Clinton Students Get Big Lift From Black Hawk Helicopters

Two Black Hawk helicopters from Whiteman AFB landed on the grounds of Clinton High School (CHS) on November 8 for a JROTC recruiting event. Teachers, cooks, counselors, two students from Clinton Christian Academy and 50 JROTC students were flown over Truman Lake by Missouri National Guard aviation personnel. It was a first flight for many passengers who showed their some of their excitement with fist bumps after land-

"It was the first time we have had helicopters for a recruiting event," said First Sergeant Thomas Collison, JROTC staff member. "When the Black Hawks landed on school grounds, kids' noses were against the windows. My seniors thought they were awesome. A couple of JROTC graduates from our program have joined the Army in aviation. Helicopters equate to a great job on the outside. We want to do this again next year and involve more of the staff."

Mac Vorce, Director of Sales for the Clinton Daily Democrat and Benton County Enterprise, went up on one of the Black Hawk flights and took photos. He said it was his first time onboard a helicopter and he

greatly enjoyed the ride.

First Sgt. Collison said that the rides took place after a safety briefing in the CHS Media Center, and lasted 15 minutes each from 12:30 to 2:00 P.M. He said that the pilots and crew chiefs of the Black Hawks are all Missouri National Guard people, and they love to fly.

"JROTC is a military-style leadership course," said

The second week of October, Amy Bagley held her annual fall craft retreat at Heit's Point Lutheran Camp near Lincoln. To provide materials for the retreat, she loaded up double-sided rolling racks with paper, inks, stamps and other supplies from her store, The Craft Lab in Deepwater.



"Kornfield Kounty's Merry Mirth" is a spin-off of a country-music variety show that aired on CBS from 1969 to 1971 and starred Buck Owens and Roy Clark. The fictional location of the TV show was Kornfield Kounty, with performers popping up in the cornfield to exchange jokes, and

crows providing the laugh track.

After 1971, the show was produced for another 21 years for other markets and lived on in syndication and spin-offs, becoming a rural cult classic. Many of the performers were Grand Ole Opry stars, including Louis Marshall Jones, aka Grandpa Jones, who played clawhammer banjo and sang gospel and old-time country. Grandpa Jones was known for his lengthy answers to the question 'What's for Dinner, Grandpa?" a routine that will be revived in the show by Bill McCoy.

Ann Pugh reprises her role as the over-eager Minnie, and cuts loose on "Grandma's Feather Bed," the John Denver song about the bed that was nine feet high, six feet wide and soft as a downy chick. Returning members of the cast are Beth Henderson, Tracy Fonke and Hailey Coleman. New to this production are Denise Owsley, Chris Modlin, David Lee, Natalee Newman and Julie Morgan.

Although he's not playing the character, former Clinton police officer Chris Modlin nails the laconic delivery of laid-back country bumpkin Junior Samples.

This is the third time the backdrop of Kornfield Kounty has been used since it was painted by Randy Day 30 years ago for "The Grand Ole Hayride," a show staged during Olde Glory Days in a tent on the Square, Ann said.

"Kornfield Kounty's Merry Mirth" incorporates 'new' jokes, groaners and songs familiar to fans of the original show. A quartet will perform the gleefully sardonic "Gloom, Despair and Agony On Me," and Ann and Chris will deliver "Where-Oh-Where Are You Tonight?".

The Gossip Girls will join forces for "We're Not the Kind To Go Round Spreading Gossip," (so you better listen close the first time). Instead of the barber shop, the snipping and gossiping will take place at the beauty shop, Marty said.

The second half of the show will incline towards

the coming holidays.

"We'll be sharing some korny Christmas as well as honoring the season with some beautiful vocals," Ann said.

David Lee, former news director at KDKD FM, will take the KORN microphone as kooky Charlie Farquharson. David will also read "The 12 Days of Christmas" and "The Christmas Guest." White Christmas" ends the show.

Public Television in Warrensburg. The message: he wanted to feature The Craft Lab on his show, "Making." And that he would be there with a camera crew on Friday.

"I had two days to put the store back together," Amy said. "It usually takes two weeks. I worked from sunrise to 2 a.m. on Thursday to finish up."

She got enough of the store stock back up, she said, and on Friday, Roy and two camera crew came and interviewed Amy and hung out at the store with the crafters. The segment aired on KMOS-TV last Saturday, Nov. 11, but Amy has posted a link to it on The Craft Lab Facebook -- click on Episode 3. "Making" is a series that profiles artists and artisans involved in keeping the creative spirit alive in Missouri, which Amy's store has done since she transformed her parents' hardware store into a multi-media arts and

crafts store in 2015. "It was a craft desert before that," Amy said of the surrounding area.

Amy carries decorated paper, ribbons, paints, paste and other scrap-booking supplies, but most of her customer base is people who design and make their own greeting cards. She also stocks supplies for a new craft called "junk journaling," which is creating handmade, one-of-a-kind books by recycling parts of an old book into a journal for recording ideas and drawings or an album filled with family stories, photos and memories.

Amy's family story: Parents Jerry and Kay Jones moved to Deepwater when she was in 7th grade. Her grandparents, Bertha and Ira Jones, had lived in Brownington, and before that, in Harper, a small town east of Osceola.

"My father was the youngest of 12," Amy said. "When the family moved, the school closed down."

Amy's older brother and older sister were already grown and had left home when she and her parents moved to Deepwater, she said. Her parents built a house in Deepwater, and in 1984, opened a True Value Hardware on Second Street

where Amy worked on weekends. After graduating from Lakeland High School in 1986, she attended SMSU, now MSU, in Springfield, then worked in Johnson County, Mo. and Waco, Texas, in printing, desktop publishing and IT.

In 2007, she moved back to Deepwater and took over the hardware store from her parents. Working in her parents' store during high school did give her a knowledge of hardware, plumbing and tools, she said.

Her college major, in industrial technology and printing with a minor in industrial management, did not prepare her for running a small business.

"I definitely learned as I went along," Amy said. "It was trial by fire."

Six months after taking over the hardware store, she began adding craft supplies to the mix to test the market — a few stamps and craft paper. In 2009, the scrap-booking supply store in Lincoln closed, and Amy bought the inventory from the owner, Dorcas.

By the end of 2014, Amy was selling more craft supplies than hardware, and in February of 2015, closed the hardware side and concentrated on selling craft supplies. She still gets calls from people looking for hardware, she said.

"For the first three years, men would walk into the craft store holding a chainsaw chain that needed sharpening," she said. "People don't expect things to change."

The Craft Lab is now the only brick-and-mortar store left in Deepwater, Amy said -the corner bar has closed and on another corner, the "bank" sign has been painted over.

"Even the welder retired," she said.

Amy and her husband own the three buildings on Second Street the hardware store occupied, and live in the house her parents built. Her father passed away, and when her mother remarried, Amy made the wedding invitations - 150 of them - for her mother and stepfather, Buel Engle, who she calls her "bonus Dad." The Craft Lab has products on pegboards all around the walls, on tables and counters, and in display racks for carrying product lines from 18 companies that make art supplies.

There are long tables for crafting, a sitting area with a sofa and a table of snacks. Tables hold bargain bins of sale items.

Fridays are "Girls' Day Out," when her regulars come and work on crafts. Everybody is welcome, she said. Two of her regulars are sisters, one who quilts and one who scrap-books, and both bring their projects to work on.

"People come for the welcoming environment, the camaraderie and the free therapy," she said. "We love to see what everyone is doing."

The therapy is provided by the shop greeters, Fritz and his brother Schnitzel, two of a series of six miniature Schnauzers the Bagleys have owned.

Her regular customers range in age from 20-something to 83, she said, with most being women who are close to retiring or have retired, and are looking for an artistic outlet. One woman has brought her two granddaughters since they were six years old, Amy said.

Girls Day Out on Fridays is \$10 per person and includes the use of an eight-foot work space in the workshop and a 10% discount on items purchased during the day while they craft.

Also available is use of Amy's extensive collection of stamps, which fills a floor-to-ceiling cabinet on one wall. Some are woodcuts, but most are rubber stamps.

"I have thousands," she said. "I have been a member of the Unity Kit of the Month club since 2015."

Amy also gives demonstrations of card-making tools, such as dye cutters, the foil machine, embossing folders and letter presses. Making your own stamp is an art that is coming back, she said.

The Craft Lab's 15th annual Christmas Card Swap on Nov. 11, for which crafters design a greeting card and duplicate it for the number of people attending, plus one for the store. On Nov. 7. she held an annual shoebox card swap where the crafters design a Christmas card, then assemble kits for each participant to put the card together themselves. The cards her regulars create look intimidatingly professional, but Amy said they aren't.

"If you passed kindergarten, it's nothing that you can't do," she said.

Amy also participates in Holy Rosary Church Altar Guild's fundraisers, held in August and February. Crafters pay for a day of crafting, plus lunch and dinner, and craft vendors give part of their proceeds to the school. For her "make and take," Amy showed people how to make one-of-a-kind bookmarks using letterpress plates printed on water-color-washed card stock.

For really professional looking cards, she sells a letter press that impresses the ink into the card. The letter press is sold out, but she's getting more in, she said. One of her customers has it on her wish list for Christmas . Amy assembles and wraps the gifts on the woman's list, adding, on the husband's suggestion, something not on the list but his wife has talked about wanting, as a surprise. Then he comes down to The Craft Lab, pays, takes the gifts home and puts them under

Amy collaborates with other professional crafters, charging a small fee for them to hold classes at The Craft Lab. The store has hosted clay-jewelry making classes, Shelly Bales' painting classes, and has a gnome-making class by Michelle Parmelee scheduled. Amy has been experimenting with making eco-prints, using leaves and plants on paper dyed with coffee, and plans to offer a workshop on the process. She's also thinking about a customer's suggestion to start an "explorer club" for people who want to experiment with different materials and methods.

"There're no mistakes in

creativity," Amy said, "only the opportunity for more creativity."

"Contractor is a different language," Peggy said. "Architect is a different language."

On Oct. 27, Peggy cut the ribbon to open the new building on Third Street, where the health department relocated from offices on the north edge of town. Last week, she was at First Presbyterian Church to speak to the members of Chapter EN, P.E.O., on the job of running a community health center that keeps expanding.

Peggy, who has worked for HCHC for 20 years, started when Sandra Braithwaite, a P.E.O. member, hired her to work for Head Start. For the first five years, Peggy commuted to Clinton from Springfield, she said, where her son was in school. She moved to Clinton in 2014. she said, when her son graduated.

She worked for ten years for WIC, the Women's, Infants and Children's program, she said, then stepped up in 2015 when the former administrator, Bonnie Glass, retired.

"When I started, the center was downsizing," she said. "Now we are growing and adding contractors."

The HCHC used to rely on medical personnel, Peggy said, but now contracts with professionals to provide services. Free services for Henry County residents range from vaccines and shingle shots to car seats and safe cribs.

Other services have a small fee. Lab tests are available at the HCHC, even for people who have insurance, Peggy said. The HCHC also provides services for people with special health needs.

"We put in four ramps and purchased a lift bed," Peggy said of recent projects.

Another gap in community health care that the HCHD fills: Once a month, the HCHC visits the Henry County Jail and provides vaccines and health tests, she said.

The health center contracts with the schools to provide life skills and education classes to middle and high school students. The classes, led by Tyler Pulcini, focus on building healthy relationships and has a very high success rate, Peggy said, the goal being to prevent students from dropping out of school.

The HCHC also provides testing for STDs, sexually transmitted diseases, and has baskets of condoms in the lobby, free to take, no questions asked.

As an individual, Peggy joined with others a year and half ago to address the problem of homelessness, she said. The group decided to focus on helping homeless teenagers and work with the schools to find them homes. The group also distributed kits of bath products and food. Clinton does not have a homeless shelter, Peggy said.

"Warrensburg has four," she said.

The HCHC offers "Family and Friends" classes in CPR (cardio-pulmonary resuscitation). CPR is now "compression only," --mouthto-mouth is no longer recommended, although the benefits of adding rescue breaths overrides the risk of Covid infection in some situations. The HCHC also helps church congregations and building owners develop emergency preparedness plans, conducts food inspections at restaurants and motels, and does safety inspections of baby cribs and equipment.

The HCHC held a Healthy Family Expo that drew 200 people, she said. The center also does rabies clinics for

"We vaccinated 22 animals last year, she said.

Peggy, who has a degree from Missouri State University, also speaks fluent spreadsheet. Last year's HCHC budget was approximately \$1.5 million, she said, which comes from four categories: 47% from local taxes, 50% plus from state taxes and the CDC, plus some from small fees and donations.

The new building came in \$1,200 under budget, she


We do not want to tempt God. We will go to Exodus 17 to see how the people tempted God.

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

SECULAR SAINTS

While I was a student at Union University in Jackson. Tennessee, the Colonial Bread bakery was just outside the city. Some days when the wind was right you could smell the bread baking. For a dollar you could go inside and purchase a loaf of hot bread before it was sliced or packaged. They just gave it to you in a brown paper sack. A carload of students would pool their coins, buy a loaf, then eat it with their bare hands while it was hot. It was wonderful, but a loaf quickly disappeared among the students.

When I read Jesus' words, "Man does not live by bread alone," I remember that delicious bread. Still, no matter how tantalizing hot bread may be, there is more to life than a loaf of bread. When Jesus used the word "bread," He doubtless was referring to more than food. He had in mind all our needs and wants, all our earthly desires.

Jesus did not mean we are not to seek bread. He said we do not live by bread "alone." Singular pursuit of the things of earth is a shortcut to unhappiness. However, the pursuit of bread is a necessity. That pursuit should be guided by "every word that comes from the mouth of God."

David Roper explained it like this, "We must work, not to conquer, acquire, accumulate, and retire but to make visible the invisible Christ by touching people with His love. Then, we can be sure our labor in the Lord is not in vain." I am currently writing a series of sketches about the life and work of some Christian people. Some of them are pastors and missionaries; but others labored at jobs not considered religious. We call them laypeople. They touch people pastors and missionaries never even see, let alone touch. I personally refer to these people as "secular saints." May I confess that I am eternally grateful God called me to be a pastor. For more than sixty years, I reveled in that ministry; but there were times when I would have preferred to be a "secular saint."

These "saints" greatly outnumber the clergy, and I will forever thank God for them. When in doubt, we will do well to follow John's example.

Clinton City Council Held Open Session

The Clinton City Council met in open session November 7. A public hearing regarding variances in the ordinance at Gerhart Industrial Park was held from 5:45 pm to the opening of the council meeting (6 pm). Councilwoman Debbie Smith was absent.

The regular meeting was initiated with the recital of the Pledge of Allegiance; the previous meeting's minutes were approved. Reports were heard from Chamber Director David Lee and Economic Development Director Mark Dawson.

Director Lee's report for the Clinton Chamber included reporting several new members and multiple business anniversaries. He commented about the fourth year of the "\$150 to get \$25" program at the chamber wherein a person can purchase multiple amounts of chamber gift certificates and get extra certificates (with limits). Lee reported that Cook Tractor celebrated its 65 year anniversary and also commented on the grand opening for the Henry County Health Center (new location on Third Street).

The snowflakes are up and lit along Ohio and Second Streets, too - largely with the help of CHS and CCA students' re-bulbing efforts.

Window Clings with QR codes are starting to appear in business windows, too. Pointing your smartphone at one with the camera app open will take you to the City of Clinton app where a few surprises will greet the participant.

Director Lee reminded folks that the Christmas Parade will be the night after Thanksgiving (as is traditional) and this year the upgraded lights will "dance to the music." Be sure to be

Economic Development Director Dawson reported there were three "in town visits" by various potential businesses: one of those is a start up and "has a good business plan." "Project Taco" is one potential business which would utilize locally grown products for their product.

"It is a diverse group of people," said Dawson about the folks working to get the business off the ground. "I'd say there is about a 60% chance it will start."

Other project activity included: Project Diversified, Project Graduate (on hold), Project Custer, and Project Sprocket. "There are several [projects] in the works and a wide variety of them," said Dawson. He hopes to get a few more before the year's end so the numbers from previous years can be topped.

Councilman Cameron Jackson gave the Parks and Rec report: two baskets for the disc golf course (at Artesian) have been moved and "no trespassing" signs have been purchased. This is in response to previous problems with properties that adjoin the Artesian Park disc golf course. The Hurt Park renovations are on pace: the door closures

have been installed, the old slide removed, and the horseshoe pit has been revamped. At Antioch Park, the city is waiting on the contractor to blade and install the rock roadway and plans for the concrete work are being made.

The boiler building at the Aquatic Center is nearing completion: the plumbing was recently installed. A walk-through at the Artesian Pool pool house was scheduled to get a list of the remaining problems

At Waste Water: the recent repair on one of the rotors at the plant did not work and another rotor is showing signs of having problems, too.

The issue with the manhole at the Westbridge Inn (the manhole was covered by a building sometime in the past) is being resolved. For now, a dye test is going to be run to determine who else uses the line there which will lend to determining a solution for the problem (move the building or manhole). A "jetting sewer schedule" is being developed which is, as Councilman Jackson put it, "essentially power washing the sewer lines." It will involve creating ten sewer line zones and completing one zone per year. The hope is to fully clean the entire system every ten vears.

The council approved the plat survey at Englewood which will add 3,940 grave spots to the cemetery. Councilman Jackson reported that the Community Development Director has sought the assistance of Whitehead Associates to produce a survey in regards to the right-of-way at 701 South Orchard Street (because of a fence located there). Also, Street Superintendent TJ Williams is evaluating current mowing locations for the City of Clinton and will be recommending a plan for the 2024 season. The council approved the concrete bid from Do-Rite Construction for the Commerce Drive extension project (amount of \$681,000); the Henry County Commission agreed via intergovernmental agreement to contribute \$100,000 of that. Councilman Jackson also reported the city has been notified it will be receiving \$120,000 in grant monies for the Safety Plan and Planning Supplemental work – this is in regards to creating bike-lanes and more pedestrian friendly sidewalks in town.

The Public Safety report was given by Councilman Gene Henry. The council approved the purchase of 27 police radios (from A & W Communications) and the purchase of a new repeater tower for the total amount of \$60,000. Captain John Scott, present at the council meeting, explained that the older police radios are not digital and the current police radios are at least 10 years old. He said the repeater is "at the end of its life cycle." After discussing the budget items, Councilman Henry suggested the city use ARPA funds for the purchase, of which motion

was approved. Also, Councilman Henry reported a grant opportunity for the Clinton Fire Department. The grant (CI-IEG) will allow the City of Clinton to use the purchase of the fire truck (about \$1,000,000) towards the match of the potential grant amount. The idea, if the grant is awarded, is to use the money to construct a training facility for CFD.

The facility would allow for the potential training of other departments, too. The council approved the motion to advance the application for the grant.

Mayor Carla Moberly's recommendations for the reappointment of Dan Wallce (to the Clinton Air-

port Board), and the reappointment of Troy Bohannan (to the Planning Commission) were both approved by the council.

City Administrator Christy Maggi reminded the council of the ground breaking event for the new airport terminal next week, and also hoped that an agreement for the SPSP grant might be in next week as well.

Unfinished business: the council held both readings for Bill No. 2023-36 (approving the replat of lots 11 and 13 at Gerhart Industrial Park). The approval for the request for variances at the industrial park were handled during the public hearing just before the council meeting proper.

New business for the council included the approval of a request for a street closure from Clinton Main street. The Clinton City Council entered closed session at 6:38 p.m.



Carlene Sersey was born on March 20, 1936, to John Rhoads and Edna Vanwinkle. Carlene was the middle of her two siblings. Carlene was born in Kimberly, Idaho, but shortly after birth she moved to Missouri. She lost her mom at the age of 12 to ovarian cancer. John then was left to raise his three children alone.

Carlene graduated from Clinton High School in 1954. She couldn't get out of Clinton fast enough and moved to Kansas City. She took a job as a nurse assistant at St. Lukes and her starting wage was whooping .81 cents an hour. She then worked at AT&T for three years.

Carlene met Ken nth Mc-Farland and they were married. They had two boys Jo D. McFarland and three years later Jeff L. McFarland was born. Carlene and Kenneth divorced and remarried but things just didn't work out and she packed up her two boys and the two dogs and heading back to Clinton.

She started working at the hospital in Clinton. Carlene had to rehome her two dogs and it almost broke her heart. She had known Amos Sersey a long time, but they married on July 3, 1972. Amos was a barber in town for 59 years. 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

AK: People could apply to be bus drivers. They could be part-time bus drivers or just trip drivers.


OS: How are your interactions with the school district?

MDC Reports 90,334 Deer **Harvested During Firearms Opening** Weekend



Top harvest counties were Franklin, Texas, and Howell. Preliminary data from the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) shows deer hunters in Missouri harvested 90,334 deer during opening weekend of the November portion of firearms deer season Nov. 11 and 12. Of the 90,334 deer harvested, 53,159 were antlered bucks, 7,163 were button bucks, and 30,012 were does.

Top harvest counties for

opening weekend were Franklin with 2,114 deer harvested, Texas with 1,825, and Howell with 1,726.




