## Sergeant Kim Barker's Final Call

MCKENZIE (December 27) — It's a tradition among emergency responders to conduct a final call when one of their own dies. Sergeant Kim Barker's final call was December 27 during his memorial service. Part of the tradition is a call of the responder's identification number over the police radio. After a period of no

response, the dispatcher declares a "final call" on the last unsuccessful attempt.

Barker died Thursday, December 22 after a long illness. He served as a patrol officer and moved through the ranks at McKenzie Police Department to earn the rank of sergeant. He served as interim police chief at one point.

Funeral services were at Brummitt-McKenzie Funeral Home and burial was at Jamison Cemetery near Clarksburg. The funeral procession was led by a large number of law enforcement officers from many departments.

## McKenzie Ladder Truck Needs Repair

MCKENZIE (December 22) — McKenzie Fire Department's ladder truck will be out of service temporarily after a official inspection found some concerns with welds in the ladder.

Brian Tucker, fire chief, told the McKenzie Mayor and Council that repairs will cost approximately \$5,000 to correct the welds and to torque some of the bolts. The ladder portion of the truck will be out of service for approximately three weeks. Chief Tucker said the truck can still respond to fires as a pumper truck. Firefighters cannot use the ladder until the repairs. Once the repairs are made, the truck will undergo a second inspection for certification.

Tucker also said the Municipal Complex needs a new roof because of leaks in the police department. The last roof was not installed correctly. Mayor Jill Holland said the city will seek a reputable contractor for the installation.

Because the cost is expected to exceed \$10,000, the city must seek competitive bids for the installation.

## McKenzie Approves Application for Wine In Convenience Stores

MCKENZIE (December 22) — The McKenzie Alcoholic Beverage Control Board approved the application of Romeo Shari, doing business as Exxon Paris 143, Inc. to sell packaged wine in the convenience store, located at 17525 Highland Drive.

McKenzie Police Department conducted a personal background check and measured to assure the store is more than the minimum 500 feet from the existing liquor store.

McKenzie City Council, sitting in session as the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board, voted unanimously in favor of the application. Councilmen Jessie Townes and David Hochreiter were absent.

Shari must now make application to the Tennessee Alcoholic Beverage Commission, which will additional determine if the store satisfies the law that 20 percent of its sales are from taxable sales of food and food ingredients for human consumption.

## Carroll County's Unemployment Rate Drops 0.4 Percent

Carroll County's November unemployment rate of 6.1 percent decreased 0.4 percent from the October rate of 6.5 percent. Neighboring Henry County's unemployment rate decreased from 5.8 percent in October to 5.6 percent in November. Weakley County's November unemployment rate of 5.6-percent dropped 0.4 percent from 6.0 percent unemployment rate in October. Benton County's November unemployment rate of 6.2 percent decreased 0.5 percent from October's rate of 6.7 percent.

Carroll County's labor force for November of 12,260 includes 11,510 employed and 750 unemployed.

Henry County's labor force for November of 14,020 includes 13,240 employed and 780 unemployed.

## Carroll Lake Filling Delayed

MCKENZIE (December 21) — The closing of the water release gates at Carroll Lake proved to be only ceremonial after a problem developed with the small sluice gate that was releasing water down stream. Carroll County Mayor Kenny McBride had the privilege of rotating the wheel to lower the gate, however, the mounting bolts came loose from their concrete mountings and prevented the

small gate from sealing. The gate was again opened. Repairs are expected within the next few weeks.

The two larger, newly fabricated flood gates are closed and ready for service. Those were fabricated by Diversified Contractors in McKenzie.

Harold Wilhite with the Safe Dams Division of the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation has certified the gates and dam and given approval for the lake to refill.

Carroll Lake emptied after a severe flood in June, 2014. Water overflowed part of the earthen dam and heavily damaged the flood gates. The lake was

safely emptied and has remained so since that date.

Tim Broadbent, Regional Fisheries Manager with Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency, said the lake will start refilling as soon as the sluice gate is repaired. Once the lake fills sufficiently, bluegill and catfish will be stocked in the lake. Bass will be added later.

Clear Creek feeds the lake and should fill it fairly quickly. However, fishing and boating will be prohibited for approximately three years as the fish population matures and is sustainable.

## Carter is New Huntingdon Town Recorder

HUNTINGDON (December 13) — Kim Carter took the oath of office as the new Huntingdon city recorder during the December 13 meeting of the Huntingdon Town Council. The oath was administered by Martha Taylor, who is retiring from that position at the end of December. Carter assumes the town recorder duties on Jan. 1. She has been employed with the town since 2003 as an accounting specialist in the Department of Finance and Administration is a certified municipal finance officer, a certification she earned in 2013. She will serve as the Civil Rights Title VI coordinator. In a surprise presentation, Mayor Dale Kelley presented Taylor with the Pinnacle of

Excellence Award. This is the highest award the town presents to an individual or group in celebrating excellence in extraordinary achievement, exceptional performance, and exemplary standards.

Taylor has been employed by the Department of Finance and Administration since 1970 and was appointed town recorder in May 1995 and was also the town's certified municipal finance officer.

"If anybody deserves this award, it's Martha Taylor," said the mayor.

"It's been a wonderful job and I appreciate it," she said. "We've all put a lot in this town."

Vice Mayor Nina Smothers said Taylor has done a great

## Rotary District Governor Visits McKenzie

MCKENZIE (December 13) — Chuck Barnett, Rotary Governor of District 6760, including middle and part of west Tennessee, made his official visit to the McKenzie Rotary Club on December 13. Barnett is a member of the Gallatin Rotary Club, a UT-Martin graduate, and an information technology consultant.

The Carl Perkins Center for Prevention of Child Abuse will distribute the bikes and toys to West Tennessee families.


100.9 The Farm listeners were asked to purchase a new toy val-

MCKENZIE (December 25) — For the third year, the Carroll County Humane Society hosted a Christmas brunch on the big day. The event is an opportunity for members of the community to visit the shelter and its many residents and bless them with gifts that will make life merrier until they find their "forever homes."

Besides what guests brought that day, gifts were distributed from the Angel Garland that hung in the shelter throughout the holiday season. It included about 40 cats and about 40 dogs, some of each fosters, and even more foster puppies. Also included were City of McKenzie pound dogs, and they received some nice gifts.

Items received were dry food, canned food, treats, toys, blankets, beds, buckets, bowls and monetary donations.

Food was provided, as in the previous years, by the Hugueley family, and included brunch bites, mini quiche, cranberry white chocolate scones, fresh fruit with dip, biscuits with ham or sausage, punch and hot chocolate.

The Carroll County Humane Society is a No-Kill Animal Shelter and will not euthanize to make space, nor will they limit the amount of time an animal can stay. A 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, CCHS funding comes entirely from private contributions, bequests, fundraising and grants.

The organization cares for approximately 250 animals at one time in the shelter and in foster homes. Its goal is to utilize adoption and spay/neuter as the community's animal population control - not euthanasia.

CCHS volunteers hope to ensure that all companion animals have a warm, safe, loving home and to assist and educate the public about proper pet care, while also giving shelter to abused animals and assisting law enforcement to prosecute their abusers.

## Former Alderman Returns to the Hollow Rock Board

A former alderman returned to the Hollow Rock Mayor and Board of Alderman in a unanimous vote of confidence at the December 20 meeting.

Michael Smith will serve a four-year term as alderman, just as if he had been elected in the November 8 election after no one qualified. Smith will return to the board in the position formerly held by Maria Crocker, who decided not to run again.

Town attorney Butch Maddox advised that nominations for the position could be made from the floor, from a person seeking the office, or from a board member.

Town recorder Pam Gallimore said Smith and Ronnie Perkins had expressed an interest in the position. Smith was present, but Perkins was not.

Vice Mayor Rob Woods nominated Smith with alderman Curt Lumley seconding the motion.

"I nominated Michael because he's been on the board before," said Woods. "He's an asset to the town."

Mayor Tim Runions agreed with Woods.

"I know he'll do a great job," said the mayor. "He has a lot of experience and has been on the board before. I appreciate his willingness to serve."

The first of two required readings on an ordinance to adopt the 2012 edition of the International Building Code, along with the fee to obtain a copy for city hall, were passed.

Tim Planer, a residential building inspection supervisor with the state Department of Commerce and Insurance, had advised the board at a December 6 meeting

that adopting the building codes would provide advantages for the town.

The benefits of having state permits and inspections include establishing minimum construction standards making homes safer and more energy efficient, leveling the playing field for contractors, and allowing residents to take advantage of government construction programs that require inspections and a Certificate of Occupancy (HAD, RD, FHA). A Certificate of Occupancy is issued, making it easier to close on a mortgage.

There is a permit fee on a graduating scale that will be required of construction companies. The town only keeps \$15 of the fee.

If passed on the second reading, which will be held at the January meeting, a copy of the ordinance will be kept on file at city hall, according to law.

Although, town attorney Butch Maddox said a copy for city hall might cost as much as \$150, town recorder Pam Gallimore said she could get a CD for \$44 and print a copy from it.

During the meeting, police chief Danny Emerson recognized police officer Barry Larkins who was recently presented a Speed Enforcement Award from the West Tennessee Law Enforcement Network on December 13 for the West Tennessee Region. The award entitled, "Helping You Arrive" was in recognition of Larkins' safety consciousness toward speed limits.

"He does a great job of traffic enforcement," said Emerson. "His plaque was for all of West Tennessee."

The mayor complimented Larkins on his award.

"We're proud of you," said Runions. "I appreciate all your hard work."

In other business, board members:

• Heard from Lumley who said that Twin Cities Baptist Church members, who have been using a portion of Fire Station No. 2 for church services, while remodeling their church, will no longer need it after February 1. Groceries have been bought for two needy families that the town is helping for Christmas. He said LED lights for the gym area of Fire Station No. 2 is being checked into and he'll have more to report at the January meeting.

• Were informed by town employee Kenny Chandler that the 1993 Ford F-700 dump truck that the town purchased for \$12,000 from John Marchek of North Lake, Wisconsin was parked out front for council members to view.

• Received information about the police department's activities for the month of November. There were 8 speeding citations given, plus three more citations issued for other offenses. Two individuals were arrested with six charges.

job in her 21 years as town recorder.

"As we look around our town, I can't remember what it looked like then when you began your leadership," said Smothers. "But I'm confident that it looks better and in much better shape than it was," she said. "Thank you for your service and dedication as we look forward to continued growth in the future."

A reduction of the financial responsibility agreement for fiscal years 2015 and 2016 relating to the financial assurance to the landfill closure was approved.

The original in-lieu-of performance bond agreement was signed in 1995 in the amount of \$645,872 as the town's assurance in the event of a problem during the 30-year post-closure period for the town's landfill site. The remaining liability obligation amount is \$104,500.95.

When the landfill was closed, private contractors bid over \$200,000 to close it. However, the city employees instead performed the work for approximately \$70,000 - a tremendous savings to the town, according to the mayor.

In other business, council members:

Heard from the mayor, who complimented Main St. Christmas, the tree lighting and Christmas parade as a

Were informed city hall will close Dec. 22, 23 and 26 for the holidays and the Dec. 27 council meeting is canceled.

Approved the first reading of an ordinance that changes the town position in charge of the administration of the Americans with Disabilities Act Program from the administrative assistant to the codes enforcement officer, Randy Crossett.

Weakley County's labor force for October of 15,880 includes 14,990 employed and 890 unemployed.

Of Tennessee's 95 counties, four of the 10 counties with the highest unemployment are in West Tennessee. They include: Lake (95th place, 8.3 percent), McNairy (91st place, 7.1 percent), Lauderdale (89th place, 7.0 percent), Obion (88th place, 7.0 percent). They are joined by Rhea (94th place, 7.8 percent), Scott (93rd place, 7.5 percent), Hancock (92nd place, 7.1 percent), Jackson

(90th place, 7.1 percent), Grundy (87th place, 6.9 percent), and Bledsoe (86th place, 6.7 percent).

Eight of the 10 counties with the lowest unemployment are in Middle Tennessee. They include: Williamson (1st place, 3.4 percent), Davidson (2nd place, 3.5 percent), Rutherford (3rd place, 3.6 percent), Sumner (4th place, 3.7 percent), Moore (6th place, 3.8 percent), Cheatham (7th place, 3.8 percent), Robertson (8th place, 3.9 percent) and Maury (9th place, 3.9 percent).

Knox County in East Tennessee is 10th in the state in unemployment with a rate of 3.9 percent.



**Huntingdon Purchases Former Funeral Home for Museum**

The building across the street from the present Huntingdon City Hall will soon become the Town of Huntingdon's museum.

Council members voted at the Dec. 13 meeting to purchase the Terrell Broady Funeral Home property at 19805 East Main Street. The building previous served as a chapel for Dilday Funeral Home and prior to that, it was the Carroll County Library.

Originally, the museum was planned for an upstairs area of the new city hall. However, the new property will provide a larger space for the museum.

The town will pay \$300,000 for the property for a nine-year term. The appraised value is \$219,200.

State regulations require the initial note for the purchase of property be for a three-year term with two, three-year extensions allowed.

"This is the same process we went through for the note for the purchase of the new city hall which we paid off in Fiscal Year 2016, before the completion of the original term," said Mayor Dale Kelley.

Kelley said the note of \$300,000 includes \$200,000 for the purchase

and \$100,000 for renovations. A local contractor looked at the building and estimated \$70,000 is needed to repair and renovate with the remaining funds to be used toward set up and getting the museum open.

The annual debt payment for the proposed note is approximately \$33,333. Wright Charitable Trust Board has approved a \$10,000 donation annually for ten years to be applied toward the purchase, making the annual cost to the town \$23,333 with the note through Carroll Bank & Trust.

Two notes, one for the City Hall and one for Edwards Park were retired this year. They are more than enough to cover the debt service for the proposed new note.

Finance Committee Chairman Melissa Powell said members of the committee met and recommended the purchase of the building.

In conjunction with the purchase, a resolution authorizing the issuance, sale and payment of 2016 General Fund Capital Outlay Note not to exceed \$300,000 was approved. The interest rate is not to exceed five percent per annum.




