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

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Oak Manor Nursing Home Closes, At Least Temporarily

MCKENZIE (July 10) — Oak Manor Nursing Home, a skilled care facility, located on Oak Manor Road, McKenzie closed last week after 50 years of operations.

One local family indicated one of their elderly family members was a patient at Oak Manor. Last Wednesday, the family was advised the facility was closing and the elderly patient was transferred the next day to Douglas Health and Rehabilitation in Milan, a facility under the same ownership. The family member called it an emergency

move. Others patients had already been relocated to Douglas and other facilities, said the family member.

The family was happy with the care provided by Oak Manor. The family hopes Oak Manor can soon reopen. Oak Manor had great activities and did many recreational and educational events with the residents, said the family spokesperson.

The facility had sustained low patient numbers in recent years.

The Banner phoned personnel at

EF-1 Tornado Damages Cedar Grove Homes

Huntingdon Sonic Awning Felled by Torrential Rain

CEDAR GROVE (July 5) — On July 5 at approximately 7 p.m., a powerful thunderstorm producing fierce cloud-to-ground lightning and a heavy downpour of rain spawned a National Weather Service verified EF-1 tornado (wind speed 86-110 mph) that covered a section of Highway 70 with trees and debris, removed the roof of a home

Funeral services for a Henry County woman, who lost her life during flash flooding at Cummins Fall State Park last week, were Tuesday, July 11 at Ridgeway Funeral Home, Paris.

Peggy McDaniel, 73, was a former LPN for McKenzie Medical Center and Dr. Volker Winkler.

Approximately 40 persons

were rescued from the water during the ordeal. McDaniel and other family members were trapped when a rush of water hit early Wednesday afternoon. McDaniel was reportedly with her son, daughter-in-law and grandchildren and trying to walk across the creek when they lost grip on McDaniel.

Rescue and recovery teams combed the area. The recovery ended a three-day search at the

McKenzie Planners Hear Update on Dollar Tree, Best Western

McKenzie Municipal-Regional Planning Commission met June 28 for its regular monthly meeting.

The commission heard three reports from Chairman Dean Robb.

Mr. Robb announced the Dollar Tree/Family Dollar project, on which construction has stopped for more than two years, has some new activity. The firm of Clark, Geer, Latham and Associates, Mobile, Alabama, Consulting Engineers, has been retained for this project and will be working with Ricky Watkins, McKenzie Building Inspector and others to complete the project. The unfinished project is located at the intersection of Oak Street and Highland Drive.

The owners of Best Western Motel, Highland Drive, McKenzie intends to purchase property behind its current location and will request subdivision

Carroll County Relay For Life-North, South Reunite

Carroll County Relay For Life north and south units joined forces for the first time in many years to host a single event of Relay For Life at the Carroll County Civic Center on Friday, July 7. The July 7 event was rescheduled from June 23, when Tropical Storm Cindy dumped rains on Tennessee.

Relay For Life started in Carroll County on May 21, 1997 at the McKenzie City Park. There was only one event in the county with teams throughout the county participating. Ramona Washburn of McKenzie was the first chairwoman. The late Ross Martin was the first honorary co-chairman. The first event raised \$30,000.

The 2017 event raised \$85,249.77.

Last Annual Vol State Road Race Returns Thursday

For most, the middle of July is a time when the daily trip to the mailbox is more than enough time under the hot, summer sun, but, for a bravely deranged few, it's the perfect time to hit the open road for 314 miles of unforgetting Tennessee terrain in the Last Annual Vol State Road Race.

The 500-kilometer ultramarathon begins in the early hours of Thursday, July 13 in Dorena Landing, Missouri, and ends in Castle Rock, Georgia, winding through Tennessee by highway and country road. Over 30-plus years, the course has undergone several changes, and one reroute enacted several years ago brings the runners through downtown McKenzie, 56 miles into the journey.

Runners compete in two classes, crewed and uncrewed, or "screwed." Crewed runners have a team that provides aid during the race, and the rest are at the mercy of the road and anyone they meet along the way.

Last year, a small group of race enthusiasts established an aid station at the McKenzie farmers market and gathered resources from volunteers and local organizations.

Gary "Laz" Cantrell, the creator of the race, told The Banner last year, "McKenzie is a star in this race. People love coming through this beautiful little town."

In his usual announcement, Laz said, "The pre-race favorite is Andrew Snipe of Los Angeles, California. He is expected to face stiff challenges from Greg South of Quincy, Massachusetts, and Matt Collins of New York City. Greg Myers, of El Dorado, Kansas, is the dark horse in the field."

"The women's co-favorites are Kathy Youngren of Owens Crossroads, Alabama, and Jennifer Caravallo of Pompano Beach, Florida, although Francesca Muccini out of Nashville is expected to make some noise on her home turf (or maybe we should say asphalt.)"

The core members from McKenzie's group of "road angels" (as runners lovingly refer to such

volunteers) are preparing to support them again and hope to improve on last year's much-appreciated efforts, having gained tons of input from both participants and organizers.

Last year, the first runner passed through McKenzie at 4:50 p.m. Thursday. The rest trickled through over the hours that followed, peaking during the first half of Friday.

Aid station organizers have most of the needed supplies accounted for, but welcome others to join in their effort. Volunteers are invited to bring the following items: comfortable lawn chairs, phone chargers, Vaseline, salt, watermelon and any appropriate food. Those bringing hot or cold food will need to also provide a way to keep the items at an appropriate temperature. Outlets will be available, but limited.

McKenzie Council Hears Long-Term Concerns About Sewer System

MCKENZIE (June 29) — The city council met Thursday afternoon in a special called meeting to hold a public hearing and a second and final reading on the budget for the next fiscal year. Councilpersons also addressed other issues, including the long-term concerns about the city's sewer system during the meeting.

The council heard a presentation by Jim Hilborn, P.E., of GRW Engineering & Architects and Frank Tate, Executive Director of the McKenzie Industrial Board.

SEWER SYSTEM CONCERN

Hilborn explained the history and current status of the city's wastewater system, outlining the upgrades, rehabilitation, and tests that have been conducted in the past ten years and what was still left to be done. He explained that the remaining repairs would be roughly \$2.25 million, and

offered the suggestion to apply for a Rural Development loan.

Tate spoke about the limitations of the current system being a hindrance to attracting new industry, particularly large industries that would employ a substantial number of workers. He was hopeful, though, that if the city has a plan to resolve the issues, even several years down the road, he can begin to secure some businesses with long-term plans.

Hilborn and Tate strongly urged the council to move forward by allowing them to submit a Rural Development application.

Mayor Holland said that it will appear on the July 2017 agenda.

The city has addressed the issue over a 10-year period, making \$500,000 repairs to the system on an annual or bi-annual basis to correct the stormwater infiltration into the system. The state of Tennessee Department of Conservation and Environment placed the city on a moratorium,

um, restricting any large users of water and sewer. That occurred during the previous city administration, which, along with the current administration, worked to incrementally correct the situation. Insituform was contracted to install inner liners in the sewer system lines. In doing so, the company made cuts in the streets, such as the pavement patches along South Main Street. Last year, the city approved a major renovation to the wastewater plant on Clark Street in McKenzie.

In March 2016, the city board approved Moore Construction Company as the contractor for that phase of the sewer rehabilitation project. The Clarksville company has been the contractor on each of the other Community Development Block Grant sewer rehabilitation projects. Water rates were increased slightly to help pay for the sewer system plant rehabilitation.



owned by Richard and Carolyn Brooks at 8225 Highway 70 and forced a large spruce tree onto the roof of a home belonging to Mrs. A. P. Fry, 8095 Highway 70.

Following the storm, TDOT crews worked feverishly for approximately two hours to clear tree limbs and debris from a closed section of Highway 70.

At the Brooks residence, a friend said the owners were electing to stay inside the home and protect their belongings until additional law or military personnel arrived to secure the couple's property.

Brooks is owner / operator of Home Furnishing of Cedarhurst located a short distance from his residence. The business received slight storm damage.

Utilizing a drone to aerially survey and video storm damage to the Brook's home, barn and equipment shelter, WBBJ-TV 7 meteorologist Tom Meiners said the storm's powerful winds were responsible for substantial structural damage in the area.

He said, "The damage is definitely the result of a significant

wind event. The storm created a definable path through the woods before crossing Highway 70 and impacting homes. We are awaiting verification from the National Weather Service as to the nature of the wind event."

Examining the heavily-damaged electrical meter box clinging to the Brook residence, Milan Public Utility District electrician Jim Sutcliffe said, "I work a whole lot of storms, and I see a lot of damage caused by straight line winds. However, gauging by the numerous angles that trees fell in the visible path of the storm, I would think that some possible circular wind motion was at play here. Whatever it was, the storm was moving fast and did a sizeable amount of damage while it was here."

Taking a momentary break from chain-sawing sections of a spruce tree sprawled on top of his grandmother's home, Robert Tart said, "My grandfather, the late Arville Fry, built this home back in 1937. My family and I had just replaced the roof not long ago."

He added, "You know, my grandmother always said that spruce trees should never be planted near a house. She was right."

Robert's brother, Randy Mc-

Minn of Jackson, added, "The storm that came through here uprooted some big oak trees, too. That tells you how strong the winds were. I'm just thankful that we can fix the damage and that no one was hurt inside the home. We were lucky with this one. I wouldn't be surprised by the trees being bent in so many directions that it was a tornado."

Huntingdon Sonic Drive-In owner Josh Grant said the damage sustained to his store's awning was probably due to torrential rains.

He said, "I was in Lexington when the storm hit, but my employees said the volume of rain it contained was unbelievable. I would not doubt that the partial collapse of the awning was due to the weight of rain collecting on the roof of the building."

Grant added, "I wish our insurance adjuster can make it out today so we can start replacing the damaged section of awning, but I know that is highly-unlikely due to all the damaged homes in our area. They have to take care of those issues first, and I truly understand. We are okay."

He concluded, "I am thankful that nothing worse happened. We are open and serving the public."



CCHS Offers Cheap Fix for Dogs Friday

The Carroll County Humane Society is excited to announce funding through a Bissell Pet Foundation grant for low-cost spay or neuter surgeries for dogs. Vouchers will be available beginning Friday, July 14 from 8 a.m.-1:30 p.m.

Per this grant, the program is available to residents of Carroll, Weakley, and Henry counties. Vouchers are \$30 each. Pet owners must complete a form at Carroll County Humane Society, pay the \$30, and be ready to schedule the procedure at the time of purchase. The participating clinic for this program is Huntingdon Animal Clinic.

Dogs need to be at least twelve weeks old, weigh at least two pounds and have had all of their puppy shots or adult shots to participate. This is for the safety of your pets. Vouchers cover only the cost of the surgery. Vaccinations, medications, deworm-

er, etc. are the responsibility of the pet owner.

The animal will need to be dropped off by 8 a.m. and picked up between 3:30-5 p.m. on the scheduled day of surgery at Huntingdon Animal Clinic.

Vouchers are non-transferable and non-refundable unless you get in touch with CCHS at least 24 hours prior to your appointment. They are usually able to fill in vacant slots or reschedule if given the time to do so.

Additionally, CCHS does still have grant funding for low-cost cat spay and neuter surgeries. Those vouchers are also \$30, available at Carroll County Humane Society to residents of any county. The participating clinic for those vouchers is Paris Veterinary Clinic.


If dog vouchers are still available after Friday, an update will appear on the CCHS Facebook page.

Miss Anita Hale just always was. I don't remember "meeting" her. No one said, "There's this nice lady living over on Forrest Avenue." I don't remember the first time I went home with Ricky. It was before we started to elementary school.

Miss Anita had a lot going for her right off the bat. She had that good laugh. And she knew how to share it. She could really cook. That counts for more than you know when you go to picking whose house you need to be playing at come super time! She liked little boys...she raised Gene, Ricky and Randy, plus me and the Mabry boys next door and anyone else her sons drug home. And I especially liked that she was always telling me what a special lady my Mother was.

They had a TV. And this was like, 1955. I took to spending the night over there so I could wake up with Captain Kangaroo. She would fix breakfast, let us take it into the living room and eat on the floor right in front of the set. I'm telling you, I felt like one of those Egyptian pharaohs, she was waiting on us so.

Mr. Arvie Hale wasn't so accommodating on Saturday nights. If me or Rick made a little noise during Gunsmoke he'd lay that Lucky Strike down and threaten us with bodily harm if we didn't hush.

Ricky was the middle son. Just like me. We allowed that it was a tough position. One parent doted on the oldest and both "took care" of the youngest. The middle child was just naturally overlooked and under appreciated. We'd complain to Miss Anita. She'd throw her head back and through the laughter proclaim, "Don't neither one of you look like

you're suffering too much!"

Miss Anita was our CNN anchor lady. She knew everything about everybody in town. She was the first to know who got hired out at the Dairy Bar. Who was visiting their kinfolks in Memphis. Who'd run off with the International Harvester tractor salesman from Paducah. What was playing next week at the Park Theatre. Who was thinking about getting married and who wished they weren't!

I think it all stemmed from her job at Mr. James Williams' Ben Franklin Store. Listen, there wasn't a soul in town that didn't filter through that five and ten cent building looking for some sewing material, writing paper or Brach's candy in a week's time. It became customary to "visit" with Miss Anita as you perused the aisles. She didn't take notes mind you, but she kept track nevertheless. And don't let that friendliness or her diminutive size fool you. She could be tough as whit leather if the occasion demanded. She's set me and Ricky straight any number of times.

And when Mr. Arvie came home a little on the gruff side, I've seen him get the same treatment!

That was a by product of her upbringing down in Yuma, Tennessee, in the 1920's. The town consisted mostly of cotton gins and sawmills. It wasn't a time or place for the faint of heart.

Yuma is where Miss Anita's dad kept the machine that made fake one hundred dollar bills. The whole community swore it would turn out perfect looking "Franklins" just as fast as you could "ink it" and crank the

handle.

Dwayne Melton, a cousin, was rumored to have inherited the lucrative contraption. I know he didn't have much when he moved up from Clarksburg...and bought that big house and barn and new pick-up and cattle and all those show horses. I dated his daughter for years hoping to find some cash floating around in the basement.

Needless to say, Ricky and I never got a cent out of that machine. But he did help make those school years tolerable. We played ball together, had pillow fights, explored the world via the Park Theatre, smoked our first cigarette in that ditch across from his house and rode his Moped all over town. He, and his family, are as entwined in my formative years as anyone on earth.

Maybe that's why I wound myself by that familiar white house on Forrest Avenue just a couple of years back. Mother had passed away and I was home taking care of a few things. It just seemed natural to check in. It dawned on me about the time I knocked that Miss Anita might not recognize a guy showing up out of nowhere from her distant past... "Kesley Colbert," she laughed before I could say a word, her hug like I remembered, "I'm so sorry to hear about your Mother. Ophelia was such a dear person."

Anita Hale celebrates her one hundredth birthday this week. She's one of the last remnants of some shining times.

I hope she lives forever.



MCKENZIE (June 30) — McKenzie Memorial Library's Summer Reading Program closed Friday with a presentation by Super Science TN's Mr. Rich, a perennial favorite for local readers.


This year, the theme of Mr. Rich's program was "Build a Better World." As always, the Super Scientist wowed the kids and grown-ups alike with his feats that seem like magic until he explains the science behind each trick.

He used a Tesla coil to demonstrate how electricity flows, giving brave volunteers a small shock through various conduits.

He created a comet, or "dirty snowball," before their eyes using dirt, ammonia, water, syrup and dry ice.

He made water "disappear" from a cup using the powder typically used in disposable diapers, which he explained is also what astronauts use to go to the bathroom in space.

Finally, he had all of the kids participate in constructing a

Carpet odors: Sprinkle with baking soda. Leave 2 to 3 hours. Then vacuum.

Rust Stains: Dissolve 1 teaspoon oxalic acid crystals in $\frac{1}{2}$ cup water. Drip over rust spot only. When the spot has been removed, neutralize with household ammonia and rinse thoroughly.

Mix all ingredients together. Pour into crust. Bake for 45 minutes. Cool for 1 hour. Pour pie filling and spread over cheese cake.

$\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon pepper

1 teaspoon curry powder

3-pound chicken

Wild rice

Cook covered with water. Cook until done. Cook wild rice as directed except substitute water for broth. Add can of cream of mushroom soup and 8-ounce carton sour cream. Mix chicken with rice. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 minutes, covered and uncovered for 10 minutes.





NASHVILLE (July 5) — Despite the remnants of Hurricane Cindy raining on competitors for two days. More than 1,300 youth athletes from middle school to college persisted through five full days of co-ed competition in three shotgun shooting sports disciplines: trap, skeet and sporting clays in the 2017 Tennessee Scholastic Clay Target Program State Championships on June 20-24 in Nashville.

Individuals and teams from all corners of the state competed for titles in nearly 70 categories.

At tournament's end, McKenzie Shooting Sports, comprised of shooters throughout Carroll County, earned first place in Sporting Clays-Rookie Team; Trap-Rookie Team; Combined Highest Overall-Rookie Team and second place in Skeet-Rookie Team.

In collegiate competition, Bethel University earned first place in Skeet, Sporting Clays and Trap.

Henry County No Fly Zone earned first place in Skeet-Varsity Team, first in Combined Highest Overall-Intermediate Team; third in Skeet-Intermediate Advanced Team, and third place in Trap-Intermediate Advanced Team.

"Every year, we're impressed with the commitment of our student athletes—and the coaches and parents who support them. But this year hit a new high," said Andrew Peery, Tennessee Scholastic Clay Target Program Manager. "The remnants of Hurricane Cindy dumped rain on competitors

Thursday and Friday but they continued to shoot, unfazed, through it all."

The governing body of the sport in Tennessee is the Tennessee Scholastic Clay Target Program, an initiative of Tennessee Wildlife Federation, one of the largest and oldest nonprofits dedicated to the conservation of Tennessee's wildlife and natural resources. Tennessee Scholastic Clay Target Program introduces youth to the shooting sports and recruits them into an outdoor lifestyle.

"Our winners embody discipline and we're excited to see many move on to Nationals the week of July 10," said Peery. "But all of our competitors represent the future of outdoor enthusiasts in Tennessee and, by extension, the future of our state's wildlife."

Hunters and anglers are the main source of funding wildlife conservation in Tennessee and are leading advocates for policies that promote good stewardship of our natural resources. But for every ten sportsmen today, only seven are growing up to take their place.


