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Thursday • March 20, 2025 175 Years! First United Methodist In Warsaw Marks Major Milestone

The First United Methodist Church of Warsaw will be celebrating their 175th Anniversary on March 30. From mission trips to food drives, disaster relief to youth ministries, FUMC has always believed in putting faith into action.

First UMC recorded history began with a land purchase in Warsaw on January 8, 1850. Christians affiliated with the Methodist Episcopal Church South organized the congregation on the new river village of Warsaw. They then bought a lot on Washington Street near the present Christian Church and built a small building. Services were held then intermittently due to the Civil War. Services were also held occasionally in union with the Presbyterian and Disciples of Christ churches until May 28, 1885, when an undivided half interest in the building was sold to the STL conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The two Methodist groups joined with a Presbyterian congregation and used the building jointly until 1895, when the Presbyterians constructed a church of their own on Warsaw's town square. The Presbyterian building was later purchased by the

Warsaw was founded in 1837 but not fully incorporated until 1843, making the church body one of the first and longest standing church organizations in the community.

On October 1914, the church's original site was sold and the Presbyterian structure on the square was purchased.

congregations worshipped together, preaching services held monthly and Sunday School on a weekly basis.

All three congregations merged to form one Methodist Episcopal body. In 1915, a basement was constructed beneath the church building. In Three 1918, a church station was

established and preaching services were held each Sunday. Rev. W.W. Garrett was the first full time minister. In 1938, a small room was constructed at the back and the right of the chancel as a study for the minister and the room beneath was the first modern rest rooms.

the church by Mrs, Maude Bagby Robbins were used for another addition on the left side of the chancel. This was used for kindergarten class and on the basement level a more modern kitchen.

City Of Warsaw Improves Benefits For Employees

the Warsaw City Council was called to order at 6:00 PM by Mayor Eddie Simons. City Alderpersons present included: James White, Eric Flores, Lou Breshears and Adam Howe. Alderman Rob Coskey was absent. City Clerk Jessica Kendall recorded meeting.

Upon approval of minutes and bills presented, the council passed a resolution authorizing the mayor to execute a contract by and between the Warsaw Police Department and the Benton County Commissioners CentralSquare Technologies to benefit all law enforcement agencies in Benton County to provide enhanced hardware and software capability to replace current vehicle dispatching/tracking system in the E-911 Dispatch Center. The City of Warsaw agrees to pay the Benton County Treasurer the City of Warsaw share of software integrations, core licensing and share of server purchase and installation. CentralSquare, LLC System should be fully activated mid-2025.

The council also passed an ordinance giving full-time employees in the City of Warsaw a total of 8 hours of sick leave per month, being **WARSAW Page 3**

Pizza Pockets

If Hot Pockets were a staple in your childhood this four-ingredient recipe will be right up your alley. A super-simple version with a few basic ingredients; starting with a tube of flaky crescent roll dough, and bakes up with just enough sauce and lots of gooey, melted mozzarella.

It can be as simple as a little pizza sauce and mozzarella cheese. I like a few slices of pepperoni, too. But that's far from the only option. You can use up leftover meat, bits and bobs of veggies hanging out in the fridge. Just be sure not to overstuff the pockets — it can cause them to split open or leak during baking.

-1 (8 ounce) tube refrigerated crescent rolls, such as Pillsbury

-1/4 cup pizza sauce, plus more for serving, if desired -1 cup shredded lowmoisture mozzarella cheese (about 4 ounces)

-8 pepperoni slices (about 1/2 ounce), optional

Arrange a rack in the middle of the oven and heat to 400°F. Line a rimmed baking sheet with

parchment paper.

Unroll 1 tube crescent roll dough on a work surface and separate into 4 rectangles (2 triangles each). Use your fingers to press on the seams in each rectangle to seal. Transfer to the prepared baking sheet. Spread 1 tablespoon pizza

sauce over half of each rectangle, leaving at least a 1/2-inch border around the edge. Top the sauce on each rectangle with 2 tablespoons cheese, followed by 2 slices pepperoni (if using), then another 2 tablespoons cheese. Brush a thin layer of water around the border of each rectangle. Fold the dough over the filling and tightly seal the edges with a fork. Pierce the top of the pocket several times with a

Bake until the tops are lightly browned and edges are crisp, 13 to 15 minutes. Let cool 5 minutes before serving.

Serve with additional pizza sauce for dipping, if desired.

(Continued from Page 1) to the church sanctuary. Heroic efforts account for the saving of a substantial part of the structure. Church services were held in the theatre until the sanctuary was rebuilt.

The rebuilt and newly decorated church was dedicated on May 12, 1951. "350 people heard Bishop Ivan Lee Holt at the dedication service on Sunday evening. Bishop Holt assisted by district superintendent E. Hartley and Pastor Wesley Hampton conducted the formal dedication. The building was presented by John Reser, chairman fo the building committee. In acceptance Bishop Holt said 'Construction of a new building is not the end, it is only the beginning.' Special music was under direction of Mrs. Maurine Hart." (Benton County Enterprise May 25, 1951.

In 1959, a growing membership indicated a need for more space and in April of that year with a bequest from the estate of Jim Rayn, an educational building fund was started. It was not until 1962 that the educational addition was completed on the west side of the building which provided eight classrooms, a pastor's study and expanded kitchen facilities.

In 1963, the first floor of the education building airconditioned, new communion rail was installed in memory of Mrs. Ella Keefer and the sanctuary was air conditioned.

In 1970, the old church was torn down and a new church was built with ground breaking on September 3, 1972.

Methodism has a long history prioritizing the teachings of John Wesley who set the example for the church in his teaching that prioritize service and emphasize doing good through social justice, giving, grace and loving God and neighbor.

FUMC Pastor Loren Whetsell serves as the president of the Benton County Youth coalition and oversees the annual Easter Egg Hunt as well as Fifth Quarter events during football season.

The Warsaw FUMC has supported both youth and adult mission trips beyond the local area. Most recently the IGNTE youth group completed a mission project at Show-Mne Christian Youth Home in LaMonte,

"Growing up in the Methodist Church I learned how important it is to have faith in God. I made so many friends along the way that I will treasure for life," said FUMC member Tracy Martin Spry.

For many years, FUMC has prioritized creating a safe and welcoming space for kids to grow in their faith. This included the preschool, after-school program IGNITE youth Vacation Bible group, and community School events like Truck or Treat and 5th Quarter and Out. Church members are also actively involved in the BCYC (Benton County Youth Coalition) program.

Jonna Arnett, who serves as the Warsaw R-IX Social Services Coordinator, commented on how the Warsaw FUMC aided in the school district. "Pastor Wetsell, United Methodist Church and BCYC have been incredibly generous to the students of Benton County and have made so many projects to benefit our students to meet the needs of students, or an opportunity to volunteer, the parishioners of United Methodist Church have jumped right in to help. I am forever grateful for their support and their amazing presence in our community," said Arnett.

The Warsaw FUMC has also sent groups to help with disaster relief efforts such as a group that traveled to Joplin to help with cleanup efforts after the devasting tornado. The church also participated in sending groups to Colorado in the wake of forest fires and Houston in the wake of a hurricane.

"First United Methodist Church raised me in said former the faith," Warsaw resident Leanne Thixton Donaldson. "They empowered me to use my gifts at a young age. Their investment in me led me to attend seminary and serve teens in the local church. I am who I am today because of the people of First Methodist. I recall First Methodist as a congregation who invested deeply in youth for the long haul. I have fond memories of adults who led Sunday School and youth choir, helped organize activities, and who simply paid attention to and took a consistent interest in young people. That investment in the next generation is simple but powerful for a community," said Donaldson.

Founded by First United Methodist Church members, the Soup and More Community Kitchen provides free meals to anyone in need every Thursday. All are welcome The Boy Scouts of America and the All Arounders 4-H Club both meet in the fellowship hall of the church each month.

"We appreciate having a safe place for our club to meet and provide our members with the opportunity to learn and grow," said 4-H project leader Gary Roberts.

Every summer, FUMC serves as a host site for the Salvation Army's free meal program.

Church members read to elementary school students once a month and provide each child with a free copy of the book.

FUMC serves as a host site for the Parents as Teachers program which is a part of the Warsaw R-IX School district.

"I guess the best part of growing up Methodist in Warsaw was the group of kids I became good friends with. I always enjoyed Mrs. Sander's 5th/6th class,"

said Dawn Elmore "Marty Tippin, Jason Sanders, Michael Kauffman, and sometimes Nicole Brunner attended. I have pictures from when we went to the beach. I also enjoyed Leslie Hill's high school class. Keith & Kelly Whitaker, Nicole Brunner, Richard Kreisel. I also participated in UMYF on Sun afternoons. We played a lot of volleyball. Becky Cobb was a constant at church. My mom taught the kids' choir. We walked from North School, once school was out, down the big hill, passed in front of the jail (which could be scary since the inmates tried to talk to us) and into the church. I sang solos and duets (with Michael) in front of the congregation. One year, UMYF took a trip to Colorado. That was memorable!! I have a picture of the group of us. My first memory of attending WUMC was of me cutting shapes out of the front of my dress in Mrs. Schroder's pre-K class. I believe that was my very first visit, and I would've been four. Mrs. Still was my Sunday School teacher, then Wallace, then Sanders, and finally, Hill. I remember VBS and playing Red Rover on the courthouse lawn. I had a lot of fun with all the Methodist youth, and to this day, I'm still friends with them. I think my interactions with the majority of the congregation helped to form the person I am today. I also loved the potluck. They spoiled me for the churches I attended in other areas as I moved around. Warsaw UMC also has the beautiful stained-glass window. No other church can compare."

The FUMC regularly hosts blood drives to support those in need.

The Church also operates a Blessings Box outside the church door so those in need can "take what you need, give what you can" basis. A dedicated team helps keep it stacked for anyone in need including those who are unhoused or struggling to make ends meet.

The church also takes a monthly food donation for local organizations as well as giving community assistance for gas vouchers, food assistance and limited help with utility bills. Anyone needing assistance or wanting to donate can contact the church office or give online.

Dr. Loren Whetsell has been the minister of the First United Methodist Church of Warsaw since 2016.

"The congregation welcomed me and my family, since my appointment in the summer of 2016. Over the years the congregation has provided me with opportunities to become much more involved in the community. They have encouraged me in my efforts to reach out beyond the church walls to the youth in the community through the Benton County Youth Coalition and through our early reading program with the Warsaw schools. They afforded me the time to serve as s substitute teacher during the COVID year, and were instrumental in my decision to serve on the Warsaw R-IX Board of Education.

"The congregation encouraged and supported me as I pursued my Doctorate in Ministry in Cambridge, England. This strengthened my call to ministry and opened up the possibility of fulfilling a long-time dream of serving the Lord in the UK.

"By serving First Church, I have learned much over the years about caring for older congregation and helping families during the difficult times of mourning the loss of loved ones. Perhaps this has been my greatest mission in Warsaw. It has allowed me many opportunities to offer hope to hurting families and offer the message that through Christ death does not have the last word," said Whetsell.

A special celebration will be held March 30 at 10:30 AM in the FUMC sanctuary to celebrate 175 years in Warsaw. Following the church service there will be a meal and celebration in the Fellowship Hall. Missouri Bishop Robert Farr will be preaching at the celebration. Everyone is invited.

a total of twelve days per year. Employees may now accumulate up to 90 days of sick leave instead of 60 days per year.

An ordinance was also passed to approve changing the benefits for covered city employees of the Missouri local government employee's retirement system (LAGERS). The fiscal officer of the City of Warsaw is authorized deduct from the wages or salaries of each employee member, employee contributions and to promptly remit such contributions to LAGERS along with the employer contribution.

The council then passed an ordinance adopting the Police Officer Bill of Rights. The city shall be required to follow the same for all disciplinary action taken by the Warsaw Police Department.

Warsaw City Council members also passed an ordinance to amend the 2024 estimated operating budget to actual adjusted ending balance for all funds within the City of Warsaw, Missouri.

The council also passed a resolution for the City of Warsaw to apply for federal financial assistance from the United States of America for the purpose for Warsaw water storage study. The city is seeking financial assistance acting through the United States Department of Agriculture, Rural Development.

City Administrator Randy Pogue notified the council of estimated completion and start dates on several ongoing projects throughout the city as well.

The meeting adjourned at 7:00 PM.

Meetings of the Warsaw City Council are typically held on the first and third Monday's of each month and are open to the public.

Commission **Accepts Bids** For Fuel And **Cold Mix**

Steve Daleske called the Benton County Commission meeting to order at 9:00 AM on March 10 in the Board Room of the Benton County Courthouse. Those present included District 1 Commissioner Larry Berry, District 2 Commissioner Scott Harms and David Malecki, guest.

Commissioner

made the motion to accept the bid for red diesel fuel for Road District #1 from MFA Oil Company at a cost of \$2.68 per gallon. Commissioner Harms seconded the motion. The motion passed. Other bids were received from Warsaw Oil Company at a cost of \$2.90 per gallon and from Zollicker Oil Company at a cost of \$2.85 per gallon. The Commissioners accepted the low bid price.

Commissioner Berry made the motion to accept the bid for unleaded gasoline for Road District #1 from Warsaw Oil Company at a cost of \$2.55 per gallon. Commissioner Harms seconded the motion. The motion passed. Other bids were received from Zollicker Oil Company at a cost of \$2.585 per gallon and from MFA Oil Company

at a cost of \$2.68 per gallon. The Commissioners accepted the lowest bid.

The Commissioners reviewed the bids received last week for cold mix asphalt. Commissioners Harms made the motion to accept the bid from Leo O'Laughlin at a cost of \$59,69 delivered to the Lincoln and Warsaw sheds. Commissioner Berry seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Benton County Economic Development Director Jo Ann Lane met with the Commissioners to present her monthly report of economic development efforts within the county.

County Treasurer Rick Renno presented his weekly financial report and County Clerk Susan Porterfield submitted bills for approval and payment.

County Collector David Brodersen presented his annual settlement report, noting receipts and distribution for the 2024 fiscal year. County Clerk Porterfield will verify his information as required by Statute.

Meeting adjourned at 12:00 PM.

Birthday Blessings To Host Donor Match Event

Birthday Blessings filled nearly 100 requests from Bates, Benton, Henry and St. Clair County foster kids in 2024. Focusing on providing needed resources to kids in care, the nonprofit will be holding an annual Birthday Bash Donor Match Event March 28-April 1. An anonymous business will match up to \$5,000 in donations during this event.

"Our Birthday Bash is a huge opportunity for people to double their impact in the lives of at-risk children," said Shannon VonAllmen. Executive Director the 501(c)3 organization. "The cost of operations is increasing, and grant funding opportunities are decreasing. This event will help us continue to meet needs in the foster community."

Birthday Last year Blessings filled more than 2,200 requests from kids in 30 Missouri counties. This included birthday party bags with gifts targeting physical and emotional needs, care packages for struggling teens, bedding sets, household goods, baby care items, graduation celebration bags and Easter baskets.

"Kids in care aren't used to people doing special things for them. Many have never owned new items or received a gift of any kind. When we send new bedding to promote healthy sleep, we are also letting children know we value their existence. When we send a birthday party bag with supplies to bake a cake, we are letting kids know we celebrate them. Our donors become part of that support



Cardinals Will Hang Banner After Taking Fourth Place Finish At Class 2 Final Four



A STORYBOOK SEASON came to an end for the Cardinals last week at the MSHSAA Class 2 Final Four. After making their first trip in 40 years to the season's-end event, Lincoln suffered losses to Eugene and Puxico to finish fourth in the state tournament. Nonetheless, their season ended with an impressive overall record of 23-6.



The dream of going to the MSHSAA Class 2 Final Four in Columbia, Missouri to play at Mizzou Arena came true for the Lincoln Cardinals boys basketball team last week. The town gave the team a superior sendoff and the players were able to enjoy the splendor and grandeur of playing in a huge arena in front of thousands of fans.

However, the game against powerhouse and eventual state champion Eugene in the semifinal matchup on Wednesday was a nightmare. The Eagles jumped out to an 8-0 lead,

led 22-6 after one and 37-13 at the half.

A slew of turnovers and 71 percent shooting from Eugene in the first half proved fatal for the Cardinals from Lincoln. Lincoln had lost to Eugene back on January 3 in Lincoln by a final score of 62-27 so they were well-aware of their formidable opponent. Coincidentally, the Eagles (28-4) defeated Canton 72-61 on Thursday to win the state championship in Class

Another slow start doomed the Cardinals. It was 25-5 at one point in the second quarter, but Lincoln made a run to get it to ten at 27-17. The Indians then ran the score to 31-17 at the halftime break.

In the third, Puxico led 48-24 before running away with the 61-38 victory. They ended their season at 28-4.

On a side note, the town of Puxico had a fire two weeks ago that devastated their main street area destroying four buildings. The team's success in the Final Four gave the community a sweet distraction from the tragedy. While Lincoln lost both





games, they will hang a banner soon.

Tyler Burke commented, "We had a couple of tough one's in Columbia against two really good teams. I was proud of our kids. We played hard. We didn't play our best, but when you're playing the state champion and another team of that caliber, it's tough. I think the guys enjoyed the experience and it's one they will certainly never forget. We deserved to make it to the Final Four. We won the games and beat the teams in

front of us to get there." He went on to say, "I'm happy for our boys, they got to play in Mizzou Arena, and at that, we got a chance to get all of our guys in to experience it. Our fan and community support was outstanding and it was cool to see so many friends and families up there. We had a great season and a great



turnaround going from 7 wins last year to the Final Four".

Coach Burke added, "Now we get to hang a banner with our kid's names on it that will hang on the wall forever and that's pretty be 40 more years until it happens again."

Tax Bond Issue The Cole Camp R-1 School District will be asking voters to approve a no tax increase bond measure at the April general election. When passed, this would allow the district to extend current bonding opportunities with no additional tax burden placed on patrons. It would generate approximately \$3.5 million in additional funds that could be used for capital improvements to district

According Superintendent Christina Hess, the District's Strategic Planning Committee worked last summer to establish capital project goals and the plan was approved by the Board of Education. "The Cole Camp R-1 Board of Education approved the potential Phase Two of the district's building project that would add facilities for industrial arts/shop classes as well as relocation of music programs, "said Hess. "The proposed new addition would be tucked into the area on the west side of the campus.," she continued. This approximate 8,700 square foot addition would only happen if the no tax increase bond issue is approved.

According to Hess, "The community has expressed a strong desire for our students to have access to more hands-on, career education type classes." She continued, "The proposed

shop and classroom space would be ample to house larger building and construction projects as well as the technical support classes that are needed to operate and maintain state of the art equipment."

Plans call for an 8,400 square foot shop and classroom space as well as remodeling funds.

"Moving music classes provide would more standardized space, increased, convenient storage and help mitigating the noise these programs generate," said Hess.

"The Board of Education is committed to supporting the District's mission of preparing our students to be successful at whatever they do, once they leave our hallways," said Hess. "Using no tax increase funds to build these facilities is a giant step to fulfilling that mission."

Other projects included in the no tax increase bond could include parking lot drainage and surfacing

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

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

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Once you and your spouse retire, you'll have some decisions to make decisions that could affect your quality of life in your retirement years. What are these choices?

Here a few of the most important ones:

• How much should you withdraw from your retirement accounts? By the time you retire, you may have contributed for decades to an IRA and a 401(k) or similar employersponsored retirement plan. If the lowerearning spouse claims Social Security before their full retirement age again, age 67 — their own retirement benefit and any potential spousal benefit will be reduced. (Spousal benefits are given to the lower-earning spouse if their full retirement benefit is less than half the other spouse's full retirement

benefit.) • Should you downsize? If you live in a big home and your children are grown, you may find it economical to downsize. Of course, this is also an emotional decision, but you may find that you can save money by moving into a smaller

• Where should you live? Some states are far more expensive to live in than

others. You'll want to weigh your decision carefully, considering the cost of housing, food, income and real estate taxes, transportation and health care in whatever state you choose.

• Have you finished your estate plans? If not, now is the time. 

Number Please!

It's somewhat amazing the bizarre thoughts one can have while performing repetitious chores. Just vesterday it occurred to me that my cousin Tootie (now passed) was an endangered species. She was the only surviving telephone operator that I had known. You know what I mean, the person that operated the switchboard at "Central" in every town.

Tootie, along with her Sister and her Mother, who was my maternal Aunt moved to Chamois, Mo in the 1950's to operate the local telephone office. My Aunt knew it was a temporary job when she took the position because United Telephone was beginning the conversion of every community to the Dial system. The job provided a miniscule living space along with the front office which housed the switchboard.

The telephone operator plugged the answering cord into the subscribers jack when they rang in and they would then say "number please". The cords came in pairs and the operator plugged the other cord into the called party's jack and then began the ringing Cousin Tootie explained the ringing switch could be pushed forward and backward. Pushing it the wrong direction would cause the ringing to go back into the ear of the caller. A somewhat unpleasant experience that could have gotten her a real tongue lashing but as she happily recalled: "Everyone was always nice to me because the residents of Chamois were very kind."

To make long distance calls the operator plugged into a trunk circuit which took it to another town. Long distance calls were not fast and it was estimated to take fifteen minutes to place a long distance call in 1918. Poor connections were the rule, not the exception, especially for rural customers out in the country. Poor connections was how Tootie met her husband Louis. Louis was in the army and was trying to call home to his parents who farmed outside of Chamois. Neither party could hear the other but Tootie could hear them both so when Louis talked, Tootie would relay his thoughts to his parents. She would then repeat back to Louis what they said. On Louis' very next trip home he stopped by the telephone office to thank that nice girl and the rest is history as

they say. The living conditions provided by the phone company at "Central" was anything but luxurious. It was not only small but they actually had to step out on the back porch to enter the bathroom. The job was 24/7 so who ever was in charge of the switchboard at night had to sleep on a roll-away bed next to the contraption. At night the ringer was set on an alarm so the operator would wake up and hear the call. Tootie remembered: "Luckily we didn't have many calls at night in those days, just a drunk ever now and again." On such occasions I'd bet Cousin Tootie longed to exercise the phone company motto of "Reach out and touch someone."

The telephone invented by Alexander Graham Bell in March of 1876 and he introduced it to the world at the Centennial Exhibition in Philadelphia that summer. An unknown



I decided to run for School Board to think bigger picture and so I could be a part of shaping the future of their education. As my kids have grown older and graduated, I have continued to enjoy helping guide our District in the pursuit of an excellent education for our students. I believe our school operates very well and I feel honored to have represented the patrons of the District for 18 years. It would be a privilege to remain sitting at the table and continuing to help the District excel.

Zach Lutjen: It has been shown that teachers make over 1,500 decisions in a day. As a former teacher, I know a lot of those decisions are made on the spot, in the moment. Being a voice for teachers, coming from someone who has spent over 13 years in a classroom is important for me. If our teachers are heard and feel understood and valued, then that will show in the classrooms. Students of course are our priority, but having teachers that feel safe, supported, and believed in, to me, is the biggest step, and first step, in the success of our students.

Pamela Eckhoff: I see a number of pediatric (school aged) children, teachers and administration in clinic and am very involved in this community. I also have children that attend the school and realize the importance that having a strong community and board behind its administration and teachers is to the success of our children.

What do you see as the board's role and responsibilities?

Doogs: The basic role of the Board is to establish policies for the District and to hire the best Admin team possible to carry out these policies. With strong leadership present, district will be in a position to hire, mentor, and develop quality staff. With that entire team in place, it enables us to maintain the top tier facility that Cole Camp has to

the school is doing that is great, and to check in on things that are concerning.

Eckhoff: I see the school boards roles and responsibilities in several different aspects. The board ultimately is responsible for insuring that district policies and procedures benefit and promote student education so that students are prepared academically to further their education after graduation or prepared to enter the work force as a productive member of society. Other responsibilities I see as the boards role are preparing for changes and setting goals in district academics for the district to achieve, advocating for teachers and leaders in the district, setting budgets for and strategically utilizing successful district

implementation of education district activities, monitoring progress of the implementation of educational goals set for the children of the district. I also believe that members of the boards should be responsible for being forward thinking about the future of the district, having a vision and goals for the district, having and maintaining good relationships with people in the district and community.

How would you handle the requests, if approached, of an individual? (Example: Someone asks you to consider a gifted program to *the curriculum.)*

Noteworthy changes are not something that happen overnight. Starting new programs takes significant planning to ensure they are done correctly and can be a viable addition to the

District. Lutjen: Of course this would depend upon the circumstance of the request, however in most instances, would recommend individual use the appropriate guidelines and process for submitting a request to the board. As a member of the board, you have to appreciate the appropriate resources that need to be utilized prior to send an issue to the board. For example, if a parent were having an issue with a classroom teacher or process, I would encourage them to first reach out to the teacher to resolve the issue. If they need further assistance, I would encourage them to reach out to the principal or proper administrator to resolve the issue at the appropriate level. Of course, if there were ongoing issues or if the issue was policy driven that required a change to be considered, I would have them come to a board meeting or submit the

proper request. Eckhoff: I would ask for as much information regarding the request, and encourage the community member to gather that information and bring it to the next board meeting, obviously it is something I would bring up as well, but hearing from the community member who has the desire, it will be best hearing it from them, and having a board would open up more knowledge, feedback and also give the opportunity to see if the request is a feasible one that will be beneficial to the majority of our students.

What is your vision for education in this community?

Doogs: To provide the best, overall, well-rounded education possible. To assist our students in the development of academic physical, intellectual and social skills to effectively navigate live. These skills build a solid foundation for them to be successful in whatever they choose to do after graduation, whether that be college, trade school, military or the work force. We cannot be solely focus on any specific area of the education world (sports, fine arts, college bound students, etc.). We must consider all facets available develop well-versed individuals to lead our community into the future. The Board must operate and make all decisions based on the question, "Is this what is best for the student of our District and is this necessary to provide a quality, wellrounded education?" believe curriculum and policies should be a local decision and not dictated by what is happening in larger metropolitan areas outside our District or state. Lutjen: Growing in a rivalry community, Cole Camp was always considered Elite, academically, athletically. All the way around. Students were involved, and community spirit always appeared very high. My vision is for CC to be in the top 3 school districts academically. For athletes to perform with dignity, and a high level of sportsmanship, to have a student section that is involved and proud, and to foster that school pride throughout the community.

Eckhoff: My goal for the education of this community is to provide resources and support for educators to have the tools to teach our children the necessary education to be successful throughout their lifetime after they graduate.

board members/ the board have a role in the day-to-day operation of the district? Can you/ should you support a board decision that you are not in favor of?

Doogs: The Board is responsible for setting the policies and framework that are used to operate on a daily basis, but should not be actively involved in the day-to-day activities. It is the Board's responsibility to put the best possible Admin team in place who will then hire the most qualified staff available. The Admin team and staff are the experts in educating our students and this should be respected by the Board. It must always be remembered, that unless authorized to act on behalf of the Board as a whole, board members do not have any individual authority to act as a school official. Their authority is only present when operating as a Board. The time and place for disagreement or discussion is at the Board table. Once a vote is taken and the decision is made, the Board, as a whole, needs to support that decision moving forward. If a vote passes or fails 7-0 or 4-3 or somewhere in between, once the vote is completed, the decision has been made, and the Board needs to support that as a unified group. If new information is presented, the issue can be reconsidered with the potential of another vote occurring. Openly arguing for or against an issue after the vote has been recorded will only bring division to the Board and ultimately to the District.

Lutien: Board members should not have a role in the day-to-day operation, we have hired the correct administration for that. We are there to help if they need

Eckhoff: I believe that the administration, teachers, and staff of the school have the biggest influence on day-to-day operation of the school. However, the school board should support them by providing guidelines/policies and structure to maximize their effectiveness.

What do you see as the current challenges facing our district? How should those challenges addressed?

Doogs: Today, one of the biggest challenges in all business sectors is finding the best qualified candidates and being competitive with salaries and benefits that will bring them to the team. Once we find the best candidates, we want to retain them. Both the Board and Admin should be willing to think outside the box when filling positions

and be flexible, to the extent possible. As a District, the salary schedules and benefits need to be routinely monitored and adjusted when able, to make sure we are playing competitive with area districts to retain quality staff. I also believe should regularly evaluate the educational and extracurricular offerings we have in our district to make sure we are providing current and applicable information to our students while serving the greatest number of student possible. Everything stated in this answer is depend on adequate funding being available, which is the underlying challenge to all

quality education. Lutjen: Our challenges are state and federal funding. Our job is to make sure that our funding is being utilized in the best way possible, and at the same time giving our student's new opportunities that they have not had in the past (more hands-on classes).
