Big Changes Are Coming To Drake Harbor Playground Facility, Here's What To Know



Phase I of the Steamboat Landing playground at Drake Harbor was completed in October 2022. When a community survey revealed that there was a desire to enlarge the playground and add bathroom, Warsaw а resident Rick Bibb offered to donate a dollar for every dollar donated by the community for the project up to \$300,000. So far, the community has raised \$243,385, including \$143,000 from the City of Warsaw, and the Bibb family has matched it. On May 7, the City of Warsaw broke ground on the expansion to the Steamboat playground and the building of modern, year-round, flushing restrooms at Drake Harbor.

a year of "After FUNdraising projects, we are close enough to our goal to break ground," said Randy Pogue, City Administrator and Planner. "We still have \$56,000 to raise before we can complete the project. Weather permitting, construction will be underway soon. The completion date is up in the air depending on how long it takes for us to raise the remaining money to finish the project."

Volunteer fundraising efforts are being led by Bonnie Wall, who noted that at \$3,673. Raffle tickets are

major donors present at the groundbreaking were Rick Bibb, Carmen Mantonya of Hawthorn Bank, Lions Club President Loren Whetsell, Kevin Dockery and Sean Dockery of Ozark Disposal, Toby Bolender of the Marine Corps League, Chuck Allcorn of the Warsaw Shrine Club and Mayor Eddie Simons.

Wall said that to raise more funds there is a current Wenig Custom Stock Ruger 10/22 Gun Raffle. The gun is made from Special Selection English Walnut and is valued

at Sportsman's Outfitters, the American Legion and the Warsaw City Office. Coming up is a four-person scramble Play Golf for the Playground tournament on June 7 at Shawnee Bend, a Texas Hold'em Tournament hosted by the Knights of Columbus on July 19, and a Trapshooting competition at the American Legion later in the summer.



If you're adding a child to your family, it's an exciting time, and you have much to anticipate. Of course, this new addition will bring many changes in your life, so you'll want to be prepared — especially in terms of your finances.

What financial moves should you make as you welcome your new child? Here are a few to consider:

• *Estimate expenses — and* create a new budget. Well before the arrival of your child, start looking for child care, so you can explore your options and start factoring in the costs to your cash flow and monthly budget. During your search, look at offerings from local community centers, religious institutions and nonprofit organizations, some of which may offer low-cost child care programs. • Contribute to your emergency fund. It's generally a good idea to keep up to six months' worth of living expenses in a liquid, low-risk account to pay for unexpected costs and with a growing family, these costs may well increase as your child grows older. • Look at your tax situation. You may want to consult with a tax professional to determine whether you qualify for credits or deductions, such as the dependent care credit, the federal child tax credit, and adoption-related credits (if you adopted a child). Also, you may want to update your Form W-4 to add a dependent — a move that may lower your tax withholding and increase your take-home pay. • Start your education planning. It's never too

soon to think about paying for costs associated with your child's education. You might want to consider a 529 education savings plan, which offers tax benefits and can be used for college and many vocational programs, as well as some K-12 costs. A financial advisor can help you explore all available education savings options.

• Check your insurance. You'll need to add your child to your existing health insurance, but if you don't have insurance, see whether you qualify for Medicaid or the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP), or look for a marketplace plan at healthcare.gov. You might also need to purchase additional life insurance coverage. And with a growing family to support, you might want to add disability coverage to protect your income against short- or long-term disabilities.

Bringing a new child into your life is certainly a joyous occasion — and by being financially prepared, you can make the whole experience even more enjoyable.



The Good Days That Will Not Come Again

When my children were struggling to find their way and grow into young adults, the house was a buzz of activity and chaos reigned supreme. But every Thursday evening we gathered as a family and watched the Waltons. And even today, each and everyone of them recalls the program with fond memories. My most vivid and poignant memory is the introduction shots of each show when John Walton (the father) brings home the radio. So many of the Walton stories depicted the family gathered to hear "Fibber McGee and Molly", listening to music or hearing the encouraging words of FDR as he attempted to soothe the fears of a nation caught up in the throes of the great depression. All of the presidents since have had their weekly address to the nation but not one of them has ever had the listening audience that the "Fireside Chats" garnered. These talks were so-called because they gave the impression that he was seated in front of a roaring fire in his den and speaking to each individual personally. In fact they were so realistic that he paused once and asked for a glass of water, which he sipped while on the air. I'm too young to really recall FDR but John Walton's radio brought back memories from my childhood and all the marvelous entertainment it provided.

In my earliest years, prior to electricity, we had a battery operated radio. The amount of listening was limited so as not to run the battery down. After electricity found us, I could gorge on all the fantasies of the airwayes to my hearts content. It was an unspoken law that the radio on Saturday night was tuned to WSM and the Grand Ole Opry. Such names as George D. Hay (The solemn old Judge) The Duke of Paducah, Minnie Pearl, Eddie Arnold (The Tennesse Plowboy), Rod Brassfield, Stringbean and who could ever forget Sarah Ophelia Colley Cannon? Or one of the show sponsors, Martha White Flour. For years that product was not available in this area but I always looked for the seemingly merchandise mythical when Mother grocery shopped. I was hoping to see a bag and perhaps a picture of the great Martha White. Of course we heard Amos & Andy, Charlie McCarthy, Fibber McGee and Molly but one of my favorites was a spin off from them, The Great Gildersleeve. Throckmorton P. Gildersleeve was a bachelor raising a nephew and a niece, Leroy and Marjorie. They lived in Summerfield and Gildy was the water commissioner. My mother faithfully listened to Kitchen Klatter, an Iowa based cooking show put on by the Driftmeier family. They produced a magazine, my Mother had a subscription, and they marketed various household products with their own label. Everything from floor cleaner to flavoring for your baking. Sometimes in the afternoon while she ironed or sewed she would tune in to Stella Dallas, "the true life story of Mother love and sacrifice, in which Stella Dallas saw her own beloved daughter Laurel marry into wealth

and society and realizing the differences in their worlds, went out of Laurel's world." This was the daily intro by the announcer. Or, "Pepper Young's Family" brought to you by Camay, the mild beauty soap for a softer, smoother complexion.

Evening listening was a great deal of musical shows such as Kraft Music Hall with Bing Crosby as the host. The show originated in New York with Al Jolson in 1934 but in 1936 it moved to the West Coast where Bing Crosby was the host for ten years. After Bing left the program it moved back East with Al Jolson again hosting. There was the wonderful Kate Smith Show and my family, always favoring country and western music, also tuned into the "National Barndance", one of its performers was later to rise to his own show in television, George Goebel.

Another show that traveled from radio into television was Gunsmoke. The remarkable realism of its sound effects with the clinking spurs or the creak of floorboards when someone walked across the saloon floor was what really made the show so memorable. Of course sound effects made radio work. From Walter Winchell's operating a code signal key to accent his rapid fire delivery of news, or sirens howling in the night to the flaming roar of machine guns that introduced "Gangbusters". Or the William Tell overture that launched "The Lone Ranger" and his horse Silver are sounds never to be forgotten.

The results that your imagination provided were good. The Lone ranger didn't have padded shoulders, you could leap tall buildings right along with Superman and the Martians that Orson Wells had attacking the earth were more convincing in your imagination than anything Hollywood has since cooked up with special effects. All children need a place to hide where grown-ups cannot get to them. And each of us found our own escape the all-American with boy, Jack Armstrong or if we were bookworms we fit in with avid readers like Ellery Queen and Sherlock Holmes. And even today as grownups we still need a hiding place in our minds. Mine comes sometimes in the old reproduction roundedtop radio that I acquired a few years ago. It, despite its old appearance, has a cassette player in it's side. In the proper mood I pop one of the old radio shows in and travel back. A mist comes in and surrounds me and I once more am on my stomach on the living room floor, clutching a pillow for security in the scary parts and my imagination carries me back to those thrilling days of yesteryear and with eyes shut tight, I know that I was not wrong. It was a world of exciting people, SALE 11 **ALL KINDS OF** DIRT, ROCK, MULCH

exciting places and exciting adventures. And sometimes the sting of foolish tears can be felt. There is no remedy for this, the nostalgia for good days that will not come again.






