The Race Is On! Benton County Voters Set To Decide Multiple Municipal Races

All three communities in the Benton County; Lincoln, Cole Camp and Warsaw have candidates seeking seats on their respective city councils.

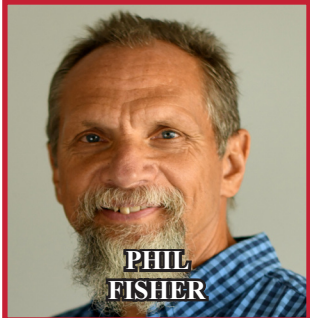
In Lincoln, incumbents Phil Fisher and Barbara Hammond have re-filed, running for another term. Fisher is running unopposed for his west ward seat but Barbara Hammond is being challenged for her east ward seat by Trey Brown.

Each candidate in all three communities was asked why they wished to run for office. The first question posed to each was, "What motivates you to want to serve on the City Council?"

Fisher, a man of few words, replied, "I appreciate the quality of life that can be had in Lincoln and wish to continue to serve the community through this service."

Hammond said, "I am running for the east side seat on the council because I was asked to fill out a term which I was not sure what that would entail. The other aldermen and Mayor Nelson helped me to understand what we need. Lincoln has been my family's home for 45 years, so the future of Lincoln is important to me."

Newcomer Trey Brown explained, "I would say what motivates me is my

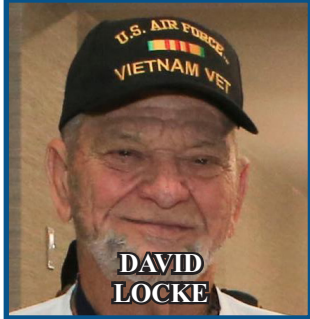

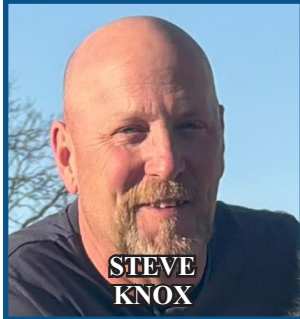

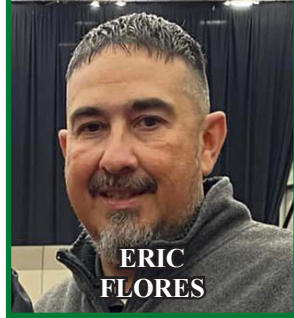

Murrell & Deckard Make WHS History With Military Academy Appointments

Warsaw High School seniors Drake Murrell and Jaxson Deckard were honored with a school assembly on March 26 as they were presented with their appointments to the United States Naval Academy and the United States Air Force Academy.

Naval Information Officer Lee Gilgour presented Murrell with his appointment.

"An appointment to the United States Naval Academy is equivalent to a full four-year scholarship including all tuition, room and board, medical and dental benefits, and a monthly midshipman stipend," said Gilgour. "After completing the four-

year curriculum at the Naval Academy, students receive a Bachelor of Science degree in one of 26 majors and earn a commission as an officer in either the United States Navy or Marine Corps."

Gilgour explained that Murrell was one of about 15,200 students from throughout the nation who applied for one of approximately 1,175 seats for the Naval Academy's

Class of 2029. The admissions process is unique and requires each student to apply for and receive a nomination, clear a medical exam, and successfully pass

Screening is thorough, with a focus on well-rounded individuals who have outstanding academic credentials, demonstrated leadership potential, and a willingness to serve in the United States Navy or Marine Corps.



DRAKE MURRELL

While maintaining a 4.0 GPA, Murrell, the son of Tim and Cindy Murrell, was also very active in athletics while he has attended WHS. Murrell was selected as a Missouri All-State First team Linebacker in 2024 and All-State Third team Linebacker in 2023. Murrell was awarded the Wildcat Most Valuable Player in 2023 and 2024; Football Scout Team Player of the Year, 2021; OHC Football All-Conference First team, Tight End; 2024; OHC Football All-Conference First team Linebacker; 2023, 2024; OHC Football All-Conference Second team Tight End, 2023; MFCA All-District First team Linebacker, 2023, 2024; KMZU Football Dream Team, 2023, 2024; Central Missouri Media All-District First team Linebacker, 2024; Central Missouri Media All-District First team Tight End, 2024; Central Missouri Media All-District Second team Linebacker, 2023; Ozarks Sports Zone Football “Top 40”, 2024; Football Academic All-State, 2022, 2023, 2024. Murrell lettered in football all four years of high school.

“Drake is a student-athlete who does things right at a high level on and off the field,” said WHS football coach Ryan Boyer. “He has worked extremely hard to receive this opportunity. I can’t wait to see what he will accomplish in the future.”

Murrell also lettered in wrestling. He was the OHC Wrestling Conference Champion in 2023, 2024, and 2025.

He served as the captain of the WHS Wrestling Cats and placed fourth at the Missouri State Wrestling Championships in 2025.

Murrell also lettered in archery, baseball and track.

In addition to his many accomplishments in athletics, Murrell was also active in various clubs such as National Honor Society where he is currently serving as the president; Future Business Leaders of America; Fellowship of Christian Athletes; Future Farmers of America; Math Club where he is serving as secretary; Pep Club; Student Council and Faith Lutheran youth group where he is currently serving as president.

“Being a part of a small school has given me the opportunities to be involved in many activities,” said Murrell. “Warsaw is a tight knit community and has given me that ‘Never give up’ attitude’.”

Murrell will report to the United States Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland, on June 26. His parents will accompany him, but after they drop him off they will not have contact with him for seven weeks.

“I appreciate all my parents have done to help me on this journey,” said Murrell.

“They questioned my commitment but when they knew I was very serious, they became my strongest supporters.”

“I will have to give up my phone for those seven weeks, but I am looking forward to that time since I will be adjusting to the rigors of training as well as getting to know my fellow cadets,” said Murrell.

The first year will be general education classes but Murrell plans to major in either aerospace and marine engineering.

While Murrell must serve five years in the military, he has plans to make the Navy or the Marines his career.

“I am very grateful to have this opportunity to serve my country,” said Murrell. “I want to thank the Warsaw community as well as my teachers and family for preparing me for this important step in my future. I am grateful that God has set me on this path.”

Lieutenant Colonel Robert Bryant, United States Air Force Admissions Liaison Officer presented Jaxson Deckard with an appointment to the United States Air Force Academy, Class of 2029.

“Less than thirteen hundred applicants are accepted into the United States Air Force Academy each year out of more than ten thousand qualified applicants,” said Bryant. “This prestigious appointment equates to more than six hundred thousand dollars and is the equivalent to a four-year, full-ride scholarship at a top ranked university in the nation.”



JAXSON DECKARD

Deckard, the son of Shannon and Jared Deckard, has dreamed of a career in the military since he was six years old.

“My family went on vacation in Colorado several times, but the trip I remember most vividly was when I was six and we toured the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs,” said Deckard. “My parents have encouraged me on my journey to this appointment. I know I will miss them, but they are my strongest supporters.”

Deckard and Murrell encouraged each other to pursue their dreams and even attended a summer academy together to learn more about the different military academies.

“We both took many of the same classes as we prepared for the process of being accepted into the academies,” said Deckard. “Higher level math and science helped us through this process.”

Deckard gave math teacher Mrs. Amy Spunaugle credit for pushing him not only in math but also socially.

“Mrs. Spunaugle pushed me outside my comfort zone my freshman year as I was rather shy,” said Deckard. “She helped me to develop leadership and to be able to talk to everyone.”

Mrs. Spunaugle was the math teacher for both Deckard and Murrell.

“I am very proud of these young men. You don’t come across students of their caliber and with the desire to serve too often,” said Spunaugle. “To have two students in one class qualify and continue their education with the military academies is amazing! Jaxson and Drake are top notch role models in all aspects of life.”

Deckard has been active in sports all four years of high school as he served as the varsity Cross Country team Captain, lettered all four years and was a state qualifier in 2024.

He also competed on the varsity Track team all four years of high school as well as competing on the Warsaw Wildcat Mountain Biking team.

In addition to sports, Deckard served as the President of the Warsaw High School Student Council, lettered in Math Club all four years and is currently serving as president, participated in the Future Business Leaders of America, All-District for organizational leaders and State competitor for Organizational Leadership, Deckard was also a member of the Madrigal Singers where he was awarded Newcomer of the Year, Gold Ratings, All-District and State Silver Rating.

Deckard also participated in Fellowship of Christian Athletes and the Warsaw Assembly of God Youth group, youth band and Vacation Bible School.

“As President of WHS Student Council, Jaxson has been a great example of character. The Air Force Academy is very lucky to have him and I can’t wait to see what he does in his future,” said Student Council sponsor Bobbie Swisher.

WHS English teacher Amanda Adler was impressed by the dedication and hard work both young men displayed in the classroom and community.

“Jaxson and Drake are both shining examples of what young people can accomplish with hard work and sacrifice. Neither one of them was handed this accomplishment. They worked hard for years and years in the classroom and in their community. They set their sights on a lofty goal, one that many told them was impossible. They supported each other and didn’t back down from a challenge. They have taken advantage of the opportunities provided in our school and community to train their minds and bodies for the next challenge.

I could not be more proud to be even a small part of their journey. Good luck, Drake and Jaxson. Keep setting those goals high because nothing is out of reach,” said Adler.

Deckard will report to the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colorado on June 25 and will not be in contact with his family or friends until July 25.

“I will miss my family and friends, but I am ready for this next step in my career,” said Deckard.

During his first year, Deckard will select a major which he thinks will be mechanical engineering. His first year will be general education and he can change his major his second year.

“I want to thank my school and community for their support and I am glad to give back to my country using my God given talents,” said Deckard.

Deckard and Murrell both said they would miss WHS and their friends.

“I will miss the atmosphere of WHS and hanging out with my friends, but this is a wonderful opportunity for me to give back to my country,” said Deckard. Murrell agreed.

“I will miss the brotherhood that I shared with my teammates, but I am ready to move on to serve my country,” he said.

Both Deckard and Murrell will graduate from WHS with the Warsaw High School Class of 2025 on May 22 at 7:00 PM on Randy Morrow Field.

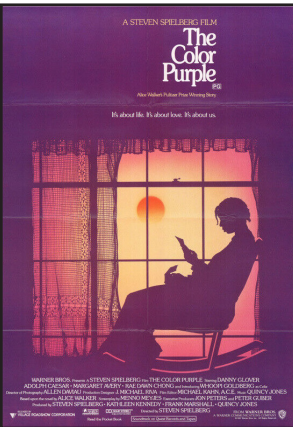

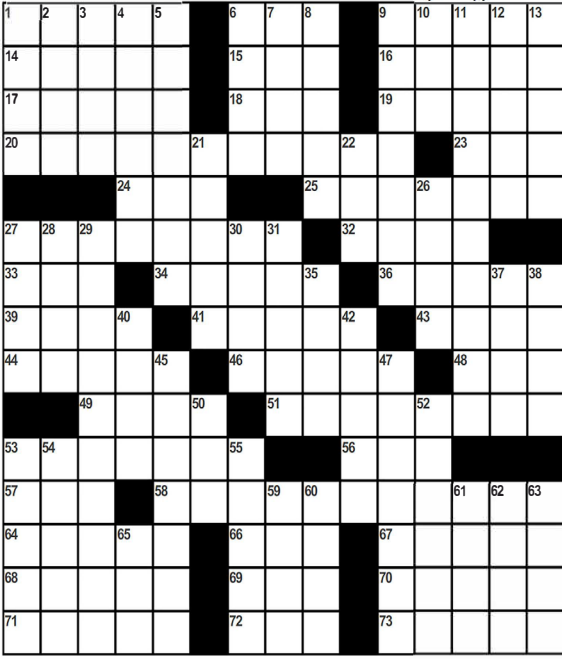

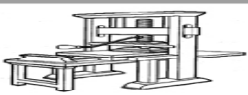

Riding Shank's Mare

Mother and Dad lived at Edmonson, Mo in their first years of marriage and their most frequent touch with civilization was the little country store at the crossroads. There they bought supplies and received their mail. They had no money as times were hard in the thirties; but they had good times with their neighbors and high hopes that the future would get better. Hard work and walking many miles were just part of life. It was about a mile and a half to the Edmonson store which was no walk at all. The real challenge came when they needed to make a trip to Cole Camp or the county seat at Warsaw. It was about a thirty mile round trip if you stayed to the roads. It was a common accepted practice in those days to climb the fence and “cut across” the neighbor’s fields and cow pastures. They were careful not to “ride down” the fence. The use of a path could save a mile or more in comparison to the same destination by the road. It seems strange today but they never encountered “no trespassing” signs or fence posts slathered with purple paint.

Somehow the fine art of walking came natural to my Father as he came from a family of people that walked long miles to school, to church, to the woods to hack ties and miles of walking as they coon hunted at night. They had wonderful little foot-paths that wound thru the woods between them and their neighbors. The paths wound around rocks, logs, over fences and across the creek that was either forded by stepping on a succession of rocks or a foot log that spanned from bank to bank. His cousin’s family operated a small store on Minnow Branch and in order to keep the soda pop cold it was kept in a spring across the branch. The boys of the family took turns running to the spring to bring back the customer’s soda pop.

Early on in life my Father taught me how to rest when walking up hill. The proper half squatting position on the upper side of a tree comes close to being like an easy chair. A fact that was good to know on the cattle hunting forays in the rough Ozark hillside pastures. After school I’d pause for some type of snack from the back of the stove and then carefully listen for the tinkling of a cow bell to give me some clue as to the route the herd had taken that day. Some days the trek was short and other times I had misjudged the direction and had to retrace my steps and add miles of extra walking. But walking was something that just about everyone did to some degree, some more than others.

In the little village of Cole Camp resided a real “hooper”. He spent his time either playing country music or roaming the countryside in search of Indian relics. The distances he walked in his archaeological pursuits is nearly legendary. Those that recall him said that when he commenced to cover lots of ground in a hurry he would shift into a type of “rolling gait” and he traveled at a steady pace. About twice a month he walked a forty mile round trip to Sedalia and most suspected that he was in search of “Amour”.

A bet brought on a 140 mile stroll for a Hickory County man in January of 1897. When the roll call was completed on January 11 in the house in

Jefferson City, there were five Representatives absent. But at three O’clock that afternoon Capt Snidow of Hickory County strode into the crowded room. On his back he carried his gripsack, his shoes were dirty and his trousers were said to need a good brushing. He was sixty years old at the time and had walked from Weaubleau, Mo to Jefferson City. His stroll was performed as the result of a bet he had with his opponent in the election. But when it comes to walking he couldn’t hold a candle to Walking Stewart.

Walking Stewart was the nickname of John Stewart (1749-1822). He was the son of a London linen-draper, he secured a post in the East India Company and went to Madras. After serious quarrels with his superiors, he resigned and started out on his travels. During the following years he went on foot through Hindustan, Persia, Nubia, Abyssinia, across the Arabian Desert, through Europe from Constantinople to England, passing through most of the continental countries. In 1791 he crossed to America and walked through what was then known of Canada and the United States. It was said of him: A most interesting man...contemplative and crazy...yet sublime and divinely benignant in his visionariness. This man as a pedestrian traveler had seen more of the earth’s surface than any man before or since. My estimation is “what a marathon man!”

And marathon brings to mind the type of walking that people do today. There are the “walk for life” agendas and the let’s get back into shape binges. It amuses me greatly when I drive past the Park on the way to my daughter’s house and I see individuals and couples briskly utilizing the walking paths in the park. They’re “suited up” in the proper attire and the parking lot is full of their cars that they have

driven to the walking path! My head never has quite comprehended that concept. Somehow my mind drifts back to the paths through the woods past the bee tree we had been watching all summer on our way to the fishing hole or to the hunt for a “mess of squirrel” to supplement the family food supply. Barefooted, we felt “mother earth” on the souls of our feet and it put us in touch with something that has somehow been lost today. Walking then was simply a way of life and something you did to get from one place to another. And no matter if you went by “Walker’s bus”, the Marrow-Bone stage or Shank’s Mare, you got there, healthy, happy and stress free!

The Barn Quilt committee met on Wednesday, March 19 at 1 p.m. with the good news Benton County Tourism has received a grant from Missouri Humanities that will allow them to do additional barn quilts in 2025.

The meeting centered chiefly around inventorying what has been accomplished and what was left undone in 2024 and discerning who was assigned to certain projects.

The end of 2024 saw the successful installation of a barn quilt on a little barn on the eastern edge of Cole Camp. The barn is currently owned by Marge Lumpe, Robert Owens Jr. and Dana Owens. Ms Lumpe had some much needed repairs done to the barn and a quilt design was chosen.

Louis Bohling purchased the property from P.G. and Emelia Miller in 1920. In 1942 the property passed to Mr. Bohling’s daughters, Ethyl Ehlers and Helen Lumpe. In 1976 Helen acquired her sister’s share



of the property.

Helen was married to Walter Lumpe, President of the Cole Camp Bank. In 1998 Helen’s interest in the property passed to her children, Ron Lumpe and Martha Owens, each had ½ interest. In 2002 Martha’s ½ was placed in the Martha Owens Living Trust. Presently Marge Lumpe holds ½ interest and Dana Owens along with her brother Robert have the other half.

At one time there was a wooden silo east of the barn and parts of its base are still there. There was a shallow (70) feet well on the property. Reno Viebrock rented the land prior to Harry Goosen’s father farming it. The land was row-cropped for years. Mr. Goosen row-cropped for a while and they began raising soybeans there. Harry assumed the rental when his father died in 1987. Later Harry put the ground in CRP for Helen Lumpe.

At one time there was a

house northwest of the gate west of the barn. It sat in the locust grove and had a sidewalk and a fence that is still there. Verna Jagels Eckhoff, Irene Kerkusiek and Leon as well as Lorraine Jagels lived in the house at one time. They were the daughters of Edgar & Erna Heimsoth Jagels. Lawrence Harms was the last person to inhabit the house and in the 70’s it was razed. Jeff Hickman’s father took the house down for the lumber. According to verbal history, heard by Harry Goosen, 52 Highway went north of the Bothwell Clinic at one time.

When the barn quilt square was added in 2024. The design of the square was chosen because of Helen Lumpe’s love for flowers. She worked at the flower show for the Cole Camp Fair for many years. She was an expert flower arranger, especially with dried flowers. Helen was also the Grand Marshal of the Fair Parade in 2002.

April 8, 2025 Election

On April 8, 2025, Benton County voters will go to the polls to decide whether to extend the existing one-half of one percent Capital Improvement Sales Tax to finance road and bridge improvements as well as finance other capital improvement needs of the County. The tax will also provide funds for the Special Road Districts of the County to do their own local improvements. The Capital Improvements Sales Tax was originally passed in 1990 with renewals in 1995, 2000, 2005, and 2010. In 2010, the renewal passed by 73%. The tax renewal in 2015 extended the collection period for 10 years instead of the 5 years that had been in place since 1990. The last election conducted on April 7, 2015, demonstrated that the County residents supported the tax with a 68% pass rate. Since this is a sales tax, all visitors to Benton County help generate revenue from this tax.

The Capital Improvement Sales Tax is essential to maintain roads, bridges, and other facilities in the County. Without this tax, the revenues of the County will not be able to meet the demands to maintain and improve the road system and obtain the equipment and facilities to provide the services expected by citizens. Benton County currently has 535 miles of road to maintain, of which approximately 116 miles are asphalt. The asphalt and gravel needed to maintain all County roads is funded heavily by the Capital Improvements Sales Tax. In addition to road maintenance, all bridges within the County must be maintained. Unfortunately, many of these bridges are so deteriorated, that some roads are closed until replacement bridges can be funded and constructed.

The one-half of one percent sales tax revenues are divided between Benton County and the Special Road Districts of Cole Camp, Ionia and Brandon based on the number of miles they maintain. Benton County allocates 60% of the revenue to maintenance of roads and the remaining 40% is allocated to the General Fund. This portion of the revenue is used to repair and make improvements to County facilities and provide equipment such as computers and vehicles for the Sheriff's Office to provide patrol of the rural areas of the County.

For the year ending 2024, the Capital Improvements Sales Tax funded \$302,000.00 for vehicles and equipment for the Sheriff's Office. The two Road Districts utilized \$991,000.00 for asphalt overlay material

and gravel purchases. The three Special Road Districts received revenues totaling \$96,000.00.

The ability of Benton County to continue these projects and services is based heavily on the continuation of the one-half of one percent sales tax that is provided not only by the residents of the County, but also by the tourists that visit our County and travel our County roads. Tourism traffic contributes to the deterioration of our roads. This tax will spread the financial responsibility and lessen the burden on the taxpayers within the County. Since this referendum is for an extension, it will not be an increase over what is presently in place.

(Continued from Page 1) from streets and sidewalks to sewers. I bring a construction background and knowledge of our codes and ordinances to the council. At the end of the day, I am asking for your vote to keep those projects moving."

Locke's challenger, Meuschke said, "As a member of the city council, I would have the privilege of directly shaping decisions that impact the everyday lives of residents. I can advocate for meaningful improvements, develop policies that benefit the community, and address the unique needs of my city. Serving on the council is my way of giving back and making a tangible difference."

He added, "Being part of the council means taking an active role in the governance of my city and contributing to its growth and progress. For me, it's a way to ensure that our local government truly reflects the values and needs of the community."

Question two, again was, "What do you see as the council's role and responsibilities?"

Locke responded, "Just about everyday, except Sunday, you'll find me checking on my projects underway and following up on citizen concerns. I think it's important we thoughtfully review every request and make sure city tax dollars are spent wisely and within budget. Recently a draft comprehensive plan was proposed that didn't fit our hometown values. I am committed to ensuring your rights as a homeowner or a landowner are not infringed. We will work together, putting in the time it takes to build the best plan to keep Cole Camp beautiful and a safe place to live."

Meuschke said, "Council is responsible for drafting and passing ordinances that govern the city. They approve the budget and allocate funds to various departments. They set policies that guide the city's operations. Council holds the Mayor and city managers accountable by monitoring the performance

of city departments. Additionally, council reviews contracts, including construction projects that benefits the community. They engage in community outreach to keep residents informed. Council members should be advocating for their respective constituents and making decisions for the betterment of the whole community now and in the future."

The east ward seat of Steve Knox is currently being contested by two opponents, Kevin Calhoun and Sandy Schlesselman.

When asked his motivation for wanting to serve on the council, incumbent Steve Knox responded, "Serving has always been important to me. I first served the country in the U.S. Army right after high school. For nearly fifteen years, I've served local school districts as a high school official and most recently on the city council. Cole Camp is a wonderful place to live and raise a family. I want to preserve this small town life by keeping Cole Camp an affordable place to live where property rights are protected."

Knox sees the council's role and responsibilities as "whatever needs to be done".

"The council makes a city budget and keeps spending in check, keep sewers and water running and plan street repairs. I've gotten on equipment and pushed snow because it needed to be done. I believe in working constructively with my fellow council members and the mayor to get things done," Knox said.

Kevin Calhoun, a contender for the seat shared he is motivated to run for city council.

"I served my country for over twenty years on active duty and I want to give back to my present day community," he said.

Mr. Calhoun stated that he sees the role and responsibility of being on the council as, "To represent the constituents that elected them and ensure the city is well maintained."

Sandy Schlesselman stated that she is motivated to serve on the city council because, "I want to bring my voice to the table. My experiences as a business owner, a retired teacher and a pastor has contributed to my perspectives on problem solving and consensus building. Therefore, I will ensure that all voices are heard, that due process is observed, and that all business owners are given the respect that is due them. I would be honored to serve the Cole Camp community as East Alderman."

Schlesselman sees the council's role and responsibilities as, "Using the tax payer's money wisely. Maintaining a fair and responsible environment for our city employees. Making out streets and downtown sidewalks safe. Provide

safety through an effective police department and supporting our volunteer fire department as well as those who serve the health needs through our local clinic and ambulance. Provide safe water and maintain the city sewer. Help promote small businesses and future business opportunities."

In Warsaw there is only one contested race. Kimberly Percy and Francis Gatlin are both vying for the vacant seat in Ward one.

Percy told the *Benton County Enterprise* that her motivation for seeking the Ward one seat is, "As a former teacher in the district, current Chamber board member, and small business owner, I've had a first-hand account of what truly amazing things our community has to offer. By serving on the city council, I can help continue to grow and transform Warsaw into an even better place for everyone."

Percy described her idea of the council's role and responsibilities as, "The council's role includes building strong relationships with residents, keeping communication open, and ensuring citizens are informed about the city's progress and advocate for its people."

Gatlin shared her feelings when she said, "I have a strong love for Warsaw. I'm retired from construction four years, so I have the time to attend the meetings and help where I can."

Gatlin concluded that her role on the council would be, "To be the voice of the people of Ward one and to see our tax dollars are spent wisely."

Ward two candidate, Jennifer Flores is running unopposed.

Flores explained that her bid for election is driven by, "My passion for Warsaw and continuing to make positive and lasting impacts on our community."

She went on to say, "It gives me the opportunity to address local challenges, advocate for a sustainable growth, improve quality of life for residents, and ensure that diverse voices are heard in decision making, as well as the chance to contribute to a city where everyone feels valued and included, and where we create solutions that reflect the collective needs of our community."

Flores feels the council's role is "to be the voice of the people and continue to make Warsaw a great place to live and visit. Help shape the future by making choices on budgets, local projects and services that impact both residents and visitors. And with being a tourism driven economy, continuing to help make improvements aiding tourism while ensuring that the needs and voices of our residents are always heard."

Ward three incumbent Eric Flores is also running unopposed. He was unable to be reached for comment.

All municipal elections,

as well as those for local school boards and other issues will take place next Tuesday, April 8. Complete results will be available in next week's issue of the *Benton County Enterprise*.



Dear Editor,

I am writing to lodge my support for the Lakeview Heights Fire Protection District in their effort to seek a first ever tax hike in their history.

I own property in the Lakeview Heights Fire Protection District boundaries. I've become to know some of the hard-working folks who make it their passion to maintain a volunteer service with limited operating capitol. I know they've spent countless hours fixing equipment, trucks, building tools and such that help save taxpayer's money. Volunteers spend countless hours away from their own families so that our families reap the benefit. Lakeview Heights Fire Protection District has been fortunate to receive grants and donations to help offset costs and stretch that tax dollar, thus being a good steward of public money. While grants and donations are helpful, they just don't solve the bigger problem.

Typically, a fire district tax levy is the most inexpensive of all levies shown on our tax statements. I believe taxpayers see the result of their money at work more frequently by local emergency services and schools.

Volunteer fire departments across this country make up about 80% of our nation's fire service, while only 20% are paid. The common theme with volunteer fire departments abroad is the struggle to financially to keep up with operating. Regulations and standards which career fire departments follow must also be followed by the poorest of fire departments. Said regulations involve operating capital for compliance. The rules don't separate the volunteer fire departments with dwindling budgets from the largest of fire departments with billion-dollar budgets. Most, if not all regulations, rules, laws, and/or whatever else just to stay operating are unfunded by the bureaucracy that creates them. Sometimes fire departments are unable to fund mandates and are stuck dealing the outcome. Those outcomes could result in reduced services, higher insurance rates for property owners, or closing the doors of fire stations altogether. Equipment that fire personnel use must be in the best possible working condition. Hoses and ladders require annual testing. Breathing apparatus must be tested and follow manufacturer specifications. Personal protective gear must be current within 10 years of manufacture dates or be removed from service. Fire pumps on fire apparatus require annual pump testing to ensure they work properly throughout the year. Insurance alone

that fire departments pay each year for the purpose of protecting public assets require protection from mother nature, fire, flooding, theft, and other risks. Insurance premiums that fire department pay continue to rise. Workman's Compensation premiums are high as well so that if volunteer fire fighters are injured serving us for free, they at least can have their medical bills covered. Volunteer firefighters who are doing this for FREE deserve the best protection possible so folks like you and I can depend on them to serve us flawlessly when our emergency arises.

According to the Missouri State Auditor's 2024 Property Tax Rates, the current levy for Lakeview Heights Fire Protection District is \$0.2657 cents on every \$100 of personal property and real estate. The total valuation of their fire district is \$23,459,121. If you do the math, this means the fire department is entitled to receive \$62,331 to operate on in a year's time—that's if everyone pays their taxes. I cannot fathom how this amount of operating capitol can financially support a two-fire station district, serving 90 square miles or more, with all the requirements that they must financially adhere to in a year's time, along with staying ahead with the constant upgrading of equipment. This

is why fundraisers are had—so they can offset costs and stretch our tax dollar as far as it will go. It isn't ever enough, to be honest.

So, what will this rate increase cost you and I? A home in the Lakeview Heights Fire Protection District boundaries valued at \$100,000 should have an assessed value of \$19,000 (or otherwise 19% of market value); therefore, 190 units of \$100 assessed valuation multiplied by the current 2024 levy rate of \$0.2657 equals \$50.48 per year in property taxes paid to the district. The \$0.2000 cent increase would raise the levy to \$0.4657 cents. So, for a \$100,000 home at that new rate would cost a homeowner \$88.48 per year. At current fuel prices, I spent that amount last week at the pump filling up my car with fuel.

No doubt there's uncertainty with our economy. No one wants to pay more money—me included. Some people have said this isn't a good time for a rate increase. To be honest, I don't know if there is ever a really "good time" to ask for a rate increase, but there also is never a "good time" to have a fire, medical emergency or motor vehicle crash either.

Lakeview Heights Fire Protection District area needs its fire service to continue answering our call when the need is there. Firefighters need to be better prepared. They need reliable apparatus. They need the best equipment to keep them safe while serving our community for free.

Before the election on April 8, I would encourage everyone affected by this rate increase to reach out to someone on the Lakeview Heights Fire Department to learn more intimately about their need for additional funding to that an informed decision is made at the polls.
