Clinton Christian Academy Continues To Grow Amid 25th Anniversary Celebration

In 1999, Jeff and Amber Rowe and Michael and Michele Parks started discussing the possibility of an alternative educational option in Clinton.

When they decided to move forward, the first person they contacted was Sandra Braithwaite, Jeff said, who was superintendent of the Clinton School District. The second was Fr. Tom Hearnes at Holy Rosary Catholic Church. What the two founding families of Clinton Christian Academy wanted to make clear, Jeff said, is that CCA was not organized because of any lack of confidence in the teachers and staff of the public and parochial schools.

What started with those discussions has grown to a K4-12 grade school with 180 students and 34 staff members. CCA is now celebrating its 25th year, and is about to launch a building program on the school campus, west of Clinton just off Hwy. 18.

"It's not so much an expansion as a facility enhancement to make things better for the stu-

dents who are here," said Robin Ritchie, head administrator.

Ritchie joined the staff in 2018, after 31 years in public school systems as a teacher and district superintendent. CCA had grown by adding grades, she said, and when she joined as the school's second administrator, CCA had just added year 2 of the upper (high) school.

Before Clinton Christian Academy was built be-

tween 2000 and 2003 on 8 and half acres on the west edge of Clinton, the students stood in a circle and prayed over the land, Ritchie said.

"It grew pretty quickly to 90 to 100 kids," Ritchie said of the school's first five years.

Like many local non-profits, the school started in the basement of a church, in this case the white-steepled First Baptist Church on Second Street, with 27 students and three teachers. Before the school opened, the founding families researched Christian curriculums and other Christian schools in the area, Ritchie said, and chose Abeka grade school curriculum. CCA also uses the BJU Press curriculum, she said, which integrates Bible verses into all areas of learning.

History Comes Home With Ancient Stories At Museum

When Patty Bartz was in high school, she remembers walking over to the Dari-Burg for lunch. For 20 cents, you had to make a choice, she said — a burger, grilled cheese sandwich or hot dog, plus an additional nickel for a soda or coffee at the Appleton City landmark, owned by Ernest and Eva Reed.

"Sometimes that's all you had, a quarter," Patty said. Patty is now a docent at the Appleton City Museum and History Center, 503 N. Maple St., where the most popular exhibit is the Dari-Burg, which closed 25 years ago. The exhibit has the iconic landmark's original bar stools, the celadon- green malt machine and the candy case. There's also the original order carousel with its metal clips, on the counter of the passthrough to the kitchen.

"That's where Ernest sat and took your order," Patty recalled. "He would bring it out to you."

The malt shop counter is also the most popular place for photo op in the museum, Patty said, which is open by appointment on Friday afternoons May through September. Admission is by donation. The museum, which opened ten years ago, is full of exhibits that bring local history to life, including the Roscoe Gun Battle. That's where outlaw John Younger was pursued on horseback and shot by Pinkerton detectives in 1874. There's also a painting of one of the old hotels at Monegaw Springs, a popular health spa in the 19th century where the Younger Brothers and the James Gang found refuge.

Patty had another connection to the Younger Brothers — a receipt that Cole Younger signed when he bought a horse from her great-great grandfather.

'To Honor Courage And Sacrifice' Brings Large Gathering To The Square On 9-11

The memories feel fresh for many even 23 years

About 75 people gathered last week on 9-11 to remember a day that forever changed the country. The crowd included members of law enforcement, fire fighters, city and county officials, school teachers and administrators, students, families and individuals from the community.

They were there "to honor the courage and sacrifice" of the many who died serving others, said Bethany Ross, master of ceremonies for the event. The annual remembrance is held on the southwest corner of the Clinton square, which is home to a 9-11 memorial that includes a piece of metal from the World Trade Center buildings.

Ross, who was in third grade at the time of the terrorist attack, recently visited New York City and said she was struck by the silence at the memorial at Ground Zero and by the sheer number of names etched in bronze.

"Even if you didn't lose a loved one, the impact is felt by all Americans," she

As a student, Ross helped secure a piece of the World Trade Center and create the permanent memorial on the courthouse lawn with support from her mother, Debby Van-Winkle at the Clinton Area Chamber of Commerce, and with a grant from the Truman Lake Community Foundation.

In the opening prayer, Pastor Justin Wright from Allen Street Baptist Church expressed gratitude for the people who responded on Sept. 11, 2001.

"We're thankful for those who ran in when so many wanted to run away," he

Members of the Clinton High School JROTC presented the colors, and Boy Scouts from Troop 430 led the Pledge of Allegiance. Xavier Mason, a senior at Clinton High School, sang the national anthem.

The guest speaker was Clinton native and decorated war veteran Colonel Paul Howerton. The colonel said he was in his final semester at the University of Missouri-Columbia and an ROTC cadet when he watched the twin towers

"I knew my future in the army was now going to be be vastly different than it had been just hours before," he said.

"In the aftermath of the attack, we saw America united in a way that quite frankly seems impossible in today's ultra-polarized environment," Howerton



The first principal at CCA was Carolyn Thornton, Ritchie said, who also taught classes. Thornton set the tone and culture of the school, including having the lower school students wear uniforms.

Clell Stephenson, who passed away in 2018, taught speech and debate at CCA starting in 2004, after retiring from teaching at Clinton public schools.

Roger Bancroft taught at CCA for 15 years, and started the girl's basketball program. Roger is inviting all former CCA teachers and coaches to a reunion on Tuesday, Sept. 24, at 1 p.m. in the CCA cafeteria. Refreshments will be provided. Call Roger at 660-885-1468 for more information.

"The purpose of the meeting is to be connected to each other and stay connected to CCA through prayer and whatever other needs we can meet," Roger said." Sometimes they need a tutor, and even though some of us can no longer teach full-time, we can continue to serve the Lord and CCA and be a part of it."

Volunteers are crucial to CCA, and include parents and grandparents who help keep the grounds mowed, the gardens weeded, and help Jackie McClure serve 110 hot meals a day and clean up in the cafeteria.

The average class size now is 11 students, with the high school growing from four students the first year, 2016, to 16 in three years. CCA has eight seniors who will graduate next spring, Robin said. CCA has five core courses four like public school (English, math, science and social studies), she said, plus Bible.

New at CCA is a student-led Praise Team, she said, which will be leading songs at weekly chapel services, on Fridays at 7:45 p.m.. The service is open to parents and the public. There is also a new Patriots performing arts club, called P-PAC.

CCA already received plans to build an enclosed bus barn for the school bus and a designated weight room. Weightroom equipment was donated to the school, Ritchie said, but up until now, the equipment has lived on the stage of the gymnasium, which is used for weekly chapel services, assemblies, graduation ceremonies and sports. The additions will be built on to the west side of the gymnasium, Ritchie said, using a volunteer contractor and

unteer force."

"We stand on the shoulders of giants, and those giants are those who paid the ultimate sacrifice in defense of this great nation," he said.

He said the rate of suicide among active military and veterans troubles him. Three individuals Howerton knew well, including a brother-in-law, have died by suicide in the past two years because they "are losing hope," he said.

In her closing remarks, Ross called for cooperation among citizens.

"Today, as we pause to remember, let us also renew our commitment to fostering unity and to embracing the values of empathy and solidarity as Americans," she said. "Let us ensure the legacy of those we lost is one of hope and strength rather than division and despair. May we continue to honor their memory by standing together in times of trouble and striving to make the world a better place for future generations."

Patty has put together and alphabetized folders of stories that people have brought to the museum, along with artifacts from the town's past. One treasure trove of Victorian hats and a trunk of Victorian dresses and suits came out of an old house in town, Patty said.

The basement of the museum is used to store items that are rotated out to exhibits. County museums serve as repositories of family history, where people looking for their family's roots can go and find primary sources of information.

"That's our service to the community," Patty said.

The museum volunteers, members of the Appleton City Historical Society and Appleton City Landmarks Restoration, Inc., also maintain a schoolhouse on the grounds, and operate a house museum, the William Clark House, which they have furnished as it looked in the 1940s, Patty said. of Allegiance, minutes from the August 30 meeting were unanimously approved. This was followed by an appearance from Brett Murphy who spoke about speeding on Craig Street where children are at play. Mr. Murphy requested that signs be put up. Bruce Stoecklein spoke about speeding on Arcadia Street where children also play. He requested additional signage. Both requests were placed on the Public Works agenda.

In other business The Council was informed that the Aquatic Center pool has been filled and opened on September 3. A roof replacement quote was received from Red Hammer for \$223,500. Staff will develop bid specs and solicit bids. The project is slated for summer 2025. The Council was also informed the Fire Department offered positions to six applicants, with three being EMT Certified.

The Council renewed agreements with Clinton Tourism and Economic Development. They also approved an agreement between the City of Clinton and the Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission to re-seal and re-mark runway 18/36 and Taxiway B at the airport.

The City Administrator reported that material used in the recent horseshoe tournament held at the Benson Center created an excessive amount of dust that covered the floor, crevices and walls and requires professional cleaning. The process of getting bids has begun and the City Attorney is looking into possible damages.

A motion was made an approved by Council Person House to re-zone from an R-1 Single Family Residential District to an R-2 Two Family Residential District the property known as Lot 9 of Coal Creek Estates. This followed an application by Lowe Family Holdings, LLC.

Before the meeting was concluded The Council adopted an ordinance for the Pay Plan for the City of Clinton for fiscal year 2024/2025. Finally an ordinance was approved adopting a Budget of Anticipated Cash Revenues and Expenses for various funds and accounts of the City of Clinton for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2025 and appropriating amounts set out for each item of General Operations and Capital Expenditures.

With no further action Mayor Carla Moberly accepted and declared a motion passed for adjourn-



Punk Barber Told about World War II Prisoner of War Experiences, Part I By Glynna Elliott Morse

The September 14 Windsor Historical Society program featured a videotape interview of Punk Barber's World War II experience as a B-24 gunner and time spent as a German prisoner of war. Punk's son, Kent Barber, presented the program which included the interview of Harry P. "Punk" Barber (1922-2014). Gary Swanson interviewed Punk in 2004 as part of "Americans Remembered," a Veterans History Project of the Library of Congress.

Kent Barber found the interview tape only a couple of months ago, an interview which provided information that the family had never known until seeing the videotape. Punk Barber was 82 at the time of the interview, and his answers were succinct and informative, providing details about his total World War II service.

The interviewer asked questions about Punk's childhood and school days in addition to his military activities. Punk was born in the family home in 1922, and he grew up on the farm which the Barber family had purchased from the Thornton family after the Civil War. His father, John Daniel Barber (1898-1974),

served in World War I and agaim in World War II, ending with the rank of Colonel. Because his father was away from home in the military, Punk said he was mostly raised by his grandparents, Harry A. Barber (1872-1948) and Lula (Ball) Barber (1876-1957).

Punk walked to the nearby one-room rural school, Liberty School, through the eighth grade. He rode a bus to Windsor High School, and he remembered that bus service for rural students had just started the year he began high school. He was on the basketball team and was captain of the basketball team his senior year. He graduated from Windsor High School in 1940.

As his father and grandfather before him, Punk attended Missouri University in Columbia.

The United States had declared war on Dec. 8, 1941, one day after Pearl Harbor was bombed. His father, John D. Barber, had been assigned as a Captain in the Army stationed in St. Louis. In Augut of 1942, Punk went to a recruiting office in St. Louis and enlisted in the army.

Punk Barber had hoped to be a pilot, but he was disqualified because he was color blind.

However, he could be a gunner, and he said he felt his skeet shooting ex-

perience was hepful.

After training at various schools and locations in Arizona, Texas, Indiana, and California, he was semt to a base 20 miles north of London in May, 1944, where he was assigned as a gunner on B-24 bombing missions over Germany.

Punk's B-24 craw would

Punk's B-24 crew would begin with a briefing meeting at 4 a.m when they were told where they were to go. The plane would take off at 5 a.m., dump their bombs at the target, and the crew would return to base by late afternoon. When asked if he was scared, Punk said, "We were too dumb to be scared!" Afer having hit their target, the plane would head for home, and when they saw the English Channel, they knew they were going to make it home.

The crew flew bombing missions every two days. The crew seldom flew the same plane because repairs were necessary to make the plane air worthy. The bombing missions experienced lots of flak (guns fired by the Germans). Punk said every plane on each of his bombing missions got hit by flak. His crew and planes returned home safely to base for twelve bombing missions. The thirteenth mission broke the string of successful missions.

The twenty-first century has brought a word to our attention, factchecking. It is not a new word; it just has never seen this much usage before. The goal of factchecking is to find the truth. You may be surprised to know the New Testament had at least one factchecker, the disciple Thomas.

Jesus told his disciples He was going away. The disciples likely registered displeasure at these words. Jesus continued, "You know the way to the place where I am going." By these words, Jesus likely meant as believers the disciples would one day follow Him into heaven.

Thomas asked for more instructions. "We don't know where you are going; how can we know the way?" Then again following the resurrection, Thomas could not believe until he checked the facts, "I will not believe until I see the scars in Jesus' hands and feet." Thomas's factchecking earned him the name "doubting Thomas."

On our way home from Kentucky, we missed our highway exit and got lost. We parked on the roadside to check our map. A lady, presumably a local, came over to help us. "Are you lost?" she asked.

"Yes, we are going to Kirksville, Missouri; but we missed our exit. Now we do not know which way to go."

"Let me see your map," she said; then she joined us in the search. It did not take long for us to realize she had no earthly idea how to direct us.

This story illustrates important truths. First, be careful where you get your advice. God alone knows where we would have gone if we had followed the lady's advice. No matter where you get your advice, do not be afraid to check it out. Jesus welcomed Thomas's factchecking. "Thomas, 'I am the way." Then later when Thomas insisted on proof of the resurrection, "Except I see His scarred hands and feet, I will not believe." Jesus showed Thomas His scarred hands and side.

Jesus not only said, "I am the way." He also said, "I am the truth." Truth will always survive an honest factcheck. The Bible is the place to check on your eternal queries. It is truth and will never lead you astray. Check it out!


