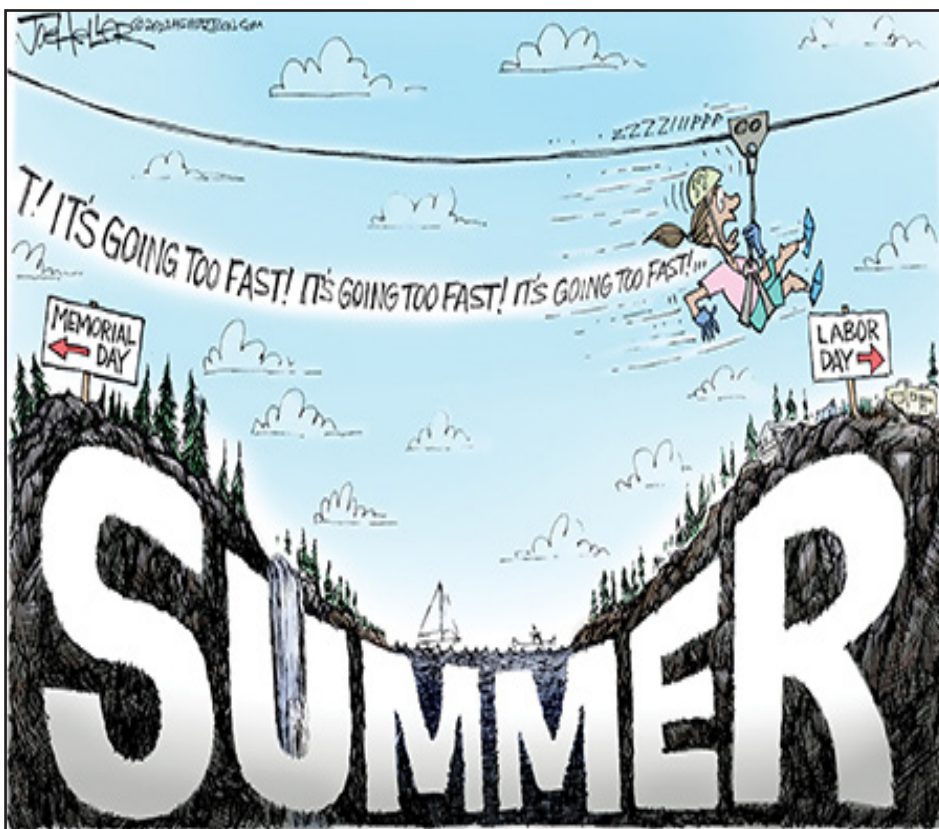
You'll find some big differences between traditional and speculative investments — and knowing these differences can matter a great deal when you're trying to reach your financial goals.

To begin with, let's look at the basic types of traditional and speculative investments. Traditional investments are those with which you're probably already familiar: stocks, bonds, mutual funds, government securities, certificates of deposit (CDs) and so on. Speculative investments include cryptocurrencies, foreign currencies and precious metals such as gold, silver and copper.

Now, consider these three components of investing and how they differ between traditional and speculative investments:

The first issue to consider is risk. When you own stocks or stock-based mutual funds, the value of your investments will fluctuate. And bond prices will also move up and down, largely in response to changing interest rates. However, owning an array of stocks — small-company, large-company, international, etc. — can help reduce the impact of volatility on your stock portfolio. And owning a mix of short- and long-term bonds can help you defend yourself somewhat against interest-rate movements. When interest rates fall, you'll still have your longer-term bonds, which generally — but not always — pay higher rates than short-term ones. And when interest rates rise, you can redeem your maturing short-term bonds at potentially higher rates.

With speculative investments, though, price movements can be extreme as well as rapid. During their short history, cryptocurrencies in particular have shown astonishingly fast moves up and down, resulting in huge gains followed by equally huge, or bigger, losses. The risk factor for crypto is exacerbated by its being largely unregulated, unlike with stocks and bonds, whose transactions are overseen by well-



established regulatory agencies. There just isn't much that investors can do to modulate the risk presented by crypto and some other speculative investments.

A second key difference between traditional and speculative investments is the time horizon involved. When you invest in stocks and other traditional investments, you ideally should be in it for the long term — it's not a "get rich quick" strategy. But those who purchase speculative investments want, and expect, quick and sizable returns, despite the considerable risk involved.

A third difference between the two types of investments is the activity required by investors. When you're a long-term investor in traditional investments, you may not have to do all that much, once you've built a portfolio that's appropriate for your risk tolerance, goals and time horizon. After that point, it's mostly just a matter of monitoring your portfolio and making occasional moves — you're not constantly buying and

selling, or at least you shouldn't be. But when you speculate in crypto or other instruments, you are constantly watching prices move — and then making your own moves in response. It's an activity that requires considerable attention and effort.

One final thought: Not all speculative instruments are necessarily bad investments. Precious metals, for instance, are found in some traditional mutual funds, sometimes in the form of shares of mining companies. And even crypto may become more of a stable vehicle once additional regulation comes into play. But if you're investing for long-term goals, such as a comfortable retirement — rather than speculating for thrills and quick gains, which may disappear just as quickly — you may want to give careful thought to the types of investments you pursue.

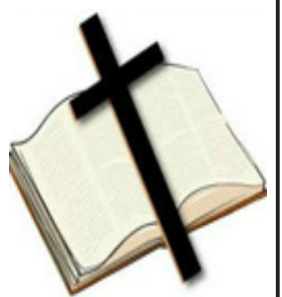
Cordes said she wanted to pursue the IBCLC certification to provide even better care for moms, babies and families, and she looks forward to providing a new level of support and education in this role.
