When the school year ends, veteran Warsaw High School instructor Amy Spunaugle will walk out of her math classroom for the last time to pursue other interests.



# City Of Cole **Camp Hears Rally From School Board**

regular monthly meeting of the Cole Camp City Council was called to order at 7:00 PM on Thursday, March 20. Following the routine payment of bills, the council heard from Marty Doogs of the Cole R-1 School Board on behalf of the no tax increase bond issue on the April ballot.

Doogs reminded everyone of the importance of the passage of this issue to enable R-1 to add industrial arts to the curriculum. The school also wants to use the funding to do extensive parking lot replacements at the school entrance where the lot has deteriorated

Doogs explained the bond issue is like refinancing a loan, it extends the bond with no additional taxes. Doogs stated, "If you can do no tax bond issues, it prevents tax increases, it has no decrease or increase in the tax rate."

Next up, a representative from Mike Keith Insurance Agency walked the council through the workman comp insurance for the city. The premium for 2025 is \$25,220. Steve Knox made a motion that the city pay the premium in full and accept the coverage. Council approved.

Warsaw High School where she lettered in four sports: volleyball, basketball, softball and track. She played on the WHS girls' basketball team that placed









## **Benton County Half-Cent** Sales Tax Renewal

April 8, 2025 Election

On April 8, 2025, Benton County voters will go to the polls to decide whether to extend the existing onehalf of one percent Capital Improvement Sales Tax to finance road and bridge improvements as well as finance other capital improvement needs the County. The tax will also provide funds for the Special Road Districts of the County to do their own local improvements. The Capital Improvements Sales Tax was originally passed in 1990 with renewals in 1995, 2000, 2005, and 2010. In 2010, the renewal passed by 73%. The tax renewal in 2015 extended the collection period for 10 years instead of the 5 years that had been in place since 1990. The last election conducted on April 7, 2015, demonstrated that the County residents supported the tax with a 68% pass rate. Since this is a sales tax, all visitors to Benton County help generate revenue from this tax.

The Capital Improvement Sales Tax is essential to maintain roads, bridges, and other facilities in the County. Without this tax, the revenues of the County will not be able to meet the demands to maintain and improve the road system and obtain the equipment and facilities to provide the services expected by citizens. Benton County currently has 535 miles of road to maintain, of which approximately 116 miles are asphalt. The asphalt and gravel needed to maintain all County roads is funded heavily by the Capital Improvements Sales Tax. In addition to road maintenance, all bridges within the County must be maintained. Unfortunately, many of these bridges are so deteriorated, that some roads are closed until replacement bridges can be funded and constructed.

The one-half of one percent sales tax revenues are divided between Benton County and the Special Road Districts of Cole Camp, Ionia and Brandon based on the number of miles they maintain. Benton County allocates 60% of the revenue to maintenance of roads and the remaining 40% is allocated to the General Fund. This portion of the revenue is used to repair and make improvements to County facilities and provide equipment such as computers and vehicles for the Sheriff's Office to provide patrol of the rural areas of the County.

For the year ending 2024, the Capital Improvements Sales Tax funded \$302,000.00 for vehicles and equipment for the Sheriff's Office. The two Road Districts utilized \$991,000.00 for asphalt overlay material and gravel purchases. The three Special Road Districts received revenues totaling \$96,000.00.

The ability of Benton County to continue these projects and services is based heavily on the continuation of the one-half of one percent sales tax that is provided not only by the residents of the County, but also by the tourists that visit our County and travel our County roads. Tourism traffic contributes to the deterioration of our roads. This tax will spread the financial responsibility and lessen the burden on the taxpayers within the County. Since this referendum is for an extension, it will not be an increase over what is presently in place.

She will be so dearly missed," said WHS English/Journalism teacher Amanda Adler.

Spunaugle said that her students were what she would miss the most about teaching.

"Mrs. Spunaugle was one of the most caring and loving teachers I have ever had," said WHS senior Drake Murrell! "She always knows how and when to make school a little more fun and enjoyable."

The Spunaugles are the parents of three children: Allison, 28, an ER doctor in Columbia; Connor, 26, a business teacher, football and baseball coach in Lincoln; and Callie Jo, 22, a senior agriculture business major at Northwest Missouri State University.

They are also grandparents of two, Calvin and Josie. Spunaugle plans to spend more time with them.

"Cole has done a great job with the kids while Allison has been busy with residency, but now I am willing and able to take them to give him some free time," said Spunaugle.

The Spunaugles have been living in Versailles while Marc worked as the superintendent there, however, they are planning to move back to Warsaw after they both retire.

"Warsaw is home and this is central to all of our children," said Spunaugle. "I love this town and I couldn't imagine living anywhere else."

(Continued from Page 1) Salmons left a note on March 14 indicating he was going to Truman Lake for a couple of hours, but according to his sister, Stephanie Salmons, he did not return. She said in a Facebook post that his boat, backpack and boots were washed up on the lake's shore within three days but there was no initial sign of her brother. Then he was found dead 100 yards off the boat ramp in the cove.

The MSHP Troop A posted on March 19 that the Water Patrol and Dive Team members had been searching the Clear Creek Cove area since March 14. At the beginning of the search, the lake's temperature was 45 degrees in the morning. An investigation revealed that Salmons likely fell out of his kayak during high winds. He was not wearing a safety device and drowned due to the temperature of the water.

Many comments were made on Facebook Benton County Chatter sending prayers for Salmons' safety. One commenter reported that there were drones and helicopters involved in the search. After being unable to contact MSHP, the Benton County Enterprise talked to Benton County Sheriff Knox who said that

Patrol handled the search and the Sheriff's Office was not contacted.

On March 21, AP News also reported the death of a kayaker from Michigan and two other people missing after an outing on Stockton Lake in Southwestern The kayaks Missouri. apparently capsized in what was believed to be rough water.

(Continued from Page 1) purchase of the automatic sampler needed for the sewer plant. The Public Works Director reported on the various models and prices and noted what model he felt was more than adequate was \$5,443.50. Jeremiah Crider made a motion to purchase and David Locke made the 2nd. Council approved.

Street Commissioner Locke shared he had priced several pieces of very much needed equipment to replace some of the city's worn out tools. He had looked at generators, power washers, welders, etc. The entire group package was priced at \$8,380. Council approved the buy with the cost to be divided between streets, water and sewer.

A question from the audience was posed as to when the asphalt on the streets on the hill would be repaired or replaced. Public Works responded that they are currently using cameras on the sewer lines to assure everything is properly repaired and will guarantee new asphalt, once installed, will not have to be torn up. Mayor Burdick appointed Gayla Hickman to the Library Committee. Hickman had indicated she would be willing to serve on that committee and the mayor made the appointment.

& Planning Zoning reported that for now they would utilize the Benton County maps. After the Comprehensive Plan is completed, Cole Camp will then go back and create its own maps. Planning & Zoning stated that during their meetings they had decided property owners rights need to be considered when they make decisions.

City Clerk Dawn Paul introduced her new assistant, Jamie Davis who is now on board and working parttime. Paul reported the city's software is forcing them to the cloud which has caused Paul to software shop. She also reported that the conference she had attended in Columbia had been very helpful and instructive. She felt she was helped with the info about audits and budgets. Paul reminded everyone that the court is no longer in Cole Camp and the first court date in Warsaw is April 3. Paul will be taking everything to Warsaw on Monday, March 24.

In addition, Paul said the lift stations had been ordered for the sewer system and she had been told it would take 10 to 12 weeks for them to arrive. In the court case involving the accident on Fowler Street at the manhole, the city's insurance would not pay the claim, stating the city was not at fault. Paul concluded with a request from Robin Fitzpatrick for

the Scouts to be allowed to camp in the City Park. Council approved.

Police Chief Jeff Canfield announced he had hired one new officer and she will start on March 24. He has also interviewed a parttime officer who will not be available until May.

Mayor Burdick asked if the city would once more partner with the special road district and the school in applying dust control to the roadway along the practice fields at the schools. It was approved. The mayor announced that she will hold a meeting on April 2 to take a look at the budget. This is in addition to the regular April 17 meeting. Council approved.

With no further business, the council adjourned.

All meetings of the Cole Camp City Council are typically held on the third Thursday of each month and are always open to the public.

# Ladycats Take Fourth In Arkansas At **Ozarks Softball Classic Tournament**



OFF AND RUNNING, the Warsaw Ladycats got their 2025 softball season underway with a fourth place finish at the Ozarks Softball Classic Tournament in Harrison, Arkansas over the weekend. After falling in a close one to the nationally reknown Bentonville Lady Tigers in the opening round, Warsaw cruised through the back side of the bracket to go 2-1.



Ladycats senior pitcher Brylee Brewster struck out 11 batters but Warsaw couldn't get the bat on Bentonville pitcher Darby Burnett who earned the 4-0 win for the Tigers in the opening round of the Ozarks Classic Softball Tournament in Harrison, Arkansas on Friday night.

Burnett, a Texas A&M commit, was nearly flawless as she went all 5 innings, facing 16 batters while striking out 14 Ladycats. Brewster mustered the only hit for Warsaw with a single in the second inning.

In the loss, Brewster, who signed with Missouri State back in the fall, surrendered 4 runs on just 4 hits while striking out the aforementioned 11.

On Saturday morning, the Ladycats rebounded with a 9-1 win over South Side (AR).

Brewster fanned 10 batters and allowed 0 hits and 1 run over 4 innings of work in

game at 1-1, the Ladycats reclaimed a 5-1 lead in the third on RBI's picked up by Brewster, Miskell and Hailey Ferguson.

Warsaw tacked on 4 more runs in the fourth for the 9-1

Your Social Security benefits can be an important part of your retirement income — but when should you start collecting them? It's a big decision, so you'll want to consider your options carefully.

Essentially, you'll need to decide whether you're going to take your benefits as early as possible — age 62 — or if you should wait until your "full retirement age" or even longer. If you begin accepting benefits at 62, they'll be about 30% lower than if you waited until your full retirement age, which is 67 if you were born in 1960 or later. And if you wait until 70, your benefits will be about 24% higher than at your full retirement age.

In deciding when to claim benefits, you'll want to weigh these factors:

• *Income needs* — If you need the money to help meet your daily cost of living, then you may not feel you have much of a choice about when to take Social Security. However, if you have sufficient income from other sources, such as your 401(k) or other retirement accounts, you may be able to delay taking benefits until they're much larger.

• *Employment* — If you're still working and you haven't reached your full retirement age yet, it might be a good idea to wait before claiming Social Security because your benefits will be reduced by \$1 for every \$2 earned above \$23,400. In the year in which you reach your full retirement age, your benefits will be reduced by \$1 for every \$3 earned above \$62,160. (But once you reach your full retirement age, Social Security will adjust your payments to credit you for the months during which your benefits were lowered because of your income.)

• Life expectancy — None of us can say for certain how long we'll live — but you may have some hints. For example, if you have a family history of longevity, and you're in good health, you might decide it makes sense to delay taking Social Security until your full retirement age, or even later, as you could potentially have more years of receiving larger checks.

• Spouse — If you're married, decisions about when to claim benefits could affect you or your spouse. The spouse with lower Social Security payments may be eligible to receive spousal benefits, which, when combined with their own benefits, can reach up to 50% of the higherbenefit spouse's payment at their full retirement age.

To qualify, the lower-benefit spouse's benefit at their full retirement age must be less than half of the other spouse's full-retirement-age benefit. But if the lowerbenefit spouse claims their benefits before their full retirement age, their own retirement benefit and the spousal benefit will be reduced. Also, the lowerbenefit spouse reaches their maximum benefit amount at their full retirement age — they won't receive additional benefits even if they or the higher-benefit spouse delays taking benefits past their respective full retirement ages.

One other point to keep in mind: If the higher-benefit spouse claims early, the survivor benefit to the other spouse is reduced, but if the higher-benefit spouse delays their benefit beyond their full retirement age, the survivor benefit is increased. By making the appropriate choices, you can help maximize your Social Security benefits — and possibly enjoy a more comfortable retirement.





# **Focus Group Mulls Theatre** Ideas, More

Benton County's Focus group met in Lincoln at Foster Hall on Wednesday, March 19 at 5:00 PM. The group has been working all winter on various initiatives increasing tourism dollars. One idea brought to the

floor was live theatre. Comparisons were made between the Lyceum at Arrow Rock and the Royal Theatre in Versailles. When considering a project like the Lyceum, it was up front that the group would have to research sustainability of such a production. It was noted that an Executive Director position would cost \$80,000-\$90,000 per year and support staff might cost an additional \$40,000 annually. A theatre would have to charge \$30-\$40 per ticket and volunteers would be a must. Also, the group would need to check the possibility of grants for hiring, etc.

The Royal Theatre concept was more realistic in they do 9 shows per year with the biggest production during the Apple Festival each fall. They charge \$10 per ticket and have a lot of community involvement and local acting talent. They have one fulltime employee to oversee their small facility that seats 150 guests. They also do talent contests, local country bands, comedy, improv and

sell concessions. Both of these venues were also compared to the Liberty Center in Sedalia that also has exhibitors and an art gallery for visitors. It was pointed out that the county only has a total population of 20,885 but the need to know an approximate seasonal

population is imperative. During the evening, four ideas were tossed about. Number one is the need for a conference center/hotel that would be able to provide adequate space for hosting meetings and gatherings. a message to all three. It Again, the need for seasonal population data (on and off season) would be important. Start up costs would depend on whether it's new construction or renovating an existing building.

> Any project would need investors, and a developer in Bolivar was mentioned. Someone possibly needs to speak with him. Another idea was to check on the possible expansion of already existing hotel options. Cobblestone Hotels was mentioned and it was decided to see what they would require to build in Benton County and need to check availability of land for building.

Idea number two centered

around family recreation. Under that heading, it was mentioned that possibly already existing businesses could expand and offer more; bumper cars and arcade games would be great, but concern was voiced of that being a seasonal option. Honey Creek near Iowa and Wolf Creek Lodge were both mentioned but that would require investors in such a project.

Number three was the idea of live theatre and number four was family themed dining experiences. Once again, the challenge is population data, seasonal population data, etc. It was suggested that the group could use the data for areas the corps land manages. Population numbers would be needed for investment opportunities.

The focus group meets monthly in Lincoln's Foster Hall and all input is needed. Presently, small groups are working on gathering data needed to move forward with any of these projects. When the next meeting is scheduled, please consider attending and help our county build on the tourism dollars that support so much locally. Presently, no meeting is set but a post will be made when available.





then J.P. Morgan Chase). Beck is the mother of two girls Kenyan, an eighth grader, and Pailyn, a seventh grader at John Boise Middle School.

Since returning to the Warsaw area, Beck has coached basketball, volleyball and track for the R-9 District.

Beck's reason for running the Warsaw Board of Education is to help the district reach its full potential.

"I want to give back to the school district that I grew up in," said Beck. "The board needs to understand the struggles of the district and set policies accordingly and support the administration and staff of the district."

As a current Board member, Beck wants to see the construction projects at the middle school and high school completed.

Marsha Bergman is also running for a position on the Warsaw R-IX School Board. Bergman has lived in Warsaw for 4 years. She and her husband Mike owned a lake house in the area and when COVID hit, they decided move from the Kansas City area and live in Warsaw full time.

Bergman is a mortgage loan processor and since she and her husband own two businesses in the area, she decided she wanted to become more involved in the community.

# WARSAW FIRST CHURCH OF THE NAZARENE

Good morning from First Church of the Nazarene! Quick question to start this discussion. How much of God do you want? Just enough to get you into heaven and out of trouble, or just enough to receive His blessings, and to keep Him out of your business (choices)? News flash! Our Heavenly Father wants all of you... that is 300% (new math). Let me share an example of how God has woven a message in the scripture for us to glean from concerning healthy relationships, and requires the same amount commitment. How can 300% be when there are only two people in a marriage? This is where our understanding of what actually makes a marriage rich and full is simply wrong. A strong wonderful blessed filled marriage requires each person to give 100% while God is

giving 100%. Without God, a marriage is just a friendly legal agreement between two people to share what they gain in this world. The sad part is this is how we build our relationship with God because we operate under the law instead of under the new covenant of His love. I hope you can see there is more to a covenant than giving 50%. How well did you know your spouse before you were married? How well did you know God before you were saved? Maybe you have not asked our Lord to fill your heart with His presences, if not, this lesson still applies. We ask our spouse when we say "I" to fill our life with their presences (hopefully under God's' watchful eyes). Think of any Hollywood, music, or sports star. How well do you know them? We know 'of' them, but there are few people in this world that really know them because of all the public relations that cover up the real person. This cover up often occurs in a marriage and in Church. When we are first married, we know of our spouse as we hope and pray to really get know them. Getting to know God is a similar process. Have you ever finished your spouse's thoughts, knew what they were thinking before they spoke, or felt their joy or sadness without sharing a word? This is what it means to be in another's presence! God is calling us to be in His presences daily, minute by minute, second by second

without pausing. When we fail to seek to know each other after we are married, marriage falls apart or they become a marriage of convenience. I am sure many people do not enter marriage with that as a goal, but it does occur. Relationships require giving to each other and the same can be said of walking with Jesus. This is why we must meditate. Meditation is one of the inward spiritual disciplines that will enable us to go deeper and deeper in the holy relationship with Jesus and in turn allow us to commune with the Father. Many believers know 'of' God by reading scripture, attending church, and watching the Chosen. However, they do not know Him. When we pray 'let your will be done' over someone else or in my life, we should know what God's will is and speak His will with love and grace. I can tell you that this type of relationship takes time and the willingness to put aside the world's distractions to really go deep. Meditation

opens the door to heavenly treasures. Jesus went into the desert for 40 days to get away from the crowds. noise, and the hurry of living as a man. Why? He went to meditate. This is not the only time in the New Testament that Jesus required rest in the Father's arms. What do you do to rest in Heavenly Father's arms?

There are many elements to consider when meditating. We can focus on scripture, circumstances of the day. being in His creation, and re-collection (centering down). I want to make clear that meditating on scripture is not exegesis but a meditation on the word given to us in love. Dietrich Bonhoeffer said, "...just as you do not analyze the words of someone you love, but accept them as they are said to you, accept the Word of Scripture and ponder it in your heart, as Mary did. That is all. That is meditation." Paul discovered God's love in the creation while on mission trips and among other believers. You can also find significance in your circumstances such as the birth of a

child, marriage,

lives lived by the saints by

discovering the meaning assigned by our Lord in every circumstance. The last means of meditation to expound on is centering down. This means of meditation is seldom know or spoken in society today but it involves spending time in silence to allow our minds to become centered on God instead of broken off in multiple directions by the world's noise. These are four paths to a deeper walk with the Father. Warning, warning! Meditation is a risky business... spending time with God will bring about change in you that you can't even imagine. Consider Psalms 119:97 "How I love Your Law! It is my meditation all the day."; Psalm 101:1-4, "I will sing of mercy and justice; To You, Lord, I will sing praises. 2 I will carefully attend to the blameless way. When will You come to me? I will walk within my house in the integrity of my heart. 3 I will set no worthless thing before my eyes; I hate the work of those who fall away; It shall not cling to me. 4 A perverse heart shall leave me, I will know no

Are you ready to hear the voice of God echo in your heart calling you into a place many never reach? Yes, we are talking about change. Consider the words found in Ephesians 4:21-24, "... if indeed you have heard Him and have been taught in Him, just as truth is in Jesus, 22 that, in reference to your former way of life, you are to rid yourselves of the old self, which is being corrupted in accordance with the lusts of deceit, 23 and that you are to be renewed in the spirit of your minds, 24 and to put on the new self, which in the likeness

Speak Louder Than Words 20:17-38

The farther I go, I realize preachers have nothing to say. I used to add on to that by saying "apart from the Word of God."

The Bible has absolute authority over popes and preachers and Sunday school teachers. Let the Bible speak and not man.


## LINCOLN **FIRST BAPTIST** CHURCH
