This week, the Spaulding Education Fund delivered nearly 400 Golden Hornet awards to teachers, coaches, and staff across the Manchester Essex Regional School District, recognizing their impact on students. Nominated by students, honorees came from all four district schools, the administration, and athletics. Each recipient received a golden hornet pin, a personalized badge, and a certificate with students' words of gratitude.

The program also included a Diamond Hornet award for the most nominations, which went to Maria Schmidt, Administrative Assistant at Manchester Memorial Elementary. eading into the first round of the Division 4 Ltournament, the Manchester Essex lacrosse teams were heavy favorites. The girls, seeded sixth with a 12-4 record, faced 27-seed Lunenburg, while the boys, seeded eighth with a 14-4 record, took on 25-seed Bourne. Both teams delivered dominant wins on June 3, with the boys defeating Bourne 17-6 and the girls cruising past Lunenburg 16-4.

he Manchester-by-the-Sea Planning Board began, again, its public hearing with Cell Signaling Technology on Tuesday

The new building would be built in two phases with one of two laboratory buildings, a lobby, which would connect the two buildings when both are completed, and a parking garage being built in Phase 1. The second phase would see the second laboratory built as well as an expanded parking

When completed, about 500 employees would work at the complex, which would be the largest construction project in Manchester's his-

The Planning Board first began the hearing with CST on March 11, but when Planning Board Chairman Ron Mastrogiacomo died and Planning Board member Christine Delisio decided not to run for re-election, the board was in a bind with quorum challenges.

# Black Earth Officially Opens Regional Compost Facility, With a Vision

T's taken years of considerable planning, cooperation with the town of Manchester, and substantial state and federal investment, and last week the North Shore Regional Compost Facility—designed and operated by Black Earth Compost—has officially

opened its doors at 201 Pine Street.

The grand opening ceremony, held on Friday within the expansive 9,000-sf. facility in Manchester's Limited Commercial District, drew a crowd of more than 100 attendees, including officials from Black Earth

Compost, local and state lawmakers, and federal agency representatives. The turnout is a testament to the successful public-private partnership between Black Earth–founded by three Cape Ann residents including Manchester's Andrew Brousseau—and the town

of Manchester, which partnered with the company six years ago by offering municipal land on School Street in exchange for curbside composting services.

Today, Black Earth serves communities from Salisbury down to Boston's South Shore, and it will now operate from the nearly \$3 million state-of-the-art new facility built on a site that formerly was the town dump.



This past week the Greater Cape Ann Chamber of Commerce held its 44th Annual Small Business Persons of the Year Awards Ceremony honoring local business owners. 
the Manchester Essex girls' tennis team.

#### ME Boys Tennis Makes Statement with State Title Win Over Lynnfield

Tt's been a while, but it was certainly worth the wait.

The Manchester Essex Regional High School boys' tennis team won a dramatic, fiercely-contested match by a 3-2 score against Lynnfield in the MIAA Div. 4 State Final game at MIT on June 15.

The win gave the Hornets their first state title win since 1998, the year before current coach Rob Bilsbury was hired as coach of the team.

"It was an absolutely amazing experience, incredible through and through," Bilsbury says of his team's journey to the state title in 2024. "Throughout the whole season, we've been in this mindset of getting better every day in practice, competing at our highest level, and it was amazing to see the results."

He adds: "With Hamilton-Wenham, we lose to them early on, 2-3, and then turn around to beat them, 4-1, to grab a piece of the Cape Ann League title. We won the Cape Ann League Open, an individual tournament, which speaks to the depth of our team. And to have that match against Lynnfield -- who beat us during the season, 5-0, so not many people gave us a chance on paper. We kind of like it that




# Amazing 4th of July!



#### Of Flags and Flagpoles

ow best to manage the flying of various flags on the Manchester Town Hall Common has become a heated debate. The Select Board is very supportive of allowing commemorative flags to be flown that go along with Board proclamations that celebrate important events and represent the rich diversity of our community. For example, the Board has approved proclamations denoting June as "Pride Month" in Town to celebrate the LGBTQ+ community and has participated in the Pride flag raising events at Town Hall. The Town Hall flagpole has traditionally been in front of the Police Station. 

#### MBTA Zoning, Wobblin' Goblin, More Open Space, and Celebrating Ron Mastrogiacomo

There's a lot going on this season, including the state-mandated consideration in November of a zoning change to encourage added housing in Manchester, what's going on this year with the Wobblin' Goblin, chipping in \$250K in CPC funds for the Greenbelt's expansion of open space, and a public event next week to celebrate our own Ron Mastrogiacomo.

Manchester is bustling with key events and initiatives this season. Coming up on November 18, town meeting voters will decide on adopting state-mandated MBTA Zoning, which allows by-right multifamily housing with a 20 percent affordable component. The proposed overlay districts aim to address housing shortages and affordability, but critics fear overreach, threats to town character, and resource strain.

In remembrance, a Celebration of Life for Ron Mastrogiacomo, former Planning Board Chair and dedicated community member, will be held on October 25 at 2 p.m. at the American Legion Hall.

Halloween festivities continue with the expanded Wobblin' Goblin event on October 28. Starting at 9:30 a.m. at Town Hall, the parade includes stops for treats, ending at Masconomo Park with games, hayrides, a petting zoo, and more.

Finally, the Community Preservation Committee (CPC) has proposed allocating \$250,000 toward Essex County Greenbelt's purchase of 330 acres near Dexter's Pond, ensuring permanent conservation. The measure will be put to Manchester voters in November.



### ME Golf Completes Stellar Regular Season, Readies for Postseason



#### **State Overturns SLV** Denial, Town Plans Appeal

he Massachusetts Housing Appeals Committee has ruled in favor of developer Geoffrey Engler and the SLV housing project proposed for Shingle Place Hill off School Street in Manchester's Limited Commercial District. The town's Zoning Board of Appeals had voted August 16, 2022 to reject Engler's application for a comprehensive permit under the state's 40B regulations for the 136-unit apartment complex to be known as The Sanctuary at Manchester-by-the-Sea. Thirty-four of the units (25%) would be listed as affordable. Engler, the managing

partner of Strategic Land Ventures, had appealed the town's rejection to the state's Housing Appeals Committee (HAC) on September 15, 2022.

Now, more than two years later, the HAC produced a 60page draft decision in October that was shared publicly. Both sides were given two weeks to make small factual corrections to the decision, according to Town Administrator Greg Federspiel. The HAC signed the final decision the following month. The town's Select Board will appeal the state's issuance of the comprehensive project

ten to the discussion in the gymnasium and their comments and questions were broadcast to the gymnasium.

The final vote on the MBTA zoning article was 636 in favor, 214 against and 7 abstained.Planning Board and MBTA Zoning Task Force member Sue Philbrick explained the state law, its requirements and the Task Force's reasoning in choosing the areas to be re-zoned.

# Meanwhile ... Essex Voters Deny, Delay Historic Rezoning



hile Manchester residents packed their Special Town Meeting to address MBTA Zoning, Essex residents were busy at their own Fall Town Meeting, where they stopped the adoption of new zoning by the Planning Board that would

have dramatically expanded residential property protections because it was deemed anti-business and pushed too much gentrification, too quickly.

Most of the 386 residents at Monday's Fall Town Meeting voted to "indefinitely postpone" consideration of Article 3 that would have established two new residential districts covering most of Essex and would only consider business use in the districts by Special Permit.

The postponement gives the Planning Board's time to strike a better balance between residential business property use regulations and return to voters as soon as Spring 2025. Voters stopped short of outright rejecting the article, which would have prevented revisiting it for three years.

# Cell Signaling: Approved

iotech firm secures unanimous Planning Board approval for largest construction project in Manchester's history

After six months of hearings, the Manchester By-The-Sea Planning Board approved a special permit for Cell Signaling Technology at Monday night's meeting.

Well, that was all anti-climactic," said CST attorney Mark Glovsky after the board voted 6-0 in favor of the special per-

The project will be built in two phases. When completed it will have a 260,000 square foot laboratory, research and development facility, a 479-space parking garage and about 500 employees. It will be located at 2 Atwater Ave., just north of the Manchester Athletic Club.

The board spent about 40 minutes going over a draft of the special permit, making small adjustments and corrections.
