John Boise Middle School (Warsaw) seventh grader Austyn Wright was recently crowned Princess of America Teen Miss Missouri. In July, Wright, the daughter of Bradly and Sarah Wright, will compete in the Princess of America Nationals.

In the national competition, Wright will compete in interview, beauty, on stage question, and personal introduction. Her optional areas include photogenic, pink carpet wear and casual wear. In the superstar competition she will showcase her talent of dancing.

Wright was drawn into the pageant world after winning the Jubilee Days Little Miss and Jr. Miss contests right here in Warsaw. She commented that she had so much fun in the Jubilee Days contests that she wanted to try them on a larger scale.

Wright is using her platform, "Glittering Acts of Kindness", to spread kindness in her community, her state and her country.

"Glittering Acts of Kindness is all about doing little things to spread kindness and make someone's day better. Even small stuff; like holding the door, giving a compliment, or just being there for someone can really make a

A Woman's Journey Through Grief Brings Inspiration To Help Others Through Fitness

In 2018, Kay Turner appeared in a *Benton County Enterprise* article about senior fitness (when her name was Kay Wingfield). She was nearing her 70th birthday, training five days a week with Brian Phillips at Warsaw Fitness and entered her first competition where she bench pressed 55 pounds, squatted 100 pounds and dead lifted 145 pounds. She later entered a second competition where she deadlifted 185 pounds. She explained that she had turned to fitness in 2008 after her son passed away and she needed to find a goal that would motivate her.

"When my son died, I was living in Lee's Summit where I had been since the

age of 20," said Turner. "I would sit in my kitchen trying to figure out how to live,"

She went on to say, "I began walking five miles a day and spending two hours a day at Extreme Fitness, (in Lee's

Summit) trying to fill up time. I found that fitness heals the heart, mind, body and soul."

The year after the article appeared, Turner got divorced and moved to

Florida where she grew up and she kept up with her Silver Sneakers program at the YMCA. Her ex-husband had stayed at their house in Benton County, but

My late husband was a huge mayonnaise aficionado. We even had a plastic utensil called a mayo knife that was used specifically for large mayonnaise jars. So, of course the following quick and easy chicken recipe was a weeknight standby.

Easy enough to remember; use your favorite dried herb or none at all.

- 2 skinless, boneless chicken breasts
- 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
- 2 tablespoons mayonnaise
- 2 tablespoons bread crumbs (I use panko)
- 1 ½ teaspoons Herbes de Provence

Directions

Preheat the oven to 425 degrees. Place chicken breasts in a baking pan. Mix Parmesan cheese and mayonnaise together in a bowl until well combined; spread evenly over chicken breasts. Coat with bread crumbs and sprinkle with herbes de Provence. Bake in the preheated oven until chicken breasts are no

longer pink in the center and the juices run clear, 20 to 25 minutes. An instant-read thermometer inserted into the center should read at least 165 degrees F.

the process of aging was difficult for him, and she had made a promise to help him if needed. She returned to Benton County the week of Thanksgiving 2024 to check on him since he is 82 years old and has a form of dementia. She decided that she could not leave him and started getting their house back in order, a process that involved so much paperwork, cleaning and other aspects that she didn’t have time to go to a gym until the middle of April of this year. She is not in training at the present time but works with dumbbells and other equipment on her own. She has taken her ex-husband to the gym, and he now rides an incumbent bike and is getting stronger too. She hopes to work with Brian Phillips again sometime, is still in contact with him, but he works in Sedalia now and she might have to drive up there about twice a week when she is available to do so.

Turner is proud of how fit she remains and has a photo of herself in a bikini at age 70. She had the photo taken so if one person saw it and felt that they could accomplish something after being in despair, it was worth it. She wanted people to see that they could rise from anything and understand the path it took for her to get to that point. She said that when someone has a disability, there is a way to put one foot in front of another. She wanted to have another photo taken of her at 75, but she is 76 now and has not been able to arrange it yet. She plans to stay with the fitness course and have another photo taken at age 80.
She will be staying in Warsaw where she has friends that she has worked with in the past at Benton County Central Dispatch, and at Harry S. Truman State Park. She says that those friends saved her life and that without people we are nothing.
Although she was raised in Florida, she moved to Lee’s Summit at age 20 to be near a sister who was a stewardess. She married and remained there for 50 years before settling in the local area.
“I want to encourage people to do what they can,” said Turner. “I would have

not survived if I had not set a goal for myself to be my best. I do this because my son Jason had the ability to be the best he could be taken away from him.”

She said that Warsaw has a lot of senior citizens who can benefit from fitness programs and the Silver Sneakers program is offered through select Medicare plans allowing seniors 65 or older the opportunity to join one of a program at a gym, online or other areas, free of charge, where fitness programs available. In Warsaw, Integrated-Fitness offers Silver Sneakers Monday through Friday from 6:00 AM to 6:00 PM. Main Street Fitness also offers Silver Sneakers and members can use the facilities 24 hours a day, seven days a week with a key to get in. The Warsaw Senior Center is also able to accept the Silver Sneakers card so seniors can take some of the fitness classes such as Line Dancing, Chair One Fitness and Joint Friendly Motion.

“It is time for new blood on the council to bring in new ideas,” said Breshears about her decision to not seek another term.

Warsaw Mayor Eddie Simons called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM in the Council Chambers of the Community Building on April 21. Those present included: Alderman Rob Coskey, Alderman Adam Howe, Alderman Eric Flores, Alderman James White, Alderwoman Jennifer Flores, Alderwoman Kim Percy, and City Clerk Jessica Kendall recorded minutes of the meeting.

Benton County Tourism Director Lynette Stokes spoke to the council about the Benton County Arts Fest to be held on Saturday, June 7 from 9:00 AM until 4:00 PM. Everyone is invited to experience the arts in Benton County with local artists, makers and performers! Art competition (cash prizes), artisan demos, hands-on projects, handmade items, live performances and more will be available.

Competition will be held in the Warsaw Community Building Harbor Room

with other activities held in Sawdust Alley (Seminary Street and the parking lot across from there. This will be during Jubilee Days so several streets will be blocked off from traffic.

Stokes also spoke to the Council about the Smokin’ HOT Harborfest to be held on Saturday, August 2 from 1:00 PM until 9:00 PM on Drake Harbor in Warsaw. There will be live music in the amphitheater featuring Trevon Dawson, Danny Button and the Groove Pilots and Sugar Bush.

The council also passed Ordinance #581 authorizing Mayor Simons to execute a contract by and between the City of Warsaw and Do-rite Construction and Excavating Company for Federal Project Tap 9901 (538) Main Street Improvements as Project 8 of a combined bid with CDBG funds.

With no further discussion, the meeting adjourned at approximately 6:20 PM.

Next up was the certification of the election results, followed by the swearing in of the elected aldermen. Following that, Locke was elected as President of the Board of Aldermen/Mayor Pro-Tem. Following that action, the council dealt with corporate resolutions for the bank accounts.

Resolution 2025-03 (CC Reunion 2025) came before the Council. The resolution was needed to authorize the consumption of alcoholic beverages in the Ezekiel Williams Park during the all-class reunion on July 5, 2025.

Next up was health insurance. That has been tabled until the May meeting.

Tammy Eckhoff, from Planning & Zoning stepped to the podium and thanked the community for their input on what is needed for the town. The group looked at the pluses and minuses of a larger housing development. They also studied DIY projects, like possibly doing murals on existing structures.

BCED Director JoAnn

Lane announced the May 2 meeting in the Community Building at 9:30 AM to learn about the Paul Bruhn Grant program for historic buildings. The first training session for this was on April 16.

Paul reported Roy Wagner had turned in a \$70 dollar memorial given in memory of Lori Schroeder, to be used for the dog shelter.

Public Works Director Ron Petersen, reported the new meter and sampler had arrived for the pumping station and had been installed and is in use. Petersen said Spring Street had a washout after the previous rain. Public Works had completed the first mowing and two bike racks had been placed at the pickleball court and the post office. They had been purchased with grant funds.

Police Chief Jeff Canfield introduced the female officer for the Police Department. She is mainly a weekend officer.

The City Attorney had no report.

Mayor Burdick shared that approximately 140 dog licenses have been issued during the vaccination clinic that was recently held.

With no further business to be discussed, the meeting was adjourned.

On Monday, Lincoln traveled to Butler and lost 6-5. A mental mistake cost the Lady Cardinals in the end as they failed to cover third base on a bunt attempt to tie the game. An unnecessary throw to second sent a runner to third who scored on a wild pitch ending the game. Lincoln lost a 5-3 lead in the sixth. The Lady Bears scored three in the first and three in the sixth while Lincoln scored one in the third, three in the fourth and one more in the fifth. Lincoln's line ended 5-6-2 while Butler was 6-6-3. Braylin Paxton, coming off one of her best performances of the year in the Kaysinger Conference Tournament, gave up six runs, on six hits,

struck out seven and walked two. She took the loss while Kylee Dubray earned the victory for Butler. She gave up six hits, five runs, struck out 11 and walked no one. In what was one of their ugliest games of the season, Lincoln defeated LaMonte 26-11 after four innings on Tuesday night in Lincoln. Unofficially, LaMonte committed 12 errors and Lincoln had six clean hits. Approximately 15 runners combined scored from third base on a passed ball or wild pitch. Lincoln scored 9 in the first as Coach Aleah Johnson had the third base runner leave third early for the last out. Lady Cards hurler Braylin Paxton momentarily lost the strike zone and LaMonte raced back to a 13-10 deficit. The bright spot was that Paxton recorded her 500th career strikeout in the game.

The game was stopped for recognition after her sixth K of the game in the third. Molly Strozewski finished out the game in the circle. The Lady Cardinals came back strong on Wednesday with a 16-0 defeat of Archie in three innings in Lincoln. Freshman Molly Strozewski, the heir apparent to starting pitcher Braylin Paxton, who rested her sore knee, shut out Archie in a 16-0 victory at home. Archie came in at 5-5 and looked to be a handful but the Lady Cardinals jumped on them early, scoring six in the first and ten in the second in the three inning affair. Strozewski gave up just one hit, walked one and struck out five. The Whirlwinds were tagged with six errors while Lincoln made one miscue. Lilly Mellen went 2 for 3, scored two runs and

picked up two RBI's. When she has a good game, the Lady Cardinals usually win. Coach Johnson played several players in the sweet victory to move Lincoln's record to 14-2.

On Thursday, the Lady Cardinals won over visiting Green Ridge, 4-3 on a walk-off single up the middle by Alyssa Mellen that scored Molly Strozewski from second. Strozewski bunted her way on and went to second on an overthrow to the pitcher. Lilly Mellen was intentionally walked setting up her sister's single. Braylin Paxton struggled at times on the mound but held on for the win. She gave up three runs on three hits, walked three, hit three and had two wild pitches. She struck out nine batters to her credit in spite of a strike zone that moved around sometimes from pitch to pitch. Back-to-back triples by Alyssa Mellen and Cadence Harvey scored two runs in the third but the Lady Cardinals left the bases loaded as Paxton was put out on a soft liner to the shortstop and Skylar Arbuckle struck out. Lilly Mellen made two inning ending catches on a ball hit in shallow left field and a ball hit over the second base side. Second baseman Arbuckle made a nice catch in foul territory in the second. Lincoln blew a 3-1 lead in the seventh. Lincoln had beaten Green Ridge 10-0 in the conference tournament the Saturday before. Lincoln is now 15-2.

On Wednesday at home, Lincoln lost to Archie 10-4. Turner Kriesler took the loss on the bump and Tanner Thompson got the win. Kriesler went 1 for 3 with two RBI's. The line went 10-12-1 and 4-6-1. On Thursday, and on the road once again, the Cardinals fared no better, losing again, 10-, this time to Otterville. Cam Everhart hit a 2-run dinger in the seventh. Riley Sanders took the loss on the mound and Eds got the win. The line went 4-4-4 and 10-8-1.

Bright Golden Brocade
I recently stumbled across a quotation by Yoshiko Uchida that sent me mentally back across the years. It read: “Sunday is sort of like a piece of bright gold brocade lying in a pile of white muslin weekdays.” As I read that, I marveled at how precious Sunday was when I was a child. First and foremost it was observed in the manner dictated by the Ten Commandments. Living on an Ozark Dairy/ Beef cow operation meant little time to “smell the roses.” Especially in the summer when the gardening and hay baling was in full swing. We still milked and cared for the stock on the Sabbath but otherwise it was observed as a day of rest. Time was taken to catch a mess of perch from the creek or to make a freezer full of ice cream. Ingredients for the frozen concoction was dipped from the cream can and eggs retrieved fresh from the old red hen.

Usually we traveled from the Cole Camp Creek valley over to the Big Buffalo valley to see my paternal grandparents on Sunday. In my earliest memories they resided at Boyler’s Mill where Grandpa maintained the grounds for the owners. He kept the large park like setting pristinely mowed and weeded. Their caretakers cottage was small and so in the summer we often ate outside under the large shade trees. The mill pond and the large underground spring created a crystal clear stream through the center of the park. Wooden foot bridges arched over the bubbling water and Grandpa kept gold fish in his lily ponds.

A fabulous springhouse nestled against the gigantic hillside that rose behind the grounds. The water from that spring was dipped with a gourd dipper and its essence was absolutely addictive. I recall gorging myself one Sunday afternoon to the point of having a stomach ache. No man made drink has ever matched it then or now.

As Grandpa aged he was no longer physically able to keep up with the demands of the mill site and my grandparents moved to a four room house in the neighborhood to “retire”. They still had a big yard, lots of flower beds and a big garden but when we came to visit on Sundays, they were creatures of leisure, for they too observed the Sabbath.

Grandma always peeled a big pan of potatoes every Sunday morning and usually baked a big fruit cobbler. She had ample amounts of homemade bread from Friday’s baking and the rest of the dinner was carried in by the family. My Mother would always cook several chickens in the summer time when the young fryers were in their prime. Other times she would prepare a beef roast or a big meatloaf. Sometimes she would go down to the cellar and retrieve a few jars of canned beef just in case extra mouths to feed materialized. All four of my Aunts did the same thing so the table would be loaded with everything imaginable.

You might think my Grandmother would be cranky from that much company but it was just the opposite. She “expected” the weekly Sunday visits and the only one of her five children that was excused from regular attendance was her oldest daughter

who lived about forty miles away. In the forties and fifties the roads did not encourage long trips in less than luxuriant vehicles.

When we arrived she came out to greet us in a fresh print dress and apron and if we were later than usual she would exclaim: “Lawdy me, I was about to give up on you getting here. It sure would have been a blue Sunday without company.” I doubt that she ever had a Sunday with no company. Some of her cousins would bring “potluck” and join in to visit and catch up and in the afternoons, many of the Buffalo Creek neighbors would drop by. In the warm summer months the men would take a split bottom chair and retire to the lawn. Out came the musical instruments and my Dad and his brothers made music on the lawn. Ancient tunes passed down for generations by their ancestors that had been carried from North Carolina, to Kentucky and then into the Missouri Ozarks. During music breaks Grandpa told wonderful tales of his childhood with old Pap, Jacob Wallace, his white Indian grandfather and I listened as much as allowed. I was usually admonished to join my cousins or at least set with the womenfolk. I would give the appearance of obeying but usually snuck back into the lilac bush if Grandpa was telling an especially good story that afternoon.

If I did play with my cousins we would amuse ourselves in Big Buffalo Creek that was just under the hill from the house. An afternoon of wading usually required about ten minutes of checking our feet and legs for leeches, especially between the toes. We, or our parents, never became upset over this occurrence, as it was just the price you paid for splashing around in the stream. Sometimes we would play King of the Hill atop the giant sawdust pile in the neighbor’s sawmill but usually my girl cousins were not fond of becoming that soiled and opted out.

This was a time when the Blue Laws were still in effect and no stores were open on Sunday. The law was a puritanical hangover from Colonial times and prohibited commercial activity on Sunday. These closing laws were designed to respect the Christian Sabbath. By the 1960’s these laws were being repealed and with the repeals have come decreased church attendance and family oriented activities. Dad didn’t run to Lowe’s to buy paint and lumber and Mom didn’t spend half her Sunday shopping in Wal-Mart. Needed purchases were made on the other six days of the week.

So when my mind recalls those “day of rest” recollections from so long ago, they do come back to me like bright golden brocade.

than mean sea level) around the project reservoir (Lake of the Ozarks). Property within the boundary encompasses all 57,460 surface acres of the project reservoir and 2,118 acres of lands adjacent to reservoir and downstream of Bagnell Dam. The lands proposed to be removed consist of five separate sites throughout the project reservoir and represent less than one percent of the project's total acreage. These five sites primarily consist of hay fields, cattle pastures, private camping areas, isolated ponds, and forested and riparian areas. Ameren UE states that the underlying lands at these five sites are not needed for project operation and maintenance or other project purposes, including recreation, shoreline control, or protection of environmental resources. Ameren UE also states it would continue to retain the right to flow water over the lands proposed for removal should the need arise.
