Historic Warsaw Basketball Tournament Tips-Off Season For Most Teams In Area



Now in it's 92nd year, the Warsaw Boys Invitational Basketball Tournament is one of the oldest in the state. The girls bracket is now in it's 37th year.

The championship has been fairly balanced on the boys side. Weaubleau is the event's most recent winner after defeating Butler in the championship a year ago. Lincoln last won the first place trophy in 2022, coincidentally over Cole Camp. They also won it all in 2016. The host Wildcats last title came in 2012 with a win over Butler. Before that one, their last championship win was in 2006. For the Bluebirds, one has to go all the way back to 2003 to find their most "recent" event title.

For the girls, defending Class 2 state champion Skyline has dominated the girls tournament. Since 2004, the Lady Tigers have won 16 tournament championships. El Dorado Springs gave Skyline some great competition, and won the event themselves in 2021, 2019 and 2013, but left the tourney two years

The Lady Bluebirds have never won the tournament but have appeared in the championship game 3 times, most recently in 2018. The Warsaw Ladycats have

played in the championshp game 11 times throughout the years, winning 6 of those. However, the last time they played for first place was in 2009. The Lady Cardinals have made just 1 showing in a title matchup, that coming back in 2004.

The girls bracket plays on Monday, Wednesday and

Friday while the boys keep the event going strong Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, providing a full, fun-filled week long extravaganza of high school basketball at Warsaw High School.

We asked some former players and coaches about their experiences in the historic event, and it is fitting that we start off with a man who has been a part of the tournament in almost every aspect, and that is none other than Warsaw superintendent Scott Gemes.

"Well . . . I have actually been involved in every part of the Warsaw tournament over my life time," Gemes said. "As a kid, I helped my dad cleanup after the Warsaw tournament by picking up the bleachers and sweeping the gym floor. As a player, I got the opportunity to play in it for three years. It was a great experience being able to play in front of the home crowd so early in the

Full House Shows Up To Address Important Topics At Warsaw City **Council Meeting**

A room full of concerned citizens filled the Warsaw City Council chambers on December 2 as several issues were brought to the attention of the Board of Aldermen.

Mayor Eddie Simons called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM. Aldermen James White, Eric Flores, Rob Coskey, Adam Howe, and Alderwomen Reba Slavens and Lou Breshears were all in attendance.

City Clerk Jessica Kendall recorded the meeting.

Following the approval of a consent agenda and payment of bills presented, City Administrator Randy Pogue formally presented the city's proposed budget for FY 2025 with hopes and an anticipated passage date of December 16.

Benton County landowner Doug Gayman spoke to the elected officials about his property on Jackson Street being annexed into Warsaw without his consent.

"I bought property outside of the Warsaw city limits with the plan to move here and establish a small farm," said Gayman. "Now I am being forced to hire an architect to turn my property into a residential area.'

According to Gayman, there are 100 empty lots in Warsaw that could be used

everyone loves potatoes, one of the most versatile vegetables ever. With an infinite number of recipes available for their preparation, the following is one of my favorites. With only 3 ingredients (a JD special) the secret is the way they are prepared.

(FYI: salt and pepper are not included as an ingredient) Certainly a few more steps in preparation but the result is an outstanding potato.

Crispy Roast Potatoes Kosner sait

3 pounds of Yukon gold or yellow potatoes, peeled and quartered into ping pong ball size

½ cup either vegetable oil, bacon fat, duck or goose fat (I know, but duck fat is

fabulous with potatoes) 1-1/2 to 2 teaspoons coarse

Fresh minced parsley

Preheat oven to 425

degrees.

Bring a large pot of water with 2 tablespoons of

Pour oil onto a baking

kosher salt to the boil. Add potatoes, lower the heat and simmer for 8 minutes.

Drain the potatoes in a colander, put potatoes back in pot with the lid on and shake the pot with vigor and really rough up the edges; important to help get a crispy texture.

Carefully transfer potatoes in one layer to a baking rack and dry for 15 minutes. They can sit at room temperature for several hours or you can refrigerate them up to 6

dish or sheet pan, distribute oil evenly over the bottom. Place in oven until oil is really hot. Carefully transfer potatoes (tongs or large spatula) into the oil, toss

Some years you are ready for it and put your best foot forward, but most of the time you have guys injured or you missed practice from football and you don't feel like you're ready."

Cole Camp's Kevin Shearer said, "I played in the Warsaw tournament my whole playing career, so it brings fond memories back to me, great time of year and exciting start to the season. It was just as exciting, at the beginning of my career as a coach, and still today very exciting."

Former Cardinal player and now assistant football and baseball coach Connor Spunaugle stated, "As a player, the Warsaw tournament was an exciting way to start every season. Year after year, it provided an excellent opportunity

to play teams we did not usually play throughout the regular season. It created some of my favorite memories playing basketball, especially in 2016-17 when we won the thing! As a fan, the tournament is always exciting to watch."

Former Wildcats player and all-time leading scorer Randall Sherman commented, "My fondest memory, I think was just the overall atmosphere that it was. Being the first real games of the year, at your home court and the buzz within the school and community for the tournament was something I always remember."

Marlin Hammond, former Lady Cardinals coach and current referee said, "Our girls have played in the Warsaw tournament for several years. On December 19, 2020, Mast's four-year-old daughter Jessica drowned after being dunked into an icy pond and beaten to death to remove a "demon."

Benton County deputies tempt, two counts of endan-

responded at 1 am on December 20 to a rural home near Cole Camp and found the 4-year-old wrapped in a blanket on a bedroom floor.

Investigators said the girl was already dead and had "severe purple bruising" over her body, along with ruptured blisters. Sheriff Eric Knox said the girl's parents also had been beaten along with a 2-year-old child. An infant son of the couple was apparently unharmed.

Ethan Mast told investigators that he and Aumen used a leather belt to beat the girl, the statement said. She was then taken to a pond behind the home, where she was "dunked" in the water on a day when high temperatures were in the 40's.

Mary Mast, Jessica's mother, entered a guilty plea in January 2023 and is awaiting a sentencing date. Ethan Mast entered a guilty plea in February 2022 and is awaiting a sentencing date. Kourtney Aumen is currently being held on a mental health commitment order.

James Mast along with his wife Mary Mast and Ethan Mast are all currently being held in the Benton County Jail in Warsaw. Kourtney Aumen is residing in a Missouri mental facility. None of the defendants will be sentenced until Aumen is reevaluated and is determined to be fit to stand trial.

The young girl's father, James Mast, told deputies that before his daughter had been found dead she had been "beaten, submerged in a pond, then left to freeze to death on the bank," according to a statement from the Benton County Sheriff's Department.

James told authorities that Jessica, his wife Mary and the couple's other children had been subjected to weeks of abuse at the hands of their neighbors, who had been monitoring them through security cameras inside the home, according to the probable cause statements in the case.

James told investigators that he was often forced to watch the beatings and wasn't allowed to intervene. On the night Jessica died, Mary and James said their neighbors came over and beat Jessica with a belt before they forced Mary to take the child to a nearby pond and dip her naked into the water. James took her inside and back up to her bedroom, where she was later found

dead.

Ethan Mast allegedly told authorities that he had beaten the family to remove "demons or evil," while Aumen allegedly claimed she had carried out the abuse at the request of someone living in the home, according to the

court records.

Aumen, who is facing charges of second-degree murder, abuse or neglect of a child resulting in death, first-degree assault or attempt, two counts of endan-

gering the welfare of a child and three counts of armed criminal action, pleaded not guilty last year. Aumen had her case transferred to Webster County in January.

(Continued from Page 1) laundromat spotted what looked like a bulldog suffering from hunger, cold weather and a swollen head, apparently badly infected. One woman in particular, Cathy Menninga, who was in Warsaw to do grocery shopping, spotted the dog and saw that it's chain was wrapped around a tree preventing it from getting into it's doghouse. She tried to help it and is aggrieved that it suffered so long.

"I went by a day later and

his water was frozen, he had no food, his head was swollen, he had open sores, and he was skeletal," said Menninga. "He wasn't a watchdog because he was friendly to me. I took him a blanket, fed him and chipped away at the frozen water in his bowl. Apparently, people have knocked on the door of the residence where the dog is located and been turned away. I was willing to take it to a veterinarian to treat, or, if necessary, put down. But without help from law enforcement I could have been in trouble for trespassing. On Monday morning (December 2) I went by the dog's house again and he wasn't there. I checked the vets in town, and none had seen the dog. They told me that a dog in that condition would have been an emergency, and they'd had no emergencies. There were nearly 200 posts on Benton County Chatter and Benton County Beat Monday morning about the dog. If they (owners of the dog) saw the posts, they knew police, mayor, councilmen, etc. knew and things were escalating...."

However, there is no animal shelter in Warsaw, so where would it go? The last animal shelter in the city was closed in 2005. Critters 'N Crisis, an animal foster program, began working with 4H in 2012 to try and reduce the risk of lost and abandoned animals being more susceptible to harm in cold winter months. The group hoped to build an animal shelter, but that project never materialized. Menninga attended the December 2 Warsaw City Council meeting to speak out about the need for ordnances that work for the benefit of animals and to bring awareness of the recurring problem to the city's attention.

Another problem in Benton County has to do with vicious dogs who are a danger to people. For sheriff's deputies to charge someone with keeping a dangerous dog, and/or for attacking someone, there needs to be a county ordinance and a charge

code. Sheriff Eric Knox said his office has written such an ordinance and it is now in the hands of the County Commission and Prosecuting Attorney who will meet this week to talk about the charge code.

According to stateregstoday.com/health/ animal-welfare, Missouri has a mandatory reporting requirement for suspected cases of animal cruelty. Anyone who witnesses or suspects animal abuse or neglect is required to report it to their local law enforcement agency or the state's animal welfare office. This case has been reported to Humane Society of Missouri Cruelty Task Force (314-647-4400) as well as to Benton County Central Dispatch (911), (660) 438-9555.

Chapter 578.012 of 2023 Missouri Revised Statutes states (in part) that having ownership or custody of an animal knowingly failing to provide adequate care which results in substantial harm to the animal is Animal Abuse. It is a class A misdemeanor, unless the defendant has previously been found guilty of animal abuse or the suffering involved.... resulting from torture or mutilation consciously inflicted while the animal was alive, in which case is a class E felony.

www.bing.com reports that animal abuse is a serious problem in the U.S. Annually, over 10 million animals in the U.S. are abused to death. Dogs comprise 65 percent of all abused animals.

org reports that intentional
cruelty to animals is
strongly correlated with
other crimes, including
violence against people.
Surveys suggest that those
who intentionally abuse
animals are predominantly
men under 30 while those
involved in animal hoarding
are more likely to be women
over 60.

(Continued from Page 1) for development without reaching outside of the city limits for residential developments.

"If the city wants to buy my property, then they can make me an offer, but I refuse to allow them to steal my property," said Gayman. The property is located near the old city golf course. Cathy Menninga spoke to the Warsaw City Council about animal abuse and the lack of an animal shelter.

"I recently observed a white dog that was tethered to a tree near downtown Warsaw and I was concerned that it was not being cared for so I took water and food and discovered that the dog was in need of medical attention," said Menninga.

Menninga reported this to the Warsaw Police Department. When the dog continued to be chained to

the tree, she contacted the local veterinarians to see if the dog had been treated. Neither of them knew of the dog.

Menninga suggested to the Warsaw Board of Aldermen that they investigate the matter and form a committee to research the possibilities of applying for grants to help Warsaw build an animal shelter.

Solutions offered by Menninga included: dog emergency fostering until placement or transport to an accepting shelter; mutual aid agreements with police agencies; agreement with shelters; plead for money from outside sources and form a non-profit.

With no further business, the meeting adjourned at 6:45 PM as the council went into executive session.

Warsaw City Council meetings are held on the first and third Monday each month in the Community Building Council Chambers. Meetings are open to the public.

Commission To Discuss Salaries & Benefits For FY 2025 Budget

Benton County Presiding Commissioner Steve Daleske called the November 18 meeting of the Benton County Commission to order at 9:00 AM. Those in attendance included District 1 Commissioner Larry Berry, District 2 Commissioner Scott Harms and visitor David Malecki.

Presiding Commissioner Daleske stated that Randy Pogue had resigned from the Transportation Advisory Commission (TAC). Commissioner Harms made the motion to appoint Eddie Simons to fill this vacancy. The motion passed.

E-911 Director Jessica Mayfield met with commissioners to discuss the current system that utilized for radio communication with the sheriff's office and all departments emergency within the county the need that exists to upgrade this equipment. Major Dean Noll was also present. A telephone conference call was conducted with Drew Steward of CentralSquare to discuss options and cost projections for a new system. Further discussion will continue in this matter.

The commission began preparation of the 2025 budget. Salary and benefits for employees for fiscal year 2025 was discussed. Each official and department head will meet with commissioners to discuss their 2025 budget requests. Benton County Treasurer

It Was Slim Pickins

In the winter of 1950, my cousin entered a contest in a movie magazine. All she had to do was select a name for Whip Wilson's horse. If you are not a fan of the old cowboys of the silver screen, you may ask who was Whip Wilson? When he was out of character his real name was Andy Clyde and he was the surprise of a lifetime. He was a very correct English-Scotch gentleman and spoke with a proper British accent. He lived his life by a strict set of rules. People who knew him never just dropped by for a visit, they waited to be invited. He had a special room in his house that contained mirrors and props so he could privately rehearse his character and no one was allowed into that room ever!

By the way, my cousin won the contest and appeared with her new Schwinn bicycle on the front page of the County paper in July of 1951. The name she had given his horse was "Prince of the Prairie." Alluding to royalty no doubt appealed

to the British gentleman.

Undoubtedly one of the most famous cowboys of the silver screen was a guy named Marion at birth. The name made him the target of every bully in town. He had a paper route when he was eleven years old and was always accompanied by his little dog he had named "Little Duke." The firemen at the local fire station began referring to him as big Duke and the name stuck.

Years later the "Duke"

said that nobody ever liked his acting except the public. He went on to say that he was just John Wayne in every role he ever played. Wayne told an interviewer he felt planes, trains and automobiles were great if you needed to get somewhere in a hurry but for pure pleasure there was nothing like a good horse. He also shared the opinion that any man who would make an X rated movie

should have to take his own daughter to see it.

The names of the old cowboys are so numerous that it would be impossible to name them all. A few silver screen heroes from the past would include Tom Mix, Buck Jones, Ken Maynard, Tex Ritter, Lash Larue, Hoot Gibson, Gene Autry, Hopalong Cassidy and the comic book cowboy, Red Ryder.

Red Ryder's name was on the BB gun that I faithfully asked Santa for each year. Each year I was disappointed and told it was not a suitable toy for little girls and that I might "shoot my eye out." A few years back it was under the tree and Red Ryder was emblazoned on the wooden stock. My grandson and I promptly tested out the gun even through he didn't have a clue who Red Ryder was but he certainly knew all about a BB gun.

What kid from the 1940's didn't adore Roy Rogers? To sum up in a few words of what Roy Rogers stood for, I would go back to a statement he made in an interview. He said "The movies today are so filthy that I wouldn't let Trigger watch them." Trigger was the all time greatest movie horse and was a large factor in promoting Roy's career. Anyone who has ever ridden a horse knows how difficult it is to fit a horse to

ones self. It's a little akin to

fitting yourself with a good pair of boots, they either fit or they don't. Trigger was the third horse Roy selected from the movie studio's stable and he knew from the first that he was the one he wanted. Roy made \$75.00 per week but paid the studio \$2,500.00 for the animal and his sidekick Smiley Burnett named the golden steed, Trigger.

Other famous sidekicks of the silver screen were Pat Butram, Gabby Hayes, Little Beaver and Andy Devine. Everybody always remembers Andy Devine simply because of the strange voice. Folklore has recorded he damaged his vocal chords in a failed suicide attempt. He survived the ordeal and the high pitched voice made him an overnight success.

Another famous "sidekick" is Slim Pickins. We've seen him in many movies over the years but probably none as memorable as the role he played in "Blazing Saddles."

He was actually born Louis Bert Lindley Jr. and he always knew he wanted to earn a living as a cowboy. He thought the natural choice was to take up rodeoing. His father forbid it and he knew he would have to follow the profession with a pseudo name as his father's exact words were: "I never want to see your name on the entry lists." His friend picked his new name by saying: "Why don't you use Slim Pickins since that's how your paycheck will be," and Slim Pickins it remained.

While the cowboy is the all time favorite American hero, his female counterpart just never quite made it. There was Dale Evans but only because of Roy Rogers so while we girls could ride, rope and wrangle too, we are missing from the folklore. Leaving the limelight for the cowgirls to be "Slim Pickins."

Lakeview Heights FD Trains For Vehicle Accidents, Fires

The Lakeview Heights Fire Department volunteers met on Wednesday evening, November 27 at Station 1 for training sessions.

The sessions were conducted by Assistant Fire Chief, Robert Stouffer and centered around vehicle fires, car wrecks and two-car collisions. It was an evening of outside training and involved some scrap vehicles to work within the various scenarios.

Before coming to the Lakeview Heights area Stouffer retired from his full-time employment with Cal Fire in the State of California. Stouffer went to work for Cal Fire as a rookie kid and worked his way though different levels of fire fighting in the southern part of the state in the San Bernadino area.

As a hobby Stouffer was always involved with speedway racing of high end cars such as a Jaguars and Lamborghinis and knows they are constructed differently than GM or Ford products and require cutting in different areas when doing extraction after

The last six years Stouffer spent with Cal-Fire he was a Division Chief with airplanes and helicopters that do the water drops on the forest fires that plague California annually.

Other than volunteering

with the Lakeview Heights Fire Department Stouffer is part of the Operation Barbecue Relief Organization and works there as Camp Director. They are located on Golden Acres Road in the Lakeview Heights area. In addition to teaching rescue techniques he has stepped up and is streamlining the record keeping part of the department for Which Chief Metscher is very grateful.

The Lakeview Heights area is a tight knit community with everyone always reaching out to help each other. Another organization there that makes a huge impact to the area residents is the Countryside Eagles. The Eagles host many fund raisers to help other organizations and are always big supporters of the Fire Department.

Realizing a need the Club through open its doors on Thanksgiving Day and hosted a Thanksgiving meal. As we enter the annual season of giving, you might be thinking of charities you wish to support. But you also might be wondering how to gain some tax benefits from your gifts.

It used to be pretty straightforward: You wrote a check to a charity and then deducted the amount of the gift, within limits, from your taxes. But a few years ago, as part of tax law changes, the standard deduction was raised significantly, so fewer people were able to itemize deductions. Consequently, there was less financial incentive to make charitable

Of course, this didn't entirely stop people from making them. And it's still possible to gain some tax advantages, too.

Here are a few tax-smart charitable giving strategies: • Bunch your charitable gifts into one year. If you combine a few years' worth of charitable gifts in a single year, you could surpass the

standard deduction amount and then itemize deductions for that year. In the years following, you could revert to taking the standard deduction.

 ${\color{red} \bullet \textit{Make qualified charitable}}$ distributions. Once you turn 73 (or 75 if you were born in 1960 or later), you must start taking withdrawals from your traditional or inherited IRA. These withdrawals — technically called required minimum

distributions, or RMDs are taxable at your personal income tax rate, so, if the amounts are large enough, they could push you into a higher tax bracket or cause you to pay larger Medicare premiums.

But if you donate these RMDs directly to a qualified charity, you can avoid the taxes. And because these donations, known qualified charitable distributions (QCDs), will reduce the balance on your IRA, you may have lower RMDs in the future.

Of course, if you need some or all your RMDs to help sustain yourself in

retirement, the use of QCDs may not be of interest to you. Keep in mind, though, that you can start making QCDs at 70½, even before you must start taking RMDs. OCDs up to \$105,000 can be taken in 2024.

• Consider a donor-advised fund. If you're interested in a long-term charitable giving arrangement, you might want to consider establishing a donoradvised fund. You can put many types of assets into this fund, and then direct it to make grants periodically to the charities you've chosen. You get an immediate tax deduction for your contribution, and, if you donate appreciated assets, such as stocks, you'll avoid the capital gains taxes you would have incurred if you simply sold the stocks and then gave the money to the charities. One note of caution, though your contributions to a donor-advised fund are irrevocable, and once the assets are in the fund, you can't use them for anything

These strategies — QCDs and donor-advised funds in particular — can be complex and involve several issues of which you should be aware. So, you should consult your tax advisor before taking action. But if any of these techniques are appropriate for your situation, give them some thought — because helping a charitable group and getting tax benefits for doing so is a "win" for everyone.





MSHP Reports Four Fatalities; No Drownings, Boat Crashes Over 2024 Thanksgiving



The Missouri State Highway Patrol reports four people died in traffic crashes during this year's Thanksgiving holiday counting period--from 6 p.m. Wednesday, November 27, 2024, through 11:59 p.m. Sunday, December 1, 2024. There were no boating crashes or drownings.

During the Thanksgiving holiday counting period, troopers report the following traffic statistics for 2024 (preliminary):

Crashes — 362 Injuries — 120 Fatalities — 4 DWI Arrests — 106

the 2023 [During Thanksgiving holiday counting period, troopers investigated 431 traffic crashes, which included four fatalities and 138 injuries. Statewide, nine people died and 483 people were injured in 1,342 traffic crashes over last year's Thanksgiving holiday. Troopers arrested 103 people for driving while intoxicated during the 2023 Thanksgiving holiday counting period.] Troopers investigated all

four of the traffic crash fatalities in 2024. One traffic fatality occurred in the Troop C, Weldon Spring, MO, area; One traffic fatality occurred in Troop D, Springfield, MO, area; One traffic fatality occurred in Troop G, Willow Springs, MO, area.; One traffic fatality occurred in Troop F, Jefferson City, MO, area One traffic fatality occurred

on November 27, 2024. An adult male, 44, of Monett, MO, died after the vehicle he was driving crossed the center of the roadway and struck another vehicle head on. The victim was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. The crash occurred in Barry County on MO 37, south of Route B. Barry County Coroner Gary Swearingen pronounced the victim deceased at the scene. The driver of the other vehicle sustained serious injuries; he was not wearing a seat belt. The Patrol's

Major Crash Investigation Team #3 investigated the crash.







Mike Thornbrugh shares Revelation 3:14-22 The Lukewarm Church and the seventh letter to the Church of Laodicea

Jesus identifies Himself to the church of Laodicea as the truth, a faithful and true witness, and the author of all creation. Jesus knows everything there is to know. He also knows your heart. He sees what's going on the outside and knows what's going on the inside.

The importance of the geographical location of Laodicea is to get water from either the cold or hot location back to Laodicea, the water would be lukewarm. The Laodicean's were neither cold nor hot, because they weren't close enough to the source.

Laodicea was a wealthy system. banking earthquake almost ruined the city. When relief money was sent, they sent it back saying they didn't need it. Self-reliance is not always good. Famous for their wool and their medical school, they prospered. They have gold, wool, and salve. They say they are rich, but Jesus says they have nothing without Him. Jesus is telling them they need to buy gold refined from the fire. The gold they have is the gold Jesus created and can be taken away at any time. They need white garments to clothe themselves instead of their black wool. They need His eye salve and not to rely on themselves.

Jesus tells the people they need to repent and turn to Him. Their problem is they are a vomit inducing lukewarmness. Jesus is standing at the door knocking. Jesus comes to them even though they are not depending on Him, and they don't even see it. They're not hold or cold, they are not healing or refreshing. Jesus comes


