In the early 1970s, a small group of people who believed it was important to offer a substance abuse treatment program in Clinton met in a church basement in town.

Throughout a series of mergers with other mental health and substance abuse programs, the services they offered 50 years ago have become part of the Compass Health Net-

"We really try to help people find their direction," said Donni Kuck, a Compass regional vice-president based in Clinton.

A sense of direction will be important on July 6, when the staff of Compass Health Network will lead the Olde Glory Days Parade. More than 500 Compass Health employees from Clinton, Windsor and Osceola have been invited to walk in the parade, Donni said, forming a parade within a parade.

candy," Donni said, indicating boxes in her office of Tootsie Rolls, bubble gum and Dum-Dums, a brand of ball-shaped lollipops that debuted in 1924.

Compass Health is a good match for Olde Glory Days, whose slogan this year is "Celebrating Freedom." The health network offers freedom from drug abuse through counseling and treatment programs, "Inspiring Hope, Promoting Wellness Since 1974," its logo states. Since that year, nine different entities have come together through a series of mergers to form Compass Health Network, Donni said.

The first treatment service in Clinton was known as Community Counseling Consultants, she said. It became a federally qualified health center in 2013, and was called Pathways Community Health.

Now it is part of the Compass Health Network, which has clinics in 46 counties in Missouri.

In 2004, Compass merged with Royal Oaks Hospital in Windsor, which provides inpatient treatment for acute behavior health problems. The hospital has 54 beds,12 for preadolescents and 42 for adolescents. It is now being remodeled to enhance the interior, Donni said, including the visitor space and enlarging the bathrooms.

All the psychiatric beds are full," she said.

In Clinton, Compass Health offers adolescent and adult outpatient treatment for substance abuse, psychiatric counseling, and psychological assessments and testing for children and adults. The Truman Lake Women and Children's Center offers a residential program, and Donni is working with Bill Moose of Door of Hope to find options for people in Clinton who are homeless. Compass Health also offers a Substance Awareness Traffic Offender Program (SATOP), a state-wide program required for people who have received a DWI or DUI, or required as a condition of a court order, probation, or charge of minor in possession. The objective of SATOP is provide people with the opportunity to address their alcohol and substance abuse problems, reducing the number of repeat DWI offenses.

Ten years ago, Compass Health added primary health care for all ages, along with dental care. Health care is available to the general public, and as a federally qualified health center, Compass offers services to uninsured and underinsured people on a sliding scale, as well as people with health insurance.

A few years ago, Compass added the Dental Bus, a mobile dental clinic staffed by dentists, dental hygienists and dental assistants, who offer check-ups and cleanings.

Clinton and Henry County." County Clerk Rick Watson is running uncontested for the combined position of Henry County Collector and Treasurer. Incumbent Ann Julian did not run for another term.

Assessor Scott Largent is running unopposed for another term.

"We have utilized technology to do more with less funding," said Largent. "I appreciate the support Henry Countians have given me for the past nine years."

Additional unopposed candidates are Deputy Henry County Coroner Paul Abbot for the county coroner spot, incumbent Surveyor Jacob Hann and incumbent Public Administrator Allen Huff.

Current Henry County Coroner Dain Sisk did not run for the coming term.

No Democratic Party members filed for open seats in the county primary election.

ducted by the Division of Drug and Crime Control of the Missouri State Highway Patrol, which then led investigators to execute multiple search warrants of the home and devices of Roberts.

Highway Patrol investigators, through analysis of Roberts's phone, found multiple files containing what appeared to be photographs and videos of graphic child pornography, including numerous videos that appeared to have been created by the defendant in his home with children under the age of nine.

The jury trial began Monday, June 24, 2024. One hundred and fifty Henry County citizens were summoned for selection. The State presented evidence over the course of several days, including footage from the defendant's phone. The jury deliberated for over an hour and returned a verdict the afternoon of Thursday, June 27, 2024.

The defendant will be sentenced at a later date by Circuit Judge M. Brandon Baker, which will be set on August 8, 2024. Each sexual trafficking of

a child conviction is punishable by a term of life imprisonment without the possibility of parole until the defendant has served twenty-five years in prison. Because the victims were under the age of twelve, each of the rape and sodomy in the first degree convictions are punishable by life imprisonment without the eligibility of parole until the defendant has served thirty years of such sentence.

Forged By Christ: Men's Discipleship Center Hosted Community Open House

Two years ago, Darren Huey and members of First Baptist Church who take the Celebrate Recovery program into the Henry County Jail saw the possibility of creating a place where the men could receive the support and guidance, they need to change their lives after they were released.

It was something people in the community had seen the need for and talked about for more than 15 years, according to Keith Ross, a Celebrate Recovery volunteer.

Everybody told me, "Don't get your hopes up," Darren Huey said.

On Sunday, June 30, Darren, Joe Hilty, the Forged by Christ board and members of First Baptist Church invited the community to an open house at the Men's Discipleship Center, 510 W. Ohio St., to see how

volunteer labor and donations have transformed a former church into a transition home where men will have the opportunity to change their lives.

Housewarming presents were not required, although the walls could use some pictures.

"Mainly, I want people to come and see what we've been doing here," said Joe Hilty, president of the Forged by Christ board.

Although it's been tried in the past, the effort succeeded this time because the timing was right, Joe said. Everything sailed through the approval process with no dissenting votes. What Joe said he found encouraging was the positive response he got from everybody he talked to about it, he said.

"The process has been a 'God-thing' the whole way," Darren said. "Plan-

ning and zoning —100 percent approval, church approval, 100 percent, and the city council approved it 100 percent two times."

One hundred members of First Baptist Church first heard of the plan on June 12, 2022. Forged by Christ received the keys to the building in mid-April of 2023, then held work parties twice a week. They anticipated completing the project in three months, but it turned out to take a year longer.

The longer work span turned out to be a blessing. In all, 150 people worked on the renovation, Darren said, and the people they met and the connections they made along the way have proved invaluable.

"It wouldn't have meant as much," Darren said of completing the center.

The project was challenging, Joe said. The bottom level of the former church, called New Beginning Ministries, was built in the 1960s, with an upper level added in the '70s. But during the Covid epidemic, church membership dropped to the point where it could no longer keep the doors opened.

The Forged by Christ volunteers leveled the sloped floor of the sanctuary and turned it into a living space, put up a dividing wall to create a dormitory with five bunk beds, and added showers to the upstairs bathroom.

Downstairs is a kitchen and dining area, laundry room and four bedrooms. One is for Darren, the director of the center, and three double bedrooms for residents as a reward for their adherence to the program. Using those downstairs bedrooms will allow them to add six more men to the program, Darren said, in four or six

All the residents will be required to have jobs to support the center, follow a structured schedule and do community service regularly, starting with helping their neighbors. The men will pray together,

months.

study the Bible together and take classes to give them the skills to become productive members of society, Joe said. People who live nearby were notified of the planned center by mail, and were invited to visit and talk with the Forged by Christ volunteers.

Now, everyone is invited to see the transformation, which invokes a "wow" response from people who walk through the door.

"We wanted to invite the whole community to come out to see our efforts," Darren said. "The community has made this happen."

The June 30 open house, from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m, was a come-and-go affair, with no formal ceremony planned, he said. Forged by Christ volunteers was available to answer questions, and light refreshments were served.

A year from now, there will be another event, a ceremony for the men who graduate from the discipleship program. Transition houses that provide a structured environment and set high expectations for residents have a 75 to 80 percent success rate, Joe said, compared to the high recidivism rate among men who have no support system when they are released from jail, and who end up returning to their old haunts, and back in jail.

But ultimately, the success of the program is dependent on the individual's desire to succeed, Darren said, with the help of Christ. Keith Ross, a volunteer with the center, knows what it feels like to be saved from yourself. After he returned from fighting in Vietnam, he made unhealthy choices to deal with the trauma, he said, and is thankful he had a church family who pulled him out of it.

Keith and Randy Shipman, the retired minister of First Baptist Church, were among the group from First Baptist Church who first took Celebrate Recovery into the local jail 12 years ago. Keith still remembers the sound of the door shutting behind him and the key turning the lock, and realizing how desperate people who are permanently locked up must feel. The discipleship center gives men a second chance, he said.

"They need help to do that," Keith said.

The center also benefits the community. Incarceration costs the state \$85 a day per person, Darren said. The Men's Discipleship Center takes no government funds, and multiplying that cost by 10 people times 365 days, saves the taxpayers \$310,000 a year, he said.

Forged by Christ has received 34 applications for the center, he said, with more coming every day. The applicants are screened — no violent offenders or sex offenders. There are hard and fast rules, including zero tolerance for drug use, an instant cause for dismissal.

Applicants are interviewed, either at the jail, in person at the center or by video from prison, Darren said. Men from Henry County are given precedence, although FBC has received requests from other counties.

They have also received requests from local judges who have men they want to send to the center, Darren said.

The first residents started moving in on July 1, he said, with more coming as they reach their release dates. The Men's Discipleship Center has plenty of food, Darren said, including a half a beef in the freezer that was donated, and enough laundry soap donated by Arm and Hammer in Harrisonville to last a year.

A few weeks ago, Darren took time out one afternoon just to sit in the living room area and imagine what the center will be like with the residents there. Sectional couches and chairs are set in a circle. Bookcases line the wall, filled with plenty of books, including Bibles.

The dining table downstairs, made from church pews recycled by Bill Mc-Coy, seats 12. Randy Shipman made the posts in the sleeping area and Darren made the bed-side shelves, also from church pews.

"Now it feels like a home," Darren said.

Darren was a little anxious about everything being ready for the open house on June 30, but is not worried that the Men's Discipleship Center will succeed in making a difference in the mens' lives.

"God lead me here," Darren said. "God has a plan. It's in His hands."

In addition to pictures for the walls and other decor items, the Forged by Christ volunteers ask for prayers for the selection committee and for the men who are chosen. It takes a lot of effort to turn your life around, but the Forged By Faith volunteers believe that living in the Men's Discipleship Center will reshape the lives of the residents, like a blacksmith reshapes iron by heating it

and hammering it.
The scripture that guides them: "And the God of all grace, who called you to his eternal glory in Christ, after you have suffered a little while, will himself restore you and make you strong, firm and steadfast." 1 Peter 5:10.

God gave Joshua authority and told him to be strong and courageous. Joshua was very brave, but it was the authority of God that took him across the Jordan River that God opened up for him.


God gave him authority to go into Jericho, to knock down walls that were five feet and eleven inches thick at the sound of yelling and the blowing of horns.



WORSHIP OBSERVATIONS

For some time now my wife and I have planned to visit other churches, especially churches of other traditions, to observe their styles of worship. After many hindrances, we were able to do that this morning. People welcomed us warmly, and we made new friends.

As parishioners arrived, they were greeted with coffee and cookies. The fellowship conveyed a warm welcome to us strangers.

The worship service was well planned. As a newcomer, I appreciated the printed bulletin. I did, however, wonder if the order of service was the same each week---a mistake churches easily and often make. Another congregation shares their facilities (good stewardship); but it requires different hymnals. With each new hymn number, someone had to clarify the hymnbook to use. It reminded me of the churches I attended as a child, "It's the blue book... it's the red hymnal."

The pastor was well prepared; I appreciated that. I have heard enough sermons to know when a pastor is prepared or "winging it." With this sermon, we walked through the difficulties and necessities of church/state separation. Jesus said, "Give to Caesar the things that are Caesar's and to God the things that are God's." Given the nearness of Independence Day and the present political fervor, the message was timely.

The custom of this church is to use the fifth Sunday offerings for special projects. They receive this offering in a large metal bowl---a noisy encouragement to "second mile" giving. Good thinking!

The sanctuary is lovely with large, attractive columns curved upward to a dome. Aesthetically pleasing, but as one who has been in many church building programs, it was a bit of a distraction---how did they make those columns? How did they install them? How much did they cost? The stained-glass windows were beautiful.




