Citizens Band Together At Benson Center As They Demand Answers Over "Fly Ash"

What is it? That is the question everyone is asking? What are the chemicals and how much of them has Evergy allegedly been pumping into our water? Or better yet, how much contaminated dust has been flowing through our air, onto our playgrounds and near our schools? Is Evergy even behind any of it or could it be something completely unknown? Could the testing come back that the levels are within reason? If they are within reason, could they still be the cause of so many problems?

On Monday night, January 27, 2025, at 6:30 pm, a meeting was held at the Benson Center in Clinton. Chuck Caisley; along with Jared Morrison, Director of Environmental Services for Evergy; as well as John Brinson, who runs the power plants for Evergy were in attendance. They began the conversation and stated that they wanted to get to the facts of the case. Caisley attempted to make it abundantly clear to the people of Clinton and the surrounding areas that he does not want anything harmful hurting the soil,

the water, or the air. He, along with his colleagues, explained that before anything is dumped into the water, it is tested thoroughly. Ensuring it meets regulations, all of the dustlike particles are made into a cement-like substance and then buried beneath the landfill dirt, that way they cannot get into the air. Essentially everything

they do is done with safety

Furthermore, they added that if something is not being done correctly, they too would want to know (as they also have families that live here).

However, the people of Clinton have a hard time believing them, citing things they have seen with their own eyes, to the things they have heard, to the health problems they've had.

Clinton's Cynthia Smith shared her story on the topic and how it has affected her personally.


She stated, "Everybody was getting sick so we finally had the water tested and, of course, as usual, not the water."

She said that all of her friends started getting cancer. Smith, however, drinks bottled water and she did

not get sick. She knew something was wrong with the water, and that was what hurt her friends, she believes.

Many of the other attendees also claimed that this is not a new thing; that this has been something that has been going on for years; that it's simply been swept under the rug. For instance, it was said by many people at the meeting that Congressman Mark Alford had known about the issue since 2024. Mr. Alford claims that, although he had known about the incident since 2024, he acted on it immediately and that other people were not getting back to him in a timely manner.

Many other personal testimonies were presented and questions were asked throughout the night, not only to the Evergy team

CHS Students Set Up Little Free Pantry: 'Take What You Need, Give What You Can'

Isabel Gastaudo was at work at a local restaurant when a person came in asking for food.

In response to a suggestion to try a food pantry, the person told her there aren't any in town. So Isobel decided to create one.

What Isobel created: a Little Free Pantry as a community service project through FCCLA, a service club at Clinton High School. The food pantries are similar to Little Free Libraries, which look like a small cabinet with shelves on a post, that people erect and stock with books, available for anyone who needs something to read. Little Free Libraries are usually located outside on the grounds or a church, community center or private property in a neighborhood.

Little Free Pantries started in 2016 in Arkansas as a grass-roots movement to address the problem of food insecurity. The cupboards are stocked with non-perishable goods, which are offered free to anyone who needs it — no questions, no red tape, no registration. The free pantries are a safety net for

people who are hungry, or have hungry mouths to feed. They include people who have moved to a community recently, and people who lack the time to access other resources.

Of Americans struggling to put food on the table, it's estimated that 29 percent don't qualify for federal food assistance. In some parts of the country, the percentage is as high as 80 percent.

The mantra of the Little Free Pantry movement: Take What You Need. Give What You Can.

Starting a pantry is the perfect match for FCCLA, Isabel's club at Clinton High School. FCCLA stands for Family, Career and Community Leaders of America, and is a national organization for students enrolled in family and consumer sciences classes. That includes child development, culinary arts and any subject that benefits the wellness of students outside of an academic education. Isabel defines the subjects as ones that help students survive after they grow up and leave homecooking, housekeeping and raising a family, or generally what's known as





but also to members of the Henry County Commission in Rick Watson, Jake Bradley, Mark Larson and Jim Stone, as well as Congressmen Alford and Representative Jim Kalberloh.

The people of Clinton and the surrounding area want to know what the people in power will do to help them if these toxic chemicals have been and are becoming a problem, not only for the people of Clinton, but for the people of Missouri as a whole.

This material waste known as "fly ash" could potentially become a very large problem for the health and safety of the public. At the public forum on Monday, Evergy representatives concluded that they will have a third party obtain test results and that the people in power and Evergy will attempt to work together to figure out if something has gone wrong. If something has indeed gone wrong or handled inappropriately, they will also work on how to fix it.

Citizens are still angry, and rightfully so. The effects of this particular nuisance are said to be harmful to not only them, but also their children, their animals, and farmer's crops.

Although the questions that the community hoped would be answered, were not done in completion at Monday night's meeting, there is light at the end of the tunnel, and very soon the answers that the community seeks will be given, providing truth to the people who call Missouri, and more importantly, Henry County home.

promote the wellness of the community. She chose to create a Little Free Pantry as a way to make a difference.

The high school shop class built the pantry, and Isabel received donations to stock it. The biggest hurdle she had to overcome finding a place in the community to put it.

It took perseverance and time, and was a learning experience on how public entities work, she said. She first asked at the health department, where she was told they already were working on a similar project. The Benson Center told her she could put her little pantry outside, where many Little Free Libraries are located for 24hour accessibility, but Isobel was afraid it wouldn't survive the elements.

She also approached churches and the library. Hawthorn Bank helped her collect donations for the project, but other than that, it was an exercise in frustration.

"It was hard to understand," she said, of navigating the restrictions that nonprofits and public institutions operate under, complicating the hunt for a location. "It took a long time."

Finally, Isobel stopped asking non-profits and decided to focus on private businesses, which she learned have more latitude to do what they want with their property. She found a home for her project at Fristoe's Body Shop, 134 N. Main, and set the Little Free Pantry up on Monday, Jan. 20, stocking it with soup, canned food and other non-perishable food items. The pantry also has some clothing and shoes that were donated.

Fristoe's Body Shop has two advantages, she said. It's close to the Clinton Square, and it's open long hours — from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Thursday and Friday to 3 p.m. The shop is owned by Tim Hager, who inherited it from his father, who bought it in 1990

and recently retired. Tim is married to Liane Hager, the Family and Consumer Services teacher at Clinton High School, and advisor to the FCCLA.

The Blessing Box, a parallel to free pantries in what is called the mini-pantry movement, started in Oklahoma about the same time. The sign on the boxes says "Have a Blessing - Leave it. Need a Blessing - Take it. Above all, Be Blessed."

Isobel, who is interested in studying chemistry, said the project taught her how to collaborate with the community to address the problem of hunger and food insecurity. Items for the Little Free Pantry can be dropped off at Clinton High School, 1106 S. 2nd, or at Fristoe's Body Shop, 134 N. Main.

chamber members on the Missouri chamber plan as well as how it could save money regarding health insurance for you and your employees. They will also have Compass Health network, doing trauma 101 training for the workforce, as well as an update from the childcare committee. Dawson will also be giving updates as the economic development director. Followed by a question and answer session, there will also be time to speak individually. The cost for the luncheon will be \$25 for non-members and \$15 for members. Tickets are on sale now at the chamber office. They ask you to keep in mind that seating will be limited.

Other topics presented included: the CFD is requesting approval to accept an MOU with GVMH to serve as a consortium member for their community paramedic program. This request was approved.

Regarding the snowstorm, the help provided is as follows: materials that were used were approximately 100 tons of salt, four large plows, and two flatbeds. A 2002 large truck went down and is being repaired, currently. It will be replaced by a new truck on order. The roads were treated and plowed for eight days by six staff employees plus a superintendent.

There has been a special waste disposal service agreement: the agreement has been submitted. The city of Clinton will have a backup plan for the disposal of bio-solids during a construction project.

There will be a gear reducer rebuild: the city administrator approved the rebuild quote.

Ace pipe: CIPP liner

has been installed in three segments. They will continue with the remainder of the project. On 1819 North Gaines Dr.: there was a blockage in a line that was cleared by ace pipe. CCTV footage showed the line to be heavily cracked as well as filled with many tree roots. On 1/7/2025 project West: A builder is looking to acquire land with the potential for a small-scale community developing small-scale homes to help with the force housing program.

1/14/2025 Project Cup: an investor is taking into consideration a producerelated store for the downtown Clinton area. There's a possibility for this project in the late second or early third quarter of 2025. 1/16/2025 Project chemical coatings - GSLI: the manufacturing of this project requires a 20,000+ square foot facility. This has the possibility of creating 25-50 jobs. This company has been in business for over 50 years.

Joel Long from the Airport Association, discussed the airport terminal building. Long presented the success of the project. He spoke on how the US Geological Research Department is using Canadian equipment as there is no longer American equipment available to do research. The airport contracted out one of the hangers. He spoke on how the airport is running smoothly and their sales are up this year.

The open session of the meeting ended at 6:50 PM.

The American Red Cross encourages donors to give now to help protect the blood supply from the ongoing impact of severe winter weather and wildfires. Donors of all blood types — particularly type O negative blood donors — are needed to help save lives this month.

As dangerous snow and ice continue to sweep across the country, and wildfires in Southern California continue to burn and impact air quality, Red Cross blood drive cancellations have grown into the hundreds. Collectively, this has resulted in about 15,000 uncollected blood and platelet donations in January. Here in the Missouri Arkansas region, 103 blood drives have been cancelled since the new year due to weather, resulting in 1,838 uncollected blood product donations.

More winter storms are forecast for this week - including in areas of the U.S. that do not typically experience significant snowfall which could further strain the blood supply. Additionally, hazardous weather conditions have the potential to make it tougher to move vital blood products across the Red Cross network, possibly affecting deliveries to hospitals in some locations. 

raised by animals, has just joined a parade of elephants. He entered the parade at the rear and is genuinely enjoying himself; but he has somehow missed the leader, Colonel Hathi's, order, "About face!"

A young elephant friend quickly tells Mowgli, "Turn around. Go the other way, or you will be trampled." Matthew tells us Jesus began to preach. His message was "Repent! Turn around! Go the other way!" Why? Because "the Kingdom of heaven is near."

The picture I get is of people surrounded by the place where they want to go but not realizing it. Instead of entering the Kingdom, they are leaving it. (One can only walk halfway into a kingdom for then you will be walking out of it.) Our universe is the kingdom. Our universe is not the whole kingdom, but it is the front end of it. From the very beginning, God created it for us. Much like one prepares for company, God spent six "working days" preparing this world, this universe for us. On the seventh day, God thought, "Everything is ready; let us invite the people-

One need not be a rocket scientist to understand such a beautiful invitation. Having been given the freedom to do right or wrong, humankind arrived in the kingdom self-centered and mistrusting. 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

General Lafayette Returns to America in 1784--Part II By Glynna Elliott Morse

The Marquis de Lafayette had left America shortly after the Battle of Yorktown. Part III of this column will review the 1784 tour in which Lafayette returned to America as a returning hero of the American Revolutionary War.

Lafayette had left America to return to France in 1781 shortly after the British had been defeated in the Battle of Yorktown. Lafayette and George Washington had developed a close relationship during the war, and they corresponded by letter from 1782 to 1784. Lafayette had joined a French group advocating the abolition of the slave trade, and he wrote a letter to Washington in 1783 urging the "emancipation of American slaves." Although Washington did not free the Mt. Vernon slaves at that time, George Washington requested in his will of 1799 that the slaves he owned be freed after his wife's death. Martha Washington freed George Washington's slaves in 1801 a year before her death in 1802. [1], [2]

After George Washington invited Lafayette to visit him at Mt. Vernon, Lafayette departed from France on June 20, 1784, arriving at New York on August 4, 1784. Americans welcomed Lafayette with a large celebration at New York City and the State Assembly. Two days later he traveled to New Jersey, and he traveled to Philadelphia on August 9 where he was met by cheering crowds. His tour reached Baltimore on August 14 for two days of large celebrations before he headed to Mt. Vernon to meet George Washington. [3]

Lafayette visited with the Washingtons at Mt. Vernon two different times in 1784: August 17-29 and November 25-29. George Washington considered Lafayette an adopted son, and Lafayette had named his first son "George Washington Lafayette." favette and Washington enjoyed pleasant outings at Mt. Vernon, many on horseback. Details of that visit were reported in letters Lafayette wrote to his wife, Adrienne, and their children, back in France. Those letters told of conversations Washington and Lafayette had about agriculture, philosophy, political freedom, and type of government envisioned for a new republic. [1],[3]

George Washington had to leave for business in the Western lands between the Potomac and Ohio Rivers, and Lafayette used those days to go visit other communities in the Northeast. While visiting in Baltimore, Lafayette met James Madison, who accompanied Lafayette to New York and New England towns.

New York and Connecticut conferred honorary state citizenship on Lafayette. He traveled on the French ship Nymph to Yorktown, arriving on November 15, and then on to Richmond by November 18. While in Richmond, Lafavette was dismayed to find that James Armistead, an African American who had carried out a spy mission for Lafayette in the Virginia Campaign, was still enslaved. Lafayette wrote a letter to the Virginia Assembly requesting Armistead's freedom. On January 9, 1786, James Armistead was emancipated for "services rendered and bravery during the siege of Yorktown." James Armistead then used Armistead as his middle name and chose "Lafayette" as his surname. [3]

After leaving Richmond on November 22, Lafayette and Washington visited for the last time at Mt. Vernon. Washington accompanied Lafayette to Annapolis on November 29, and, Washington and Lafayette said their goodbyes at Marlboro, Maryland on December 1, 1784. [3]

As Lafayette boarded the French ship Nymph at New Yorkn on December 2, 1784 to return to France, the escorting dignitaries handed Lafayette a letter written by George Washington on December 8, a few days after Washington had returned to Mt. Vernon after having said goodbye to Lafayette at Marlboro, Maryland. [3] In George Washington's letter, his attachment to Lafayette was evident, which said, in part: "In the moment of our separation upon the road I traveled, and every hour since, I felt all that love, respect and attachment for you, with which length of years, close connection and your merits have inspired me.... It is unnecessary...to repeat to you the sincerity of my regards and friendship, nor have I words were I to attempt it. My fervent prayers are offered for your safe and pleasant pas-

sage." [3]
The visit in 1784 was the last time Washington and Lafayette would meet in person. They corresponded frequently by letter for the next 15 years until Washington's death on December 17, 1799. Lafayette visited George Washington's tomb at Mt. Vernon on his next tour of the United States in 1824-1825.[1], [3]

Lafayette's 1824-1825 tour of the United States will be reviewed as Part IV at a future date.

Henry County Women Join The World At War

When J. Howard Miller depicted Rosie the Riveter on a poster in 1942 he was chiefly creating a portrait of the women working in aircraft manufacturing, ship yards and other war plants across the United States.

Women worked at all the jobs that had been vacated by the men being called to the front lines. They even worked on the railroads and one Henry County woman worked for the railroad as a "Section Jenny" for \$6.00 a day for 10 hours daily. It was hard, back breaking labor but her son was a prisoner-of-war in the Philippines and she said that keeping busy was the best way to forget her worries.

Clinton had two young men at Pearl Harbor on that terrible day of December7, 1941. One was killed and one survived the attack and that alone was enough to strengthen the local citizen's grim resolve. Everyone was on high alert and the State Highway Patrol contacted all Navy servicemen home on leave to return to their base immediately and the Patrol also took action to guard power plants and other industries in the area.

Because dynamite had been discovered under several bridges on both coasts, the Missouri State Highway Department ordered all 238 important bridges in the State to be guarded day and night, including 7 bridges in Henry County. By February 9, 1942, the nation went on daylight savings time to conserve electricity for the defense industries.

It seemed as if everything was in short supply, and by the end of the war some items were very difficult to obtain and sometimes impossible: shoes, sugar, tires, coffee, dog food, hosiery, gasoline, canned fish, meat, rubber, silk, shellac, newsprint and paper and all metal products including zippers. Bananas were unavailable completely and the speed limit was reduced to 35 mph to conserve gas and also for safety's sake, as most people were driving on retreads. The most severe shortage was "man power." When it came time to plant and harvest on the farms the women picked up the slack.

The American Legion in Clinton collected old records to be made into new ones. Residents could leave old records with any local merchant to be picked up. If it could be repurposed, it was.

Nylon stockings could be recycled into parachutes and rope. Old cars were salvaged for the steel mills. By 1945 women were being asked to save their old cooking fat for the war effort. The famous singer, Kate Smith, stated in a newspaper ad, "Only one tablespoon of used cooking fats will help make 5 machine-gun bullets." She advised it didn't make a

bit of difference how dark or blackened it is or what smelly things like onion or fish you've cooked in the fat, it was usable.

When you were just a baby during this time, like I was, it made it difficult in later years to understand why when I viewed my maternal grandmother save white cotton string in large balls, put a patch on top of a patch on my grandfather's work pants, darn socks again and again, save buttons and zippers from clothes that was beyond repair and salvage every drop of cooking fat. If it was good bacon grease it was saved for cooking, if it was old and

rancid it was used to make homemade lye soap.

She, like all the other women on the home front had waged their own war against the enemy by "using it up, wearing it out, making it do or doing without!" Even when the war ended and the servicemen came home, the generation that had survived those difficult times was not easily swayed by the new "golden age of Capitalism." Those women had learned valuable lessons about the fragility of the U.S. Economic system and for most, would hold on to those lessons for the rest of their lives.

Selecting and Managing Replacement Heifer

Selecting and managing replacement heifers can be a hot topic between beef cattle producers. There are a myriad of ways to select and manage heifers, and most producers have a system they are comfortable with. These systems can be quite variable from producer to producer, however, so I wanted to highlight some data from our Show-Me-Select Replacement Heifer Development Program (SMS) database to perhaps provide some guidance on this

In general, research has shown replacement heifers born early in the calving season have the following advantages: they conceive early in the breeding season, they tend to have early born calves, their heifer calves tend to conceive and calve earlier, and their steer calves tend to have higher value carcasses. Managing heifers to calve early in the calving season programs them for productive lives including producing older, heavier calves and more calves during their lifetime.

One key aspect of successfully getting replacement heifers bred is their reproductive status at breeding. This is determined by reproductive tract scoring (RTS). Heifers are examined and scored based on reproductive maturity on a score of 1 to 5. RTS 1 is infantile, RTS 5 indicates a heifer has cycled and is reproductively mature. In the SMS program, this exam is done between 30 and 60 days prior to the start of the breeding sea-

Our SMS database from 2010 through 2024 has data on slightly over 81,000 head of heifers. At the pre-breeding exam, approximately 2.5% of these heifers had a RTS of 1 or 2, meaning they had not yet reached puberty. It is inter-

esting to note that the RTS 1 and 2 heifers had an average pre-breeding weight of 658 and 709 pounds respectively. RTS 3, 4, and 5 weighed an average of 772, 812, and 834 pounds respectively. We know RTS is influenced by age, nutrition and genetics, so any single or a combination of these factors could be the reason for the 176-pound difference in pre-breeding weight between the RTS 1 and 5 heifers.

The goal of keeping replacement heifers is for them to become pregnant. An earlier review of the SMS data base showed pregnancy to a fixed-timed artificial insemination (FTAI) protocol for RTS 1 heifers was 4%. RTS 2 had a FTAI pregnancy rate of 27%, 48% for RTS 3, 52% for RTS 4 and 53% for RTS 5. Nearly 43,000 heifers were included in this analvsis.

Two clear points emerge from these data. If a producer really wants to emphasize selection pressure on reproduction, do a RTS exam before the start of the breeding season and cull RTS 1 and 2 heifers. This can save development costs on heifers that have a small chance of becoming pregnant during the breeding season.

Secondly, pay attention to the pre-breeding weights of heifers. A goal is to have heifers somewhere around 60% of their mature weight at breeding. If mature cows weight 1,400 pounds, 60% is approximately 840 pounds, so this should be your target weight at breeding. There are a variety of ways to get heifers to this target weight. If you have a large weight spread in your heifer selection pool, it would be cost effective to split the group into a heavyweight and lightweight group and feed accordingly in order to achieve the target weight at breeding.





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
