

Clinton Community Shows Huge Heart For Foster Families

In the weeks before Christmas, if you get stressed out wondering if you have everything ready for the holiday, think of Tammy Woirhaye.

For the past two years in a row, Tammy has received a call to pick up a newborn baby who needed a foster home — on Christmas Eve.

Which, of course, she did. "One was 4 days old and one was 11 days old," she said. "I had to go to another county to get one of them."

Tammy has fostered more than 100 children in the last 13 years, she said, and adopted five. She is part of a community of people in Clinton who form a safety net for children whose family are unable to care for them.

She and the foster family community are looking for more people and organizations to strengthen that net.

"There is alway a need for foster families," said Jeremy Hicks, a social worker at the Children's Division of Missouri Social Services.

The Children's Division office in Clinton oversees 148 children in foster care in four counties, he said, Henry, Benton, Bates and St. Clair. There are seven case workers in Jeremey's office to cover the kids in foster care or placed with

The Clinton City Council met in open session December 6. Mayor Carla Moberly was absent; Councilman Wilson was Mayor pro tem. Roll call was held, the Pledge of Allegiance recited, and the previous meeting's minutes were approved. There were no personal appearances.

The tourism commission report was delivered to the council. Councilman Henrv asked a minor question about how some organizations bring tourism dollars to town, and David Lee (present in the audience) explained, for instance, that the Big Brothers and Sisters half marathon and 5K brings people in from all over the country – and they stay the night, eat lunch at local restaurants and shop, etc. In short: money spent towards these organizations are not a waste of tourism dollars. Three weeks ago, a middle-aged couple came to the door of Allen Street Baptist Church. They were living in their car, they said, and asked if there was some help the church could offer them.

"We were able to help them with some food, and offered them the opportunity to shower," said Pastor Justin Wright.

Mark and Gay Smith are starting a community choir in Clinton in February, but if you ask Mark what kind of music the choir will sing, he'll reply that he can't tell you.

He can say what the choir won't be.

"It won't be a church choir, and it won't be a pop choir," he said.

Mark and Gay are the music directors at First Presbyterian Church, 220 E. Franklin, where the community choir will meet in the fellowship hall on Thursdays at 6:30 p.m., starting Feb. 1.

The reason he doesn't know what music the choir will sing is that he doesn't know how many people will sign up, he said.

"Once we have a general idea of the numbers, then we can pick out the music," Mark said. "It will be a mix of genres."

Diane Hannah, who is organizing the effort, has had a good response to the call

for participants she posted online, Mark said. Asked how many people they need to form a choir, Mark replied "We only need what we get."

"At least four to six people per section would be nice," Mark said, "and more would be nicer."

Mark, a 1964 graduate of

CHS, played clarinet and saxophone in the CHS high band under band director Ross Kelsey, he said. Gay hails from the Park Grove community, south of Clinton between Deepwater and Lowry City.

Both musicians attended Central Missouri State, now the University of Central Missouri, where they met. Both taught music at schools in the area, including Clinton, Leeton and Harrisonville. They have never organized a community choir, they said, but have been the music directors at FPC for more than 40 years. They also play in



Continued from page 1 land Day Care, which is just off North Second, at 115 E. Elm. Like Vickie. Steve has a heart for the foster/ adopt community, as does Vickie's daughter, Melinda Moreland Lebofski, according to Moreland's new director, Samantha Mothersbaugh.

"Steve asked what the Foster Closet needed for a year, and then donated \$3,000 to meet those needs," Samantha said.

Samantha was recommended for the job by Tammy Woirhaye and Dara Bigler of State Fair Community College. Originally from Springfield, Samantha has lived in Clinton for five years, and has a degree from Missouri State University in Early Childhood Education.

Located in the basement of State Fair Community College, the Foster Closet has a large selection of clothes for all ages, an infant room with baby supplies and a birthday shelf of gifts, available at no charge to foster families. The building is owned by Golden Valley Memorial Healthcare, which donates the space for the Foster Closet as well as the Teacher's Warehouse.

Tammy Woirhave said the Foster Closet started out in her basement.

"I'd have foster families show up at my house and say "We're here for the Woirhaye Walmart," she said.

Foster children arrive at their foster homes with literally nothing but the clothes on their backs, Samantha said. Sometimes babies are just in diapers. Jeremy said his office now provides bags with pajamas, a change of clothes, a toothpaste, toothbrush, and a blanket.

Another big need in the community that Moreland is addressing is for beforeand after-school programs for children of working parents.

"We get lots of calls for before and after care," Samantha said. "We're exploring options to expand the number of slots offered to the community"

a boost earlier this year when Gov. Mike Parson approved \$82 million to increase the number of badly-needed pre-kindergarten childcare slots in Missouri. Grants were awarded to both community-based child-care providers and public schools. In October, Moreland Day Care used its grant to add a third preschool class for 4 and 5-year-olds, Samantha said. Hired to teach the class of 17 preschoolers were Sarah Tavlor and Jessica Bailey, who have masters' degrees in Early

Childhood Education. "We were filled the first week," Samantha said of the class, which Moreland provides at no charge.

The Pediatric Place and First Steps provide inhouse services to Moreland Day Care, she said, including physical, occupational (meaning daily tasks) and speech therapy. That makes fewer appointments for foster parents to have to take their children to. Samantha said.

Moreland has also implemented a new curriculum that is experience-based. Samantha said, with seasonal themes, the current one focused on winter making snow-flakes and learning about ice and snow. The Moreland staff has also done a lot of training dealing with trauma and behavioral issues, Samantha said.

"We want to make sure we are taking care of children and families in the community to the best of our abilities," she said. "It takes a village, and we have a good village going." Clinton used to have a coalition called "Mission Clinton" that is now dissolved. Clinton foster families do receive supplies from Sammy's Window, a foster/ adopt state-wide connection, through its southwest office in Springfield, which delivers socks and underwear, baby wipes and food items every month to the Foster Closet. Samantha picks up supplies and delivers them to foster families whose children attend Moreland Day Care, saving

them a trip. "We started with a few

"and now have 30." Jeremy said he would like to see a CarePortal started in Clinton, which is a network of volunteers who respond to immediate needs of families and children in the community.

"It takes seven churches and four community organizations to start one," he said.

The Henry County Health Department provides safe cribs, car seats, CPR training, immunizations, and WIC (Women's, infants and Children's supplemental nutrition). The HCHD also has free or reduced-cost lab tests, said Tyler Pulcini, community outreach director.

Women at Trinity Lutheran Church, led by Hope Seider, make and donate age-appropriate Care Bags, each with a story book, hygiene items and a stuffed toy, to the Foster Closet.

Samantha and spouse Brooklyn Mothersbaugh also have a heart for children - they have six, 3 girls and 3 boys, ages 10 months to 13 years old. At dinnertime, the family sits around the dining table and plays "High-Low," with each person describing the high and low of that day.

Helping children and teenagers deal with the ups and downs of life is especially important for foster parents, whose children may have experienced trauma and loss. It's one of the most challenging parts of being a foster parent, Samantha said.

The goal — to give every child a safe, happy childhood, she said. Foster parents also try to preserve childhood memories of foster children who move on to another family for adoption.

Tammy said she saved the hospital bracelet and the first Christmas outfit one of her foster babies wore, and mailed it to the child's adoptive family.

Justin did not grow up in the church, he said, did not find religion until he was in his 20s, has never attended seminary and doesn't preach like a minister who did.

you've ever been "If turned off by church, that's not what you get here," he said.

Allen Street is a 'come as you are' church, he said, a jeans and t-shirt church. "In the summer, it's a flip-

flop church. It's the bestkept secret in Clinton." A flip-flop church is one

where you can wear casual footwear to church, not one that waffles theologically. The Sunday services at Allen Street Baptist, at 8:45 a.m. and 10:30 a.m., are contemporary casual, with upbeat music, guitars and drums.

On Dec. 24, there will be one combined service at 10 a.m., then Christmas Eve services at 5:30 p.m. and 11:30 p.m.

Until 10 years ago, Justin's life was more about creating custom machine fittings than deconstructing theological questions. He grew up in Sedalia, graduating from Sedalia High School in 1993, then attended State Fair Community College. He moved to Smithton, where he built a house and he and spouse Kari Wright raised a family of six children while Justin worked at a Sedalia tool and die shop.

Five of their six children, now ages 15 through 26, were still living at home in 2013, when Justin heard the call to the ministry.

"It was a life change," he

said.

break from preaching. But when Justin was leaving the Windsor church, **Roger House at Allen Street** Baptist was announcing his retirement.

The Wrights visited several Baptist churches in Clinton, Justin said, but felt drawn to Allen Street. At first, Justin didn't tell people in the congregation he was a minister, but word got out, and he was invited to fill the pulpit several times. After being interviewed by the search committee, he gave his testimony and described his call to ministry to the congregation, who voted unanimously to invite him to lead the ministry of the church and its staff.

That he has experience building houses and working with machinery was a plus.

"When you are hiring a minister, they say you should always look at his hands," Justin said, alluding to the advantage of having a minister who can handle maintenance and repair issues.

Justin hopes more people will discover Allen Street Baptist. There is always something going on in the building, he said.

A good time to check out Allen Street Baptist is this Sunday, Dec. 17, when they are holding a dinner followed by a musical evening, with dinner starting at 6:30 p.m. To let them know how many people to make dinner for, go to the Allen Street Baptist Church website, allenstreetclinton. com, and make a reservation.

"It's a musical Christmas card," Justine said of the program.

Justin still keeps a hand in construction. He is doing a lot of work on the house the Wrights are building in Clinton, he said, while they are living in a travel trailer on site. Their daughter, Hannah, who attends Clinton Christian Academy, has been a trooper, he said, but they are all eager to get into their house, which is reaching the final stages of completion.

"The electric work is done," he said. "The sheet rock is coming in two

"In the future, counseling will be a big part of what we do here," he said.

It's a church where there's something happening every day of the week, he said, not just on Sundays and Wednesday nights, when there are AWANA and Strike Zone programs for youth. When he comes in on Mondays, Justin said, it's like a train station, with the women's group meeting in one room and the worship team in another.

Allen Street is getting ready to host a women's conference, called LYP, Live Your Purpose, Jan. 12 through Jan.14.

The Allen Street congregation is a true church family, he said, one whose doors are open to those in need. The church is planning its next steps in outreach ministry, he said, so they will be ready to meet the needs of the next unexpected visitors. Meeting people's immediate needs is the priority, he said.

"We're sort of just traveling that way," he said.

The church is uniquely situated for that ministry.

"There are two homeless camps on the same street, one two blocks from the church and one a block up," Justin said. "There's the park, as well."

The congregation has already decided to get a washer and dryer to make available to people who may have limited changes of clothes. Someone who heard of that need has donated new appliances, Justin said.

"We want to be part of the solution," he said.

That's just one example of the many wonderful things that are happening at the church, Justin said, which was founded in the 1950s.

The couple who showed up at their door, at 210 W. Allen St., was an answer to the congregation's prayers.

"You either run away from it, or towards it," Justin said of the church's ministry to its neighbors. 'We ran towards it."

Not everything that happens at the church on Allen Street will be perfect, he said. But in the end, he said, it will be amazing.

Forming a community choir was the idea of several people at First Presbyterian, they said, including minister Nancy Gillard, Diane Hannah and Raymond Hartner.

"Nancy Gillard believes in outreach, and Raymond is always looking for ways for our people and our facility to be involved in the community," Mark said.

Anyone who can carry a tune can join the choir. You do not need to be able to read music. The idea is to connect with other people doing something you enjoy, to add a little spark to the winter months.

"We're going to have a good time getting together with people who enjoy singing," Gay said. "We have a lot of fun and laugh a lot at church choir rehearsal. People enjoy being in the choir."

The First Presbyterian Church choir consists of 12 to 16 singers, Mark said. He directs the choir, and Gay is the accompanist on the piano or organ.

Mark is trying to research what music is available in town, he said, but with the Advent season, most people are busy. He did say it will probably include something bluesy, or a spiritual.

"The sooner I know how many people are singing, the sooner I can start getting organized picking out music," Mark said.

The community choir will rehearse for 90 minutes on Thursday nights, starting on Feb. 1, from 6:30 p.m. to 8 p.m. Rehearsals will go through mid-April, when a performance for the public is scheduled in the Per-

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

My earliest recollections of Christmas are of Christmas trees and presents and Santa Claus. No doubt, my parents told me Christmas was Jesus' birthday; but that didn't register much until I was older. What captured my attention was that Christmas was something good, festive, joyous, a time to celebrate. Those good memories continued long after I learned the true meaning of Christmas.

For me now as an adult, Handel's Messiah is the all-time best celebration of Christmas. The Hallelujah chorus is the most worshipful music I know. However, I seriously doubt I would have appreciated it as a young child. Can you imagine forcing preschool children to sit through a presentation of The Messiah and then telling them this is how we celebrate Jesus' birthday.

Admittedly, much of our country's Christmas celebration is not very Christian. But imagine this parable with me. Once there was a Christian whose family did not believe. When he tried to tell them about Jesus, they refused to listen or worse they laughed at him. All his attempts to involve them in worshipping Jesus were rejected. However, these unbelieving family members really got involved in Christmas trees, Christmas decorations, gift-giving, Jingle Bells, and the entire secular celebration. So, the Christian simply smiled within and thought, "They may not realize it, but they are celebrating the birthday of my Savior. Thank you, God!"

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





Preliminary data from the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) shows that deer hunters in Missouri harvested 193,669 deer during the November portion of firearms deer season, Nov. 11-21. Of the 193,669 deer harvested, 105,614 were antlered bucks, 16,081 were button bucks, and 71,974 were does.

New CWD Portion in Management Zone Counties: Deer hunting continues in Missouri with the new CWD firearms portion running Nov. 22-26 in CWD Management Zone counties. Hunters will be able to use any unfilled firearms deer hunting permits during the CWD portion and must abide by the statewide limit of one antlered deer during the firearms deer season, all portions combined. Hunters must also abide by county-specific firearms antlerless permit numbers. CWD testing is not required during the CWD portion, but voluntary CWD testing is available.

Archery deer hunting resumes Nov. 22 through Jan. 15, 2024. The late youth portion runs Nov. 24-26. The late antlerless portion of firearms deer season runs Dec. 2-10 in open counties and the alternative methods portion will occur Dec. 23 through Jan. 2, 2024.

Overall season outlook: I'm really happy with where we are now. We are still growing and still very young. We're gonna have some bumps this year but we are on the right track with a rapidly growing program.

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

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
