

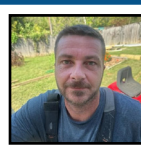

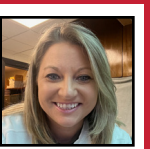

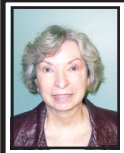

New Director Jumps Into Job At Warsaw Chamber's Busiest Time

Pamela Burnham stepped into the position of Warsaw Chamber of Commerce Director on Monday, October 2. She comes to the chamber from a diverse background in municipal parks and recreation where she honed her skills in coordinating program events, marketing campaigns and volunteer activities.

"Pamela also has a solid background in office management and leadership with a gift for inter-agency cooperation and building community connections," said Luke Johnson, Vice President of the Chamber Board. "While the new executive settles into her role, the board has been diligently working on implementing new strategies and updating policies to serve the chamber's members more effectively. These initiatives will require time for proper setup, but the board is committed to delivering valuable new programs and services."

Burnham said that she opted to apply for the position being that she had been in marketing and programming for many years in Independence and felt that the position seemed right in line with her previous experience.



PAMELA BURNHAM is the new face of the Warsaw Area Chamber Of Commerce, replacing Kimberly Pearcey who stepped down from the role. Burnham takes on the position amid planning for Heritage Days, a major event that gets underway on October 21.

Originally from the small town of Carrollton in Missouri, Burnham has also lived in New York City, Colorado Springs, CO and the KC metro area since 2002.

She and her husband purchased a home last year in Clinton but were unable to be there full-time until this May.

Burnham says that she is eager to discover all of the attributes of Warsaw and the surrounding area. She is busy learning the ropes and

having fun exploring the community.

"Besides being a crafter and cat owner, my husband and I love to fish and kayak," Burnham said. "We knew we eventually wanted to retire to this area, so we took advantage of the housing market last year and sold our house in Sugar Creek. We are especially happy that we don't have to go far now to do the 'outdoorsy' things we love. We've sat many hours on the docks of Drake Harbor, the banks

of Berry Bend and Finey Church Road with baited hooks, waiting for the tug of our lines!"

Tugging on Burnham's line on my first day in the office is the annual Heritage Days event.

"Heritage Days is first on my event agenda," she said. "I'm excited to be a part of it this year."

Combined, Burnham and her husband have 4 adult children and will be welcoming their tenth grandchild in late November.

Johnson further reported that the business landscape in Warsaw has undergone significant changes since the chamber's inception and it is recognized that it will continue to evolve in the future.

"The board's commitment to our members is unwavering, then and now," said Johnson. "As the chamber navigates a period of transition and transformation, it remains committed to its mission

Forgiven And Free Ministries Inc has opened Debra's House of Hope in Warsaw. This recovery

house was named after the late Debra Lee who passed away in February 2023. She had struggled with addiction in her younger years and had been sober for 23 years when she passed. Debra's heart was to help women recover.

Debra's House of Hope

is a yearlong recovery and Christian discipleship program.

The staff at Debra's House helps individuals find safety and healing from trauma, abuse, domestic violence, and addiction. This program provides mentorship, education, counseling and biblical training. Debra's House offers a clean and substance-free environment. There is an application process and several applications have already been received from women who are homeless and need recovery.

"There is a growing need in our community to help women," said Brandy Fajen, director of Debra's House of Hope. "We do not have many supports available in our community and we hope to help women get their lives back on track."

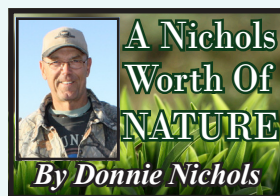

(Continued from Page 1) getting energy from the sun. There are two small tube-like structures: the xylem transports water and water soluble nutrients up to the leaves and the phloem distributes sugars and nutrients down to the roots of the tree. At the base of each leaf there are abscission cells through which these tubes pass. Photosynthesis produces chlorophyll in the leaf and gives it its green color. Carotenoids which produce yellow and orange colors, are also present throughout the year but are masked by the green of the chlorophyll. In fall, the abscission cells begin to swell and form a cork-like material, reducing and finally cutting off the flow of xylem and phloem between leaf and tree. Glucose and waste products are trapped within the leaf. Without fresh water to renew it, the chlorophyll begins to disappear. As the chlorophyll dissipates, the pigments produced by carotenoids start to show through.

The reds and purples, the result of anthocyanin, are not present year round but are actively produced toward the end of summer. Their formation depends on the breakdown of sugars in the presence of bright light as the level of phosphate in the leaf is reduced. When autumn days are bright and cool, and nights are chilly but not freezing, the brightest coloration develops.

As fall progresses, abscission (derived from the Latin root word for scissors - "to make a cut") cells continue to swell and elongate and bit by bit push the leaf away from the stem ultimately severing the leaf from the tree.

The cold dry winds of fall strip trees of moisture through their leaves. By losing its leaves, the tree can conserve moisture in the trunk and branches to prevent drying out and dying. In addition, loss of leaves helps put the tree into a state of dormancy, greatly reducing the amount of energy needed to stay alive.

Some oaks, noticeably pin oaks, retain leaves until spring. Leaves that remain on trees during the fall and winter don't retain their colors for very long. Like chlorophyll, pigments eventually break down and disappear. The only pigments remaining are tannins which are brown.

Come spring, the trees begin to bud. Leaf production is renewed and

the cycle is repeated.

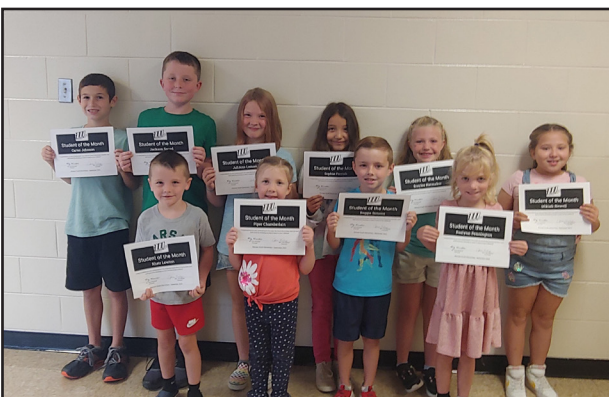

Cole Camp won in three sets 25-14, 25-17 and 25-14 but the contests were closer than the scores indicated as Lincoln made a comeback in the last two sets. In the second set, there was a 20

touch volley between the two teams won by Cole Camp at 12-9.

Coach Mallard was happy despite the loss.

"We played great. We came back and never quit. This is what you want when building a program," the Lady Cards coach said.

Coach Massingill, on the other hand, wasn't as pleased.

Harvath Runs For Four TD's In 'Cats Rout Of Bulldogs

Warsaw's Josh Harvath and the rest of the Wildcats offense unleashed some pent up frustrations when they went on the road and dismantled the Eldorado Springs Bulldogs, 37-8 last Friday night.

The conference win left them yet still unbeaten in the Ozark Highlands with a 3-0 mark.

Harvath, a sophomore running back, flew by the hat trick, accounting for four touchdowns, all coming on the ground en route to running for 154 yards.

As a team, the Wildcats (4-2, 3-0) amassed 360 yards of total offense, their best output in at least three weeks.

The Bulldogs won the coin toss and uncharacteristically elected to receive and the Warsaw defense went to work.

After a minimal gain on first down, the Wildcats bottled up Landon Murry, Eldorado Spring running back, but a personal foul on the green and black

awarded the home team a new set of downs. A steady dose of Murry moved the ball downfield, but the defense came through with a big stop on fourth down, turning the ball over to the offense.

Facing a third down, Harvath tallied his first score on a 43 yard touchdown run and Logan Gemes came on to split the uprights to give Warsaw the 7-0 lead just past the midway point of the opening period.

Later in the quarter, Garrett Ferguson kept the snap and scampered in for a 1 yard scoring run and after Gemes was good on another PAT, Warsaw led 14-0 at the end of the first.

On their first possession of the second quarter, Harvath struck again, this time on a 7 yard run. Gemes was perfect once again and the Wildcats extended their lead to 21-0.

Warsaw had the ball to end the first half with an opportunity to add to their margin, but chose to take their three score lead into the half.

"We were working to get into field goal range there, but a couple of miscues and a penalty set us back," said 'Cats head coach Ryan Boyer.

The Wildcats received the second half kickoff and that drive penetrated the red zone of Eldorado Springs, but on fourth down from the Bulldogs' 14 yard line, Warsaw coaches decided against bringing on Gemes for a 32 yard field goal try. Instead, the offense was stopped and turned the ball over to Eldo and the rest of the half went uneventful with the Wildcats still clinging to the 21-0 shutout.

"We were confident in our offense's ability to get the first," Boyer commented. "Obviously it didn't happen, but as a team, we learned from it."

The flow found it's way back early in the fourth when Harvath scored his third touchdown of the night

on an 8 yard run. The snap was botched on the PAT, but Gemes was able to pickup the ball cleanly and race to the left pylon to convert the 2 point conversion for the 'Cats to put them up 29-0. Warsaw increased their lead halfway through the final frame when Harvath notched his fourth touchdown run, this time on a 51 yard run, pinballing his way past Bulldogs defenders. Another fumbled snap on the PAT put the ball in Ferguson's hands, he rolled right and found a wide open Noah Siebert in the back of the endzone for another 2 point conversion to make it 37-0 for the Wildcats.

Eldorado Springs put a late score on the board on amongst several defensive substitutions when Murry rolled across the goal line on a 2 yard run and Aidan Rotert converted the 2 point try for the 37-8 final.

Harvath paved the way for the Wildcats offense with 154 yards on 15 carries while accounting for 4 of their touchdowns.

"Josh ran the ball hard all night," Boyer said. "We were proud of how well our team blocked for each other."

For the Warsaw defense, Harvath also led the way with 8.5 tackles. He was followed closely behind by Murrell with 7.5. Sean Reinertsen and Riley Taylor each had 5.5 tackles. Devon Boul recorded 4.5 tackles and Gemes had 4.

Utilizing Corn Stalks In Beef Cow Rations

The spring grass hay crop was extremely poor across many regions of the state. Beef cattle producers are turning to alternative feeds in order to find winter forage for their herds. Baled corn stalks are going to be one of the more available forage sources for many producers.

A discussion of their quality and use is certainly appropriate.

Baled corn stalks are a completely different feedstuff than grazed corn stalks. Baled stalks do not offer the opportunity for cattle to glean grain from fields, and therefore a lot

of the feed value of corn stalks are lost. They will be lower in quality and can potentially have a large amount of waste since the stalk is baled up along with the more nutritional leaves and husks.

During 2018, I received several forage test results for baled corn stalks. There was a wide range of nutritional value. Crude protein ranged from 2.6% to 6.0% and total digestible nutrients (TDN, an estimate of energy value) ranged from 31.6% to 45.0%. How will this quality of forage affect winter feeding programs for beef cows?

First, realize intake of

baled corn stalks will be low, with some estimates being 1.2% of body weight on a dry matter basis. Our expected intake of hay less than 52% TDN, is 1.8% of body weight. So right off the bat, we have an issue with total feed intake.

Using an expected intake of 15 pounds of dry matter combined with average protein and energy values from the 2018 corn stalk bale results, a dry, second period cow would consume 72% of expected dry matter intake, receive 48% of her energy requirement and 33% of her protein requirement if only being fed corn stalk bales.

Obviously additional energy and protein are needed for this animal, especially as she gets closer to calving time. For this second period cow, a supplement mix of 4.0 pounds of corn, 1.5 pounds of dry distiller's grain, and 0.5 pounds of soybean meal, or an equivalent mix, is needed to meet energy and protein needs when fed at a rate of 6.0 pounds per head per day. Additional mineral supplementation is also needed to meet nutritional requirements for this animal. Supplying only protein in the form of lick tubs, protein blocks, etc. will not

provide enough energy to meet the nutritional needs of the animal and poor performance, including weight loss, can be expected from this scenario.

Due to the variability in nutritional content and potential nitrate issues, it is strongly recommended producers submit forage samples for nutrient analysis. Forage analysis identifies the nutrients needing to be added to the diet which prevents feeding the wrong nutrients or the wrong amount of a particular nutrient. Nutritionally inappropriate diets will be very expensive this year due to the cost of various feedstuffs and the length of time conserved feeds will be fed.

Baled corn stalks certainly have a place in winter feeding programs this year. However, they may be best considered as a way to stretch hay supplies rather than to be the hay supply. Be aware that a high level of waste will probably occur, and adjust feed amounts accordingly.

MDC Reminds Deer Hunters Of Changes For Upcoming Season

Regulation changes include new firearms early antlerless portion, new firearms CWD portion, changes to firearms antlerless permit numbers, and expansion of CWD Management Zone.

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) reminds deer hunters of regulation changes for the upcoming 2023-2024 deer-hunting season. The changes include a new firearms early antlerless portion, a new firearms CWD portion, changes to firearms antlerless permit numbers, and the addition of 14 new counties to the MDC CWD Management Zone.

"The changes to deer hunting regulations for the 2023-2024 deer season were motivated by increasing deer numbers throughout much of Missouri and in response to changes in the distribution of chronic wasting disease (CWD) in the state," said MDC Cervid Program Supervisor Jason Isabelle. "With a growing deer population in most Missouri counties, we're increasing opportunities for hunters to harvest deer both within and outside of the CWD Management Zone this year."

2023-2024 Deer Hunting Portions and Dates Archery Deer and Turkey Hunting

September 15 through Nov. 10 and Nov. 22 through Jan. 15, 2024

Firearms Deer Hunting -New! Firearms Early Antlerless Portion: Oct. 6-8 (in open counties)

-Firearms Early Youth Portion: Oct. 28-29
-Firearms November Portion: Nov. 11-21

-New! Firearms CWD Portion: Nov. 22-26 (in open counties)

-Firearms Late Youth Portion: Nov. 24-26
-Firearms Late Antlerless Portion: Dec. 2-10 (in open counties)

-Firearms Alternative Methods Portion: Dec. 23 - Jan. 2, 2024

New Firearms Early Antlerless Portion Oct. 6-8

MDC will offer a new firearms early antlerless portion Oct. 6-8 in the 100 counties open for the firearms late antlerless portion Dec. 2-10. Reynolds County will now be open during the antlerless portions.

"With deer numbers being at desired levels in most counties but continuing to increase, additional antlerless harvest is needed to stabilize the deer population," said Isabelle. "This new season portion will help increase antlerless deer harvest prior to the November portion, when many hunters focus on harvesting bucks."

Isabelle noted that timing of the early antlerless portion was chosen to provide hunting opportunity when weather conditions are usually favorable and to minimize conflicts with archery hunters, who usually

hunt most in late October and early November.

New Firearms CWD Portion Nov. 22-26

MDC will offer a CWD portion of firearms deer season Nov. 22-26 in CWD Management Zone counties during the 2023-2024 deer season.

According to MDC, hunters will be able to use any unfilled firearms deer hunting permits during the CWD portion and must abide by the statewide limit of one antlered deer during the firearms deer season, all portions combined. Hunters must also abide by county-specific firearms antlerless permit numbers.

"Because higher deer densities can increase the rate of CWD spread, additional deer harvest in the CWD Management Zone is needed to prevent further increases in deer numbers and help minimize the spread of the disease," said Isabelle.

Isabelle noted that the CWD portion is timed to occur during the tail end of the primary rut, when deer movement is typically good and hunter interest remains high. CWD testing is not required during the CWD portion.

Changes to Firearms Antlerless Permit Numbers

MDC has also increased the number of firearms antlerless permits hunters can fill in most counties, including allowing hunters to fill a firearms antlerless permit in Butler, Carter, Scott, and Wayne counties. Hunters in Bollinger County will be able to fill two firearms antlerless permits beginning this year. Qualifying landowners in Reynolds County may now receive two Resident Landowner Firearms Antlerless Deer Hunting Permits. MDC has also increased the number of firearms antlerless permits from two to four in 85 counties.

"The liberalization of antlerless harvest opportunities will help slow population growth and keep the deer population at desired levels," said Isabelle.

He also noted that the additional firearms antlerless permits will help hunters and landowners to meet their deer management goals in areas where more antlerless harvest is needed.

Expansion of the CWD Management Zone

MDC has included 14 new counties as part of the CWD Management Zone this year: Bollinger, Caldwell, Carroll, Clay, Clinton, Carroll, Grundy, Jasper, Livingston, Madison, Montgomery, Pemiscot, Ray, and Schuyler.

As with all counties in the CWD Management Zone, grain, salt products, minerals, and other consumable products used to attract deer are prohibited year-round. Hunters must also follow carcass transportation regulations. The antler-point restriction has also been removed from Caldwell, Carroll, Clinton, Grundy, Livingston, Montgomery, Ray, and Schuyler counties.

Hunters who harvest deer in select CWD Management Zone counties during Nov. 11-12 must take the deer (or its head) on the day of harvest to a mandatory CWD sampling station.

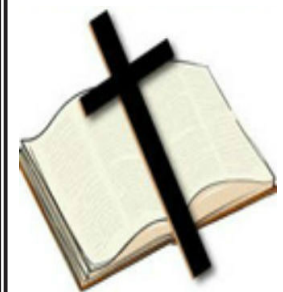
