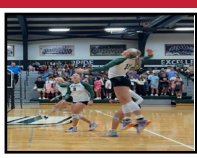
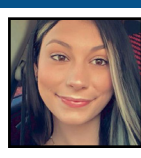

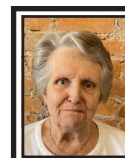

City Of Lincoln Addresses Busy Agenda On Monday Night



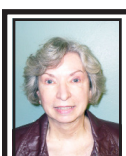

After the swift handling of routine business, the Lincoln City Council heard a report from Benton County Economic Development Director, JoAnn Lane on grants available for businesses that are Ag related in food production.

The Monday evening, September 9 meeting moved to reports from the new Police Chief, Andrew Breshears. Breshears also had in attendance his chief officer and his reserve officer. Chief Breshears, in his first report since assuming the position, revealed a great deal of progress on various issues that had been lingering.

Public Works Director, Josh Cole gave a verbal and written account of what his crew has been working on. The tasks were numerous and very diversified in what had been done. One large issue was working with Cardinal Apartments with water leaks with the goal of protecting the roadways in that area. A second task finally off the to-do list was getting the water lines installed to the Kendal Mast business on the north end of the 65 corridor. Shawnee Masonic Lodge will help by cooking for the event that will be held at the District Headquarters located at 1206 Medic Drive in Warsaw. and Everyone is welcome.

"The separate Lincoln Community Ambulance and Warsaw Community Ambulance formed the Warsaw-Lincoln Ambulance District in 1974," said Nathan Burton, Paramedic/Administrator of the ambulance district.



OPENING OF THE DOORS, the Warsaw-Lincoln Ambulance District is marking 50 years of service with a reception on September 21. Cole Paulsen, Karen Orick, Mayci Harman, Dave Jenkins and Colin Kabler will be among Ambulance District employees in attendance.

"We always had a station in Warsaw and most of the time in Lincoln. Now we have a third one -- South Station at Jackman and Hwy 7."

Burton has been with the ambulance district since 1997

and has seen it grow to 26 full-time employees. There are 40 Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) and Paramedics, and technology has advanced so that crews in the field

(Continued from Page 1) and power loads that help prevent cumulative trauma injuries are also available to assist with moving and loading patients. Some of the previous old equipment was physically hard on those lifting patients.

There is one Response Vehicle in the district that is usually driven by Burton for crew back up and is also used in inclement weather. The district owns six ambulances with four on duty.

"Typically, we are one of the better covered ambulance districts in the area," said Burton.

EMTs and paramedics go through in-house and external training and are qualified by the state. The EMT class takes two nights a week for six months and is open to anyone. Paramedics must take one or two years of training after qualifying as an EMT.

"Typically, we are one of the better covered ambulance districts in the area," said Burton.

The Warsaw-Lincoln Ambulance District covers much of Benton County and a small portion of Henry County. Cole Camp has its own ambulance district. When patients are transported by ambulance, they most frequently go to Golden Valley Memorial Hospital or Bothwell Regional Health Center. However, patients can also be transported to Lake Regional Hospital in Osage Beach, Citizens Memorial in Bolivar, and Western Missouri Medical Center in Warrensburg.

Burton and Administrative Assistant Karen Orick run the administrative staff and there are three shift supervisors, David Jenkins, Marty Baumhoff and Jonathan Evans. Crews are on 48 hours and off 96 hours. One crew is always on duty while two others are off. The medical director is Dr. David Gustafson who has certification in emergency medicine and ensures that protocols are what they need to be for treatment. There are six members on the ambulance district's Board of Directors. They are Bill Dockery, Donnie Nichols, John Mehrens Jr., Sal Rios, Brooke Daleske and Scott Spencer.

(Continued from Page 1) on a new budget for his department for 2025.

City Clerk Sabrina Brown reported a man, new to Lincoln, was concerned about the costs to comply with licensing a dog in the community. He had three and was not happy with the costs he was facing. He wants the city to sponsor a clinic for dogs receiving their necessary shots and after discussion it was decided the city would investigate and possibly of establishing a city provided clinic.

Ms. Brown announced she has decided the city has to take the plunge and purchase new city software. She said the matter will have to be voted on for approval at the October regular meeting.

Cameron Akins, a W&C Insurance adjuster, was on hand and reported his findings on hail damage on city owned property. There are solar panels that need to be replaced at the sewer plant, police receptor building, concession stand and bathrooms and the dugout roof in Hare Park, the buildings on Main Street, including one-half the roof on the cattle barn in the 4-H grounds, the Maintenance shed roof on the 65 Corridor, the Airport hangar. The adjuster says he is including ground cleanup at the airport to insure nothing is left to damage airplane tires. He stated the city has full replacement coverage with a \$2,500 deductible.

There was a first and second reading by title only of Bill No. 09-09-2024 to become ordinance #722. It is: "An Ordinance establishing rules and guidelines for water bill adjustments, when requested by customers, by the city Clerk, to offset excessively high water consumption due to a catastrophic leak or neglect." The Bill passed unanimously by roll call vote.

Mayor Nelson announced there will have to be a solution concerning the sale of the ferris wheel, carousel and the little train housed in the Big Park. The city does not have insurance liability coverage and the company

will not write a policy. The Park Board will have to meet and discuss the issue and then the city will have to find a buyer.

The Mayor gave the council a heads-up that the budget process sessions will begin on September 25 and again on October 2, beginning at 1:00 PM. With no further business, the meeting adjourned.

Benton County Commission Approves Tax Rates For 2024

Attorney Gable Dull met with the Benton County Commissioners on August 26 to present an application for vacation of a portion of a platted road located in First Addition to Lakeview Heights. Also present were Jeffre and Diane Firman. This property is described as follows: Dogwood Lane running parallel to the eastern boundary of Lots 175 through 178 and 30' of Lot 179 for a total distance of 30' x 480'; Cross Lane running parallel to the northern boundary of Lots 180 for 70' and the northern boundary of Lots 181-183 for a total distance of 30' x 375'; Northern walking path (running east-west) running parallel to the southern boundary of Lot 190 for 116' and the southern boundary of Lot 175 for 40', for a total distance of 10' x 156'; Eastern walking path (running north-south) running parallel in the western boundary of Lot 185 for 155' and western boundary of Lot 182 for 100', for a total distance of 10' x 225'.

There being no opposition to the proposed vacation, District 2 Commissioner Scott Harms made the

motion to approve the vacation as presented. The motion passed.

In other business the Commissioners discussed the proposed tax rates for Benton County. Commissioner Harms made the motion to approve a resolution to adjust the tax rate ceiling as required and to accept the proposed tax rates for the 2024 tax year. The motion passed. The proposed tax rates are \$0.1119 for general revenue and \$0.2107 for Road and Bridge per \$100 assessed valuation.

The Commissioners have contacted the Department of Health and Senior Services and the Missouri State Highway Patrol pertaining to a business within Benton County that is allegedly selling cannabis without a license. Further investigation will be given to this matter.

County Treasurer Rick Renno presented his weekly financial report and County Clerk Susan Porterfield submitted bills for approval and payment.

* * *

The Benton County Commissioners met with Collector David Brodersen, Deputy Collector David Hansen at their September 3 meeting to discuss SB 190/SB756 providing a tax reduction benefit for older Benton County residents. The attendees reviewed a proposed order/ordinance from MAC attorney Travis Elliott. Some written changes were proposed and these were emailed to Elliott to consider adding to the draft ordinance. A draft application form and a draft approval form have been proposed by the Collector's Office and these documents will be finalized with the adoption of a future ordinance.

In other business, the Commissioners opened the RFQ Proposal submitted by HMN Architects of

Overland Park, Kansas. This RFQ is intended to have an architectural firm develop a Master Plan for Benton County. The proposal will be reviewed and an interview with the selected firm will be conducted on September 9.

The Commissioners discussed the proposed Memorandum of Understanding document between Benton County and the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers. This agreement outlines the maintenance needs of Benton County roads that provide access to Corps property roads. This document will be reviewed and approved at a future Commission meeting.

Presiding Commissioner Steve Daleske received a quote from Heritage Tractor to repair the damaged John Deere tractor Road District #1. The quick quote was \$17,646.82.

It is recommended that Mike Keith insurance be contacted to determine the deductible amount to have this unit repaired. Commissioner Daleske called Jennifer Taylor of Mike Keith Insurance and was advised that the deductible would be \$500. The decision was made to submit the quote to begin processing the insurance claim.

The Commissioners discussed the issue with road signage problems in the County. There is a large backlog of signs to be installed and the current part-time employee is not able to address this backlog. One recommendation was to hire a full-time employee to handle the backlog and the future signage needs. It was also recommended that this task remain with the E-911 Center as they have the equipment to manufacture the signs. Commissioner Daleske will visit with Director Jessica Mayfield regarding this issue.

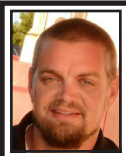

Lincoln was forced to forfeit last season after a 42-8 score in the fourth quarter against Crest Ridge as injuries left them with just ten healthy players. The Cardinals have 22 players this time around and are looking to redeem themselves after the disappointing loss to Tipton in week 2.

Wildcats Earn Tough Comeback Win On The Road Against Ranked Adrian



AN INSTANT CLASSIC, Warsaw took on the Class 1 #2 ranked Adrian Blackhawks on Friday and, after trailing 21-7 early in the second half, held their own and mounted a wild comeback in the fourth quarter to win, 28-21, improving their record to 2-0 for the season.

It was a battle of heavyweights in an early season Ozark Highlands Conference matchup on Friday night when the Wildcats took to the road at Adrian to take on the #2 ranked team in Class 1.

Both teams traded punches through the bout but when the final bell rung, two fourth quarter touchdowns proved to be the knockout blows that the Wildcats needed to escape Bates County with a 28-21 win.

After the home team won the coin toss and deferred to the second half, Warsaw came out swinging in the first quarter when quarterback Garrett Ferguson heaved a ball deep downfield. The pass was tipped by an Adrian defender, but Drake Murrell's focus helped secure the ball for a 54-yard touchdown. Logan Gemes came on to put the PAT

through and Warsaw led early, 7-0.

The Wildcats defense forced a turnover, a fumble recovery by Shane Poyser, on the Blackhawks' ensuing drive, but that possession came up empty as Warsaw turned the ball over on downs at the Adrian 25 yard line.

A methodical drive for the Blackhawks moved the ball just across midfield and a controversial defensive pass interference call (one of a few) set Adrian up at the Wildcats' 2 yard line. There, freshman Elijah Hubbard scored on a short TD run, the extra point was good, and the game was tied at 7-7.

After another stalled drive by the Wildcats, Adrian took the lead when Hubbard parted the Warsaw defense and ran seemingly untouched into the endzone on a 35-yard run. Warsaw's Kendall Bagley blocked the PAT, but the Wildcats faced their first deficit of the season, trailing, 13-7.

Warsaw's final possession

of the first half took them to the Blackhawks' 2 yard line, but a series of penalties and miscues pushed them back to the 28 where the drive came to an end on a blocked 43-yard field goal attempt by Gemes and, at the break, Warsaw still trailed, 13-7.

Things began to look bleak for the Wildcats in the third when Adrian went ahead by two scores after Colton Miller connected with Mason Rusow on a 60-yard slant pass that ended in paydirt. Miller tacked on the PAT and Adrian led, 21-7.

But after being knocked to the mat, the Wildcats got back up.

Late in the third, Josh Harvath got Warsaw back on the board on a 6-yard TD run and after another PAT by Gemes split the uprights, the 'Cats trailed just 21-14 with one quarter to go.

Fairly early in the fourth, Ferguson tied the game on a 3-yard touchdown run and Gemes' PAT tied things at 21-21.

Murrell forced and recovered a fumble by

Adrian deep on their end of the field, but the Wildcats coughed it right back to the Blackhawks when Ferguson scampered for a first down but then had the ball jarred loose by Bryler Ford.

But the Wildcats' defense stood the test and, despite taking several blows to the chin, kept throwing punches.

Warsaw took the lead with 1:53 left to go in regulation on a 2-yard TD run by Jayce Depriest and Gemes nailed the PAT to give the Wildcats a 28-21 lead.

Adrian's final drive of the night ended on a turnover on downs and Warsaw went into victory formation to take the 28-21 win.

Ferguson finished with 101 yard on the ground on 25 carries and 7 of 10 passing for 116 yards. He had 1 touchdown each on the ground and through the air.

Harvath was also over the century mark with 104 yards on just 14 carries and had 1 TD on the ground. He also reeled in 2 passes for 23 yards.

Depriest went for 48 yards on only 8 attempts and had 1 TD.

Murrell was on the receiving end of 3 passes for 73 yards and had 1 TD.

Freshman Brecken Brewster paced the Wildcats' defense with 6.5 tackles while Murrell had 3 and Luke Henderson and

Harvath both recorded 2.5. Brewster and Murrell each forced fumbles and Poyser and Murrell both had recoveries.

Gemes was a perfect 4 for 4 on his PAT's. His only field goal attempt was blocked.

The Wildcats (2-0, 1-0) will finally be at home this Friday night when they put their unbeaten record on the line against Lafayette County (Higginsville).

The Huskers also come into the contest at 2-0 after defeating Penney in week 1, 45-6 and Lawson in week 2, 57-20.

The Wildcats and Huskers are slated for a 7:00 PM kickoff at Randy Morrow Field on the campus of WHS.

Mirror of the Soul

Sometime back I made reference to knowing the difference between a conniption fit and a hissy fit and it seems that most people believed them to be the same thing. Not true! A conniption fit is very serious while a hissy fit is nothing to get excited over. I understand both but I wasn't sure I knew how to clearly define each so I turned to a reference book about the origins of words and phrases.

The word conniption comes from an English dialect word canapshus, meaning ill-tempered. Conniption is defined as a fit of rage or anger. A person can go into a conniption, have a conniption fit or have a fit of conniptions, all meaning the same. Such a fit was first recorded in writing in 1833 with: "Aunt Keziah fell down in a conniption fit."

The hissy fit is a mere expression of your disapproval or contempt for a situation. Hissing was first recorded in the review of a play in 1602. The author, Charles Lamb observed his first play hissed off the stage and was so embarrassed that he joined in the hissing so that no one would recognize him as the playwright.

He must never have forgotten the experience because years later he was delivering a lecture and someone in the audience let forth with a loud hiss. After a brief pause, Mr. Lamb in a level voice said: "There are only three things that hiss, a goose, a snake and a fool. Come forth and be identified."

Other phrases nearly lost to everyday speech would include, "By and by" means before long or in a little while. To those who question how many a "mess of fish" is, it is a great number or a large amount. The word mess applies to lots of things. A mess of folks, She picked a mess of beans to can, he just came through here drivin a mess of cows, when she married that feller, she walked into a mess of dough.

Anyone reading this column that already knew the correct definitions of all these words has probably always lived in Benton County or somewhere south of the Mason-Dixon line. And if you know the general direction of catty-wampus, I know you're a native. Anti-gogglin and catty-wampus is the same as catty-strangling. The latter term was actually found as a direction in an ancient Ozark deed. A town lot was described as "catty-strangling across" from another property. The words

actually mean diagonal or diagonally.

But never jump to hasty conclusions and assume that two similar sounding things mean the same. For instance, whippoorwill winter and blackberry winter are two entirely different times. Blackberry winter is a cold spell in late May or early June when the blackberries are blooming. While a whippoorwill winter is a cold April rain with considerable wind. Grandpa used to say: "When you hear a whippoorwill holler in April, you had better begin packin in extra wood."

And speaking of grandpa, he had a term that I have never heard used by another human and that was "Gabriel's Hounds." Gabriel's Hounds are wild geese in flight and to him they sounded like a pack of hounds in full cry. He said that was what his old grandpa Jake called them.

So many of the old words and phrases lose something in the translation. Vance Randolph explained it best in his book on Ozark dialect, "Down in the Holler." He told, how in Taney County, a big hillman from Sowcoon Mountain came down to a community dance hall in search of feminine companionship. It happened the place was full of high school girls that were scrawny and immature. "Shucks," said the hillman disgustedly, "the top waters is a shoalin but there ain't a hoss in sight." The local people roared with laughter, but a city fellow who was present could make nothing of it. He questioned what all the people were laughing about.

But how could they tell him? It's no use to explain that a topwater is a small worthless minnow, and a hoss is a highly prized fish, while shoaling is a frenzied sexual activity preliminary to spawning. These are the facts but facts are not funny.

Unless a man has actually seen topwaters and red-horse a-shoalin, he can never fully appreciate the Sowcoon Mountain wisecrack.

The colloquialisms that has long made our region unique are disappearing fast. The speech has become like our bread that is mixed and baked and then prepackaged so that it is all uniform with no chance for individual flavor. This is how our language has become, it is uniformly good and uniformly tasteless. Never too much salt or too much yeast, just perfectly flat and tasteless. And what a shame for that loss because speech is such a mirror of the soul.

Be Bear Aware

The Missouri Department of Conservation wants to remind Benton County Citizens to be "bear aware." There is a growing black bear population in MO. While most of the bears are south of Interstate 44, some bears are around the Benton County Area. MDC Biologist's want to make sure Missourians understand why they do not want bears to be fed by humans.

There's an element of truth in the old saying that a fed bear is a dead bear. Black Bears that get used to finding food around homes, businesses and campgrounds often must be destroyed. You don't have to deliberately feed bears to get them in trouble. Simply leaving food where they can get it is enough. And you might be surprised what qualifies as food for a bear; pet food, livestock feed, birdseed, sugar water in hummingbird feeders and garbage all are tempting to hungry bears. Bears are constantly on the move, and

they will check out anything that smells like it might be good to eat.

If you see a bear in your area, biologist recommend bringing birdfeeders inside for a couple weeks and not putting trash out until right before pickup time. Livestock feed should be kept in bear-proof buildings or containers, and pets should be fed inside or only given as much as they can eat at one time. Campers can avoid creating "fed bears" by keeping food and trash locked in vehicles and not discarding garbage in or around campsites.
