Candle Shop Brings Creativity, Casts Seasonal Spells On Clinton

Boujee Pumpkin. Harvest Moon. Pure Magic.

Despite the names of the scents that Ashlynn Newman has mixed up for Halloween, there is the no black magic at her shop, nor any spells, cats or bells.

There are candles, however, and a candle bar, where customers can make scented candles, choosing from 100 scents.

Ashlynn's business, Clinton Candle Co., opened a year ago, and is now entering the busiest quarter of the year. Her favorite part of owning the shop: mixing and concocting scents for seasonal candles.

"I love to get in here and create something new," she said. "It allows me to create an environment that is cozy and calming, and I can help you create whatever environment you want."

Ashlynn always wanted to run her own business, she said, but didn't know she had an artistic side until she opened the shop. Besides mixing and concocting scents, she designed the Clinton Candle Co. logo, which Nick Smith painted on the wall. Besides the ambiance the scented candles give the space, the features of the interior add a nostalgic layer— the painted tin ceiling is the original, and as are the wood floors, which were stained and finished.

Clinton Candle Co. has candle-making workshops coming up, she said, and has been taking reservations for company holiday parties.

"We just did pumpkin dough bowls and ghost dough bowls," she said.

Dough bowls are wooden bowls that are filled with candle wax and wood wicks. Ashlynn uses soy wax and cotton or wood wicks for a clean product. Fragrance oils are designed for candle burning, she said. After the candle burns down, the shaped bowl can be refilled or repurposed. She also has a recycle pol-

"You can return a candle vessel and get a discount on another one," she said. "Recycled vessels are sold at a discounted price."

Ashlynn's favorite candle this time of year resembles candy corn, with layers of white, orange and yellow wax. She chose scents of honey butter, pumpkin caramel and apple cider for the layers.

The holiday season is the busiest for the shop, because in the fall, people use scented candles to create a cozy and warm atmosphere in their homes, she said. Her "All the Fall" scent includes cedar leaf and spiced apple. For Hallow-

een, she created a spider web candle scented with black raspberry and butterscotch bourbon.

You can choose what scented candles you want to slot into a sugar-mold candle holder. Clinton Candle Co. carries a variety of table decor to warm up a family holiday gathering. Ashlynn also makes hand soaps and roll-on perfumes.

Since ancient times, candles were lit in sacred spaces in Egypt and the Middle East, a symbol of light, hope and the eternal nature of the soul. Candles can be used to focus energy during meditation, and are lit to remember the departed. Ashlynn is ambivalent when asked if there are any lingering spirits in her shop, which sat empty for three or four years. Before that, it was the Treasure Chest, she said, which carried antiques and vintage items.

"Kyle's Jewelry occupied the space for the longest amount of time," Ashlynn said. "It was the Penny Grocery from way back."

But for a Clinton couple, the macabre is a yearround obsession.



CITY COUNCIL Continued from page 1 Director Mark Dawson reported to the council.

Dawson said Project Husker is looking favorable, Project Diversity is "getting there," Project MW (Mega Watt, a large capital investment in the county) is moving forward, and that Project Graduate (an electronics project) is "dead." Director Dawson thanked the council for getting the sign placed at Gerhart Industrial Park and reported that a new retail project opened up: "Project Cup." Dawson said the activity was okay but that there had not been a lot of industrial activity lately, but

Councilwoman Shelley Nelson gave the Public Works report (in lieu of Councilman Jackson's absence): she reported that the city is exploring sign placement and other solutions to keep the Frisbee disc golf course a little more contained - especially along the edge of the course where residents are getting baskets full of Frisbees collecting on their properties. There is talk of potentially moving the 8th disc golf "hole" or possibly putting up netting as well.

Councilwoman Nelson reported that staff is keeping a close eye on the finishing punch list for the Artesian Pool improvements. Also, the Parks and Rec staff is in discussions with the Missouri Department of Conservation regarding revisions to phases with the Antioch Park Urban Conservation area concerning culverts and head-walls there. She reported that the Aquatic Center boiler building work is underway and (the Aquatic Center is closed for the construction) the work may be done early.

At Waste Water, the city will be exploring cheaper options for the SCADA systems at the plant. Currently, repairs are becoming more difficult and expensive and exploring alternatives might be better financially (and practically) for the city.

It was reported that a manhole was covered by a small building at the Westbridge Inn and Suites. They will be asked to relocate or remove it. Councilwoman Nelson reported that the VaCon Jetter truck is in need of repairs (brake light). Line cleaning arrangements have been arranged while it gets fixed. Also, one rotor gear-reducer needs to be replaced. Councilwoman Nelson reported that Alliance Water is working with Ace Pipe to ensure the original pricing quotes match the current

contract. The Public Safety report was given by Councilman Austin Jones. He reported that the Clinton Fire Department extended offers to two people which would fill two of the three vacant positions there.

Offers were extended to Bayley Heider and Danny Bailey. There is the possi-

bility that the third vacant position might be filled soon, too.

However, it should be noted that even with the vacancies filled, the Clinton Fire Department is still understaffed (according to good practice regulations and standards concerning fire departments).

Councilman Daniel Wilson gave the Finance Committee report: the council approved Resolution No. 16-2023 (contract provisions of services between the city and Clinton Main Street). It is the same as last year except some Cruise Night changes.

The council approved the employee health, dental, and life insurance options. Health and dental were slight increases for the city, however, the life insurance is the same rate as last year. The council also approved the employee health challenge for 2024. This program offers incentives to employees who participate.

Mayor Carla Moberly's recommendations for the reappointment of Rod Balke to the TIF commission and the reappointment of Bruce Dewsberry to the Board of Adjustment were approved by the council. City Administrator Christy Maggi reported that she will be attending a pre-construction meeting with West Point Construction about the Airport Terminal Project and the second phase for the road and fence.

New business: the council approved Resolution No. 15-2023 establishing the dates for the General Municipal election in 2024.

The council adjourned to executive session at 6:20 p.m.

14 years. The bakery has been at the same location since the shopping center on Ohio Street opened in 1981. Jesse is a 2009 graduate of Windsor High School, but wears Cardinal red and supports local schools.

The Bakery has undergone a change of color, also, she said. Following the previous owner's tradition, Blue Ribbon Bakery closed for two weeks last Christmas, and the interior was given a new coat of paint. The menu, formerly on chalkboards, is now painted on the wall cinnamon rolls, turnovers, fritters, biscuits and gravy, breakfast sandwiches, along with cookies and deli sandwiches, eat in or takeout. 



Clinton High School is excited to announce that it recently received a grant from the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE). This \$10,000 Grow Your Own Grant is designed to increase recruitment of high school students into the teaching profession.

For the past three years, CHS has taken a proactive approach to combat the growing teacher shortage crisis. Students who show interest in pursuing a career in teaching have the opportunity to be a part of the Future Teachers of America program, allowing them to attend college visits

to education programs in the region and also attend the University of Missouri Future Teacher Academy. Clinton High School also created an internship program within the district to allow high school students to enroll in "Teaching As A Profession". These students are provided with a year-long mentorship in the grade-level classroom of their choice. This program allows for high school students to get teaching experiences and mentorship of the teaching profession, allows younger students to see the older students as a teacher role-model, creates a sense of "home" for students, and builds a partnership with the greater Clinton community. Through the reward of

this grant, Clinton High School will offer students who complete the Teaching As A Profession internship, and are enrolled in a Missouri Educator Program after high school, with a \$500 scholarship. These students will be given one year of mentoring provided by the teacher in which he/she interned with. Teachers will also be paid \$500 for their agreement and completion of this mentorship to the student. This mentorship will include monthly checkins, advice, questions, classroom observation placements and opportunities, and the connection of a homebase for these students.

"I am extremely excited Clinton High School received the Grow Your Own grant," says Jenny Corson, Clinton High School Principal. "Only 125 schools in Missouri were awarded the grant and we are grateful to be one of them. Our hope is to grow our students into educators and bring them back to the district to teach!"

From high school basketball star to Olympic gold medalist and member of the Women's National Basketball Association (WNBA) Hall of Fame, Chamique Holdsclaw has an inspiring story to share. But it's not just about athletic stardom. It's about personal struggles to manage mental health issues such as depression and a desire to help others do the same. She will talk about her role as an emotional health activist and an athlete when she makes a free, public presentation at 7 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 15 in Hendricks Hall at the University of Central Mis-

Holdsclaw's remarks are a continuation of the Signature Series at UCM that began in 2022 as a way to enlighten campus members and the local community on issues such as diversity, inclusivity, mental health and more through presentations by nationally known speakers who can share their personal experiences and expertise. The series is coordinated by the Office of the Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs, and all interested individuals are invited to attend.

Born in Queens, New York, Holdsclaw was a standout basketball player at Christ the King High School, and was awarded a full athletic scholarship to play collegiately for legendary Hall of Fame Coach Pat Summit and the University of Tennessee Lady Volunteers. Holdsclaw contributed to the Lady Volunteers' reputation as women's basketball powerhouse helping the team to become the first in women's collegiate basketball to win three


straight NCAA Championships. In the process, she captured several All-America honors and many other

Holdsclaw's success in

college athletics propelled her to the professional level, becoming the #1 pick in the 1999 WNBA draft, selected to play for the Washington Mystics. Maintaining the same greatness on the court that she exhibited in college, she capped off her first season with a WNBA Rookie of the Year Award, and the first of six appearances as a WNBA All-Star. In 2000, she won an Olympic Gold Medal playing for Team USA in the Olympic games in Sydney, Australia. In addition to her success in athletics, Holdsclaw has dedicated her life to mental health and wellness activism. Most recently, she has spent time speaking at conferences, and participating on panels and events related to mental health issues. She shares information about her personal struggles with depression, which are depicted in the riveting documentary "Mind/Game: The Unquiet Journey of Chamique Holdsclaw." This work describes how she sought help and managed her own mental health.

Holdsclaw is an honorary member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., and is an ambassador with the JED Foundation, a nonprofit organization that seeks to protects emotional health and prevent suicide for the nation's teens and young adults.
