'Be Careful With Space Heaters!' Warns Fire Captain Following Warsaw House Fire

U.S. The Fire Administration and FEMA report that during winter months structure fires increase, although the total fires for a variety of reasons decrease. A substantial portion of the structure fire increase is caused by heating fires. Colder temperatures result in longer operating time for heating equipment and there is more opportunity for that equipment to cause a fire. Each year more than a half million winter fires cause \$3 billion in property loss, 1,900 deaths and nearly 8,000 injuries.

Captain John Powell of The Warsaw Fire Protection District (WFPD) was on duty February 12 when a house on Jackson Street near the Warsaw Laundromat caught on fire. He stated that the page came at about 2:15 AM and flames were already on the roof when they arrived at the scene.

"We had everything contained in two hours, and there were no rekindles of any kind," said Captain Powell. "We responded with two engines and roughly 10 firefighters. All the right people were there. Firemen don't determine causes of fires, that is the responsibility of fire marshals. But this fire

electrical. We also responded to a structure fire recently at 31495 Chance Avenue, at 10:16 PM in White Branch. Normally we have more fires than this."

The local Salvation Army steps in to help people displaced from their homes due to fires. Terri Watson with the local Salvation did appear to have been Army said that they provide members were willing to

a place to stay for the night after a fire and get clothing, blankets, socks, underwear and towels for those who have lost their belongings.

"Sometimes it takes 48 to 72 hours for initial insurance funds to arrive to help victims," said Watson. "The Red Cross helps with hotels. In one case family

take in their mother after a fire, but she couldn't walk up the stairs at her son's house and was put in a hotel for a week. We try to help with specific things that victims need. One person needed dishes and clothes. We have one man who lost his home to a fire a year ago and is still homeless, so we still help him as he tries to get back to normal. If you don't have insurance or family, it is hard. Finding housing in Benton County is unheard of. However, the Lakes Inn, behind Sonic in Warsaw, is amazing to work with and others have helped too."

Cole Camp Makes Move On Street Construction



The Cole Camp City Council held their regular monthly meeting on Wednesday, February 19 rather than Thursday evening, February 20. Following the handling routine of monthly business they welcomed a representative from Great River for an update on the planned improvements on North Maple Street from Main Street, northward to Junge Street.

The spokesman was up front that everything will have to be ADA compliant. On the west side of North Maple Street, it will not be an issue, but on the east side it is a challenge which they will meet. He spoke of the possibility of adding "festival boxes" which would provide power and water to those areas of the street during events.

He said most of the sidewalks will have to be removed and replaced on the east side but they will try to plan work to be the least disruptive to businesses. Also, there will be extreme care shown in not touching the 100-year old structures. He was reminded by the council that the project has to be completed in time for the Cole Camp Fair. He offered the alternative of beginning the work after the fair ends but was

told the town also has an Oktoberfest, a Pumpkinfest, a Christbaumfest and a Christbaumfest and a Christkindelmarket during September, October, November and December. In conclusion, he stated that the contractor will have to come from MoDOT's approved list. He stated an evening meeting for the business owners needs to be

held. Unfinished business included sewer equipment purchase. Jeremah Crider reported he had three bids that would make the city compliant. The equipment is needed for the plant on Spring Street that went down on Christmas. One was a new version of what is currently being used and is worn out. Once the new is installed the old can be rebuilt that would give the city a back-up. The prices ranged from \$55,000 to \$68,000 to \$130,000. After much discussion it was decided to amend the sewer budget to \$95,000 to buy a brand new version of current pumps and rebuild the old system with two new pumps for future backups. The council approved.

Under new business, the zoning ordinance under Bill #2025-04 had a first and second reading by title only to become an ordinance to change part of Eckhoff Addition from A 1 to R1. The bill passed unanimously.

Under the subject of camera systems, it was voted to install a security camera at the city's maintenance barn at a cost of \$4,930. Discussion was held about a possible system for the sewer plant but was tabled for a later time.

The Planning and Zoning Committee reported they had chosen Nicole Brown Garret as their secretary. Garret has made a rough draft for the comprehensive plans that will allow the public to follow along with all the plans.

The city clerk stated she had received several

Mayor Burdick shared that she has been trying to attend group meetings not only in town but around the county to keep abreast of what is happening in the area. The mayor also noted the Cole Camp Municipal Court is being moved to the Benton County Court and should be in place by April 1.

Council then adjourned to go into a closed session.

Part 2: Benton County Museum Brings Village Of Brandon Back To Life



Several people from the community worked to repair the store and get it back in business as it was a vital service to the entire area. Mr. Perry, a neighbor, was attempting to drive a nail into the ceiling but hit it at an angle which turned the nail into a flying projectile. Young Sam was hit in the left eye by the object and sustained a severe injury. It was decided he would require treatment in Kansas City so his grandfather stood on the tracks with a white cloth on a stick to flag down the next train.

Incidentally, the last merchant to operate the general store and gas station in Brandon was D.V. Ferguson, son of Sam Ferguson. He was the merchant there from 1935 to 1948 when he sold the building to W.H.Hall of Hall's Automotive Company in Windsor. Hall razed the structure and utilized the lumber for a building for storing used car parts.

In the glory days four passenger trains and several freight trains passed through Brandon daily. The last trains didn't stop but there were two locals going into Windsor and other places that would stop and give passenger service to County, receiving \$45.00 per month. The salary was good because the N. Fairfield district had a high assessment due to the fertile farm land.

Fortunately Mrs. Swisher, being an educated woman, recorded the history of the founding of the Brandon Methodist Church. According to her account, in January of 1916 a group of men and women met in the little northern Benton County community to build a Methodist Episcopal Church of Brandon. In the spring the men began digging the basement but they were farmers and the work went slowly as they were often busy with planting and harvesting. By the spring of 1918 the building was completed at the cost of \$5,000.00

The women did their part too rolling up their sleeves, they hosted ice cream socials and chicken dinners. The ladies became quite well known for their efforts and these events coupled with selling eggs, homemade bread, quilts and rugs raised the funds to purchase the furniture for the church. such as a piano, rugs, pews, pastor's bench, preacher's stand and communion table. They served food at many auctions and their records show they served more than 40 sale dinners between 1917 and 1928, with more than 20 dinners during the 1940's, 50's and 60's. Undaunted they moved on to adding window blinds, a stove for the Sunday School room and years later they went to work on the basement. Making a dining room and a kitchen with two electric cook stoves, sink, cabinets, running water and many other accoutrements, creating a house of worship to make its members proud. The stately original church

was struck by lightening in 1985 and burned to the ground. It has been replaced by another structure and services are still conducted. congregation, The frequently doesn't have their own Pastor and shares with the Windsor church. Most of the buildings in Brandon are now gone. No trains passing through anymore and no stock is shipped. Like so many country villages of the early 1900s, it lost its usefulness. Good farm roads, with modern trucks and cars lured the residents to larger shopping venues. Consolidated schools and the condensing of small farms into one large one has reduced the population in the old neighborhood. A poem by Jim Milks titled, Death of a Small Town, sadly describes Brandon's plight.

As mentioned previously the Posson School was about a mile from the town and was later named North Fairfield No. 19. Mattie Swisher, a doer and shaker in the little community, served as a teacher in the N. Fairfield in 1910. Brandon was where she would meet her future husband, Sam Swisher, who was one of the directors of the school.

Before she came to the Brandon Community she first taught at Yeager School in 1907-08 and was paid \$23.00 per month. She did her own janitor work, walking one and one-half miles to the school from where she was boarding. The next year she taught at Rocky Ridge in Cooney Creek and then came to N. Fairfield. There she was the highest paid teacher of a rural school in Benton A town dies in so many small ways,







I just used it a minute ago while looking at the calendar. We've got two days until Friday the 28th and then February 2025 will disappear into the "mists of eternity." Isn't that a fancy sentence? How about "gone forever into the dim. dark pages of eternity" or "dragged screaming into a dim, dismal cave of time?" Anyway, it won't be long until warmer weather and we hear the hum of lawn mowers around town.

Most of us probably don't enjoy preparing our taxes, but there's often a reward at the end — a tax refund. If you get a refund this year, how can you make the best use of it?

Of course, the answer depends somewhat on the size of your refund. Last year, the average tax refund was \$3,050, according to the Internal Revenue Service.

Whatever the size of your refund, though, you'll want to maximize its benefit. Here are a few suggestions:

• Contribute to your IRA. If you were to receive about \$3,000, it would go a long way toward funding your IRA for the year — but any amount would help. You still have until April 15, 2025, to contribute to your IRA for the 2024 tax year, but if you've already "maxed out" on it, you could use your refund for 2025. The annual contribution limit for a traditional and Roth IRA remains \$7,000, or \$8,000 if you're age 50 or older. And by getting an early start toward fully funding your IRA, you can reduce the pressure of having to come up with large amounts later in the year.

• Build an emergency fund. Your tax refund could help you start or expand an emergency fund. It's a good idea to keep up to six months' worth of living expenses in such a fund, with the money kept in a liquid, low-risk account, separate from the funds you use for your daily expenses. You might need to draw on this fund for unexpected expenses, such as a major home or car repair or a medical bill that's not fully covered by your health insurance. Without such an emergency fund in place, you might be forced to dip into your IRA or other retirement accounts to pay for these types of costs, and such a move could be expensive, resulting in taxes, penalties and lost opportunities for growth. • Contribute to a 529 plan. If you have children or grandchildren and you'd like to help them further their education someday, you might consider investing in a 529 education savings plan. With a 529 plan, earnings and withdrawals are federally tax free, provided the money is used for qualified education expenses. Based on where you live, your 529 plan may provide state tax benefits, too. (It is possible, though,

529 withdrawals that could affect financial aid packages, depending on who owns the account.) A 529 plan can be used to help pay for college, accredited trade school programs, some K-12 expenses and even to help repay some student loans.

• Pay down debts. Your tax refund may give you a chance to reduce your debt load. But which debts should you tackle first? You could follow the "snowball" method by paying off the smallest of your loans or debts as quickly as possible. Or you could choose the route by "avalanche" making minimum payments on all debts and using extra funds — such as your tax refund — to pay off the debts that carry the highest interest rates. Either method could help you save money in the long term.

It's not often that you receive a financial windfall such as a tax refund ----so think carefully about how you can maximize its benefits.

Starlings Take Over Large Lawn During Recent Winter Storm

all just We've come through a bitterly cold winter storm that added not only record breaking temperatures but lots of the fluffy white stuff too. With it came frozen water pipes, furnace failures, slick roads and cars that wouldn't start. We've all been there and it is miserable to say the least, but I am here to tell you I had a unique situation that I pray I never experience again.

Anyone that knows me is aware I love my backyard birds and I feed them mixed seeds, suet and black oiled sunflowers. This draws a large variety of feathered creatures and I keep an ear of molded corn on a special feeder just for the squirrels that reside in the edge of the woods above my house.

About the first day of the snow storm I arose one morning to hear strange bird songs outside my kitchen window that I was not familiar with. Looking out I saw hundreds of birds I had never seen before. They were dark birds with what appeared to be flecks of white and they had white beaks. I had no idea what they were but taking into account the large numbers, I guessed Starlings. After googling the situation I discovered they were definitely European Starlings.

I had only ever seen them when they do the massive groups swirling in the sky, not unlike a beautiful synchronized dance on the wind. That is scientifically called a Starling Murmuration. From a distance they are beautiful, up close I'm here to say they aren't even one generation away from being "poor white trash."

For about three days of hell I witnessed them bully the other birds and take over everything. They roosted on everything leaving a thick crust of feces on antique metal lawn chairs, all the bird feeders, the top of the stone retaining wall in my back yard and the Weber charcoal grill. The upper lawn is a solid mass of the mess and right now I'm doing a rain dance and praying fervently for God to give my home a long, heavy rain shower.



bird song it was quite pleasant. After three days of it I was nearly ready to commit murder. It is an unusual sound but they also have the uncommon ability to mimic other sounds like a barking dog, car alarms and a variety of sounds including the human voice. All this I learned by reading up on them attempting to discover a means of eradicating them. In case you're interested Youtube is filled with clips of Starlings imitating human speech.

During my research I discovered a man called Eugene Schieffelin brought 100 Starling to New York City in 1890. He released them in Central Park to honor they had been mentioned in Shakespeare's plays. At the time it was somewhat comical but considering how they have become such an overwhelming number not few are laughing now. I know I'm not!

Another interesting fact I gleaned from my reading was their beaks. Unlike most birds, a Starling's jaw muscles work backward. Instead of using most of their power to clamp their bills shut, the strength of the muscles are used to spring the bill open. They insert the closed bill between blades of grass in thick turf or other ground cover and then spring it open to expose hidden morsels. I had often seen large numbers for brief amounts of time on the lower lawn doing this in the Zoysia grass.

Because of their increasing numbers and their aggressive behavior they have few friends among humans. The reason they gather in mega flocks is for protection and finding food sources. Their fecal matter can cause health hazards. They have created problems at airports, endangering the planes and they are generally labeled "a nuisance."

There were a variety of scare devices and tactics but I finally decided to make sure there was no more food. I felt bad for my regular little visitors, the nuthatches, tufted titmice, cardinals and the large variety of woodpeckers but I knew it was the only way. With no more food they lingered a short time and then moved on to invade some other place not unlike a mass of unwelcome carpetbaggers. The feeders remained empty until I felt assured they were gone and they are now refilled and my little guys have come back to flit and fly and create great entertainment in peace and harmony once more.



There's not much happening at City Hall except snow removal and other weather-related and routine activities. I'll take this opportunity to update everyone on the status of the grant activity.

The Safe Streets For All (SS4A) grant is in the planning stages. The CFS Engineers from Springfield were chosen by the Board of Aldermen to write this. They have met with the Board of Aldermen and the Mayor for preliminary ideas and are now in the process of collaborating with the Department of Transportation and other agencies to collect the data needed to write the plan. The target date for completing the plan is May or June 2025. This grant will be used to update safety of our streets and sidewalks. The Land and Water Conservation grant application is still pending. All the criterion have been met and we are just waiting for their decision. This grant is a 50/50 matching grant to update the playground area and equipment in Butterfield Park. We have not been given a projected date for their decision

The TAP grants to update the curbing and sidewalks on North Maple Street are now in the execution stage. Work will begin in May and be completed by Labor Day so as not to interfere with the Cole Camp Fair in September. The work is being overseen by Great River Engineering Co.

Cole Camp **Board Hears** Presentation On Ag Program

The Cole Camp Board of Education held their regular monthly meeting on Thursday evening, February 20 due to the adverse weather conditions on Tuesday, February 18.

The agenda was approved along with the minutes, monthly bills, updated substitute list, the January financials and the mowing/ field service contract was approved.

There was no public comment so the meeting moved to Career Education. In discussion items, Mr. Bloss and Mr. Montemayor, along with four ag program alumni presented a program on the importance of career education in general and the many opportunities that are available through ag education. The two instructors lined out what possible course offerings

could be added with enlarged shop and classroom space. This proposal is part of the no-tax increase bond issue on the April general election ballot. In addition to ag education, Cole Camp has approved career education programs in Family and Consumer Science and Business and Information Technology.

Septagon's status report on Phase One of the building project was reviewed. The classroom elementary section is nearly ready for final inspection with the new multi-purpose coming along on schedule. Both additions remain on time and on budget.

In action items, the board approved the purchase of Balance HQ software as a budgeting tool for the district, bus ridership totals, the revised 2025-26 school calendar, (which will be emailed under separate cover) and overnight trip requests for FBLA and FCCLA.

The board also reviewed the school insurance proposed plans from OSBA (major medical and supplements) and approved those. The district will offer the same plans as last year with the district continuing to pay \$528 towards premiums. There have been a few changes to the medical plans as well as the supplemental offered by OSBA (vision, dental, etc.) Once the board gets final documents from OSBA they will share those. Open enrollment for next year will occur fairly soon with exact dates published once OSBA confirms.

Administrators presented their building reports, as did CTA. Calendar items approved were the March 3 PD day, School Board appreciation week (and month) March 3-7, with no school on March 21-24.

Following a closed session, all returning administrators were rehired, and Rileigh Grunden was employed as the 5th grade Science and Social Studies teacher for 2025-26.

The meeting adjourned at 9:40 PM. The March meeting will be on March 18 at 6:00 PM.
