

## County Approves \$23.5 Million Budget, Tax Rate Change

The Carroll County Commission approved a \$23.5 million budget for the fiscal year 2016-17 on Monday, July 18. The new tax rate is \$1.5519 per \$100 assessed value. Last year's tax rate was \$1.4854 per \$100 assessed value.

A tax rate increase reflects an error in calculating the tax base last year by the State of Tennessee. The error is corrected in the 2016-17 fiscal year, which requires a higher tax rate to fund the proposed budget. The county adopted the

\$1.5519 tax rate as certified by the State of Tennessee. The state has determined the total assessed value for taxation purposes is \$61,388,500 in the county.

CKENZIE — For years, Carroll County was an industrial powerhouse, home to dozens of factories and plants that were the foundation of the local economy. Many of those were producers of clothing: H.I.S., Bill Sills (Sillco), Wilker Brothers, Thomas Bradford Shirt Company, Publix, Kimro, and Osh Kosh. One by one, those companies either folded or moved production (usually out of the country), leaving a wake of economic destruction in the fragile area that is northwest Tennessee.

Since the loss of those and countless other industries, local officials have made efforts to draw in more companies to occupy the vacant facilities scattered throughout the county and bring some desperately needed jobs to the area.

Roberto Padilla of McKenzie is looking to prove that there's another way with Dilla's Sewing, an industry grown from the ground up but teeming with potential.

## Inmate Graduates High School, Hopes for College

HUNTINGDON (July 14) — Christie Jones-Beydler was all smiles Thursday at a ceremony to honor her and eight other inmates from Carroll and Benton counties' jails. A high school dropout was awarded a second chance in life at the Carroll County Jail.

The mother of four and grandmother of one spoke about how the staff at the jail, the education program, and the ladies from the Huntingdon Church of Christ, who visited her, had emboldened her life.

"I was a bitter person," said Christie of her life before entering Carroll County Jail. The admitted drug dealer thanked those who believed in her and helped her find the right path in life.

Christie faces a parole hearing on

Tuesday, July 19 and hopes to be exiting Carroll County Jail very soon. Her mother has moved back from Nashville to support Christie.

Christie dropped out of West Carroll High School in the eleventh grade. She has lived with many regrets with the errors she has made in life. Some of those regrets include: a separation from her children for one year, the loss of her dream of becoming an anesthesiologist, and the lack of an education. She achieved her high school equivalency last week with the help of Megan Blackwell, a certified teacher working with the area's literacy program. As soon as Christie is released, she hopes to

## Wine Permit Conditionally Approved

**McKENZIE** (July 18) — Cornerstone Market was denied a permit to sell package wine during a Monday meeting of the McKenzie Alcoholic Beverage Control Board (Beer Board). The McKenzie Mayor and Council, acting as the commissioners, determined the store, located at the intersection of State Route 124 and U.S. 79, did not meet the 500-foot setback from an existing package liquor store as established by state law.

Cornerstone managers filed a \$250 application fee and successfully passed a background check. However, after learning the store is only 267 feet from City Wines and Spirits, commissioners initially voted to deny the application. After learning of a proviso in the new state law that allows the

nearby existing liquor store to give permission, the commission rescinded its first motion and voted to grant the permit if David Barksdale, owner of City Wines and Spirits, gives permission in writing. Mayor Jill Holland and City Recorder Terry McCoy were authorized to assure compliance and issue the permit.

City Attorney Laura Keeton said the new law, effective July 1, allows more privileges to the liquor store if its management allows the new competition. That liquor store could then sell additional items generally found for sale in convenience stores.

Commissioner David Hochreiter said the new law was intended for package wine sales in grocery stores or places with at least 20 percent food sales that qualify for the lower five-percent state sales tax. Prepared food, such as chicken

on a stick, does not qualify. Cornerstone does not appear to meet the qualifications, said Hochreiter.

Mayor Holland said the city can only issue the permit based on qualifying factors other than the percentage of sales. Only the state, not the city, can inspect the sales records of businesses, said the mayor. It is up to the regulating authorities at the state to assure compliance based on food sales.

Voting for the conditional permit were: Gene Hale, Cassie Allen, Charles Pruneau, and Jessie Townes. David Hochreiter abstained and Kevin Gallimore was absent.

A second store was expected to submit its application. Exxon Food Store on Highland Drive-South never completed the application, said Ms. McCoy.

## Johnsons Want Flooding Issue Resolved

Charles and Jacqueline Johnson brought their concern about a flooding issue at their 325 Myrtle Dr. residence to the Huntingdon Town Council meeting July 12.

Jacqueline Johnson spoke to the matter and showed several photos that depicted how their yard floods when it comes a downpour.

"This is a major concern for my property," she told council members who were all present with the exception of John Sanders and Charles Hodges. "My property is just as important to me as the next person's."

She said the culvert is not large enough to carry all the water and causes it to back up in their yard.

"Is there anything being considered to relieve the issue?" she questioned. "Anything in the process for the situation?"

Mayor Dale Kelley said that \$250,000 worth of work would be taking place on the drainage ditch near Browning Avenue that should relieve the situation.

"The water goes down to Knox St. to Woodlawn where it gets bottled up," he said. "We're working feverishly to

correct that problem and will do a lot of repair work on the big drainage ditch through town. The contract has been let and work is beginning."

He added that whenever there is three inches of rain within a two-hour period there would be areas where problems would exist.

"Not only will the town be addressing these problems, but West Tennessee River Basin Authority will be working on the tributaries down Beaver Creek by cleaning out the fallen trees that stops the flow of water," said the mayor.

However, Jacqueline Johnson pointed out that the water comes from behind her house and pushes across the street.

"If it rains an hour or an hour and a half my place is flooded," she said, contending that working on streets below her wouldn't help her situation.

However, the mayor said part of the problem is Beaver Creek that stops the water flow and causes the water to back up.

"West Tenn. River Basin Authority will be here with a backhoe to clean out Beaver Creek," said Kelley. "The water coming through the major drainage ditch can't get through to Beaver Creek and the culvert on Woodlawn keeps the water from draining as

it should."

The mayor assured the Johnsons that the matter would be further addressed if there continued to be a problem.

Public Works Director Randy Crossett also said the problem is downstream.

"The water that goes through your culvert backs up some, but the real problem is downstream," he said. "We're looking at starting down hill."

enroll at Bethel University to obtain a bachelor's degree and later a master's degree in a career to help others.

"I am leaving Carroll County Jail a happy, joyful Christian, said Christie. She said it is all thanks to the Christian, non-judgmental staff at Carroll

County Jail, the ladies of the Huntingdon Church of Christ, and her teacher, Megan Blackwell. Christie also praised the PADDLE program, administered by Goofy Foot Animal Rescue. It places rescued dogs with inmates, who are responsible for the animals' care.

Blackwell influenced all the students to achieve the goal of a high school diploma. While some other students did not complete the course of work for the first graduation, those who

graduated worked and challenged each other to excel.

Roberto and Hilda welcomed their first of three daughters, Jackelyne, in 2006.

In early 2009, rumors were swirling about the fate of New Generations. The couple had just finalized plans to build a new home when they received two big pieces of news in one day. Hilda was pregnant with second daughter, Stephanie, and Roberto's entire family was out of a job.

He would soon land that pivotal supervisor job at Kimro, and has made the most of it ever since.

Wade Smith, Jr. spoke of his objection first.

"I object to the permit being granted," he said.

"We object," said Virginia Smith who stood to voice her objection immediately after her husband. "It's not only in the interest of us, but for public consumption. It keeps some teenagers and others off the road and from having accidents. There are lots of concerns for us and others."

The town's code says no permit will be granted to a place of business to sell such beverages within 300 feet of a residential dwelling, measured from building to building, provided the owner of the residential dwelling appears in person before the beer board and objects to the issuance of the permit.

The town will be forgoing approximately \$18,000 in yearly tax revenue, according to Huntingdon attorney Michael King, who was hired to repre-

sent Hucks in the matter.

Chairman Dale Kelley, who conducted the meeting, said a review concerning any criminal activity of the applicant was conducted by Director of Public Safety Walter Smothers, who verified the information as true and correct. There was no information that would adversely affect the applicant's suitability for the issuance of a permit.

Item II of the review process was conducted by Codes Enforcement Official Randy Crossett concerning the business location meeting the requirements of the zoning regulations, standard codes, or separation from schools, churches, and places of public gathering as defined in the town's municipal code. Crossett certified that the location would be an approved location, but the business is within 300 feet of a residential dwelling.

King spoke during the hearing on the issue.

"We reviewed the code which had the proper location and it could have been amended to 250 feet (from nearest residence) and it is 447 feet from the nearest church," he said.

"But the latter part of the ordinance was not amended and it says 300 feet from a residence and if objected, it gives (the beer board) the opportunity to deny the application."

King added it was previously amended to measure from the front door of the business to the residence, but the ordinance now says from building to building. Hucks contends the back door is not an entrance. He pointed out that Wal-Mart across the street sells beer.

J.W. Hollowell, who was in the audience, questioned the amount of footage from building to building. Town Attorney Bob Keeton confirmed that the measurements showed it was 271.37 feet.

At the conclusion of the hearing, board member Tim Tucker made the motion to deny the permit, which was given a second by board member Melissa Powell with board members Jeff Bailey and Carl Byars, also voting aye. Board members John Sanders and Charles Hodges were absent.

Each penny on the tax rate will generate \$36,788 net revenue.

It includes a two-percent increase in pay for the county employees.

The tax rate is divided as follows: \$1.1219 for the General Fund; \$.1400 for School Transportation; \$.08 for Highway Department; \$.12 for General Debt Service.

Donations to non-profit organizations are as follows: Carroll County Rescue Squad - \$3,000; Gordon Browning Museum \$4,000; McKenzie Memorial Library \$6,000; Carl Perkins Center for the Prevention of Child Abuse \$26,750; Tennessee Rehabilitation Center \$500; McKenzie Senior Citizens \$200; Atwood Senior Citizens \$100; Carroll County Shooting Sports Complex \$10,000; and Carroll County Museum \$200 for a total of \$50,750.

The budget includes two donations of \$10,000 and \$17,000 to the Carroll County Chamber of Commerce for membership and economic development activities and up to \$60,000 to be forwarded to the Carroll County Watershed Authority as part of the agreement to grant the county's tax receipts on appreciated values of homes in the lake area.

Budgetary departments have the following expenditures: General Fund \$12,819,333, \$1,907,479 for Solid Waste/Sanitation;

\$71,362 for the Drug Fund;

\$3,698,549 for the Highway/Public Works Fund; \$2,894,188 for the General Purpose School Fund; \$1,477,860 for the School Transportation Fund; \$642,110 for the General Debt Service Fund; and \$23,700 for the Carroll County School Cafeteria Fund.

The beginning reserve fund balance is \$12,717,582 and the end-of-year fund balance is estimated at \$12,522,121, for a net difference of \$195,461.

Mayor McBride said the county has two major expenditures planned totaling approximately \$450,000 that affects the reserve account.

The first expenditure is the construction of an emergency operations center bunker for a dispatch center at the Carroll County Jail campus. It is estimated to cost \$500,000 for the "hardened" facility. The county's share of the cost is \$200,000 after a \$300,000 CDBG. It will be tornado-proof and will house the dispatchers for emergency services, the county's fire department headquarters, and the emergency director's office.

The second is a new roof on the County Office Complex at an estimated cost of \$250,000.

Additionally commissioners

approved the issuance of a capital outlay note in an amount not to exceed \$170,000 for the Carroll County Highway Department. It is asphalt on Bennett Road and Baker Road.

Marty Hurley of Bruceton

was reappointed to a four-year term to the Carroll County Electric Board.

The final resolution allowed the Carroll County courts to increase the charge for the Carroll County Sheriff's Department to serve papers on individuals or entities. The present rate is \$26 and the new rate is \$40. General Assembly approved the fee increase to better cover the cost of delivering and serving court documents.

Buster Barger, commissioner District 5-Huntingdon, announced his resignation by a written letter. Barger, who was absent, wrote that he moved from the county to Jackson. The Commission will temporarily fill the vacancy during the August meeting. Adult residents of that district can seek the nomination from the Commission to serve until the November election, when the seat will be on the ballot. Those nominations for the temporary appointment can come from the commissioners or the audience during the August 9 meeting.

McBride said the District 8-McKenzie area seat will also be on the November general election ballot. Commissioner Gaylon Sydnor is serving in that position after being appointed to fill the unexpired term of the late Harold Vinson.



Students wishing to enroll in Kindergarten must reach their fifth birthday on or before August 15, 2016. Students wishing to enroll in Pre-Kindergarten must reach their fourth birthday on or before August 15, 2016.

Any student wishing to enroll in a West Carroll school for the

first time must present at the time of registration: a birth certificate or officially acceptable evidence of date of birth, evidence of state-required immunizations, evidence of a current medical examination, and proof of legal residency within WCSSD boundaries.

There shall be a complete medical examination of every student entering school for the first time. This applies to Kindergarten, first grade, and other students for whom there is no

health record.

In the absence of a state-issued birth certificate, parents or guardians must provide legal documentation of the following: maiden name of the student's biological mother; proof of country, state, county, and municipality of the student's birth.

West Carroll Special School District reserves the right to require proof of legal custody.

Students enrolling in West Carroll schools for the first time are required to provide proof of

legal residency within WCSSD boundaries. Acceptable documentation may include any two of the following: a copy of mortgage payment information, a notarized copy of a rent receipt, or a copy of utility bill(s).

Those who enroll a dependent student in West Carroll schools should be informed that any parent, guardian, or other legal custodian who enrolls an out-of-district student in a school district and fraudulently represents the address for the

domicile of that student for enrollment purposes is liable for restitution to the school district for an amount equal to the local per pupil expenditure identified by the Tennessee Department of Education for the district in which the student is fraudulently enrolled. (TCA 49-6-3003)






**Gleason City Board Debates Water, Sewer Issues**

**GLEASON (July 14) —** During Thursday night's meeting, the Gleason City Board and Mayor Diane Poole addressed issues dealing with the city's current infrastructure.

The key topic of discussion focused on service lines conjoined at 106 and 108 Missionary Lane. Dale Stephens of the Public Works Department wanted guidance from the board on how to proceed with the issue.

Stephens explained the two properties were sharing water and sewer lines with independent water meters. The owner of the 106 property requested independent lines to prevent future property damage. The action forces the owners of the 108 property to install new lines as well. The tap fees are \$900. Carol Godwin, part-owner of the 108 property, addressed the board on her concerns. Godwin questioned if there were other ways to go about splitting the lines without

boring a new tap. The question of who is responsible for extending the lines to the home was also raised.

Stephens explained for \$300 the city would complete the line hookup. The price broke down to \$100 for water and \$200 for sewer.

The board questioned the fairness of the ordinance on the forced split. The jest of the issues boiled down to, can a person be denied water or sewer service because the homeowner cannot afford the fees; what are the owner's responsibilities in regards to the split; and would the city be willing to divide the fees into a payment plan?

Charles Bookout made the motion to table the discussion until the board received answers to their specific questions. The motion passed with a called meeting to be scheduled within 30 days when the city has answers.

In other business, the city addressed concerns on the condition of Phelps Street. Roots have pushed up the asphalt. It was determined the best course of action

consists of removing the damaged sections and milling out the roots. The cost of the project was the biggest worry.

Additionally, Carlton Street and Carlton Terrance surfaces were discussed. The public works department was informed to investigate prices for patching and resurfacing the three roadways.

Cason Massey, President of the Gleason Rotary Club informed the board of a \$2500 matching grant received by the club. The grant goes toward the construction of a helipad for medical helicopters. Snider Park was approved by the board for the construction site.

Board member Jerry Connell urged the city to consider aiding in the construction of the helipad. Within the last month, Connell reported Snider Park was used three times as a makeshift landing zone.

Tony Terrell of the water department reported the city scored 597 out 599 on a recent sanitary survey. The high marks provide approval status for the city's water.

**Bassmaster Brings Tournaments to Carroll, Henry Counties**

Bassmaster has released the tentative times for 2016 Costa Bassmaster Junior Championship held at the Carroll County 1000-Acre Lake. The Championship is August 1-3.

On August 1 Bethel University in McKenzie will host a banquet and welcoming ceremony for the Costa Bassmaster High School and Junior championships. An estimated 750 anglers and boat captains are expected to attend.

"Bethel University is happy to join with other financial supporters in bringing this tourism event to Carroll & Henry Counties" said Dale Kelley, athletic director, Bethel University. "The partners are the State of Tennessee Department of Tourism, Bethel University, Village of Paris and Paris Landing State Park, and the Carroll County Chamber of Commerce."

The Junior Bassmaster Championship — a youth competition in its second year — will follow a team format. The event will be comprised of teams grades second through eighth from each state within the three B.A.S.S. Nation regions.

"In 2015, we launched a pilot Junior Championship that had 26 participating states," said Weldon. "Continuing the championship this year, we expect this number to rise exponentially. The Carroll County 1000 Acre Recreational

Lake is a perfect size lake packed with a bunch of bass for the Juniors to catch while maybe catching a lake record bass like we saw last year."

Competitors will compete on Carroll County 1000 Acre Recreational Lake. The Junior Championship anglers will weigh their bass in downtown Huntingdon at the Billy Cary Park at 1:45 p.m.

According to the tentative schedule, anglers launch at 6 a.m. at the Carroll County Thousand Acre Recreational Lake on Tuesday and Wednesday and return at 1 p.m.

The 2016 Bassmaster High School Championship returns to Kentucky Lake out of Paris Landing, Aug. 4-6, in conjunction with the Junior Bassmaster Championship held on Carroll County 1000 Acre Recreational Lake, Aug. 2-3.

"Returning to Kentucky Lake for the third straight year was a very easy decision," said Hank Weldon, B.A.S.S. High School Series tournament manager. "From the hosts, to the fishery and facilities, it is very hard to find a more ideal place than Paris and Huntingdon, Tenn."


This is the third year in a row that the national championship is on Kentucky Lake.

## Gasoline Prices Decline

(July 18) — Average retail gasoline prices in Tennessee have fallen 4.7 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$1.96/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 3,821 gas outlets in Tennessee. This compares with the national average that has fallen 1.6 cents per gallon in the last week to \$2.20/g, according to gasoline price website GasBuddy.com.

Including the change in gas

prices in Tennessee during the past week, prices yesterday were 50.6 cents per gallon lower than the same day one year ago and are 17.4 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has decreased 13.8 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 55.7 cents per gallon lower than this day one year ago.

According to GasBuddy historical data, gasoline prices on July 18 in Tennessee have ranged widely over the last five years: \$2.47/g in 2015, \$3.36/g in 2014, \$3.44/g in 2013, \$3.15/g in 2012 and \$3.53/g in 2011.

Areas nearby Tennessee and their current gas price climate: Chattanooga- \$1.82/g, down 5.3 cents per gallon from last week's \$1.87/g. Nashville- \$2.03/g, down 4.7 cents per gallon from last week's \$2.08/g.

## Sister Tricia Becomes First Female Minister

**MCKENZIE** (July 14) — Reverend LaTricia Trull, who prefers to be called Sister Tricia, became the first female minister at First United Methodist Church of McKenzie on July 1.

Originally from Michigan, Sister Tricia and her family moved to Tennessee when she was 13 years old. They settled in Camden, where her maternal grandfather was a Baptist preacher. At age 16, Mrs. Trull first felt the call to ministry shortly after being baptized.

With the guidance of Brother Eulas Greer, she continued to minister at various churches in Kentucky and Carroll County, Tennessee. Brother Greer, who once served as pastor of local churches Blooming Grove, Seminary, and Community Grove, kept mentoring Tricia and encouraging her to follow where the Lord leads. He introduced her to female pastors, who are still small in number.

In 2013, she completed the local pastor course of study at Candler School of Theology in Atlanta, Georgia. She plans to continue with the advanced studies at Candler.

In the year 2000, she met her husband, Alan, and they joined the Methodist church.

Alan, who now ministers at Blooming Grove United Methodist Church and Seminary United Methodist Church, began his ministry in 2001. Four years later, Tricia began her ministry. Throughout the years, the clergy couple became great resources for one another as they grew as

She served as full-time pastor at Puryear United Methodist Church and Buchanan United Methodist Church for nine years.

She and Alan would preach at the other's churches on occasion so the church families would have the opportunity to become acquainted with their minister's family. Each has a different style of preaching, said Tricia. The two also work together when members of their respective church families need individual attention or counseling. If that parishioner wants a listening ear from someone of the same gender, then that is possible with the clergy couple.

When Tricia was assigned to the First United Methodist Church of McKenzie, she and Alan were pleased that both were assigned to churches in Alan's hometown. Tricia says, "McKenzie is such a loving and supportive community, where the people have a genuine sense of love for one another."

She is excited about the many programs within the community, such as United Neighbors and Meals on Wheels. She hopes to initiate new programs for the youth.

When asked about being a female minister, Sister Tricia said she encounters some resistance. However, as the number of female preachers continues to grow, she receives a lot of support from the community and church. She says that beginning her ministry at the church "as with all change there are challenges but I believe we are off to a good start."

Tricia and Alan are two of three ministers in McKenzie named Trull. Brother Dennis Trull is the pastor of First Baptist Church.





## Facelift Continues on Wildcat Stadium

MCKENZIE — Excitement is building as renovations of Bethel University's Wildcat Stadium continue on the campus in McKenzie, Tennessee. Drew Cowan and his company, TNT Greens continue to lay the base for the field. A new turf will be installed soon.

The new turf will be Astro-Turf GameDay 3D. A recent Michigan State University study ranked the turf closest to natural grass as any product on the market.

According to the results of the year-long Michigan State study, GameDay Grass 3D most closely replicated natural grass in a comparison of 16 types of synthetic and natural sports turf.

The study found the torque,

force and friction generated by cleated athletic shoes is minimized as the GameDay 3D turf was much more realistic and forgiving than most of the standard artificial turf systems currently in use.

Bethel Director of Athletics Dale Kelley said, "We continue to be excited about renovations taking place at the stadium. Other than just being excited about the new look we are extremely pleased with the new turf which not only will look great but it is the best turf being used in the nation. I know our student-athletes will love it. It is proven this type turf cuts down the percentage of injuries. We fully expect it to be ready for our fall seasons."

Kelley added, "A two-lane track will be added and the facility will undergo painting renovations. There will also be a new Wildcat logo at mid-

field. We feel all of these improvements will enhance our recruiting in football, soccer and track and field. Our student-athletes, coaches and fans in all sports deserve the best facilities possible and our goal is to provide that when possible. The playing surface also will be widened so as we can play our men's and women's soccer matches in the facility."

The Football Cats open at home on August 27 against Missouri Baptist. Kickoff is slated for 6 p.m. It will be the first home night game since 2012. The Wildcats are 34-21 at Wildcat Stadium in its ten year history.

Men's Soccer opens against Freed-Hardeman August 18 at 4 p.m. Women's Soccer opens their home campaign August 23 at 3 p.m. against Cumberland University.

Combining for a first place total of 558 out of a possible 600 targets, Stuart Archer (Par-

In Rookie Shooting, the Henry County No Fly Zone Rookie squad finished second with 463. Dalton Dodd (Paris) led the team breaking 171 of his 200 targets, followed by Will Overton (Paris) with 147 and Evan Bevill (Buchanan) 145.

In the Rookie Division National competition, the Henry County No Fly Zone finished fourth with 746 targets. Will Overton of Paris led the No Fly Zone with 163 followed by Dalton Dodd (Paris) with 154, Wade Tucker (Buchanan) with 148, Evan Bevill (Buchanan) with 146 and Parker Dyche (Buchanan) with 135.







# McKenzie Police Department Reports

MCKENZIE (July 14) — Moments after introducing herself to this reporter inside the offices of The McKenzie Banner, District 76 House of Representatives Democratic hopeful Angela Callis spoke about her aspirations to unseat incumbent Republican D76 State Representative Andy Holt in the upcoming November General Election.

She began, "Although I did not anticipate running against Holt in the November election, I decided to commence my campaign in May of this year. During Holt's District 76 House of Representative tenure, West Tennessee has missed out on a lot of economic opportunities because of controversial statements and actions he made bringing unwanted and unneeded negative national notoriety to this region. He (Holt) has made all of us, Republican, Democrat, and Independent alike, look bad in the eyes of the nation and the state, and I am determined to take his seat for the betterment of all people in West Tennessee."

She said, "My work with the Exchange program to the University of Beijing involved studying the financials of companies that had the potential to expand their markets on a global level. One of the company's I proactively assisted in successfully expanding globally is Staples."

Callis said that while working at Memphis State in International Economics, she received a telephone call from a relative that forever changed her life.

She said, "One day while at work in Memphis, a relative called to tell me that my uncle had been airlifted to a hospital after sustaining a traumatic, work-related injury at MTD in Martin. At the time, my uncle was taking care of my grandmother and helping to run her dairy farm business. I knew at that moment that I had to step up for my family, so I moved back to the area to care for my ailing grandmother and run her dairy business and other small businesses that she owned. Needless to say, it was not easy taking on these challenges, but the life lessons that arose from my doing so formed me into the person that I am today."

Callis said, "I saw firsthand in helping my grandmother how medicine and health costs can drain a person's life savings. Faced with a bleak situation, I dug in hard and ran grandmother's farm operation. I made employee payrolls, paid state and federal taxes, paid unemployment and employee insurance premiums, purchased tractors and implements, and paid for equipment repairs. I did it all. Thankfully, I was able to pay off the last 128 acres of land, saving grandmother's farm while preserving it for future generations of family farmers. During those struggles, I learned a lot about farming and a lot about life. You see, family is everything to me, and I will apply those life lessons as

Callis said that real leadership is built upon respect.

She said, "Before I picked up my papers to file as a candidate, I called Governor McWherter's son, Mike, and asked him if it was okay to run for his father's former seat as District 76 Representative. Mike told me that his father would be proud of me for doing so and gave me his blessing. Soon afterward, I met up with former Congressman Tanner, and he gave me his blessing as well. They along with other respected leaders, know that I am someone that is ready to work for everyone and face the challenges that lie ahead for the people of the district. According to her Facebook site, Callis raised \$16,051, Independent candidate Bennie Cas-

tleman raised \$8,565, and Holt raised \$6,200. Callis' financial report included contributions from over 40 donors with an average contribution of \$400.

She said, "We must put politics aside and start working for the people of the 76th District. Unlike my Republican opponent, who got his money from special interests and PACs, my contributions came from hard-working men and women across the district who believe in my campaign because they know that I will respect their voice in Nashville not the voices of big money and special interest."

Leaning forward, Callis spoke about her desire to promote public schools.

She said, "As a substitute teacher in public schools, I am aware of the need to improve the quality and support infrastructure of schools. Many children that attend our public schools in District 76 deal with poverty and hunger. They need help, and I will fight for them. I will also stand up for educators. A lot of teachers have to purchase many classroom materials out of their own pockets after expending the limited amount of money provided to them by their schools. That's not fair to them. They buy for their students because they love them and want to provide them every opportunity to thrive. If elected, I will do all that I can to help schools expand their access to classroom books, computer technologies, and listen to their concerns. I will advocate for education. Some issues in my mind are more important than guns-issues like child hunger and education. I'm not one of those 'vote for me once and you'll never see me again' candidates. I'm here to help, and I am a woman of my word. I am a Christian with a conscience, and I know what matters. I will work across party lines and not waste time picking partisan fights. I support Governor Haslam's Insure Tennessee Plan to keep hospitals open and to provide families with quality, affordable healthcare. I am here to change what Holt has done to our communities. I am asking for the people of District 76 to elect me so that we can work together for the betterment of everyone."
