

# Cole Camp Passes Chicken Ordinance, Must **Be Permitted**

Under old business Thursday eve, city aldermen passed a bill that will allow residents to keep chickens. The number of fowl permitted was not publicly stated, but the group mentioned that a permit to keep fowl is still required. The bill perhaps responds to a few complaints by city residents living near owners of those animals.

The meeting opened at 7:00 PM on March 21, with Aldermen Jon Beckman, David Locke, Diana Burdick, Mindy Fox present. Mayor Bob Meuschke presided; City Clerk Dawn Paul recorded. City resident Diane Banks, living at 505 West Ferguson,

appeared at a public hearing that the group offered her to deal with an allegation that her property was a public nuisance. She responded but the group eventually affirmed that the property was indeed a public nuisance, leaving her with an ultimatum to either clean up the property, or the city will do so at her expense.

Following, the group approved the eve's agenda, February bills and financials for the city, and minutes of the February 15 meeting.

Diane Simon, who lives outside the city, then discussed a plan to modernize public restrooms in the city. She thought such an effort might cost \$16,000

**Asks For Help** In Passing **Proposition KIDS** By

The need for improvements to the buildings of the Warsaw R-9 School District has prompted the Board of Education to ask voters to approve Proposition KIDS on April 2. The bond issue will not increase the tax rate but will give the district a \$18,000,000 general bond to construct, remodel, upgrade and repair existing buildings.

R-9 According to Superintendent Scott Gemes, passage of Proposition KIDS will not increase the district tax rate.

"Warsaw R-9 has a tax rate of \$2.75 operating levy and 80 cents debt service. That rate will not change with the passage of Proposition KIDS," said Gemes.

The State of Missouri set the tax rate at \$2.75 and the school district can increase that rate. In comparison, Lincoln R-2 School District has an operating levy of \$3.4331.

In addition to adding a fifth-grade wing to the middle school, there will be multiple remodeling projects associated with Proposition KIDS.

Both a boys' and girls' bathroom will be added to WHS. Presently the only girls' and boys' restrooms are the ones originally installed when WHS was constructed in 1969. WHS

So, I reached out to businesses telling them that the kids in the community want to do this and it would be their first time going. Stephanie Anderson, Exalted Ruler of the Benton County Elks, is a friend of mine and I asked her how to get help from the Elks.

She told me to come make a presentation to the board, and I asked Brookelynn to make the presentation and answer questions."

Anderson said that Brookelynn made her presentation to some officers of the Benton County Elks Board on February 19. Board members included Stephanie Anderson, Brett Powell, Bob Waters, Genia Townsend, Marilee Carman and Brenda Michael. She said that \$1,240 was raised from the lodge as well as individual member donors.

### Public Works Director Heath Roark then discussed a possible TAP grant for engineering costs to improve the Rock Island trail. He will issue a request for a consultant to do so.

Planning and Zoning Director Tammy Eckhoff reported that P&Z met this month and was getting "the ball rolling."

Clerk Paul was requested to get more bids for replacement of windows in the Community Building, especially as to labor costs. information which would be helpful in locating Echo. The scene, however, raised more questions than we had answers for. We conducted a grid search of the area surrounding Echo's home which involved Sheriff's Offices employees, including myself, the Highway Patrol, all the area fire fighters, water patrol, the conservation department and other volunteers. Again, this search produced no answers that would help us to locate Echo or help determine what had happened to her. At that time, I knew our little office did not have the resources necessary to give this case what it was going to need, so the case was turned completely over to the DDCC.

The members of the DDCC have put in thousands of manhours on this case. They brought in expert cavers who worked the extensive cave system that exists here in Benton County. They followed leads that came in from citizens and interviewed every person that had contact with Echo as well as every other person of interest that may have been connected to her in any way. They interviewed people whose names came up from those leads and interviews as well, still producing no hard evidence of what had happened to Echo.

The DDCC is still actively investigating tips and leads that come in. Three weeks ago, the Camden County Sheriff's Office had a lead that was worked by DDCC which involved K9s and a forensic team, but unfortunately resulted in no connecting information in Echo's case. All leads, no matter how miniscule or vague, are followed up by the DDCC.

Leads that are called into the Benton County Central Dispatch or the Benton County Sheriff's Office are forwarded immediately to DDCC for action. It is the heartfelt desire by every member of the BCSO that evidence will come in that will help the DDCC solve this case. If you have any information, no matter how insignificant you may think it is, please contact the Missouri tate Highway Patrol 573-751-3452, the Missing Persons Clearinghouse at 866-362-6422 or Benton County Central Dispatch at 660-438-9555. 

Brewster earned the win in the circle for Warsaw by going the 7.0 inning distance, surrendering just 3 hits and 1 walk while striking out 13.




On Saturday, Warsaw improved to 4-1 when they rallied for 15 runs on 17 hits in a 15-4 win at Lincoln.

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### Dear Editor,

Disclaimer: As a dedicated employee of the Warsaw *R-IX School District for over* 16 years who left the district on good terms only to move out of state to be closer to family, I still only want what is best for the district. In regards to Proposition KIDS, I have nothing against the district and am only writing this article to make sure that other aspects of the upcoming bond proposal are considered and to voice my deep concern of the potential consequences. I will also share my personal opinion on what might be one better solution. (There are several other alternatives, but I don't want to make this too lengthy.)

The Warsaw R-IX School District is proposing a notax increase bond issue on this April's ballot, but is it the right thing for our school district? The proposed benefits are great on the surface: new blacktop instead of gravel, new classrooms, renovated bathrooms, etc. Yet, the question of all voters should be this. How will this financially impact the district long-term?

Right now, district finances look great. Last year's ending fund balance was probably the highest in at least 20 years, but why is that? That is easy to answer. The district received well over \$6M in ESSER federal funding (due to the Covid pandemic) over the last few years, and those dollars have boosted numbers considerably. Prior to that blessing, though, the district was struggling and even had to shut the doors on an elementary school and reduce staffing in order to reverse the downtrend. It was an incredibly tough, but at the time necessary, thing to do.

The concern with the proposed proposition on April's ballot are two-fold (at least). First and foremost, if the district was to proceed with these changes, would the district have the money to maintain and sustain them long-term? More facilities mean more energy costs, more maintenance/ upkeep costs, and more personnel costs (such as administrators, secretaries, custodians, teachers, etc.) to support them. Does the district have a way to pay for these additional expenses once the Covid money runs dry, or will its fund balance continue to decline until drastic measures have to be taken again? Renovations are one thing to use bond money for, as they can help the district pay for needed upgrades and repairs, but additions such as those proposed will only accrue additional costs that we need to know for sure we can afford ten vears down the road before approving through a vote. Given the district's past, some serious financial forecasting needs to be considered by outside entities before carrying on with these projects, because we can't walk away from these add-ons like we did RME. A three-year ballpark estimate isn't good enough for such an impact to a budget.

In addition to the facilities expenses, personnel costs should be considered. Last year the district completely restructured the certified salary schedule to help long-term financially sustain its budget. This, again, was another tough decision that the district/ board had to make to protect its finances in the future. However, adding more personnel to put in these new additions will only negate that change. The district should be careful to not let the currently high

fund balance cloud the fact that a major change was made for its certified staff less than a year ago to safeguard its future.

Now that the district has nearly reached the "Covid cliff" and won't have those extra federal dollars coming in, can it long-term sustain extra energy, maintenance, and personnel costs? What areas of funding will need to be cut in the future to sustain the extra costs associated additions: with the personnel textbooks, benefits, sports, technology, curriculum resources. . . ? Those are questions for which voters need an honest answer before voting yes this April. Furthermore, where would the district be right now without those ESSER funds? The leaking walls/windows at the HS that just got replaced would probably still be leaking, HVAC units at North/South would still be in desperate need of repair/replacement, and the district's fund balance would not be nearly as high as it is currently. That \$6M financial injection saved the district in many respects.

In other words, the district was struggling to maintain prior to Covid. Can the district continue to thrive without those extra funds? More importantly, can the district even survive if this bond passes and additional costs are added? Granted, the district's enrollment (which is a major driver of its revenues) has increased the last two years, but why is that? Is the county experiencing a large increase in new industry/ jobs resulting in more people moving within district boundaries, or is it a fluke that will slowly fade away again? Does the district have solid evidence that enrollment will stay steady or increase? If so, then voters should probably approve Proposition KIDS as space will be needed, but the future is hard to predict

without sure signs of new industry/jobs coming to the area, and caution should be taken to safeguard long-term finances.

The second concern is gleamed from data taken from the DESE website concerning the district's total adjusted operating tax (i.e., the amount collected that the district can use to fund its operations) in comparison to other districts in the state. In over 20 years, it hasn't changed from \$2.75, and the state average is now over \$3.60. That's a big difference, and less than 15% of the state's school districts are at the minimum like Warsaw. Yes, Warsaw R-IX is operating at the bottom 15% of the state's districts.

Have we seen drastic inflation in the last 20+ years? Absolutely! Then how can a school district continue to operate without an increase somewhere as well? The issue at hand is once again long-term sustainment. The district has had to make major changes (like retirement incentives, salary restructures, and even a school closure) in the past. partially because voters have not been asked to vote for an increase.

Why is this? No one likes



to pay more taxes, and it's much easier to sell a no tax increase rate bond. That's why you see it bolded on the district's website and mentioned in every newspaper article. However, this just kicks the proverbial can down the road further and doesn't solve any long-term problems. In the case of additions, it even adds long-term problems. Additionally, just because a district has the capacity of an \$18M no tax increase bond, doesn't necessarily mean it should all be pursued. Now, it's hard to know whether or not those past tough choices would have needed to have been made if we had "kept up with the times" and increased taxes, but one thing is for sure. The district would be in better financial shape overall.

No one likes to pay more taxes, but in reality a change like this has minimal impact on households and can add up to make a long-term positive impact for our students' education and the district's under-paid staff. Rather than ask for a no tax increase, it may be (past) time for the district to ask for a tax increase. . .and it's definitely time for the voters to approve it. The district's students, faculty, and staff deserve it.

In summary, voters should vote yes on the April ballot \*\*\*IF\*\*\* the district has weighed out all the longterm costs associated with these proposed changes and has a solid financial plan to accommodate the increased financial burden. However, if voters cannot see proof of that, then they should vote no for now and instead perhaps even ask the district to request an increase of taxes on the next ballot to get us more in line with the rest of the state. Let's start by stabilizing long-term funding and then revisit the topic of additions and niceties after we are sure we can afford them. Let's learn from history and practice some caution going forward.



(Continued from Page 1) and had a full night-time job at the sheriff's office before running for sheriff.

1) Why are you the person to be Sheriff of Benton County? I am a Patriot, and I am and will always be Constitutional. I am a United States Navy veteran who served my country during war time, and I chose to continue my life of servitude as sheriff. I have a proven record of success. Through my leadership and perseverance, we were able to bring a new jail facility to Benton County creating 26 new jobs and bringing in over \$2,000,000 in revenue into the county through leasing bed space to Federal inmates.

2) What do you plan to accomplish in your first 30 days? 90 days if elected to a new term? Within the first 30 days of my office, I was actively campaigning for school resource officers to be stationed within schools. I also worked with a variety of groups and individuals to raise funds for bullet resistant vests for the deputies, something they had lacked prior to my first term. Within the first 90 days I was already actively planning for a new jail facility. Two of my third term goals are to build an animal shelter attached to the jail for law enforcement use. I also have plans to start a citizen's academy, in this we would like to train groups of citizens and introduce them to some of the things that we deal with on a regular basis. The citizens academy would also include firearms training and training on the Missouri State Statutes and crime prevention.

3) What kind of leadership do you bring to the office? I feel that I am a strong leader who can lead without micromanaging my staff. I believe in surrounding with fantastic. mvself intelligent, hardworking people, then utilizing those strengths to help me make decisions which are best for the office, which equals best for our community. At the end of the day, I have no problem making hard decisions and standing behind them. 4) What is the number one thing you think needs to be changed at the sheriff's office and how would you change it if re-elected? The budget and budget constraints! We struggle daily with trying to find funds to effectively run and maintain a professional agency. There is a nationwide crisis

involving a shortage of law enforcement officers. The agencies that are blessed with a full roster can pay more and offer their employees LAGERS, the premier retirement system for government agencies which focuses on employee longevity and performance. The economy has no effect on this retirement system and allows law enforcement to retire at age 55. The fix is bringing awareness to the people, working with the county commission and finding new ways to bring income into the community without the burden of raising taxes. I have several ideas that I have presented

to the county government. 5) How do you plan to address staff morale and retention in the sheriff's office if re-elected? Morale within the office has never been higher! Even with not being able to pay as much as other counties and the lack of LAGERS, we have been able to slowly add to our ranks. We are on pace to be fully staffed by summer with some amazing people. To these people, money is not the driving force. They were looking for a home within our community because are very fortunate we to have a community who supports their law enforcement! Couple that with a Constitutional sheriff who is not afraid to mix it up for his community and on their behalf. You need a strong sheriff to stand up for your rights! I am a fighter, and I don't apologize for it, I have fought for your rights with Covid regulations and gun control. I have fought within the state government at the Capital to defend your constitutional rights and I continue to fight the Federal Government and their overreach. I will continue to do so if I am your sheriff.

6) How will you approach budget cuts or financial constraints in the office going forward? I will stand against any budget cuts, our community deserves a well-paid, well trained, and professional sheriff's office. The community, early on, saw a need to help with funding and additional gear that was not allowed for in the budget. The Friends of the Benton County Sheriff was born. This group works closely with the sheriff's office and has been instrumental in helping to fund the original bullet resistant vest program, our drone program, K9 program, benevolent program and now our MILO program. (Multiple of aging and division of

Interactive Learning Objectives). MILO is a state-of-the-art shooting simulator that will allow law enforcement and, in the future, citizens the ability to train with firearms in real world situations, virtually. In addition to the Friends of the BCSO, we apply for every grant available to us, bringing in thousands of dollars for gear and training. If we should find ourselves short on funding or in need of additional funding, I will always reach out to the people and inform them of what is going on and what is needed. The office of sheriff belongs to the people.

7) What will you do to improve transparency from the sheriff's office? In my opinion this is the most transparent sheriff's office this county has ever had. One of my first priorities when I took office was to open the lines of communication between the citizens of Benton County and its sheriff's office. I instituted a website for the office so citizens can see the office's information and who is currently housed in the county jail. I started a Facebook page to better reach the citizens of Benton County and currently have a following of over 14,000. I regularly share my thoughts and keep followers informed on current situations. I also share articles in the Benton County Enterprise, the Lincoln New Era, and the Cole Camp Courier to keep citizens updated on the Sheriff's Office activities.

8) What strategies have you implemented to tackle drug related crimes? In my estimate, drug related crimes make up over 70% of the crime here in Benton County in one form or other. We work closely with the Mid-Missouri Drug Task Force who operates within our borders in an undercover capacity. Early on as sheriff, I helped neighborhoods my version start of watches, neighborhood there is power in numbers! When neighborhoods take a stand and get involved, all crime goes down. Drugs are not just a law enforcement problem, its everyone's problem.

9) What strategies have

family services. We have and will continue to deal strongly with those who commit crimes against our very young and our more mature citizens.

10) Finally, how do you plan to address the increase of cybercrime? Since my time in the office, I have added a detective's division who can concentrate on all crimes to include cybercrime. We are also a member of a cybercrimes task force whose sole existence is to track down and deal with crimes relating to the internet.

Andrew Breshears was raised in Southern Benton County, Edwards, and helped run the family farm while attending Warsaw High School. He was a leader and mentor in school sports and other school activities and graduated in 2005. He then helped manage the day-to-day operations of the family construction business for many years. In 2012 he decided to follow his passion of helping and serving the community and joined the police academy in Warrensburg, graduating at the end of that year. He then went to work at the Benton County Sheriff's Office where he had the joy of serving Benton County while raising a family. He has taken pride in upholding a high level of respect, integrity, and dedication to the citizens of the county, and in being active with youth sports in hopes of building a strong future of leaders and active members of the community for the future.

1) Why are you the best person to be Sheriff of Benton County? I believe I would benefit Benton County due to having a wide range of knowledge of the county and the citizens who live within Benton County. I will make it a priority to protect and uphold the rights of the citizens of Benton County. I take pride in being involved in the community positive and lending leadership and guidance to not only the office but the citizens alike. As a father in this community, I understand how important it is for our organization to get more involved in the schools and community. After all they are the future of our country. A good sheriff must be able to maintain composure in stressful situations and having 10 plus years working for the sheriff's office I know this is a quality I possess. 2) What do you plan to accomplish in your first 30

days? 90 days? In the first 30 days, I would work to reinstate relationships with other agencies within the county. After all we need to work together as a team to make Benton County strong and a safe place to live and raise a family. The Sheriff's Office cannot do it alone, it takes a community. This will be achieved by communicating and setting a foundation and goals with all agencies and the county commission and working as one for the best interest of the community. In those 90 days, I would work to have more community involvement. The Sheriff's Office cannot be effective in protecting and serving the community if it does not have the trust and respect of the people we serve.

3) What kind of leadership will you bring to the Sheriff's Office? I will bring strong positive leadership to the office, leading by example and being involved in the everyday workings of the office. A leader needs to be present not only in the office but also in the field and willing to lend a hand when guidance is needed. I feel my vast range of experience and knowledge will be beneficial in guiding the office in quality service to the community.

4) What do you think is the number one thing that needs to be changed at the Sheriff's office and how would you change it? The number one change I see within the Sheriff's Office is positive leadership and relationships with the community and other local agencies. I will make it a priority to restore these relationships and uphold a higher standard of service to the community. In return it will help bring willing and qualified deputies wanting to work for Benton County.

5) What steps will you take to ensure privacy and the rights of citizens are respected? I will stand with the people of the community to protect and uphold the constitution. The constitution and our rights are dear to my heart and protecting those rights is priority in these times.

6) How do you plan to aaaress morale ana retention in the Sheriff's Office? I strive to have the trust and respect of the deputies and staff which is earned by listening and considering opinions and ideas. I believe the job is rewarding when there is positive involvement and feedback. This is achieved by giving positive

leadership and guidance. The low staffing issue can be restored when the Office personnel feel appreciated and trusted by its leadership and the community.

How will you 7) approach budget cuts or financial constraints in the department? The Sheriff's Office will work tirelessly with the commission to ensure the best use of taxpayers spending. The budget should reflect the community's best interest and how it will benefit the citizens of Benton County.

8) What will you do to improve transparency from the Sheriff's Department? The Sheriff's Office will work to keep the public informed in a timely manner, through social media and face to face interaction as I believe interacting with the citizens is paramount.

9) What strategies will you implement to tackle drug related crime? I believe high visibility and patrol are key to curbing drug related crimes. I also plan to have a strong working relationship with our local drug taskforce. It is also important to provide offenders with resources and avenues to make change rather than just releasing them back to the community with no guidance.

10) What strategies will you take to protect the vulnerable in Benton *County?* I plan to get back full staff to ensure more patrols in the rural areas of the county. A presence in the rural areas of the county will not only deter crime but help ensure the community the Sheriff's Office will be there in their time of need or concern. The Sheriff's office is responsible for providing assistance to the community beyond patrol and responding to calls for service. The Sheriff's Office will also strive to provide further resources to ensure the safety and knowledge of the citizens of Benton County.

11) Finally, how do you plan to address the increase of cyber-crime? I plan to be involved and partner with locale awareness groups and build a working relationship with the local cyber task force team, το spread awareness and knowledge to the community and younger generation on the risk and dangers of the internet and social media.

One of your important sources of retirement income will likely be Social Security - but when should vou start taking it?

You can start collecting Social Security benefits at 62, but your checks will be considerably bigger if you wait until your full retirement age, which is likely between 66 and 67. 
