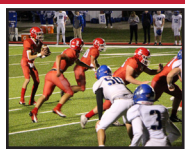

Breast Cancer Survivors Share Stories Of Resilience, Strength And Hope

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month, a global campaign to raise awareness and support for people affected by the disease. Members of the WHS volleyball and football teams wore pink this past week to show support of those fighting breast cancer.

Heather Bagley of Warsaw is one of those breast cancer survivors.

"I was diagnosed with breast cancer December 12, 2022. While I was shocked, I also felt at peace with it honestly. I knew I didn't want to succumb to cancer," said Bagley. "I chose a doctor at Olathe Cancer Center two hours away in Olathe, Kansas. While this was a big trip to travel daily, I knew God was sending me there and that is where I needed to be for me. I had a double mastectomy in January, ovaries removed in March and reconstructive surgery beginning in August 2023. I also had radiation treatment for five weeks daily in Olathe."

"My motivation to overcome cancer was knowing I wanted to live for my family and my boys needed me. Knowing I had all the family and friends support, love and prayers, I was able to focus on getting better. The hardest part was accepting help from friends

and family. I don't like to need help. I like to be the one to give help," said Bagley.

Breast cancer can have different symptoms for different people. Most don't notice any signs at all.

The most common symptom is a lump in the breast or armpit. Others include skin changes, pain, a nipple that pulls inward, and unusual discharge from the nipple.

"The quote I remember the best as a kid is, 'It's all in God's hands; pray, believe

and stay strong'. I gave my cancer diagnosis over to God and I was alright with it. I was actually oddly calm through it all. People would ask if I was alright. I always say, 'I am just grateful'. Of course, people would think that was odd. I was grateful though. I was grateful we caught it at stage 2. It made me stop and think about life and also grateful that I was able to have surgery and I had the best team I could have asked for. I had

support and love and doctors had a positive outlook that I could beat cancer. So, yes, I was grateful because many people don't have all of that when they have cancer. I considered myself lucky. The town of Warsaw said many prayers and they were all felt! I am so grateful to live where I do and have the community support I had. I may have had breast cancer but breast cancer didn't have me! I truly am grateful, thankful and blessed," said Bagley!

Carolyn Findley of Edwards was diagnosed with breast cancer after a doctor's visit in 2014.

"I had a lump that was ¾ the size of my breast so the doctor wanted to remove the breast," said Findley.

Findley decided to have both breasts removed since there was a chance the cancer could spread.

Warsaw Grants Operating Franchise To Co-Mo Electric

In new business Wednesday eve, Warsaw Aldermen approved an ordinance granting a franchise to Co-Mo Electric Co. to "construct, acquire, operate, and maintain electric facilities in the city" for a period of 20 years and to furnish electricity to the city and its inhabitants. A board member commented that this approval does not prohibit other firms from seeking similar status. Co-Mo is presently installing an internet operating system in the city.

The meeting opened at 6:00 PM on Wednesday, October 4, with Aldermen Rob Coskey, Lou Breshears, Adam Howe, Doug Hedrick present. Aldermen Reba Slavens and Eric Flores were absent. Mayor Eddie Simons presided, City Clerk Jessica Kendall recorded.

First actions by the group were to approve a revised agenda and minutes of its September 6 meeting, then okay payment of September 2 to October 2 bills submitted against the city.

In early session, Mac Vorce discussed a recently completed September 2 NICA bike racing event for 6th thru 12th graders, which brought to this area about 530 children, plus about 2,940 other attendees.

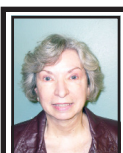
Bothwell To Recognize National Pregnancy And Infancy Loss Remembrance Day

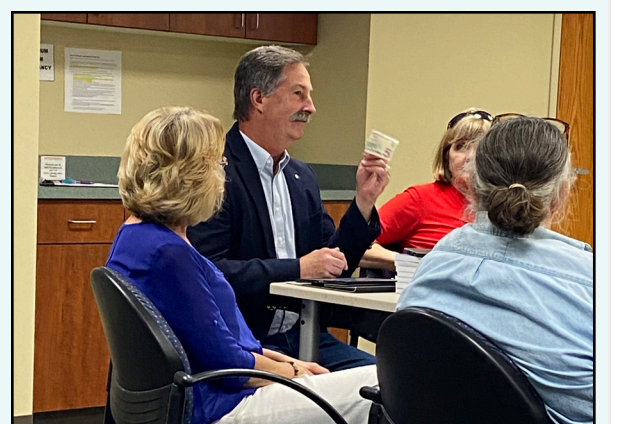

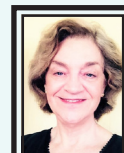

(Continued from Page 1) drawbacks as the implants were recalled and she ended up having surgery three times.

At the time of her surgery, Findley was working for Honeywell in Belton, Missouri, and her surgery was covered by her work insurance; however, since then, she has retired and many of the doctors she tried to see for follow up appointments refuse to accept Medicare.

"I finally got in touch with a doctor with the Susan Komen Cancer Center and had some luck seeing a doctor," said Findley.

According to the Susan Komen Cancer Center, every 12 minutes a woman in the United States will lose her life to breast cancer.

Some general symptoms that breast cancer may have spread include: feeling constantly tired, constant nausea, unexplained weight loss and loss of appetite.

Studies have shown that the risk for breast cancer is due to a combination of factors. The main factors that influence the risk include being a woman and getting older. Most breast cancers are found in women who are 50 years old or older. However, prognosis tends to be worse for women under 40. This is because breast cancers in young women can be more aggressive than breast cancers in older women.

The most important screening test for breast cancer is the mammogram. A mammogram is like an x-ray of the breast. It can detect breast cancer up to two years before the tumor can be felt by the patient or the doctor. Women should begin having a yearly mammogram at age 40.

Having a support system is very important in beating breast cancer.

"My husband and children were very supportive," said Findley. "However, I also appreciated the support I received from the people I worked with at Honeywell. They brought food to our house and sent me notes of encouragement. They even threw a party for me."

"The best advice I can give is to stay positive and as active as you are able. Rest when you can, lean on people when you need to and give it all over to God, for He is the true healer," said Bagley.

There are currently 3.8 million breast cancer survivors in the United States.

(Continued from Page 1) Lincoln Mayor Glenn Nelson reports that the first phase of the city's project will include placing a one-mile gravel parkway around the park. In the future the area will be paved, and equipment added to make more of a playground that will be friendly toward children with disabilities. He also plans to add a splash pad.

Cole Camp Pool President Taylor Hayes says that the current pool has not been functional for toddlers for several years. Its current depth begins at three and a half feet, and she hopes to provide zero entry to 18 inches. The pool is private, but open to the public. It opened in 1981.

Warsaw's South School Principal Tony Warstadt said that his school has all kinder and special education preschoolers (ages three and four) in Warsaw ISD. There are also 100 kids under five

years of age at South School. The present playground is more suited for kids in first grade and up and has been used for decades. With a PHIL grant he believes that building of a separate playground for the PreK and Kindergarten children can start in November and be completed by spring.

Cynthia Mos, a volunteer with KaysingerBluffPioneer Heritage Association, stated that the 1857 Crabtree cabin was dismantled at its original location and reassembled at Kaysinger Bluff. It didn't have a roof at first. It was given a roof and doors and windows have been replaced. She said that the organization wants to restore the cabin's authenticity with the goal of preservation and education. When that is complete, the next project will be to provide an authentic lean-to kitchen outside the cabin.

Dan Obrecht, representing the Food Bank says it serves four elementary schools, one middle school and a high school in Benton County with Buddy Backpacks and pantries. A PHIL grant would help with Buddy Backpacks, and free up some of the food bank's operating funds to expand to different populations with local support.

Marsha Eaton, a volunteer with the Historical Society, said that Warsaw's Steve Hanson generously gave the organization his collection of Native American artifacts dating back over 13,000 years. It has been displayed in the museum and archeologist Chris Hord is working with the volunteers to provide information about the sizeable collection. Additional displays are needed so the public can be more informed and educated about the background of how these artifacts were made and learn what purpose they had helping people.

The relatively new PHIL committee is chaired by Suzie Broderson. In its first year 100 members joined for a contribution of \$250 each. At the end of each year, those funds are used for non-profit grants. This year the committee received matching funds through the Patterson Family Foundation which generated the total amount of \$50,000 for grants.

(Continued from Page 1) monthly meeting. Members updated the status of signatures on the Truman Visitor Center petition and announced that a meeting on the matter is scheduled for 6 PM in the Harbor Room of the Warsaw Community Building on Saturday, October 14.

Executive Order 14067 signed March 9, 2022, directed government agencies to report within six months on the pros and cons of creating a central bank digital dollar and cryptocurrency regulations. According to Reuters they suggested how digital currency could be established in the U.S., but did not recommend one way or the other.

Thereafter, a group of major U.S. banks tested it for foreign and bank-to-bank payments.

Senator Moon spoke on the expectation that a central bank digital currency (CBDC) is inevitable and unstoppable, but said "if we do what we can now we may be able to slow it down in Missouri." Two issues he raised, privacy and cybersecurity, are key

concerns of many including not only conservative politicians but investment advisors, independent community bankers, members of the Federal Reserve, and central bankers overseas. The Fed issued a fact sheet in April 2023 that addresses some general concerns, available at: <https://www.federalreserve.gov/cbdc-faqs.htm>.

Comparing cash to digital currency, Senator Moon held up a US \$5 bill, fiat currency backed by the Federal Reserve. "If you paid for something that cost \$4 with \$5 cash," he said, "you would get \$1 back." "However, digital dollars are a form of currency, but not necessarily tangible, they would be controlled by the Federal Reserve and implemented by a central state bank."

He explained that with digital currency it could happen that if you had \$100 in your bank account and bought something for \$50, you might not get the change back. "It's frightening, and concerning." At issue is the potentially unlimited ability of the federal government to control individual's bank accounts. They point to Canada's Prime Minister Trudeau for example who blocked protesting truckers' access to their banking accounts.

Another example is China's CBDC by which the government controls personal spending.

The convenience of vigilant banks and credit card issuers who monitor unusual activity to prevent fraud against their clients, which can sometimes cause inconvenience, could expand to surveillance under a central bank digital currency system.

That in mind, Congressman Emmer (R-MN) with 60 co-sponsors including Congresswoman Ann Wagner (R-MO), authored the CBDC Anti-Surveillance State Act (<https://emmer.house.gov/2023/9/emmer-s-cbdc-anti-surveillance-state-act-passes-financial-services-committee>) that was passed from the Financial Services Committee to the House Floor on September 20, 2023. Emmer said the bill, in simple terms, halts government efforts to implement a surveillance tool contrary to the American way of life.

On another subject, several in attendance asked Senator Moon about the status of SB 190 signed by Governor Parson on July 6 that became effective August 28, 2023. The bill gives counties an option to pass an ordinance to give property tax credits to certain senior citizens. They must be eligible to receive social security benefits and must own, live in and be liable for property taxes on

their primary residence.

Although the bill passed, it did so without his support, Moon said, "Mine was the only "No" vote." Citing Article 1, Section 2 of the Missouri Constitution (he brought copies to give out to people who wanted one), he said "the Constitution grants everyone equal rights and opportunities so why not give tax breaks to young people, too?" Teachers, nurses, and retired seniors ineligible for social security are also left out. Therefore, because the tax breaks are not equally applied, and because of his duty to follow the Constitution he opposed the bill. Some of the approximately 20 people present at the meeting agreed with his stance and some did not.

So far a majority of counties, including Benton County, have not passed an ordinance to implement the property tax credits. Five counties have done so: Camden, Greene, Jackson, LaClede, and St. Charles. Each one interpreted the law differently and wrote their ordinances accordingly. SB 190 is not an easy read but for those interested it can be accessed at <https://senate.mo.gov/23info/pdf-bill/tat/SB190.pdf>.

Near the meeting's end, the senator answered questions he was asked about the best ways to get representatives attention to what people want and need them to do. Moon said one thing was to look at voting records, including his, to compare how they vote to what they promised to do when campaigning. If they don't match, he said, tell them you are not happy about it. "Doing the right thing is our job," he said.

Senator Moon talked throughout his presentation about his faith in God and encouraged everyone to trust in His control over all things. Proverbs 3 has special meaning for him. The senator emphasized as well that as a representative he makes decisions based on his faith and his understanding of the Missouri and U.S. Constitutions.

(Continued from Page 1) heartache and pain this loss can cause affected families.

"My second son, Myles, died at five months of age, six years ago this September," said Staus. "Myles died from positional asphyxia during naptime while with a caregiver when a blanket had fallen into his crib. The grief I have felt from losing a child, as well as working at the hospital where I gave birth to him and where I had to say goodbye, has always

been a struggle. I only hope my strength and courage can reach other mothers and families experiencing similar loss."

Pregnancy loss includes miscarriage and stillbirth, along with sudden infant death syndrome. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control indicates that about 1 in 100 pregnancies ends in miscarriage and each year more than 24,000 babies are stillborn in the United States.

This year's event will include remarks from Certified Nurse Midwife Tracey Arwood with Bothwell OB/GYN Associates, and the lilac tree planted at the first event in 2019 will be lit. A Wave of Light ceremony will happen at 7 pm where attendees may light candles in honor and remembrance of their loss. Refreshments will be available.

The Pregnancy and Infant Loss committee creates

baskets and distributes informational packets for mothers and families who experience loss while in the hospital. In the future, Staus said the committee hopes to start a fundraiser that can assist grieving families of infant loss with the burden of funeral costs.

"Just getting out into the community and being vulnerable reminds people they are not alone and creates awareness the community needs," she said. "I don't think there is a single person who hasn't been affected by this personally or who doesn't know someone who has experienced this type of loss. Currently, there is not an infant or child loss support group in Sedalia, and I hope our committee can fix that."

The event is funded by the Bothwell Foundation. In the event of inclement weather, the event will be held inside the Education Center.

Lincoln Pulls Off Amazing Fourth Quarter Comeback For Win Over Bluebirds

It was 26-6 in favor of Cole Camp after three quarters of play on Friday night in Lincoln. Some of the Cardinals faithful left early and missed possibly the all-time greatest comeback in Lincoln football history with a 28-26 sweeter than sweet victory.

With Lincoln players banged up and short on experienced athletes, this reporter thought going in that the Bluebirds would own the fourth quarter. That assumption couldn't have been further from the truth as the Cardinals controlled the final period.

Apparently, the week off and two players coming off the injured list and five new players from the student body made a huge difference.

Cardinals coach Brad Drehe said, "Cole Camp dominated us for three quarters. The new kids that came out to help us made all the difference in the world. Without them, we don't

finish the game like this. We had three weeks with only 12 kids in practice. To be able to scrimmage was a big deal. We have the pieces now."

He went on to say, "Riley (Sanders) made the big run and momentum went our way after that. This was a big win for us."

Sanders, who was 12 for 130 rushing for his best of the season, commented, "This was the first time I have been healthy this year. I have been looking forward to this game all season. We are a different team now."

Grant Rodriguez scored first for Cole Camp on a nice sweep to the right side from 14 yards out. Grady Strathman ran in for the two-point conversion and it was 8-0.

Sanders tied the game in the second for a brief moment on a ten yard pass to Cam Everhart. The two pointer failed, but it was 8-6.

The magic arm of Bluebirds' quarterback Gentry Dieckman came into play as he found Rodriguez for a 18 yard touchdown. The PAT failed and it was 14-6 at the half.

Dieckman hit a wide open

Matthew Bright from the 41 and the big tight end trotted in for the TD. An incomplete pass failed on the 2 point try and it was 20-6.

Later, Dieckman hit Rodriguez for an 18 yard gain. Strathman, who had a marvelous running game, would go in for the conversion and it was 26-6 after three. The fat lady was warming up to sing but she never did get the chance as Lincoln would steal the show.

Sanders broke one for a 58 yard score on the first play of the fourth at the 11:49 mark. The PAT failed but the scoreboard read 26-12.

An onside kick recovery changed the game. Sanders scored again on a nice run from the eight. He then found Ben Eckhoff on a play action pass for the huge two-point conversion to make it 26-20.

Lincoln's defense held and the Cardinals scored with 39 seconds left in the contest on a fourth and goal situation. Sanders threw a nice touchdown pass to Benham to tie the contest. No overtime was needed in this one though as Sanders ran in the two-pointer to

take the 28-26 lead.

Dieckman threw several long bombs but couldn't connect as Cole Camp raced against the clock. The Bluebirds' Reid Harrison sat out nearly the entire game with an ankle injury and came in briefly, but the pass attempt to the speedy senior fell incomplete.

Lincoln got a sack on a scrambling Dieckman to end the game.

Dawson Parrott was 4 for 20 receiving and Everhart was 12 for 47 rushing.

Sanders went 10 for 25 passing for 67 yards with an interception.

On the comeback by Lincoln, Cole Camp coach Kevin Shear said, "They did a tremendous job. We had lost too many pieces (two injuries) to the puzzle at that point and Lincoln made some big plays and we did not. We had a good scouting report but Lincoln rose to the occasion. We lacked physical toughness in the fourth."

Dieckman finished 4 for 12 passing for 60 yards. Strathman rushed 26 times for 168 yards. Rodriguez, the promising sophomore, was also a problem for Lincoln with 16 attempts for 97 yards.

Lincoln goes to Midway and Cole Camp will host Adrian this week.

Lane Johnson will have all of the Cardinals action this Friday at 7:00 PM on the Lincoln Sports Network.

For the season, Lincoln jumped to 2-4 and Cole Camp fell to 2-5.

'Cats Lose Close One At Home To Butler Bears

In a game that was nearly everything that it was hyped to be, the Wildcats did everything in their power to seal a win on Friday night when they hosted the undefeated Butler Bears (7-0), but a couple of untimely penalties and questionable calls down the stretch spelled doom for Warsaw (4-3) as they dropped another close contest, 30-27 to the visiting squad from Bates County.

The loss is the Wildcats third in five games, but all have been extremely close calls, coming by a total of just 9 points.

In the duel that just about everyone predicted, after receiving the opening kickoff, Butler drew first blood with less than one minute elapsed on a 50 yard run by Hunter Stevens. The 2-point conversion came up short, but the visitors took the early 6-0 lead.

The Wildcats answered on their first drive though when they put together a nice drive, capping it with a 2 yard touchdown run by Josh Harvath. A botched snap forced Warsaw's hand, the 2-point try was no good but the Wildcats tied things up at 6-6.

The Bears regained the lead late in the opening period on a 2 yard run by quarterback Dylan Davidson. Jayce Depriest knocked down the pass attempt for the Wildcats defense on the 2-point try, but the Bears made the score 12-6.

Warsaw's next drive ended when the sure-footed Logan Gemes' 37 yard field goal attempt went wide left, turning the ball back over to the Bears. That possession came up empty as the defense of the Wildcats had dug in for a long night and they took the ball back for the offense.

After moving the ball methodically downfield, Warsaw's ensuing drive gave them the lead on a jet run by Depriest around the left side of the offense. The wide side of the field gave him plenty of room to work with as he arrowed towards his own sideline and turned towards the endzone. After stiff arming one defender, Depriest lowered his body and created a boom heard across Benton County as he ran not just over, but thru a Bears defender for a 27 yard touchdown run. Gemes came on to nail the PAT this time to give the Wildcats their first lead at 13-12 with 3:54 remaining in the first half of play.

The lead was short-lived however as the Bears offense struck quick, this time on a 30 yard run by Xavier Wisdom. The 2-point attempt failed once again, but the Bears held the 18-13 halftime lead.

After the much needed break for both sidelines, Warsaw received the second half kick and quickly went

to work. Utilizing much of the clock in the quarter, the Wildcats took the lead on a 9 yard pass from quarterback Garrett Ferguson to Depriest as he ran a shallow route in the front of the endzone. Gemes nailed the PAT once again as Warsaw reclaimed the lead, 20-18.

The fourth frame provided about everything Wildcats fans could want (with the exception of the end result).

Warsaw took a two score lead with 8:27 to go on a 15 yard touchdown run by Ferguson. Gemes notched his third PAT of the night, the 'Cats lead grew to 27-18 and the defense was put on the stage.

On their next possession, Butler scored on a pass from Davidson to Jake Chandler after he slipped past the second level and was wide open in the middle of the field. Their 2-point attempt came up empty yet again and the Wildcats clung to a 27-24 lead with 5:57 left to go.

After the Green and Black offense was stalled on their drive, Butler took the lead back on a 49 yard touchdown run by Chandler on a misdirection play that seemed to fit the Wildcats defense all night. Again, the 2-point try failed but the visitors took back the lead, 30-27.

With one last chance and looking to at least put themselves in position for a field goal attempt, Warsaw moved the ball downfield, converting crucial downs along the way. Facing fourth down and 8 yards to go from just across midfield, Ferguson saw the field split and he raced through the heart of the Bears defense, diving and reaching out for the first down marker. After initial signals of a first down for the Wildcats, the original spot was reversed, marking the ball short of the marker without a measurement and the ball was given back to the Bears.

Butler ran out the clock and escaped, handing the Wildcats the narrow 30-27 loss.

Ferguson finished with 136 yards on the ground with 26 rushing attempts and scored 1 touchdown. He also completed 4 of 7 pass attempts for 32 yards and 1 touchdown.

Depriest and Harvath each tallied 10 rushes for 73 and 56 yards respectively. They each had 1 touchdown on the ground and Depriest also hauled one in through the air.

Drake Murrell led the Warsaw defense with 7 tackles. Riley Taylor recorded 6, Oliver Robertson had 4.5 and Harvath and Sean Reinertsen both tallied 3.5 apiece.

Gemes was a perfect 3 for 3 on PAT's and missed his only field goal attempt from 37 yards.

The Wildcats will travel to Skyline this week to take on the Tigers in a late season, non-conference matchup. That game is set for a 7:00 PM kickoff and can also be viewed on BCE TV via www.citylinktv.com.

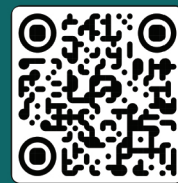
Reimbursement is available for necropsy if livestock loss is determined to have occurred because of black vultures.

If you're a long-term investor, your portfolio may stay fairly stable over time. However, that doesn't mean you will never sell any investments. But when should you sell — and why?

Here are some scenarios to consider:

- *If an investment has consistently underperformed* – For one reason or another, some investments may not live up to your expectations. Rather than holding these investments in the hope that they will eventually show consistently positive returns, you might be better off selling them and using the proceeds to buy other investments that could help you make progress toward your goals. Keep in mind, though, that short-term price swings are inevitable for virtually all investments, so you may not want to sell an investment after just a few price drops, as it may still have strong fundamentals and good prospects.

- *If the investment itself has changed* – The nature of some investments, such as stocks, can change over time. Stocks represent companies, and companies can evolve and adapt — or not. So, you may own shares in a company whose management has changed or whose products are less competitive than they once were. If this company no longer seems like a sound investment, you may consider selling your shares and moving on.

- *If an investment is "redundant"* – Over time, you may have added investments that are similar to others you already own. If you do have too many investments that are alike, you risk not having a fully diversified portfolio, and while diversification can't always protect against all losses or guarantee profits, it can help reduce the impact of market volatility on your holdings. Consequently, you might want to sell an investment that may now be "redundant" to your portfolio and replace it with another one that could boost your diversification efforts.

- *If an investment takes up too much space in your portfolio* – If you bought an investment years ago, and it's grown substantially in value, it could eventually take up more space in



your portfolio than you had intended, which could expose you to more risk than you'd like — because too much of any single investment may leave you more vulnerable to market downturns. Of course, if the investment is still appropriate for your needs, and still has a good outlook, you may not want to totally liquidate it, but you could consider scaling back on the shares you own.

- *If your own needs have changed* – You originally created your investment mix to help you reach certain goals, such as a comfortable retirement. And during much of your working life, you could possibly afford to invest primarily for growth, accepting the risk that comes along with that approach, as you knew you'd have time to potentially overcome the short-term volatility that's part of investing. But as you near retirement, you may want to lower your risk

level. Consequently, you could decide to sell some of your growth-oriented investments and move the money into income-producing ones. However, even during retirement, you'll still need your portfolio to provide some growth opportunities to help you ahead of inflation.

Generally speaking, you may not want to do a lot of selling (or buying) of

investments once you've built a portfolio that's appropriate for your goals, risk tolerance and time horizon. But if you are going to sell investments, make sure you do so for the right reasons.

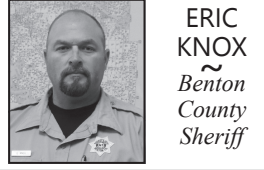

to be held on Saturday, October 14. He added that the event will involve closure of Benton Street, in front of Nix Horseshoe Bar, from Main Street and extending to Washington Street, and will feature sales of alcohol in a beer garden. All funds received will go to military veterans. The group approved his proposal. The group also okayed an ordinance relating to action allowed upon three unexcused absences of aldermen from City Council meetings; and approved a resolution between Warsaw Bike Share Program and Compass Willow, LLC, dba Warsaw Adventures, allowing bike rentals in the Drake Harbor area. When Luke Johnson, owner of Warsaw Adventures, had completed his talk, he also introduced another guest, Pamela Burnham, the new Director of the Warsaw Area Chamber of Commerce. In late session City Administrator Randy Pogue presented two bids received from contractors wishing to build a deck on the backside of the city offices. He said one bid, submitted

by Rolling Perfection, was \$5,640. The second bid was \$12,500. The group selected the 1st bid. City Administrator Pogue then kicked-off an October 10 kick-off for a RAISE Grant start-up meeting; also talked about recent census information which projects that Benton County will become a "high growth area" in the near future. He added that he was preparing a "needs list" for the city for the next three years, much of which will be available for budget discussions when the group enters those meetings this fall. Pogue then concluded that the FAA requires periodic updating of the city's designation of its Municipal Airport engineering firm. The group decided that the firm of Burns and McDonnell should remain the city's airport engineering firm. The group went into executive session about 6:50 PM. Visitors are welcome at the city's open meetings, which are usually held on 1st and 3rd Monday eves.

Hunters Take 16,575 Deer During New Firearms Early Antlerless Portion



Top harvest counties were Franklin, Howell, and Ripley.

Preliminary data from the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) shows that hunters harvested 16,575 deer during the state's new firearms early antlerless portion of deer season, Oct. 6-8. The top-three harvest counties were Franklin with 489 deer harvested, Howell with 454, and Ripley with 437.

"With deer numbers being at desired levels in most counties but continuing to increase, additional antlerless harvest is needed to stabilize the deer population," said MDC Cervid Program Supervisor Jason Isabelle. "The goal of the new firearms early antlerless portion is to help increase antlerless deer harvest prior to the November portion of firearms season when many hunters focus on harvesting bucks."

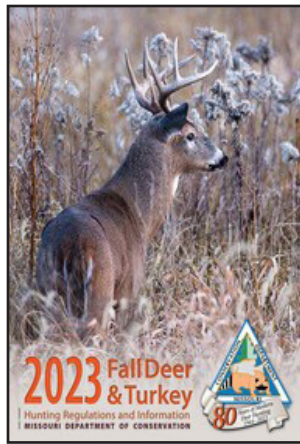
Isabelle added that the timing of the early antlerless portion was chosen to provide hunting opportunity when weather conditions are usually favorable and to minimize conflicts with archery hunters, who hunt most in late October and early November.

"Hunters couldn't have asked for much better weather," said Isabelle. "After a warm start to October, the cooler weather during this year's early antlerless portion helped to increase daytime deer movement and made for comfortable conditions for hunters."

Deer hunting in Missouri continues with archery hunting through Nov. 10 and again Nov. 22 through Jan. 15, 2024. Upcoming firearms portions are:

Firearms Early Youth Portion: Oct. 28-29
Firearms November Portion: Nov. 11-21
New! Firearms CWD Portion: Nov. 22-26 (in open counties)
Firearms Late Youth Portion: Nov. 24-26
Firearms Late Antlerless Portion: Dec. 2-10 (in open counties)
Firearms Alternative Methods Portion: Dec. 23 - Jan. 2, 2024

WARSAW CHRISTIAN CHURCH

Paul wrote the following to Timothy: "... from infancy you have known the holy Scriptures, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus." "Able" in this verse is a translation of the Greek word "dunamis," a word which, I believe, is a bit stronger than "able." It is the word often used for power, suggesting that there is an inherent power in Scripture that draws us to faith in Jesus as we are exposed to the gospel. Thus, the Scriptures "have the power to make us wise unto salvation."

A wise Christian is one who knows that salvation is in Jesus Christ, a truth that has powerfully exploded in his or her soul through exposure to the Scriptures. We have a glorious treasure in the Holy Bible, yet many give it little time or thought. Faith in Christ makes us Christians. A knowledge of Scripture makes us wise Christians, helping us to understand the wonderful treasure we possess in the word "salvation."

We normally think of the new birth as taking place when we trust in Jesus (e.g. 1 John 4:15). So closely connected, however, are the written Word in the Bible and the Living Word, Jesus Christ, that being born again is also attributed to the written word of God in 1 Peter 1:23: "having been born again, not of corruptible seed but incorruptible, through the word of God which lives and abides forever." Jesus, the living Word, becomes our Savior and Lord when we encounter Him in the written Word and exercise faith.

But how can words on a page have such wondrous power? The Bible, according to its own testimony and the testimony of millions of believers, is a unique book. Hebrews tells us that the Word of God is living and active. As we handle the Word of God with faith, the Word revealed on the pages of Scripture becomes real in our hearts. Jeremiah tells us that God's Word is

like a fire that burns within the soul and like a hammer that smashes a rock (23:29). The point in this reference is that there is power in God's Word.

When God speaks, it is different than when we speak. I may read the words of Aristotle, Cicero, or Herodotus and gain information, but reading their words does not bring about a personal, living relationship. I enjoy reading Martin Luther, and while my soul is refreshed by such reading, Martin Luther does not jump off the page and into my soul. With God, reading His word with faith does bring about a relationship because God is always living and present in His Word. Those who wish to be "wise Christians" will regularly read and study the Bible.

HOPEWELL BAPTIST CHURCH

In Matthew 9:27 Two blind guys find out Jesus is coming, and they call out "have mercy on us, Son of David". They have heard who Jesus, and they believe He is the Messiah. Jesus goes inside and asks them if they believe He can do this, and they reply "yes, God". He touched their eyes and said, "according to your faith will it be done to you" and their sight was restored. Jesus asks them not to tell anyone, but they went and spread the word all over the region.

Someone else shows up who is demon possessed and Jesus drove the demon out and the mute spoke. The crowd asks what is happening. People have actual problems, and all the sudden the burdens are gone because that is what Jesus does. A person's life is radically changed, and, on and individual level. Here's the problem. They see something but they haven't found the faith yet. It's one thing to believe in Jesus and another to believe in who Jesus is. Faith is a justified, true belief. It's knowing in something. You can know in something a little or a lot. And this depends on our growth as humans. Faith is not a question of knowing everything about Jesus, it's do we believe. The problem isn't Jesus, it's humans.

The Pharisees might have the strongest faith in the crowd, but their faith is in the wrong thing. The

question today is what is your faith in, the right thing or the wrong thing. We put the whole of our faith in a person, then we get in trouble. But people cannot save us from our sins. Here are some things we put our faith in – our political party, in our football team, our pastor, or our church, and our faith belongs only in Jesus and everything else will take care of itself. Where is your faith today? If it's anything but Jesus, put it down and walk away. We really like our things, but we get a choice. We get to pick. I certainly don't have a death wish and I'm not in a hurry to leave this life even as good as the next one might be. I will get there soon enough.

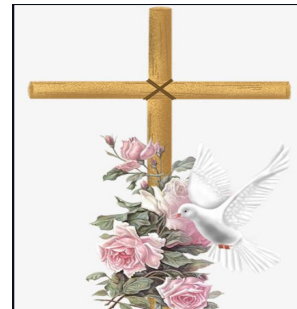
I have lost most of my family members and many friends over the years. That just comes with age.

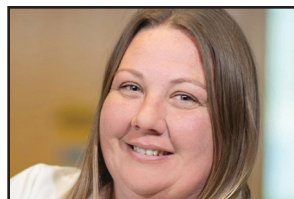
I am rambling a little this week as I have gotten behind with things. With winter coming in, we will be moving our services in a couple of weeks regrettably to the homes of our last remaining church members.

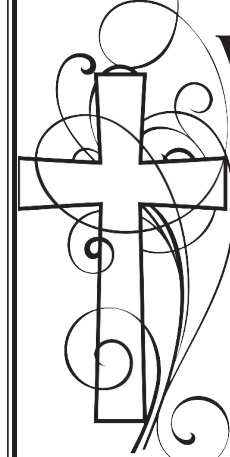
Dobbs said in addition to caring for people in rural communities, she has a strong interest in mental health.
