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Let The Good Times Roll! Bowling Set For Comeback In Henry County

When Dorothy Sell was in high school in Clinton, bowling was one of the activities she and her classmates did in gym class. The students went to a bowling alley on Green Street, she recalled, which didn't have automatic pin-setters, so the students took turns doing that chore.

"You would bowl for a while, then go and sit in the back and set the pins up," she said. "There were spots on the floor where the pins went."

In 1959, Dorothy married Roy Warren and moved to Windsor. Three years later, in March of 1962, Windsor Lanes opened. The newly-weds didn't attend the grand opening, she said, but Roy got into bowling soon after.

It became a family activity as soon their three daughters were big enough to try their hand at the sport.

"They would set the ball down and give it a shove," Dorothy said.

At the June 8, 2024, meeting of the Windsor Historical Society, Dorothy will give a program on the history of bowling in Windsor and an update on its future. Windsor Lanes closed four years ago, but the building has been sold

and is now being cleared prior to new equipment and lanes being installed. There's no set opening date, but when Windsor Lanes reopens, Dorothy hopes the sport will be as popular as it was when her family bowled there.

"I'm guessing that 75 percent of the kids in Windsor bowled in the junior league," Dorothy said of the years her daughters were growing up.

Dorothy found a copy of

a 1960 letter to the editor of the local newspaper, pointing out that Windsor needed a bowling alley for the local kids to have something to do. That may have been what prompted a group of investors called the Windsor Development Co. to apply for a Small Business Administration loan to build a 60- by 154-foot building with 10 lanes. The company planned to lease the building to Asa Chambers of Sedalia, who

would operate the bowling alley. Windsor Lanes opened in March of 1962.

Now, an entrepreneur named Anton Glen Berthelsen has purchased the building and is renovating Windsor Lanes, which fell victim to Covid restrictions. Anton has hired Roy Hampton, who used to bowl with Dorothy's children, to clean out the old building at 605 N. Main. Hampton found bowling balls, shoes,

City Council Updated On Pool Opening

During their recent meeting, the City Council addressed concerns about the outdoor public pool. A motion was filed to replace a 6-foot section of the original steel pipe from 1976, which needs replacement due to potential cracks or perforation that could damage the newly installed pump if not addressed. Consequently, the pool's opening may be delayed by three weeks. Meanwhile, the indoor pool will remain open with a reduced entry fee of \$2. Additionally, parking lot repairs at Artisan Park are nearing completion, ensuring better access and convenience for residents.

Issues were reported at the Deer Creek Pump Station, where the pump is clogged due to recent rain storms, and the elevator is out of order. Efforts are underway to repair the elevator and move the controls to the top level to address these problems efficiently.

An ongoing tree inventory aims to assess the health of Englewood Cemetery trees and identify any losses while marking locations and gathering data such as species, height, and width while also noting the need for tree maintenance. As well as a multi-spectral analysis done by the use of drones, this initiative is part of the broader effort to maintain and enhance the community's green

spaces.

In a significant development, the city has been awarded \$120,000 for the Safe Streets and Roads for All program. This substantial funding will be instrumental in creating a comprehensive safety action plan and conducting road safety audits, thereby significantly enhancing the safety and infrastructure of our community. This initiative is a testament to our collective commitment to ensuring a safer and more secure environment for all.

The council gave unanimous consent for the Clinton Missouri Fire Fighters Association to use the firehouse on July 6th from 7 AM to 9 AM for their Annual Pancake Breakfast. This event also serves as a fundraiser for the Holiday Heros Fundraiser.

The mayor's recommendations for appointments were all approved by unanimous consent. John Leonard was reappointed to the Clinton Housing Authority Board with a term expiring in December 2027. Jacob Kenney was reappointed to the Park Board with a term expiring in June 2027. Debby VanWinkle was reappointed to the Park Board with a term expiring in June 2027. Gary Mount was appointed to the Clinton Housing Authority Board to fill a vacancy with a term expiring in December 2024.

Clinton Native Takes The Helm At Museum

Throughout a career in emergency management, Susan Jones-Hard has dealt people who were going through traumatic events.

In 1999, when the Columbine High School shooting occurred, she was the Emergency Management Director and Response Coordinator for the Colorado Department of Health. Susan worked long hours coordinating the public information response, setting up news feeds to media outlets around the world.

After Sept. 11, 2001, she was one of 13 civilians chosen to attend an 18-month master's course at the Naval Postgraduate School in California in domestic preparedness and security studies, which became known as Homeland Security. Many of her classmates were first responders from New York City, she said.

Susan is now the director of the Henry County Museum, where she started last week. After the jobs she has held, she appreciates

the fact that working at the museum will be less stressful.

"When the phone rings, I know it won't be bad news," she said. "Here, it's meeting people and seeing things that are positive."

Susan was born and raised in Clinton, a fourth-generation graduate of Clinton High School. After college,

she worked in Nevada, Mo., as a social worker, then traveled throughout the United States, Canada and Europe as part of the staff with Up With People.

Susan moved to Tucson, Ariz., and worked as the Emergency Services director for the Red Cross, then to Denver, where she held the same job and met future spouse Greg Hard,

who was also in emergency services.

In 2005, they moved back to Missouri to run the family's century farm after Susan's father, uncle and brother passed away. Susan also worked as the managing director of the Naval Postgraduate School Center for Homeland Defense and Security Mobile

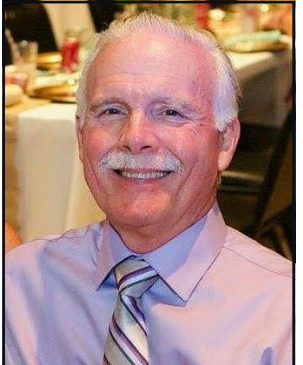

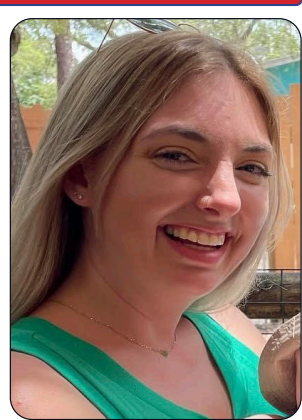

and pins in the clean-out, which he has loaned to Dorothy to display at the June 8 meeting.

The WHS meets at the Windsor Museum and Research Center, 214 W. Benton, Windsor, MO 65360. The program starts about 1:15 p.m., following a brief meeting of the Windsor Historical Society at 1 p.m.

Dorothy has invited Amy Mullins Witherspoon, whose family ran Windsor Lanes for many years, to the meeting. Also scheduled to attend is the former owner of Windsor Lanes, who sold the building to Berthelsen in 2023. Dorothy is meeting with Berthelsen before the June 8 WHS meeting.

Dorothy is also bringing memorabilia in the form of bowling shirts and embroidered hand towels, souvenirs of teams and tournaments she and her family were part of. They had tons of trophies, she said, plus their own bowling balls and shoes, but unfortunately, somebody broke into the storage unit where the items were kept and took everything.

So she has her memories of her family bowling together, which they did in leagues and together on open days on Saturdays. Roy, who passed away three years ago at age 83, was very competitive, as is their oldest daughter Sandy, who bowled with her father in a mixed league.

"She is like her father," Dorothy said. "When she decides to do something, she wants to do it well."

A standout year for serious bowlers was 1973, when the 10th Annual Missouri State Junior Bowling Championships were held at Windsor Lanes. The competitions were held over eight weekends in March, April and May, Dorothy said, and drew 363 teams and 1,410 singles. Every business in Windsor was a sponsor, as well as outlying businesses, as people had to go out of town to find lodging.

Dorothy has collected memorabilia from that event, at which her daughters took part, and still has their scorecards. She was involved in everything they did in and out of school, she said, including softball, band, 4-H and Girl Scouts. In addition to bowling, the family had family skate night every Tuesday, driving to Clinton to the roller-skating rink.

Roy and Dorothy moved to the Lincoln area when the shoe factory closed to find work, but drove back to Windsor to bowl, she said. They moved back to Windsor in 2019, and Dorothy was surprised to see how much the town had changed.

Now, Windsor is undergoing a renaissance of new businesses catering to the tourist traffic generated by the KATY and Rock Island recreational trails. Bowling alleys across the country reopened once the worst of COVID was over, although in many areas didn't rebound until winter, bowling being a seasonal activity in many parts of the country.

Dorothy has seen a lot of changes in Henry County. She grew up near Leesville, east of Clinton, and attended the Leesville one-room school for her first eight years of education. Part of a family of 10 children, she lived in a farmhouse built by Ulysses Grant Sell, her paternal great-grandfather, then in a farmhouse built by great-grandfather Jacob Van Hoozer.

The farmhouses no longer exist, and the roller-skating rink in Clinton is also gone, but once Windsor Lanes reopens, Dorothy hopes people of all ages will rediscover the fun of bowling, which provides exercise as well as social activity.

"I would like to see the high school include it in the gym classes," Dorothy said.

And with all-new equipment, the students won't have to take turns setting up the pins.

Education Team, organizing seminars on cybersecurity, weather emergency response and disaster-relief response plans for governors and mayors of large cities.

In 2018, she was hired by MU Extension as the nutrition and health specialist for four counties. Most recently, she was director of the Kaysinger Basin Regional Planning Commission.

Susan also served for 12 years on the Clinton School District Board, including terms as president and vice-president of the board, and was the public relations coordinator for the Clinton High School Alumni Association. Classmates may remember Susan as "Miss CHS" of 1979, when she had her photo on the cover of the Clinton Eye.

One hundred years earlier, Susan's great-grandmother, Ella Highnote, was in the first graduation class of Clinton High School, the Class of 1879. The family farm dates from 1881.

Susan said she has always been a friend of the Henry County Museum, and once was a fill-in docent. She was stationed in the Courtney Thomas section of the museum's music room, she recalled, and spent the time between visitors reading about Thomas, an opera singer who grew up in Clinton and toured Europe in the late 1800s and early 1900s.

So far, Susan has two priorities in her new job. One is to raise money for the museum. The next fundraiser is June 22 at 5 p.m., and features a chicken dinner cooked by Jim Kalberloh, a state legislator and former owner of the Landmark Restaurant in Lowry City.

The other is to get more people through the doors, especially locals who haven't visited the museum since they were children. The museum has grown to include six buildings, two of which, the Anheuser-Busch Building and the Dorman House, are in the National Register of Historic Places.

"I was drawn to the fact that the Henry County Museum has so much depth and significance compared to other museums," Susan said.

The newest acquisition

is the Exchange Building, which holds exhibits of mid-century modern furnishings, including a pink kitchen, plus vintage toys from the baby-boomer era. A mural of a train station with a train arriving, with passengers waiting to board, captures the romance of that era.

The Museum Annex, the main entrance to the museum at 203 W. Franklin, houses an art gallery, a genealogy library and a walk-through early 20th century village, including a dry goods store complete with

a pot-belly stove surrounded by chairs and table with a checkerboard, ready for a game. Down the brick-paved street is a pharmacy with a soda fountain, a doctor's office and a bank.

In addition to the Music Room and the Veteran's Room in the Anheuser-Busch Building are reproductions of a parlor, kitchen and bedrooms furnished as they would have looked in the pre-electric age. In the back room and a side room of the Anheuser-Busch Building, a distribution center built for the brewery in the late 1800s, are extensive displays showing the history of businesses and industries in Henry County, including farming, coal mining, potteries and chicken hatcheries.

The museum is in the process of creating a Communities Room, featuring memorabilia from Clinton, Tightwad, Coal, Calhoun and Blairsville. The museum is looking for photographs and records from the schools, as well as people's memories of them.

Across Franklin Street from the museum is the Homestead, a reproduction of a mid-1800s Missouri farm with a dog-trot log cabin, mule barn, corn crib and smoke house. Children's programs are held in a one-room schoolhouse, circa 1890, by a school marm in period attire, giving lessons from McGuffey Readers, math lessons on slates with chalk, and geography lessons on roll-down maps.

A free activities day for children and families, held annually at the Homestead in the fall, features games and crafts. Children especially like sitting in the wooden desks and playing school.

Across the street from the west side of the Homestead is the ante-bellum Dorman House, the oldest two-story brick house in Clinton. The house is entering the final stages of renovation to stabilize the foundation and walls, according to Nick Smith, assistant museum director. The new

floors are down, Nick said, the walls repainted and the staircase re-installed. Once the furnishings have been moved back in, the house will open again to the public, hopefully by Olde Glory Days, July 3 through July 7. A reception will be scheduled for the public to meet

the new director. Check the Henry County Mo. Museum facebook page for information.

The Henry County Museum is open Tuesday through Saturday, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. For more information, go to the Henry County Mo. Museum website.

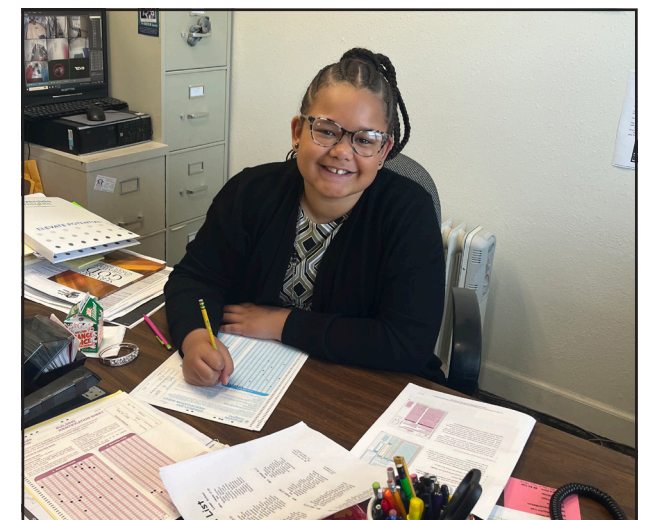

Attorney General Bailey Moves to Protect Missouri Property Rights in Monroe County

In an effort to protect Missourians' property rights, Missouri Attorney General Andrew Bailey today filed a motion to intervene in a lawsuit against the Grain Belt Express (GBE), a massive transmission line project that will unlawfully seize land from Missouri property owners, spanning the entire northern portion of the state.

"Living and raising my family in rural Missouri has given me a deep respect for personal property rights. No one knows better how to use Missouri land than Missouri farmers, ranchers, and landowners," said Attorney General Bailey. "My neighbors are the legacy farmers and ranchers that sustain Missouri's economy through livestock and agricultural production. I'm filing a motion to intervene to ensure Missouri farmers are not being strong armed into giving up their land."

The GBE is an 800-mile-transmission line that would carry power starting in Kansas, through the entire northern portion of Missouri and eventually end in Indiana. An 'off-shoot' of the GBE would run through Monroe and Audrain Counties into Callaway County. The rural counties impacted in Missouri represent nearly a quarter-of-a-million residents, many of whom have fiercely opposed the project.

"Half of the counties that border my home in Montgomery County are destined to become pass-through counties for the Grain Belt Expressway and its Tiger Connector spur," continued Attorney General Bailey. "The project will be built and funded by well-heeled, out-of-state private interests on the hope that, someday, energy purchasers across the Midwest might want the power flowing through these lines. This business venture is not intended to benefit Missourians or our state."

Chuck Miller, President of the Missouri Cattleman's Association, said, "Andrew Bailey has consistently stood for private property rights in our state. His motion to intervene is yet another example of his efforts to protect the rights of landowners."

Monroe County Western District Commissioner Marilyn O'Bannon said, "Monroe County commissioners appreciate the support of Attorney General Bailey intervening in this lawsuit."

At 9:01 a.m. Commissioner Stone brought the meeting to order.

The agenda was approved as presented.

The minutes from the Tuesday, May 7th, 2024 meeting was read; Commissioner Lawler made a motion to approve the minutes. Commissioner Fosnow seconded the motion, motion carried.

Expenditures from the following were approved to be paid: ARPA Fund, May Special Election, Law Enforcement Fund, Road and Bridge

Clerk Rick presented a report from Renodry. The report showed that their devise has reduced the moisture in the courthouse.

Collector - Treasurer Ann Julian was asked to attend the meeting to review a draft of the county's SB190 ordinance. Ann shared that the software company, used by her office and the Assessor's has not committed on how to account for tax credit. There was also discussion on how to implement the ordinance

without the support of the software company. Additional discussion was had on the best timeline needed for officials to be able to work through applications, which office would oversee the process, and when to implement the ordinance. 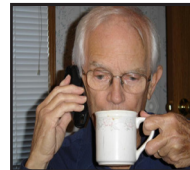

SIMPLY SERVE

Clarence Ray Dowell was ninety-three. He was not a relative of mine, but I drove more than 250 miles to attend his funeral. Why? Because he was the personification of the servant Jesus taught us to be. In his more than 60 years of ministry, he served nine churches--all of them small and some of which he founded himself. Twice he served as a Director of Missions, and each time he placed his church membership in one of the smallest churches so he could be more helpful to them.

It was this Director of Missions role that introduced me to Brother Dowell. I followed in his footsteps 40 years later, and people still remembered him with great pride. When he retired, he might easily have assumed he had earned a rest. Instead, he asked the local missionary to point him to the smallest church. It turns out the smallest church did not meet regularly, so he joined the second smallest church. Sometimes ministers have difficulty adjusting to being "just a church member." Brother Dowell did not have this problem. His pastor said, "He was one of my best supporters. Though he could have been my father, he called me, 'Pastor.'" When health problems prevented his supply preaching, he served in the most thankless place of all--the local jail.

Jesus taught us that most of us want the prestigious places, but the greatest among us are those who serve. (Matthew 23:11) Brother Dowell probably could have had the prestigious places, but he chose simply to serve. In God's eyes, that made him great. May God teach us how to serve like Clarence Dowell.
