Former Mustang Football Standout Drowns in Illinois


Rocky Bolen, 20, a 2015 Huntingdon High School graduate and former Mustang football standout, died while swimming at a national park in Illinois on Saturday afternoon at approximately 1:00 p.m. According to David Bunn, chief deputy of the Carroll County (Tenn) Sheriff's Department, Bolen was camping with friends on Friday and Saturday at Shawnee National Park in Illinois. Bunn, a

relative of Bolen's, said the young man was swimming with two of his friends in One Horse Gap Lake when the young men decided to swim from point a to point b. Unable to swim the distance, Bolen went under. Responding, his companions, along with passing horse riders, unsuccessfully attempted to rescue him.

FIREFIGHTERS BATTLE TRAIN FIRE

TREZEVANT (August 7) — Firefighters responded to a fire on a CSX train on Sunday evening, August 7 between McKenzie and Trezevant.

According to Janice Newman, director of the Carroll County Emergency Management Agency, the county's rural fire brigades were notified around 9:00 p.m. of a CSX train engine on fire. The southbound train stopped just outside of Trezevant in a sparsely populated area of the county. Firefighters from the county brigades located at Trezevant, Atwood, McLemoresville, and Huntingdon responded. Upon arrival, firefighters cleared a path through the wooded area between the track and U.S. 79, extended a ladder up the steep rail bed, to get to the engine.

Firefighters had to open side panels on the locomotive to reveal the fire, which was believed to be fueled by diesel fuel and hydraulic fluids.

U.S. 79 was closed as tanker trucks shuttled water from fire hydrants in Trezevant to a drop tank on the scene. Pumper trucks drafted water from the portable supply tank and onto the fire.

Schools Report Preliminary Enrollment

Schools in Carroll County reported preliminary enrollment numbers on Monday. Officials at each of the schools noted preliminary enrollment numbers are always subject to change and vary until as late as the end of August.

In McKenzie, preliminary enrollment is 1,299. At McKenzie Elementary (Pre-K to grade 4) enrollment is 488, McKenzie Middle School (grades 5-8) enrollment is 375; and McKenzie High School is 436.

Huntingdon reported preliminary enrollment at 1,218. At Huntingdon Primary (Pre-K to grade 3), enrollment is 403, Huntingdon Middle School (grades 4 to 8) is 480, and at Huntingdon High School is 335.

West Carroll reported preliminary enrollment at 925. West Carroll Primary (McLemoresville, Pre-K to grade 2) is 194; West Carroll Elementary (Trezevant, grade 3 to 6) is 285; and West Carroll Jr./Sr. High (Atwood, grades 7-12) is 446.

A total of 2,295 voters cast ballots in 2016 as compared to 5,578 in the year 2014, when the county had local county elections in addition to the state

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

Bethel University Holds Summer 2016 Commencement

MCKENZIE — Bethel University held its Summer 2016 Commencement on Saturday, August 6 with 271 candidates receiving degrees. Degrees awarded included bachelor's, master's and associate degrees.

According to Bethel University President Dr. Walter Butler the event also kicked off a year-long celebration of the school's 175th birthday.

Serving as Commencement speaker was Nancy Bean, recently retired Vice President of Bethel's College of Arts and Sciences. Bean, a Bethel graduate herself, and a lifelong supporter of Bethel University, was granted the school's prestigious Doctor of Humane Letters for her many contributions to education.

Bean congratulated the graduates as well as all the people at the ceremony.

Big Fish Strands Angler In Obion River Bottom

An angler was stranded at the big fish he hooked caused him to swamp his 14-foot boat in the Obion River tributary along U.S. 79 near McKenzie.

David "Rooster" Greer was stranded approximately one hour after his boat sunk and he stood in waist-deep water in an area known for its significant snake population.

Greer said he had hooked a catfish, which twisted and turned causing him to swamp boat. Greer stood in the small boat and was in plain sight of U.S. 79 and near the railroad bridge.

He said he "waved and hollered" for approximately one hour. The friendly people of the South just waved back and did not realize he was stranded. Finally, his situation was reported to authorities and McKenzie Fire/Rescue responded to the scene. Utilizing an extension ladder, Austin Bennett, Daniel Hollowell, Robert Ross, and Michael Hudson walked the railroad to the scene and extended the ladder down to the angler. Greer then climbed to the overhead railroad bed and abandoned

his boat. CSX Railroad was alerted of the situation of the rescuers on the tracks.

Greer said he is a long-time angler in the bottom and was very familiar with the terrain.

McKenzie Emergency Medical Services and the Carroll County Sheriff's Department also responded to the scene.

and federal primaries.

The most contested race was that of U.S. Representative-District 8 with 13 Republicans and two Democrats in the primaries. Overall, David Kustoff and Democrat Rickey Hobson won their respective primaries in the multi-county district. The two will face each other in the November general election. In Carroll County, it was Dr. George Flinn who received the most votes with 611 compared to 443 for Kustoff, and Brad Greer of Jackson receiving 300, Brian Kelsey received 239, Mark Luttrell 87, Ken Atkins 35, Hunter Baker 34, Tom Leatherwood 24, Dave Bault and David Wharton 6 each, Raymond Honeycutt 5, George Howell 4, and David Maldonado 2.

Daniel Williams (R-Huntingdon) was unsuccessful in his challenge to incumbent Curtis Halford (R-Dyer) for House District 79 representing Gibson and a portion of Carroll counties. In Carroll, Williams received the majority with 601 votes to Halford's 492, however, Halford bested Williams by a total of 2,510 to 1,100 in Gibson County to earn 63.70 percent of the total vote.

In District 76 State House - Andy Holt (R-Dresden) received 602 votes in Carroll in

his uncontested race in the Republican primary. Overall, Holt received 2,426 in Carroll, Obion and Weakley counties. Angela Callis received 163 in Carroll in her uncontested race in the Democratic primary. Overall, she received 733 in Carroll, Obion, and Weakley counties. Holt and Callis will face Bennie Castleman (I-Martin) in the November general election.

Tim Wirgau (R-Buchanan) easily earned the Republican nomination for Tennessee House District 75 over James Poe. Wirgau garnered 3,606 votes compared to Poe's 2,452 in the counties of Henry, Stewart, and Benton. In November, Wirgau will face Democratic challenger Daniel Powell, who received 1,736 votes in the uncontested primary.

John Stevens (R-Huntingdon) received 1,311 complimentary votes in the county in the Tennessee 24th Senate District. In the five-county district, Stevens received 9,474 votes. He faces no Democratic challenger in the November election.

West Carroll School District Board of Education will have two new faces. William Robinson of Atwood won the seat for the Old Atwood District in an uncontested bid. He received 157 votes. Kristi Moore did not seek reelection for the seat.

Misty Mitchell received 153 votes in her uncontested bid for the Old Trezevant District seat. Greg McClain did not seek re-election.

Kyle Foster won the Old Trezevant District seat with 119 votes over Joe Fowler who received 40. Foster was previously appointed to the board.

Winning re-election was Michael Foster with 217 votes for the Old County District seat. Foster was unopposed.

In the McKenzie Special School District, John Austin (335 votes) and Lance Rider (327 votes) won re-election. Brad Davis returns to the board with 328 votes. All three ran at-large for three seats.

Tim Tucker and Vicki Williams were re-elected with 513 and 551 votes respectively. Both ran at-large for the two available seats.

Brad Hurley of Bruceton (86 votes), Tim Runions of Hollow Rock (58 votes), Vicki Brown of the Vale District (35 votes), and Joseph Stephen Robinson of Westport-Spanish Grove District (14 votes) won re-election in their unopposed contests for Hollow Rock-Bruceton School Board.

In the Carroll County School Board race, Harold McClain, Jr. (District 1, 556 votes), Tonya Phifer (District 2, 486 votes), Kenna Bailey, (District 3, 593 votes) won re-election in their uncontested races.

In South Carroll School Board race, Corey Bartholomew (163 votes), Jeremy Gurley (137 votes) and Philip Moore (157 votes) won in their uncontested bids for the three at-large seats.

Nolen Appointed to Fill Commission Vacancy

HUNTINGDON (August 8) — Lori Nolen, executive director of the Dixie Carter Performing Arts Center, was appointed to fill the District 5 – Huntingdon vacancy created by the resignation of Buster Barger, who moved from the county. Nolen sought the nomination, which was open to any registered voter residing in District 5. She will fill the vacancy until the November general election, when candidates can seek the unexpired two years of Barger's term.

Nolen is a Henry County native, married to Clay Nolen and they have two children, Johns, 5, and Heston, 1.

We immediately took the oath of office as administered by Mayor Kenny McBride.

Joann Long of Atwood addressed commissioners concerning the lack of sheriff's patrol in the Atwood area. The City of Atwood does not have a police department and the sheriff's department does not monitor speed nor write citations for speeding

with electronic devices. The department does cite driver for driving violations. She said drivers often speed and disregard traffic signage in the Bryant and Brooks Road area. She said she was almost involved in a traffic accident recently because of another driver, who had such disregard for safety. She asked commissioners for their support and asked for additional patrols in the area or the financial resources for the sheriff's department to add deputies to monitor the geographic area. She did note Sheriff Andy Dickson asked the Tennessee Highway Patrol to monitor the area, however, they too stopped because of low traffic volume.

Charles Curtiss, executive director of the Tennessee County Commissioners Association, spoke to commissioners. He said he was available any time and encouraged commissioners to be active in the association. Area county commissioners were invited to attend training at Paris Landing State Park on September

1 or at a later date in Jackson.

In other business, Carroll County commissioners approved the following resolutions:

Resolution 8-1-2016, a resolution to appoint Linda Inman to the Carroll County Library Board with term ending June, 2019;

Resolution 8-2-2016, a resolution to appoint Meredith Surber and John Mann to the Carroll County Indigent Care Board with term ending September, 2019;

Resolution 8-3-2016, a resolution to amend the budget for Carroll County Clerk and Master from General Fund to Mark S. DeBruce from 2006 Tax Sale.

Notaries public elected were: Angela Jones, Wanda McMackin, Alacia Mitchell, Brenda Spencer and Larry Spencer.

Mayor Kenny McBride noted the death of Wayne Kirk, commissioner of District 1. His vacancy will be filled in the November general election. Qualifying deadline for the seat is August 18 at the Carroll County Election Commission.

Firefighters left the scene after approximately two hours. Newman said there were no injuries and no haz-mat materials were involved. In addition to the four rural brigades, emergency personnel included members of the Carroll County Sheriff's Department, the county Haz-Mat team, and the Tennessee Emergency Management Agency.

A special response crew from CSX was left in charge of the scene. Newman said the CSX crew planned to remove the disabled engine from the main track – possibly moving it to a side track - and later tow it from the scene.

Dr. Smothers graduated from the University of Tennessee College of Pharmacy in 1974 and began her career as a relief pharmacist in community pharmacy before becoming employed by Carroll County General Hospital in Huntingdon in 1975, where she organized the pharmacy department. In 1998, Dr. Smothers completed an MBA in Health Services Management, and continues to work for the hospital, now Baptist Memorial Hospital-Huntingdon, as Pharmacy Director and Ancillary Services Manager.

Dr. Smothers has built a lasting and distinguished career within the profession of pharmacy. In particular, during her service in 2015 as the President of the Tennessee Board of Pharmacy, Dr. Smothers made significant professional contributions to moving the profession of pharmacy forward in the area of patient care.

During Dr. Smothers' tenure on the Board of Pharmacy, she chaired the Board's effort to address a complete rules revision of Tennessee's compounding rules, and in particular, sterile compounding practice. Through this effort, she guided

The adoption of these rules will authorize pharmacists, student pharmacists, and pharmacy technicians to provide the highest level of care possible to their patients through new models of care and a more collaborative, team-based approach.

Additionally, Dr. Smothers has been a long-time member of the Tennessee Pharmacists Association (TPA), served as President of the Tennessee Society of Health-System Pharmacists (TSHP, a society within the TPA) from 2001-2002, and worked on various committees within TSHP. She received the 2002 TSHP Health-System Pharmacist of

the Year Award, and Baptist Memorial Hospital-Huntingdon received the 1996 TSHP Innovative Pharmacy Practice Award. She has further contributed to her community through her work with Huntingdon Business and Professional Women's Club.

The Tom C. Sharp Pharmacist of the Year Award is sponsored by the Tennessee Pharmacists Association in honor of Tom C. Sharp, Sr., who had served as the Association's chief executive for 30 years, and also honors the service of his son, Tom C. 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

'Double, Double Toil and Trouble'

"Don't go up on the third floor no matter what." Leon was wearing his serious look. "There's creatures and haints and things that will eat you up behind every door." I swallowed hard. I knew it was going to be bad. "And be careful going into the bathrooms. THEY wait in the stalls for little seventh graders!" But I had no idea... It's the reason August has always been my least favorite month. You just couldn't possibly imagine how "going back to school" ruined a perfectly good summer. We'd start dreading it as soon as the Independence Day festivities trailed off into the sunset. It was like dropping into a dungeon. But this was going to be the year to end all years! The seventh grade meant moving to the big high school building. It meant changing classes. It meant a different teacher every hour. You had to keep your books in some locker and just carry what you needed to each class. Me and Ricky and Buddy were lost already... and we hadn't even gotten there yet! I didn't know who THEY were, waiting to devour me. But I purposed in my heart I was not going to the bathroom for the whole year. THEY had to be really big and mean and surely deranged. Leon was a rising senior. And, as the older brother, he was naturally helping me all he could. "Course, my little mind didn't need much prompting. I was already conjuring up all kinds of things that could go wrong. Like fainting from sheer fright when I couldn't find my first class; getting run over by stampeding sophomores; or being captured by those "things" up on the third floor.

And you ought to have seen the size of that old building! It actually blocked out the sun when you came down that little hill in front of Jim Williams' house. I think it was erected by Egyptians during the Ming Dynasty. It had stocks and leg stretchers for bad little boys and girls. And Leon knew two people who'd been laid out on the rack. "You can't believe any of those teachers and they especially don't like boys who grew up on Stonewall Street." Leon had a world of experience. "Be careful not to cross Coach Campbell. He carries a paddle in his back pocket. Don't let Bob Edwards fall on you at football practice. The water in the front hall fountain is piped in from the ditch behind the gym. Don't eat the 'turnip greens' the day after Mr. Featherstone cuts the grass." but it was about more than a body could take in. It was the earliest August we'd ever had. The first school day leaped on us way before we were ready. I walked as slow as I could toward this latest bout with destiny, pondering on life, liberty and what might be alive up on the third floor. And wondering if I ought to tell my homeroom teacher I really live over on East Paris Avenue no matter what it says on my form. Buddy was out front waiting for me. "Heber, this doesn't look good." I agreed with him even though neither of us had been inside yet...or seen, or not seen, anything. "I don't think anybody ever died from showing up for the seventh grade." I wasn't sure if I was trying to convince Buddy, myself or sending a message to THEY in the bathroom stalls.

LaRenda, Ruth Ann, Pam, Janice, Jane and Suzie were just buzzing around like they didn't have a care in the world, laughing and grinning and carrying on to beat the band. It just galled us to death! Mrs. Bryant didn't smile one lick when she called the roll. She only paused, and looked up, when she got down to my name, "Are you any kin to Leon Colbert?" "No ma'am. And I don't live on Stonewall Street and I ain't going into the bathroom, eating any turnip greens or drinking out of that fountain in the front hall!" We followed John Ingram and Billy Thompson to Mrs. Cox's math class. P. E. looked like the only subject I could pass. Mr. Rogers taught history and coached the junior high football team. The real bummer was most all my classes were on the first floor but my locker was on the second. I grabbed my papers as fast as I could and leaped back down those stairs before the rumblings from above overtook me. Coach Rogers didn't even put us in a position that first afternoon at practice. He just ran us. And ran us. And ran us. Ricky said he was preparing us in case one of those creatures from upstairs got loose. You've never seen a boy so proud to get back home that evening. I was battered but unbowed. And I have done some more philosophizing over the years on that August day of long ago. I figure if a boy can, and does, survive the first day of the seventh grade, the rest of life ought to be a snap for him!


Correction

New Staff Announced at Board Meeting

ATWOOD (August 4) — The West Carroll Board of Education held a brief meeting Thursday evening. Newly-hired staff were announced, and many of the new faces were present and introduced to the board by school principals. Several other items of business were discussed, including approval of an emergency purchase for the primary school.

Beginning their first term in the West Carroll district are David Dillard, Mark Yarbro, David Hale, Adam Cooper, Marian Jones, Larry Williams, Pam Bryant, B.J. Cobb, Nikki Hartz, Josephine Williams, Bridget Baker, Beverly Keymon, Rachel L. Johns, Rusty Dawson, Paul Acuff and Hunter Herrin.

A freezer/cooler duo will need to be replaced at the primary school as soon as possible as the cooler is unusable. The board considered a pair of quotes and voted unanimously to approve the purchase of a \$31,573 unit from Jackson Restaurant Supply, along with a budget amendment. A surplus in the Child Nutrition budget will cover the purchase. Even with the quick action by the

board, it will be approximately four weeks before the unit will be in use.

The board heard a request from new softball coach Paul Acuff for approximately \$2,000 worth of improvements such as field conditioner, rakes, drags, bases, and other tools for field maintenance. He noted that if he can get these basic improvements, he wants his players to then take ownership to keep maintaining and improving the facilities. He offered to do whatever fundraising he could for those and future expenditures. Chairman Jimmy Halford said that he didn't anticipate a problem with the board taking care of his requests, and it would be put on the next agenda. New baseball coach David Dillard requested a few improvements for that program as well, and Halford echoed his previous statement.

In other business, the board approved renewal of memberships in the Tennessee School Board Association and Tennessee Small School Equity. Also, final approval was given for list of policy updates, and first readings were held on a pair of other policy updates. One sets a policy on the use of service animals in district

facilities, and the other gives the district flexibility to set a tuition fee for non-resident students in the future. There is currently no fee, and there is no plan to institute one in the near future.

In principal updates, WCES principal Molly Ashley announced that open house will be Tuesday, August 9 from 6-7 p.m. Junior/senior high principal Dexter Williams announced that open house will be Thursday, August 11 from 6-7 p.m.

Williams also mentioned the need for uniforms for the new cross-country team. After some debate about the best procedural method to utilize, the board agreed unanimously to accept a telephone request for approval of the purchase the following Monday. The cross-country team will begin competition in the coming weeks, and uniforms will take around one month to receive.

In her updates, interim Director of Schools Betty Wallace reported on the Financial Statement for 2015-16, announcing that the district was \$260,000 in the black for the year.

The meeting adjourned in under an hour.

In a large bowl, combine bread cubes and milk; let stand 5 minutes. Drain, reserving excess milk. Place bread in a greased 8-inch square baking dish; set aside. In a large bowl, whisk eggs, salt, pepper and reserved milk. In a large skillet, heat 2 tablespoons butter over medium heat. Add egg mixture; cook and stir until

set. Spoon egg mixture over bread cubes. Top with cheese. Melt remaining butter, add bread crumbs. Sprinkle over cheese. Top with bacon. Cover and chill 8 hours or overnight. Remove from the refrigerator 30 minutes before baking. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 35 minutes or until a knife inserted near the center comes out clean. Let stand 5 minutes before cutting. Yield 8 servings

BACON POPOVERS

1 cup all-purpose flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 eggs
1 cup milk
1 tablespoon canola oil
3 bacon strips, cooked and crumbled

In a large bowl, combine flour and salt. Combine the eggs, milk and oil; whisk into the dry ingredients just until blended. Using a 12-cup muffin tin, grease and flour five alternating cups. Fill two-thirds full with batter. Sprinkle with bacon. Fill empty cups two-thirds full with water. Bake at 400 degrees for 15 minutes. Reduce heat to 350 degrees (do not open oven door). Bake 15 minutes longer or until deep

golden brown (do not over-bake). Yield 1 dozen.

CARAMEL FRUIT DIP

2 packages (8 ounces each) cream cheese, softened
1 cup packed brown sugar
1/2 cup caramel ice cream topping
Assorted fresh fruit

In a small bowl, beat cream cheese and brown sugar until smooth. Beat in caramel topping until blended. Serve with fruit. Yield 3 cups.

OLD FASHIONED LEMONADE

2 to 2 1/2 cups sugar
5 cups water, divided
1 tablespoon grated lemon peel
1 3/4 cups lemon juice (about 6 lemons)

In a large saucepan, combine sugar, 1 cup water and lemon peel. Cook and stir over medium heat until sugar is dissolved, about 4 minutes. Remove from the heat. Stir in lemon juice and remaining water. Pour into a pitcher and refrigerate until chilled. Serve over ice. Yield 2 quarts.



All proceeds will go to the Carroll County Humane Society for care, vetting, and housing. All donations are tax deductible.

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

Rebel Field Has New Name

McKENZIE (July 5) — The hallowed ground formerly known as Rebel Field has undergone a name change. Friday evening, long time coach, Randy Thomas was recognized for his dedication to McKenzie athletics as the football field was named in his honor.

The honor came as a surprise to Thomas. "I looked up and saw the blue cover, but I had no idea it was concerning me. Then when I looked and saw my family coming out on the field, especially my parents, and I knew there was something. I still didn't know what it was, so it was a total surprise."

Thomas's career began at McKenzie

Junior High School in the fall 1979 after graduating from UT-Martin. At the time, the new coach was an assistant for the junior high school football team working with the high school program.

"I helped with the high school team as much as I possibly could. In the fall, I'd go out the first week or so with the high school and work with them until our junior high started." For six years, Thomas taught Tennessee History and World Geography in the old junior high building.

Thomas made the transition to the high school in 1985 joining Head Coach Richard Chappell's staff. In the fall of 1988, he was at the helm of Rebel Football. For nine years, he led the program before the school system looked to make

a change.

Thomas's coaching career took a brief two year hiatus. He returned to coaching as an assistant softball coach helping Lorie Pearson. After Wade Comer was named football head coach, Thomas was asked to rejoin the staff helping with the line.

"I had hired Coach Comer as my assistant his first year. He came back to me and wanted me to come in and help him coach. All he wanted me to do was coach the offensive line. Of course I was a little apprehensive about it at the time because I was concerned some people might think I wanted to take the limelight away from him and his accomplishments. I still had a desire and being head coach was never too overly

important to me."

In 1973, Thomas graduated Adamsville High School and went to college but decided the college life was not for him. "I quit and went back home. I worked in a couple factories and construction for a while. I found out I better get into something I enjoy." He found his enjoyment while he helped coach the junior high team back home in Adamsville. He decided he wanted to get into coaching and returned to college.

Being around the kids has kept him in the game. Thomas still enjoys coming to school every day and seeing the students. Having a positive impact on students and players is the most important part of his career.

"Probably the things that stick out in

your mind more than anything are the mistakes you make as coaches more so than the accomplishments. As a coach, having the opportunity for McKenzie to play for the state championship was a great joy."

The ballgame against Mount Pleasant (leading to the state championship game) holds special memories for Thomas, as the Rebels walked away victorious with 35-32 win.

With a lifetime of achievements, Thomas believe the his greatest achievement comes in the thirty-plus year career is the guiding of students and athletes as they develop through four years of high school and make it to graduation.



Bethel Bass' John Garrett Wins First National Fishing Title in State History

PARIS (August 6) — Bethel University's John Garrett walked away with the most coveted prize in the sport of collegiate bass fishing this past week and become the first college angler from the state of Tennessee to claim the title of Bassmasters College Classic Bracket Series Champion.

Garrett and fishing partner Brian Pahl had just returned from Campbellsville, Kentucky where the duo had won second place in the Carhartt Bassmasters national championship presented by Carhartt. That second place finish catapulted both Bethel University Anglers into the Bracket Series, but Pahl fell short in the first day of competition and was eliminated in round one.

Garrett, a 20-year-old incoming junior at Bethel University, won the Carhartt Bassmaster College Series Classic Bracket presented by Bass Pro Shops on Saturday when he weighed a 14-pound, 13-ounce limit before a crowd filled with familiar faces in downtown Paris. That was more than enough weight to defeat Texas State University's Evan Coleman, who had an unfortunate day

on Saturday, and didn't catch a weighable fish.

Garrett, the No. 4 seed in this eight-man tournament, established a pattern early in the week and stuck with it throughout. On the first day, when he defeated No. 5 seed Sam Stone of Texas State, he boated five bass in the 2 1/2 pound range-going first to a shallow hump about a mile away from the launch site at Paris Landing State Park, and then moving another 15 miles south on Kentucky Lake where he fished a ledge in approximately 15 feet of water.

On Friday, he lit into his biggest limit of the tournament—a 19-7 bag that was by far the heaviest of the event, and handily dispatched No. 2 seed Taylor Bivins of Kansas State. Saturday, Garrett caught 35 keepers during Saturday's competition and had a few of his biggest bites break off, preventing his 14-13 from going even heavier.

Regarding the historic win for Garrett and the Bethel Bass Fishing Program, Bethel Bass Head Coach Garry Mason said, "John is such a great angler, a great young man, and a leader of our program, but anytime you win at this level, there's some amount of surprise."

He added, "We were very much in anticipation of seeing John win. This win will be huge for our Bethel University Bass Fishing Program and will be life changing for John and his quest to gain a career in the outdoors industry once he graduates from Bethel."

In addition to the Classic berth, Garrett won \$7,500 to cover fishing expenses, and he earned free entry to all nine of the B.A.S.S. Opens in 2017. He will have use of a wrapped Nitro boat and a fully-rigged Toyota truck for the year, as well.

The Cadets broke the stalemate with a long TD run, but failed to convert the points-after and led 6-0.

McKenzie got the passing game going on the ensuing drive. Eli Surber made passes of 34 and 5 yards to Jaden Currie and Elijah Seivers, respectively, before being stopped at the 1-yard line for a turnover on downs.

Remembering 'The Rock'

In my 13 years of covering sports for The McKenzie Banner, I have had the privilege of meeting many great athletes from our six schools in Carroll County. Without hesitation, I can attest that former Huntingdon High School Mustang sports standout Rocky Bolen was one of my favorites.

I have never written an editorial (and never planned to do so), but the passing of my friend Rocky Bolen demands no less from me. So, it is with sadness that I commit my humble words in tribute to Rocky.

Long before Rocky earned the reputation as one of the toughest football players to ever hail from Carroll County, I was introduced to him by his grandfather, Wayne Roberts, as they cut and trimmed my neighbor Martha Birdwell's yard on North Street in Hollow Rock.

First impressions are often telling, and Rocky's smile as we shook hands that hot summer afternoon spoke volumes.

From that day on, I had the pleasure to watch "The Rock" and his fellow Mustangs compete in middle and high school games on the gridiron and basketball court.

And let me tell you compete is exactly what Rocky did.

Of all the games I watched him play in: one stands out above the rest as a testament to Rocky's "team-first, all-or-nothing" competitive style.

On the night of September 26, 2014, I stood on the sidelines with the Mustangs as they

prepared to battle the state's third-ranked and undefeated 3A Camden Lions featuring the highly-touted runningback, DeShawn Brown. Moments before kickoff, Rocky and I made eye contact, and he was not smiling. As a long-forgotten, former lineman for Hollow Rock-Bruceton, I knew at that moment that Rocky was more than ready to go to war with the heavily-favored Lions.

After a physical first half, the Mustangs trailed Camden 14-7 early in the fourth quarter. Stopping the Lions cold and forcing them to punt, Huntingdon took possession with 76 yards between them and Camden's goal line.

Undaunted by the large Lion defense and the vocal Camden crowd, Rocky and his teammates attacked utilizing traditional Mustang trench warfare. Hammering straight ahead,

Bolen and company gouged Camden's line for tough yards as Huntingdon slowly marched to midfield and into Lion territory. On third and two from the five yard line with less than six minutes left in the contest, Rocky struggled to paydirt as Huntingdon knotted the contest, 14-all.

But "The Rock" wasn't finished.

After helping his teammates shut down the weary Lion's desperation offensive drive, Rocky brought the huge Mustang crowd at Paul Ward Stadium to its feet by veering right side and outrunning Camden defenders 34 yards to score as Huntingdon turned the tables on the bewildered Lions and claimed an emotional, 28-14 victory.

In the celebration that followed, Rocky shook hands with me and flashed that smile I had witnessed years before.

When I heard of Rocky's passing at the McKenzie Middle School Jamboree last Saturday night, I had to step away from my fellow sports colleagues to gather myself. After all, grown men aren't supposed to show emotion, much less cry.

Well...cry I did.

I close my tribute with these words-Rocky, although your time with us was short; you lived a full life filled with joy and purpose. You did your family and friends proud. Every time that I admire my neighbor's beautiful yard, I will think of you and know that the angels and your grandfather are rejoicing with you in Heaven. Rest well, Rock.

MSSD Contracts with Sheriff for Resource Officer

MCKENZIE (August 2) — McKenzie schools will once again have one student resource police officer (SRO) to work with students, faculty, and staff at the three school sites in the McKenzie Special School District.

In a non-agenda item, the McKenzie Special School District Board of Education unanimously approved a contract with the Carroll County Sheriff's Department to provide the certified police officer to provide day-to-day security at the three schools, teach DARE - a drug, alcohol, and bullying training program, provide safety training for faculty and staff, and provide security during ball games.

Previously, the city contracted with the McKenzie Police Department for an SRO, however, the MPD is short on manpower and the city did not reach an agreeable financial arrangement.

Lynn Watkins, director of schools, said the SRO provided through the county, will be an employee of the Sheriff's Department with a contractual arrangement to serve MSSD. He or she will serve the school on a 40-hour weekly contract for a one-year period. The total estimated cost is \$49,317, including a salary of \$36,059 and benefits of insurance, retirement, social security, and worker's comp. The Sheriff's Department will provide all necessary equipment.

The position will be advertised once the contracts are signed. Both the sheriff's department and the school will choose the successful applicant.

Craig Moates, chief of the McKenzie Police Department addressed the board and said his department would continue to provide traffic control at the beginning and end of the school days, and monitor the speed of motorists in school zones. He said the McKenzie force would still provide security at school

events when necessary.

Moates also presented a brochure on a door jam device to secure doors in case of an unwanted person in the building. The chief said the jam was at the floor level and could not be easily overcome.

In other business, the board approved a three-year lease of 125 Lenova brand Chromebook laptop computers at a cost of \$9,000 per year. The units will be serviced or replaced if necessary during the three-year period.

Michelle Horton, a former board member, who died during her term of office, was memorialized during the meeting through the presentation of a plaque to her family. Her husband, Paul, and children Shelby and Lane accepted the plaque from Watkins, who said Michelle was a "spot-on professional" who served for the "right reason."

Aluria Parks, a senior at McKenzie High School, took the oath of service to serve in an advisory role to the full school board. Just as previous student representatives, she will sit at the table where board members discuss and vote on school policy and budgets.

Miss Parks said she is honored to accept the role and hopes to have a little say in school policy. She is the field commander of the McKenzie Marching Rebels, in which she started participating in the seventh grade. She plans to either attend UT-Martin or Austin Peay State University, where she plans to major in music education.

She is the daughter of Melissa Hutchins and works at McKenzie Health Care.

In the Director's Report, Watkins said he accepted the resignation of teachers Rikke Curtis and Janet Esch; employed Jamie Brown as the MHS nurse, Mistee Cooper as the MMS science teacher, Cassie Smith and Amy Scott as MMS English teachers, and Anna Trull as a MES first grade teacher.


In the Director's Report was also a list of possible maintenance items. McKenzie High School still has 12 through-

the-wall heating and air units that need to be replaced with central air conditioning unit. The school replaced several of the obsolete units in some classrooms in recent years.

A long-range proposal to air condition the Middle School Gym at a cost of \$100,000, as well as the McKenzie Elementary Gym for \$160,000. The MHS roof is now 20 years old and its replacement would be \$1,500,000. Paving projects at the football stadium and MMS field-house are estimated at \$25,000, and standard maintenance of HVAC units costs \$60,000 annually. Watkins said adding air conditioning to the MES would probably necessitate the installation of a new roof.



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
