Abortion Big Issue In Benton County Among November Ballot Amendments

Proposed amendments to the Missouri constitution go to a statewide vote, meaning all eligible voters in the state will see the following questions on their November ballot. Amendments need a simple majority to pass, and then they are added to the state constitution.

Amendment 2 proposes making it legal for people 21 years old and older to bet on sports in Missouri. If it passes, the Missouri Commission Gaming would regulate sports betting statewide. The state would establish a 10% tax on revenues from sports gambling and allocate any leftover funds to education.

The state anticipates a one-time cost of \$660,000 and ongoing annual costs of \$5.2 million. The state could collect up to \$28.9 million annually from tax revenue. Initial licensing fees would bring in \$11.75 million.

R-IX Warsaw Superintendent Scott Gemes commented that he wasn't sure about how much money Amendment 2 would bring to education. "Amendment 2 will bring more money to Missouri so that is good, however, I don't know how much of it will wind up going to

Gemes said that right now citizens in Missouri are traveling to Kansas and Illinois to place their bets and that Missouri is missing out on the money those people spend when they travel to place bets.

Lincoln R-2 Superintendent Kevin Smith agreed with Gemes. "I was told recently by a legislator that if it did, we would receive

I talk to my good friend Larry Walthall just about everyday. In the last month or so he has been seeing a few American goldfinches at his bird feeder. They are commonly called wild canaries.

goldfinches, American which are the state bird of Iowa, New Jersey and Washington, are one of the latest breeding songbirds. They begin nesting from late July into September. This coincides with the abundance of their chief food source - seeds.

Almost any sort of seed will do. They readily feed on a wide variety of weed, flower, tree and grass seeds as well as buds, sap, berries and less commonly, insects. But, thistle seed is their favorite food. The American goldfinch's scientific name is carduelis (from the Latin word carduus which means thistle) tristis.

Unlike many birds, American goldfinches molt their feathers twice a year. The male in breeding plumage is easy to recognize: bright yellow with black wings and cap. Like other common feeder birds such as northern cardinals, the American goldfinch is a sexually dimorphic species with females much more drab than the eye-catching male.

After nesting in the fall, they molt again and male and female look more alike with feathers of brown,

Warsaw Seniors Target For Major Mail Fraud Scammers

The U.S. Postal Inspection Service reports that every year, mail fraud schemes are directed at consumers of all ages but some groups, like retirees, are more impacted than others. The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) says that consumers reported losing more than \$10 billion to overall types of fraud in 2023. It stated that only a small percentage of victims report the fraud, and even fewer manage to get their money back. Two of Warsaw's senior residents are among several locals who have recently been reported to have gone through the traumatic experience of being targeted for fraud, one by mail and one by phone.

(Continued from Page 1) violators could be fined \$100,000. A company's license also could be placed on probation or revoked.

The Missouri Gaming Commision will regulate the sports betting industry, like it does with casinos. If the measure is passed, state lawmakers can further regulate the industry, said Jan Zimmerman, chair of the Missouri Gaming Commission.

The vote amends the state constitution, so some items — like the 10% tax rate on betting revenue — couldn't amended without another constitutional amendment.

The gaming commission can't make new laws.

Another Amendment that Missouri voters will see on the ballot is Amendment 3, Right to Reproductive Freedom Initiative. The language on the ballot will be as follows:

"Do you want to amend the Missouri Constitution to: establish a right to make decisions about reproductive health care, including abortion and contraceptives, with any governmental interference of that right presumed invalid; remove Missouri's ban on abortion; allow regulation of reproductive health care to improve or maintain the health of the patient; require the government not to discriminate, in government programs, funding, and other activities, against persons providing or obtaining reproductive health care; and allow abortion to be restricted or banned after Fetal Viability except to protect the life or health of the woman?

If passed, this measure will have no impact on taxes. Amendment 6 is about salaries and benefits for law enforcement personnel.

Official Ballot Title: Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended provide that administration of justice shall include the levying of costs and fees to support salaries and benefits for certain current and former law enforcement personnel? and local State governmental entities estimate an unknown fiscal impact.

Fair Ballot Language:

A "yes" vote will amend the Missouri Constitution to levy costs and fees to support salaries and benefits for current and former sheriffs, prosecuting attorneys, and circuit attorneys to ensure all Missourians have access to the courts of justice.

A "no" vote will not amend the Missouri Constitution to levy costs and fees related to current or former sheriffs, prosecuting attorneys and circuit attorneys.

If passed, this measure will have no impact on taxes.

According to Benton County Sheriff Eric Knox, this bill will help ensure that people will have retirement benefits if they chose to go into law enforcement.

"We had in place a \$3 court cost that was designated for sheriff's retirement, but that was challenged and found unconstitutional so we lost that money for the retirement of law enforcement," said Knox. "This amendment will reinstate that money for retirement so we can recruit qualified candidates."

Amendment will reinstate the ability to collect the current \$3 court fee for guilty please in criminal courts placed in Missouri state statutes. The \$3 fee was established in A "yes" vote will amend December 1983 with the creation of the Missouri Sheriffs' Retirement System.

House Bill 81 in 1983 the fee and placed retirement system in State Statutes. The court fee provided full funding for the Sheriffs' retirement system since inception of the retirement system. The Prosecuting Attorneys' Retirement system was created in 1989. The \$4 fee for the Prosecuting Attorneys' Retirement System helps fund along with county and member contributions.

Amendment 6 allows voters to define the administration of justice as salary and benefits for only Sheriffs and Prosecuting Attorneys. The fee is only collected if a person is found guilty and judges will still be allowed to waive court fees if they find that it is a hardship on the person.

For many Sheriffs and Prosecutors and widows or widowers, this is the retirement have. The court fees can be considered a user fee of the court system, with many being out of state travelers. Without the fees, it would become a burden for the criminal justice system and fall to the local taxpayer to fund. Sheriffs' retirement has 200 retirees and survivors currently receiving benefits and 17 vest members not yet collecting benefits. 114 active Sheriffs are also participating in the plan and contributing 5% of their current salary. If Amendment 6 doesn't' the sheriffs' pass, retirement system projected to be bankrupt in 9 years.

There are 125 active members in Prosecuting Attorney's Retirements System with 90 members receiving benefits and 50 vested not vet collecting benefits. If Amendment 6 doesn't pass, the prosecuting attorneys' retirement system projected to be bankrupt in 15 years.

Amendment 7 is about voting.

Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended

voters to a single vote per candidate or issue; and

Require the plurality winner of a political party primary to be the single candidate at a general election?

State and local governmental entities estimate no costs or savings. Fair Ballot Language:

A "yes" vote will amend the Missouri Constitution to specify that only United States citizens are entitled to vote, voters shall only have a single vote for each candidate or issue, restrict any type of ranking of candidates for a particular office and require the person receiving greatest number of votes at the primary election as a party candidate for an office shall be the only candidate for that party at the general election, and require the person receiving the greatest number of votes for each office at the general election shall be declared the winner. This provision does not apply to any nonpartisan municipal election held in a city that had an ordinance in effect as of November 5, 2024, that requires a preliminary election at which more than one candidate advances to a subsequent election.

A "no" vote will not amend the Missouri Constitution to make any changes to how voters vote in primary and general elections. If passed, this measure will

have no impact on taxes.

These Amendments will be voted on November 5.

(Continued from Page 1) she trusted by her cash app, or go to Walmart and get a \$500 gift card or go to her bank and withdraw \$1,000. This senior had recently had a lot of emotional distress in her life and was not fully aware that the person on the phone was trying to steal her money. When she told him she didn't have enough money in the bank to withdraw \$1,000, he told her to get a loan by telling her banker that she needed it for emergency surgery. She realized he was a scammer and told him so.

"My daughter told me that the sum of \$1,898 was a classic dollar amount used candidates by limiting by scammers, as well as

other statements he made," said the victim. "I got some help from a tech-savvy friend who helped me go through my cash app to get a refund of my extra \$500 that I had spent on my purchase. The people working for the cash app were very security conscious and a month after the incident, I received a payment back into my bank account."

U.S. Postal Inspection Service Postal Inspector Paul Shade talked to the Benton County Enterprise about a senior man living in Warsaw who very nearly lost a large sum of money in a mail fraud scheme. He got a cashier's check for \$8,000 and mailed it to the seller of a truck he thought he was buying. However, the truck was not delivered and with the help of Shade, who found the letter with the cashier's check, the money never got in the hands of the fraudster targeting the victim. Shade said the practice of mailing checks from residences can be unsafe, and that it is not a good idea to leave mail in a mailbox overnight that has a check in it. He encouraged people to take such mail straight to the post office to lessen the chance of theft.

Lorra, who works on statistics for the Warsaw Police Department, said that fraud crimes increasing in the area. She said that only one fraud crime was officially reported in 2023, but so far this year there have been four reports since May. She said that many times people don't report suspected fraud so there is no way her office can know how many cases there are. She also stated that sometimes when fraud calls come into the office, a report cannot be written if the officer answering the call cannot find sufficient evidence of a crime.

The FTC suggests some usual ways scammers will try to commit fraud. They will often insist that you pay in a way that makes it hard to get your money back such as by wire transfer, gift card, cryptocurrency, or payment app. Anyone who insists that you can only make a payment one of those ways is probably a scammer. 

AS POTENT AS THE OFFENSE IS, the Wildcats defensive dominance accentuated Warsaw's 42-0 win at Versailles on Friday night. The Wildcats are now 5-0 overall, 3-0 in the Ozark Highlands Conference, and hold the #4 ranking in the state, their highest for the program in over a decade.

If one asks Google "what it means to be dominant", the word is deemed as an adjective with a description "ruling, governing, controlling; having or exerting authority or influence"

The Wildcats were just that at Versailles on Friday night, with the defense holding the Tigers to a mere 10 total yards of offense while accumulating 391 yards themselves in a 42-0 rout, spoiling the host team's Homecoming.

The Wildcats scored first on a 19-yard TD run by Jayce Depriest at 8:14 in the opening period and

Boyer said. "Shane works hard for us every week and it was great to see him hit paydirt."

Ferguson scored second touchdown of the night on a 21-yard run with 8:32 in the third quarter and Gemes split the uprights for the fifth time to get the clock running with a 35-0 Wildcat lead.

Warsaw's final tally of the night came early in the fourth, at 11:20, when Ferguson performed the "hat trick" with his third touchdown run of the night, this time from 15 yards out. Gemes' sixth PAT was good for the Wildcats' 42-0 final.

"Our team did a great job coming out ready to play. Offensively, we were able to get into a rhythm early and stay in it," Boyer commented.

Ferguson finished with 95 yards rushing on 15 attempts with 3 TD's while also completing 5 of 7 passes for 122 yards and 1 more touchdown.

Poyser was on the receiving end of 4 of Ferguson's passes for 91 yards and 1 TD while Depriest had the other reception for 31 yards.

Josh Harvath racked up 52 yards on 10 carries, Ryan Fajen picked up 40 yards on just 2 carries and Depriest added 38 yards on the ground on 5 attempts.

After going 7 for 7 on his PAT's just a week ago, Gemes followed up that performance with 6


Coach Drehle commented, "The incomplete pass call was a 16 point swing. We were driving to score and now they go score. We have a lot of things to work on and get better."





(Continued from Page 1) olive and dull yellow-green accented by buff or white markings. The change in the males plumage leads

some people to believe that American goldfinches are absent in the winter when in fact they may still be around- just in duller plumage. When the males molt back from drab to brilliant it seems as if they just appear from nowhere.

Four subspecies are recognized, separated by size, wing and tail markings and color intensity.

Many southern populations are resident, but northern populations are short distant migrants, traveling during the day in sizable flocks. In winter, flocks wander nomadically in search of food and are common visitors at backyard bird feeders. Resident flocks may move as much as 4-6 miles between multiple feeding

Feathers are much more dense in the fall molt which provides additional layers of insulation to help keep them warm throughout the winter.

finches Since granivorous (mostly seed eating diet) they also have other adaptations such as a strong conical bill that easily gathers and splits seeds and dexterous legs and feet which allow them to scramble up and down plant stems and hang from seedheads while feeding thereby accessing seed sources unavailable to other birds.

The American goldfinch male courts a female through flight displays and song. When a female accepts a male as a mate each flies in wide circles while the male sings.

The male then selects a territory, often close to several other goldfinch pairs in a loose colony. The close proximity of the pairs may help in defense against predators.

The female builds the nest, a tightly woven cup of plant fibers and spider webs lined with thistle down in a tree or shrub, usually 15'-17' high. The nest is attached to the supporting twigs with spider web. American goldfinches nests are so well made that they have even been known to hold water.

While the female incubates the eggs by herself, the male feeds her on the nest. After the chicks hatch (in about 12 days) the female in turn feeds her chicks. As the nestlings grow, both parents feed them directly, but the male gradually takes over feeding the young birds. Nestlings fledge in about 12 days. Since they begin nesting late, American goldfinches usually only produce one brood of four to six eggs per season. It is estimated there are about three males for every two females because males live longer.

The American goldfinch is one of the very few species not affected by the cowbird brown-headed which are parasitic nesters. Cowbirds do not build a nest of their own. It has been documented that the female cowbird lays eggs in as many as 220 different species' nests. The incubation period for cowbirds

is generally shorter than the host nest species. The cowbird egg hatches first, chicks develop faster, and the cowbird chick tosses out other eggs or nestlings of the host species. Any cowbirds that hatch in an American goldfinch nest usually die of starvation because goldfinches feed regurgitated seeds to their young, a diet that fails to meet a cowbird's nutritional requirements.

Also the Board approved the 2024-2025 strategic plan, the purchase of a bus from Freightliner for delivery in July of 2025, and the resolution for the District to form its own police department.

Following discussion the Board approved the 2024-2025 school year ONLY, the ability of staff members to take five PTO days in a row

If staff members take more than five days in a row, the excess days will be docked financially.

It is important for staff members to realize that the excessive absenteeism policy still remains in effect which can include financial penalty, administrative write-ups etc. Five in a thirty day period, ten in a one hundred twenty day period and fifteen in a one hundred eighty day period. These day spreads are calendar days, not school or contract days.

It is the Board's desire to tighten up the language regarding paid time off, well prior to the start of the 2025-2026 school year. With no further business the meeting adjourned.

Michael McBride met with Commissioners discuss a road within K.C. Colony subdivision. Presiding Commissioner Steve Daleske explained procedures for vacating

McBride stated that this road is a subdivision road and should not be vacated since the plat indicates that roads are open to the public, but a gate has been constructed across a road by another resident. Sheriff's deputies have visited this area several times address complaints. to Lieutenant Lowe stated that this is a civil matter and that there is nothing law enforcement can do. McBride was advised to seek legal guidance in this matter.

County Treasurer Rick Renno presented his weekly financial report and County Clerk Susan Porterfield submitted bills for approval and payment.



I'm writing this letter in response to the letter from Mr. Bird in the September 26, 2024 issue of the Benton County Enterprise. Bird is certainly entitled to his opinion regarding the decision made by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Cole Camp, however some of the statements he made were not correct. Had he attended the open meeting held to discuss questions the Board had regarding the grant application he would had an opportunity to hear the information from the various entities present. There were representatives

the Missouri Department of Parks, from MoDOT, and the writers of the grant application itself. He stated that building the trailhead would "cost the city almost nothing for construction". He talked of all the materials and labor that would be donated. The fact is that the TAP grant is a federal grant and there are strict regulations about the materials that must be used. Materials must be purchased from vendors that are approved by the grantors and labor must be contracted with approved contractors. None of these vendors or contractors are local. He neglected to mention that the other towns that are building trailheads did not do so with a TAP grant. These towns raised the funds with the help of the Friends of the Rock Island Trail. That group has raised approximately \$7000.00 of the over \$125,000 needed to build the trailhead and the 3/4 mile of trail (not 1/4 as he stated) required by the grant. The rest of the funding would have come from city taxes paid for by the citizens of Cole Camp on their property. Part of that funding could have been offset by the donation of land, but the amount that was pledged was not large enough to support all the parking, etc. needed for the trailhead and would have necessitated the city purchasing additional land. Mr. Bird stated that the city would "be guaranteed" not to get another grant from MoDOT. It was clearly stated by the representative from MoDOT that turning down the grant would not preclude receipt of future grants from MoDOT. One of the big issues

of contention is that not having the Rock Island Trail will "destroy the only viable economic development plan on the horizon" for Cole Camp. The representative from the Dept. of Parks stated in the open meeting that the trailhead will be built in the future whether or not Cole Camp chooses to build it now. The location of the trailhead may not be in the same location however. A potential problem with the bicyclists contributing to the economic development of the city is the location of the trailhead being out of town. There is no easy, safe access for bicycle riders come to Cole Camp the proposed location of the trailhead. The other cities that have reported increases in sales tax revenues have their trailheads located within the city so there is easy access to the local businesses. This trailhead would be at least one and one-half miles north of Cole Camp. Additionally, U Hwy. is the only available road between the proposed site and the city. This road has inadequate shoulders for safety of bicycle riders and there is no way to widen the road to accommodate


the bicyclists. The Board of Aldermen stated clearly that they are not against the Rock Island Trail itself. Their concern is simply that the tax dollars from the citizens of the city would be more wisely spent at this time on city infrastructure such as repairing roads and sidewalks.

Ain't No Cokes In Hell! Part two

Every farm on the creek had its own orchard in those days. The seedlings were commonly purchased from a salesman traveling around selling trees for a nursery. Down here on the creek it was usually the Stark Bros. Nursery Louisiana, Mo. Many times the peddler traveled by horseback to take the orders for the fruit trees in late summer. The seedlings arrived in late fall with the mail carrier and were promptly planted. They always produced as

represented. I spoke earlier of Greatgrandma's stone canning jars, which brings to mind the large stone jars that my Aunt, my Grandmother and my Mother utilized to pickle cucumbers and process kraut. My Aunt and my Mother transferred the pickles and the kraut into glass mason jars but Grandma Laura almost always preferred to leave hers in the large stone jars, and just take out what she needed to cook that day.

What cabbage that was not processed into kraut was kept in a hole in the front lawn of this house. It was covered with soil and hay to prevent it from freezing and was unearthed when needed for the winter table. A few summers ago I had some landscaping done in that area, so the indentation is no longer visible.

A favorite family folklore story (every family has them) concerns my cousin Norma and her Mother's (my Aunt) large stone canning jars. It was late fall and the canning season was finally over. My Aunt had washed her precious jars and turned them upside down on the back porch to

Now picture my impish little cousin, "Tootie," as we all still refer to her, with a "hickory nut" and Tootie had secured possession of a

hammer from somewhere. The top of the crock was about the right height for her "cracking" purposes. So, she rested the hickory nut upon the first jar in order to strike it with the hammer and reveal it's wealth inside.

When the first jar split

neatly apart, not to be deterred, she just picked up her hickory nut and proceeded to move to the next jar. Another bit the dirt! And another! And another! But little Miss Tootie didn't cease until she had reached the end of the row. And I'm sure that if I recall the proficiency my wonderful Aunt had with a peach tree limb, little Miss Tootie sat down carefully for awhile. I spoke earlier of the wash house in every back yard on the creek. That was a way for the women to keep the heat of canning, cooking and laundry from the main house. They had their own wood fired cook stove which were never as grand as the range that was in the main kitchen inside the house. Grandma Laura, here on the creek, had a plain Jane black one in the wash house out back. Inside the house she had a white enameled model that she kept polished and shined as if it were 18 carat gold. My Mother had a modern, in technology, latest electric range as soon as the REA (Rural Electric Association) made that possible. My Grandmother resisted for many years before succumbing to a gas model. Little by little she realized the benefits that came from less heat in the

I don't exactly recall the lengths of time that all those canning pots had to process atop that old wood burning stove but I do know that the combination of a wood fire and steam, on an already hot summer day, made you think seriously about what was preached from the pulpit on Sunday. It gave you a prelude to what after life down below would be like. The preservation of the family's food in that old washhouse made me know, as the old Evangelist said: "There ain't no fans, not no rest and brother, there ain't no cokes in hell!

Small, But Mighty: Mt. Hulda Church Hosts Annual Fish Fry

long The running traditional fish fry held annually on the last Sunday of September had perfect weather conditions. The location is Mt Hulda Congregation's stone church setting atop a high hill that overlooks the Indian Creek Valley and is one of the older parishes in the area.

The Fish Fry is such a long running event that no one seems to recall anymore when it actually began. In the earlier days the congregation purchased fish from a fish farm at Stover and then a local church member, Glen Smith, allowed the men of the church to seine and catch fish from his well stocked ponds. As the dinner's popularity grew the church finally began ordering the fish

commercially. The meal consists of fried fish, homemade French fries, cornbread, home baked white bread, Cole slaw, home grown tomatoes, green beans, German potato salad and lots and lots of cakes and pies, all made from scratch. In the early days the fish was deep-fried in large black cast iron kettles on the back lawn. Presently the workers utilize gas operated fryers located in a screened kitchen area behind a large screened shelter house. The dinners had always been served in the church basement but growing attendance forced them to add the outdoor dining area which is generally a favorite with the attendees, although food is still served in the air-conditioned basement for those desiring a more controlled atmosphere.

The native, Ozark stone church was built in 1952 to replace an older frame building from the 1800s. The present day parsonage is a ranch style, built in 1975 to replace a two-story frame home that had been

erected about 1900. In December, 2004, a young minister, Allen Braun, accepted the call to become Pastor and brought his young wife Laura and baby daughter to take up the pastorate. The young family fell in love with the residents and the area and have stayed to raise a large family and become vital members in the community socially as well as his duties.


Pastor Braun certainly

doesn't let any grass grow beneath his feet as he also serves as Pastorial assistant to Trinity in Cole Camp, is a vacancy pastor for Iglesia Lutherana Amigos de cristo in Sedalia. He serves as Chaplain to the local Lakeview Heights Fire Department, serves as a Chaplain to the Missouri State Fire Department on the Fairgrounds, the first

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

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

Here are some common types of scams:

• Cryptocurrency – Not all cryptocurrency offers are scams, but many are. The scammers will contact you via social media, claiming they've made a lot of money in crypto and are willing to help you do the same. They may direct you to a website or app to invest, but the "company" taking your money may not even exist, and, after taking your money, may disappear.

• Investment programs - These programs claim to have "proven" strategies that can enable you to get rich by investing in financial products. But these strategies are dubious at best and can cost you thousands of dollars that could otherwise go into an investment plan based on your goals, risk tolerance and time horizon.

• Real estate – Typically, a real estate scam tries to get you to invest in a "worldclass" or "luxury" property development, but these properties may take years to build, if they're built The first weekend of at all. • Gold and other precious metals - Scammers who call themselves "rare coins" merchants may try to sell

• Be suspicious of "risk-free" claims. All investments carry risk, and no variable investments can claim to provide "guaranteed returns." If an individual or organization downplays the risk of an investment and doesn't want to provide risk disclosures, just walk away. • Ask about licensing or

registration. Legitimate investment professionals must be registered with the Financial Industry Regulatory Authority (FINRA) and be licensed by your state's securities regulator before they can sell you any investment product. You can check the status of an individual or firm by using FINRA's BrokerCheck tool brokercheck.fina.org.

• Do some research. You can search online for the name of the company or individual offering you an investment opportunity. By entering terms such as "review," "scam," "fraud" or "complaint," you may well find that other people have experienced problems or been victimized.

To achieve your financial goals, you'll likely need to invest for decades — so, be wary of scammers who claim to offer a shortcut to success.


Carl was married to Sandy Beason on February 12, 1960. Together they had two children, Carl David and Kristi Dawn. He was a
