During the evening, attendees placed bids on items offered for the silent auction. A live auction was held after dinner with Larry Drenon Auction providing their services.

One of the top items for the auction was a set of "The History of Benton County, Missouri" books by Kathleen Kelly White and Kathleen White Miles. The books were published in the 1969. Lincoln Swears In New And Returning Board Officials

In mid session Monday eve City Clerk Sabrina Brown read the certification of election results furnished by the office of the Benton County Clerk, then swore in re-elected Mayor Glen Nelson and returning Aldermen Jack Lietzke, and newly elected Alderman Seth Casey.

The meeting opened at 6:00 PM on April 8, with Aldermen Lietzke, Barbara Hammond, Phil Fisher present. Alderman Janice Swearngin was absent. Mayor Nelson presided; Clerk Brown recorded.

First actions by the group were to approve an amended agenda, minutes of its March meeting and an amended agenda, then okay payment of bills presented.

Then County Economic Developer Jo Ann Lane presented information on a recent "Connecting Entrepreneurial Communities Conference" recently held in Benton County. One of the quickest shrimp alfredo recipes is easily made in one pan, in the oven for about 30 minutes and voila, dinner. And most of the ingredients are probably pantry staples already in your house.

4 tablespoons butter (plus more for the casserole dish) 12 ounces rotini pasta 1 pound frozen, peeled and deveined medium shrimp 2 cups chicken broth

1/4 teaspoon red pepper
flakes
2 cloves garlic, minced

Salt and pepper ½ cup grated Parmesan

1/3 cup loosely packed fresh parsley, chopped

fresh parsley, chopped ½ cup heavy cream, warmed

Preheat oven to 425 degrees: Grease bottom and sides of a 9"x13" casserole dish

Spread rotini in an even layer over the bottom of the dish, scatter shrimp over top, dot with cubes of butter. Pour in broth, sprinkle with red pepper flakes, garlic, salt and pepper. Cover and bake until pasta is al dente, about 25-30 minutes.

Meanwhile, toss the cheese and parsley. When the pasta is done, stir in the warm cream and then top with cheese mixture.

April through mid-May. Reall, Tamra Horticulturalist with Missouri University Extension, also known as 'Dr. Bug,' said "it will be crazy!" Cicadas are not locusts as some mistakenly call them. They do not bite or sting humans or domestic pets, and do not carry diseases. Therefore, Reall recommends against using pesticides which can be harmful. New trees or bushes that may be susceptible to damage can be protected with loose covers of cheesecloth.

Brood XIII (Northern Illinois Brood), underground for the last 17 years, and Brood XIX (Great Southern Brood), the largest of all and underground for the last 13 years, have not emerged together since 1803. The co-emergence of these two specific broods will not occur again until 2245.

After the temperature at 8 inches underground reaches 64° F for several consecutive days, much of Missouri, a "hot spot" for the 2024 cicadas according to Reall, could experience up to 1.5 million of four different species of Brood XIX cicadas per acre. Farther away, people in the Springfield, IL area might also see three different species of the Brood XIII cicadas, especially in or near wooded areas. Overall, however, the broods are not expected to overlap to any significant degree.

Cicadas emerge for the sole purpose to mate, shortly after which both males and females die. Males "sing out" mating calls particular to their species that can be " as loud as a lawnmower. " Females lay their eggs in tree branches. The nymphs fall to the ground, burrow into the soil, which is enriched by them, and the 13-year or 17-year cycle begins again.

These two broods are known as "Magicicadas." Considering the number of predators threatening them, their survival does seem magical. Their large swarms make them easy targets for other insects like wasps, spiders and ants. Birds, bats. squirrels, snakes, lizards, raccoons, opossums, and fish also find them tasty. Not only insects, rodents, and fish makes meals of cicadas. Cicadas are herbivores, edible also for humans. Even so, the FDA recommends that people with shellfish allergies do

The website CicadaSafari. org describes periodical locations cicadas, maps where Broods XIII and XIX will emerge, suggests activities for learning about cicadas, offers free downloads, and provides links to other websites and books on the subject. A free Cicada Safari app can be downloaded from Apple or Google Play stores. Tamra Reall encourages Missourians to use it. Help map the locations of cicadas by searching for them to take and submit photographs.

Sometime this month or in May we will know whether the prediction that a horde of cicadas will emerge here was accurate. If so, the sights and sounds of millions of Brood XIX cicadas in Benton County will be unmistakable!

Let's wait and see.

She also reported there will be a county "Spring Boutique Crawl" on April 12-13, and a Credit Workshop on April 24 for anybody who wants to improve their credit; then added that the Heights venue is now available for rent, and the Premier Automotive lot and building are for sale. She observed that at a USDA meeting last week, she found that many grants and loans were available through USDA.

Police Chief Jason Wenberg said that in March his department received about 42 calls for service, made 9 traffic stops, wrote 2 motor vehicle accident reports, issued 4 summons, and made one arrest.

Public Works Director Josh Cole reported the water tower has been sample tested and is back on-line, his department is crack sealing roads, well #3 switch was replaced, west lift pumps were pulled - plugged again with wipes, drainage behind the school was re-routed because of ground saturation, and the department cleaned out junk in the water tower area, and had a DNR inspection.

City Clerk Brown reported a recent software upgrade, and said there will be a June training session for the city's elected officers.

Just before the session closed at about 6:20 PM, Mayor Nelson said the next meeting will include a budget review and further discussion on a proposed food truck ordinance.

It seemed like it took forever for them to get in range, but once they crossed our path, the Tom's spread out enough to safely take a shot. I didn't think I could do this because of how nervous I was. It was my first time turkey hunting. At about 33 yards I finally gained confidence and took the shot on the Tom in the front. I used a Mossberg 410 SA shotgun and a Hevi-18 TSS shot shell. The turkey dropped to the ground and flopped around for a while. With all the work that it took to get prepared for this hunt and all the waiting for them... Pulling the trigger seemed easy, but turkey hunting is anything but. After the bird had laid still for several minutes. We went to check and see if it was really dead. It was and we noticed it had two beards, one large and one small. Then after looking at the spurs, we noticed it was banded by the Missouri conservation department. I didn't know what that meant...but quickly found out how unique that is. Once I got back home, I used the MDC app to report that I had harvested a turkey and I took a closer look at the band, I contacted the number on it and left a message. I'm excited to hear back from them because my grandma found out that I may be getting a certificate from them and the band mentions a reward.



powerful men are coming to take him. Jesus doesn't rebuke him but asks where do you think they collect their taxes from, their families or from others? The powerful people don't collect from their powerful friends, they collect from the weak. Jesus then asks if they need to pay a tax for God's house since everything we have already belongs to God. Jesus tells Peter, we don't have to pay it because God's house is taken care of, but so we don't offend them, go to the lake, and throw out your line. Take the first fish you catch; open its mouth and you will find a coin. Take it and give it to them to pay my tax and yours. They had no home or source of income; they had nothing to pay with, but it wasn't worth upsetting others.

There is sometimes a difference in knowing something and doing something about it. Jesus never talked about someone drinking alcohol or other such things and sometimes we create our own Temple Tax. Are we building Temple Tax or scripture. What is the limit we are willing to sacrifice ourselves to reach other for Jesus? Jesus is getting the disciples to think, and maybe thinking is something we as believers need to do. Why do we do the stuff we do. We shouldn't get mad when some do it different than we do. Think more, read more, and pray more. Don't write people off. We've got to get back to Jesus! Jesus is enough!


Darnell suffered moderate injuries and was flown to University Hospital in Columbia.



We all hope to remain healthy and independent throughout our lives – but life can be unpredictable. If you were ever to need some type of long-term care, would you be financially prepared?

The median annual cost for a home health aide's services is more than \$60,000 per year, and it's more than \$100,000 per year for a private room in a nursing home, according to Genworth, an insurance company. Furthermore, contrary to many people's Medicare expectations, usually pays very little of these costs.

Of course, some people expect their family will be able to take care of their long-term care needs. But this may not be a viable strategy. For one thing, your family members simply may not have the skills needed to give you the type of care you may require. Also, by the time you might need help, your grown children or other family members might not live in your area.

So, you may need to protect yourself and your loved ones from the potential costs of long-term care. Basically, you've got two main choices: You could self-insure or you could transfer the risk by purchasing some type of long-term care insurance.

If you have considerable financial resources, you might find self-insuring to be attractive, rather than choosing insurance and paying policy premiums. You may wish to keep an emergency savings or investment account that's earmarked exclusively for long-term care to help avoid relying on your other retirement accounts. But self-insuring has two main drawbacks. First, because long-term care can be costly, you might need to plan for a significant amount. And second, it will be quite hard to predict

exactly how much money you'll need, because so many variables are involved - your age when you start needing care, interest rates or inflation, the cost of care in your area, the type of care you'll require, the length of time you'll need care, and so on.

As an alternative to selfinsuring, you could purchase long-term care insurance, which can provide benefits for home health care, adult day care and assisted living and nursing home facilities. However, you will need to consider the issues attached to long-term care insurance. For one thing, it can be expensive, though the younger you are when you buy your policy, the more affordable it may be. Also, long-term care policies typically require you to wait a certain amount of time before benefits are paid. But policies vary greatly in what they offer, so, if you are thinking of buying this insurance, you'll want to review options and compare benefits and costs.

In any case, by being aware of the potential need for long-term care, its cost and the ways of paying for it, you'll be able to make the appropriate decisions for your financial situation, your needs and your loved

You show your support with a wave and a friendly hello, or by showing up at the office with baked goods. You bring in toys for children, which the deputies hand out during their shift, and you donate to our projects. You've formed a group, the Friends of the Benton County Sheriff's office, made up of involved citizens who want to actively make a difference in our community with the sheriff's office. Our community is amazing and the appreciation from myself and my staff cannot be understated.

The other reason is, you have a patriotic sheriff who supports the Constitution. One who fights for his employees and fights for our community against state and Federal overreach. This has made a difference to those joining our ranks, and those who have stayed through all the challenges. I am very proud of what we have built together. The new jail and sheriff's office has been a huge success. We now provide a safe working environment for our staff.
