Pool Problems Pop Up At City Council



MAYOR MOBERLY presided over a varied agenda during December 19's city council meeting. Her Honor encouraged council members to take a look at GVMH's new oncology center commenting, "It is a huge advantage to the whole region."

The Clinton City Council met in open session December 19; councilman Daniel Wilson was absent.

Following roll call and the recital of the Pledge of Allegiance, the previous meeting's minutes were approved. There were no personal appearances and no reports to be delivered and no second readings of bills to be heard.

Councilman Cameron Jackson gave the Public Works report. The Artesian Pool's main circulation pump had to be replaced: it cost the city \$7,353. And, the main controller board at the Aquatic Center will need to be replaced. Estimated costs for the replacement are about \$3,100 for the board and about \$2,500 for labor. Also, the Aquatic Center's pool temperature will be set (gradually) to swim competition guidelines.

Councilman Jackson reported that the rock for the road at the Antioch Conservation area has been put down and the contractor for the ADA pad to be poured was there as well.

The sewer mains cleaning project has a starting point: the first 10,000 ft will be completed soon. Rotors 5 and 6 at the Waste Water Treatment Plant are being repaired. Two sewer line

repairs have been completed on Allen Street, too, although it has been recommended the sewer line have CIPP lining within the next few years.

The city gained \$5,266 from the repair cap from Alliance Water Resource. Councilman Jackson reported that the Stoneridge Subdivision regionalization request is "in a holding pattern." City Administrator Christy Maggi said she is working with DNR to get more information about the grant process. Recall that the Stoneridge subdivision folks are either upgrading their sewer system or tying into the city's infrastructure.

Councilman Jackson said that a request about a land transfer to the US Army Corps of Engineers is moving about as expected: "It is not moving swiftly," he

Councilman Gene Henry gave the Public Safety report: the first item on his report was about a potential Public Safety Tax appearing on the April ballot. It has been decided to ask for the ½ cent tax (maximum allowed by state statute). Both the Fire and Police Departments will have more detailed reports in a few weeks about where the potential tax money would be spent if it were to be approved by voters, but both departments need

Case Of The Missing Trophy: Theories Abound On A Legendary Award's Fate **BY JENNIFER JACKSON**

On March 8, 1950, the Clinton High School basketball team traveled to the University of Missouri in Columbia to compete in the Missouri State Class A tournament.

The next day, the Cardinals defeated Sedalia's Smith-Cotton High School, 39 to 28, to advance to the semifinals. On March 10. they played Joplin, but lost by three points, 39 to 36.

On March 11, the Clinton Cardinals beat the St. Louis University High School Bills by two points to take home the third-place trophy, which was presented to Don Snyder, who played center on the team.

In June of 2021, Snyder, who lived in Warrensburg, and his daughters, Liz Rotert, and Glenna Fleeman, visited Clinton in connection with an annual scholarship established in Don's name. While they were in town, they went to visit the trophy Don and his teammates won in 1950. The trophy was supposed to be in the big display case at the new high school.

Only it wasn't there. Liz contacted the school,

and several people looked for the trophy for the next several months, she said. Liz also contacted Tim Komer, former Clinton Daily Democrat sports editor, to ask for his help in tracking down the missing trophy.

When the trail got cold, they decided that something had to be done.

So Liz consulted an expert on vintage sports trophies, and with the support of friends and family, decided

to make a new trophy, assembled from parts of vintage trophies.

On Feb. 2, 2024, the replica of the trophy Don and his teammates won at the 1950 state championships will be presented at 7 p.m. at the Court-Mat Warming basketball game at CHS. Activities Director Kevin LaFavor will accept the trophy on behalf of Clinton High School.

"The third-place finish was the highest Clinton

has ever placed in the state tourney," Tim Komer said. What happened to the trophy? One of the last sightings of it was at a Rotary Club meeting, when it

was borrowed to display. "It was never seen after that," Tim said.

When questioned, Rotary members said they had no knowledge of what happened to the trophy after its appearance at the meeting, Tim said. Ac-**Trophy Page 3**

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
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

Installed inside an octagonal building she had built on the Appleton's City main street, the carousel has drawn riders from 12 states. Dara Bigler attends a surprise party celebrating her 20 years as director of the Clinton branch of State Fair

July: The Olde Glory Days Parade is not rained out.

Kim Henderson of Kim's Cabins in Windsor is a keynote speaker at the opening of the Rock Island Trail State Park in Windsor.

Mayor Carla Moberly wields a knife in a pool-noodle cutting ceremony to reopen Clinton's outdoor swimming pool in Artesian Park, which was closed for a facilities remodel and the addition of a new pool house.

December:

A open house for the new Bourland Radiation Oncology Center, 501 E. Oakstar Dr., is held on Dec. 11.

Last but not least, Polly Mills, beloved member of Curtis and Shelley Mills' family, crossed over the Rainbow Bridge on Dec. 5. According to the notice the Mills placed in the CDD, Polly, a senior pug, was adopted from Clinton Animal Rescue Endeavor (CARE), who rescued her in July of 2022. Polly was preceded in death by three brothers, Sancho, Mr. Beefy and Cletus. Cremation services were provided by Over the Rainbow Bridge Pet Me-

cording to his source, the meeting was "not that long ago," but the source was unable to pin down exactly how long ago the meeting

Tim said he believes the trophy made the move from the old high school to the new Clinton High School. The most prevalent theory, however, is that someone stole the trophy as a prank, despite its size, from the old high school as long ago as 2006, before the new high school was built.

The trophy may be gone, but the memories linger on. Patty Russ Waugh, CHS Class of '51, remembers going on a school bus to Columbia to watch a 1950 state playoff game, held in the Brewer Fieldhouse on the UM campus.

She also remembers Don Snyder, who was known as "Big Don," and knew the players that were juniors in her class that vear— James Thompson, Jimmie Price and Bob Shoemaker. Thompson has died, but Price and Shoemaker still

live in Clinton. Liz hopes

that surviving team mem-

bers, their family members and classmates from that era will attend the Feb. 2 trophy presentation at the Court-Mat Warming game.

"I'll be there, along with my sister, Glenna Fleeman, and possibly our brothers and uncle," Liz said.

Liz sent announcements about the presentation to the surviving team members, she said, and has had responses from Jimmie Price, who plans to be there, and Bob McFarland, who lives in Horseshoe Bay. Texas. She hasn't heard from Jim Fithian, who lives in Port Hueneme, California.

"It was a big deal then," she said, "and although 74 years was more than a lifetime away for many, the fact that it has not been repeated since makes it a big deal still."

Shelby Fellhauer, who lived in Urich, passed away last month at the age of 91. Liz's father, Don Snyder died a year ago on Nov. 29 at age 90. After graduating from Clinton High School, Don attended the University of Missouri, where he had been recruited for the basketball, football and track teams.

After a year, he joined the Navy and completed training as a Communications Technician, then was stationed in Pearl Harbor, where he played on the Pearl Harbor basketball team. After his tour of duty, he attended Central Missouri State College, now UCM, taught school and coached sports in Clinton, Windsor and other area schools. Calhoun residents may remember Don from the years he served as a principal.

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
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

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

Two people died in traffic crashes during the 78-hour counting period, which began at 6 p.m. Friday, December 22, 2023, and ended at 11:59 p.m. Monday, December 25, 2023.

Traffic Crashes — 124 Traffic Crash Injuries — 71 Traffic Crash Fatalities — 2

DWI - 81 [Note: Last year during the 78-hour Christmas counting period, there were 1,017 traffic crashes statewide. In those crash-

es, four people were killed and another 318 were injured. During the 2022 Christmas holiday, troopers investigated 306 traffic crashes which included three fatalities and 84 injuries. Troopers arrested 52 people for driving while impaired in 2022.]

There were no boating crashes or drownings over the 2023 Christmas holiday counting period.

Of the two fatality traffic crashes investigated by troopers, one occurred in the Troop D, Springfield, MO, area, and one occurred in the Troop G, Willow Springs, MO, area.

shared how the Chapter 100 tax exemption process works and the proposed agreement of \$1,000,000 in a Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILOT) be paid annually to the taxing entities within the planned development. He also shared that the PI-LOT would be in effect for 25 years. The distributed spreadsheet indicated that Walker Township would receive annual payments of \$22,464.44, in the first of 25 years. Rick also shared that the current levy, recently set by the township, will only bring in \$40,727.71.

Rick also explained that the development would be a \$500,000,000.00 investment in the county. Provide 10 full-time jobs maintaining the equipment, and many other full-time jobs in mowing and maintenance of the property. Once completed, the project would be the largest investment in the county in decades, and the largest solar farm in the state.

The next step in the development process is for Walker Township to sign a waiver of their Planning and Zoning Ordinance. Both Elaine and Paul didn't feel that they should sign a waiver without first visiting with others in the township. Elaine stated that the question of allowing a solar farm development should be voted on by the residents of the township. Clerk Rick shared that many of their residents have already shown their approval of the project by agreeing to lease their land. He also shared that the board would be taking away their right to lease their land without signing a waiver.

The Walker Township Board discussed having a public hearing with their residents to discuss the Planning and Zoning Ordinance waiver. Clerk Rick stated that he would be more than willing to share information at the meeting. A list of registered voters of Walker Township was provided.

Bruce Dewsberry, Chairman of the Senior Citizens Service Tax Board, updated the Commission on their most recent meeting.
