

New Clinton Firefighter Makes Major History For Department

Last week, when most people were out shopping for gifts, Bayley Heider was involved in a different kind of search.

And instead of getting the house decorated for the holidays, she was breaking into one. But saving people's holidays, not destroying them, was the reason behind her activities.

These physical challenges were part of the state skills test for students at the Metropolitan Community College Blue River Fire Academy, where Bayley is one of five female students. Two are in the day class, which she's in, she said, and three women are in the night program.

Bayley graduated from the Fire Academy last Saturday, Dec. 16, but was hired in October by the Clinton Fire Department, where she is the first female career firefighter with the department.

"They had a woman who was a volunteer firefighter," she said, "but not a career firefighter."

It was her captain at the Blue River Fire Academy, which is Independence, who told her that Clinton F.D. had a job opening. And

the Clinton firefighters are happy to have her.

"Right off the bat, I felt very welcome, from the department and the community," she said.

Bayley is from Archie, south of Kansas City, where she played basketball, volleyball and softball. Basketball was her top sport, she said. At 5-foot, 11 inches tall, Bayley was the center on the girl's basketball

team.

"I was a Whirlwind," she said of the Archie School team name.

Her father is 6-feet, 4, she said, and her younger brother, who is 17, is 6-2. Bayley said she didn't always want to be a firefighter, but originally trained as an EMT, an Emergency Medical Technician. She often went on ride-alongs with firefighters, however, and knew an EMT who was

"You feel forgotten," he said.

Last Saturday, Darren and a group of volunteers spent the afternoon at First Baptist Church, where they filled 100 bags, each almost as big as Santa's loot sack. Going into the sacks were cupcakes and snack cakes, cookies and candy, plus packets of cocoa mix, instant coffee, chips and instant noodles.

On Monday, Dec. 18, Darren and Celebrate Recovery volunteers delivered the sacks to the Henry County Jail, where they were distributed to inmates, both men and women. It's the third year Darren and the CR volunteers have created sacks of gifts for inmates, this year raising \$3,000 in donations of cash and items.

"We want them to know that no matter what they've gone through, there are still people out there who care about them," Darren said.

There are currently about 75 people in the jail total,

Darren said. They'll take 85 sacks to the jail, he said, and take the extra sacks to people who are homeless in Clinton at Christmas and living in their cars in parking lots, he said.

Celebrate Recovery is a faith-based program for people seeking to break the cycle of drug and alcohol addiction. The volunteers visit Henry County Jail inmates on Monday nights once a week to share the program. Each gift sack includes a "Doing His Time" book of meditations and prayers for people who are in prison, and a small New Testament.

The third most important thing in the sack is the "lifeline" letter he wrote, Darren said, encouraging people to break the cycle of their lives by contacting him or one of three other names listed, which includes their phone numbers.

"In the last three years,

we've had more than 75 people who used the letters and called us," Darren said. "There's nothing they're going through that we haven't gone through. The contacts are people who have been right where they are, right now."

It was five years ago, on Dec. 23, 2018, that Darren was in jail, he said. He was sentenced to 30 years in jail, but only served 19 months, with a five-year Gift Sacks Page 9

Continued from page 1 she had to pass two agility tests, one at the Fire Academy and one in Clinton. The tests involved hoisting a ladder, and climbing five flights of stairs carrying a fire hose while wearing a weighted vest, which simulates wearing firefighters' gear.

She also had to find her way through a maze. The test replicates conditions on a fire site. In Clinton, the agility test was held at the Benson Center.

"I enjoyed the challenge," Bailey said.

She can do a fireman's carry, she said, depending on the size of the person, but firefighters don't sling people over their shoulder any more, but are taught to lift them under the arms to move them.

"We can carry and cradle a child in our arms," she said.

Bayley's uncle, a firefighter with Central Jackson County in Blue Springs, was a good source of advice on what to expect, she said.

"He's got a lot of good firefighter recipes, too," she said. "Firefighters like to cook, and like their sweet tea."

For the state skills test in December, Bayley used an axe to break down a door, and also demonstrated how to use a hallagan, a crow-bar like tool used to pry open doors. She extinguished a Class A fire with a fire hose, and successfully completed a search and rescue mission blindfolded, with her mask covered. "It simulates finding a person in a situation with poor visibility, like a smokefilled house," she said. "We

Glasscock, Bayley's shift captain, attended Bayley's graduation and presented her with her department badge.

At the Academy, Hayley passed certification exams 1 and 2 for Missouri Firefighters, and now is a fully-trained firefighter as well as an EMT. She has the rest of a six-month probationary period to complete, to learn how the Clinton Fire Department operates, she said. There have been a few adjustments. They had to put stalls in the bathroom, she said, and she gets the back bedroom all to herself.

She's also learning her way around Clinton, including orienting to landmarks that people who grew up here were familiar with, even if the buildings don't exist any more or are occupied by new businesses.

Besides the physical challenges, and the adrenaline rush when the fire bell goes off, what she likes about being a firefighter is helping people.

"I want to be the person who is there for them during what may be the lowest point in their life," she said.

What she's not wild about: being awakened in the middle of the night to go on a call.

She's already helped host her first school tour of elementary students. It was a little noisy, she said, but what the girls were excited to see close up were the fire trucks, which they thought were neat.

With her background, experience and training, it's been an easy transition for her and for crew members she works with.

"Everyone's been very helpful," she said. "They're right there any time I have a question, ready to help me by giving me the answer."

he was released after all charges were dropped. He spent Thursday night on a lawn, then found a dumpster to get out of the wind.

"I was terrified to go back to any of the places I used to," he said. "I slept in a dumpster, but I was free

Prices for many items Darren buys for the gift sacks have tripled, he said, including travel-size toothpaste and shampoo. So this year, he's been buying fullsize toiletries, which are more economical for what you get, he said.

The most popular items in the sack? It's not the cupcakes, Twinkies or instant coffee, but cotton swabs –something you don't appreciate until you haven't had access to one for six months, Darren said.

Inmates do receive some toiletries, he said, but the state-provided toothpaste has no flavor, and the pink antiseptic soap smells pink and antiseptic. Meals in jail are served with juice, he said, but inmates only get water between meals, which makes the packets of cocoa mix and instant coffee to have something hot to drink all the more appreciated.

Before packing the sacks, the volunteers prayed for the inmates and the people who work at the jail. It's their prayer that the inmates will know that there are people in the community who haven't forgotten them. That's why Darren started the gifts for inmates program.

"I did what God told me to do," Darren said "If I can get out and change my life, they can, too.

"Actually," he added, "it was God who changed my life."

Darren now leads Celebrate Recovery programs and is studying online for a degree in theology and substance abuse counseling, making A's in all his classes. Since last April, he has been leading volunteer crews to transform a former church into the Men's Discipleship Center, where he will be the on-site manager.

Scheduled to open in January, the Men's Discipleship Center will provide living quarters and a structured living situation for 10 men when they are released from jail. It's the first halfway house for men in Henry County.

"The painting is finished and we're cleaning up, getting ready to put the carpet and linoleum down," Darren said. "Then the beds we ordered will be shipped.

"It's a good way to start the new year off."

At First Baptist Church last Saturday, Tim Holman, Justin Willcockson and Ron Pack were cutting open boxes of candy to add to the 14 long tables of treats lining the hallway.

"We start down there at the far end," explained Brenda Robinson of Clinton, "and put the number on the wall of items into clear bags."

Also helping with the effort were Vickie Kreisel of Calhoun, where she helps with a Celebrate Recovery program, and Valerie Dehn and Carieanne Cromley, both of Clinton. After they filled the bags, they were passed to Ron and Justin, who tied the tops closed.

Justin said he would have spent this Christmas in jail, he said, but last Thursday, from myself."

When asked what spending Christmas in jail is like, Justin replied that it's not that bad, because it provides time to experience God's presence with no distractions.

"I found the Lord in a jail cell," he said. "Miracles can happen in the darkest places. That's where the light shines brightest."

He considers it a Christmas miracle that he got out of jail this year, and hopes to spend Christmas at Compass Health Rehab with others who need to experience the same miracle. He's now waiting for a bed to become available, he said, and has set himself the goal of learning to live without substance abuse as a coping mechanism.

"I give all the credit to the Lord," he said. "I'm here as a way to return the favor."

In addition to visiting the jail on Monday nights, Celebrate Recovery volunteers hold a weekly program at First Baptist Church, 1531 N. Vansant Rd., Clinton, on Tuesday nights. The evening starts with a meal at 5:30 p.m, with childcare for ages 12 and under during the 6:30 p.m. service and small group meetings.

In July, CR launched an addiction recovery program for teens ages 12 to 17, similar to the adult program, Darren said.

Darren said a lot of the donations for gift sacks come from relatives of jail inmates, who are not allowed to take items into the jail, only give money. The jail has a cantina where inmates can buy auxiliary food supplies like instant noodles, Darren said, but items are expensive compared to dollar stores, so monetary gifts don't go far.
