On The Move! Share & Care Plans New Offices And Training Complex

On April 13, 1989, two dozen people gathered at the former Lutheran Church near the Clinton Square to discuss how they could support families in the communities with members who needed services they could not get locally.

From that meeting, a not-for-profit agency was formed to serve what is now referred to as the IDD community, people with intellectual and developmental challenges. From its start in a church basement, Share and Care has grown to employ a staff of 65 direct support professionals, who work out of a building on the south end of town.

Share and Care has now outgrown that building, and has purchased 15 acres adjacent to the Clinton Community Center, where a new office and a 5,000 square-foot training center will be built. The training center will be named the Cheryl Craig Learning Center, after the Clinton woman who served as the director of the agency for 25 years.

"It's going to be a great way to honor her and everything she did for the IDD community," said Sandy Carroll, business admin-





istrator for the agency. Cheryl passed away on February 12, 2023, at the age of 73. With a bachelor's degree in education from Illinois State University, she specialized in services to blind and partially sighted people, and taught braille. Cheryl was teaching special education at Lakeland High School when she was hired as director of Share and Care. An active advocate statewide for support services, she led the effort to establish the first adolescent behavior

group home in the state. In 1998, Cheryl was named a "Champion of Change" by the Institute for Community Health Leadership for her commitment and dedication. On April 10, 2024, Phil Craig and the Craigs' three daughters met Sandy and Becky Gregory, Share and Care executive director, at the site of the planned construction of the learning center to put up a banner. At the time of her passing, the family had designated gifts in Cheryl's memory

Basset Hounds Inspire New Calhoun Business

Having a long beard can sometimes be a problem. According to Jeremy Reed of Calhoun, you have to be careful when you are doing yard work or using power tools.

"I usually tuck it in my shirt," Jeremy said of his beard. "Although sometimes I forget. You'd be surprised at how many strands of beard get pulled out in a day."

Despite the daily depreciation, Jeremy's swath of reddish-gold beard reaches his waist. Do people come up to him and ask to touch it?

"Oh my gosh, yes," he said. "The stories I have." Jeremy is a walking advertisement for the beard-care products he makes. He sells them under the name The Bearded Basset, drawing inspiration from his two pet hounds, Winston and Watson.

"I was looking for a business name that would be different, something light-hearted," Jeremy said. "Bassetts are a regal-looking dog, and smart, but

also kind of goofy looking." Most people are polite and ask if they can touch his beard first, he said. His beard makes a good conversation starter, he said, and even stops traffic.

"I've had people stop and tell me 'Dude, I love the beard,'" Jeremy said. "and I'm sitting there next to the most beautiful woman in the world — my wife."

His response: "I tell them, 'Thanks, I grew it myself.'"

Maintaining a beard means keeping it clean by washing it frequently, Jeremy said. Beard oil is used to keep the facial pores healthy, he said. Beard balm, like mustache wax, keeps his beard hydrated and prevents it from getting brittle. It also reduces itchiness, he said, adding that not shaving your neck under the beard will also help with that issue.

Jeremy said he first started growing a beard when he was 33 years old "because I could." That was in 2010. At first, he kept it close and tight, he said, but after he started using beard oil, got into growing his beard out.

Artesian Park Pool Will Debut New Parking And Summer Fun

A five-year 1/8 percent tax was approved in Clinton in November 2021 to fund upgrades and renovations to the Artesian Outdoor Pool. The interior of the pool was renovated in 2022, the pool house was modernized in 2023, and this year the broken-up parking lot is having a drainage pipe installed and multiple layers of asphalt applied. In addition, four parking lights have been upgraded to LED lights on concrete pedestals. Opening date for this summer was previously scheduled for Memorial Day weekend, but a pipe in the pumphouse was cracked or perforated and is being repaired.

"The indoor pool that is open during the other three seasons, has remained open so that people can still swim while waiting for the outdoor pool repair," said Christy Maggi, Clinton City Administrator. "During the five years lifetime of this tax we are cutting summer entry fees to \$2 per person. Citizens are paying

a little more tax during this time, and we want to give them a break and let them have fun at the pool. The pool tax expires on March 30, 2027. The renovations have cost a little more than is expected to be generated by the pool tax. However, some city funds are being used to cover the extra ex-

pense." Maggi said that the outdoor pool was built in 1976 by the Corps of Engineers. Things have been done over the years, and substantial renovations were completed in 2006. An article in the Clinton Daily Democrat on October 20, 2021 reported that plumb-

ing was an issue in the pool restrooms, and the pipes under the concrete would need to be dug up and replaced. Paint that would protect the pool's surface for 20 years was also required. The parking lot had deteriorating curbs and potholes, and the lion's





to four months to design two buildings. In the meantime, a civil engineer from Sedalia will be doing site preparation.

When the plans are complete, Share and Care will be reaching out to local businesses for bids on heating, plumbing, electrical work, Becky said.

"We're hoping it will be up within a year, but more realistically, it will be a year and a half," she said. "They've just started on the plans."

Share and Care is now located in a building purchased from Dr. Harrison, a Clinton chiropractor. The agency had hoped to expand on the property behind the building, Becky said, but realized that given the size of the learning center, that it wouldn't fit. In addition to other classes, Share and Care has started an apprenticeship program, registered with the U.S. Department of Labor, which qualifies employees to become certified in the field of IDD support.

"There are eight employees currently enrolled in the program," she said. "Share and Care pays all expenses."

The course is available to people with a high school degree. It starts with teaching relationship building and communication skills, Becky said, which gives the support person the skills to "read" a client who is not feeling well but may be unable to express it. The apprenticeship program also includes medication training certification, crisis intervention training, and CPR and First Aid instruction.

"The program makes a great stepping stone to pursuing a health career in college," Becky said.

Share and Care deals primarily with adults who live in their own apartments, she said, and currently serves individuals in Henry and Johnson counties. It offers half day to 24-hour care, depending on the needs of the individual.

When Share and Care started in 1989, it offered an adult day program and physical, speech and occupational therapy for children, along with early intervention. The Pediatric Place now offers those services locally to "the littles," Becky said.

The new buildings will be funded with help from the state legislature, Becky said, which determines the budgets for agencies that offer community health services. With the increase in rules and regulations, the amount of paperwork required has increased Sandy said. Share and Care tries to stay focused on the individual and their needs.

"We tailor the service to the individual," Becky said.

Adding to the agency's strength is the commitment of its employees, which the two administrators said is reciprocal.

"We're looking forward to providing more options for the individuals we serve, and more opportunities for our employees," Becky said.

Many of the personal support professionals have worked there for more than 15 years, she said, and one employee just retired after 24 years. Becky has been there for 27 years, she said, and Sandy has been there from day one, having been in the original group that met in the basement of the old Lutheran church. She was one of the group who hired Cheryl Craig as director, she said, and then Cheryl hired her.

Cheryl was her mentor, Becky recalled.

Sandy remembers that Cheryl would take time to work with potential and current employees to improve their literacy skills to qualify them for employment and help them

retain it. Cheryl retired from Share and Care in 2015, and after running a mail-order quilt fabric business from her home, went into partnership with Mary Cupp to open the White Flower Quilt Shop on the Clinton Square. Cheryl's daughter Andrea Schmidt owns Silhouettes, the lingerie shop on the east side of the Square, daughter Alexa Thompson works on the south side on the Square at Designers Edge Salon and Spa. Daughter Emily Combs is a teacher.

Kathy Allen was the original head of the Share and Care board. The current board members are Barbara Moseley, Pat Nielsen, Avis Compton, Scott Largent, Luke Edwards and Blaine Paxton.

share of the tax money was to be directed to the pool house renovation.

Maggi said that when the pool is open the number of people varies from day to day. On a nice day there may be over 100. She said that people, church organizations and other youth groups often rent the pool out for parties.

"Hours will be Monday and Wednesday: 1 to 8 P.M. On Tuesday, Thursday, and the weekend it will be open from 1 to 5 P.M.," said Maggi. "We typically close down for the summer on Labor Day but lately we have tended to close when school starts because we have difficulty staffing lifeguards when they are back in college."

Another interesting project taking place in Clinton is the construction of a public terminal at the Clinton Regional Airport that is expected to be complete in the fall. It currently is an informal spot mainly for pilots. When completed there will be doors on the public side where people can go through the terminal and exit on the airfield side of the building. Maggi said there are large corporate jets that come into the airport frequently, plus a lot of small private planes. Ninety-three percent of the cost to construct the public terminal is being covered by federal grants.

He's had a beard for eight years now, he said, although the current one dates to four years ago. That's when he asked his spouse to cut his beard off. It was the worst decision of his life.

"It had become part of my personality, part of my character," Jeremy said. "I immediately started growing it again."

Being a bright reddish-blond, Jeremy's beard is an attention-getter. He inherited the coloring from his Scots-Irish ancestors — the surname Reed means "red or ruddy colored." His grandfather and his uncles always had beards, he said, although not as red, and not as long. Jeremy hails from southern Missouri.

"My father is a retired Pentecostal minister, so the family moved around a lot," Jeremy said.

Jeremy, his spouse and four children moved to Calhoun in 2020, a few days before Covid shut everything down. After becoming frustrated trying to find some at a reasonable cost, he said, he developed his line of beard care products, premiering them last year at a craft fair in Warrensburg.

Bearded Basset products are available at Moonlit Petrichor, 111 E. Cul-ton Street in downtown Warrensburg, which sells small-batch bath and body

products.

Petrichor is a word that means the earthy scent that emanates from the ground after a rain, especially after a spell of warm, dry weather. Bearded Basset beard oil and beard balm comes in five scents, ranging from Howlin' Rum and Coffee Hound to Chewing Tobacco.

The best-seller is Big Paw Forest, a blend of pine, cedar, oak moss and amber. The products also come in unscented and Short Legs Mint — the name basset comes from the French for "bas," meaning low. Jeremy has lowered the price of his beard oil and balm, down to \$16 to \$20 an ounce. Products are available online at The Bearded Basset.com or by phone order, 660-596-9232

"I even have women customers," Jeremy said. "Beard oil is basically hair oil."

Either would make a thoughtful gift on Father's Day for a family patriarch who wants to grow a lush, healthy beard. Jeremy said his Father's Day gifts ran to hand-drawn cards and art when his children were younger. His younger daughter, Bella, graduated from Clinton High School last month and is headed to William Woods College in August. Their older son graduated from high school in Sedalia last year, and the oldest daughter is photographer Katelyn Reed, who is the mother of an almost two-year-old son.


The bassets are also related. Winston, who is 5 years old, and Watson, 4, share the same grandfather. Winston and Watson get along well with the smaller bearded residents that have the run of the Reed property, 13 Nigerian dwarf goats, one fainting goat and one a mix.

Jeremy breeds and raises goats as pets, and also keeps chickens. Go to his Facebook page to see a video of Winston and Watson, who are about the same height as the baby goats, attempting to herd them. Basset hounds, which were bred for hunting rabbits, are second only to their ancestor, the bloodhound, in the ability to "ground

scent," or follow a trail using their nose.

"The dogs are actually trying to get close enough to the goats to register their scent," Jeremy said.

Those members present were: Jim Stone - Presiding Commissioner, Rick Fosnow - North District Commissioner, Dale Lawler - South District Commissioner, Kelly Marriott- Deputy County Clerk

At 9:02 a.m. Commissioner Stone brought the meeting to order.

The agenda was approved as presented.

The minutes from the Tuesday, May 14, 2024 meeting was read; Commissioner Lawler made a motion to approve the minutes. Commissioner Fosnow seconded the motion, motion carried.

Expenditures from the following were approved to be paid: Juror Pay, Law Enforcement Department, Circuit Clerk, General County Government, Court Administration, May Elections, Prosecuting Attorney, Buildings and Grounds, Coroner, Emergency Management, Road and Bridge, Inmate Security, Law Enforcement Training, Prosecuting Attorney Training, Election Services, Administrative Handling Cost Fund, Sheriff Civil Fund, 27th Circuit Treatment, Law Enforcement Fund, Senior Citizens Service Tax Fund

Collector Treasurer Ann Julian met to update the Commission on an upcoming meeting in Columbia on SB190. The meeting is hosted by the Missouri Collector's Association. The meeting is in June and will be attended by Rick Watson, and herself. Ann also shared the changes to 2023's SB190 with this year's SB756.

David Plumlee, Clinton Chamber Director, met with the Commission to discuss this year's Olde Glory Days festivities. He shared a tentative agenda. They also discussed the electrical panel upgrades to the courtyard. The Commission agreed to contribute \$1000 toward the port o potty rental, once again.

Emergency Management Director Brad Wright attended the meeting to update the Commission on the operations of the Emergency Management Center. Brad asked about the office vacated by the Tri County Child Support Office.

At 9:58 Commissioner Fosnow made a motion to go into closed session via RSMo 610.021(3) to discuss personnel matters. Commissioner Lawler seconded the motion. The motion passed with a roll call vote of Fosnow - yes, Lawler - yes, and Stone - yes.

At 10:23 Commissioner Fosnow made a motion to end the closed session. Commissioner Lawler seconded the motion. The motion passed with a roll call vote of Lawler - yes, Fosnow - yes, and Stone - yes.

At 10:25 Sheriff Kent Oberkrom and Jacque Watson, attended the meeting. Kent explained that the per diem board bill needs to be set. He expressed that \$60 - \$65 is the average rate from neighboring counties. Kent recommended the Commission raise the current rate of \$50 per day to \$65. After discussion, Commissioner Fosnow made a motion to set the prisoner per diem to \$65 per day. Commissioner Lawler seconded the motion. The motion passed with a roll call vote of Lawler - yes, Fosnow - yes, and Stone - yes.

Sheriff Oberkrom explained that medical costs for inmates was going to increase if we stay with Advanced Correctional Healthcare. Jacque explained that the company is changing by using RNs from their company vs using LPNs or local nurses. Kent shared that he has decided to put out an RFQ for new medical providers. Jacque shared that she has been in contact with many potential companies. Also discussed were mental health needs of some inmates.

Jacque led discussion on commercial dishwashers that Aramark was to provide per contract. She shared that Aramark failed to fulfill the contract. She has shared that they have now agreed to pay its portion of the \$20,000.00 for the new dishwashers.

Dennis Bowers, Road and Bridge, attended the meeting. He shared that he spoke with the CORPS regarding NE 300 Rd, in Springfield Township. He also shared that he was given permission, from the CORPS to drive pilings just past the parking lot. The flooded areas would be between the pilings. The pilings would be a permanent solution to recurring issues of the lake level, and release the county of liability.

Dennis asked about comp time, holiday pay, and the way the county handles callouts for the Road and

The Commission discussed comp time and deferred holiday pay.

There was discussion on SB756, which clarified portions of last year's SB190.

There was discussion on storm damage, in the county, from last Tuesday's wind event.

The Commission called Ivan Schraeder, the county attorney, to discuss the De-commissioning Agreement with Ranger Power. A message was left.

Gina Husak, with Clinton Wrecker, met with the Commission for a solicitation. She was referred to the Sheriff's Office, as they will post the bid specs for wrecker services.

At 10:25 Lindsay Chaffin, with Great River Engineering, met with the Commission to discuss BRO30 and BRO31. She shared updates on BRO30, on NW 400 Rd, in White Oak Township. She presented documents that had to be signed which included Flood Plain, Easements, and CORPS documents. She shared that she is about 75% complete on the planning phase of BRO30, and estimates it to go to construction early 2025.

Lindsay shared updates for BRO31, on SE91 Rd, in Clinton Township. She provided documents that needed to be signed including Flood Plain, Easements, CORPS, and Categorical Exclusion documents. She estimates this project to go to construction mid-year of 2025.

There was discussion on

additional engineering contracts she is working on with Dennis Bowers, Road and Bridge Supervisor. The next day we walked around the downtown area in Hannibal and explored the different shops in the area before heading

to the Mark Twain Riverboat tour. We boarded a steamboat from the 1950s where they took us down the Mississippi river where we passed "Jackson's Island" from the Huckleberry Finn books. From the boat, we were able to see new sights as well as some of the places we had already visited. We learned more about the history of Hannibal, including the fact that "mark twain" was actually a commonly shouted out slang term that had to do with the depth of the water. 
