Abortion Big Issue In Benton County Among November Ballot Amendments

Proposed amendments to the Missouri constitution go to a statewide vote, meaning all eligible voters in the state will see the following questions on their November ballot. Amendments need a simple majority to pass, and then they are added to the state constitution.

Amendment 2 proposes making it legal for people 21 years old and older to bet on sports in Missouri. If it passes, the Missouri Gaming Commission would regulate sports betting statewide. The state would establish a 10% tax on revenues from sports gambling and allocate any leftover funds to education.

The state anticipates a one-time cost of \$660,000 and ongoing annual costs of \$5.2 million. The state could collect up to \$28.9 million annually from tax revenue. Initial licensing fees would bring in \$11.75 million.

Warsaw R-IX Superintendent Scott Games commented that he wasn't sure about how much money Amendment 2 would bring to education. "Amendment 2 will bring more money to Missouri so that is good, however, I don't know how much of it will wind up going to education."



MISSOURI AMENDMENT THREE has garnered attention from citizens on both sides of the issue. Brandy Wallace and Shannon Noland told the Enterprise they are in opposition because of their principles and religious beliefs.

Games said that right now citizens in Missouri are traveling to Kansas and Illinois to place their bets and that Missouri is missing out on the money those people spend when they travel to place bets.

Lincoln R-2 Superintendent Kevin Smith agreed with Games. "I was told recently by a legislator that

The sports betting amendment includes these regulations:

A ban on advertising to minors.
Background checks

for people/companies applying for a sports betting license. People convicted of felonies or gambling offenses can't run the operations.

Promoting information on problem gambling on websites and apps.

Failure to comply with state regulations could bring a \$50,000 fine. Repeat

Warsaw Seniors Target For Major Mail Fraud Scammers

The U. S. Postal Inspection Service reports that every year, mail fraud schemes are directed at consumers of all ages but some groups, like retirees, are more impacted than others. The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) says that consumers reported losing more than \$10 billion to overall types of fraud in 2023. It stated that only a small percentage of victims report the fraud, and even fewer manage to get their money back. Two of Warsaw's senior residents are among several locals who have recently been reported to have gone through the traumatic experience of being targeted for fraud, one by mail and one by phone.



SCAMS TARGETING SENIORS are on the rise. Warsaw Postmaster Dawn Frentzel recently helped thwart a mail scam being perpetrated on a local resident.

A long-time local woman (name withheld at her request) made a \$500 purchase at Menards on her debit card in August. When she went in the store to pick up the item, it couldn't

be found so she ordered another of the same item. The store then found the first order and she decided to try and get her second \$500 payment back by calling what she thought

was Apple Pay. The man she talked to on the phone gave her thoroughly rigorous set of classic routines to get her money back. He told her to send \$1,898 to someone

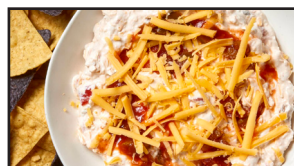

(Continued from Page 1) Two states restrict abortion at 12 weeks post-fertilization. One state restricts abortion at 15 weeks post-fertilization. One state restricts abortion at 18 weeks since the last menstrual period. Three states restrict abortion at 20 weeks post-fertilization or 22 weeks after the last menstrual period. Four states restrict abortion at 24 weeks since the last menstrual period. Eleven states restrict abortion at fetal viability. One state restricts abortion in the third trimester. Doctors take an oath to care for our patients to the best of our ability, to approach them without judgment, and to treat them with dignity and privacy. Unfortunately, our state's abortion ban has been getting in the way of our ability to do our jobs. That's why over 500 Missouri physicians, and over 800 Missouri medical professionals total, endorsed Amendment 3. **Kansas City Star, September 29, 2024.** Amendment 5 will allow gambling establishments on the Lake of the Ozarks. Do you want to amend the Missouri Constitution to: allow the Missouri Gaming Commission to issue one additional gambling boat license to operate on the portion of the Osage River from the Missouri River to the Bagnell Dam; require the prescribed location shall include artificial spaces that contain water and are within 500 feet of the 100-year base flood elevation as established by the Federal Emergency Management Agency; and require all state revenues derived from the issuance of the gambling boat license shall be appropriated to early-childhood literacy programs in public institutions of elementary education? State governmental entities estimate one-time costs of \$763,000, ongoing costs of \$2.2 million annually, initial fee revenue of \$271,000, ongoing admission and other fee revenue of \$2.1 million annually, and annual gaming tax revenue of \$14.3 million. Local governments estimate unknown revenue. Fair Ballot Language: A "yes" vote will amend

the Missouri Constitution to allow the Missouri Gaming Commission to issue an additional gambling boat license to operate an excursion gambling boat on the Osage River, between the Missouri River and the Bagnell Dam. All state revenue derived from the issuance of the gambling boat license shall be appropriated to early-childhood literacy programs in public institutions of elementary education. A "no" vote will not amend the Missouri Constitution regarding gambling boat licensure. If passed, this measure will have no impact on taxes. Amendment 6 is about salaries and benefits for law enforcement personnel. Official Ballot Title: Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to provide that the administration of justice shall include the levying of costs and fees to support salaries and benefits for certain current and former law enforcement personnel? State and local governmental entities estimate an unknown fiscal impact. Fair Ballot Language: A "yes" vote will amend the Missouri Constitution to levy costs and fees to support salaries and benefits for current and former sheriffs, prosecuting attorneys, and circuit attorneys to ensure all Missourians have access to the courts of justice. A "no" vote will not amend the Missouri Constitution to levy costs and fees related to current or former sheriffs, prosecuting attorneys and circuit attorneys. If passed, this measure will have no impact on taxes. According to Benton County Sheriff Eric Knox, this bill will help ensure that people will have retirement benefits if they chose to go into law enforcement. "We had in place a \$3 court cost that was designated for sheriff's retirement, but that was challenged and found unconstitutional so we lost that money for the retirement of law enforcement," said Knox. "This amendment will reinstate that money for retirement so we can recruit qualified candidates." Amendment 6 will reinstate the ability to collect the current \$3 court fee for guilty pleas in criminal courts placed in Missouri state statutes. The \$3 fee was established in December 1983 with the

creation of the Missouri Sheriffs' Retirement System. House Bill 81 in 1983 placed the fee and retirement system in State Statutes. The court fee provided full funding for the Sheriffs' retirement system since inception of the retirement system. The Prosecuting Attorneys' Retirement system was created in 1989. The \$4 fee for the Prosecuting Attorneys' Retirement System helps fund along with county and member contributions. Amendment 6 allows voters to define the administration of justice as salary and benefits for only Sheriffs and Prosecuting Attorneys. The fee is only collected if a person is found guilty and judges will still be allowed to waive court fees if they find that it is a hardship on the person. For many Sheriffs and Prosecutors and widows or widowers, this is the only retirement they have. The court fees can be considered a user fee of the court system, with many being out of state travelers. Without the fees, it would become a burden for the criminal justice system and fall to the local taxpayer to fund. Sheriffs' retirement has 200 retirees and survivors currently receiving benefits and 17 vest members not yet collecting benefits. 114 active Sheriffs are also participating in the plan and contributing 5% of their current salary. If Amendment 6 doesn't pass, the sheriffs' retirement system is projected to be bankrupt in 9 years. There are 125 active members in Prosecuting Attorney's Retirements System with 90 members receiving benefits and 50 vested not yet collecting benefits. If Amendment 6 doesn't pass, the prosecuting attorneys' retirement system is projected to be bankrupt in 15 years. Amendment 7 is about voting. Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to: Make the Constitution consistent with state law by only allowing citizens of the United States to vote; Prohibit the ranking of candidates by limiting

Defense Comes To Play In Wildcats Dominant Win Over Versailles



AS POTENT AS THE OFFENSE IS, the Wildcats defensive dominance accentuated Warsaw's 42-0 win at Versailles on Friday night. The Wildcats are now 5-0 overall, 3-0 in the Ozark Highlands Conference, and hold the #4 ranking in the state, their highest for the program in over a decade.

If one asks Google "what it means to be dominant", the word is deemed as an adjective with a description of "ruling, governing, or controlling; having or exerting authority or influence".

The Wildcats were just that at Versailles on Friday night, with the defense holding the Tigers to a mere 10 total yards of offense while accumulating 391 yards themselves in a 42-0 rout, spoiling the host team's Homecoming.

The Wildcats scored first on a 19-yard TD run by Jayce Depriest at 8:14 in the opening period and Logan Gemes point-after-

try quickly made it 7-0.

At the 11:10 mark in the second quarter, the Wildcats scored again, this time on a 5-yard run by Garrett Ferguson and another Gemes PAT made it 14-0.

Another run by Depriest with 4:09 left in the half, this time from 3 yards out and another successful PAT by Gemes made it 21-0.

The final score of the half came with under a minute to go when Shane Poyser got behind the defense of Versailles and Ferguson laid a perfect ball into the outstretched arms of Poyser for a 56-yard touchdown. Gemes' fourth PAT of the night made it 28-0 at halftime.

"It was nice to be able to stretch the field a little more this week by airing it out," Warsaw head coach Ryan

Boyer said. "Shane works hard for us every week and it was great to see him hit paydirt."

Ferguson scored his second touchdown of the night on a 21-yard run with 8:32 in the third quarter and Gemes split the uprights for the fifth time to get the clock running with a 35-0 Wildcat lead.

Warsaw's final tally of the night came early in the fourth, at 11:20, when Ferguson performed the "hat trick" with his third touchdown run of the night, this time from 15 yards out. Gemes' sixth PAT was good for the Wildcats' 42-0 final.

"Our team did a great job coming out ready to play. Offensively, we were able to get into a rhythm early and stay in it," Boyer commented.

Ferguson finished with 95 yards rushing on 15 attempts with 3 TD's while also completing 5 of 7 passes for 122 yards and 1 more touchdown.

Poyser was on the receiving end of 4 of Ferguson's passes for 91 yards and 1 TD while Depriest had the other reception for 31 yards.

Josh Harvath racked up 52 yards on 10 carries, Ryan Fajen picked up 40 yards on just 2 carries and Depriest added 38 yards on the ground on 5 attempts.

After going 7 for 7 on his PAT's just a week ago, Gemes followed up that performance with 6

converted PAT's in as many tries against the Tigers.

Defensively, the Wildcats "dominant" performance was led by Drake Murrell and Kendall Bagley who both recorded 3 tackles. Bagley also had a 0.5 sack with the other 0.5 going to Dakota Todd.

Harvath tallied 2 tackles with 1 sack of the Tigers' quarterback and Depriest and Sean Reinertsen also had 2 tackles apiece.

"Defensively, we did a great job of adjusting to a little different look than we expected, but did a great job executing the game plan," said Boyer.

Gemes also aided the defense for the Wildcats by recording 4 touchbacks on 6 kickoffs.

"Logan's leg not only helps us put points on the board, but it also creates some favorable field advantage for our defense," Boyer stated.

Warsaw will put their undefeated 5-0 overall record, unblemished conference record and new number 4 state ranking on the line this week when they host Eldorado Springs for another Ozark Highlands Conference matchup with big implications in this season's standings.

Eldorado Springs (3-2, 1-1) began their season with a win over Cabool (34-0), lost to Ash Grove (6-14), beat Pleasant Hope (52-6), won over Versailles (49-8) and then lost to Sarcoxie last week (35-50).

That week 6 game is slated for a 7:00 PM kickoff at Randy Morrow Field on the campus of WHS.

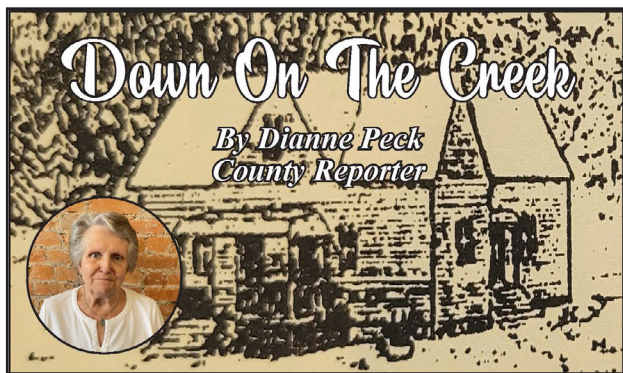

Ain't No Cokes In Hell! Part two

Every farm on the creek had its own orchard in those days. The seedlings were commonly purchased from a salesman traveling around selling trees for a nursery. Down here on the creek it was usually the Stark Bros. Nursery from Louisiana, Mo. Many times the peddler traveled by horseback to take the orders for the fruit trees in late summer. The seedlings arrived in late fall with the mail carrier and were promptly planted. They always produced as represented.

I spoke earlier of Great-grandma's stone canning jars, which brings to mind the large stone jars that my Aunt, my Grandmother and my Mother utilized to pickle cucumbers and process kraut. My Aunt and my Mother transferred the pickles and the kraut into glass mason jars but Grandma Laura almost always preferred to leave hers in the large stone jars, and just take out what she needed to cook that day.

What cabbage that was not processed into kraut was kept in a hole in the front lawn of this house. It was covered with soil and hay to prevent it from freezing and was unearthed when needed for the winter table. A few summers ago I had some landscaping done in that area, so the indentation is no longer visible.

A favorite family folklore story (every family has them) concerns my cousin Norma and her Mother's (my Aunt) large stone canning jars. It was late fall and the canning season was finally over. My Aunt had washed her precious jars and turned them upside down on the back porch to air.

Now picture my impish little cousin, "Tootie," as we all still refer to her, with a "hickory nut" and Tootie had secured possession of a

hammer from somewhere. The top of the crock was about the right height for her "cracking" purposes. So, she rested the hickory nut upon the first jar in order to strike it with the hammer and reveal it's wealth inside.

When the first jar split neatly apart, not to be deterred, she just picked up her hickory nut and proceeded to move to the next jar. Another bit the dirt! And another! And another! But little Miss Tootie didn't cease until she had reached the end of the row. And I'm sure that if I recall the proficiency my wonderful Aunt had with a peach tree limb, little Miss Tootie sat down carefully for awhile.

I spoke earlier of the wash house in every back yard on the creek. That was a way for the women to keep the heat of canning, cooking and laundry from the main house. They had their own wood fired cook stove which were never as grand as the range that was in the main kitchen inside the house. Grandma Laura, here on the creek, had a plain Jane black one in the wash house out back. Inside the house she had a white enameled model that she kept polished and shined as if it were 18 carat gold. My Mother had a modern, latest in technology, electric range as soon as the REA (Rural Electric Association) made that possible. My Grandmother resisted for many years before succumbing to a gas model. Little by little she realized the benefits that came from less heat in the house.

I don't exactly recall the lengths of time that all those canning pots had to process atop that old wood burning stove but I do know that the combination of a wood fire and steam, on an already hot summer day, made you think seriously about what was preached from the pulpit on Sunday. It gave you a prelude to what after life down below would be like. The preservation of the family's food in that old washhouse made me know, as the old Evangelist said: "There ain't no fans, not no rest and brother, there ain't no cokes in hell!"

Small, But Mighty: Mt. Hulda Church Hosts Annual Fish Fry

The long running traditional fish fry held annually on the last Sunday of September had perfect weather conditions. The location is Mt Hulda Congregation's stone church setting atop a high hill that overlooks the Indian Creek Valley and is one of the older parishes in the area.

The Fish Fry is such a long running event that no one seems to recall anymore when it actually began. In the earlier days the congregation purchased fish from a fish farm at Stover and then a local church member, Glen Smith, allowed the men of the church to seine and catch fish from his well stocked ponds. As the dinner's popularity grew the church finally began ordering the fish commercially.

The meal consists of fried fish, homemade French fries, cornbread, home baked white bread, Cole slaw, home grown tomatoes, green beans, German potato salad and lots and lots of cakes and pies, all made from scratch.

In the early days the fish was deep-fried in large black cast iron kettles on the back lawn. Presently the workers utilize gas operated fryers located in a screened kitchen area behind a large screened shelter house. The dinners had always been served in the church basement but growing attendance forced them to add the outdoor dining area which is generally a favorite with the attendees, although food is still served in the air-conditioned basement for those desiring a more controlled atmosphere.

The native, Ozark stone church was built in 1952 to replace an older frame building from the 1800s. The present day parsonage is a ranch style, built in 1975 to replace a two-story frame home that had been erected about 1900.

In December, 2004, a young minister, Allen Braun, accepted the call to become Pastor and brought his young wife Laura and baby daughter to take up the pastorate. The young family fell in love with the residents and the area and have stayed to raise a large family and become vital members in the community socially as well as his duties.

Pastor Braun certainly



doesn't let any grass grow beneath his feet as he also serves as Pastorial assistant to Trinity in Cole Camp, is a vacancy pastor for Iglesia Lutherana Amigos de Cristo in Sedalia. He serves as Chaplain to the local Lakeview Heights Fire Department, serves as a Chaplain to the Missouri State Fire Department on the Fairgrounds, the first

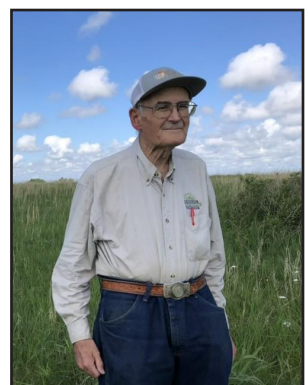
to ever fill the role, and is an Auxiliary Chaplain at Whiteman Air Base, but Mt Hulda remains home.

The Mt Hulda Church is small, but plays a large role in the area, and is always ready to reach out to help others. This year they donated part of their proceeds to the newly formed Lutheran High School in Cole Camp

and also to the Lakeview Heights Fire Department. According to verbal accounts the organizers feel like attendance was down somewhat this year but still well attended. If you've never enjoyed this event, put it on your calendar for next year because it is truly five-star dining with great ambiance.

Morton Prairie Dedication To Be Held On Saturday

This Saturday, October 5 the Missouri Prairie Foundation welcomes the public to attend the dedication of the Morton Family Prairie just west of Cole Camp.

The Morton Prairie was generously donated to the Missouri Prairie Foundation by Dr. Wayne Morton, a lifelong leader in natural community conservation and former president of the Missouri Prairie Foundation (MPF).

The Morton prairie is a 380 acre tract in Benton County to the east of "Friendly Prairie", "Drover's Prairie", and the "Lordi Marker Prairie" and is one mile northwest of Cole Camp and is adjacent to the Conservation's "Hi Lonesome Prairie".

The Morton Family Prairie

is dry-mesic chert prairie, and includes 178 acres of unplowed, remnant Tall grass prairie. There is one small pond in one of the prairie swales. The Morton Prairie supports at least 79 native plant species. So far this Prairie has been found to support 3 species of conservation concern, Mead's milkweed, the Regal Fritillary Butterfly and the Prairie Mole Cricket. Future studies will provide additional information about the biological diversity of this prairie. The prairie is open to the public for hiking and nature viewing.

The Saturday event is free (except for the optional dinner) with dedication and walking tours of MPF's Morton Family Prairie. There are complimentary beverages of wine, beer and soft drinks served at a 5 p.m. social hour.

Between 2:00-2:45 p.m. and 3:00-3:45 p.m. there are guided tours of the prairie, followed by the dedication at 4:00 p.m. From 4:45 to 5:00 p.m. the annual member meeting will be held with members voting for director nominees. The prairie will be open for free camping on that Saturday night and the MPF hopes everyone will remember to donate to support the foundation's conservation work.

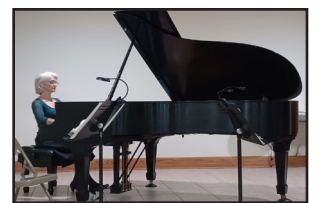
Donated Grand Piano Is A Hit At Trinity's School Of Music Concert

Dr. Christensen played the benefit organ recital at Trinity in January, 2020, which served as the vehicle for Trinity pairing with St Paul's of Iowa to establish the Trinity School of Music. This prompted Dr. Christensen to gift Trinity with the Steinway he called "Frederick."

The Trinity School of Music is a parish-based music school that provides musical instruction and performances to develop musicians and enrich the lives of student's families and the entire community. Music is a huge part of life in Germany and that has not been diminished in Cole Camp's population that are descendants of those who emigrated from the "Waterland", (Fatherland) in the 1800's. From Bach to Beethoven to Brahms, and they reign supreme.

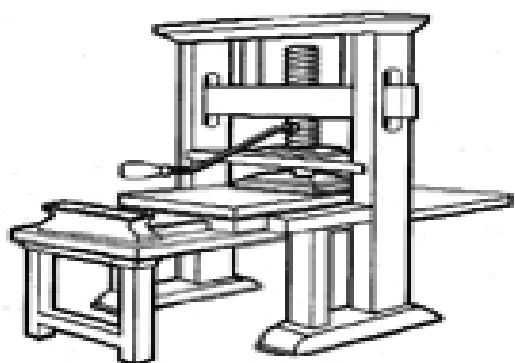

Ambulance District Votes On Change Of Billing Company

In the regular monthly meeting of the Cole Camp Ambulance District, during the routine business of approval of minutes and financials, it was pointed out the sales tax was up for the year by \$6,000 compared to the previous year, but the year before it was down \$16,000, so there was still a \$10,000 deficit.

The Board is in the process of acquiring the loan at the bank to combine all debt into one payment but is still waiting on the appraisal to finalize.

The Board will be forming a committee that will be promoting the November ballot of the property tax levy. There is a state statute that prohibits the Ambulance Board from using tax dollars to promote any ballot measure, even their own.

The Board discussed

like people pay the District property tax that is sort of like a membership for those that live in the area.

Meuschke explained that is why they offer discounts and do service calls to people that live in the Ambulance District. Charging for lift assist or blood pressure checks is something that would greatly affect the elderly community that lives alone. Meuschke went on to say the Board can select in their reporting system what is considered a "Patient."

One example would be if the Ambulance arrives and helps someone up and they are not hurt and don't need to be transported, the Board could not consider them a Patient, therefore they would not bill them.

Another example is the Ambulance is called and the person's blood pressure is low and they are unconscious. The EMT's administer meds through an IV and get them back to normal, but they don't need to go to the hospital. The District would then send a bill in the amount of \$252.00 because that is what Medicare would pay if approved.

There was continued discussion on switching the billing company. The Board finally decided to switch to AIM for the District's billing in January 2025. This gives the required time the new company needs to make the switch with insurance payers. The Board also said they would like to see the District have some additional access to Patient billing records and some additional transparency. The District has been with the same billing company for over ten years.

The scammers will contact you via social media, claiming they've made a lot of money in crypto and are willing to help you do the same. They may direct you to a website or app to invest, but the "company" taking your money may not even exist, and, after taking your money, may disappear.

• **Investment programs** – These programs claim to have "proven" strategies that can enable you to get rich by investing in financial products. But these strategies are dubious at best and can cost you thousands of dollars that could otherwise go into an investment plan based on your goals, risk tolerance and time horizon.

• **Real estate** – Typically, a real estate scam tries to get you to invest in a "world-class" or "luxury" property development, but these properties may take years to build, if they're built at all. Also, various real estate "seminars" claim they can teach you how to get wealthy by buying and selling real estate, but these programs are expensive and usually worthless.

• **Gold and other precious metals** – Scammers who call themselves "rare coins" merchants may try to sell

So, how can you avoid these scams? Here are some suggestions from the Federal Trade Commission:

• **Don't be pushed into snap decisions.** Scammers will pressure you to act quickly because "space is limited" in an investment offering or a "special deal" won't last long. If someone won't give you time to consider an offer, it's not worth considering.

• **Be suspicious of "risk-free" claims.** All investments carry risk, and no variable investments can claim to provide "guaranteed returns." If an individual or organization downplays the risk of an investment and doesn't want to provide risk disclosures, just walk away.

• **Ask about licensing or registration.** Legitimate investment professionals must be registered with the Financial Industry Regulatory Authority (FINRA) and be licensed by your state's securities regulator before they can sell you any investment product. You can check the status of an individual or firm by using FINRA's BrokerCheck tool at brokercheck.fina.org.

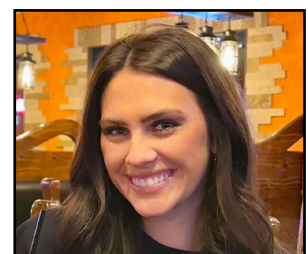

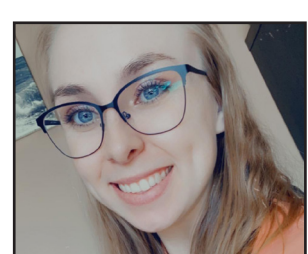

developer and co-owner of the Truman State Park Marina, until her retirement in 2000.

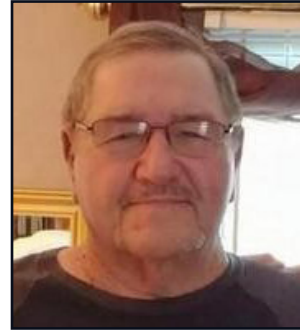
