How's A Bayou? Super Southern Melodrama Comes To Heartland

Heartland Community Theatre held an audition in August for its fall production, "Noises Off." According to director Linda Freese, not enough actors showed up to stage the classic play within a play, which has a cast of 16 and a complicated set.

So Linda went back to the drawing board, which in this case, meant her collection of scripts. What she found: a gem of a comic melodrama by Scott Cherney and Edward Thorpe called "La Rue's Return," or "How's A-Bayou?"

The tagline: "Evil always returns, and this time, it has a bad French accent."

"When I read it, I laughed out loud," Linda said.

The comic melodrama will be performed at 7 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 11, and Saturday, Oct 12, and at 2 p.m. on Sunday, Oct. 13. That means the cast of eight has had four weeks to learn their lines and pull the show together, Linda said. Heartland Community Theatre productions are staged by people who enjoy bringing the experience

of live theater to the Clinton area. For compensation for their considerable time commitment —three evening rehearsals a week, they receive the applause of appreciative audiences.

The cast of "La Rue's Return" includes Martin Grisier, who channels Snidely Whiplash as Jacque La Rue, the villain of the piece. Grisier has already put together his outfit, Linda said, and had grown the requisite villain's mustache.

The plot revolves around La Rue's attempts to get revenge for being sent to prison by Polly Montclair, owner of "Chez What," a bistro in New Orlean's French quarter, and the bartender, Ike, played by Clinton attorney Zac Mag-

City Council Opens Up **Towing To Bids**

Clinton City Council Members gathered on September 17 for their regularly scheduled meeting. Present were Council Persons Gene Henry, Roger House, Cameron Jackson, Austin Jones, Gary Mount and Stacia Wilson. Not present were Council Persons Shelley Nelson and Greg Shannon. Others present included City Administrator Christi Maggi, City Clerk Wendee Seaton, City Attorney Doug Harris, Fire Chief Mark Manuel, Deputy Fire Chief Matt Willings and Deputy Police Chief Paul Abbott.

With Mayor Carla Moberly presiding, the Pledge of Allegiance was recited and following this time honored tradition, The Council approved minutes from the September 3 meeting.

Economic Development Director Mark Dawson gave an update on current active projects and several that were unable to find space available in Clinton. Following Dawson's report The Council passed ordinances approving pay plans, city fees and a budget for the 2024-2025 fiscal year.

Council Person Jackson gave a Public Works Committee Report. Jackson made a motion to approve a resolution between The City and Alliance Water Resources which passed unanimously. A quote of \$5,501.77 to AA Mechanical was approved for water pump #3.

Discussion ensued regarding cleanup of the Benson Center following a horse shoe tournament and The City's rental policy. Cost for the cleanup was \$3,000 and the renter said they will pay an additional \$500 on top of their \$250 deposit. A motion was made and passed for City Staff to review and update the rental policy. A request for Kids At Play signs on Craig Street between Franklin and Highland drive was also approved.

In other business the Police Department made a request that towing becomes an annual bid process. A motion was made and passed to approve the request. A request was made and passed by Parks Cabinet to modify the exterior of their building at 1748 Gerhart Drive.





THE OLD MAN'S GOSPEL

In Sunday School we are studying the Gospel of John. There are four gospels in the New Testament: Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. Each has its own "flavor," reflecting the author's perspective.

Matthew wrote to his fellow Jews. His message goes like this, "Listen, all you kinsmen, we have been looking for the Messiah for hundreds of years. When He came, our Jewish mindset kept us from knowing Him. Jesus is the Messiah." Matthew's gospel is organized and teachable. Perhaps he hoped it would one day be taught in the synagogues.

Mark was the first gospel written. Mark was likely young when he wrote and was hoping to get the message of Jesus out simply and quickly. His writings are filled with facts but little comment. Still, one must wonder when Mark quoted Jesus saying, "You don't put a new patch on an old garment." Maybe he believed his Jewish brothers needed to hear that. Luke was a physician. Dr. Luke was not a Jew. His gospel is

a letter to a friend, Theophilus. He told Theophilus he was writing to tell him the truth about Jesus. Chapter 15 of Luke's gospel gives us Jesus' picture of our Heavenly Father. The chapter ends with the story of a father loving two wayward The fourth gospel---John, I choose to call the old man's gos-

pel. It was written several decades after the death and resurrection of Jesus. By first century standards, John was an old man when he wrote. John was a righthand disciple of Jesus and knew Him well. We know he had read the previous three gospels because he quoted from them. Personal experience teaches me life looks different when viewed through the lens of many years. John gives us Jesus' beautiful summary of the gospel in John 3:16: God so loved the world; He gave his Son

We often tell new Christians or folk just beginning to study the Bible, "Start with the gospel of John." As I studied the book again for Sunday School, I realized why we say, "Begin with John." John said it himself, "Jesus is the Word."



Punk Barber World War II Prisoner of War

Experiences, Part II
By Glynna Elliott Morse
Part I reviewed Punk Barber's WWII air training
and bombing missions up
through June 29, 1944.
This week's Part II column
will discuss his captivity,
"Death March," and final
liberation as Punk Barber
related in the September
14 Windsor Historical Soci-

ety program. On June 29, 1944, Punk Barber was a gunner on a B-24 which had completed its 13th bombing mission over Germany when the plane's fuel system was damaged by flak. The pilot was forced to land the plane in a potato field, from which all the crew members survived. The ten crew members were able to escape from the pane, going in separate groups; however, each was captured by German authorities within a day or

Punk Baarber and his crew mates were taken to an Amsterdam jail. After a few days in Amsterdam, the men were moved in July, 1944 to Stalag 4, a prisoner of war camp in northern Germany which today is part of Poland. The camp housed 10,000 men, mostly American enlisted prisoners of war.

Punk was housed in a wooden barracks building with 24 other men. They slept on 3-tier bunk beds with a straw mattress and a thin banket. The barracks were unheated except for one small stove for which that barracks was allocated three pieces of coal. For food, they were fed barley or potato soup, amd one loaf of bread was given for the 24 men, ending with about a half slice of bread per man. Some of the prisoners received Red Cross packages, and they

especially valued cigarettes which the POWS used to barter for food from the guards or German workers

During the day, Punk remembered walking around the barbed wire camp for exercise. They were locked in their barracks each day at 6 p.m.. Mostly they played cards, using cards they had made out of cardboard.

His parents had been notified that he was missing (MIA) in June 29, 1944 when his plane was shot down, but they did not know if he was alive or dead. The Germans sometimes would swap the more seriously injured POWs in a prisoner exchange. The men in Punk's barracks had the most seriously injured prisoner memorize the other 23 men's names and home towns. Eventually the injured man was exchanged, and he was able to get information to the families of the remaining 23 men that they were alive as POWs. Punk's family first knew he was alive because of that injured sol-

dier's information. On February 2, 1945, the German authorities moved the 10,000 POWS out of the Stalag 4 prisoner of war camp telling them they were moving them to a new prison camp. Actually, the Germans did not have a new camp; they were just moving them around because the Russian Army was coming closer. For 86 days, the prisoners spent every night outside in the winter elements with nothing more than a military overcoat and a thin blanket for warmth.

Food was even more scarce than in Stalag 4 camp. The POWs on the march were fed three potatoes and one cup of warm water in the evening, approximately 300 calories per day! In addi-

tion to a starvation diet, many of the men suffered from dysentery because of the unsanitary conditions and drinking contaminated water from ditches and streams along the road. Of the 10,000 men, 1700 men would perish in the 600-mile travel during the 86-day "Death March."

Punk remembered that liberation occurred when two British soldiers arrived on a jeep to tell them the war was over. The prisoners were on their own; there were no trucks or supplies to take care of the prisoners. Most of the POWs began to head west to the nearest Allied forces as best they could. Punk eventually ended getting rides to different military groups. He crossed the ocean on the Queen Marry, arriving in New York. He recalled, " It was a great

Punk was discharged from the military in Miami on October 27, 1945. He received eight medals including the Bronze Staar and Purple Heart. Punk Barber returned to the family farm. He was home!

Punk Barber married Judy Fewell on January 23, 1946,. They raised one son, Kent Barber, and one daughter, Kay Parris, three grandchildren, and several great-grandchildren. Punk and Judy Barber lived the rest of their lives on the family farm. Punk Barber died in October 22, 2014, and his wife, Judy Baarber, died on December 15, 2021.

Comparing Supplement Costs

Fall is a time when spring-born calves are being weaned and decisions are being made about marketing the calves. Many producers choose to background their calves after weaning and sell them after the first of the year. To determine if this is a good financial decision, producers must know costs of gain and expected sale price, sale

weight, and sale date.
We have many grain and grain by-products to choose from when developing cattle rations. Choice of ingredients is based on cost, feed storage facilities, rate of use, and desired animal performance.

Many producers, however, only look at the cost of individual feed ingredients per ton, particularly if they have the capability to utilize higher moisture feeds from ethanol plants. Recent price quotes from MU Extension By-Product Feed Price Listing have wet distiller's grains costing \$10 per ton less at Missouri ethanol plants than modified distiller's grains.

However, when calculat-

ing the cost of nutrients per pound of energy or protein on a dry matter basis, the current pricing structure favors the modified distillers' product, even though it is more expensive per ton.

determining When which feed ingredients to select, they need to be evaluated in the total ration being fed, not by the individual cost of each ingredient. Additionally, many of these by-product feeds provide different positive aspects to the entire ration, so knowledge of the positive and negative attributes of different potential feed ingredients is important.

Another helpful calculation is feed cost per pound of gain. This is straightforward to determine and many ration programs can calculate this if feed ingredient costs are known. It is important to estimate the cost of all ration ingredients, including the forages. Be sure to include transportation and shrink costs when pricing ingredients, especially if buying semi-load lots of ingredients.

Ultimately, working with someone who can develop cost-effective rations designed to meet the performance goals of the livestock will pay off in the long run. If I can as-

Our Caboose - The Spirit of '76

Windsor is very proud of our caboose that sits at the Katy Trail Head in Windsor and we love to share the story of how we came by that caboose. The following is an excerpt from an article written for the Windsor Review, published after the caboose was repainted by our sister squadron from Whiteman Air Force Base.

The "Spirit of 76" Caboose came to Windsor by way of a city-wide campaign in 1990 to memorialize the feel and importance of the Katy Railroad through Windsor. Significant to the acquisition of the old caboose was resident, and retired Katy line employee, Q.W. Schroer. His 42 years with Katy Railroad carried some weight, and soon he and other residents began to work on restoring the old, canned crumb box to its splendor.

According to a Kansas City Star article (dated Oct. 28, 1990), the caboose was set on a section of track on the east side of town where the old depot stood. "... eventually a Katy caboose, painted green and yellow and streaked here and

there with rust, arrived," read the article. "...nobody would have said a thing if the folks here had just sort of touched it up and left it the way it arrived." But that wasn't what folks around Windsor had in mind.

Schroer found a sandblaster, and the people restoring the caboose went to town removing the years of rust and paint. Soon, though, they started to see stars; and not in a bad way. After sandblasting for awhile, the citizens noticed underneath the years of rusty metal caused by trudging along the clattering tracks in the rain and snow, and coats of paint slapped on by workers and simply the tincture of time - stars and stripes began to emerge. "As if by magic," the Star article went on. Schroer said, "Well, people started looking at me as if I had St. Vitus' dance. I was just going crazy, doing everything but back flips," he said. "At my age, too," he added.

Underneath the paint the residents of Windsor discovered Katy Railroad's contribution to the bicentennial: the caboose was painted white with a huge American flag on each side, with the letters, "Spirit of '76". Adding even more intrigue, the original number of the caboose was discovered to be No. 76, not No. 130, as earlier thought. It was decided that day that the caboose would be repainted in that bicentennial motif, and Schroer set about town, collecting \$3,000 for the project.

The Bicentennial Caboose has remained as a tribute to three things: our great nation, Katy's affiliation with Windsor as a whistle stop town, and the citizen's dedication to preserving the past for future generations. The fact that members of our United States military took time to bring the old caboose back to her bicentennial self adds just another layer of rich history between the brush strokes.
