

Some Clinton Businesses & Consumers Crack Amidst The High Price Of Eggs

The highly pathogenic avian influenza has recently depopulated more than 2.7 million birds in Missouri, reducing overall egg production according to www. bing.com. Nationwide the average cost of a dozen Grade A eggs was \$4.95 in January, a 15 percent increase from prices in December.

John French, manager of Price Cutter in Clinton said that the egg shortage is "horrible." He said they get their eggs at market price which is higher than other means.

The Clinton Senior Center uses eggs in its in-person dining and its home delivered meals. When asked about how high prices of eggs had affected the Center, Kathy Wilson, Senior Services Director, said "We have to eat ... " She said that the supplier they use charges \$150 to \$175 for 15 dozen eggs. Broken down to price per dozen is from \$10 to \$11.67.

The Ben Franklin Bistro in Clinton, Nikita Branscombe, said that egg prices have almost doubled in price. She said that her restaurant gets eggs from a vendor, but she is trying to use local options.

"I have only been with Ben Franklin Bistro for two years, but these are the

highest prices I have seen in restaurant in my total 20 years in the restaurant business," said Branscombe. "A lot of people have great advertising about their eggs, and we get them locally. We are skating by but haven't raised our prices.

The Dietz Family Buffet offers eggs to order on weekends. Management has seen all their foods go up and they are thinking about the possibility of stopping their eggs to order, but have not done so vet.

R&R BBQ said that they don't use eggs with barbeque but for their potato salad they order them already boiled and peeled and the price stays the same.

Chain restaurants such as Waffle House and Denny's have announced that some of their restaurants in the U.S. are adding a 50-cent surcharge to all egg items sold at their locations.

Clinton resident Cindy Tellman told the Democrat, "I love eggs and I but a'lot of them. I don't like the price increase, but I'm still buying them and look around for where I can get the best price."

The United States Department of Agriculture said that recouping egg supply losses could take longer than anticipated, and we can't begin fixing it the next day. It is really a six-to-nine-month process (according to Newsweek). www.usatoday.com reported on Feb. 18 that

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Make Room For Fido! Max Motors Gives Major Help To Animal Shelter

Petey has been in the Clinton Animal Shelter for 644 days, with no time off for good behavior. It's a long sentence for the white dog, but Petey is one of the lucky ones.

Clinton Animal The Shelter has been full for months, and not able to accept any more homeless dogs. The reason: the prevalence of pet discarding and puppy dumping. With no room at the shelter, Terri Williams and concerned volunteers spend hours every day on the phone, trying to find rescue options for homeless pets, but in turn get calls from all over the state from shelters that are similarly strapped.

Terri is a board member of CARE, Clinton Animal Rescue Endeavor, which runs the Clinton Animal Shelter. On March 8, Max Motors is teaming up with CARE to take the pressure off the shelter by finding Petey and his pals new homes.

The big draw: for Shelter

Adoption Day, adoption fees have been cut in half for dogs, to \$75, and reduced \$15 for a cat or kitten to \$50. The regular fees — \$150 for dogs, \$65 for cats — are actually cheap, Terri said, and do not start to cover the medical costs the shelter pays for rabies shots and other inoculations, spay/neuter procedures, and micro-chipping that are spent on each pet. In all, 38 dogs are currently housed in the shelter, plus seven are in outside kennels, not an ideal situation in cold weather.

"We are now over capacity," Terri said. "We actually should only be holding 25 in the shelter."

Another 40 dogs are in

foster care homes, adopted on a temporary basis. The board members are hoping the March 8 event at Max Motors will result in a lot of adoptions, she said, creating space to accept more dogs. If the volunteers can't find options for unwanted pets or unexpected litters, they have



to ask people to hold onto them. There is, literally, no room in the inn, she said.

CARE is part of a network of animal welfare groups that work to save the lives of cats and dogs, and has a no-kill policy. That means that once the shelter is full, there are no options for unwanted pets in the community.

So on March 8, Max Motors, 1500 Harrison Rd., will have pets on display both outside and inside the dealership from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Ida Jacaway at Max Motors is organizing the event for the dealership, which is a big supporter of the shelter and its mission. The staff have filled a truck bed with bags of pet food and treats, and added balloons to decorate the dealership for the event. They have also scheduled a food truck from Chick-fil-A for 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Max Motors has donated part of their air time on Fox4KC.com to advertise the event, and a news crew was visiting the dealership last Friday to meet Petey, Milly and other dogs up for adoption and the volunteers. The CARE board, shelter staff and volunteers are counting on the March 8 event to result in a lot of adoptions

CARE (Clinton Animal Rescue Endeavor) has held adoption events before. Terri said, but not on this scale. The shelter is also strapped for cash, she said.

"We need all the help we

she said, the result of pet owners who fail to have their pets spayed or neutered, then are "surprised" by litters of puppies they can't keep. What Terri and other volunteers hear from people who are discarding their pets:

"We're getting 'We're moving,' or 'We're pregnant," Terri said. "People are not taking their pets into consideration when making big decisions. It's hard on the pets when they are returned to the shelter." The shelter gets all sizes and kinds of dogs- small, medium-small and medium-large — with the small breeds being adopted fast, Terri said. The shelter even gets "doodles" - poodle crossbreeds —as a result of breeder dumps.

The cat numbers are good right now, Terri said, but spring is coming, which is 'cat season.' The shelter will work with people to get feral cats in their neighborhoods rounded up and spayed, Terri said.

The mission of CARE, part of the Best Friends network, is to promote adoption, prevent abuse, and educate the public on how to care for companion animals.

The weather forecast for Saturday is partly cloudy and warm, with temperatures in the 50s. Come out to Max Motors, on the east side of Hwy. 7 on Saturday, meet Petey, and help the shelter get its head above water by adopting or by making a donation. To get to Harrison Road from town, go out Price Lane and under the highway overpass, and turn right on Dzf Road.

turn left on Harrison Road. Max Motors was founded by Mark Muller in Butler. Mo., in 2006. It acquired Jim Raysik's dealership in 2023. Max Motors is owned by Mark Muller and Bob Jacaway, who joined the company in 2017. Max Motors awards a Future Agricultural Leaders Scholarship annually.








GETTING TO KNOW HIM EIGHTH IN THE SERIES INSIDE OUT, NOT OUTSIDE IN

In the conclusion of His Sermon on The Mount, Jesus mentions three matters Christians should practice privately---pray, give, and fast. (1) When you pray, go into your room, close the door, and pray to your Father unseen. (2) When you give, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your giving may be in secret. (3) When you fast, do it privately---not to be seen of men.

Those instructions are essentials of the Christian faith. Ideally, one should get himself right with God before acting in God's behalf. God works from the inside out---not the outside in. The religious people to whom Jesus ministered had for centuries sought God backward. They insisted the way to God was to keep the law. The beginning of the law consisted of the ten commandments.

In their zeal to keep the commandments, the religious leaders spelled them out meticulously. The Jews had a passion for definition. When the commandments instructed no work on the Sabbath, they felt compelled to define work and Sabbath. Consequently, there were multiple rules regarding labor and Sabbath. Over the years, definitions were developed for all the commandments. Later, definitions of the definitions were added. There was so much law one could not know or keep it all. To complicate the matter even more, religious leaders taught the way to God is by keeping the law. Jesus insisted that was backward, i.e., the cart is before the horse. One should first get to know God, develop a relationship with Him, and then you and He can work together to know and do what is right. This misunderstanding continues. 

Cow Herd

Management Tips

Even though calving is just getting started for many producers, breeding season for spring calving herds is in the not too distant future. Below are a few items to consider before breeding season arrives.

The first order of business is to schedule a breeding soundness exam for the bulls. If an issue with a bull is discovered, there is time to find a replacement during the upcoming bull sale season. Take time to review weaning weight records or other production records to determine areas needing genetic improvement and search for bulls that improve those areas.

Pay close attention to the body condition score (BCS) of the cow herd after calving. Science tells us that cows in adequate body condition (BCS of 5 or greater) are likely to breed and conceive earli-

ual cow herd helps ensure adequate feeding programs are in place to keep the herd at the target breeding BCS. Cow weight also directly impacts proper stocking rates which affect pasture productivity and persistence.

There are a lot of moving parts in having cows breed and calve in a timely manner. Hopefully some of these ideas will stimulate some thoughts for your cow herd management. with the topsoil blowing away. The land had always been the one stable thing when everything else was a big "roll of the dice."

The only way to explain the amounts of earth moved in a dust storm was made by Kansas State College. They said: "A 96 mile line of 1 1/2 ton trucks could be put to work hauling 10 loads apiece daily, it would take them a year to haul back to western Kansas the dirt that was blown over to the eastern half of the state.

If blowing topsoil, sweltering heat and zero prices weren't enough, Kansas was plagued by jack-rabbits. They could be compared to grasshoppers that had plagued the early settlers. The rabbits ate everything in their path, including the roots of plants. The few farmers who had minimal crops watched as rabbits demolished their last hopes for a livelihood. In early years rabbits had been a blessing, providing meat for the settlers.

The warm dry weather had eliminated the conditions that killed young rabbits. By 1935 it was estimated there were 8,000,000 rabbits in 30 western Kansas counties. The rabbits were eating what few crops had survived and depriving cattle of badly needed feed.

Drives to control rabbit population was organized and were often held on a Sunday afternoon. The size of a drive varied from one or two sections to massive efforts covering several square miles. One drive

By Glynna Elliott Morse On February 17, we celebrated Presidents Day, involved 10,000 people in an eight square mile area. They killed approximately 35,000 rabbits. People would line up every 20 feet along four sides of a square and make noise as they walked. A fenced area in the center was the object of the drive. The size of the enclosure varied. People closed in toward it, coming closer all the time. By the time they reached the enclosure, people were shoulder to shoulder which blocked the rabbits escape. The rabbits were then clubbed in the fenced enclosure.

People across the country were outraged and didn't have a clear concept of the destruction created by the rabbits. Farmers tried to ship live rabbits to eastern states but game and wildlife officials realized how jackrabbits destructive were and put a halt to the plan.

Despite the criticism cattlemen estimated that feed for 200,000 cattle had been saved by the drives. Rabbit drives were a means by which farmers could directly improve their economic conditions in the 1930's. This all sounds gruesome by today's standards but the drives offered an outlet for frustration and anger brought on by forces the farmers could not control. Drought and extreme temperatures were felt here in the Ozarks too but we escaped the dust storms. Here rabbits were a blessing not a problem, which taught us all, there was certainly a difference in hares.

residents were invited to these Washington Birthday programs. In 1917, the Pleasant Green School Washington birthday program was reported "a real treat for the 45 visitors present." [3]

Large as well as small rural schools observed Washington's Birthday. Windsor High School had assemblies for Washington's birthday in 1920s and continuing through the 1950s. Many students participated in these assemblies as indicated in a Feb. 1932 Washington Birthday assembly program which included a Salute to the Flag, Recitation of the Life of Washington, George Washington – Builder of the Nation, Washington the President, Quotations of George Washington, and musical entertainment.[3]

In 1954, the Future Farmers had chosen George Washington's birthday for the observance of National FFA Week. The newspaper reported, "Although generally recognized as a Revolutionary war general and our first President, Washington's first love was the farm he called Mt. Vernon. There he was first in the nation to practice contour planting, crop rotations, fertilization, and other soil conservation and improvement methods." [3]

Ladies used Washington Birthday themes for February social and patriotic celebrations. The Henry County Chapter DAR celebrated Washington's Birthday with teas in the 1920s. In later decades, the DAR chapter was celebrating Feb. 22 with contributed dinners. Other civic, church, and patriotic organizations recognized Washington's Birthday. For example, the Masonic Lodge had begun an annual Washington birthday oyster stew dinner in the 1940s.

Also, private parties, dinners, and luncheons celebrated George Washington's birthday. The Windsor Review stated on


with Presidents Day. [2] Historian Floyd C. Shoemaker stated that Missourians had celebrated Washington's birthday as early as 1817 when territorial governor William Clark toasted Washington's Feb. 22 birthday at a celebration of dignitaries at Washington Hall in St. Louis. Later birthday celebrations would include parades, speeches, and exhibitions such as a speech given in honor of Washington at the St. Louis Court House on Feb. 22,.1845 by the Hon. Uriel Wright.[3] Mention of Washington's Birthday began to be reported for school programs by the late 1800s. Also, some schools were closed for a Washington Birthday holiday. In the Palo Community News, the Feb. 18, 1898 Windsor Review stated, "Sunny Side School is preparing for an entertainment in honor of Washington's birthday." In 1906, the newspaper wrote, "The Berry School will close Thursday and it being Washington's birthday, recitations and dialogues appropriate for the occasion are being prepared and ... the teacher is devoting considerable time for practicing. "[3] Relatives and community

er in the breeding season. This translates into heavier weaning weights, and in the case of replacement heifers, females that are also more likely to breed early and ultimately be more productive in their lifetime. If you need supplementation after calving, be sure to start that soon enough so cows are in adequate body condition at breeding.

The impact of earlier calving dates is shown in data that my colleagues in NW Missouri collected a few years ago. At one location, steer calves born during the first 21 days of the spring 2020 calving season were 47 pounds heavier at weaning than their counterparts born during days 22 to 42 of the calving season. Recording birth dates of calves is one of the simplest and most useful pieces of information that can be collected.

If cows have calved early enough in the calving season and are in adequate BCS, producers may consider synchronizing cows for either AI or natural service. These tools can help bunch calves toward the beginning of the calving season so the benefits of early calving can be realized.

Another interesting aspect of the NW MO data is cow weight. A total of 485 head of cows were weighed for this project during 2020. The average weight of the cows was 1,229 pounds, but the weight breakout is as follows. Twenty-one percent weighed between 700 and 1,099 pounds. Sixty-four percent weighed between 1,100 and 1,399 pounds and 15% weighed between 1,400 and 1,799 Knowing the pounds. weight range in an individ-

Down here on the creek we ate a lot of fish and game, including rabbit. Feasting on rabbit was only in the winter and usually during a snowfall. I still recall my Dad closely examining the flesh as he skinned the game as if he was scrutinizing it for some disease. The meat was placed in the icy snow beneath a wash tub and the tub was weighted down with a rock to protect the kill from dogs or other predators.

The next day the hare's carcass would be bleached as white as the snow it was nestled in. The rabbit was then fried and served with cream gravy or marinated and prepared as hasenpfeffer. More than once I have heard dad say we were having "Hoover Pork" for supper. A term I didn't understand at the time but in later years learned it was lingo left from the "dirty thirties" and hard times in the great depression.


The great depression affected almost every American in one way or another and here in the Ozarks it was marked with inescapable heat and a parching drought. A dry heat that often prevented most garden plots from producing and thus left families facing a winter with no food preserved in the fruit cellar. No crops had been raised so there was no food to sustain the stock through the harsh winter months. It was reported that in the summer of 1936 some farmers on the Osage had witnessed their cattle actually consuming smart weeds along the river banks. Vegetation that had never been eaten by livestock before was now rav-

As strange as it may sound, live rabbits were actually a good "cash" crop in the Ozarks in those hard times. One example was Vol Brashears who started a lumber mill in Berryville, Arkansas in 1935. He began making wooden traps for children to catch cottontail rabbits. He would pay kids thirty-five cents per live rabbit and then he shipped the little critters to parts of the country bereft of rabbits. He received anywhere from one dollar to two dollars and fifty cents per head. Despite the fact that the children were only receiving thirty-five cents they were making more money catching rabbits than their parents earned at the lumber mill.

The rabbit exporting business brought in much needed money during the lean years and continued to thrive afterwards. Until their railroad went out they were the largest shipper in the United States of wild, live cottontail rabbits. A shot rabbit only brought ten cents as the real money was for the live rabbits.


But across the state line in Oklahoma and Kansas, the only good rabbit was a dead rabbit. It was the days of the dust bowl and the black blizzards of dirt that plagued Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas and Nebraska. Marginal land had been plowed during World War one when wheat was bringing two dollars per bushel and when the rains stopped the land lay bare, plundered and eroded. The residents of sturdy pioneer stock had experienced drought and crop failure before but they had never seen their land in danger ing to many people. For many decades, the United States observed February 22 as George Washington's birthday. It had become an official holiday in 1879, but it applied only to federal workers at the time. Many states declared Washington's birthday as a state holiday by the end of the 19th century.[1]

In 1968, the Uniform Monday Holiday Law moved a number of Federal holidays to Monday, going into effect in 1971, establishing the third Monday in February as the date in which Washington's Birthday would be celebrated. A proposal was made that the third Monday in February be called "Presidents Day," and some suggested that "Presidents Day" could honor both Washington and Lincoln or honor all presidents. Although the proposal was never signed into law, attempts to restore Washington's Birthday (and Lincoln's) have failed to pass. Presidents Day remains confusing today, including whether an apostrophe should be used



tion due George Washington. The Mount Veron organization has stated on its web site, "As a founding father, and our first President, his character and accomplishments should not be muddled into a holiday as a vague as 'Presidents' Day,' Let's officially bring back 'George Washington Day' on February 22!" It consists of three guiding principles: Zhen (Truthfulness), Shan (Compassion), and Ren (Forbearance), and includes gentle, meditative exercises, which can improve a person's physical, mental, and emotional health.
