Ranch Gives Area Equestrians Faith, Fresh Air And Fortitude

BY JENNIFER JACKSON Staff Reporter

Last September, Cori Carriger's palomino, Hickory, developed an infection. Her family took Hickory to the equine hospital at the University of Missouri, where they were told he was not expected to recover, and if he did, he would not be rideable.

So Shay Carriger, Cori's mother, and all the riders who take lessons at the C Bar C Ranch gathered in the barn and prayed for Hickory's healing.

"I prayed he would live," Shay said. "My daughter prayed he would run."

After spending 28 days in the horse hospital, Hickory is not only alive and kicking, but running and ride-

"He's totally healed," Shay said. "He's our miracle

Faith and horseback riding are the unique mix at C Bar C, where people come to take riding lessons from towns up to an hour and half away, including Freeman, Bolivar, and Sedalia. What they like is that Shay integrates Christian scriptures into the riding lesson, in a curriculum she wrote

References to horses are surprisingly prevalent in

the Bible, and can be found in Rev. 19:11, James 3:3 and Psalms 76:6. Shay also applies verses that don't specifically refer to horses to teaching riding skills.

"For example, when I'm teaching barrel racing, I use the verse about turning to the Lord," she said. Shay said she introduces riders to all equine disciplines as well as barrel

racing- roping, jumping, trick riding, trail riding and obstacles —crossing creeks on log bridges, for example. If riders try different types of riding and want more specialized training in one discipline, she sends them to a teacher who specializes in it.

Shay said she started taking riding lessons at age six, a riding teacher.

"My dream was to provide lessons for all kids,"

Shay started giving riding lessons in 2002, she said, traveling to locations to do so. In 2012, she bought the 60-acre ranch, just outside of Blairstown on the north edge of Henry County, with a white ranch house, pas-

In the 1980s, Mike Town discovered the healing qualities of comfrey. He was living on a farm in Zimbabwe, in the southern part of Africa, where he and his family had joined a mission project, founded by five families who had pooled their resources and bought 10,000 acres to develop as a farm.

The plan: to use the farm as an economic base, and to serve as a conduit for a ministry of reconciliation for a country that had been split by revolution. The missionary families raised chickens, cows and goats, and that was how Mike learned about the medicinal qualities of comfrey, an herb which grows profusely in Africa.

"They said if you feed your chickens comfrey, they'll be immune to everything," Mike said.

Mike now lives in Clinton, where he is the owner of Integrity Floors in the East Ohio shopping center, and

makes batches of comfrey salve at home, which he sells at his store and seven other outlets.

"Every place we sell it is seeing an increase in sales," Mike said.

Mike bought Integrity Interiors 11 years ago, changing the name to Integrity Floors. He had worked

his way up in the flooring business after moving to Missouri in 1990. Born in Japan of missionary parents, Mike was 10 years old when his family came back to the states and settled in Great Falls, Montana. After high school, Mike worked in the tar sands oil fields of Northern Alberta, he said,

earning money to attend a year at an interdenominational Bible school in southern Sweden called Torchbearers.

The flooring business has been a good economic base for his large family, he said. He also raises chickens, and grows comfrey to Comfrey Page 3

Continued from page 1 ture, trails, and a barn with horse stalls.

It is not a boarding stable. All the students ride one of the C Bar C mounts, Shay said. C Bar C is home to 18 horses, three ponies and two donkeys, although the donkeys only work one day a year, Shay said, when the ranch holds a nativity program.

All the horses look calm and gentle — they've seen it all, the luminous dark eyes seem to say, even nosy reporters, and nothing would surprise them.

"We wouldn't keep them if they weren't," Shay said. "One of things I learned when I went to university is that if you work with animals, it has to be mutually beneficial to be successful."

One of the barn cats, an orange-striped tabby named Louise, is resting on a bench in the warm, clean-smelling barn, but rouses herself to sit in the visitor's lap to help take notes.

Shay has lived a number of places, she said, but thinks of Warrensburg as home. That's where she attended the University of Central Missouri. In 2013, she earned a Master's degree in Human Services, and is a certified riding therapist through Eagala, the Equine-Assisted Growth and Learning Association.

When did she start blending her faith into riding lessons?

"We started that way," Shay said. "We wanted to commit all of our work to the Lord."

Shay named the ranch after her children, Cori and Colt, she said, and turned the bar that connects their initials on the C Bar C brand into a cross, because Jesus holds everything together. The quote from Hebrews on her business card summarizes her approach to life: "Let us run with patience the race that is set before us, looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith."

Her children help with the day-to-day operation. Colt is in charge of taking care of the chickens and cows and cleaning the barn, using the tractor to haul away and bury stable rubble. Cori is in charge of cleaning the tack, having learned the fine art from Mr. Tony, of the Chap Shop in Harrisonville.

"She also helps the younger children groom their horses," Shay said.

In 2019, Shay started a one-day-a week Farm School for home-schooled children, based on a oneroom schoolhouse model. During the pandemic, the students met and played outside, she said, providing socialization and exercise. The school is taught by guest teachers, who teach a life skill at each sessionwelding, beekeeping, canning and sewing were some of the skills they've covered, Shay said. The school is limited to under 16 students. Winter Farm School begins Feb. 28.

"It's alway sold out," Shay

Still open is a Bible study next summer for women that starts with a trail ride, then convenes on the farmhouse porch for discussion. There will be Bible study for kids going on at the same time, Shay said.

On April 5, the ranch will host the Spring Cowgirl Camp Out. Boys come to the C Bar C for Cowboy Camp, Colt said. In addition to working on the ranch, he attends Rodeo Bible Camp in Gerard, Kansas, and sports a belt buckle he won for bull-riding.

Asked if he watches Westerns on television, Colt replied that he doesn't watch much television, as he is mostly outside working in the barn, although he does tune into the World

Rodeo Finals and hunting shows. When asked what he hunts, he lists all the local game —deer, turkevs , rabbits, squirrels and coyotes -plus he has gone boar hunting in Texas. He hunts with both a gun and a compound bow, he said. Shay is holding a Spring Luau Open Fun Show on March 23, and a schooling show on June 1 to showcase the skills her riding students learned during winter and spring sessions. Winter session riding lessons begin Monday, Feb. 19. She also does parties

and special events. Shay still has the first horse she gave lessons on, she said. Copenhagen is 29 years old, and is now retired. She taught her kids to ride on him and originally used him for all her riding lessons.

"He was with me through my life's changes," she said. "He is my heart."

Shay said she doesn't know if horses have souls, but she has had a few horses she hopes to see at heaven's gate.






