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South Henry County To South Africa: Rucker Family Takes Aim For Big Game

In 1993, Mark Rucker decided to add elk to the mix on his ranch in Henry County, south of Brownington, where he raises crops and cattle and whitetail

deer for hunting.

He and his father, Laverne
Rucker, had started the
game farm in 1989, and
Mark set his sights on raising the biggest trophy elk
possible on his ranch.

"I bred two cows and got one calf," Mark said of paying \$5,000 for artificial insemination from a world-record elk.

The bull calf grew to become 900 pounds with a 31-point rack, scoring 502 points on the Pope and Young scale in its prime, out-scoring its sire. A hunter from Georgia took the trophy elk 13 years later, Mark said.

"It was the biggest one he had ever harvested," Mark

Mark now has a herd of nine female elk and one bull elk, and 80 whitetail on the property, which offers 1,100 acres of prime hunting. Called the Otter Creek Trophy Ranch, it is leased out to a group of hunters from Georgia who travel 15 hours one way several times a year for the trophy hunting.

The hunters stay in Clinton, and have been to the

ranch once this year, Mark said, and are coming back, he said.

"It isn't an easy hunt," Mark said.

"Fair chase" is not issue on the Rucker Ranch, which is large enough for the elk and deer to evade hunters. Last year, there were five hunters, Mark said, so he let six bull elk out a week or so before the hunt

or so before the hunt.
The hunters harvested

five of the elk.

Despite search parties of experienced trackers looking for it, nobody could find the sixth elk.

"We looked everywhere and didn't even find a track," Mark said. "We have trophy bucks (whitetail) on the ranch that we've only seen one time, because they are so smart

and hunter-wary.
"We have game cams, but

don't even have pictures of them."

Three months later, on Christmas Day, Mark caught a glimpse of the sixth elk when he was out on a farm road, he said.

There's more big game down the road at the ranch

where Mark grew up.
For Mark's parents' 50th
wedding anniversary, his
father built a 30-by-40 foot

It's Beginning To Look A Lot Like Clinton: Artist Creates Second Set Of Holiday Cards

Ask artist Maddie Yosch what Clinton landmark is her favorite, and she'll tell you the Delozier Building. The former Henry County Bank, at 201 W. Franklin, was built in 1887 and also served as the post office. In 1994, it was donated by the Delozier family to become part of the Henry County Museum and Performing Arts Complex.

The Delozier Building is

one of the local landmarks featured in the second set of the greeting cards Maddie has created as a fundraiser for the Henry County Museum. "I did the first set two

years ago," she said. "This year's set has different buildings, except for the Dorman House, which is a different perspective."

Also a favorite of Maddie's is the ante-bellum Dorman House, the oldest two-story brick residence in Clinton. The other buildings illustrated on this year's cards are the former bank building at Main and

Franklin, now the home of Glasscock Jewelry Corner, and the Henry County Courthouse, depicted with its original third-floor tow-

"The courthouse was the most challenging for me," Maddie said, "because I had never seen it with the tower, and I was working from black and white pho-

tographs."

The courthouse, completed in 1893, originally had a third floor, which consisted of one room topped with a 40-foot tower. Built of stucco and copper, the tower began leaking only a few months after it was completed, and in 1969, the whole third floor of the courthouse had to be re-

moved.

The daughter of Debbie and Nathan Bettencourt, Maddie moved to Clinton when she started first grade, about 25 years after the third floor of the courthouse was removed. She graduated from Clinton High School in 2007 and attended Central Mis-Cards Page 3

lion members world-wide. That number is down a few in the United States, where more than 6,100 United Methodist congregations -100 in Missouri alone -voted to disassociate from the United Methodist Church (UMC). Among them was Clinton UMC, leaving members who wished to remain associated with the United Methodist Church without a church home.

On the Tuesday before Thanksgiving, a group of 30 people met with UMC District Superintendent David Gilmore at the Benson Center to discuss options for forming a UMC Church in Clinton.

The split in the United Methodist Church started appearing along ideological lines more than decade ago between churches in urban areas on the East and West coasts, and that of conservative congregations, mostly in the Bible

The breaking point was the pending removal of negative language from UMC regulations regarding the rights of all United Methodists to marriage and ordination in the church, regardless of who they choose to marry. Methodist bishops tried to avoid the split by delaying the decision as long as possible, a decision further postponed by the COVID pandemic, which cancelled the 2020 General Conference.

But by last spring, the handwriting was on the wall, and conservative congregations started bailing in expectation of the new ruling passing at the 2024 General Conference, scheduled for the end of April in Charlotte, N.C.

Disaffiliation requires a two-thirds vote of the congregation, plus is contingent on the church paying its apportionment for the next year. The apportionment is an amount levied by the administrative area the UMC church is in, and covers the pension fund of the ministers in that conference, among other costs. Each conference is divided into districts.

Clinton is in the northwest district of the statewide Missouri Annual Conference, which is based in Columbia. Last Tuesday, District Superintendent Gilmore opened the meeting with a prayer and a brief devotional.

Also present at Tuesday's meeting were Rev. Jeremy Vickers and Rev. Rocky Kloth of Grace UMC. Since

1991, Grace UMC has established satellite campuses in Independence, Oak Grove and El Dorado Springs, and is in the process of starting a fourth, Vickers said. Becoming a satellite campus of Grace UMC is one option for the

local UMC members. The UMC church in El Dorado, which requested help after the membership dropped, was launched in 2014, and now has 120

members, he said. Grace UMC recently had a training session for 50 church planters, he said. A church planter starts a church by recruiting a leadership team, which recruits new members, plans preview worship services and holds a big "launch" service for the new church community.

Forming a new faith group is an opportunity to define and focus on the needs that should be addressed in the community and find new ways to meet

Depending on what direction the Clinton group wants to go, the district will supply a church planter or a grant to fund a full-time minister, with the goal of growing a new church community. A UMC minister is working to start a church in Joplin, in what is called a "parachute

drop."

"We want to help you go where you want to go," asked Mark Sheets, director of the "New Places for New People" program in the Missouri Conference.

Another option is to form an emerging faith community, which is more locally directed, like the people in Bernie, Mo., did, he said. First Presbyterian Church in Clinton has offered the UMC to affiliate with their church. Another suggestion is to partner with the St. Paul's Episcopal Church, part of the world-wide Anglican communion, taking the Methodist church full circle.

At the Nov. 14 meeting, the discussion centered on how to reach groups in Clinton that are "missing" from church, and where the church might be located to have the greatest possible impact. One answer was to reach out to the 30 to 50 age group, many of whom don't have a church home.

"What is your church trying to become? What do you want it to be known for?" Sheets asked.

A meeting with Gilmore is planned for Dec. 19 at 6 p.m. to let the district know how the group will proceed. Jim Johns is coordinating the continuing discussion as the designated point person in Clinton. Johns is an attorney with Johns, Mitchell, Duncan and Lowe on the Clinton Square.

The denomination John Wesley started has survived other divisions. Clinton once had both a Methodist Episcopal Church North and Methodist Episcopal Church South, reflecting divided loyalties in Missouri before, during

and after the Civil War. In 1968, the Methodist Church joined with the Evangelical United Brethren to become the United Methodist Church. The red flame logo on church buildings throughout the world designates a meeting place of a UMC congregation.

As a result of the recent schism, an umbrella organization called the Global Methodist Church has emerged to connect churches seeking to uphold what it calls "historic Methodist praxis." Negative wording regarding relationships same-sex was added in the 1950s to the UMC Book of Discipline, as the church regulations are called, so calling the restrictions "historic" is part of the spin that is being used by the disaffiliating faction about the split.

building next to their house and moved all his mounts out of the living room of his house into the building, called the Trophy Room. Laverne Rucker has made two big-game hunting trips to South Africa and five to Alaska. Trophies on more than half of the walls were shot with a recurve bow. Laverne said, including the lion and the Kodiak bear.

When asked how close he was to the lion when he shot it with a bow and arrow, he replied "Closer than I wanted to be."

Laverne said he was seven paces away from the lion, who wasn't aware he was there. He was even closer to the Kodiak, which was looking up at him in a tree stand. Kodiak, which are larger than grizzly bears, stand eight to ten feet tall and have large, curved claws that allow them to climb trees.

"I could have reached down and hit it with the bow," he said.

Laverne switched to hunting with a crossbow in the last couple of years, due to arthritis, he said.

In 2014, Mark and Shirley Rucker made a biggame hunting trip to New Zealand, where they both got a red deer. Jim Smika wrote about their trip in his "What's Your Story?" column in the Clinton Daily Democrat. The red deer mounts are in a trophy room the Ruckers added to their house, which was previously owned by the Ackley's, who gave their name to the lake on the front of the property.

When they first added elk to the ranch, the Ruckers didn't raise them for hunting, Mark said.

"In those days, you could sell the critters' horns," he said. "You could get \$1,000 per elk horn in the Asian market."

The job of harvesting elk horns entailed cutting off the horns in the sum-

mertime, when the horns were just appearing, and had velvet on them. Mark and Shirley recall having to funnel the elk through a squeeze chute, then put a blanket over the head of the elk before lopping off the horns. The market for elk horns eventually dropped off, he said.

Mark said he doesn't have any elk ready to be hunted this year. The Ruckers developed their whitetail deer herd with the help of Shirley's twin daughters.

"We once had eight or nine fawns that we were bottle-feeding," Shirley

Hunters buy their deer tags from Mark, who keeps records for the Missouri Department of Conservation. He had to take a course and become certified in testing for Chronic Wasting Disease, he said.

He also has to maintain five and half miles of fencing. Automatic deer feeders spread grain, and there are ponds on the ranch, although he had to add a water tank this year.

The Rucker family continues the family tradition of hunting. Mark and Shirley's young great-nephews, Crew and Coy, got their deer, as did grandson Matthew. LaVerne's grown granddaughter also got a

On holidays, the extended family gathers in the Trophy Room for dinner, surrounded on four sides by trophies from several continents.

Even though Mark grew up on a ranch where they raised cattle and chickens, the family ate venison and fish, he said. He and Shirley have a freezer of venison, he said. They have wild turkeys on the ranch, but don't shoot them for Thanksgiving dinner.

"We could but we don't, "Mark said. "Shirley buys one in town."

souri University, where she earned a degree in interior design.

She lived for a short time in St. Louis after college, she said, then moved to Osage Beach, where she used her interior design skills to sell flooring at Menard's. That's where she met Jim Yosch, who was the cabinets and appliances department manager. They married eight years ago and moved to Omaha, Neb., when Jim was promoted to a general manager.

In Omaha, Maddie works at Nebraska Furniture Mart, where she started in visual merchandising. She is now an event planner, making arrangements for corporate and off-site events. The couple's son, Seeley, turned 6 in September. Maddie's mother, Debbie, is from Omaha, Maddie said, so she has family there as well as in Clinton, whom she was visiting last weekend for Thanksgiving.

Maddie also does furniture refinishing and upholstery, and DIYs projects at home. Her taste leans towards Arts and Crafts in residential architecture. she said, and Art Deco and Art Nouveau in commercial buildings.

To recreate the classic Clinton landmarks for the cards, Maddie used rendering markers on tracing paper, which gives the effect of water-color. Then she goes over the markers with a black ink pen, adding outlines and shadowing, and paints in the snow, giving the cards a holiday look. The cards have no message inside, so can be used for holidays or for other occasions, and especially fitting for sending well-wishes to former Clinton residents or classmates. Each card has information about the building's history on the back.

The original depictions of the buildings are 8" by 10." Maddie photographs the artwork, crops the pictures, and emails them to Suzanne Bush, the Henry County Museum director, who sends them to Adkins Printing, where the cards are produced.

"I enjoy doing them," Maddie said. "I hope I can keep doing this as long as it's needed. It's for a great cause."

In addition to donating her talents to create art for the cards, Maddie is donating the originals to the museum, which will be sold at a silent auction next

Last September, Maddie got a tour of the Dorman House, which is undergoing a three-stage renovation, plus a private tour of the museum. The exterior of the Delozier Building has also had a facelift by a stone mason.

Dorman Saving the House, which had serious structural issues, has put a major dent in the HC Historical Society's reserves in the past year. The HCHS also owns and maintains the 1887 Anheuser-Busch Building next to the Delozier Building, the adjacent Adair Annex, with its art exhibits and 1900-era walkthrough village, the Exchange Building, and across the street, a dog-trot log cabin, a one-room schoolhouse and other buildings on the Homestead, which replicates a mid-1800s Missouri farmstead and is used for children's programs, hosts school groups studying Missouri History, and for Old Settlers Day.

The museum is not underwritten by the county, but is funded by membership fees in the Henry County Historical Society, which operates the museum, and by museum entrance fees, donations, corporate sponsorships, building rentals and fundraisers. The next fundraising event for the Dorman House is a threecourse Valentine's Day

Dinner on Feb. 14 in the Delozier Building. Tickets are \$25 a person, \$45 a couple, with a cash bar.

Continued from page 1 Nichols, a resident on North Gaines Drive, expressed concern about the placement of a road which is part of the park plan in that area. "I love the idea of walking trails," said Nichols. "But I would rather see the parking lot, where it is, change and the trail head start at the bridge." Nichols said she was concerned about the heavy use of the park – especially youth - and increased vehicle traffic.

The next personal appearance was that of Don Palmgren. Palmgren expressed concern about the new Billiards and Ale business which is scheduled to open near his residence (Price Lane). "I will have a beer-joint five blocks away," he said. "Is there any reme-

Palmgren said he cares a lot about kids (the location of the new business will be near a park) and the value of his property. City Administrator Christy Maggi responded to his concerns by affirming the city would ensure it was properly zoned and verify liquor licenses,

Councilwoman Shelley Nelson gave the Public Works report. The first item on her report was to address the Artesian Park pool house is-

A deadline will be established to make sure the construction company completes the unfinished items and/or repairs some of the issues addressed at the recent walk-thru.

The city will begin looking at a sponsor policy in regards to the naming rights for ball fields. She also reported an amendment on the first two phases of the grant agreement for the parking lot and road for the Antioch Park project.

Other quotes for the non-proprietary system at Waste Water are being sought. Also, it was discovered the Montgomery Pump Station generation was undersized. Work continues on the rotors as well: "They are updating and getting things done economically," said Councilwoman Nelson of

the work at the plant. Also updated was the incubator system (an additional incubator bottle and incubator were needed to be purchased) to be in compliance with the Missouri Department of Natural Resources. Parts have been ordered to address an air exchange switch and heater for the sludge-press building. Westbridge Inn's build-

ing, which covered a manhole, will be required to be removed. This was determined after testing indicated there is more than one service location from the manhole. Also, a collapsed sewer line at 702 S. Washington was repaired after it was discovered during a dig-rite request. The city attorney will be reviewing the Waste Water Treatment Plant improvement project contract addendums after it was discovered they were more complicated than anticipated.

Bid packets for the improvement contracts should be ready by December, however.

The first reading of Bill No. 2023-37 (regarding the final plat for The Refuge at Sycamore Acres) was held and approved by the council.

Also, Whitehead Consultants has scheduled a survey of the right-of-way at the 400 Block of West Allen as requested by Community Development Director Chuck Bailey.

The Public Safety report was given by Councilman Gene Henry. The 911 Board elected to place the new repeater at the 911 Emergency Call Center (this is in response to the police department's recent equipment upgrades). Resolution 21-2023 was approved by the council.

The resolution updated the language in the original resolution regarding tow services in Clinton (removing "loopholes"). Councilman Henry updated the council on the recent grant application the Clinton Fire Department submitted for the purpose of constructing a Fire Training Center. This is a matching grant opportunity and, if successful, could lead to the city not having to put any "hard dollars" toward the construction. The training center would hopefully be used to train other department personnel and bring in some revenue of its own.

Councilwoman Martha Nichols gave the Finance Committee report: Resolution 20-2023 was approved by the council regarding the lease agreement between the City of Clinton and the Clinton Airport Association. The resolution increases the funding from \$105,000 annually to \$150,000. There has been no increase in the past decade for the associa-

Mayor Carla Moberly said she was excited to see the Fire Department Training Center come to (hopefully) fruition. She also had positive comments about the groundbreaking ceremony at the Clinton Airport last week. "It is a landmark [improvement] for Clinton and the region," she said. She further commented on the help to the economy the airport provides – especially in regards to economic development. Potential businesses do not drive into towns much anymore – they fly.

Also approved by the council was Resolution 18-2023 regarding the approval of the agreement with Do-Rite Construction for roadway and drainage improvements on Commerce Drive.

New Business: The council approved Resolution 19-2023 certifying the November 7 election results (the extensions of the Parks and Transportation ¼ cent sales taxes.

The Clinton City Council entered closed session at 6:29 pm and did not return to open session.

Family and friends often want to help, they just don't know what to offer. Allow someone to stay with your loved one so you can take a break, even if just for an hour to get an

The Shephend Calls

IMMANUEL Immanuel is a beautiful name. I wonder why more peo-

ple fail to name their sons Immanuel. Perhaps it assumes too much. Yet, in my lifetime I've had some friends whose parents were brave enough to name a son Immanuel.

Emmanuel McCall was serving on our Home Mission Board. As an African American, his assignment was to bridge the racial gap in our churches. I invited him to lead a weekend revival in our church. As we did with all revivals, I sent his picture and a brief article to the local newspaper inviting folk to participate with us. I received hostile phone calls and grew concerned for his well-being while in my "care." Years later, I told him of my fears. He smiled and said, "You wasted your anxiety. People would not have harmed me; they would have gone after you."

Prior to his election as a congressional representative from Kansas City, Emmanuel Cleaver and I were pastoral colleagues. To gain approval of a building our church planned, I made multiple trips to the state capital to meet with committees. One legislator told me he questioned a statement I made and consulted Representative Cleaver about it. The legislator later told me, "Mr. Cleaver said, 'If Wade Paris told you that, you can be sure it is true.'" I was honored.

The Immanuel I hope to know best is Jesus. Remember the angel of the Lord told Joseph Mary would give birth to a child. The angel even named the gender, a son, and gave the child a name---Immanuel, God with us. (Matthew 1:20ff) That is what I need, God be with me. That is what I want, God with me. I pray for it every day.

Brother Lawrence, a seventeenth century French monk, speaking of "God with us" called it practicing the presence of God. He said he had learned to be aware of God's presence in all that he did---"When I am in the kitchen washing pots and pans, and people are shouting, 'Lawrence, do this; Lawrence, do that,' I feel just as much in the presence of God as I do when I am on my knees at the Blessed Sacrament."

I cannot claim Brother Lawrence's success; but I am trying to be conscious of God's presence in everything---great and small.



After discussion Commissioner Lawler made a motion to continue mowing the roads for Tightwad. Commissioner Fosnow stated that Brownington should be included to be fair. A call was made to Bill Collins a Trustee for the Village of Tightwad. He was asked if the Village was willing to pay for the county to have their roads mowed. Bill stated "no" and that the County could no longer park on the roads of the Village. After the call Commissioner Lawler stated that he disagreed for not continuing to mow the roads in the Village of Tightwad for free.

Dennis shared that Great River has been contacted to engineer SW 351 Rd in

Bear Creek Township. Sheriff Kent Oberkrom visited with the commission. Discussed was recent legislation regarding the Sheriff's salary. Also discussed were state ARPA grants available for Law Enforcement. Kent also shared that he has applied for a LLEBG Grant for helmets. There was brief discussion about transferring the armored vehicle. Also briefly discussed was outfitting one of the patrol cars with the Thunder

Struck deer guard. Commissioner Lawler discussed mowing in the county, Tightwad, and Brownington. He stated that mowing in Tightwad has occurred since the 80's and stated that the county should continue. The group had a long discussion on this topic.

County Clerk Rick Watson distributed 2024 budget worksheets to Commissioners. Commissioners discussed the 2024 CART rock program for Townships and Special Road Districts.

Brad Wright, Emergency Management Director, met with the commission. He shard of a grant awarded to the County in the amount of \$10,000 for Election Security. There was much discussion regarding security at the polls for the upcoming Presidential Election. After discussion it was agreed to accept the grant and proceed with the project.

Commissioners journed at 12:00 p.m. **NOVEMBER 7, 2023**

The Henry County Commission met pursuant to adjournment at the courthouse in Clinton, Missouri.

Stanley Nold, Walker Township Board Member, called into the Commission to discuss a conversation he had with Ranger Power over their Planning and Zoning ordinance. A copy of the ordinance was provided.

Clerk Rick shared that there are only 2 active businesses, in the county, that have not renewed their County Liquor License, Primitive Old Crow & Winery, off of AA Hwy, and Tan Ur Bunz, on 2nd Street, in Clinton. He also shared that 2nd notices were sent out. He stated that he would send the information to Prosecutor Gray's Office if the licenses were not renewed by Tuesday.

Clerk Rick provided a copy of a resignation letter from Karl Monard from the Deepwater Township Board. He also shared that he would confirm the individual the remaining board members recommend for his replacement

Christy Maggi, City Administrator for the City of Clinton, met with the Commission. She provided a cooperative agreement, between the city and county to financially assist with road construction at the Gerhart Industrial Park. The county had previously committed \$100,000.00 to the project. Included in the documentation was the bid tabulation for the project. After brief discussion, Commissioner Fosnow made a motion to sign the agreement. Commissioner Lawler seconded the motion. The motion passed with a roll call vote of Fosnow - yes, Lawler - yes, and Stone – yes.

he was prepared to sign a contract for the mowing service.

The group discussed private road mowing service. Commissioner Lawler stated that the county should provide the service, for a fee, if the private road leads to an agricultural purpose. There was much discussion and debate.

It was agreed that the county will mow the shared border roads of the villages and cities, if it is not in a Special Road District. Mowing service inside the village and city limits would be provided for a fee.

There was lengthy discussion on Road and Bridge procedures and communication between the Commission and Road and Bridge personnel.

The debate of mowing private lanes and driveways continued. Commissioner Fosnow stated that the county should not mow private property.

Commissioner Lawler left at 11:00 for a personal matter.

Commissioners adjourned at 12:00 p.m.


MDC Reports Hunters Harvested 11,705 Deer During New CWD Portion

The new portion of firearms deer season will increase harvest in the CWD Management Zone to help slow the spread of the deadly deer disease.

Preliminary data from the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) shows that hunters harvested 11,705 deer during the state's new chronic wasting disease (CWD) portion of the firearms deer-hunting season, Nov. 22-26, in CWD Management Zone counties. Of the 11,705 deer harvested, 4,707 were antlered bucks, 1,074 were button bucks, and 5,924 were does. Get harvest numbers for the new CWD Portion by county at extra. mdc.mo.gov/widgets/harvest table/

According to MDC, the CWD portion was timed to occur during the end of the primary rut when deer movement is typically good and hunter interest remains high. Hunters were allowed to use any unfilled firearms deer hunting permits during the CWD portion and had to abide by the statewide limit of one antlered deer during the firearms deer season, all portions combined. Hunters also had to abide by county-specific firearms antlerless permit numbers. CWD testing was not required during the CWD portion, but voluntary CWD testing is available through the entire deer season. 

From the time when Wesley abandoned the formal cloisters of the Episcopal church to take the Word of God to the people, the Methodist Church has moved forward on social issues. Wesley also moved the church westward, across the Atlantic Ocean, defying Anglican leadership by ordaining ministers to go to America, where they became circuit riders, traveling trails through the wilderness on horseback to establish churches in remote areas.

At his death in 1791, Wesley had 120,000 adherents in England and America.

The UMC extended ordination to women in 1956, overcoming biblical strictures against women speaking in church. In 1968, when some church congregations were literally circling their sanctuaries to keep people out, Methodists were welcoming people of color to Sunday services, and the separate administration for AME —African Methodist Episcopal —churches was abolished.

Removing negative language in the Book of Discipline regarding same-sex relationships removes another cultural bias to full participation in the UMC for all members, regardless of race or gender.

People interested in following the example of John Wesley and continuing to have a Wesleyan presence in Clinton through the United Methodist Church are invited to future meetings, Gilmore said.




