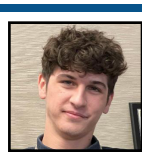

Wine Warriors Will Saunter Main Street

Thousands of people are expected to visit the downtown area of Warsaw on April 27, for the 13th Annual Benton County Wine Stroll sponsored by the Benton County Community Foundation (BCCF).

According to BCCF Board member Suzie Brodersen, over 800 tickets have already been sold and many of the participants will purchase tickets the day of the event.

"We are really excited about the Wine Stroll and are anticipating a great turnout," said Brodersen.

Twenty-one Missouri Wineries have committed to serving up samples at the annual event. In new business Thursday eve, following City Clerk Dawn Paul's reading of election results furnished by the of Benton County Clerk's office, she swore in new Mayor Diana Burdick who was formerly a city alderman, returning Alderman Mindy Fox, and newly elected Alderman Jeremiah Crider. The group also appointed Steve Knox to serve in Mayor Burdick's former position, and prior to appointment of new officers, plaques of appreciation were given to Alderman Fox and Mayor Meuschke.

The meeting opened at 7:00 PM on, April 18, with Aldermen Fox, Burdick and David Locke present. Alderman Jon Beckman was absent. Mayor Bob Meuschke presided; Clerk Paul recorded. The group then approved the eve's agenda, payment of March bills, and its March 21 meeting minutes.

In old business, they approved one of four bids received for purchase of a 2015 Silverado truck; a \$17,500 bid submitted by Fabrau Charles, of Lexington.

When fresh peas are in season, I could have them for every meal. We are in luck now to have really good frozen peas all year round. The following is a quick stew like concoction using peas that my grandmother used to make since we always had a lot of ham needing to be used.

- 1-1/2 teaspoons butter
- 1-1/2 teaspoon corn or canola oil
- 3/4 cup chopped onion and add a couple of diced scallions if you have them
- 1-1/2 teaspoon flour
- 3 carrots (about 6 ounces) peeled and cut into very small pieces

Heat butter and oil in saucepan, add onion and scallions, sauté over high heat for 2 minutes. Add flour, mix well, cook for about 1 minute, add 1

cup water, carrots, salt, pepper and herbs. Bring to boil, cover and cook for 2 minutes. Add peas, cover and simmer gently for about 6-8 minutes or until the peas are tender. Add ham, bring to a boil to heat. Serve.

In addition to the Benton County Wine Stroll wine glass there will be lanyards for sale as well as wine bottle bags and t-shirts.

The Benton County Wine Stroll is the main fund-raising event for the Benton County Community Foundation. The BCCF's main goal is to establish endowed funds for the purpose of conducting a flexible community grant making program which addresses the most important needs of the community at any one time. This year the Patterson Family Foundation will be matching the money raised by the Benton County Wine Stroll to double the money that will be available for grants issued to local non-profit organizations.

"We are very fortunate to have such a successful Wine Stroll," said Board member Randy Eaton. "The Wine Stroll has grown every year and is the main fund raiser for the BCCF. Because of the Wine Stroll and the Patterson Family Foundation, we have been able to offer \$50,000 in grants to local organizations."

Any non-profit organization (501c3) in Benton County can apply for a grant in the fall.

In the past several years, BCCF has granted funds to the Benton County Historical Society, the Cole Camp Museum, the Food Bank, the three county school districts and annual scholarships to a graduating senior in each of the three county high schools.

Since the founding in August 1999, Benton County Community Foundation has distributed thousands of dollars in grants to the community. They now hold assets totaling over a million dollars.

(Continued from Page 1) State in Springfield where she earned a degree in journalism in 2020.

"I graduated during the pandemic so there weren't many job opportunities which gave me time to search for the right opportunity," said Mais. She was hired as a producer for KY3 in 2021 and began working on the 5:00 AM news and morning show, "Ozarks Today".

"I go to work at 10:30 AM at night and work through the night preparing for the early morning shows," said Mais. "I work with reporters to pull stories from the area and our sister stations as well as setting up graphics to go with their stories."

KY3 was a perfect choice as Mais' employment as she had grown up watching reporters such as Ron Hearst and Brandon Beck.

"As a girl in Warsaw, I watched KY3 News every day and I felt like I knew the reporters and now I get to work with them every day," said Mais. "It was a privilege to be able to advocate for my hometown of Warsaw to get the KY3 team to come here to present our show and to get the people of Warsaw on the air."

Mais' high school journalism teacher was elated to see her former student succeeding in her chosen field.

"Makayla was one of the hardest working students I have ever had and I am so proud that she followed

the passion for journalism that she developed in high school. She is going to continue to do big things and find great success," said WHS journalism teacher Amanda Adler!

Mais' other high school teachers were also excited to see their former student shine.

"Seeing Makayla shine doing her dream job makes a teacher's heart so happy. If you ask Makayla, 'Do you like math?' She would reply, 'I cried my way through Algebra II, but I made it.' This is the determination of a strong person who will reach her goals," said WHS math teacher Amy Spunaugle.

Children from the Warsaw area filled the gym floor as Ron Hearst and Brandon Beck presented the KY3 Weather School. They spoke to the children about the dangers of severe weather and how to prevent weather related injuries. "I liked the experiments the weathermen presented," said Warsaw North Elementary fourth grader Henry Adler. "It was cool when he made clouds appear right in the gym."

For over 70 years, KY3 has served as "the place to be" in the Ozarks providing one of the most well-known and longest running locally originated programs. From October 1, 1953 to the present, the KY3 team has covered stories that Benton County residents want to know. When news happens, KY3 is here to cover it; from local high school teams making a run for a state title, to covering other local news and happenings, KY3 is "the place to be" for Benton County.

(Continued from Page 1) AM to 12:00 PM, from April 27 through the week after Labor Day.

"The market started back in 2009 when a group of people organized it," said Market Manager Robert Gemes who has held his position for nine years. "It was first located at the Community Building parking lot, and then on Orscheln Farm & Home property (now part of the Bomgaars family of stores). For the past few years, it has been stationed in the J&D Pharmacy front parking lot. Each vendor is local and an independent businessperson handling his or her money. Many of the vendors are farmers, and they furnish their own canopies and tables. We are all people who enjoy talking to customers and each other. We have not grown much during our years of business, and we want to build up. We are looking for new vendors to join us."

Gemes said that many vendors make or grow their products, and some get early produce and other products at nearby Amish auctions.

Jack Downing, who is in his 11th year of selling produce at the market, sells tomatoes, sweet corn, cucumbers, watermelon, and cantaloupes. He says that he buys a lot of produce from the Amish, but he also has his own garden. He likes the produce business and has been in it for 60 years. He said he sells his produce to be good, and if a customer finds something wrong with it, he will replace it.

Noah Long is in his fifth season as a vendor at the market and he estimates that there will be 12 to 15 vendors this year. He began helping a friend who sold products at the market while in high school. He now sells plants in the spring, produce in the summer and mums and pumpkins towards the fall. He also sells homemade Shagbark Hickory syrup and bread made by his dad.

"My dad makes dinner roll bread from a recipe he got when he attended South Elementary School," said Long. "He makes both sour dough and wheat sour dough bread. I am one of the three big plant vendors at

the market, and we bring in a lot of traffic. I provide local produce that I grow and buy from the Amish community in Versailles."

Long said that he has a 30 by 86 foot tunnel for growing tomatoes in the ground that produces 500 tomato plants. He also has 80-foot gardens for Rhubarb and strawberries, and has 600 to 700 cucumbers. He just planted a small orchard of peach, pear and apple trees and is also putting in a fig orchard. Additionally, he has places for zucchini plants, hanging plants, flowers and more.

"I think of myself as a horticulturalist," said Long. "I attended two years of college in the field of horticulture and left before getting my degree to get married. I do this kind of work full time until winter when I take other jobs such as lawn care. I sell produce to all schools in Warsaw, plus other schools in Wheatland, Lincoln. I want to diversify and focus on wholesaling."

The Warsaw Farmer's Market group hasn't decided if it will have a special celebration to celebrate its fifteenth year in business, but will continue to enjoy serving its customers with quality local products as it has in the past.

(Continued from Page 1) signatory authorities on the city's bank accounts. Aldermen also authorized issuance of a request for qualifications for selection of a firm to provide engineering services in connection with a TAP grant for downtown west side sidewalks. The group hoped that work on the downtown eastside sidewalks could be done at the same time. Finally, aldemmen also selected continued membership by the city in the Kaysinger Basin Regional Planning Commission at a slightly increased rate of 30 cents per city resident. The group recognized that KBRPC had provided grant writing support for the city. Mayor Burdick volunteered to represent the city in that matter.

City Clerk Paul reported that auditors will be in the city the first week of May. She added that a city vehicle she sometimes used was "sick". She said she had gotten two repair bids, but was directed to get a third.

Public Works Director Heath Roark thanked several groups for their recent help.

Police Chief Jeff Canfield reported he was going to a conference on April 28 and will be gone several days.

Acting City Attorney Hunter Martin said there will be training for new board officers on May 10 and May 17. Mayor Burdick thanked everyone who had helped with the recent election. She emphasized that public input is necessary in matters to be put before the board.

The open session closed about 8:20 PM to go into executive session.

These meetings are usually held on 3rd Thursday eves and the public is invited; but an open session is scheduled for 7:00 PM April 30.

Three juveniles and an adult male were injured in an accident on Sims Road in rural Benton County on April 21 at 5:55 PM.

The crash occurred when a Honda Pioneer 4 driven by a 13-year-old male from Windsor was westbound on Sims Road, ran off the left side of the road, struck a tree and overturned.

An 11-year-old male, a 14-year-old female, both from Clinton, and Brandon Feagan, 22, of Windsor, all passengers, were transported to Western Medical Center with moderate injuries.

The accident was investigated by CPL. R. J. Chapman of the Missouri Highway Patrol.

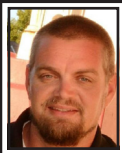

Beef Heifer Management
by Gene Schmitz, Field Livestock Specialist

Breeding season for spring calving beef cows and heifers is just around the corner. Nutritional management between now and the start of the breeding season will be critical for breeding success, especially for heifers.

Research has shown that heifers developed to 65% of mature weight had greater pregnancy rates during the first 45 days of the breeding season than heifers developed to 55% of mature

weight. Heifers developed to a lighter percentage of mature weight may also have a longer post-partum interval. Studies have also shown heifers fed 85% maintenance requirements of energy and protein had reduced embryo development on day 3 and day 8 after breeding than heifers fed 100% of maintenance. Be sure heifers are heavy enough and carrying enough body condition at breeding to help improve odds of breeding success.

Heifers calving in the first 21 days of the calving season have shown increased longevity in the cow herd compared to later calving heifers. Researchers from USDA-Meat Animal Research Center at Clay Center, NE analyzed data from 3,700 calves and found for each day of age

after the beginning of the breeding season that a calf is born, 2.4 pounds of weaning weight is lost.

Nutritional management after breeding is critical to successful AI breeding programs. Heifers developed in dry-lot and moved to range pasture had 15% lower AI pregnancy rates 42 days after insemination than dry-lot heifers moved to range pasture and receiving 5 pounds of dried distiller's grains per head per day. Additional research indicates reducing feed intake for 6 days following AI decreases embryo quality and delayed embryo development. Therefore, it is important to carefully manage the nutritional change from winter hay feeding to grazing spring pasture. If cows and heifers are to

be moved to a new location after AI breeding, this should be done between days 1 and 4 following insemination. Shipping heifers or cows between day 5 and day 42 after AI breeding should be avoided since the newly developing embryo is at greatest risk for loss during these times.

While many of these research results were reported for AI breeding systems, the same principles should hold true for natural service breeding systems. Developing heifers to correct age and weight at breeding, and reducing nutritional stress around the time of breeding are keys to successful breeding programs.

Don't lose sight of the impact of short-term supplementation after turning cattle out to grass. Using the above research

results as examples, 5 pounds of distiller's grains will currently cost about \$0.60 per day or just over \$25 per head for 42 days. This level of supplementation for this length of time may not be necessary in all situations, but the point is don't just turn the heifers and cows out to pasture and forget about them or neglect their nutritional needs. Losing one 21-day calving interval will reduce calf weaning weight by about 40 pounds, may delay breeding next year, and these losses in lifetime productivity may never be recovered.

Feed supplies are tight and expensive. Pasture growth is likely being slowed by lingering drought conditions. Being in a rush to get cattle to grass may result in long term reductions in cow and heifer productivity if body condition and nutritional management at the start of the breeding season are ignored. Targeted supplementation may be the key to getting through this situation.

"I put this series together because I see a need for this type of education, based on the number of calls I receive from women who are widowed, divorced or single and are running their farms by themselves for the first time," said Amie Breshears, MU Extension agricultural business specialist in Benton County.

"I receive questions that range from 'How do I determine the value of my land?' to 'How do I know if I'm paying a fair price for custom work on my farm?'" Breshears said. "This workshop is designed to help these new operators understand the basics and where they can find resources to help them make informed management decisions."

The workshop will help participants understand essential elements of agricultural leases and resources that can be used to determine land values and rates for custom work, she said. Participants will learn:

- The components and common types of agricultural lease arrangements.
- How to determine the approximate monetary value of leasing agricultural land.
- How to assess the approximate monetary value of agricultural land.
- How to determine the average rate for a variety of custom work activities (including land clearing, custom baling and more).

"On My Own" workshops are specifically designed for women who are first-time sole operators of their farm enterprises, but they are open to everyone, Breshears said. These workshops also allow networking and building connections with other participants in similar operator roles.
