History Is Close To Home At Jesse James Hideaway

There are two theories of why a Clinton rancher named Warren C. Bronaugh visited the Younger brothers in prison after they were arrested and sentenced to life sentences for robbing a bank and shooting several people in 1876.

One is that Cole Younger was the soldier that saved Bronaugh's life during the Civil War Battle of Lone Jack. The story goes that Cole guided Bronaugh and another Confederate soldier back to their unit after they became lost in the town, which was filled with smoke.

Another is that Capt. Bronaugh, known as Wal, made the visit because he was a good friend of Frank James, Jesse James' brother, who couldn't make the trip himself.

Whether one or the other story is correct, or the truth is a combination, the house where Capt. Bronaugh lived when he was working to get the Younger brothers out of prison still stands on a hill northeast of Clinton. It's now owned by Dawn Guterman, who offers tours, an event venue and overnight stays. She calls it "The Jesse

James Hideaway."

"It was called the Jesse James House, but it wasn't his house," Dawn said. "Supposedly Jesse was here. When people used to see a couple of horses that were not here normally, they'd say it was the James Boys."

The two Victorian houses

that the Bronaugh family built in the 1880s stand across from each other on a hill on either side of Hwy. YY, off Hwy. 52 E. near Clinton. The houses have become part of local lore connecting Henry County to the notorious James Gang and the Younger brothers who rode with them.

But when Dawn saw the house listed for sale in December of 2022, she didn't know much about its history. She did know she loved the house, a three-story Victorian with gingerbread trim, wrap-around porches and widow's walk on the roof.



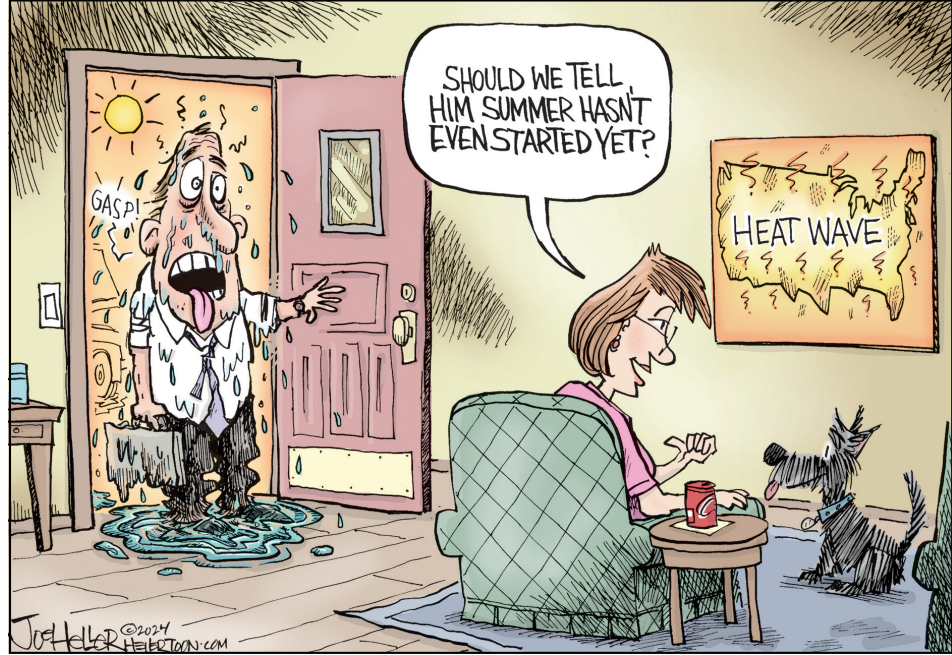

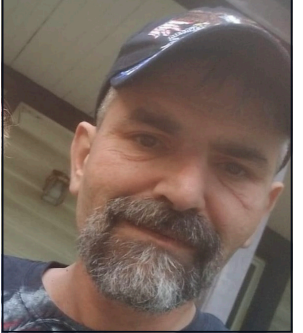

The Pediatric Place Announces Opening of Autism and Neurodevelopmental Center

The Pediatric Place is excited to announce the opening of our new state-of-the-art Autism and Neurodevelopmental Center next month in Clinton, Missouri. This exciting milestone represents the culmination of years of vision and planning to meet a great need in our community.

"With 1 in 36 children diagnosed with autism in the US, I am excited to see a much-needed collaborative setting creating im-

mediate and long-term opportunities for not only the clients, but also their families," said Brooke Allen, Board Certified Behavior Analyst and Director of the new Center. "As it is a diagnosis that can truly shift the dynamics of the entire family, to know that TPP will be offering collaborative care that can include family training on techniques to support communication, social, and behavioral needs, is priceless."

What services will be offered?

The Center will provide Applied Behavior Analysis therapy for children as young as two years old with a diagnosis of autism spectrum disorder.

"ABA therapy can help kids develop a variety of functional skills to make them safe and comfortable in their environment," Brooke explained. "In collaboration with speech, occupational and physical therapists, it can address social skills, academics, communication,

functional/self-help skills, toilet training, sleep struggles, and more."

Children requiring significant support in these areas will attend a half or full-day ABA program. TPP's therapy experts will be on-site to provide all the services students require in one location.

"The Center allows more space for collaborative work," said TPP co-owner Carmen Rathert. "Our mission includes collaboration between each discipline for increased success."

What will the Center look like?

Adjacent to TPP's Clinton clinic, the Autism and Neurodevelopmental Center includes 2 large rooms for social interaction and group therapy; a large kitchen; a conference room for professional collaboration, parent training, and treatment team meetings; 12 individual therapy rooms and 4 observation rooms; a life skills room where students practice functional tasks such as laundry; and a 3,000-square foot gym for children who need to move their bodies for regulation. Carmen and Brooke agree that they are most excited about the gym and the future outdoor play space.

"Outdoor play can be a barrier for many of our learners with autism, as 49% of children with autism have been reported to engage in elopement behavior at some point (wandering or bolting away from a safe environment)," Brooke said. "This barrier can be removed when clients have access to outdoor play spaces with safer play boundaries created by assessing the triggers that result in elopement and teaching coping strategies to reduce the risk of elopement."

The Center will provide safe, fun spaces to prac-

tice skills that will enable them to safely access their home, school, and community environments.

Join us for our Grand Opening!

The Missouri State Highway Patrol would like to remind the public that driver examination stations throughout the state will be closed on the following date:
Thursday, July 4, 2024, in observance of the July Fourth holiday. Normal operations will resume on Friday, July 5, 2024.
Plan A Safe July Fourth Holiday!
Colonel Eric T. Olson, superintendent of the Missouri State Highway Patrol, reminds Missouri's travelers to make smart choices for a safe July Fourth holiday. Whether planning to visit one of Missouri's recreational opportunities or hosting a backyard barbecue, everyone should make safety part of their plans. No matter how you decide to celebrate, your smartest choice is to follow all Missouri traffic and boating laws.
During the 2023 counting period, 15 people were killed and 646 injured in Missouri over the holiday

in 1,505 traffic crashes. Last year during the counting period, troopers arrested 125 people for driving while intoxicated. In 2023, there were 11 boating crashes, which included two injuries and no fatalities. One person drowned during last year's July Fourth holiday. Troopers made 10 boating while intoxicated arrests over last year's July Fourth holiday weekend.
The 2024 July Fourth holiday counting period will be from 6 p.m. Wednesday, July 3, 2024, through 11:59 p.m. Sunday, July 7, 2024.
All available troopers will be patrolling Missouri roadways and waterways to enforce traffic and boating laws and offering assistance as needed. The Highway Patrol will participate in Operation C.A.R.E. (Crash Awareness & Reduction Effort) and Operation Dry Water over the July Fourth holiday. Operation Dry Water specifically targets impaired vessel operators.
Missouri's boaters are asked to do their part by remaining alert for other boats and swimmers and being courteous on the water. Never operate a vessel if you've consumed alcohol. Boaters need to be aware that it is illegal to discharge fireworks from a vessel. Leave all fireworks in a safe place on shore. Re-

member to share the waterway, watch your wake, and use common sense, good judgment, and courtesy to ensure the safety of all. Life jackets save lives. Wear It!!

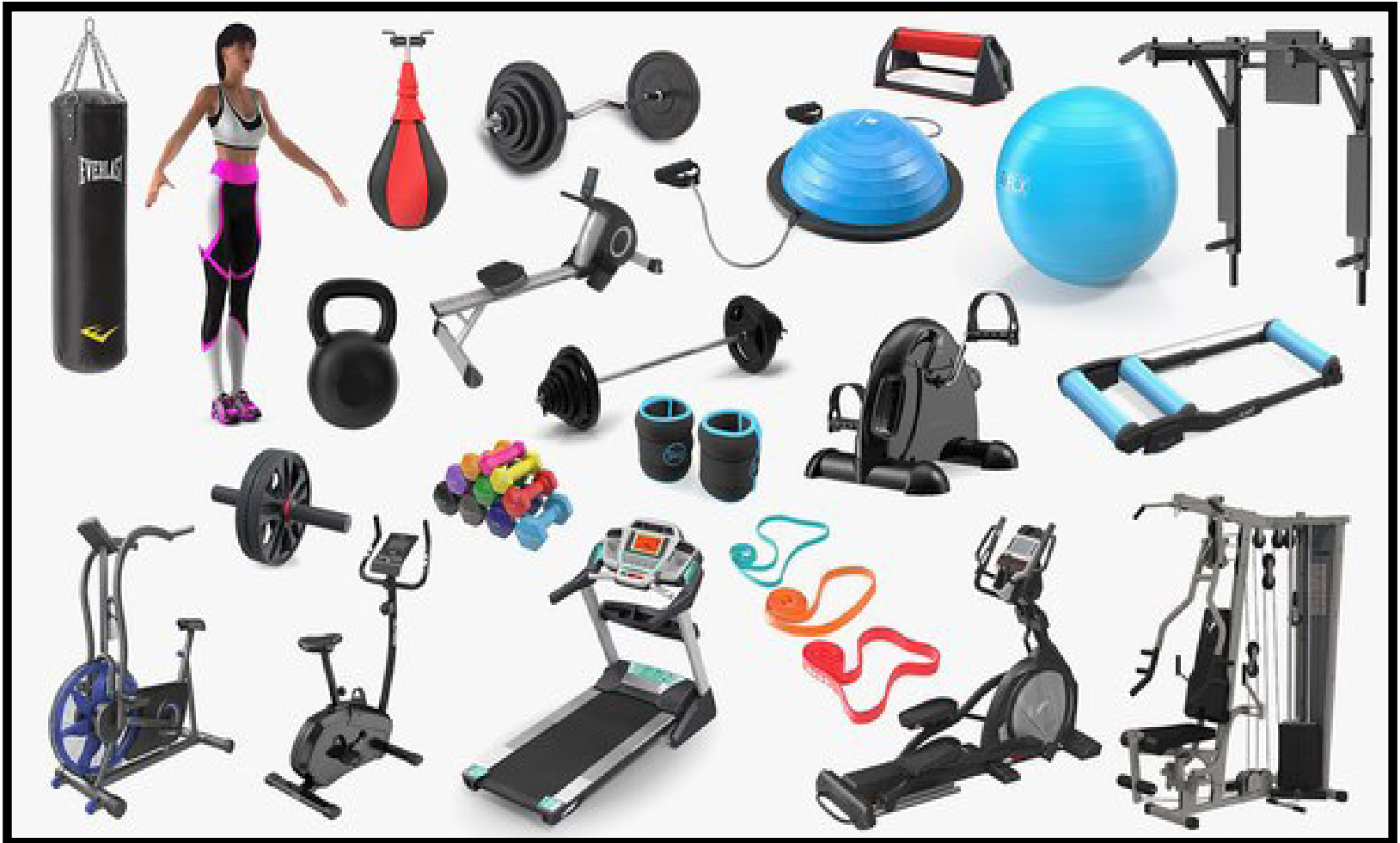
