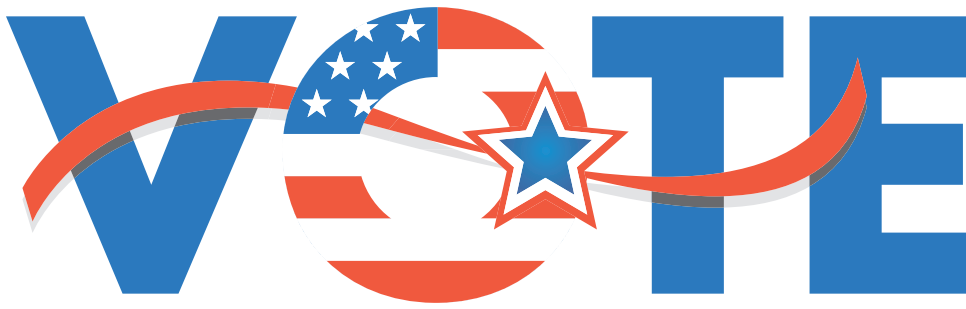

## Secretary Hargett Encourages Tennesseans to Vote Early

NASHVILLE (July 10) — Early voting for the Tennessee State and Federal Primary and County General Election begins Friday, July 17, and runs Monday to Saturday until Saturday, August 1. Election Day is Thursday, August 6.

"The safety of voters and poll officials are our top priority," said Secretary of State Tre Hargett. "With social distancing measures and many other safety precautions in place for this election, I urge voters to take advantage of Tennessee's generous early voting period."

Early voting provides Tennesseans the opportunity to avoid Election Day crowds and can shorten your wait time. Early voting also offers the flexibility of evenings and Saturdays along with multiple polling locations in many counties.

During early voting and on Election Day, Tennesseans are encouraged to do their part. This includes wearing a face covering and maintaining a six-foot distance from poll officials and other voters. Voters should expect to see signs with further safety instructions at their polling locations. All poll officials will be wearing face coverings and will be trained to social distancing measures.



"County election commissions have been planning for a safe and secure election for months," said Coordinator of Elections Mark Goins. As part of our commitment to safety, the state is providing masks, social distancing resources, gloves, gowns and face shields for poll officials."

Tennesseans can find early voting and Election Day polling locations, view and mark sample ballots and much more with the GoVoteTN app or online

at GoVoteTN.com. You can download the GoVoteTN app for free in the App Store or Google Play. Reviewing your sample ballot and deciding how you will vote will reduce your time at the polls.

Voters who have moved within the county or have had a name change since the last time they voted can update their registration online at GoVoteTN.com. By making sure your registration is up to date, you can shorten the time you will need to spend at your polling location.

Tennesseans voting early or on Election Day should remember to bring valid photo identification with them to the polls. A driver's license or photo ID issued by the Tennessee Department of Safety and Homeland Security, by Tennessee state government or by the federal government are acceptable even if they are expired. College student IDs are not acceptable.

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# How to Become a Tennessee Voter

## Voter Eligibility

To be eligible to vote in Tennessee:

You must be a citizen of the United States.

You must be (18) years of age or older on or before the date of the next election.

You must be a resident of Tennessee. Visit the link at the end of this story to find information regarding guidelines for determining residency and special considerations for homeless persons residency and non-resident property owners.

If you have been convicted of a felony, your eligibility to register and vote depends upon the crime you were convicted of and the date of your conviction. If your conviction made you ineligible, you may regain your eligibility if your conviction has been expunged or if you have had your voting rights restored, unless you were convicted of a crime that rendered you permanently ineligible to vote.

## How Do I Register To Vote?

Use online voter registration to conveniently register to vote or update your voter registration.

Download and complete the Voter Registration Application and submit the application to your local county election commission.

In order to participate in an election, a qualified voter must be properly registered no later than thirty (30) days before the election. The election commission office will process any voter registration form that has been postmarked at least thirty (30) days before the election. T.C.A 2-2-109.

Register during a transaction with one of the following agencies:

- Department of Health (WIC program)
- Department of Human Services

- Department of Safety (motor vehicles division)
- Department of Veteran's Affairs

Once you are registered, please tell your friends on social media by printing a sign and posting your photo with it using the hashtag #GoVoteTN. You can print it in color or black and white.

## John Stevens Announces Senate Re-Election Bid

I'm asking for your vote in the August 6 Republican primary. I've shrunk the size and scope of state government, protected the Constitution, and reduced burdensome regulations on business and agriculture.

## FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

# Absentee Voting

### 1. Am I eligible to vote absentee by-mail?

You can vote absentee by-mail if you fall under one of the following categories:

You will be outside the county where you are registered during the early voting period and all day on Election Day.

You or your spouse are a full-time student in an accredited college or university outside the county where you are registered.

You are on the permanent absentee list (see question 4 below).

You reside in a nursing home, assisted living facility or home for the aged outside your county of residence.

You will be unable to vote in-person due to jury duty.

You are sixty (60) years of age or older.

You have a physical disability and an inaccessible polling place.

You are hospitalized, ill or physically disabled and unable to appear at your polling place to vote; and/or you have determined it is impossible or unreasonable to vote in-person due to the COVID-19 situation.

You are the caretaker of a person who is hospitalized, ill, or disabled, and/or you have determined it is impossible or unreasonable to vote in-person due to the COVID-19 situation.

You are a candidate for office in the election.

You serve as an Election Day official or as a member or employee of the election commission.

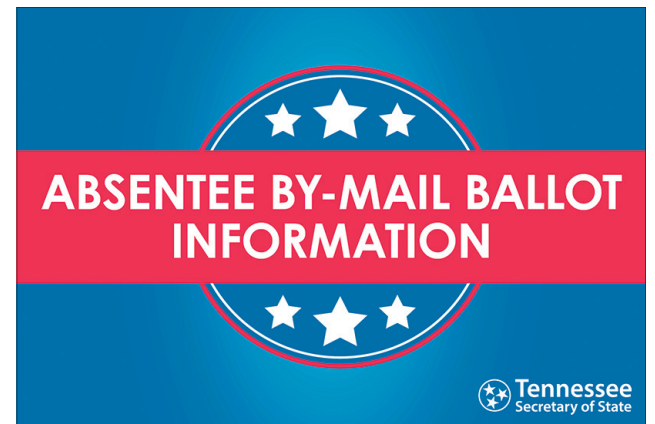
You are observing a religious holiday that prevents you from voting in person during the early voting period and on Election Day.

You or your spouse possess a valid commercial drivers license (CDL) or Transportation Worker Identification Credential (TWIC) card and you will be working outside the state or county of registration during the open hours of early voting and Election Day and have no specific out-of-county or out-of-state address to which mail may be sent or received during such time.

You are a member of the military or are an overseas citizen.

### 2. How can I request an absentee by-mail ballot?

You must submit a written request containing the information below to your local county election commission office by the seventh day before Election Day. You



can use the absentee ballot request form to make sure all required information is provided.

You can submit your written request for an absentee ballot by mail, fax, or e-mail. If e-mailing your request, be sure the attached document contains the information below and your scanned signature.

Name of the registered voter

Address of the voter's residence

Voter's social security number

Voter's date of birth

Address to mail the ballot

The election in which the voter wishes to participate. If the election involves a primary, the political party in which the voter wishes to participate.

Reason the voter wishes to vote absentee. If applicable, a copy of the CDL containing the CDL number or the TWIC card must be included in the voter's request.

Voter's signature

A request that contains this information will be processed and a ballot will be mailed to the voter.

**NOTICE:** A person who is not an employee of an election commission commits a Class E felony if such person gives an application for an absentee ballot to any person or commits a Class A misdemeanor if such person gives an unsolicited request for application for absentee ballot to any person. T.C.A. § 2-6-202(c) (3) and (4).

### 3. What if I do not provide all of the information required on the absentee by-mail ballot application?

The county election commission will return the application to you so you can make corrections and resubmit your application.

### 4. Do I qualify for the permanent absentee list?

You will receive an application for ballot for each

election if your licensed physician signs a statement stating that, in their judgment, you are medically unable to vote in person. The statement must be filed not less than seven (7) days before the election and signed under the penalty of perjury.

### 5. When can I request my ballot?

You may request an absentee by-mail ballot no earlier than ninety (90) days before the election and no later than seven (7) days before the election. To be processed for the next election, the application must be received by the election commission no later than seven (7) days before the election.

The deadline for the August 6 election is Thursday, July 30.

Requests for the November presidential election cannot be received until August 5.

### 6. What if I do not receive or ruin my ballot and can no longer use it?

You should notify your county election commission.

### 7. What is the deadline to return my ballot so it can be counted?

You must mail your ballot in time for your county election commission to receive it no later than the close of polls on Election Day.

### 8. Can I hand deliver my ballot to the election office?

No. You must return your ballot by mail (USPS, FedEx, UPS, etc.).

### 9. Is any additional information if I registered to vote by mail?

Unless you are on the permanent absentee voting register or enrolled in the Safe at Home program, you must appear in-person to vote in the first election after you have registered by mail. If you have already voted in-person since you registered, then no additional information will be required to vote by mail.

**State law requires voters to have Federal or State government issued photo ID to vote, unless an exception applies. College student IDs will not be accepted. The voters must have photo identification when they present themselves to vote. This includes early voting, which is ONLY at the election office, and Election Day voting at your assigned polling place.**

1. Those outside the county during Early Voting and Election Day
2. Students and their spouses enrolled in a college or university outside the county in which they are registered
3. Individuals on the Permanent Absentee Register due to illness or disability
4. You have a physical disability and an inaccessible polling place.
5. \* You are hospitalized, ill or physically disabled and unable to appear at your polling place to vote; and/or you have determined it is impossible or unreasonable to vote in-person due to the COVID-19 situation.
6. \* You are the caretaker of a person who is hospitalized, ill, or disabled, and/or you have determined it is impossible or unreasonable to vote in-person due to the COVID-19 situation.
7. Registered voters who are residents of any licensed nursing home, home for the aged or similar licensed institution
8. Jurors
9. Voters 60 years of age or older
10. Candidates for office
11. Election officials
12. Individuals observing a religious holiday on Election Day
13. A voter who possesses a valid Commercial Driver License and who will be working outside of the county or state during Early Voting and Election Day

Voters who want an absentee ballot may send a written request or call the Carroll County Election Office for an Application for Ballot, no later than **THURSDAY, JULY 30, 2020.**

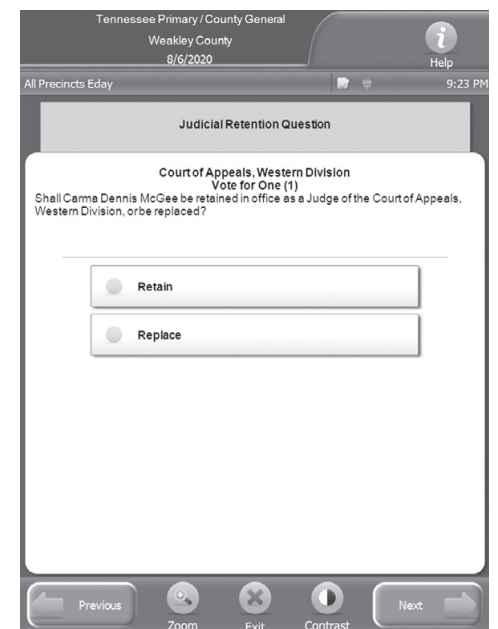
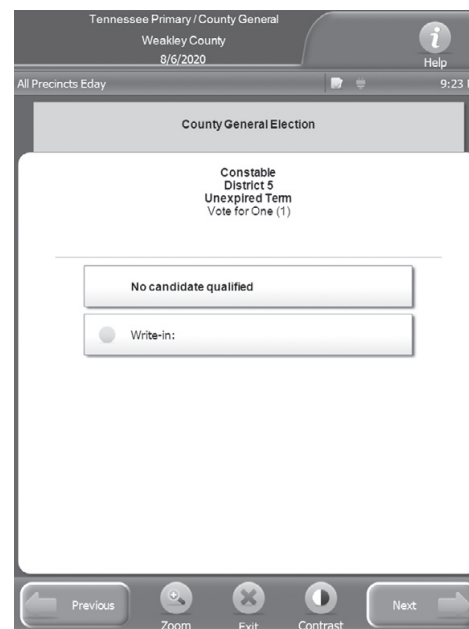
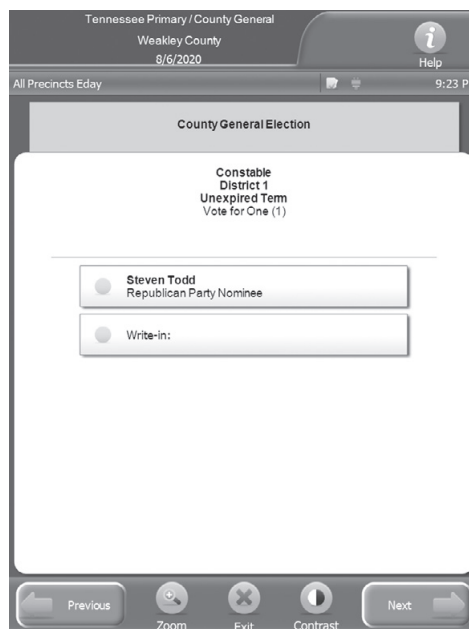
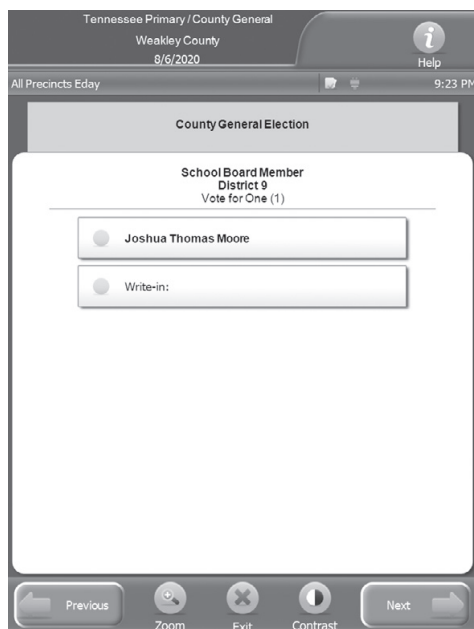
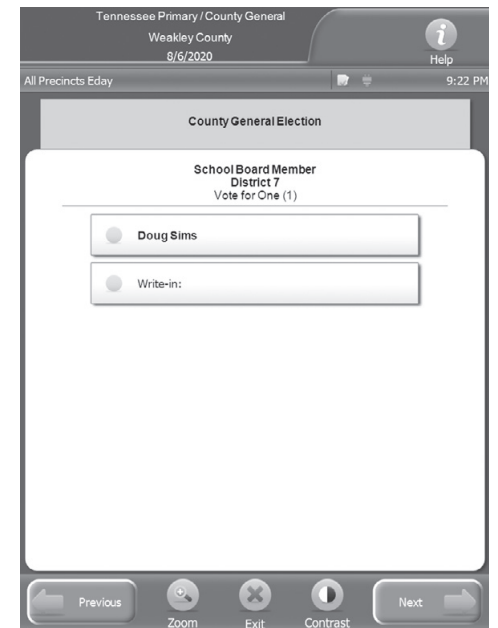
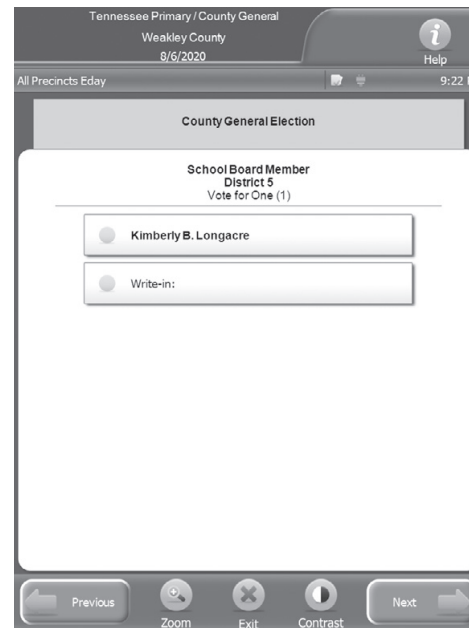
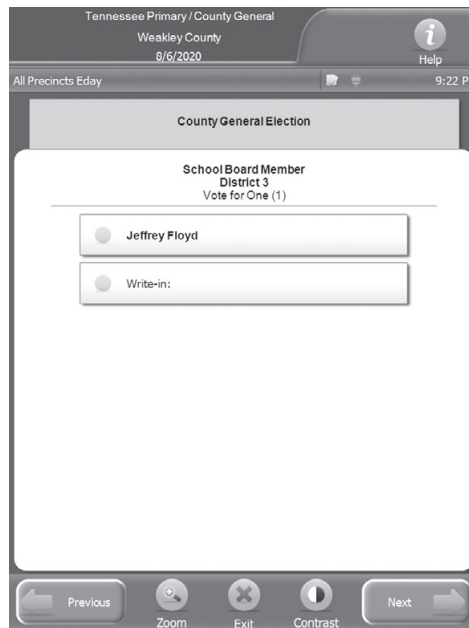
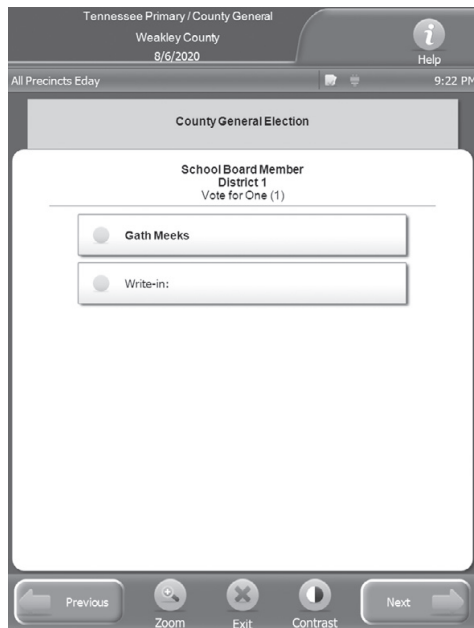
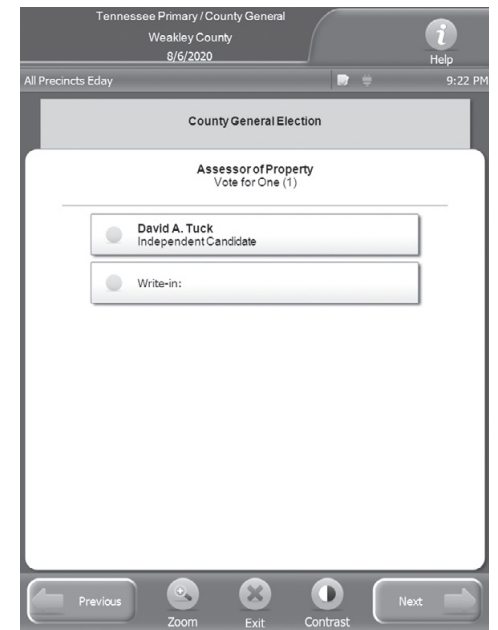
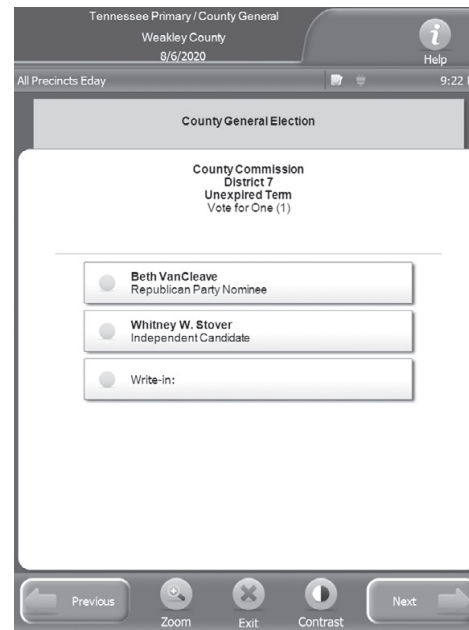
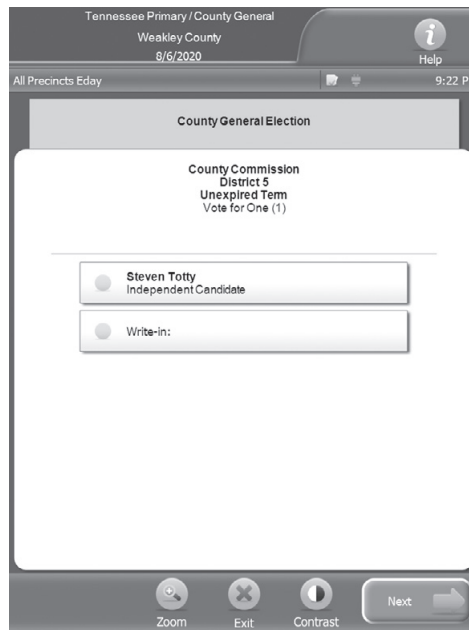


# Sample Ballot State Republican Primary

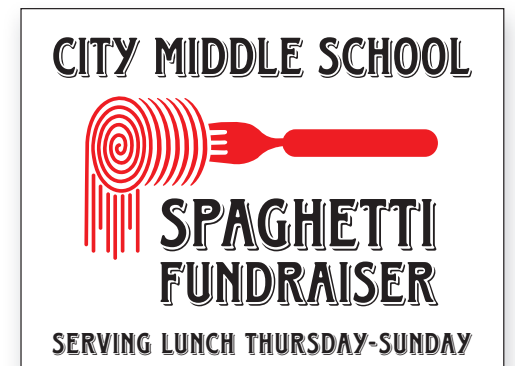
