

In the early 1800's, the colorful Osage Indians hunted, lived on, and controlled the entire length of the Osage River valley. The French had earned the trust of this great tribe by creating a very prosperous fur trading business. As a direct result of this trust, the entire tribe shared their friendliness, excellent farming abilities and land with our appeators.

with our ancestors. celebrated The very Lewis and Clark expedition provided this area with its first recorded settler. Ezekiel Williams conducted several more independent explorations of the West. Even with this vast knowledge of the new frontier, Williams chose the Ozarks to settle due to the unlimited virgin timber, spring fed streams and lakes,

and abundant wildlife. pioneering The homesteaders made the same discovery, and settled in small groups of three or four families in close proximity to each other. This not only provided security in a very remote back country, but in one or two of these new settler homes they constructed a so called porch kitchen which was used to instruct all the children in this settlement. This was the birthplace of the one room school in later

Population was growing rapidly in this un-organized, un-chartered area later to become Warsaw, Missouri. A legal system was needed to control the influx of new pioneers. Steven Houser built the first house in Warsaw, and provided a court room for several years to allow a legal system to assist and control community organization and growth.

Overland held up at the Osage River because crossing was available only during low water times. Lewis Bledsoe built a strong, usable ferry in 1831 to solve this problem. This brought a concentration of large freight wagons, teams, and drivers in need of rest, repair, and overnight accommodations. Blacksmith shops, sleeping quarters, and saloons grew quickly to supply these needs. Many blacksmith shops ran 20 or more forges to provide shoes for the teams, and repairs for the wagons.

As the area grew and prospered, the court ordered the area to name a county seat for Benton County. After several years of heated disputes, Warsaw was declared the capitol in 1835, but it took seven more years for the name of Warsaw to become official.

The melody along the river in 1837 was the whistle of the riverboats announcing

their arrival in Warsaw. These early steamers provided an enormous economic impact with numerous freighters being unloaded and reloaded night and day along the Wharf. St. Louis merchants were very pleased and eager to provide the new pioneers with much needed steel, salt, groceries, nails, and trading supplies for the Indians. The new settlers re-loaded these steam boats with raw material harvested from the new frontier. Items being shipped included animal hides and pelts from the abundance of wildlife, grain, dried fruit and vegetables, dried meat, honey, and large quantities of corn whiskey from their stills.

stills.

Slaves created working melodies as they paced their walk to the beat of the drum and carried the heavy packs on their backs, unloading and reloading the river boats. The peak levels of navigation in the spring and fall created brisk business all along the Wharf in early Warsaw.

In 1840 the population of Warsaw reached 1200 as churches, schools, the first jail and courthouse were constructed. Many merchants were opening shops to sell the new Hundreds of supplies. slaves were registered in Benton County causing growing racial tension. The Osage River served as a natural dividing line between the slave owners of the south, and the "free soilers" or "secessionist" to the north. A silent Civil War with bloody raids claimed countless lives for many years before the Civil War was officially declared.

The click of the rails, the familiar whistle, and the smell of coal smoke brought the successful romance of the railroad to the area after the war. Industry needed to move steel, grain, livestock and people at a faster pace so the railroads replaced the river boats.

Benton County had so many tributaries of the Osage River and the Grand River winding through the area that bridges became an absolute necessity to transport livestock and grain to the large river Warsaw city terminals. engineer, Joe Dice, built 20 bridges and swingers with some being rebuilt upon failure. Joe Dice left not only many very useful design and construction ideas, but he also had a reputation for his beautiful singing voice, often heard in local churches.

Severe economic depression hit the entire country in the 1930's, and Benton County was no exception. These rough patches seemed to strengthen this area, even when the wars of the 1940's were followed by severe record floods. All these hardships stimulated a serious plan for flood control.

From the very beginning, Warsaw was a rural based agricultural community. This allowed for a very peaceful small town character where residents were often employed

by personal friends and neighbors. Skilled jobs were provided by the grain and livestock industry, the feed milling industry, railroads, and gunstock factories

and gunstock factories. educational County leaders responded continued growth with creative construction plans. Approximately 100 one-room schools reorganized. were and consolidated to three school districts in Warsaw, Lincoln and Cole Camp.

As the 1960's appeared, plans for long time flood control were under way. Truman Dam construction began in 1964, and was completed in 1979. Α 50-thousand-acre pool provided adequate flood control. As this flood control project was in progress, another important industry was being developed by the large number of tourists coming to the area. The attraction and beauty of the developing new lake helped convince these tourists to consider building new homes here and becoming permanent residents. This large influx of new households required not only new and expanded banking facilities, and medical care, but additional eateries, and shopping.

(Continued from Page 1) grinding coffee for the morning brew. That would be for grown-ups, cocoa for the children, also building fires in three stoves so that the house would be warm when his large family arose. Sometime later the train whistle would blow and he was off to the post office to work the mail, then start on the rural mail route riding one horse (Old Queen) and using (Old Buck) as a pack horse.

As he passed our house he would blow a whistle for one of his family to pick up our mail and give him his lunch, which he often did not eat as it would be frozen by noon. Again the same whistle would be blown to gather his children in for the evening mail. Later he drove a horse to a cart, and I can still hear him approaching. Then later a Model-T replaced the cart.

The town siren blew at noon and again at 6 in the evening. It too, was blown when a fire occurred. One blast for one end of town, two for the other. Having no fire department this gave us great concerns.

I remember well different people driving cows from town to nearby pastures outside of town, stopping them at the town well near our home to water them morning and evening.

I can still hear the laughter as we were picking blackberries in a path that seemed terribly big. Guess it was as we picked 150 gallons one year. Laughter was also hear as baseball was being played in our pasture, or it could be a game played with sticks and a can called (Old Sow in the hole) or various other sports.

One winter when it was very, very icy, I remember seeing my brothers skate to school. Als on winter nights one could hear children sleigh riding on Wisdom Hill. No cars were on the road so it was safe.

Almost every Saturday night there was a band concert on the hotel lawn which was run by Mrs. McEwan. Kenneth Davis was the conductor and had taught most of the people involved as music was not taught in school. This music could be heard from a great distance. Sometimes fiddle music was enjoyed there too.

Church bells always rang out on Sunday morning and most everyone went to church. When the bell of the Lutheran church tolled during the week, it meant that one of their members had died and it tolled once for every year of their age, so we stood and counted until we had the age figured out, then tried to determine who it might be, not knowing

until it was learned by word of mouth, as there weren't any telephones. Our neighbor Arch Lockard, ran a dray wagon and delivered kerosene, groceries, feed and etc.

Lincoln sometimes had

a fair, which was quite an event and one could see and hear sounds that were different and enjoyable. Gene Nash ran a drug store and if you happened to get an Eskimo Pie with a pink center (instead of white) you were entitled to another. And that was great! Silent movies were shown at night at the school and this was a treat. Once in awhile a tent show would come to town. I watched my brother play basketball on an outside court and I did too for three years, also one year of volleyball. Tournaments were played in Sedalia or Smithton as they were the only one that gymnasiums. One had to put their hands in the pits of their arms to warm up when playing

outside, but it was fun. Our little red wagon made a noise of its own as we took it to town to get five cents worth of ice which would cool tea for both dinner and supper on hot, sticky days. There was a man named McOueen that would drive up with a load of watermelons and Mom would purchase some and place them in a tub of cold water to be eaten later. They tasted cold to me, but now I know they weren't.

On occasion, some of the Henry clan would go home with my Uncle Matt and Aura Fields and have the enjoyment of spending the day on a farm about four miles north of Lincoln. We rode in a surrey, going with them after church on Sunday and returning again

in the evening for church.

The Bible was read out loud by my father each morning before breakfast, followed by prayer and I have seen both Mother and Father kneel by their bedside to pray before retiring. This is well worth remembering."

(Continued from Page 1) A 7-punch card went from \$28 to \$30. A 24-punch card went from \$90 to \$100 and a 48-punch card increased from \$168 to \$190.

Other new prices include: Twilight swim, \$2.50; Aerobics Pass, \$85; Aerobics Lessons, \$4.

Pool Party, 0-49 swimmers (no slide or diving board), \$135; 50-74 swimmers, (slide or diving board), \$190; 75+ swimmers (slide and diving board), \$225.

Lap swim, \$1; children 2 and under are free with an adult's paid admission; A 5% discount will be offered for seniors (65+) and military;; Spectators, \$5; School, \$2; Daycare, \$2.

Beard pointed out that among the reasons for increases is that lifeguards are needed at each part of the pool and are now paid \$13.75 per hour. The pool will, however, now be available 7 days per week.

The board also voted to move city office hours of operation from 8:00 AM until 4:30 PM.

With no further discussions, the meeting adjourned to executive session at 6:36 PM.

Lincoln's Braylin Paxton was on the hill for the five inning contest and turned in one of her best performances of the season thus far. She gave up one run on two hits, struck out three and walked



A Message **FROM THE MAYOR**

If you have not purchased your dog license (or chicken-keeping license), it's time to do that now. There is a bonus of free rabies vaccination for all dogs with a current license. The clinic will be held at the city barn/shed on Saturday, April 12 from 1:00 PM to 2:00 PM. This is the only time the vaccinations will be offered by the city, so don't miss it! Dogs must be on a leash or in a carrier while at the clinic.

The grass is growing and will sprout quickly with the warmer temperatures and the spring rains. This is a reminder that grass must be kept cut no taller than 7 inches to meet city ordinance requirements. If it is allowed to grow taller, residents can be given a citation and fine. When mowing your lawn be sure to remove the clippings from the streets by making your last direction so clippings will be blown back into the yard. It is very dangerous to anyone riding a bicycle or motorized bicycle/motorcycle because the clippings make the pavement very slippery and can result in accidents.

There is no longer a municipal court held in Cole Camp. All court business must be conducted at Benton County Courthouse in Warsaw. This includes payment of fines. The city clerk does not have any access to the court records and can no longer accept payment of fines. Once again, there is a need

for volunteers to beautify the flower beds at the Boonslick Library in Cole Camp. Much improvement was done about two years ago with landscaping plastic and rock being applied, but as time passes it needs more attention. The local staff has identified plants that need to be removed and/or pruned back to make it easier to complete the process. There even a couple of rogue trees that have sprouted in the flower beds. The bottom line is simple. Real prayer is something we learn and is a discipline that will grow when you are willing and make the choice to develop a deeper prayer




Edmonson Baptist Church Giveway Soon

The Edmonson Baptist Church is preparing to host their Spring Giveaway, 2025. The Church does the giveaways of brand new merchandise each Spring, Summer and Fall, plus one in December geared toward the youth of the area to acquire gifts for their family members. They aren't just allowed to shop free but a volunteer assists them in wrapping their gift. The church provides the gift wrap too, plus a visit with Santa.

The spring giveaway is Saturday, April 12, one day only. Shoppers 70 years old and older will shop from 9-10 a.m. Everyone else from 10-1. Edmonson Baptist church has a beautiful Ozark setting at 27109 State Hwy H at rural Lincoln.



One sign of spring are the white blossoms of Bradford pear trees. This oval-shaped oriental became a favorite of landscapers and was widely planted in yards, city malls, business campuses, parks and downtown revitalization efforts from the 1960s up to 2000, but after four decades the Bradford pear would appear on the categorized lists of invasive trees in nearly all the eastern, midwestern and southern states.

In the early 1900s, United States pear orchards were in danger of being wiped out by fire blight disease. The U.S. Department of Agriculture sent Frank Meyer, a scientist, to China to search for a disease resistant fruit variety. Meyer collected several hundred pounds of the Chinese Callery pear seeds. He headed to Shanghai on a riverboat in 1918. The boat arrived with the seeds but Meyer was missing. His body was later found in the river, the cause

was never determined. Meyer's Callery pear seeds were shipped to the USDA Plant Station in Glen Dale, Maryland. Over the next three decades plant scientists found that the Callery pear was fire blight resistant but it did not produce edible fruit. Although it had little value for orchard growers, the Glen Dale station chief, Charles Bradford, thought the Callery pear might make a good oriental tree. He was working on its development when he collapsed of a heart attack in 1951.

Frank L. Creech continued Bradford's work. He found one variety of the Callery pear tree had a pleasing shape and produced a proliferation of white

flowers. Creech reproduced the tree and eight years later the carefully pruned test trees were deemed a success. Creech named the tree Bradford pear in honor

By 1962, the Bradford pear was available commercially and became one of the most widely planted ornamental trees in the United States. All ornamental pears originate from Pyrus calleryana, commonly referred to as Bradford pear.

of his deceased boss.

The trees were very popular because of their prolific spring flowers, dark glossy leaves and ability to thrive in almost any kind of soil - and because as a hybrid, people thought they were sterile, therefore having no messy fruits to contend with. The tree grew only 20-25 feet tall, retained its oval shape and in the fall, leaves had brilliant colors.

In 1966, Lady Bird Johnson planted a Bradford pear in Washington, DC publicizing its use as a landscape tree.

Fast forward to the century 21st when conservationists forestry scientists calling the Bradford pear an "invasive tree". By 2011, at least 26 states had reported problems with the spread of wild Callery (Bradford)

In 2007, Theresa Cully, an Ohio scientist, documented the reason for the spread of wild Callery pears. As other cultivars were developed and released, each cultivar was genetically different from the others which meant they could, and did, cross with each other producing lots of fruit and seedlings trees. Birds ate the fruit and scattered the seeds across the landscape. The proliferation of wild Callery pear thickets has been wide spread, most noticeably around municipalities and non-cultivated areas. Its invasive spread has been largely uncontrolled. Callery pear populations have exploded and threatened native biodiversity the trees steadily march

into our native grasslands and forested areas, even becoming a headache for land developers.

In 2019, the Missouri Invasive Plant Council started a Callery pear buyback program. The Missouri Department of Conservation Bradford pear buyback 2025 schedule is on the MDC website. There are 17 locations statewide and the closest location nearest Warsaw is Warrensburg on April 22 from 3-6 pm. All that's required is bring a photo of a Bradford pear that you have cut down and you will receive one free native tree.

A great place to find native plants that are best suited for your area is the National Wildlife Federation Native Plant Finder: nwf.org/ nativeplantfinder. Just type in your zip code.
