Be Prepared: Wright Is A Good Fit As Emergency Management Director

In 2010, when Brad Wright was 17 years old, he graduated from Clinton High School and started working as a jailor at the Henry County Jail. The jail was located on South Washington Street at that time. In 2011, the new jail was built across town, where he also worked.

Brad decided to move north to attend the Blue River Police Academy, then worked for police departments in Independence and the Jackson County area. He moved back to Clinton in 2017, and since last April, has been working where he started out, in the law enforcement building on Washington.

Only this time, he's got the head office as the Emergency Management Director for Henry County.

Brad said he originally applied to work at the jail after high school because he knew he wanted to work in law enforcement. He moved back home to help out grandparents, James and Shirley Walters, on their farm, and commuted to work. It was a friend who works at the courthouse who saw the posting for the job of emergency management director, and

suggested he apply. "She said it would be a good fit," Brad said.

Brad serves all of Henry County except the incorporated towns, Clinton, Deepwater and Blairstown. Mark Manuel, the Clinton Fire chief, is responsible for the city's emergency management, Brad said. But having a good relationship with all the first responders

is crucial to an organized response to an emergency or natural disaster, he said.

Is the area prepared for emergency situations? "We are in good shape," Brad said. "We review our emergency plan every two years, and just reviewed it in 2023."

The most likely emergency the county will face are storms and severe

weather with high winds, Brad said. With threats like flood, you have some warning that the water is rising, but weather is more unpredictable. His office has a head-start with its resident weather expert, Jim Sublette. Subby, as he is known, has extensively studied weather, especially the local weather. Many

Last September, Tabetha Jamsek and her husband, Jay, bought a 5,400 square foot building on Price Lane in Clinton. In October, they started converting into a family-oriented sports club where people could play pool, darts and arcade games.

Clinton Couple Cater To New Mobility Trend With Scooters

Tami and Yosh Gould have been in the car business for years. They met in Springfield in 2007, she said, where they both worked in car sales. Yosh has had a car dealership in Springfield since 2012, where he also sells motor scooters.

In September of 2022, they bought a house in Clinton, and last August, the Goulds opened a motor scooter shop on North Main.

"It's something Clinton didn't have," Yosh said. "I was told there was a man who sold scooters on the side of the road and did really well selling them. He just disappeared."

The Goulds sell new scooters, both gas and battery-powered electric scooters, plus go-karts and dirt bikes. They have one scooter that has pedals you can pedal like a bicycle, then push a button to kick in the motor, Yosh said. Scooter customers are in their mid-20s and up — state law requires you have a drivers' license to

operate a scooter so must be 16. Helmets are recommended, but not required.

"People mainly buy scooters to run around town," Yosh said. "They are great for around town. One guy bought one to commute to work."

One of the Cruisin' to Clinton organizers bought a scooter to ride around the Square on Cruise

nights, Yosh said. Another bought a stand-on scooter that has a handlebar that folds down, so you put it in your car.

"He uses it when he takes his grandchildren to the fairgrounds, so he can keep up with them," Yosh said.

Scooters go a maximum of 35 mph, and get 80 miles to the gallon.

The 49 cc model is legal to ride on the streets, he said, but does not require registration or a special license.

Another reason the Goulds chose Clinton is because Tami grew up here. Tami Dennis, as she was, graduated from Clinton High School Class of 1986. She is the daughter

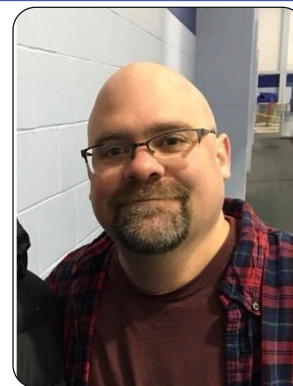

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residents follow "Subby's Weather Talk" on Facebook, where he gives a video weather update every few days.

Jim is also holding a Severe Weather Seminar on March 6. See information at end of article.

After Brad talked Jim into coming to work part time for EM, Jim brought a radar program to monitor the weather, and provides long-range forecasts for Brad's office that give a heads-up if bad weather is on the way, which he shares with first responders.

"He is my weather guru," Brad said. "His long-range forecasts are pretty accurate."

Brad got first-hand experience of a weather emergency when he lived south of Oak Grove. On March 6, 2017, a EF-3 tornado touched down in the town. Brad and his family heard the sirens and got into the storm shelter, he said. His wife was nine months pregnant at the time, he said, but as a law enforcement officer, he told her had to go and see if he could help in the wake of the tornado.

"As I drove into Oak Grove, I could see there were just foundations where houses had been" Brad said. "We had 19 people injured, but we had no fatalities. We were lucky."

The scare did not send his wife into premature labor, he said, but if it had, Brad would be prepared — he's delivered babies in what first responders call roadside deliveries.

Educating people about what to do in an emergency is part of his job, he said — if people know what to do, they won't add to the problem by panicking. When you deliver a baby in an emergency situation, he said, you try to have everybody stay calm.

"But you are praying the whole time that the ambulance will be there soon," he said.

In Clinton, if a wind storm wipes out power, the 911 center has back-up generators, as does the sheriff's office and the jail. Brad says his office has mobile devices called hot boxes that will work if the cell towers are up.

Brad's job in emergency management is to work with all parts of the community, from law enforcement, firefighters and EMS to utilities and public works departments.

"Our job is coordinating the effort, providing resources and making sure everybody is going in the right direction," Brad said. "Everybody has a part to play."

As well as tornadoes and storm damage, weather events include flood damage and drought, he said, noting that Missouri seems to have either one or the other. Wildfires are possible in wooded areas of the county, he said, and while earthquakes are not probable, he said, people did call in who felt the recent one.

Civil unrest is also unlikely, he said, but he works with school districts on security issues.

of Marty Webb and bonus dad Jim Webb.

Tami works at Jim Falk Motors upstairs in the billing department.

"The Henry County Emergency Operations Plan covers every possible scenario that you could think of," he said. "We know our office is well-prepared."

Henry County is required to review its emergency plans every two years, he said, and just did a review in 2023. Brad works with the LEPC, the Local Emergency Planning Commission, headed by Bruce Dewberry. The LEPC focuses on hazardous materials containment and training, Brad said.

"Hazardous materials are more prevalent than most people think," he said. "Any industrial facility, processing plant, gas station or grain elevator has them, as well as tankers going through the county on the highways."

The LEPC just got a grant to buy pallets of hazardous material absorbent, which Brad said comes in 33-lb. bags and resembles kitty litter.

"We gave a pallet to the Clinton Fire Department, and to every fire department in Henry County," Brad said. "It should last them a while."

Some processing plants are required to have their own hazardous materials plan, he said.

As well as Jim Sublette, Brad has an intern, Niko Anderson, working with him. Niko is majoring in crisis and disaster management at the University of Central Missouri, and also works in the sheriff's office. His classes include practical experience in handling an emergency, he said, plus he is taking a management course and doing a research project on ethical decision-making concerning discrimination for women and minorities in police and fire departments.

The Emergency Management Building dates back to 1953, and still has the jail cells on the top floor, and some on the lower level, Brad said. The cells mostly serve as storage areas for boxes of paperwork, Niko said.

Brad, who lives on a farm a 10-minute drive from town, said working in the Emergency Management Building, where he started out when Sheriff Kent Oberkom hired him back in 2010, is the perfect place for him to use his law enforcement experience in his hometown.

"I'm so glad and blessed to serve this community," he said.

The Goulds like the location of their business, at 116 N. Main, because it's convenient to everything, Yosh said. He likes to walk down to Daylight Donuts for coffee and pastry, and to visit with the guys. He also stops off at Blue Ribbon Bakery on Monday mornings, when Daylight Donuts isn't open, and he is on his way out of town to go to Springfield, where he spends the first part of the week at his dealership.

He likes coming back to Clinton, he said, where he's away from the hustle and bustle of Springfield, and not at the beck and call of customers. He named his car business Roustabout Sales after an Elvis Presley movie.

"We love Elvis," Tami said. "We went to Graceland two years ago."

Yosh grew up on Table Rock Lake, and graduated from Reeds Spring High School. The scooter shop is named "JustBCuz," the answer Yosh gives when anyone asks him why he decides to do something.

"I have been on my own since I was 15," he explained. "I look at every situation from every possible angle."

"JustBCuz" sums up his reasons after he weighs all the possibilities and decides what he wants to do, he said.

"This will end up being my retirement thing, or for my semi-retirement, I guess," he said of the shop.

Yosh puts most of the scooters together, another thing he likes to do. He also collects antiques, which are on view in the back office, and include a selection of wooden chests, an old saxophone, and a large JP Coats spool cabinet. He likes to be around antiques, he said, but will also sell them.

During the cold snap this winter, the Goulds spent their indoor time watching Elvis movies, Tami said. She had been to Graceland when she was a child, she said, but when she went there two years ago, was surprised at how much the complex had grown. You could hardly see the house, she said, which this time they could go inside, unlike her earlier trip, and they enjoyed seeing Elvis' car collection in the museum. They took the tram from the museum to the house, and put their names on the wall, Yosh said.

The trip was to pick up a car, he said, but turned into a mini-vacation, he said.

"We parked the truck and trailer at the motel and went sight-seeing for a few days," he said.

The Goulds held a grand opening for JustBCuz, and set up a Facebook, and

are getting lots of followers, Yosh said. They are involved in Cruisin' to Clinton and plan to get more involved in the community, he said. Yosh thinks their storefront may have been an accounting office, but he also keeps finding paperwork about a photogra-

phy business.

Missouri Extension to Offer Program for Couples



MISSOURI EXTENSION'S Kyleigh Brown is offering a Strong Couples program online, designed to help couples develop conflict resolution and communication skills and strengthen their relationship.

Engagement season, between Thanksgiving and Valentine's Day, is the time of year when most engagements take place, with Christmas and New Year's Eve being the most popular days to pop the question.

Now, couples are starting to plan their June weddings, focusing on the details that will make it a perfect day. But Kyleigh Brown thinks they also ought to be investing some time before their big day into planning for their marriage, which will last longer than the wedding.

Brown is a human development and family science specialist for the University of Missouri Extension. She is offering a Strong Couples program, designed to teach couples how to improve conflict resolution and improve satisfaction in the relationship with their partner. The program is open to couples who are engaged, as well as married couples and couples who have been living together for six months or more.

"This class is an excellent opportunity for couples to do as a premarital course," Brown said. "Studies have found that premarital programs decrease a couple's likelihood of divorce."

The program was developed by Illinois Extension, which funds the program. There is no charge for the course, and participants who complete a program survey will have a chance to win a \$25 gift card, Brown said.

In addition to improving communication skills and building conflict resolution skills, the program is designed to increase the fun a couple has together, Brown said. It also offers guides to engaged couples on how to be intentional in the decisions made for their marriage.

The program consists of six online modules, plus virtual meetings with a trained coach to give participants a chance to practice their skills. Participants can be mixed or same sex couples, must be 18 years or older and residents of Missouri.

"The Strong Couples Program is a no-cost opportunity to ensure your 'happily ever after,'" Brown said.

University of Missouri Extension is a way for the university to reach beyond the campus to improve the health and well-being of residents, and to promote agricultural growth and economic opportunity in Missouri communities.

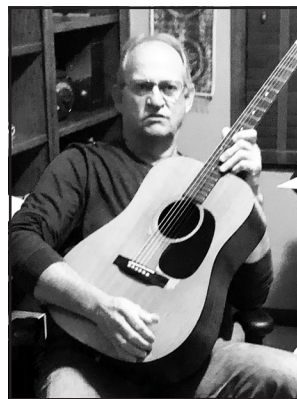

Public Safety Tax On The April Ballot

The Clinton City Council met in a work session the evening of February 6 at city hall. Most of the council members were present except Daniel Wilson; Councilman Roger House joined via phone. Fire Chief Mark Manuel and Police Chief Kevin Miller were in attendance.

City Administrator Christy Maggi had asked the council for some direction concerning the potential tax. Recall that the Clinton City Council recently approved the appearance of the Public Safety Tax to appear on the April ballot. The tax, if passed by voters, should generate about \$1 million dollars annually. The funds are, by statute, earmarked to be spent only on certain items in the public safety realm, but both the fire department and the police department know where it will be spent: to hire more personnel. Of the approximately \$1.1 million dollar estimated revenue, the idea is to split equally the generated tax dollars evenly and fill in the ranks of the fire and police departments.

Both the fire and police departments have done their research: the fire department has equipment enough for six new hires and the police department has vehicles and other equipment on a purchase rotation that should not affect them adversely either. At the same time, the pay schedules for the police department would be revamped as well.

Some issues, such as higher ranked officers making less than the people they oversee, would be corrected, too. Police Chief Kevin Miller said it would also ultimately improve the culture of the police department and slow down officers from leaving the department who are seeking better pay. Clinton has

lost several good officers in recent years who sought better opportunities in the private sector.

Although it may seem counter-intuitive, hiring more new personnel will actually ease some of the payroll expenses. Because of the shortage of staff for both the police and fire departments, overtime is a big issue – and a large chunk of the payroll expense. More staff will also make things safer for those patrolling or showing up to a fire and for the people in town, too; it will get both departments up to recommended standards personnel-wise. But it is best not to get too excited: even if the initial pay offering is up there are not exactly a lot of people knocking down doors to be police officers and/or firemen. Larger towns are notorious, however, for sucking up the new recruit pool because they offer the advantage of better pay.

Much of the work session was devoted to determining and clarifying what the tax – if passed – would generate and how it would be spent. The remainder of the work session was to determine how to disseminate the information to the public so voters could make an informed decision at the ballot box this April. Some ideas included Facebook, radio and news ads as well as mailers and, of course, the city's website.

Some key take-aways about the Public Safety Tax are: it should generate a little over \$1 million per year to be split equally between the police and fire departments; it is a half-cent tax – which is about 50 cents per \$100 spent at the store; Clinton's current tax rate (8.1750%) would raise to 8.6750% which would still keep Clinton in the five lowest tax rates

per towns in this area (under Warsaw, Butler, and Sedalia). The tax, if passed, will be to increase staffing at the fire and police departments. As Councilman Cameron Jackson put it: "It is to expand services."

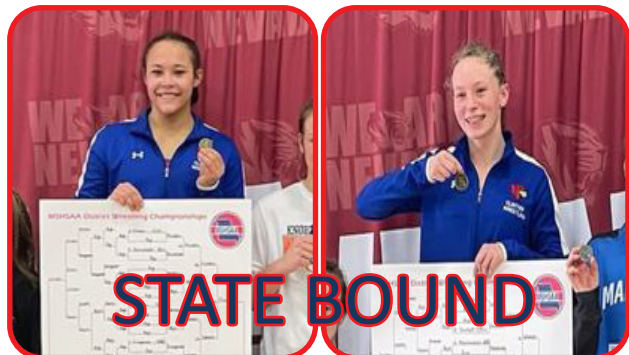




Mayor Gibbs called the board meeting to order at approximately 5:00 p.m. Following the pledge of allegiance, roll call was taken. Those in attendance were Alderpersons Terry, Dailey, Hudson and Watson. Also present was Lila Foster and Police Chief Shumaker.

Alderson Dailey moved to approve the consent agenda and financial reports as presented; Alderson Watson seconded the motion and roll call vote was taken with all members voting yes.

Curtis Colby presented the Optimist Club's plans for renovations of the Optimist Park which include pickle ball courts, 1/2 court basketball court, new toddler park and relocating the volleyball courts. Anticipated cost \$200,000, the city volunteered to assist with in-kind support of man hours and materials; also discussed was lighting, parking and electrical work. Discussion followed with no objection being noted by the board.

Citizen Input— Margaret Hogan and Audrey Hogan both voiced their concerns regarding the project and how it would fit in with current activities and the surrounding residences. Jacob Dean with Great River Engineering gave the board an update on grants in progress.

ACTION AGENDA— **Mike Keith Insurance**— presented a proposal for "municipal environmental pollution" insurance plan. This would cover pollution emanating from locations owned or leased by a public entity. Items covered cleanup and testing; third-party pollution legal liability including bodily injury and property damage onsite or offsite. The cost of the policy is \$8000.

MPUA ELECTRIC LINES —

TRIMMING/MUTUAL AID -- Kevin Thornton representing MPUA discussed the advantages of the city participating in the lineman program. He noted the city is currently a member of MPUA so there would not be a membership fee, but any costs would be for the linemen to provide tree trimming service or emergency assistance through the mutual aid agreement. Discussion followed; Alderson Dailey made a motion authorizing the mayor to enter into the agreement with MPUA's mutual aid program; and further join the MO Electric Commission. Alderson Watson seconded his motion and roll call vote was taken with all members voting yes. Motion carried.

Electric Rates -- Lila Foster gave the board a report showing the electric fund and its profit and loss for the past twelve months. It was evident the cost being billed to the city customers was not keeping up with the cost of energy that energy was charging the city or the maintenance and repairs costs paid out by the city. Item was discussed with Alderson Watson volunteering to review the data.

Citizen Input — Margaret Hogan noted the chamber was working on rehabbing the snowflakes or replacing some on a yearly basis.

sewer issue to be addressed. The information was passed along to Public Works to be placed on their agenda.

Airport Manager Joel Long reported to the council. He commented on the delays concerning the terminal building project. The delays are mostly related to weather events. He reported that two airport association members were re-elected. Also, Long reported some problems with the navigation lights at the airport, but those issues have been solved.

"Please come visit the airport," he asked of the council. He discussed that he was an ambassador of sorts for the City of Clinton as he is the first one that those flying in see — and many of those folks are business people, too, potentially looking to open or establish their businesses in Clinton.

Economic Development Director (reporting next) affirmed Mr. Long's position and also the importance of the airport to Clinton. One project came to Clinton largely because of the airport [here]," said Dawson.

Dawson said that some landowners in the county have recently been approaching him about what they can do with their land. "They seem to be weighing the highest and best use for their land," said Dawson. He found it encouraging that folks were asking "What could we do?" and considered it a positive sign. Dawson also reported on the recent project activity: Project Diversify (breaking ground soon), Project Sprocket (a retail venture, probably coming in April), and Project Sparkle (an industrial business).

There were no second readings of bills.

Councilman Cameron Jackson gave the Public Works report. He reported to the council that Capital Electric workers are in the process of trying to figure out what repairs are needed for the Second Street traffic signals at the Jefferson and Green Streets intersections.

Although working currently, when the control boxes for one of the signals was opened, several issues were found. Capital Electric will be generating a report and sending it to Public Works. Councilman Jackson re-

ported that the city used 140 tons of salt during the somewhat recent weather events. More salt is on order to replace what was used. He also reported that there is a need to replace the 2002 dump truck. The truck's recent repairs did not last long.

A somewhat lengthy discussion about Resolution 05-2024, regarding the contractual agreement for Westport Construction to complete the Artesian Parking Lot Project, took place. For the most part, Councilman Daniel Wilson raised his concerns about the timing of the project: he wondered, ultimately, why the project would not just be pushed back to fall 2024 to avoid becoming a "mess" during the early summer programs — namely, the ball programs which fill up the parking lot(s); lots of youths and others participate in baseball games that often overflow the parking available. Recall, the ball fields are adjacent to the Artesian Pool. This, coupled with a few other misgivings, led Councilman Wilson to vote "no" on the resolution (the measure did pass, however, as he was the sole "no" vote). Somewhat coupled with Resolution 05-2024 were the approval of the final walk-through of the pool house: a door issue is being addressed and the final pay application for the work was approved (Councilman Wilson voted "no" on this as well). Also reported, a leak along the south wall at the Aquatic Center has developed and Redhammer Roof will be contacted to take a look at it.

From Waste Water: pumps at the Calvird Pump station are not keeping up — especially in heavy rain events. Solutions are being sought; repairs for the east clarifier have been made; the CCTV scoping of lines and cleaning are near completion; also, quotes are being gathered concerning the replacement of the obsolete control panel for the Montgomery pump station.

A motion to replace the #4 upper level pump was approved. The estimated cost is \$50,000. It was noted the head-works at the facility will need to be replaced at some point (estimated \$250,000). It was explained that the Corps of Engineers originally owned and built the facility which Clinton later took over. Councilman Henry brought up "the changing regulations" that always seem to be imposed upon the facility (and therefore the city) and complained mildly about those. Otherwise, the council approved the final repair price (\$10,600) for rotor #5; it was noted that bids for the Waste Water Treatment Improvement Project are due back by March 5. The RFQ for engineering services are due February 22. It was reported the Allen Street sewer line has been repaired.

The McLane Chapel roof at Englewood will be repaired at no cost to the city. The repairs will come from the McBeth Trust Fund and the roof will be a composite slate-like material which will replace the original slate roof there. There was no Public Safety report.

Councilman Daniel Wilson gave the Finance Committee report. A motion to approve the Do-Rite Construction bid to clear the drainage ditch at Gerhart Industrial Park was approved by the council. Also reported, some of the covenant restrictions at Gerhart will be looked at in the future as they are outdated. "What a wonderful outcome," said Mayor Moberly in regards to the recent grain bin emergency that left a young man trapped for a few hours. She said she was pleased to hear the purchase of the rescue equipment came in handy, too. Comments were made that Fire Chief Mark Manuel represented the city well to outside media.

City Administrator Christy Maggi said a meeting with

the Corp of Engineers about the Waste Water Treatment property will happen soon; they will discuss the history of the plant as well and some other issues.

There was no unfinished business and no new business for the council to address.

Of note: Councilman Daniel Wilson will be (reluctantly) resigning at the next council meeting. The Councilman's home burned down last year and he was unable to find a suitable home within city limits for his family. Since

"It's been very humbling," Tabetha said. "I didn't realize there was such a need for a pool hall. Now that there is a place to go, people are pulling their sticks out of the closet."

"There is nothing like Elite Billiards in a hundred miles." Sunday was the second day of a APA Cash Cup tournament, with the winning team taking home \$1,600, split between the team's eight members.

"What a great day," said Sharla Taylor, receiving her share of the winnings, "and we get to watch the Chiefs play the Super Bowl!"

Sharla and spouse Nathan Taylor are both on the winning End Zone team. They drove from their home in Hughesville, north of Sedalia, to play in the tournament, which started Saturday. It's a drive of about 45 minutes to Clinton, Nathan said, with the tournament starting at 10:30 a.m.

"We played 10 games yesterday," he said. "We didn't get home until after 1:30 a.m."

The couple plays at the End Zone, a sports bar in Sedalia, but it only has two tables. It take at least eight tables to hold tournaments, Nathan said. Elite has 13 pool tables, three rows of three and two rows of two tables, plus tables and chairs around the room, where people were eating, watching the games and waiting to play.

"There are lots of tables, lots of food and lots of room," Sharla said.

"Elite Billiards is the best. I wish we lived closer."

The End Zone team won the fall session, Nathan said. League play is now into the winter session, with eleven more weeks to go, Tabetha said.

Elite Billiards is starting a juniors league for ages 9 through 15, which will take place on Saturday, she said.

"We already have seven signed up," Tabetha said.

Elite has leagues every night, except for Friday and Saturday, when they have tournaments, Tabetha said. Elite Billiards is open every day, Tabetha said, from 3 p.m. to midnight on Mondays, 11 a.m. to midnight Tuesdays through Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays 11 a.m. to 1:30 a.m., and Sundays, 11 a.m. to midnight.

The pool hall has a small bar tucked in the back cor-

ner, but the serious players don't drink during a tournament. The food menu ranges from pizza to quesadillas and salads. "Elite has the best wings in town," Tabetha said. Players include all ages, both men and women and couples. Children are welcome before 9 p.m., which people like because they can bring them and enjoy an evening out without hiring a sitter.

On Sunday, Elite hosted ten teams of eight people each. While the championship game between the Old Farts from Harrisonville and Sedalia's End Zone team was being resolved, Megan Peterson, executive administrative assistant of the Warsaw Chamber of Commerce, challenged Sarah Gray of Deepwater to a game.

On this chilly Sunday, the feeling is a friendly vibe of people enjoying being inside with friends, enjoying a game of pool.

"It's become quite the spot," Tabetha said. "It's like this every day." Nathan said he has been playing pool for 15 years, and is probably the second best player on his team, though he seemed to sink almost every ball he cued up in the tournament's championship game. He has a pool table at home, he said, and owns two pool sticks, a heavier one to use for breaking and his more expensive stick for playing. It's worth about \$1,500 if you bought it today, he said.

Sharla's pool stick is not as expensive, she said, but was made by Athena, a company operated by women, and has her name on it. The couple's first date was at the E Street sports bar in Sedalia, she said, where Nathan was playing in a pool league. He's been working with her on her pool game since they met.
