Bibb Gives Major Money For Steamboat Landing Playground

Phase I of the Steamboat Landing playground at Drake Harbor in Warsaw was completed in October 2022. Afterwards, a survey of the community revealed a desire to enlarge the playground with more agediverse equipment, plus a new bathroom.

Upon those results being released, Warsaw resident Rick Bibb approached the city about donating a dollar for every dollar donated by the community for the project, with a limit of \$300,000 in matching funds. Organizations, businesses, individuals are also jumping in to raise funds for Phase II of the playground project, including the Shriner Club, Ozark Disposal Company, Marine Corps League, and the Lions Club. With continued support from the community, it is possible to raise a total of \$600,000 or

"The design will continue the riverboat theme from Phase I," said Randy Pogue, City of Warsaw Administrator, who submitted a grant request to Missouri State Parks which resulted in building Phase I of the \$226,169 playground. Pogue elaborated, "Phase II will have over 27 imaginative play activities,

highlighted with an impactful color scheme offering a rich partnership with the historic past of Warsaw's Osage River heritage. It will have the required social behavioral, physical skill, and communal activity development of

Kinship Connection **Offers Support**



for Aging Services

Care Connection for Aging Services is presenting a regular support group for grandparents and other relatives raising children. The program will take place at the Warsaw Senior Center/Harbor Village every other Monday and was scheduled to start on January 22, 10:00 AM to 11:30 AM.

The group is part of the Kinship Connection program to serve relatives raising children, and is a partnership between Care Connection for Aging Services and ParentLink of the University of Missouri.

The program will offer kinship caregiver credit for Missouri state licensure.

Each session will provide practical information that adults 55 and older can use in their daily role as a grandparent or relative raising a child.

Kinship Connection is more than just a job assignment for Tammy Wilkey, Care Connection Family Caregiver Specialist and a single grandmother raising three young grandchildren - a girl and two boys.

"It's pretty rough sometimes," said Wilkey. "In my situation, the boys have been through a lot. They don't get to see their mother on a regular basis, and they do not understand why. That puts a lot of stress **SUPPORT Page 3**

Opinions Vary On AMI Days Versus Traditional Snow Days

Students in Missouri used

cancellation of school due to bad weather conditions. A "snow day" meant a day off from school and time to sleep in late and then play in the snow. However, with the most recent implementation

still required to complete assignments on those days away.

AMI is an acronym for Alternative Method of Instruction and is part of the Warsaw R-IX School District curriculum. An AMI day is a day in which school is cancelled (e.g. in the case of inclement weather) but students do not have to make up the day because they will be provided the opportunity to complete "Weather Work" assignments over a

specified period. According to Warsaw R-IX Superintendent Scott Gemes, it is a way to keep students on task and avoid making up instruction hours during the school vear.

"With modern technology in place, we are able to keep students moving forward,"

said Gemes. school and middle school students receive assignments through Google while our elementary students receive packets of material at the beginning of the year to use in case of a snow day.'

Students should take home devices and other school supplies as needed if there is a potential for school closure due to inclement weather. If there is a problem with internet connections then they should contact their teachers.

Gemes explained students are able to submit their assignments to their teachers and teachers can grade the assignments and give instruction when the students return to school. The district is then able to count the AMI day as a school day and the students AMI Page 3

Sometimes all you want is a quick and easy dinner. That's BFD (Breakfast For Dinner) steps up. One of my favorite quick and easy breakfast or breakfast for dinner recipes is Piggy Pudding.

Preheat oven to 425 degrees and butter the bottom of a 9-inch square baking dish. Breakfast link sausages, 12

to 20 depending on size (you need to cover the bottom of the baking dish)

4-5 apples, peeled, cored and cut into 1/4 inch slices 1 pkg. of yellow combread mix, batter prepared to box instructions

Cook sausages over medium heat until done, pierce to let out fat. Place in baking dish, layer apples on top, pour batter over the top, bake until done, about 30 minutes. Serve with maple syrup. * * *

This quick quiche (my late husband somewhat inelegantly called egg pie) doesn't use a crust, and can be quickly assembled.

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Lightly grease a 9-inch pie pan. 8 slices cooked and

chopped bacon or a large handful of bacon bits 4 ounces shredded cheese, your choice

1½ cups milk 4 large eggs, beaten

½ cup all-purpose flour 1/4 cup finely chopped onion or green onion butter,

2 tablespoons melted Salt & pepper

Cover the bottom of the prepared pie pan with shredded cheese crumbled bacon. Whisk together milk, eggs, flour, onion, butter, salt and pepper in a large bowl until smooth.

Pour mixture over cheese and bacon in the pie pan. Bake until the center is set, about 35 minutes. Serve hot or cold.



I wonder how many citizens in Benton County know that the presidential preference primaries are being conducted in March? I suspect there are very few who are aware of this and that is the intended consequence of the MO Republican's HB 1878.

Republican 2022, In Gov. Mike Parson signed HB 1878, which eliminated Missouri's state-run presidential preference primary designated election and a party-run system for choosing presidential nominees which attacks our Democratic elections process. None of the Democrats serving in the MO State House or Senate at the time voted for this bill but every MO GOP member did, which limits participation, and takes away more of our freedom and rights as voters.

The Missouri Democratic Party has designed a process that will encourage wide voter participation by offering both mail-in and in-person voting options to Democratic presidential primary voters on March 23, and will largely be conducted at the county level. In-person voting location for the Benton Democratic County presidential primary will be at the Warsaw Library meeting room from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. More details will be forthcoming but if voters would like to participate, contact the county party bentondemocrat@gmail.

Bibb offered to match funds given by the community in the name of his parents Edward and Esther Bibb. He said that he and his family have called the area home for a long time and have really liked what the city has done. Although his parents have passed away, they were always active in the community, and Bibb offered some memories of life with them.

parents "My were originally from Knobby and bought the hotel that is currently owned as a restaurant by the Twelve Tribes when my sister and I were ready to go to high school," said Bibb. "I remember when we had to back our car up Turkey Hill on Highway 7 because the gas pump didn't always work if the tank was not full."

said Allcorn. "There are certain muscle groups that each piece of equipment focuses on. We have a lot of community activities at Drake Harbor, and I see kids playing there, including my grandson. This playground will complete our harbor, and give kids exercise in a beautiful place. We already get a lot of compliments on our Christmas Lights, on the Wine Stroll, Jubilee Days and Heritage Days. Sixty donations of \$5,000 will add up to \$300,000. That amount matched with \$300,000 from the Bibb family will give us \$600,000 for the playground."

Walmart Manager Craig Dudenhoeffer said that the store had contributed \$1,500 to Phase I of the playground. In February, community donations will be decided and he expects the store to be able to offer a donation for Phase II.

"Anytime we can contribute to the community we try to do it," said Dudenhoeffer. "If there are things such as a playground at Drake Harbor, it is good for kids. I walk at Drake Harbor and see a lot of kids on the equipment. It helps those who do not have playground equipment at home."

"Without AMI days, the school year might extend all the way until June," said Gemes. "As it is now, the district has used all five of the AMI days so if we have to miss another day of school then we will have to make up that day."

WHS English teacher Amber Glenn is on board with AMI instruction.

"I would prefer to have AMI days over making them up on Mondays," Glenn said. "My students tend to complete the work I send them, but I keep it pretty short. The students who typically complete their work on a daily basis, turn in their AMI. I give them 10 points per day, using a rubric for meeting the criteria. As long as they turn it in by the day the district sets, they are counted present for each day they complete work."

WHS Math teacher Amy Spunaugle said that AMI is helpful in some ways.

"It depends on which perspective I'm looking at it from," said Spunaugle. "It's nice that the administration has a few days they do not have to stress in calling off a day of school. My students are pretty good about doing their work. I do hate missing five days of full force education though."

Warsaw South School pre-school teacher Kristy Henderson is in favor of the AMI days.

"I like them. I would rather have them now than make up 5 days later on in the year. I have had all my students return their work in a timely manner. I believe the assignments that students receive should be something they can do on their own or with very minimal parental help. I think it has been a learning curve for teachers, students, and parents with this program, but overall, I feel it is effective for my young students. It helps students get some quality work time and still have some time off for fun during a snow day," said Henderson. Some parents have trouble with AMI days.

"I personally don't like them," said mother of two, Jacquelyn Snow. working parents, we don't get snow days and teaching my kids takes time I get to spend with them. I'm not a very good teacher."

"Teachers need to be teaching our kids, but AMI days serve their purpose to

District, the concept is the same, however, no work is assigned to students on days away from school.

"We have 10 days built into our calendar," said Chris Sanders, an alternative classroom instructor. "As long as we aren't out more than 10 days, we don't have to make them up."

If the district ever does have more than 10 snow days, days may be added to the end of the school year or certain holidays or breaks may be taken away and replaced with school days.

But Sanders commented, "In my 11 years with the district, I don't think we've ever been over 10."

"We prefer in-person instruction over AMI days," said Lincoln R-II Superintendent Kevin "During Covid, Smith. we had some negative experiences with AMI and we didn't like the results. Therefore, we currently feel that additional school days and in-person instruction is a better fit for our students and community."

Sanders described advantage being that teachers aren't required to have pre-made paperwork or assignments ready.

Lincoln R-II Elementary teacher Sarah Weatherby explained another advantage.

"I like that our schedule will not change with added days put into the end of the year," Weatherby said. "I appreciate the freedom that when a snow day is called, our schedule is not changing in the long run."

Cole Camp, Superintendent Chris Hess explained.

"AMI days allow school districts to continue to provide instruction on days when it is too hazardous to come to school," she said.

But the superintendent added, "In order to count the student present for the AMI day and thus to be able to count them in district attendance, the assigned work has to be done."

Elementary Principal Andrea Curtis recognizes that nothing takes the place of being in the classroom with a teacher giving the lesson.

"It isn't ideal to have students at home multiple days in a row and sporadic teaching," the administrator said. "But AMI helps with this aspect. The students are able to review concepts they have already been taught and keep their minds fixed on what they've been learning. They aren't learning new

To date, Cole Camp has utilized three of their 5

Cole Student Camp Administrator Curtis.

"Nothing substitutes being in the classroom with a teacher," Shearer said. "But after testing and so far into May, parents and students are ready for summer, so AMI days do help to keep the school year on track."

He added, "Safety is the biggest concern."

While the difficult decision of whether or not school should be in session is ultimately up to the superintendents, the AMI option provides the them another way to keep students safe.







MDC Reports **Final Deer Harvest At Record 326,026**

Harvest total is a new record, surpassing one set in *2006*.

2023-2024 Missouri's deer-hunting season ended Jan. 15 with the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) reporting preliminary record-setting total deer harvest for the season of 326,026. This year's new harvest record surpasses the one set in 2006 of 325,457.

Of the deer harvested, 147,705 were antlered bucks, 29,060 were button bucks, and 149,261 were does. Top harvest counties for the overall deer season were Franklin with 7,395, Howell with 6,346, and Texas with 6,181.

Hunters harvested 299,719 deer during the 2022-2023 deer hunting season with 140,735 being antlered bucks, 27,028 being button bucks, and 131,956 being

Deer hunting ended with the close of the archery season. Preliminary data from MDC showed that hunters checked 55,396 deer during the 2023-2024 archery deer season. Top counties for the archery deer season were Jefferson with 1,440, Franklin with 1,194, and St. Louis with 1,022. Hunters checked 56,683 deer during the 2022-2023 archery deer season.

According to increasing deer numbers and regulation changes that added a new early antlerless firearms portion, a new chronic wasting disease (CWD) firearms portion, and an increase in the number of firearms antlerless deer hunting permits in most counties led to additional hunting opportunities and contributed to a record harvest.

"With deer numbers increasing in most counties, additional antlerless deer harvest is needed to slow population growth and help maintain deer numbers at desired levels," said MDC Cervid Program Supervisor Jason Isabelle. "It was great to see hunters take advantage of the additional hunting opportunities.

According to MDC, this year was the first since 2013 that more does were than antlered harvested bucks.

"Prior the to severe hemorrhagic disease outbreak in 2012 that reduced deer numbers and resulted in regulation changes to reduce antlerless harvest, doe harvest exceeded antlered buck harvest each year for about a decade," said Isabelle. "Now that the deer population has rebounded and regulations have been liberalized, it's nice to see the much-needed increase in antlerless harvest given our desire to slow the growth of the increasing deer population to maintain deer numbers at socially acceptable levels."

According to MDC, this year's antlered buck harvest

is also the highest on record. Isabelle attributed this increase primarily to the new CWD portion of firearms deer season that was open in CWD Management Zone counties.

"Hunters play a major role in helping to manage CWD and increasing the harvest of both bucks and antlerless deer in the CWD Management Zone will help reduce the spread of the disease," said Isabelle.

Isabelle noted that increasing deer numbers, changes in hunter preferences, and removal of the antler-point restriction (APR) in counties that enter the CWD Management Zone have also contributed to an increasing antlered buck harvest trend over the past decade.
