Ah Hail, Grinch Steals Day Full Of Christmas Fun In Benton County



When the Grinch got word of Warsaw's Hallmark Christmas event he flew into action by bringing in a hail storm that took everyone off guard. Two storm chasers on Highway 7, west of the county seat, were following the storm clouds when they noticed a rotating force and reported it to the weather service. They confirmed it as a tornado and watched it continue in a path about two miles north of Warsaw.

Those same chasers were en route and recorded for Youtube what they were observing; not just the rotating clouds but dime to nickel-size hail covering the roadway. It was of the amount to make them slow the vehicle in fear of slick patches. One, Mike Williams, observed, "It sounds like we're driving on gravel!"

All of this surprising, late afternoon weather caused the Warsaw Chamber to announce, "Unfortunately we will have to reschedule the Mayor's Tree Lighting and Christmas Parade for this evening. With the hail storm that passed through, and the standing water on the streets with temps dropping, it is unsafe for us to proceed. The safety of our residents and participants is our top priority. While we

Mayor Eddie Simons called the Warsaw City Board meeting to order at 6:00 PM on December 16.

Alderwomen Lou Breshears and Reba Slavens and Aldermen Adam Howe, Eric Flores and Rob Coskey were all in attendance. Alderman James White was absent.

City Clerk Jessica Kendall recorded minutes of the meeting.

The 2025 budget was presented to the board for approval.

Total governmental fund revenues are projected at \$8,301,156 and expenditures at \$8,215,428. This provides for a final budget of revenues over expenditures of \$85,728.

Full-time employees will receive a 2% step increase and a 2.5% COLA.

Departments major purchases may include:

Transportation: 16" Cold Planer-\$16,795, 72" pick-up broom; \$11,560; \$300,000 overlay.

Parks: lawn mower, \$12,500; master plan, \$45,000; shelters, \$20,000; restroom, \$143,966.



I love to cook and want to be beneficial and convenient to people who need or want home deliveries. I live in a retirement community and some residents are homebound or do not have a lot to live on. Some of the favorite foods that are ordered include Philly cheese potatoes which are so big they can be split into two meals. Soups are also popular, especially in cold weather. Some favorite soups of my customers are chicken tortilla, broccoli cheese and loaded potato. Brown butter chicken and meat loaf are also popular meals."

Hill said that she is not a baker, so last year she collaborated with local bakers to get fried pies, cakes and cupcakes. Last year she also provided bread with soups, but not everybody liked bread because it did not taste its best when reheated after delivery.

Mike Keith Insurance, Inc. representative Christian DeLozier met with the Commissioners to present the 2025 property and liability insurance proposal, noting an increase in premium of 17% from 2024. A schedule of property and premium breakdown was included for each type of coverage. GVMH Acquires New CT Scanner, Offers Cardiac Calcium Scoring



Golden Valley Memorial Healthcare (GVMH) has acquired a new, state-of-the-art CT Scanner.

A computed tomography scan (CT scan) is commonly known to patients as a CAT scan. Compared to standard x-rays that only show two dimensional bones, CT scans capture many images of individual slices or

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cross-sections of the body to produce 3D images. Medical staff can then use these images to view a tumor from different angles. Often, without even needing to perform any type of invasive surgery, the doctor is able to discern the tumor's size, shape, location and even the blood vessels feeding it.

Providers commonly perform CT-guided biopsies to further their diagnoses. Additionally, comparing CT scans over time is considered advantageous. Multiple scans give doctors the ability to see how a patient's tumor is responding to treatment or find out if the cancer has returned after treatments have concluded. Starting December 16.

Starting December 16, 2024, the GVMH Imaging department will begin performing cardiac calcium scoring to aid in assessing heart health and the risk of heart disease and stroke.

The scan is recommended for the following patients:

-Age 60 or older -Mother or sister diagnosed

with heart disease at age 65 or younger -Father or brother diagnosed

with heart disease at age 55 or younger -Have a history of:

-Diabetes

-High blood pressure

- -High cholesterol
- -Stroke

-Peripheral vascular disease -Tobacco use, either current or former

"We are excited to have the new CT Scanner. The improvement in image quality will result in an even more accurate diagnosis," said Race Kastl, Director of Oncology and Imaging Services. "Access to the advanced software technology carried by our new CT Scanner can result in reduced patient radiation dose without a decrease in quality in many cases."

"In addition, we are delighted to offer cardiac calcium scoring to our patients," commented Kastl. "This test helps patients understand their risk of heart attack or disease as well as if they need to take preventive or corrective measures based on the results, such as eating better, exercising more or quitting smoking."





Less Is More

Aunt Sella was born in 1902 and spent her girlhood in the southeast region of Benton County. Her father, my paternal grandfather earned the family's living from tie hacking and other endeavors associated with the timber industry. Many times their income was meager to say the very least. As poor as they were in earthly riches she recalled in her journals of being excited and looking forward to Christmas time.

Her mother made sure that she and her siblings had something in their stockings. She recalled corn shuck dolls and candy. Hard peppermint candy could be expected and sometimes tootsie rolls. Some years they had received oranges for the holiday, something

they never tasted or even saw at any other time of the year.

Christmas The that stood ahead of all in her memory was when she was a teenager. On a rare trip to town in the big wagon, earlier in the year, she had spotted something special in the case at the General Merchandise store. The style for young women at the time was to wear a cameo brooch at the throat on their blouses. The lovely oval shell circled by gold depicted the carved head of a young woman. She had never seen anything so lovely but it cost several dollars so she put it out of her mind and didn't fret about it.

Unknown to her, her Mother had noted the wistful longing and determined to find a way to make the

wish come true. Pinching pennies even harder than usual the brooch was in my Aunt's stocking that special Christmas. She never spoke of that special gift that she didn't become a little teary eyed and she wore the pin for years before a faulty clasp caused her to lose it. She never fretted over the loss but always said she had the memories of her Mother's love in securing the gift for her. One of the few store bought gifts she ever received in her youth.

As a child my Christmas wasn't quite as meager as my fathers and his siblings but there weren't mounds of gifts by any stretch of the imagination. Dresses and nightgowns made by mother, nuts and fruit and some candy were standard with perhaps one "special" gift. One year it was a red wagon that I utilized to fill the wood box on the back porch. I usually scanned the newest selection of books at the Ben Franklin store before writing to Santa. Over the years my book shelf filled with "The five little Peppers", Black Beauty, Heidi and Huck Finn. Occasionally someone would shop for me at Scotten's Book Store in Sedalia and then I'd receive a Nancy Drew mystery, the most prized of all.

Consistently each year I asked for a Red Ryder BB gun, which was never under the tree. When I lamented that Santa never brought me the gun, which I truly wanted, I was told: "He doesn't want you to shoot your eye out." Ah, me and Ralphie were in the same boat! I suppose everyone grew tired of me telling the sad tale every Christmas and I found one under the tree a few years ago. I was sixty years old but Santa Claus finally came through. Undoubtedly the most unique gift I ever received was from my Aunt Leota. On my sixth Christmas she made me a set of playhouse

furniture from orange crates. In 1949 oranges and other fruit was shipped in wooden crates to the local grocery stores. The boxes were usually thrown away so my thrifty and clever Aunt rounded some up from Atwood & Henry in Lincoln, Missouri, went home and got out her hammer, saw and paint brushes. The crates were left in their original form but she did cut away or add in some areas to make the chairs, the table and a cradle for my doll.

The boxes were very strong, and the charm from my playhouse furniture came from the sandpapering, several coats of bright red paint and gingham seat cushions. The table top was made from some type of melon box with scrap boards forming the legs. The chairs were from orange crates and the cradle was a grape box. The furniture was upstairs in a spare room when I left home but some where over the years it disappeared, I know not where.

That same Aunt had not lost her creativity when my five were young and eagerly anticipating Santa's arrival. Both of my sons have stuffed dogs made from a masculine plaid fabric, Mary the youngest received an "old woman" rag doll and a sock monkey. Laura and Katy received rag dolls, complete with ears and ear rings. She made them a wardrobe of clothing and tiny hangers for the clothes and later she presented them with doll furniture stuffed & covered chairs, beds and sofas formed over match boxes. There was the Christmas she made all her own grandchildren, plus mine, the two-headed dolls. They had a head on each end and by flipping the skirt back and forth the doll could change from a blonde to a brunette.

Every one of those gifts of love reside in a trunk and every once in awhile they are retrieved and cuddled

fondly. They seem to bring back a flood of memories of Christmas past that existed prior to cell phones, computers and expensive electronic games. I recently heard that a group had approached the toy industry and requested them to cut back on their seductive advertising. They didn't want children longing for expensive gifts that their

parents might not be able to purchase if they are having economic hard times.

I, my ancestors and my off spring learned early on that Santa's pockets weren't very deep. Most of the gifts were homemade, sometimes second hand but always given with love. And maybe the most valuable gift we received was the knowledge that sometimes less is more.

There's been quite a buzz around town concerning the Planning and Zoning Ordinances and the Comprehensive Plan. My goal here is to give out facts to alleviate some of the rumors I have been hearing and seeing on social media.

First of all, these are two separate issues. They both began in 2023 because the city is required by State Statute to have an up-todate set of planning and zoning ordinances and comprehensive plan. The only comprehensive plan on file was written in 1972. The planning and zoning ordinances had not been completely reviewed for years, if ever. Each council had simply dealt with any problems raised by the current ordinances or added ordinances as they were needed.

Secondly, they are being

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handled individually. The Planning and Zoningmm committee is now reviewing the proposed ordinances that were written to update our ordinances so they meet the current State Statutes. Once they have reviewed them, made deletions/corrections, and accepted the revised version, they will be presented to the Board of Aldermen to be accepted by the City of Cole Camp. The steering committee has the responsibility of putting together a proposed plan for future development of the City of Cole Camp. This plan has been presented to the Planning and Zoning committee for its approval before it is presented to the Board of Aldermen. I want to stress two things about the comprehensive plan. Number one, it has not been accepted by the Planning and Zoning committee. Number two, it is a proposed guide to future development of the city. It is not a set of rules for future development. The city is not obligated in any way to follow through on these suggestions. The plan was based on input from the community obtained at three open community meetings held in the spring of 2024 held at WAM, the high school gym during a game, and at City Hall. The participants were asked to list their concerns about the City of Cole Camp and to then vote for their top concerns. The plan is based on the concerns voiced by the citizens during those meetings. I am aware that the Sunshine Law requires that once a document has

I am aware that the Sunshine Law requires that once a document has been presented in an open meeting it is to be made available to the public. These documents have been released as requested and have raised concerns with a few people. I urge everyone who has concerns to remember that these are draft documents. The Planning and Zoning committee is going over

proposed ordinances the one by one and removing or changing the ones that do not apply to Cole Camp because of the size of the city. The draft will be returned to the writers for a final revision. It is highly likely that the ordinances that are most concerning to the citizens may be deleted by the committee. We must also remember that because of changes in state statutes, new ordinances some may be necessary. That was the reason to hire the outside firm of PGAV to write the new ordinances. Unfortunately, they are written in legal-speak and that is difficult to understand. But our attorney

will also be looking at these documents before the Board of Aldermen is given them for consideration.

Finally, I sincerely hope that this explanation has helped put to rest some of the rumors that have been going around town about these two items. It is not wishing for something. It is confidence that the things we hope for will one day be a reality. Christmas brings hope, an enduring quality that reassures us in times of uncertainty.

Hope is the confident expectation that God will fulfill His promises. Look at Luke 1:45: When Mary, the mother of Jesus, meets her cousin Elizabeth, Elizabeth says: "Blessed is she who believed, for there will be a fulfillment of those things which were told her from the Lord." That is the language of hope. Hope in the Christian vocabulary is not wishing for something we may or may not receive. It believes what the Lord has promised will be accomplished. We may not possess God's promises today, but hope says, "One day, I will receive everything God has promised." To celebrate Christmas properly, we need the confident expectation that God can be relied on to fulfill the hope He has awakened in our hearts through the promises of His Word.

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
