

Dr. James Alton (J.A.) Barksdale International Man of Intrigue

he name, Dr. J.A. Barksdale, was a name I've seen over the years in one context or another. So while scratching my head and looking for an interesting topic I came across his name. It must have been a sign; I stopped and read a few highlighted passages.

To my surprise, he may have been one of the most interesting or well traveled individuals from McKenzie. He was known as a man of deep moral and ethical conviction, he lived by the principles he taught.

James Alton (J.A.) Barksdale was born November 19, 1904 to James Monroe and Judith Esch Barksdale. Judith was James second marriage. His first wife, Delia Hedgecock died in the same year of her son, Clarence.

The Barksdales moved to Carroll County around 1878. James Monroe worked his entire life as a farmer. He was known as a kind, considerate and generous man, who never raised his voice

in anger. James Monroe and his wife lost their lives in a fire in June of 1933.

J.A. graduated from McKenzie High School and earned his Bachelor of Science degree from Bethel College. In 1928, he married Eleanor Herrin.

He later earned a Master's Degree from the University of Colorado, a doctorate from the University of Tennessee and an honorary doctorate from Bethel

During the majority of his advanced collegiate course work, Dr. Barksdale was a teacher and administrator at the secondary school level. He also served as a professor and administrator at the university level.

He served as a superintendent of schools, state commission, dean of a college, advisor in Turkey during the Kennedy administration, and president of Bethel College to name a few of

his accomplishments. He was appointed Commissioner of Education under Governor Gordon Browning. As

commissioner, Dr. Barksdale testified before the House of Representatives' select committee to investigate the education, training and loan guaranty programs under the GI Bill. The committee investigation focused on the \$14 billion spent on helping veterans. Committee Chairman Olin Teague stated they would "make some recommendations to Congress so to what we think should be done to take any of the what we might call bugs out of this program where we may not have gotten our money's worth to the taxpayer or to the veteran.'

According to transcripts from the proceedings, Dr. Barksdale was brought in to testify because members of the committee thought they would benefit from his "advice and suggestions concerning the evolution of the policy of the state department of education pertaining to allowing the school to do live work."

Live projects are defined as projects that can be worked on in real-time and with a defined deadline. These projects provide a hands-on experience on any ongoing work in a company. A live project can be called as an internship or training because a student can gain real work expertise before getting a full-time job.

In his testimony, Dr. Barksdale explained how he put a clearer definition of the work allowed as live projects and how the State of Tennessee was working to prevent abuses of federal funds:

"Live projects not permitted to be worked on if they are not school property or property of

the veterans who is enrolled in the school or property of the veteran's immediate family. The veteran must show that he or members of his immediate family has owned this property for 30 days prior to being accepted by the school. If its is necessary to accept live projects for repair other than as stated above in order to have a well-balanced training program, the attached form must be completed and retained by the school. If complaints are received by this office that school is abusing the privilege, it will result in withdrawal of the approval after investigation shows that the complaints

are justified." A few committee members worked to trip him up on certain incidents that occurred in Nashville, but he was unphased by the line of questions.

In the 1960s, he worked for the federal government overseas in Asia serving as a "Consultant in Education" in Turkey and

Jordan. After his work with the government, Dr. Barksdale and his wife Eleanor returned to McKenzie. Although he was looking to retire, he took on the position of Professor of Education at Bethel

College. With a stellar career and an impressive resume, Dr. Barksdale remained humble about his accomplishments. It was noted never said, "when I was Commissioner of Education or Dean of Tennessee Tech." He was at ease with the governor or with the person who plowed his garden. As a teacher he was at his best, having the rare ability of holding one's attention completely. College students praised his ability. Dr. Barksdale was in great demand as a speaker and church leader.

Dr. Barksdale died November 10, 1980 at the age of 75 in Paris, Tenn. He is buried alongside his wife at Shiloh Church Cemetery in McKenzie. With Dr. Barksdale's impres-

HUNKER DOWN WITH KES

Talk About A Bad Rap!

The first president that affected my life directly was Herbert Hoover. It didn't matter that he left office fourteen years before I was born. Dad referred to him every time we asked for money. I'd only need two dollars to buy a football..

"I don't think so, son," Dad wouldn't even consider it, "you never know when those 'Hoover Days' might fall on us again." It was the sentiment of many who had lived through the Great Depression. I spent my formative years kicking Mr. Hoover for his thoughtless leadership that kept my 1950's "spending money" to the bare minimum

Herbert Clark Hoover was born in West Branch, Iowa, in 1874. His father died when he was six, his mother passed away when he was nine. He was sent to live with an aunt at the Osage Indian Reservation in Pawhuska. Oklahoma. From there he was shuffled off to an uncle in Newberg, Oregon.

You know what I'm thinking here, how could a boy with such humble beginnings grow up to wish harm off on anybody... much less create a worldwide depression all by himself.

By sheer determination Hoover managed to get enrolled into Stanford University. Working nights, weekends and summers to keep himself in school, he graduated in 1895 with a degree in geology. After a rough start, he ended

up in Western Australia, scouting gold fields for a prestigious mining company. He worked hard and he was good at what he did. He made his boss, and himself, lots of money. He went to China and did the same thing.

By 1914 Hoover was living in London and operating his own company with offices in several cities around the world. His net worth was in the four million dollar range. Not bad for an orphan from West Branch.

But here is where the story really begins.

World War I broke out. There were one hundred thousand Americans stranded in Europe. Hoover immediately organized an effort to get as many as he could safely home. He continually assisted and gave aid and relief to the ones that remained.

As Germany overran Belgium, they commandeered most everything and refused to feed or care for the conquered masses. Hoover pressed BOTH the English and German governments for permission to intervene. He raised money and food for the vanquished nation. He crossed the North Sea forty times and met with German officials to insure they did not confiscate food meant for the Belgium people.

His work did not go unnoticed. Hoover became Secretary of Commerce under both Presidents Harding and Coolidge. Among his many accomplishments was working tirelessly to bring relief to the hundreds of thousands displaced by the devastating Mississippi River floods of 1927.

Just doesn't seem like a Great Depression type guy to me.

He was inaugurated as the 31st President of the United States on March 4, 1929. The stock market crashed in October, sending America spiraling into the economic recession that lasted until the beginning of World War II. President Hoover

months! Regardless of what Dad (and most of the world) thought, Hoover didn't have the means, opportunity or wherewithal to get us into something that large in such a short amount of time! He had the misfortune to jump on the horse just as it headed over the cliff.

He was the first president to not take a salary while in office. He didn't need it. But that leads us to the most important thing vou need to know about Herbert Hoover.

McKenzie snapped a two-game losing streak and qualified for their first playoff berth since 2016 with a 28-7 win over Adamsville Friday night. It was also Senior night for seven Rebel football players including West Cook, Micah Austin, Jeremiah Moore, Evan Jarrett, Jordan Barnhart, Kyle Maxwell and Witt Mitchum. McKenzie got the ball to start the third quarter and drove the ball all the way to the Adamsville 1 yard line before Micah Austin took a hit and lost the football inside the one.


Adamsville recovered the fumble. Both teams swapped possessions with McKenzie ending the third quarter threatening to


score again.

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
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

ty honored three former athletic greats, one team and two contributors with inductions into the prestigious Bethel Athletic Hall of Fame Saturday. The event was held in Crisp Arena.

Prior to this year, ninety-one people and three teams were enshrined into the hall. The 2008 National Championship soccer team was the first team to be inducted at the 2013 ceremonies. The 1970-1971 Men's Basketball Team was enshrined in 2016. The 1982 Men's Basketball squad was inducted in 2017.

It was the 39th Hall-of-Fame Ceremonies celebrated by the school. Here is a look at the 2019 Athletic Hall-of Fame Class:

Cliff Barna:

Cliff Barna was raised in Ocala, Florida and it was a football scholarship that brought him to Bethel University in McKenzie. Cliff received his undergrad degree in Computer Information Systems in May of 2008 and a Masters in Education in May of 2010 from Bethel.

After receiving his Masters in Education, Cliff felt called into ministry in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. In the summer of 2010 Cliff started his journey to receive a Masters in Divinity from Memphis Theological Seminary. After completing his Masters in Divinity, Cliff was ordained into the Cumberland Presbyterian Church on Bethel's campus on December 13, 2014.

As a Bethel football player, Cliff held both records for All-Time Sack Leader and All-Time Tackles for Loss Leader at one point. He started every game of his collegiate football career. After college Cliff had the opportunity to play Arena football in Huntsville, Alabama for one season.

After professional football at the Arena level, Cliff became an Assistant Football Coach for Bethel. He coached for seven years while also working as the Chaplain of Athletics for two years.

After Bethel, Cliff served as a teacher, coach, and administrator at Christian Community School, a K-12 private school in the Nashville area. Cliff is now serving as the Senior Pastor at Tusculum Church in Nashville and has held those duties the past two years.

Cliff is married to his beautiful wife, Kasey, who is from Paris, Tennessee. She graduated from Bethel with a Bachelor of Science and Nursing degree. Kasey also had a successful softball career under Coach Larry Geraldi at Bethel. Kasev received a Masters in Nursing Education and is working as the Facility Professional Development Educator for TriStar Centennial Medical Center in Nashville.

Cliff and Kasey have two children. Daughter Ellie Anne is four vears old and Lincoln Josiah will be two years old tomorrow (November 3). Cliff is immensely grateful for the beautiful family

She was also named Honorable Mention All-American during her tenure at Bethel. She scored six goals and had two assists for 14 points in an 11-1 non-conference win over Trevecca her senior season and finished her career with 97 goals. Leah was a key performer on the 04 team which is being inducted into the Hall-of-Fame today.

Growing up, she played soccer at the club, provincial, and international level. She played with the U17 Canadian National team, and after her collegiate career at Bethel she played semi-professionally in Tampa, Florida in the W League. She is married to Clint Blackburn who played basketball at Bethel. They have been married for 10 years, and have two beautiful children. Brice, four years, and Rainey, two years. They live in Jackson, Tennessee and Leah just recently started a personal fitness training business, LB Fitness, She is working on her soccer coaching license and will be coaching girls' soccer with the Jackson Wolves.

Coach Malang Jarju:

Coach Malang J.J. Jarju is in fourth season as head coach of the Bethel Wildcats and 12th overall at the school.

He was a member of the Wildcats from 2003-2007 and then was a longtime assistant with the program. Coach Jarju was named as interim head coach in July of 2016 after the resignation of his longtime mentor Melvin Belong. He earned his Bachelor of Science degree in Physical Education from Bethel University in 2008 and his Master's Degree in Education this past year.

He is a native of Banjul, Gambia in West Africa, where he attended Nusrat High School. Jarju played for both the junior and senior national teams of Gambia.

He owns the record for goals scored in a career at Bethel College at 56. He also holds the record for points in a career at 151 and assists in a career at 39. He was named All-TranSouth Conference first team All-Region first team and NAIA All-American Honorable Mention. He is the first ever Bethel men's soccer player to have his jersey retired and hung in Bethel's Baker Fieldhouse.

As a coach, Jarju holds a U.S.S.F. C Certificate and a member of NSCAA. He is involved in a soccer Club with Jackson Wolves and player development in Jackson Tennessee and the surrounding communities. He conducts several soccer camps every summer which are recognized as some of the best in the South. The Wildcats were 15-4-1 last year. They finished 7-1 in the SSAC.

Bethel has been ranked in the NAIA Top 25 Coaches' Poll this year. Coach Malang resides in McKenzie.

2004-05 Women's Soccer Team:

The 2004-05 Bethel Women's Soccer team was the first women's squad in school history to make it to a national tournament quarter final berth. They finished the season 20-4-1 after falling in the national tournament in two overtimes 2-1 to Concordia in Santa Barbara, California. They had earlier beat Park University and Azusa Pacific, Highlighting the APU match was the Lady Cats winning on a goal by All-American Alicia James. Bethel won and the 40-yard shot is still recalled by Bethel soccer fans to this day.

The Lady Cats were the KIAC Champions. They won the NAIA Region XII championship. Bethel completed the season ranked No. 16 in the nation.

Coach Misty Aird was named conference and regional coach of the year. Coach Aird commented on the team and season. "To win the conference and regional championships were big accomplishments for our team and each of us. We were thrilled to be going to the national tournament and we played well enough to win it. We fought some adversity but never lost our focus and confidence. This was and is a great group of ladies and we were honored then and now to represent our school and this program."

One of the highlights of the trip to the national tournament occurred off the playing field. The team visited the TV set of the "Price is Right." Bethel player, Morgan Giles Butler was chosen to play and won a car in the Showcase Showdown.

W. Kent & Charlene Jones:

W. Kent & Charlene Jones have been longtime supporters of Bethel College and University for many years. The McKenzie natives are graduates of the school and their support in various ways has never wavered. Part of the fabric of each one of their lives are woven in purple and gold. Kent is a graduate of Vanderbilt University and has been a licensed and renowned attorney for 56 years.

He is recognized as one of the great all-time voices of West Tennessee athletics covering sports on the radio or as a public address announcer for seven decades.

At the age of 19 he started with WHDM doing tape replays of McKenzie High with his first game being in 1957. He had worked the board prior to that listening to Art Mooney call Tennessee games and was inspired to become a broadcaster in his own right. He did three different stints with WKTA calling McKenzie High football and Bethel College basketball for a total of seven years. He then worked three years with WCMT and worked on the UTM network doing games all throughout the South. He worked at WVHR for 21 seasons serving as the voice of the Huntingdon Mustangs and broadcasting 270 games including four state championship appearances and the 2003 Mustang title.

The iconic and distinguished voice was already familiar to West Tennessee fans but even more so recently to Bethel Wildcat football fans as the P.A. voice of the football Wildcats for ten seasons.

His dedication to his family and his broadcasting can be summed in a weekend that took place in 2003. That Friday he had lunch with his son and family in Dallas, flew home to do the Huntingdon/ Milan playoff game and then flew back to Dallas to have breakfast to reunite with his family again. He said, "American Airlines was right on schedule."

Kent is a member of the Carroll County Sports Hall-of-Fame.

Charlene Penick Jones is a graduate of McKenzie High School and Bethel College with majors in Music and English. She also graduated from Vanderbilt with a degree in Music Education. She had a great impact and a servant's heart as a teacher in the McKenzie school system sharing her love of music for 20 years. As former student and now Associate Athletic Director Brad Chappell stated, "Charlene was my teacher and a great one. When she held up one finger and told you that was one, you did not want her to

Charlene is a former church organist and choir director at Huntingdon Methodist Church and is presently choir director at McKenzie First United Methodist Church. She served on the Bethel University Board of Trustees for three terms. Charlene and Kent have been married since 1958 and two sons, Richard Kent and Charles David. They have four grandchildren, Justine, Maggie, Bella and Fielding Jones. Charlene shares this night with her sister Jenny Penick Garner.

Bethel Director of Athletics Dale Kelley commented, "Kent and Charlene have both contributed so much to so many. Their love of Carroll County and Bethel is absolutely immeasurable. They care about people and have impacted so many in our area. I am proud to call them dear friends and so happy to share this day

Bethel Associate Athletic Director Brad Chappell said, "The 2019 Hall-of-Fame class is rich with a tradition of excellence in athletics at Bethel University.
