"Since the first of the year, we have had several businesses open up as well as plans for many more in the coming months," said Lane.

On Main Street, Michelle Branson has opened her new store, Main Event Wedding, Boutique and Rental. Branson has been in business awhile in Warsaw, but recently moved to the downtown area.

Another new business is Velvet Studio located in the building next door to the Benton County Enterprise. Alyssa Tinney and Mikayla Barkley are the owners. Barkley is a tattoo artist and Tinney creates permanent make-up such as lashes, eyebrows and tattoos.

City Administrator Outlines Unique Walking, Biking **Trail System**



In a short session Monday eve, City of Warsaw Administrator Randy Pogue discussed an ambitious plan to build a five foot wide walking and biking trail and "landscape calming" features in and around the city, through a projected RAISE project. He added that, with a fully described plan, city residents will be able to understand the project's vision, but cautioned that the plan is presently in a stage which is yet unfunded and it's costs could be beyond the monies which will become available. Yet this project, if it becomes reality, would address a long-standing concern among many for a trail that could serve other than motorized traffic.

The meeting opened at 6:00 PM, with Aldermen Lou Breshears, Rob Coskey, Adam Howe, Eric Flores present. Absent was Alderman Reba Slavens. Mayor Eddie Simons presided; City Clerk Jessica Kendall recorded.

(Continued from Page 1) four decades the Bradford pear would appear on the categorized lists of invasive trees in nearly all the eastern, midwestern and southern states.

In the early 1900s, United States pear orchards were in danger of being wiped out by fire blight disease. The U.S. Department of Agriculture sent Frank Meyer, a scientist, to China to search for a disease resistant fruit variety. Meyer collected several hundred pounds of the Chinese Callery pear seeds. He headed to Shanghai on a riverboat in 1918. The boat arrived with the seeds but Meyer was missing. His body was later found in the river, the cause was never determined.

Meyer's Callery pear seeds were shipped to the USDA Plant Station in Glen Dale, Maryland. Over the next three decades plant scientists found that the Callery pear was fire blight resistant but it did not produce edible fruit. Although it had little value for orchard growers, the Glen Dale station chief, Charles Bradford, thought the Callery pear might make a good oriental tree. He was working on its development when he collapsed of a heart attack in 1951.

Frank L. Creech continued Bradford's work. He found one variety of the Callery pear tree had a pleasing shape and produced a proliferation of white flowers. Creech reproduced the tree and eight years later the carefully pruned test trees were deemed a success. Creech named the tree Bradford pear in honor of his deceased boss.

By 1962, the Bradford was available pear commercially and became one of the most widely planted ornamental trees in the United States. All ornamental pears originate from Pyrus calleryana, commonly referred to as Bradford pear.

The trees were very popular because of their prolific spring flowers, dark glossy leaves and ability to thrive in almost any kind of soil and becaus a hybrid, people thought they were sterile, therefore having no messy fruits to contend with. The tree grew only 20-25 feet tall, retained its oval shape and in the fall, leaves had brilliant colors. In 1966, Lady Bird Johnson planted a Bradford pear in Washington, DC publicizing its use as a landscape tree.

pear populations have exploded and threatened native biodiversity as the trees steadily march into our native grasslands and forested areas, even becoming a headache for land developers.

Callery pear (Bradford pear) continues to be one of the most invasive tree species in our area.

(Continued from Page 1) solicitation or award of a city contract may protest to the City Administrator, adding other provisions to the ordinance. Aldermen then approved a resolution for the City Administrator to submit a Transportation Assistance Program (TAP) grant in the amount of \$600,000 for Main Street improvements. The city will contribute matching funds of \$508,136 for a total project cost of \$1,108,136. Administrator Pogue said the funds would fund a gap in Main Street improvement from Hackberry to Illinois streets, adding that this project will possibly take place in about two years.

In late session, the Administrator discussed a TAP update which would involve selection of an engineer to plan improvements to the south side of Main Street.

The group completed its open session at about 6:12 PM, followed by a closed executive session.

to the Fast forward 21st century when conservationists and forestry scientists were calling the Bradford pear an "invasive tree". By 2011, at least 26 states had reported problems with the spread of wild Callery (Bradford) pear.

In 2007, Theresa Cully, an Ohio scientist, documented the reason for the spread of wild Callery pears. As other cultivars were developed and released, each cultivar was genetically different from the others which meant they could, and did, cross with each other producing lots of fruit and seedlings trees. Birds ate the fruit and scattered the seeds across the landscape. The proliferation of wild Callery pear thickets has been wide spread, most noticeably around municipalities and noncultivated areas. Its invasive spread has been largely uncontrolled. Callery

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Ladycats Roll To Second Straight **Championship At Buffalo Tourney**



ANOTHER TOURNEY, ANOTHER TROPHY for the Warsaw Ladycats as they used some impressive offensive performances and superb pitching to power their way to a first place finish at the 2024 Buffalo Softball Invitational. Warsaw pummeled Spokane, 19-0; came from behind to win 3-2 over Buffalo and then shutout Fair Grove, 12-0 for the title.



In a highly anticipated and long awaited rematch of last vear's quarterfinal game when Warsaw lost to Fair Grove, 6-1, the two met again on Saturday in the championship of the Buffalo Softball Invitational where the Ladycats flipped the script and toppled the Lady Eagles with a lopsided 12-0 shutout to take first place for the second consecutive year.

Warsaw (10-1) opened the scoring in the top of the second inning thanks to a leadoff double by Bri Fellers and back-to-back singles by Jaylen McCullick and Sara Miller to put Warsaw up, 2-0.

That score remained until the top of the fifth when the Ladycats went on a 2-out rally, led off with a single by Brylee Brewster. Three more singles off the bats

of Fellers, McCullick and Miller drove in 3 runs to make it 5-0.

Like she did the entire game, Brewster held the Lady Eagles (7-5) at bay in the bottom of the inning and Warsaw tacked on 1 more run in the top of the sixth to make it 6-0.

The Ladycats put the game out of reach in the top of the seventh when they scored 6 runs on 7 hits. A double by Miller led off the inning and she advanced to 3rd on an errant throw. Autum Walton grounded out but scored Miller. Mady Reimund followed with a single of her own and came around to score on a double by Haylee Cobb. Singles from Adison Sherrill, Tanna Howe, Brewster and Fellers all led to runs to give the Ladycats the 12-0 final.

Sherrill, Brewster, Fellers and Miller all had 3 hits for Warsaw while 2 apiece were added by Howe and McCullick.

Brewster threw the 7

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inning complete game for the win. She gave up 0 runs on 5 hits and struck out 9 for the Ladycats.

Coming into the weekend, Warsaw held down the #3 spot in the Class 2 poll while Fair Grove, at 5-4 (then) was ranked #9.

The Ladycats trip to the championship game was hard-earned when they had to come from behind to beat Buffalo, 3-2 in their semifinal.

Trailing 2-1 in the bottom of the fifth frame, and with 2 outs, Warsaw's Adison Sherrill reached first base when she was hit by a pitch, bringing Tanna Howe to the plate. Working a 2-0 count, Howe's next pitch was a called strike on a questionable check swing. With the count at 2-1, Howe saw the next pitch and blasted it over the centerfield fence for a 2-run homerun to erupt the Warsaw dugout and put the Ladycats in front, 3-2.

Brylee Brewster took the reigns from there in the top of the sixth. She issued a leadoff walk but got a strikeout for out number one, induced a groundout for out number two and got an easy popout for out number three to seal the past the Spokane Lady Owls in a 19-0 shellacking.

A far more tried-and-true approach is the "slow-and-steady"

method. To follow this strategy, consider these suggestions: • Start small — and add more when you can. But longterm investors try to own a range of assets - U.S. and foreign stocks, bonds, government securities, certificates of deposit, and so on.

"Slow and steady" may not sound like an exciting approach to investing. But it's often the case that a little less excitement, and a lot more diligence, can prove to be quite effective.

releases for the week – Missouri House Passes HB

1413 to Safeguard Election Integrity

The Missouri House has passed HB 1413, a crucial piece of legislation aimed at ensuring the integrity of elections within the state. The bill introduces a requirement for Missouri driver's licenses or nondriver's licenses issued to citizens of the United States, including naturalized citizens, to bear a distinguishing mark indicating their citizenship status on the front of the license.

HB 1413 emphasizes the importance of clarifying citizenship status identification documents used for voting. This bill specifies that the license holder is a citizen of the U.S. and would denote such through a distinguishing mark. Many Missourians believe that only citizens should be allowed to vote, and that is the intent of our current laws. We believe it should be easy for legal citizens to vote in our state, and not cheat the system.

The proposed legislation addresses existing loopholes in the law that create challenges in preventing non-citizens from voting. Certain practices by contracted Department of Motor Vehicle (DMV) services have inadvertently registered individuals who are not citizens or are otherwise ineligible vote. By implementing to a citizenship marker on identification documents required for voting, the bill aims to empower election workers to screen potential voters at polling places effectively.

Some of our current laws have a blind spot in identifying violations related to non-citizen voting. It is very difficult to verify legal citizenship, as our election authorities have no tools to do so. Non-citizens have been verified as having been placed on voter rolls, and unfortunately, most are only discovered through special circumstances.

HB 1413 not only seeks to safeguard the integrity of Missouri's elections but also aims to restore public trust in the voting process. By clarifying citizenship status on identification documents, we reinforce the principle that only eligible citizens should have the privilege of voting. This measure is vital in preserving the integrity of Missouri's elections and restoring faith in our democratic process. The bill will now proceed to the Senate for further consideration.

The Missouri House of Representatives has taken a significant step towards addressing concerns over rising property taxes with the passage of HJR 78. The bill proposes a constitutional amendment aimed at providing relief to homeowners burdened by escalating property tax rates.

HJR 78 seeks to freeze the assessed value of residential properties maintained as primary residences at their most recent assessment value, starting January 1, 2025. This measure aims to alleviate the financial strain on homeowners, particularly seniors, who face the risk of losing their homes due to soaring property taxes.

The passage of HJR 78 comes in response to the escalating issue of soaring property assessments, which sparked has widespread discontent among citizens grappling with unexpectedly high property valuations. highlights Recent data that property assessments in Jackson County have resulted in increased assessed valuations for approximately 238,000 residential parcels, totaling over \$2.6 billion. Consequently, thousands of residents have lodged appeals seeking adjustments to their property valuations.

This legislation is a crucial step towards ensuring fairness and stability for homeowners across our state. Citizens have been asking for answers regarding their tax assessments, and by freezing property assessments and implementing reasonable limits on increases, we are providing muchneeded relief to hardworking Missourians struggling to keep up with rising taxes.

HJR 78 reflects our commitment to supporting homeowners and safeguarding their property rights, while also ensuring that our tax system in the Show-Me State is fair, transparent, and equitable.

Enhancing Employment Security for Workers

The Missouri House of Representatives is looking to bolster employment security for workers across the state with the passage of HB 2098. This legislation would align Missouri with 35 other states that have passed similar measures, aiming to modify the definition of "wages" to include additional forms of compensation and ensure fair evaluation of eligibility for unemployment benefits.

Under HB 2098, wages would now include vital elements like vacation pay, termination pay, severance pay, and holiday pay. This expanded definition acknowledges the various ways workers are compensated, incorporating these crucial forms of payment into their weekly wage calculations. This inclusive approach provides a more comprehensive safety net for workers during periods of transition or financial need. Moreover, the bill tackles situations where individuals receive lump sum payments, such as severance or termination pay. It mandates that these payments be prorated on a weekly basis, ensuring equitable distribution over relevant weeks. By enhancing the integrity of the unemployment benefits system, HB 2098 safeguards workers' rights and financial stability. This bill fixes a loophole in the Missouri unemployment law that currently allows people receiving severance pay and other termination payments to also collect unemployment benefits at the same time. The unemployment fund exists to assist those who are unemployed through no fault of their own and to provide a short bridge to their next job. When an employer has already provided that bridge, unemployment benefits should not be received until those payments have been exhausted. By recognizing a broader range of compensation and implementing fair evaluation practices for lump sum payments, we are advancing policies that prioritize the wellbeing and economic resilience of our workers.

After our legislative spring break, we are finishing up a short week here at the Capitol as we approach the Easter Holiday this weekend. It was a productive week at the Capitol, the House continues to perfect our bills and send them over to the Senate for their consideration. As of our adjournment today, the House has Third-Read 63 bills in total, all of which have been, or soon will be sent to the Senate. The next major milestone for the House this session will be beginning the consideration of budget bills. Every year the House Budget Committee works hard to draft and bring budget bills before the House, where we as a body will consider the appropriations for the year.

I am also pleased to share that this week, I presented one of my bills, HB. 1688 in front of the House Special Committee on Technology & Innovation. Simply put, HB. 1688 requires public schools to offer a driver education course that students must complete before graduating. This is a bill that I have worked on for many years

Missouri House Passes Legislation to Expand Access to Health Care Benefits for Farmers

The Missouri House of Representatives has approved HB 2082, aimed at improving access to affordable health care for farmers statewide. This legislation, backed with strong support, addresses the urgent need for accessible health care coverage in rural areas.

HB 2082 specifies that contracts offering health care benefits by qualified organizations, membership like agricultural or farm bureaus, will not be classified as insurance under state law. In 2024, Missouri joins five other states-Wisconsin, Nebraska, Alabama, Mississippi, and Florida-in considering new Farm Bureau healthcare plans. HB 2082 represents a significant step towards providing essential health services without imposing excessive financial burdens. Expanding health care benefits through qualified membership organizations will empower the agricultural community promote and economic development in rural Missouri, and the plan for coverage with the Missouri Farm Bureau directly responds to members' needs for more tailored coverage options amid rising costs.

This bill will move the Missouri Farm Bureau and qualified membership its organizations away from the oversight of the Department of Commerce and Insurance to offer health coverage. It will operate similarly to existing models, providing members with access to competitively priced health coverage options. With its approval in the House, HB 2082 now moves to the Missouri Senate for further consideration.

Providing Relief from Escalating Property Taxes

Missouri House Passes Bill to Boost Rural Business Investments

The Missouri House of Representatives has approved HB 2170, also known as the "Missouri Rural Access to Capital Act," with the aim of boosting investments in rural businesses statewide. This legislation establishes a mechanism for investors to inject capital into rural funds, thereby fostering economic development and job creation in underserved regions. Key features of the bill include

tax credits for investors over a six-year period, starting at 0% for the initial two years and escalating to 15% for the subsequent four years. The bill imposes an annual cap of \$16 million on authorized tax credits and mandates a rigorous application process for rural funds, requiring past investment experience, a business plan, and a nonrefundable application fee. Qualified investments must meet specific criteria regarding business size, location, and industry. The Department of Economic Development the authority retains to recapture tax credits if investment requirements are not fulfilled, and rural funds must submit annual reports on business investments and economic impact. Additionally, rural funds have the option to exit the program after six years, subject to conditions. These provisions are scheduled to

expire on August 28, 2030. HB 2170 represents a crucial initiative in revitalizing rural economies in Missouri by facilitating access to capital for mid-sized businesses in rural areas, thereby laying the groundwork for sustained prosperity and opportunity statewide. The bill underscores the significance of investing in rural communities for the future of Missouri, empowering local businesses to thrive and driving economic growth and prosperity for all citizens. Its passage signifies a significant milestone in addressing economic disparities between urban and rural areas, supported by strong bipartisan backing and endorsements from key stakeholders, promising a meaningful impact on Missouri's rural landscape. Missouri House Passes HB 2142 to Expand Broadband

Access The Missouri House of Representatives has passed HB 2142, an initiative aimed at bolstering broadband infrastructure and expanding internet access to underserved communities across the state.

HB 2142 seeks to provide a tax deduction for funds received as grants to facilitate the provision or expansion of broadband internet in areas lacking connectivity. Currently, taxpayers can deduct federal grant money designated for this purpose from their state income tax. The bill extends this deduction to encompass state or local grant money, contingent upon the funds' earmarking for broadband development.

HB 2142 represents а crucial stride toward ensuring equitable access to essential broadband services for all Missourians. By incentivizing investment in broadband infrastructure through tax deductions, we are empowering communities to unlock their full potential and thrive in the digital age. Access to reliable broadband internet is not just a convenience but a necessity in today's interconnected world. The passage of HB 2142 underscores our commitment to ensuring that every Missourian has the tools they need to

compete and succeed in the 21st century economy.
